School board sets tax rate

General state aid is about what was projected in August

OCONTO FALLS — The Oconto Falls School Board plans to complete work on its 2019-20 academic year budget at a brief meeting Oct. 30.

The board gave tentative approval to a tax rate of \$10.52 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation at its Oct. 14 meeting, pending the state Department of Public Instruction release of the amount of general state aid each school district will receive for the coming year.

Oconto Falls' grant of \$11.222 million, a 1.49% increase over 2018-19, was actually closer to what district accountant Kim Sinclair had projected in August than when she gave her semi-final report to the board on Oct. 14. Administrators had prepared their \$22.7 million budget proposal

based on an estimate that general state aid would be about \$11.22 million, but they refined that estimate to a more conservative \$11.204 million in October.

The tentative tax rate would support a property tax levy of \$10.584 million, a 6.93% increase from a year ago.

The special meeting was necessary because the state figures are always released on Oct. 15 and the board meets the second Monday of each month, which this October was the 14th.

Sinclair and Superintendent Dean Hess said the biggest changes since August were a recommendation to pay down the district's long-term debt by an additional \$560,000 this year to keep the levy amount and tax rate steady after the \$705,478 purchase of a little more than 100 acres along County Road I for future district use.

Robert W. Baird and Associates, the district's longtime financial consultant, made the recommendation to pay the extra half-million in debt service.

"That's interest that we won't be paying for multiple years," Hess said.

Since voters approved a referendum that authorized the district to increase the mill rate by as much as 23 cents a year, Hess said it has never quite hit that mark and have actually decreased.

"We had one year we went up 22 cents, then we had a year where we didn't go up at all, and now you can see the mill rate is coming back down," Hess said.

The district also benefited earlier this year with the closure of the city of Oconto Falls' tax incremental financing district along Highland Drive, which increased the district's tax base, he said.

Among other late changes to the budget were a \$20,000 contribution toward improvements to the Memorial Park baseball diamond and \$35,000 to extend a walking trail on school district property, part of a collaborative project with HSHS St. Clare Memorial Hospital.

Both projects come out of the district's Community Service Fund, a fund specifically designated for efforts that benefit the community in general.

Oconto Falls Women's Club disbands

Club started in 1904 as the FOS Club

OCONTO FALLS — After much consideration and regret, members of the Oconto Falls Women's Club determined at its Sept. 23 meeting that it was time to disband after 115 years of service to the community, due to declining membership.

In 1904, a group of 12 women met to organize a club. The purpose of the society was to promote the use of good English and the art of expressing oneself in ready speech. The society was named FOS Club, meaning Freedom of Speech, and the meaning of the letters was a secret for a period of time. Members presented educational programs on such topics as American literature and American history, speaking without the aid of notes. Planning menus and serving the food received as much attention as the programs.

During the second year, a public library for Oconto Falls was the focus, resulting in the rental of a room in the bank building and a collection of books. Club members acted as librarians, and in 1907, the library was turned over to the village of Oconto Falls.

When World War I broke out, the FOS Club took on helping with the war effort, such as rolling bandages and knitting for the soldiers, while studying the service organizations such as the Salvation Army, Knights of Columbus, YMCA and YWCA while continuing to support the library.

In 1921, membership was opened to all the women in the community, and the group joined the State and National Federation, with focus on the library and building project for which they donated and raised funds for the library building which was started in 1925. The estates of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cook gave \$10,000 toward the library building on the corner of Washington and Manufacturer's streets. On Oct. 19, 1926, the meeting of the FOS was held in the new Charles Cook Library.

In 1927, the FOS was changed to the Oconto Falls Women's Club, and the club voted to sponsor the Helen Farnsworth Mears Art Contest in the city schools. During the Depression, members served as board members for Associated Charities and helped to provide funds for band uniforms for the newly organized high school band, as well as supporting the Dramatic Club. As time went on, other projects for the good of the community included funds towards the purchase of a bed for the hospital, a resuscitator, a baby clinic, and serving lunch for an immunization clinic.

During the years of World War II, members sponsored the war fund campaign, made 10 scrapbooks for hospitalized servicemen, worked on the rationing board, made dressings, collected clothing, etc. Because of gas, coffee, and sugar rationing, meetings were changed to once a month and lunch menus were simplified. When the war ended, a new hospital became the project of the community as a war memorial, and the women's club pledged \$1,000, with \$651 being raised toward that goal from an auction.

