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Local dispatcher honored as Hometown Hero

Mary Beck receives First Responder of the Year Award

Shawano County sheriff's dispatcher Mary Beck was honored by the state recently for assisting a Bowler couple deliver their baby while they were stuck on the road during a February ice storm.

Beck received a Hometown Hero award as First Responder of the Year in Assembly District 6, which is represented by Gary Tauchen, R-Bonduel.

The State Assembly awards Hometown Heroes when they have done something amazing for their community and recently focused on first responders as part of October's First Responders Appreciation Month. There were recipients of the award from each Assembly district across the state and state representatives selected their local winner.

The awards were handed out Oct. 10.

"I was very honored to get it and that such a small department was nominated," Beck said. "It was a beautiful ceremony. I'd like to thank Rep. Tauchen for nominating me."

Beck has been doing this work for about 30 years, 20 of them with the Shawano County Sheriff's Department.

But on Feb. 4, 2019, in the midst of a hectic flurry of weather-related calls to the dispatch center, she took a call that put her in a position she's never been in before.

A Bowler couple, Matt Grall and Pilar Gauthier, was on the road during an onslaught of freezing rain with Gauthier going into labor.

The call came in shortly before 7 a.m., after Beck had already been on duty for about 11 hours, having come in early the night before.

Beck's partners in dispatch paged out the ambulance and tried to get the closest deputy possible out to the scene while she instructed the caller and his wife on what to do. Due to the weather and so many other calls, deputies didn't arrive until after the baby was born.

Beck read instructions from an emergency medical dispatch protocol that provides instructions for a variety of different situations, including

child birth, and led them step-by-step through the process, checking on the health of the baby and the mother as she went along.

The citation given to Beck at the ceremony reads as follows:

"WHEREAS, Mary Beck serves Shawano County with honor and distinction as an Emergency Dispatcher within the Shawano County Sheriff's Department; and

WHEREAS, Mary has been nominated by citizens of Wisconsin State Assembly District 6 for the honor of First Responder of the Year; and

WHEREAS, on February 4th 2019, Mary received a 911 emergency call from a Bowler couple - the wife had gone into labor and her upper body had become numb - they required emergency aid and were now stuck in the midst of an extremely severe ice storm; and

WHEREAS, Mary acted swiftly, confidently, and to the best of her abilities - assisting the couple in the successful delivery of their healthy baby boy within their vehicle amidst the rough weather before the ambulance was able to arrive; and

WHEREAS, first responders from across Wisconsin are being recognized in the State Capitol with a Hometown Hero Award for their service and sacrifice; now, therefore

LET IT THEREFORE BE RESOLVED...that Senator Robert Cowles and Representative Gary Tauchen, on behalf of the Wisconsin State Legislature, hereby recognize Emergency

Dispatcher Mary Beck as the First Responder of the Year for Wisconsin State Assembly District 6 in recognition of her selfless dedication and service to our community and state."

Nominations for the Hometown Hero award are predicated on a variety of factors including a specific heroic action, a significant professional achievement, community work, and/or length of service.

"It's important that we honor our first responders who serve and protect our communities every single day," Assembly Speaker Robin Vos said. "We appreciate their dedication and would like to express our gratitude for putting their lives on the line for the safety of others."

Shawano County Supervisor Jon Zwirschitz passes

Longtime board member died Monday at 66

SHAWANO — The Shawano County Board this week lost a longtime member who was praised by his colleagues for his dedication to the county and in particular his commitment to public safety.

District 27 Supervisor Jon Zwirschitz died Monday at Aspirus Hospital in Antigo. He was 66.

"I'm going to really miss the man," District 4 Supervisor Mike McClelland said. "He was a real gentleman. He paid attention to what was going on and he was very well-informed. I'm really going to miss Jon."

Zwirschitz and McClelland sat next to one another on the County Board and often arrived an hour before board meetings.

"We would talk about what was going on on the board, what we thought was going to happen," McClelland said. "We just tried to work things out in our heads."

McClelland said Zwirschitz was honest and conscientious.

"Jon's going to be missed by everybody who knows him," he said.

Zwirschitz joined the board in 1998, losing his seat to Marion Wnek in 2012 after redistricting. Zwirschitz won his seat back from Wnek in 2014 and had served as a supervisor since then.

