BOOKS AND STUFF

Mix of sci-fi, conspiracy, coming of age makes for good read

The book I chose was “A Diamond in My Pocket,” the first in the Unaltered series by Lorena Angell. It is a little sci-fi, a little conspiracy, a little coming of age and a pretty darned good read.

Calli Courtnae would describe herself as an OK-looking 17-year-old with good grades and few close friends. Calli decided to join the track to team to avoid the boredom of being home alone while her doctor parents work.

Usually the slowest on her team, today she sets a world record with ease. Unsure of what just happened, she is approached by a beautiful woman who tells her she must leave with her immediately to train for the Olympics. To Calli's shock, her parents agree without asking any questions.

Within hours, Calli is in a secluded compound in the mountains of Montana. This isn't an Olympic camp. It is one of several housing individuals with unusual powers. Each “clan” has a special ability. This one is for runners. Others are seers, healers, hunters and readers. No one individual has all the various powers.

Calli is told that centuries ago, some embryos were affected by special radiation endowing them with certain super-human traits, and she's a descendant. Deep inside, she doesn't feel like she fits in, and none of the other young people make her feel even a little welcome.

By the second morning, Calli has been assigned a dangerous journey.

Three members from each of the clans are being held hostage by the Death Clan — a group of healers who want to become immortal. They will release the hostages when they get the powerful Sanguine Diamond.

The hunky Chris, shifty Justin and slowpoke Calli plus several other “shield” runners are chosen to deliver the diamond. While waiting for it to be given the lead runner Chris, Calli is approached by the enchantress, Maetha. She gives Calli the real diamond, explains that Calli is the only one who can deliver it, and that she must keep it an absolute secret. Chris will unknowingly carry a fake.

Town of Elderon Ordinance 9-9-19

Pike Lake, Town of Elderon and Town of Reid, Marathon County

A Sole Ordinance to Regulate Boating Upon the Water of Pike Lake and Prescribing Penalties for Violation Thereof.

The Town of Elderon Board of the Town of Elderon does ordain as follows:

Section 1 - Applicability and Enforcement: The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to the waters of Pike Lake. This chapter shall be enforced by the officers of the Town of Elderon.

Section 2 - Intent: The intent of this ordinance is to provide safe and healthful conditions for the enjoyment of aquatic recreation consistent with public rights and interests and the capability of the water resources.

Section 3 - State Boating and Safety laws Adopted: State boating laws as found in ss.30.50 to 30.71, Wis. Stats., are adopted by reference here.

Section 4 - Penalties: Wisconsin state boating penalties as found in s. 30.80, Wis. Stats., and deposits established in the Uniform Deposit and Bail Schedule established by the Wisconsin Judicial Conferences, are hereby adopted by reference and all references to fines amended to forfeitures and all references to imprisonment are deleted.

Section 5 - Severability: The provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed severable and it is expressly declared that the Town of Elderon would have passed the other provisions of this ordinance irrespective of whether or not one or more provisions may be declared invalid. If any provision of this ordinance or the application to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provisions to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected.

Section 6 - Definitions: "Slow-no-wake" means that speed at which a boat moves as slowly as possible while still maintaining steerage control.

Section 7 - Slow No Wake Area: No person shall operate a boat faster than slow-no-wake in the waters of Pike Lake beginning at buoy markers located at the southeast area markers 1 and 2 and ending at the northwest markers 3 and 4 at any time.

Buoy Marker #1: latitude 44.81058N longitude 89.35052W

Buoy Marker #2: Latitude 44.81020N Longitude 89.35014W

Buoy Marker #3: Latitude 44.81155N Longitude 89.35315W

Buoy Marker #4: Latitude 44.81153N Longitude 89.35231W

Please see attached map with markers.

Section 8 - Posting Requirements: The Town of Elderon shall place and maintain a synopsis of this ordinance at all public access points within the jurisdiction of the Town of Elderon pursuant to the requirements of NR 5.15, Wis. Adm. Code. Under the authority of the Town of Reid, the Pike Lake Sportsman's Club agrees to post the ordinance and purchase, place, and maintain the four buoys.

Section 9 - Effective Date: This section will become effective upon its passage.

Wittenberg teen sings at Carnegie Hall

Schmidt gets to see wonders of New York

WITTENBERG — Not everyone can say they sang at Carnegie Hall, but one lucky Wittenberg teen has added that to her list of credits.

Seventeen-year-old Brianna Schmidt went to New York with her vocal group Bella Voce in March to sing in an a cappella choir event produced by Distinguished Concerts International New York.

DCINY provides opportunities for singers and instrumentalists to perform in prestigious concert halls.

According to their website, they produced their first concert in 2008 and, as of 2019, more than 70,000 performers representing all 50 states and 47 countries have participated in a DCINY production in the form of 17 world premieres and over 200 concerts.

Schmidt has been singing with Bella Voce, a coed group of 16 members in Wausau, for a couple of years under the direction of Julie Burgess, a vocal teacher in D.C. Everest School District. They rehearse as a group once a week for two to three hours, but closer to performance time they rehearse twice a week. This is the third time Burgess has been invited to bring her group to a DCINY event.

As part of this international event, they got to join singers from Canada, New Zealand, Great Britain and Asia. It was a mix of people who did it for a hobby, to ones who were on the path to being professionals between the ages of 12-88.

Schmidt sang in a group of 300 under the direction of Deke Sharon, music director and arranger of the “Pitch Perfect” movies. They rehearsed two hours, twice a day, at the hotel basement. Other singers

had solos or sang in smaller groups. All of the performers had been working on the same material, and the show was pulled together that weekend of rehearsal.

The day before the show, they rehearsed at Carnegie Hall. On March 24, they performed to a sold-out crowd of 3,000.

It wasn’t all work; there was plenty of time to do some sightseeing. Her father, Mark, went along on the trip. Her mother, Lisa, was home recuperating from a recent surgery.

“We got to see ‘Phantom of the Opera’ from the box seats,” said Schmidt, acknowledging that her father had to sit in the nosebleed section.

She enjoyed Times Square the most and remarked that you could tell who the Midwesterners were on the trip, because they came prepared and brought umbrellas for the rainy weekend.

“I know why they call it the city that never sleeps — horns and sirens are going off all the time,” said Mark Schmidt. “The taxi drivers are the best in the world — weaving in and out of traffic without a scratch.”

Brianna Schmidt is a senior this year, home-schooled by her mother, would like to go into cosmetology and pursue singing professionally. Just recently, she met with a producer and there is the possibility of producing a CD.

For now, she will continue to sing with Bella Voce. They perform at the St. John Episcopal Church — they donate the hall and basements for rehearsal — and other venues throughout the year.

Schmidt might go again next year if they get invited back to New York.

“Maybe the show would be at Lincoln Center or Ed Sullivan Theatre instead of Carnegie Hall,” said Schmidt. “Radio City Music Hall would be great.”
