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Woman charged in witness beating

Video of assault shows Elmira Corn punching and kicking victim

GREEN BAY — A Keshena woman has been charged in federal court with retaliating against a witness after allegedly ordering the beating of another woman who reported a fatal drug overdose to authorities, according to court documents.

An affidavit by FBI Agent Sarah Deamron filed in court on Oct. 10 alleged that, just before midnight on July 9, Elmira J. Corn, 29, and an unidentified man arrived at a Neopit residence and went to a bedroom with a second man, referred to as John Doe.

A short time later, Corn and the two men left the bedroom, and Doe walked Corn and the unidentified man to the door. Corn then left with the other man.

The witness, referred to as Jane Doe and as “the resident,” went to the bathroom where she saw John Doe smoking something off a piece of tin foil. John Doe told Jane Doe that he was smoking a pill that Corn and the other man had given him. John Doe also said the pill “had fentanyl in it.”

Jane Doe told Doe not to smoke it and he folded the rest of the pill in the tin foil and left the bathroom.

Jane Doe went to the kitchen with Doe and then she laid down and fell asleep. She awoke to someone who was screaming that John Doe was foaming at the mouth. Jane Doe and another person tried to resuscitate Doe, while a third person called 911.

Emergency medical personnel pronounced John Doe dead at the scene. An autopsy by the Fond du Lac Medical Examiner’s Office determined the cause of death as fentanyl toxicity.

Jane Doe was contacted during the investigation into Doe’s death and told a FBI agent, assisting Menominee Tribal police, about Corn and another man delivering a pill to Doe.

On Oct. 6, a tribal dispatcher received a report about a female who had been assaulted and needed emergency medical services. A tribal police officer went to the “White City” area of Neopit and spoke with Jane Doe.

She was crying told the officer that she was “jumped” by Corn and other women in the “Sewer Circle” area of Neopit.

Doe said one of the women punched and kicked her in the body and face causing her to temporarily lose consciousness.

Corn called Doe “a snitch” during the assault, Doe said.

The officer took photos of Doe’s injuries to her face and hand and then transported her to the ThedaCare Medical Center - Shawano emergency department.

Later that evening, the officer talked to Doe at ThedaCare Medical Center-Shawano. Doe said she was at a residence in the “Sewer Circle” area but left a house for another in response to text message she received from someone she knows.

While walking to the house, two vehicles pulled up with Corn and multiple females. They began yelling at Doe that she was a “snitch.” Doe she walked away but a woman intercepted her and confronted Doe. Doe said she could hear Corn telling the woman to hit her.

The woman hit Doe in the head with a closed fist. Doe slapped the other woman but fell to the ground where she was kicked and punched in the head and body. Doe said she lost consciousness after receiving several blows to the head.

When Doe awoke, the women were gone and she walked to the “White City” area and called 911 for help.

A week before, Doe said she was

walking in Neopit when Corn came out of a house and asked Doe what she said to the police. Doe asked Corn if she denied her involvement in John Doe’s death and Corn said she sold the drugs to John Doe but did not make him take it.

Corn then told Doe that she would have people assault her if she continued to cooperate with police.

The officer searched social media for information about the assault and saw a video of the assault posted to Facebook. The video showed a woman punch and kick Doe while several people yelled and encourage her, including people Doe identified as Corn.

The video showed Doe lay motionless on the pavement while a woman punched and kicked her in the head and body.

Corn was arrested on Oct. 10.

The officer learned of the other woman’s address and arrested her at a house in Keshena. The officer observed that the woman had scratches on the knuckles of her hands consistent with having recently struck something.

That woman admitted punching and kicking Doe, who she identified by name, in Neopit because Corn told her that she needed to do it. She also said Doe had a history of “bullying” her.

Corn was charged by complaint and made an initial court appearance on Oct. 10. Magistrate James Sickel ordered her detention, finding that Corn was a danger to the community and that the evidence against her was strong including the video of the assault.

A preliminary examination is scheduled for Oct. 23.

If convicted of obstruction of justice-retaliating against a witness, Corn faces a maximum penalty of 30 years in prison.