"Jon was an all-around good guy," County Board Chairman Jerry Erdmann said, "A lot of people liked him. We all appreciated basically what he did for the county as far as being on top of things with the sheriff's department and other issues in general."

"Jon was just a down-to-earth basic good guy that always kept the county in mind when it comes to spending and other things," Erdmann said.

Zwirschitz, who's nickname was "Bear," was currently serving as chairman of the public safety committee.

"I've been working with Bear on the Public Safety Committee since 2015," Sheriff Adam Bieber said in a Facebook post. "He helped with the fruition of the evidence building,

body cameras, drug court, upgrades in dispatch and jail, and has always been supportive of law enforcement's mission of improving our community for family and friends. His leadership and support will be missed."

Erdmann said notices will be published seeking someone to fill out the rest of Zwirschitz's term, which ends in April.

In addition to his work on the County Board, Zwirschitz was president of the Mattoon Snow-Runners and a Mattoon Fire and EMS volunteer for 48 years.

The funeral service will be held at 11 a.m. on Saturday at Schmidt & Schulta Funeral Home, Birnamwood. Visitation will be held from 9 a.m. until the time of services at the funeral home.

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Task force to address indigenous women victims

Proposed panel would be help to find the missing, murdered

SHAWANO — Thousands of unsolved cases involving missing and murdered indigenous women across the U.S. have prompted introduction of a bill in the Wisconsin legislature for the state to develop a task force to examine the problem but first to get a firmer grip on the scale of the problem.

The task force is still awaiting consideration in the legislature. Rep. Amanda Stuck, a Democrat from Neenah, is the primary author of the measure that has garnered bipartisan support, including co-sponsorship from Sen. Rob Cowles, a Green Bay Republican. Stuck is running for the 8th Congressional District seat.

The task force would be made

up of four or more tribal government representatives, two or more female tribal elders, two members each from the Assembly and Senate, two representatives of law enforcement, one or more attorneys, a county coroner and at least four representatives of organizations such as the Wisconsin Coalition Against Sexual Assault and tribal health agencies.

The task force is something that Shannon Holsey, president of the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohicans, wants to see become a reality. Holsey is also a member of the National Congress of American Indians.

“This is something that we have been discussing for some time, because it’s multi-faceted,” Holsey said. “It really was surrounded by

the protection of Indian women and tribes.”

The goal of the bill is to get some acknowledgement that the crisis of missing and murdered indigenous women exists, Holsey said. There are more than 5,000 unsolved cases nationwide, but the crime is believed to be under-reported.

“It’s not a fixation on an issue just in Wisconsin,” Holsey said. “It’s national.”

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention has reported that murder is the third-leading cause of death among American Indian and Alaska Native women and that rates of violence on reservations can be up to ten times higher than the national average.

About 84% of Native American

women have experienced violence in their lifetime, according to Holsey. Sexual violence has been experienced by 56% of Native American women, and 55% have experienced physical violence by an intimate partner. Almost half of Native American women have been stalked.

“That’s pretty telling,” Holsey said.

Holsey is not the only local Native American seeking support for the task force. Rachel Fernandez has been doing her part with the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin to bring this hidden and dark aspect to society into the light.

“A lot of people don’t realize the impact this has,” Fernandez said. “The violence that our

women face, it's not just happening on the reservation. It's down the street. It's in the homes. It's everywhere."

The issue is underreported because Native Americans learned back in the boarding school era — when Native American children were taken and taught to live like white Christians — that you don't report when something bad happens, according to Fernandez.

"We should be holding our women as sacred," Fernandez said. "We cannot be forgotten."

One outstanding murder case on the Menominee reservation is the death of Rae Tourtillott, killed in 1987.

There are two rewards totaling \$20,000 for information leading to an arrest and conviction in her death.

"People know what happened. People know who did it. They're just not saying anything," Fernandez said. "It's really sad because I can't imagine that happening to my daughter. Rae's mom is an elder, and she has had to endure this pain and this loss since Rae went missing and they found her remains."

Fernandez said there are other cases she's learning about by visit-

ing with elders and other community members.

Fernandez said she believes the issue dates back to colonization, when foreign settlers considered Native Americans to be unintelligent and something that should be exterminated.