The Korean conflict started in 1950 and the new hospital opened.

Members collected clothing to ship overseas and helped with sewing and other duties for the hospital. In 1952, a swap shop was opened, first upstairs at City Hall, and later to rooms below the bank. Money received from donated clothing and other items were sold to aid in the purchase of hospital equipment. A committee was formed to look into the organization of a hospital auxiliary.

Over the years, many programs/trips were presented to provide information, education, enrichment and entertainment to area residents.

Fundraisers included style shows, parade of homes, bake sales, cook-book sales with recipes from members, Stanley products, Christmas ornaments, rummage sales, and sales at Funfest of lemonade, cinnamon rolls, cookies, and milk.

Library and reading support has always been a priority, with donations toward signs, bike rack, books, summer reading program, planting of flower barrels, and the Oconto/Marinette County Literacy Council. Members did story hours for children at the library. From 1994 to 2019,

42 scholarships were provided to Oconto Falls High School students.

Members also participated in or contributed to The Avenue of Lights, Mitten Tree/other clothing for needy children, Home Respite Care, seat sponsorship for the OFHS PAC, Oconto County Teen Court, Police Department Crimes Against Children, Girl Scouts, bike rodeo, Helen Mears Art Contest, Trees for Tomorrow, and annual Senior Teas honoring female graduates and their guests. The first Senior Tea was held in the Cook Memorial Library in 1951 and then in member homes until 1961 until it was moved to the Grace Lutheran Church hall, where it continued through 2019.

Officers at the time of disbanding are Romelle Delzer, president; Carol Marquardt, treasurer; Verna Peterson, secretary; Ruth Trudell, parliamentarian.

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Slight drop in Oconto Falls enrollment

School Board discusses marketing good things

OCONTO FALLS — There were 47 fewer students in Oconto Falls public schools on the third Friday in September than in 2018, administrators told the School Board on Oct. 14.

State school aids are based on enrollment, which is determined by a “snapshot” count every year on the third Friday in September.

Superintendent Dean Hess said he anticipates another slight drop next year because of a somewhat larger senior class at the high school.

“We’ve been averaging, over the years since 2012, class sizes of around 120 to 130 kids,” Hess said. “Right now in the high school we have two classes that are 103 and 106, one is 115 and another (the senior class) is 135.”

Several classes in lower grades are between 95 and 110 students, he said.

“Depending on what’s coming in the 4-year-old and 5-year-old kindergartens in the next few years, we should see at least a stationary or potential increase,” Hess said.

The numbers will be used as administrators begin the process of reviewing staff levels in January, but Hess added that doesn’t necessarily mean staff or program cuts.

“One of the things we’re always thoughtful of, it’s one of our key interests, is making sure that we’re offering a sound myriad of options for our young people,” he said. “So it’s not as simple as saying we’re going to reduce students so you’re automatically going to reduce your offerings, because if you do that you have a potential to lose more students if you’re not finding that they feel good about the offerings that you have.”

The conversation turned to the district’s efforts to market itself in hopes of attracting students through

the open enrollment process, through efforts like an upgraded website and social media presence.

“We continue to improve the aspects of what it’s like for a parent and a student in getting their education, and then we try to market that as well as we can,” Hess said.

He said there’s a lot happening in the district and called attention to the monthly Student Council report earlier in the meeting. Among the highlights were the music department’s annual Community Halloween Party, the Drama Club’s hosting a sectional one-act play competition on Oct. 29-30, and the choir being invited back to sing the national anthem at the Dec. 14 Milwaukee Bucks game.

“They don’t invite you to go to a Bucks game to sing the national anthem because you’re just nice. They invite you because you’re outstanding,” Hess said. “I don’t know that we toot our horn enough. I think a lot of people are pretty humble, and we need to get over that ... People need to know the awesome things that are going on, so you’re not the best-kept secret.”

Board member Clint Gardebrecht suggested that the district should share some of its statistics with the City Council, chamber of commerce, and others.

Hess recalled a conversation he had with three retired men about three years ago about why they settled in Oconto Falls.

“They wanted to retire to a community that had a hardware store, that had a grocery store, that had medical facilities close by, and was on water someplace, and had easy access to the interstate,” he said. “They had their list of, like, seven or eight things, and I never really thought of it that way, but I went, ‘Wow, how many small communities do you have that really have all that? I mean, a lot of towns have three of them, four of them, five of them, but not all of them.’”