Kenneth Gales, a spokesman for the U.S. Attorney’s office said no one else has been charged in connection with the Oct. 6 incident.

Keshena man killed in head-on crash Sunday afternoon

WESCOTT — Authorities have released the name of a man killed Sunday in a head-on crash on state Highway 47-55 in the town of Wescott.

Chance L. Latender, 24, of Keshena, was pronounced dead at the scene of the crash that occurred just after 4 p.m. north of County Road A, according to the Shawano County Sheriff's Department.

He was the lone occupant of his vehicle.

The crash is still under investigation, but, according to the sheriff's department, it appears Latender was northbound on Highway 47-55 when he crossed the centerline and hit the southbound vehicle driven by Chad J. Haen, 45, of Marinette.

Haen was flown from the scene by

ThedaStar and was in intensive care Monday afternoon, according to the sheriff's department.

There were four people in the vehicle, including Linda A. Haen, 60, Marinette, who sustained multiple broken bones, the sheriff's department said.

Two other passengers — Jeremy J. Anderson, 30, and Paul E. Anderson, 35, both of Marinette — were also treated

for injuries and possibly released from the hospital, but the sheriff's department couldn't confirm that information.

The sheriff's department was assisted by the Shawano Police Department, Menominee County Sheriff's Department, Wisconsin State Patrol, Shawano area and Keshena fire departments, ThedaStar and Shawano Ambulance Service.

Registered sex offenders to get Halloween visits

State law prohibits those under active supervision from holiday activities

SHAWANO — Police and state probation agents will be making the rounds on Halloween again this year to make sure registered sex offenders in the city are complying with a state law that forbids them from taking part in trick-or-treating festivities.

"They'll go around and visit every sex offender that's living in the city and

ensure they don't have a porch light on, ensure that they don't have any decorations out, that they're not giving candy out and they don't have any kids around," Police Chief Dan Mauel said.

Trick-or-treating hours in the city will be held from 5-7 p.m. on Oct. 31.

The compliance checks are done annually, in the city and the county, according to Mauel.

"We have done this for a while," he said.

Mauel said there were 12 or 13 registered sex offenders under active community supervision who were checked on last year.

"We got to them all before the end of the night," he said.

The law applies to registered sex offenders who are on probation, and also applies to Christmas activities.

"That's a state law," Mauel said. "Just as they can't dress up at Christmas in Santa costumes and cover their faces and play Santa Claus."

Registered sex offenders having terminated status are not on state supervision and are not subject to the restrictions.

Though the law applies to sex offenders under active supervision, the number of registered sex offenders in the area is far higher, according to the data from the state sex offender registry.

The registry currently lists 87 regis-

tered sex offenders living in the 54166 zip code.

Two of them are listed as homeless.

Mauel said it was his understanding that the sex offenders listed as homeless are on electronic bracelets and must report daily to a probation agent, but that could not be confirmed.

A call seeking information from the local probation and parole office was not returned.

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Feedback sought on USDA environmental assessment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency has announced the availability of a Programmatic Environmental Assessment for the Conservation Reserve Program.

The 2018 Farm Bill made changes to CRP, and the assessment evaluates those changes as they relate to the National Environmental Policy Act. The assessment only covers programmatic changes that have not been evaluated previously.

The environmental assessment is available to the public for review, and FSA is requesting comments on the proposed alternatives and their potential impacts on the human environment. FSA will incorporate the feedback into the final assessment, as

appropriate, prior to a decision.

Annual flu shots important for young and old

Flu season will soon be underway, and Prevea Health encourages community members to get a flu shot, as it is the most important step in preventing the disease.

In addition to getting a flu shot, the spread of flu can be prevented by:

- Covering the nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze

- Washing hands frequently with hot water and soap often, especially before you eat

- Using alcohol-based sanitizer
- Avoiding touching the eyes, nose and mouth

- Cleaning and disinfecting surfaces that may harbor flu germs

- Exercising and eating a balanced diet to keep your immune system healthy

Flu symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headaches, chills, fatigue, diarrhea and vomiting. If you or someone you know may have the flu, stay home, treat the fever and contact your health care provider if necessary.