"When we have non-natives think of us as 'less than,' that behavior perpetuates continued violence," Fernandez said.

Holsey said she plans to testify at hearings for the bill, noting it's an issue ignored for too long.

"As tribal leaders, we have no greater priority than protecting our women and children and elders," Holsey said. "Too often, these native women are invisible, and it's really important to alert our state representatives about this issue. This can't wait."

The Leader reached out to local legislators for comment on the bill. Cowles did not return calls seeking comment, and Derrick Scherdell, spokesman for Rep. Gary Tauchen, said Tauchen did not have any comment because he hadn't had a chance to look at the bill.

"Phil was a heck of a guy. He was a good guy," Supervisor Bruce "Duffy" Schultz said.

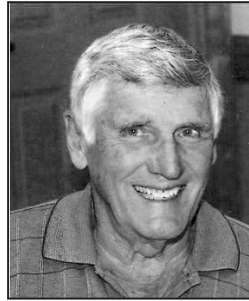
Schultz said Zuhse and his wife Carolyn did a lot for the community, and Zuhse was always well-informed on issues facing the town.

Impeach President Trump or palace coup?

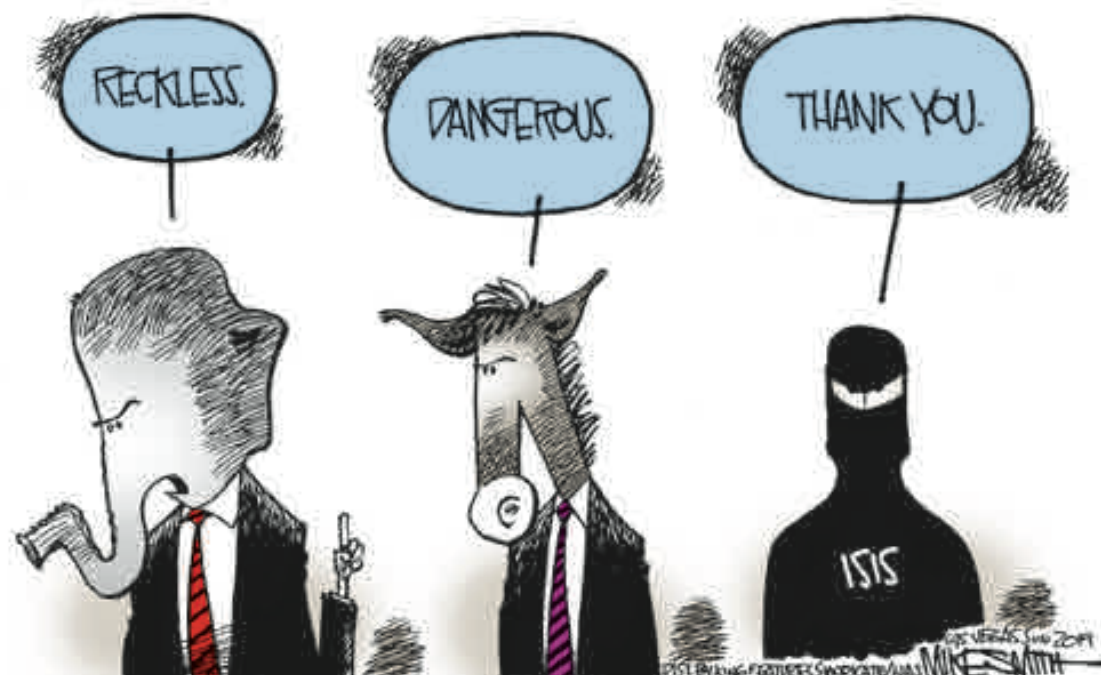

New airport terminal dedicated

New facility includes meeting room for business travelers

When Wilmer Zeuske's name was added to the Shawano City-County Airport in 1954, a dedication ceremony was held. The municipal airport was renamed for the first Shawano area aviator to die in World War II.

"At that dedication, one plane flew in and one man walked out—Wilmer's father," recalled Gene Zeuske, now 95, and a cousin to the airport's namesake. The image of the hero's father walking across the runway had an emotional impact that has remained to this day.