“If I hadn’t heard those guys, I never would have thought of it, and haven’t seen the community marketed that way.”

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Board OKs student trip to Spain in 2021

Opportunity will be limited to Spanish III and IV students

OCONTO FALLS — Advanced Spanish students at Oconto Falls High School will have an opportunity to travel to Spain during the 2020-21 school year, after the School Board approved the department's request Oct. 14.

Teachers Hannah Zidon and Susan Ziolkowski-Stiede presented a report on a trip earlier this year when 31 students from the Oconto Falls Spanish III and IV students to Madrid and Barcelona with excursions to two nearby towns.

"Our students found it amazing," Zidon said. "A lot of them had very successful interactions in Spanish. They got to see a lot of things that we had studied, things like flamenco dance, we went to art museums and saw art that they had studied in class — it was a really great opportunity."

The department is again working with a company called Education First, which provided a full-time tour director and planned the itinerary this year.

Zidon added that they are also getting quotes from other companies for prices and itineraries even though they were pleased with Education First.

Based on this year's experience, the next trip will see some tweaks.

"One of our main concerns was to give students as much opportunity to be active during the day, so we wanted to cut down on the free time

that they had," Zidon said. "We want to give them activities to get the most out of their experience."

The nine-day tour will again feature Madrid and Barcelona but also a few more local day trips to nearby locales. The group would fly out of Chicago instead of Green Bay to cut down on costs, she said.

In addition to the \$3,500 to \$4,000 cost of the trip, which the students pay, they will be required to take out trip insurance for an estimated \$165.

"That guarantees the company would be liable for anything that might go wrong, delayed flights, lost luggage, problems with hotel stays," Zidon said.

Superintendent Dean Hess said that's for the families' protection. He shared the story of a colleague in another district where a similar trip had to be canceled and, having declined the trip insurance package, several

parents lost thousands of dollars.

A minimum of 12 students is needed to give the trip the green light — the company pays for one chaperone per six students, one male, one female. Zidon said they're expecting about 25 to 30 students to want to go.

Currently, 55 students are taking Spanish II, and Spanish III has about 27 students, she said. Those young people will be in Spanish III and IV when the trip is scheduled, and the journey will be limited to the students in those classes.

"We see it as an incentive and a motivator for students to continue their studies into those upper levels," Zidon said. "And then we have students who know enough Spanish to be able to interact and appreciate the experience."

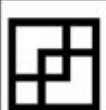

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ECLECTIC MIND

In the days when the iceman cometh

I read an article a while ago that made me think of my childhood. The article was about “harvesting ice.”

Does anyone else out there remember the iceman? We had one of those old wooden iceboxes with the brass hardware. It sat next to the kitchen door, in the entryway — not the kitchen — because it was cooler in

the entry, I suppose, especially in winter. John Lotter would deliver ice on a pretty regular basis to all his local customers in the city and on the farms. The John Lotter family members were our local icemen for as long as anyone could remember.

The iceman was almost like the Good Humor man in those days. When he’d pull into someone’s drive-

way, the kids would all run to meet him, and he never disappointed. He’d chip off a nice chunk of ice for us to suck on on the hot summer days. It was sort of magical to think that he had ice in the summer.

The Lotters lived on the edge of the Oconto River just above the dam and the swimming beach in Oconto Falls. During the summer, they rented fishing boats to area fishermen, but during the coldest part of the winter, you’d see them out on the ice “harvesting” big chunks of ice, which they stored in the big icehouse right on the bank.

I didn’t get to stand around and watch too often, but I remember seeing those guys out there working on days when I’m sure they’d much rather have been sitting inside where it was warm. The ice-harvesting process was pretty labor-intensive: It required quite a few men to do the work.

First, they’d scrape the snow off the ice that could be anywhere from

6 to 30 inches thick. Next, they’d cut a small channel in the ice, which they’d use later to float the ice chunks in to the bank. Then they’d measure out grids on the ice, and horses would pull some kind of tool that cut grooves on the grid.

The next step was to cut through the grooves with a big saw that looked like a lumberman’s cross-cut saw (but it had a handle on only one end). Then, they’d use big bars to break the blocks off and they’d float them down the cleared channel to a chute, where they were hauled up and into the icehouse. Some of those blocks were huge; they must have weighed 75 or 80 pounds.