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Pollution credits bill passes Assembly panel

MADISON — The ability for state farmers and other sources of water pollutants to buy and sell water pollution credits through a central clearinghouse moved a step closer to passage with the unanimous vote Oct. 16 of the Assembly Committee on Local Government.

The approval of Assembly Bill 113, also called “P3: Wisconsin’s Trading Marketplace to establish more Pollution Prevention Partnerships,” marked

the most recent legislative consideration after a June hearing before the Assembly committee.

Senate Bill 91, the companion to AB 113, passed the state Senate on May 15, also on a unanimous vote.

The companion bills were authored by Sen. Robert Cowles, R-Green Bay; Rep. Joel Kitchens, R-Sturgeon Bay; and Sen. Jerry Petrowski, R-Marathon. Joining them were a bipartisan list of co-sponsors in both Houses.

The legislation now awaits a vote

in the full Assembly. If passed as amended in the Senate, It will advance to the Gov. Tony Evers for his signature.

“P3: Wisconsin’s Trading Marketplace represents an exciting and innovative opportunity to provide farmers and other nonpoint sources with some financial incentive to implement more advanced land and water management practices,” Cowles said in a press release, “This bipartisan, groundbreaking effort will promote more water quality trades by introducing a third-party clearinghouse into the currently inflexible pollutant trading process.”

The fiscal estimate narrative from the state Department of Natural Resources (DNR) explains that under this bill, DNR may authorize a Wisconsin Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit holder to discharge a pollutant above authorized levels if the permit holder purchases credits from a clearinghouse contracted with the state Department of Administration.

The narrative added the required outcome of the trade is “an improvement in water quality and the increase and reduction in pollutants under the

agreement must involve the same pollutant or the same water quality standard” in the same geographic area. Another option in the bill allows for discharges over a permit’s level if the holder enters into a contract with another party “that works with other sources of water pollution to reduce the amount of water pollution that those other sources cause.”

“Today’s vote helped to set Wisconsin on a course to create the first statewide water quality pollutant trading clearinghouse,” Cowles said. “While the goal is to help clean up our waters, these pollution prevention partnerships would have numerous ecological, financial, and recreational benefits.”

The press release indicated the bills attracted the support of over 30 groups including the Wisconsin Economic Development Association, Clean Wisconsin, League of Wisconsin Municipalities, Wisconsin Farm Bureau, Cheese Makers and Trout Unlimited. The DNR, under the Walker and Evers administrations, has also been intimately involved in the process and expressed support for the legislation, according to the release.

Tigerton trip to DC gets help from fundraisers

'We work together, we'll make the money' is their mantra

A talented crew with a strong desire to succeed can achieve great things. That success is being demonstrated by a Tigerton group working to raise funds for an educational field trip to Washington, D.C., this summer.

Organizer Anita Kernen understands firsthand the benefits and costs of student travel experiences. "My daughter is 35 now. But when she was in high school, the opportunity came up for her to go to Europe. But as a single mother, I couldn't afford to send her," recalled Kernen, owner of Anita Hair Cut, Tigerton. "Now I know how to do fundraising, and I'm dedicated to helping others go on trips like this one."

Kernen and other volunteers held a taco dinner Oct. 8 at the Tigerton Community Center to raise money for the D.C. trip. So far, eight Tigerton

Middle School students have registered for the trip, along with about 14 chaperones and family members.

The fundraising group is comprised mostly of the parents and families planning to go to Washington with the students. In addition to the taco dinner, they also hosted a 5K run over the Fourth of July. Kernen said she wants to host a potato bar next, but not all of the details have been decided yet.

While the adults lend a hand on the bigger fundraisers, the students themselves have been working hard to raise money by selling snacks and operating concession stands at local sporting events.

There is still room for more students to sign up for the trip, according to middle school teacher Wanda Minniecheske, who is coordinating efforts. The early bird discounted rate has expired, and the current cost is \$2,000.

ny based in Aberdeen, South Dakota, approached Minniecheske about the possibility of sending students on a trip to Washington, D.C.

"It seemed like such a great opportunity for students to learn outside the classroom," said Minniecheske, who was pleased with the support from families and staff members.