Gene Zeuske was one of the speakers at the ceremony celebrating the opening of a new terminal at the field at 248 Airport Road in Shawano. He was joined by other Zeuske family members, pilots, elected officials and airport board members. He and other members of the Zeuske family recalled Wilmer Zeuske and the legacy that he, and other airport supporters, have created.

Prior to the ceremony, the public had a chance to see the new terminal and chat about flying at an hour-long open house. Visitors were able to tour the new building, which includes the office, a multi-purpose room, pilots' lounge and desk space.

Pilots and supporters of the airport used the opportunity to talk about the impact of the airport,

and, of course, flying.

Shawano's airport is primarily used for "pleasure flying," said Airport Manager Clarence Schampers.

"On a weekend we'll get six or eight (planes) before breakfast. They go to breakfast at Seasons, then others come in and go to the Launching Pad for lunch," he said.

The airport has an automatic weather station

that pilots can access, he said. Rather than an air traffic controller, pilots coming into the airport use the same frequency to announce their arrivals and departures to other pilots.

Schampers has been with the airport since 1971, and said the biggest change he has seen has been the automated weather system, which allows pilots to dial into a repeating weather broadcast. Navigation with GPS services has been a big change as well, he said.

Schampers said he feels the new terminal will have a positive impact on pilots.

"Anytime you've got something new, it has an impact," he said.

He added that during the week, businesses also use the facility. One of the features of the new terminal is a multi-purpose room, allowing business people from all over the country to attend a meeting in Shawano without having to leave the airport.

The impact on business and development was a recurring theme, both in conversation and in the ceremony. Shawano's current 3,900 foot runway allow for small jets to land but many commercial gets require 5,000 feet, Schampers said.

Doug Engel, airport commission member and master of ceremonies for the event, said that on today's site, the longest runway could expand by another 1000 feet.

The business connections to the runway have been part of the culture there since the beginning, Engel said. "In 1945 if you ordered something from Boston Store in Milwaukee you could have it air delivered in Shawano," he said. He added that he did not think that there was a high demand for that service.

State Rep. Gary Tauchen presented plaques from the Wisconsin Senate that honored Wilmer Zeuske's service with the Flying Tigers in WWII, and flags that had flown over the state capitol.

Gene Zeuske closed the ceremony by reading short excerpts from Wilmer Zeuske's letters to his family during World War II. The young flyer closed one of his letters with a line that proved to have more lasting impact than he, as a 21-year-old, could have imagined at the time: "I'll do my best to keep them flying."

Authorities make 5th arrest in Wisconsin THC vaping business

KENOSHA (AP) — Authorities have made a fifth arrest in connection with a black market THC vape manufacturing business in Wisconsin.

A 22-year-old Racine man is accused of working for the large-scale operation in Kenosha County. He's facing charges of possession of THC with intent to deliver.

Forty-three-year-old Courtney Huffhines and her sons, 23-year-old Jacob Huffhines and 20-year-old Tyler Huffhines, are accused of operating the business from a rented Bristol condo and the mother's real estate office in Union Grove.

Prosecutors say the business employed 10 workers who manufactured thousands of vape cartridges a day using THC oil purchased in California.

The number of vaping-related illnesses in the U.S. continues to rise, now reaching about 1,300 cases.

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Pneumonia vaccine recommended for ages 65 and over

APPLETON — An estimated 900,000 Americans develop pneumococcal pneumonia each year, according to the Centers for Disease Control. Of that number, approximately 400,000 require hospitalization and as many as 25,000 of those individuals die from the infection.

"Pneumococcal pneumonia can be a very serious disease, especially for the elderly population," said Dr. Kelli Heindel, medical director of primary care for the ThedaCare Clinically Integrated Network. "That's why we recommend that anyone 65 and older receive the two doses of the pneumococcal vaccine."

The pneumococcal bacterium, *streptococcus pneumoniae*, is responsible for causing pneumococcal pneumonia, sepsis (a bacterial blood infection), ear infections, sinus infections and meningitis.

It is one of the most common causes of pneumonia in older adults and the most severe in nature, the

CDC reports.

Pneumococcal bacteria spread from person to person through coughing, sneezing and close contact. People can carry the bacteria in their nose and throat without being sick, which can then spread to others.