Each block was moved up a chute with hooks to various levels as the icehouse filled up with layers of ice. The tiers of ice were separated and surrounded by layers of sawdust the Lotters got from area sawmills.

The sawdust served as an insulator and kept the ice chunks from freezing back together in the

icehouse. If they hadn’t used the sawdust, the blocks would melt a little bit and then freeze together and they’d have one huge block the size of the icehouse. That sawdust would keep the ice through spring, summer, fall, and up to the next harvest, so if you had an icebox, you could have a steady supply of the natural refrigerant.

Sometimes, on really hot summer days, when we’d meet our classmate, Marvin Lotter, at the beach, he’d take us over to the icehouse and let us crawl around on the big stacks of ice. We’d come out with sawdust stuck to our swimsuits and bare feet, but, man, it was a “cool” thing to do.

When the iceman would come, with his big flatbed truck loaded with ice covered in sawdust and a big tarp, we’d tell him just the size piece we wanted, and he would cut the piece we needed with a chisel and ice axe, bring it into the entryway with his big iron tongs, and put it in the icebox for us. That chunk of ice

A closer look at the forest

Fall beauty not limited to leaves

Walking through the autumn forest, the colors of the season are overwhelming, and the beauty of fall is everywhere. I encourage you to take a closer look as you travel along the forest trail, as autumn provides many unexpected wonders along the path.

Even in our own garden, many of these autumn wonders can be found. Sometimes they are subtle and sometimes they are dramatic and flamboyant. It is only during October that we can find many of these fall treasures.

Our native wildflowers put on quite a show in the autumn forest and along the forest edge. One of my favorites to enjoy in the fall, after the bloom, are the breathtaking, spiral seed heads of our native wild clematis, named Virgin's Bower. The green, silvery, feathery spirals can be found hanging among shrubs and

While enjoying a stroll through the autumn forest, be sure to enjoy the sheer variety, colors, textures and forms of our spectacular fall fungi. Turkey tails, small shelf fungi that can be found growing from stumps, logs and tree trunks, is a beautiful and ornate, ruffled fungus that grows in clusters on wood.

Many of our unique and unusual jelly fungi are also fruiting now in

small trees at the forest edge.

Just in time for Halloween, the spooky fruiting clusters of white baneberry, nicknamed Doll's Eyes, for obvious reasons, keep watch along forest pathways.

October. One of the most beautiful is the neon orange, jelly like mass of Witch's Butter. These can be found growing in small clusters along mostly dead stumps, logs and tree trunks. Its color is unmistakable, a brilliant, neon orange or yellow orange.

Another unique jelly fungus is black jelly drops, sometimes called licorice drops. The consistency and texture is very similar to black licorice drop candy. These round, circular fungi that may be the size of a nickel or quarter, can often be spotted oozing out of cracks in the bark of forest trees.

Woolly bears are on the march in October, as well, crawling with a fierce determination across roadways, pathways and trails in grassier areas. These caterpillars, with their telltale black and maroon striping,

may even be spotted after a few hard frosts, their hairy blanket of fur keeping them warm on the coldest nights.

Look for "buck rubs," areas where whitetail bucks have used small trees and shrubs to rub off the velvet of their antlers, as you walk through the fall forest and the forest edge. Whitetail bucks rub their antlers vigorously up and down the trunk and stems of small trees, creating visible rubbing that often wears down to the heart of the wood.

The first juncos arrive, flitting along the trail before us with their flashy dark gray and white tails and squeaky, chirping calls. The arrival of the juncos ensures that winter and the first snowfall is only weeks away.