For special education aide Wanda Tucker, the trip will be something fun to do with two of her grandchildren. They live in Denver but spend some of the summer with Tucker.

Another special education aide, Teresa Griepentrog, is going on the trip with her daughter and three grandchildren.

All were on hand to make sure the taco dinner was a success. Minniecheske noted the event raised \$2,600 which will go towards the monthly payments. The cost per person is about \$2,500 so the total amount that needs to be raised will be determined by the final count of people going on the trip and the money over and above the student responsibility of \$1,800-\$2,000, said Minniecheske.

Seventh-graders Jessica Burayi and Aubry Arndt said they enjoyed the taco dinner and were excited to talk about the upcoming trip.

"History is my favorite subject, and I want to learn about the monuments there," said Burayi, who plans on being a social worker.

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Parental involvement aids students' academic success

APPLETON — What are some ways to support your child academically this school year? According to ThedaCare pediatricians, much of it comes down to parental involvement. Studies over the years have proven that parental involvement is the greatest predictor of student success.

"Parental involvement comes in many forms," said Dr. Michael Jakubowski, a pediatrician with ThedaCare Physicians Pediatrics-Appleton. "It often involves listening well, being available, responding to a child's needs, predicting problems and communicating constantly. Jakubowski offered these suggestions for parents:

- Take the time to listen to any

concerns or challenges your child has as well as the triumphs. Modeling good listening not only shows you're interested in what the child has to say, it also helps a student follow direction and pay attention

in class.

- Make yourself available to your child and his or her teachers. Set time aside to help your child with homework and prepare for tests. Attend parent-teacher conferences and consider volunteering to stay better connected to the school and the people in it.

- If your child asks for help, respond to his or her needs sooner rather than later, whether it's finding a tutor or applying for special services.

- Stay on top of trends like cyberbullying and appropriate screen time. If you sense your child will have trouble in certain subjects, talk to the teacher. Ask questions of your child: are you having trouble learning or

studying? Are there any issues with any students, teachers, or administrator? Follow-up with the teacher. Advocate for your child and partner with teacher and administrators.

- Communicate constantly. With the teacher, make sure they know to contact you if any issues arise with your child. Let the teacher know you want to partner with them in your child's education. Also, show your child how you value education through positive talks about school and learning.

- Stay current on immunizations for serious illness prevention.

- Feed your child's brain with

nutrient-rich foods that keep him or her alert and mentally sharp. Eating a solid breakfast will keep energy levels up until lunchtime.

"Don't forget to exercise at least 60 minutes a day to keep the oxygen going and blood flowing through the brain," said Jakubowski.

He also encourages adequate rest nightly.

"Sleep has a profound impact on brain health, restoring brain function by clearing out toxins that build up during the day," he said. "Be sure that your child is getting the amount of sleep recommended for their age group."

A closer look at the forest

Fall beauty not limited to leaves

Walking through the autumn forest, the colors of the season are overwhelming, and the beauty of fall is everywhere. I encourage you to take a closer look as you travel along the forest trail, as autumn provides many unexpected wonders along the path.

Even in our own garden, many of these autumn wonders can be found. Sometimes they are subtle and sometimes they are dramatic and flamboyant. It is only during October that we can find many of these fall treasures.

Our native wildflowers put on quite a show in the autumn forest and along the forest edge. One of my favorites to enjoy in the fall, after the bloom, are the breathtaking, spiral seed heads of our native wild clematis, named Virgin's Bower. The green, silvery, feathery spirals can be found hanging among shrubs and

While enjoying a stroll through the autumn forest, be sure to enjoy the sheer variety, colors, textures and forms of our spectacular fall fungi. Turkey tails, small shelf fungi that can be found growing from stumps, logs and tree trunks, is a beautiful and ornate, ruffled fungus that grows in clusters on wood.

Many of our unique and unusual jelly fungi are also fruiting now in

small trees at the forest edge.

Just in time for Halloween, the spooky fruiting clusters of white baneberry, nicknamed Doll's Eyes, for obvious reasons, keep watch along forest pathways.