Heindel said everyone 65 or older should talk to their doctor about getting the vaccine once they turn 65 and then the second dose of the pneumococcal vaccine one year later.

"Those immunizations will help protect older adults from the serious infections the pneumococcal bacteria can cause," Heindel said. "The benefits so outweigh any potential minimal risks associated with an immunization."

Heindel also advised that anyone ages 2-64 who is in a high-risk category — diabetic, asthmatic, a smoker or some who are immunocompromised — should talk with their doctor about receiving the immunization.

"People with those health concerns should be immunized," she said. "And they may also need a booster shot during their lifetime."

Unlike the flu vaccine, which is only available in the fall, the pneumococcal vaccine is available throughout the year.

"The flu vaccine changes every year because the viral strains causing the flu change over time," Heindel said. "The flu is a viral disease whereas pneumococcal disease is caused by bacteria, and that bacteria does not change. That's why people generally only need to receive the shots once."

She also noted that there are

several different types of pneumonia, so someone who has had the pneumococcal vaccine may still develop pneumonia, though it will likely be less severe.

"One of the most common scenarios we see is an older person developing pneumococcal pneumonia following a bout with severe influenza," she said. "If the person isn't vaccinated, they run the risk of the pneumococcal bacteria becoming invasive and causing sepsis and other serious health conditions that sometimes can be fatal. These pneumococcal diseases can take off like wildfire, which is why it is so important to be immunized."

Doctor: Take low-sodium juice study with grain of salt

RIPON — Each year, more than 610,000 people die as a result of heart disease, according to the Centers for Disease Control. In fact, one in every four deaths can be attributed to cardiovascular disease, the leading cause of death in Americans. New research claims to report that drinking tomato juice could help lower a person's blood pressure, thereby helping improve their overall heart health.

"It's always important to be skeptical when taking in articles like this," said Dr. Steve Rasmussen with ThedaCare Physicians-Ripon. "We should remember at times these studies — as it might have been in this case — are funded by a company that might have some financial interest in people drinking more tomato juice."

When we notice things like that, it should raise some red flags."

The recent article in Food Science & Nutrition unveiled the results of a year-long study by Japanese researchers, which showed that among participants who drank an average of one cup of unsalted tomato juice each day, some had lower blood pressure during the study.

Rasmussen explained this study and others show that what people ingest and how they care for themselves daily can make a difference in their overall health.

"I don't think that this is a real definitive study," Rasmussen said, "but it does show that more tomatoes in your diet or tomato juice could be helpful."

State DNR reaffirms commitment to dealing with climate change

MADISON — The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources reaffirmed its commitment to addressing the impacts of climate change on Wisconsin's natural resources in a memo to staff last month.

In the memo, Secretary-designee Preston Cole outlined the department's role in addressing climate change and clean energy through adaptation and mitigation.

"Climate change is one of the defining issues of our time. From shifting weather patterns, increases in average temperature, higher frequency and intensity of rainfall to heavier snowfalls, the impacts of climate change directly impact Wisconsin," Cole said. "The DNR is entrusted to protect the people's resources, and as a result, we need to recognize the factors that drive change and must plan accordingly."

In August, Gov. Tony Evers signed an executive order to address the issue of clean energy in Wisconsin.

Evers directed the Department of Administration to create an Office of Sustainability and Clean Energy.

This new office will coordinate with the DNR and others to develop and implement a clean energy plan for Wisconsin.

The department also remains committed to the Wisconsin Initiative on Climate Change Impacts, which brings DNR experts and other agencies together to assist decision-makers across the state.

As the DNR carries out its work, the department will keep staff and the public informed through new climate websites.

At the heart of the DNR mission is bringing together diverse perspectives and relying on science to inform decision making.

Additionally, the department's mission requires the department to ensure the right of all people to use and enjoy Wisconsin's natural resources.

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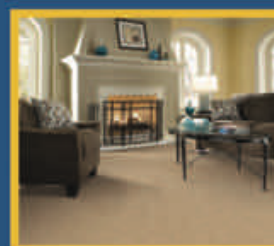

Wildcats earn win on senior night

Gresham coach Tim Wild said the group has played a big part in the program's recent success on the court, which includes two conference titles and a regional title over the past three seasons. "They've had a lot of success on and off the court, and that's starting to show."