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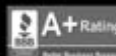

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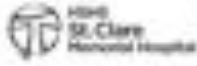

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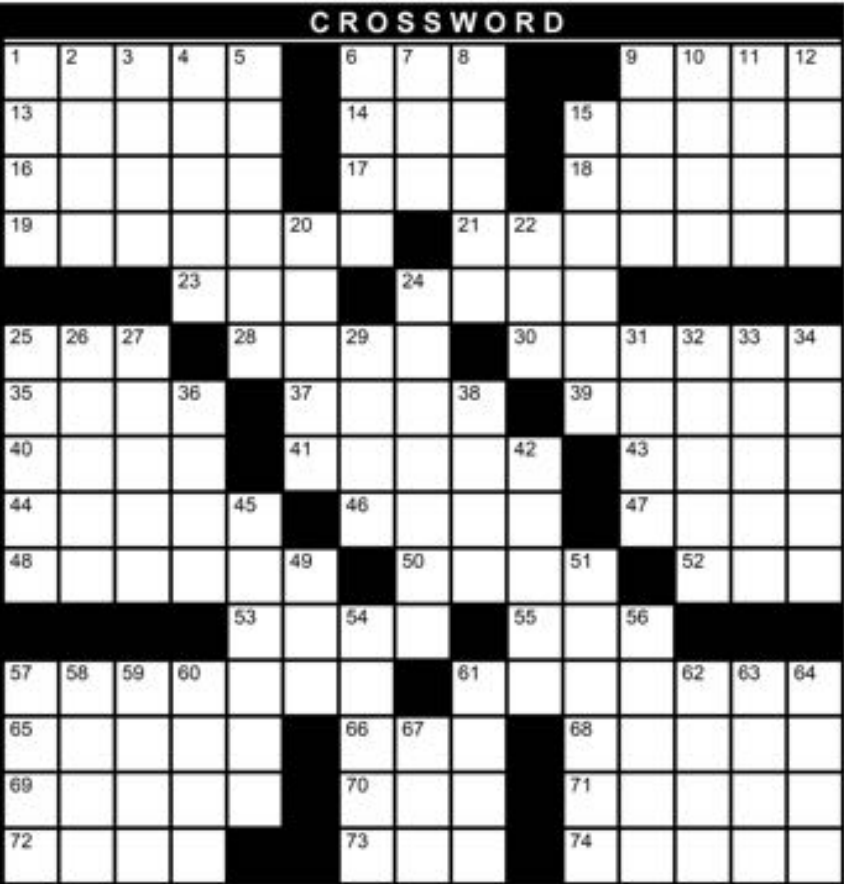

HUNTING

As a hunter, fall is one of my favorite seasons - it's the start of deer hunting season! Bow hunting is in full swing, and we need to think about safety in the woods. Here are some basic tips for the DNR to keep you and your family safe:

- Do not drink alcohol or take mood-altering drugs before or during bow hunting.
- Hunt within your own physical limitations.
- Tell family or friends where exactly where you will be hunting.
- Use a full body harness attached so that you drop out from a tree if you fall.
- Always use a hand line to bring your gear into your elevated stand and to lower your gear when you're done.

Hunting - don't drink or depend on a bow if you're tired!
• Carry basic survival gear every time you go afield, even for short hunts.

November is the annual gun hunt and according to the DNR there are four basic rules of firearm safety:

1. Treat every firearm as though it was loaded.
2. Always point the muzzle in a safe direction.
3. Be certain of your target and what is beyond it.
4. Keep your finger out of the trigger well guard.

PRE-HUNTING PHYSICAL

You may have already scoped out the woods and checked your tags, but

also make sure you're in good health before heading into the woods. Hunters walk long distances, climb trees, navigate rough terrain and dig their traps back out of the woods. All of these activities can put a strain on your heart and take a toll on your body. If you haven't had a physical this year, schedule an appointment with your doctor before taking to the woods to ensure you are in good physical condition. Don't have a primary care doctor? Finally when it comes to Halloween and trick-or-treating, here are some tips to having a safe, fun and incident-free Halloween!

- Worn and costume accessories should be short and flexible so they don't cause injury.
- Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
- Make sure the tips of black lights to costumes and bags to help them see you.
- Examine all foods for choking hazards and tampering before eating them.

Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating and walk, don't run, from house to house.

Always tie hair up in a bun and tie back both waist belts, closing the belt, use crosswalks and sidewalks whenever possible.

Lower your risk for serious eye injury by avoiding decorative contact lenses and removing makeup before bed.

Only eat well-labeled, factory-sealed, never play and stick home.

Wear well-fitted masks, costumes and shoes to avoid tripping. When slipping and falling, make sure your child can see and breathe easily.

For only factory-wrapped tools. Avoid homemade tools and store-bought fuel.

Enter phone only if you're with a trusted adult, even if you know the homeowner. Never accept rides from strangers.

Never walk near or behind or underneath the gate to wear. Some children's costumes.