October. One of the most beautiful is the neon orange, jelly like mass of Witch's Butter. These can be found growing in small clusters along mostly dead stumps, logs and tree trunks. Its color is unmistakable, a brilliant, neon orange or yellow orange.

Another unique jelly fungus is black jelly drops, sometimes called licorice drops. The consistency and texture is very similar to black licorice drop candy. These round, circular fungi that may be the size of a nickel or quarter, can often be spotted oozing out of cracks in the bark of forest trees.

Woolly bears are on the march in October, as well, crawling with a fierce determination across roadways, pathways and trails in grassier areas. These caterpillars, with their telltale black and maroon striping,

may even be spotted after a few hard frosts, their hairy blanket of fur keeping them warm on the coldest nights.

Look for "buck rubs," areas where whitetail bucks have used small trees and shrubs to rub off the velvet of their antlers, as you walk through the fall forest and the forest edge. Whitetail bucks rub their antlers vigorously up and down the trunk and stems of small trees, creating visible rubbing that often wears down to the heart of the wood.

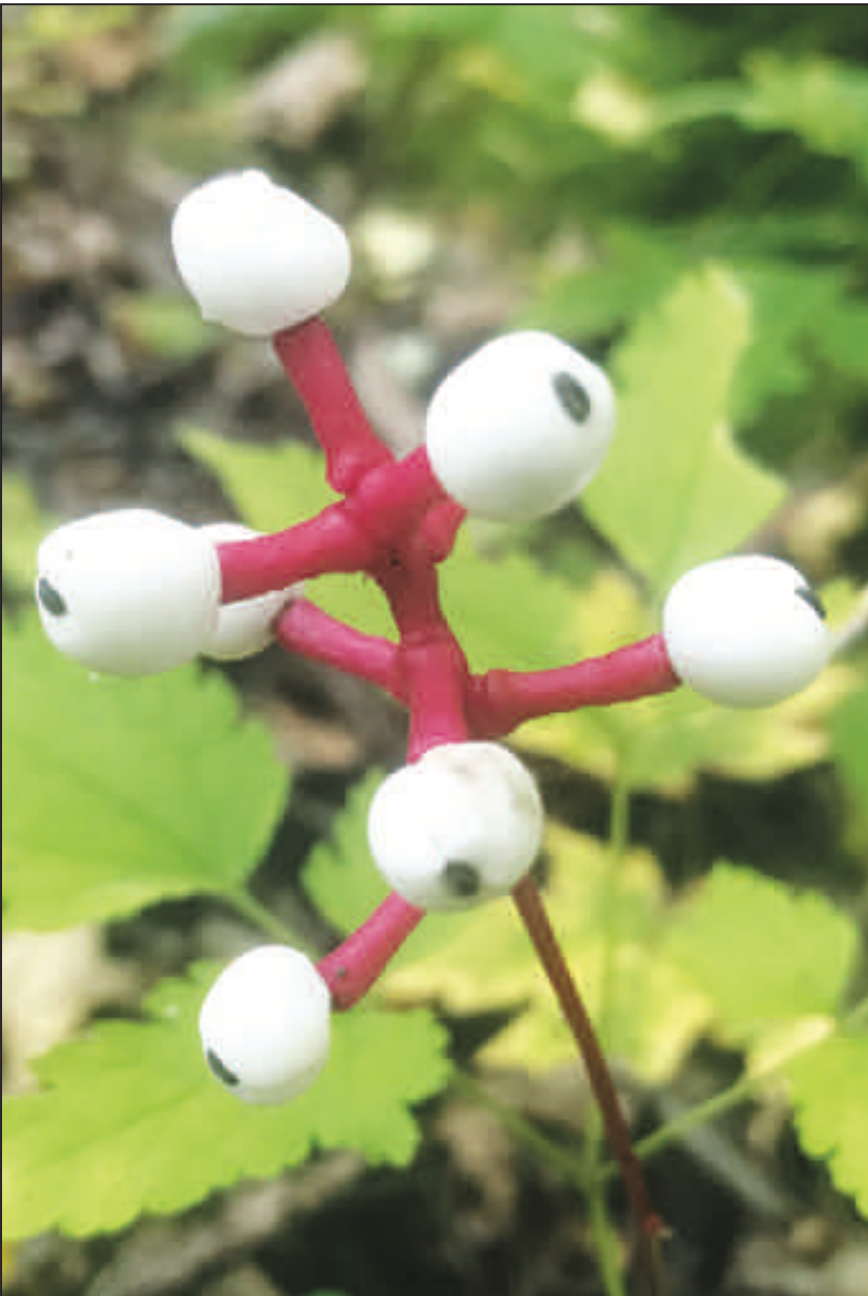
The first juncos arrive, flitting along the trail before us with their flashy dark gray and white tails and squeaky, chirping calls. The arrival of the juncos ensures that winter and the first snowfall is only weeks away.