Nietzer finished the night with 16 attack kills, four block kills and four aces, while Jensen provided strong serving and had 12 service points. Hoffman finished with 14 assists.

"It just means a lot. Just like going back on all the memories you have and to finish strong, it just means a lot personally and as a team," said Nietzer of the win.

"It meant a lot to me tonight. I'm really proud of my teammates; we really just worked together really well on the court tonight," said Hoffman. "It was just a great feeling to get the win, especially on senior night."

All five of the Wildcat seniors started the match and worked as a unit to battle back from an early deficit.

The third set was a back-and-forth battle in the early going before Gresham went on a 5-0 run with Jensen serving to go up 10-5.

Stockbridge whittled the deficit down before tying the set at 17, but the Wildcats answered with a 6-0 run to regain control. Nietzer added several more kills during the stretch,

while Hannah Cerveny served.

A Stockbridge serving error sealed the set, giving Gresham its 15th win on the season. Sophomore libero Kalayla Tucker tallied nine digs to round out a strong team effort for Gresham.

"I definitely think that we're headed in the right direction right now," said Wild. "Not just in skills and the way we're playing, but we're really loose as a team. We're having fun out there. There's a lot of smiles, and everybody is working together, and that's a huge part of why we're having so much success right now."

"I think we are all very confident; we're all ready for the playoffs and very excited. We're hoping to make it back to the regional finals again this year," said Hoffman.

Traditional bows return bowhunters to a nostalgic era

What's the most powerful force in nature? Is it sex? Hunger? Thirst? The desire for love and to be loved?

As I grow older and more philosophical, I feel a longing for the good-old days. Call it nostalgia.

Those of us who have reached the ripe old age of 50 or 60 (I turned 60 on Sept. 3) have had many experiences, good and bad. We've seen some amazing things, especially in the natural world.

We've had some achievements (big bucks, limits of ducks or walleyes, special times with hunting buddies or maybe lasting memories at deer camp), and maybe we're still in the race for a bigger buck, a faster bow, a bigger boat. That's what keeps the economy humming and keeps us feeling young.

But at some point, some of us reach a point where those goals change. We lower our sights, so to speak, and decide that the latest carbon wonder shooting 370 feet per second doesn't make you any happier. The constant search for a bigger buck doesn't give you as much of a thrill as watching your child or grandchild shoot a doe. The old Alu-macraft or Lowe still floats fine and you really don't need to get to your favorite fishing hole any faster.

The bucket list has changed, and that's OK.

Sitting in my ground blind Sunday morning, a nice doe approached quickly from a blind spot. I had to set my bipod down, slowly turn toward the right window, swing the cross-bow into firing position and cant the limbs slightly because of the window.

That was my mistake. At the shot,

the doe didn't shrug. She just kept walking. At 350 fps, I never saw the bolt fly. Later when I found it, I realized I'd shot just over her back. Even a 20-yard shot is not always a gimme. I think canting the limbs meant the red dot was not in the correct spot.

If I had a vertical bow, I could have shot again. Maybe. She was well past the window at that point.

Then I started thinking about re-curve bows. You know, those relics from the heady golden days of bow-hunting. I cut my bowhunting teeth on a beautiful fiberglass-and-wood wonder called a Bear Grizzly, and when I carried it from about 1974 to 1979, its whisper-light magic made every step in the woods and autumn afternoon in a homemade tree stand feel like I was Fred Bear himself.

Bear archery equipment was the gold standard for bowhunters, and it's still sought after among collectors. Those old bows (as well as those by Ben Pearson, Wing, Shake-speare, Herter's and others) still shoot well, too. With care, they will last multiple lifetimes.

Although I have about a dozen traditional bows (mostly Bear), I'm always searching for that perfect traditional bow that shoots smoothly and fast. A recent bow competition at our Fox Valley Muzzleloaders Club helped renew my interest in these classic weapons, but what really spurs me on is the simple fact that I've never killed a deer with a recurve or longbow. But I feel that nostalgic tug return.

A visit to my favorite recurve enthusiast was in order. He runs a sporting goods store with his brother in Oshkosh, and even though he mostly sells compound bows and crossbows, he has a few traditional bows for sale, too.