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Daily aspirin not recommended for everyone

APPLETON — Does an aspirin a day keep the doctor away? Many people still believe the standby saying, even though new guidelines advise against daily aspirin use for most who are trying to prevent cardiovascular disease.

"Patients should not just take aspirin as a preventive measure for cardiovascular disease," said Dr. Salvior Mok, a cardiologist with ThedaCare Cardiovascular Care. "It may actually do

more harm than good. Patients should only take it when it is prescribed."

Survey results published in the Annals of Internal Medicine this summer show almost half of people over age 70 who have no symptoms of cardiovascular disease take aspirin, despite recent recommendations against the routine. In spring, the American Heart Association and American College of Cardiology released updated guidelines that take

a stand against regular use of aspirin for people 70 years and older and for adults at any age at increased risk of bleeding.

"The two take-home messages are that aspirin carries an increased risk of bleeding for people who are at a low risk or without a risk of cardiovascular disease," Mok said. "And aspirin is still considered effective for people between the ages of 40 and 70 who are not at an increased risk of bleeding."

Mok stressed that all treatment plans should be discussed with a provider.

"Do not just take aspirin without following up with your doctor," she said. "I also suggest patients contact their primary care provider at least once a year. Guidelines change, and it is important to have the most up-to-date information."

Mok believes the reason many people are not changing their ways as a result of the new guidelines is due to infrequent visits to their primary care physicians. Providers must also ensure patients understand new health recommendations and are complying.

"Additionally, many patients see this preventive aspirin use as a supplement," Mok said. "They just take it with all their other supplements."

That can be dangerous, especially with the increased risk of bleeding.

Mok suggests a healthy, active approach to preventing cardiovascular disease, including healthy eating, watching your weight, reducing stress, avoiding cigarettes and knowing your family history.

Rodgers, Packers carve up Raiders

Green Bay moves to 6-1

GREEN BAY — Green Bay Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers turned in one of the top games of his career, posting a perfect passer rating and accounting for all six of the team's touchdowns in a 42-24 thrashing of the Oakland Raiders on Sunday at Lambeau Field.

Rodgers completed 25 of his 31 pass attempts for 429 yards. He threw five touchdowns, one each to Jimmy Graham, Aaron Jones, Jamaal Williams, Marquez Valdes-Scantling and Jake Kumerow. Rodgers also scored a 3-yard rushing touchdown.

"I still don't understand how they put that (passer) rating together, but it does sound pretty good," said Rodgers.

"I think this was the most complete (game) that I've played (this season). I felt good about the timing. There were a lot of balls thrown on time and obviously the offensive line played fantastic."

Before Rodgers sat out the final two offensive possessions with the team up big, he led the Packers to six touchdowns over eight possessions.

On the team's first touchdown drive, he hit Graham for a 29-yard pass on third-and-7 before finding Jones on the next play for a 21-yard touchdown.

Jones turned his body around at the last second to haul in the perfectly-placed Rodgers' pass.

"He (Jones) told me on the sidelines afterwards that he kind of owed me for last week (when Jones dropped a wide-open touchdown pass against the Lions), so I guess we're even now," said Rodgers with a smirk.

The Packers second offensive drive also looked promising, but Rodgers was sacked on third down and the hosts had to punt.