In back, he eagerly shows me a few of his 80 or so recurves and longbows. He hands me a Bear Au

Sable longbow, and it feels feather-light in my hand. But longbows are a bit awkward in the woods and even more awkward in a ground blind.

He then shows me some of his takedown recurves, including an old Bob Lee three-piece takedown with two sets of limbs. Let the salivating begin.

Bob Lee founded Wing Archery and was the inventor of the three-piece takedown recurve. His bows are ranked on a par with the legendary Black Widow bows, and are still built in Texas.

"If you asked me yesterday, I would tell you this bow's not for sale," Dean said. He's not interested in any of the bows I brought for trade, suddenly realizing how many he already has. Holes drilled in bows for sights, arrow holders and other

accessories kill the value of those old relics, and a few of mine have been drilled.

But he offers me a very good price. More talk of a gun trade, or cash. He's saving for a riding mower. I don't really need the gun. I don't really need the bow either, but that's not the point.

Nostalgia. It's a powerful force of nature. And an expensive one.

That Bob Lee bow is still in its 3-foot-long case in Dean's shop. He's going to let me shoot it next week. I can already see it hanging in my collection. But I'm really not looking so much at buying a bow as I am attempting to buy a time and a place and a feeling that I really can't return to. But I can certainly try.

SHAWANO — The Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School girls swim team earned first-place finishes in all but two events to claim a 91.5-75.5 Bay Conference dual win over Shawano/Bonduel on Tuesday.

Metropulos got the Chargers off to a strong start with a dominant showing in the 200 freestyle. Metropulos won the event in 2:05.21, nearly 25 seconds faster than any other swimmer.

Olivia Curley and Emma Herb took

second and third, respectively, in the 200 freestyle, giving the Chargers 13 team points in that event alone.

Metropulos also was victorious in the 100 butterfly with a time of 1:02.75. Langlois came in second with a time of 1:19.84, while Shawano/Bonduel’s Anne Carrier and Witt-Birn’s Christina Thrun tied for third in 1:21.64.

Resch won the 50 freestyle (26.83) and 100 breaststroke (1:18.7).

“At this point in the season, it feels good to win a meet, especially with a small team because we know we had to work hard to get there,” said Resch, who noted she personally likes competing on relay teams the most.

Resch helped the 200 medley relay team to a first-place finish in 2:10.18 in the first event of the night. Thrun, Metropulos and Jalynn Horacek rounded out the team.

Thrun capped a strong night in the pool with a top finish in the 200 IM (2:42.4). Thrun held off Shawano/Bonduel’s Gabi Bukoski (2:42.91).

Witt-Birn’s Isabella Hegewald was third in the 200 IM (2:45.03) and came in second in the 100 breaststroke (1:20.22).

The Chargers’ 200 freestyle relay team also took first, finishing in 2:02.8 — Herb, Curley and Horacek teamed up with Alexa Chaney for the top finish. Lydia Quandt, Allison

Brown, Elizabeth Dillenburg and Ashauntée Smith formed the Shawano/Bonduel team that took second in 2:07.36.

Bukoski was a part of both of Shawano/Bonduel’s top finishes on the night.

The sophomore won the 500 freestyle in 6:22.13, pulling away from Witt-Birn’s Jessica Storlie (6:34.73). Bukoski was also on the 400 freestyle team that took first in 4:28.25, with Langlois, Colon and Macy Monfils filling out the relay.

“I think that our team competed very well against a really strong team,” said Bukoski, who achieved a personal best time in the 500 freestyle. “Our team took this as a challenge and ended up having 19 personal best swims (Tuesday). I think we performed really good as a team and as the season goes on, we keep getting better and better.”

The quartet of Langlois, Bukoski, Colon and Monfils also formed the 200 medley relay team, taking second in 2:11.99.

Individually, Colon came in second in the 50 freestyle (27.26), while Faith Ugoretz took third in the 100 breaststroke (1:22.8).

The dual was the final one for both teams. Shawano/Bonduel, Witt-Birn and Clintonville are all scheduled to compete in the Bay Conference Sprints at Shawano on Tuesday.

The three teams are then set to travel to Sturgeon Bay for the Bay Conference Relays on Oct. 24 before the Bay Conference Meet in Clintonville on Oct. 31.