After Oakland chewed up over eight minutes of clock and took a 10-7 lead, Rodgers led the offense on an 11-play, 82-yard drive that also took

over eight minutes.

On the drive, Rodgers connected on big passes to fullback Danny Vitale (21 yards) and receiver Geronimo Allison (15) before a quick pass to Williams resulted in a 2-yard touchdown.

As they did for most of the day, the Raiders' offense moved the ball down the field on the next drive.

On second-and-goal, Oakland QB Derek Carr rolled out to his right and tried to race Packers linebacker Blake Martinez to the end zone. With the ball in his left hand, Carr tried to reach for the pylon, but lost the ball when Martinez pushed him.

Carr was initially ruled down, but a review showed he fumbled over the pylon, and with the ball rolling out of bounds, Green Bay was awarded the ball on a touchback.

Green Bay took control of the game after that, going 80 yards in seven plays to score before halftime.

"I think everybody had big plays throughout the game," said Marti-

nez, who finished with 16 combined tackles. "That was one of those plays that I wanted to make for the team. It helped us get a score right before half."

A roughing the passer call got the drive going before short passes to Allison and receiver Allen Lazard put the Packers in Raiders' territory. Rodgers then hit Kumerow behind the defense, and the former UW-Whitewater standout tiptoed up the sideline before diving and hitting the pylon with the football to complete a 37-yard touchdown pass.

"It was a good one. The ball was in the air and I was just trying to do my job and make the catch, and I noticed I was leaning pretty far to the sideline, so I tried to do everything I (could) to stay in and touch the pylon with the ball because I know if you can get a piece of it, it counts as a touchdown," said Kumerow. "It was a great job by the rest of the guys, o-line holding it down up front and Aaron with the

great throw like always."

The Packers took the opening kickoff in the second half and turned in another touchdown drive to go up 28-10.

Rodgers uncorked a 59-yard pass to Valdes-Scantling to kickstart the drive and capped the drive with a 3-yard rushing touchdown.

Oakland's offense responded with a touchdown of its own to cut the deficit to 11, but Rodgers led the Packers on another long drive to take the momentum right back.

The drive started with a 25-yard pass to Graham and was eventually capped by a 3-yard touchdown pass from Rodgers to Graham. Rodgers also hit Kumerow for 17 yards and Lazard for a 26-yarder on the possession.

The Packers' defense then surrendered another long drive, but found a way to keep Oakland out of the end zone, stuffing a pair of runs from inside the 2-yard line.

After a rare Green Bay punt, Oakland looked to be on its way to another touchdown, but cornerback Kevin King intercepted Carr in the end zone to end the threat. King credited Adrian Amos for the pick, as the safety deflected the pass.

The Packers put the game away on the ensuing drive. Rodgers found Valdes-Scantling on third-and-five, and after the receiver made a man miss and got a key block from Jones, MVS sprinted down the left sideline for a 74-yard dagger.

Along with Allison, Valdes-Scantling looked like a long shot to even play in the game. Coach Matt LaFleur was appreciative that both guys suited up.

"I know he (Valdes-Scantling) was battling through it (his ankle/knee injury)," said LaFleur. "I know he wasn't feeling 100 percent, but that's a lot of guys in the league right now. That's what it's all about. I loved the grit he showed, the determination he showed and he came up big for us because he had two huge receptions in this game."

With many of the starters from both teams on the sidelines, Oakland added a late touchdown.

Shawano overpowers GB West, earns playoff spot

Dickelman breaks rushing record

SHAWANO — The Shawano Community High School football team gave its seniors quite a treat on Friday.

Not only did Shawano roll to a 42-7 Bay Conference victory over Green Bay West on senior night, but the win also made the team eligible for postseason play.

“It is a huge accomplishment for our team to become playoff eligible on senior night,” said senior Jagger Theis. “It means so much because we have grown so close as a team that I am proud to call every guy next to me family.”

The lopsided win pushed the Hawks’ conference record to 4-4, while moving the team’s overall record to 5-4.

Shawano was handed a No. 8 seed in Division 3, with a tough first-round matchup against top-seeded West De Pere, which is undefeated, won the Bay title and knocked off the Hawks 42-0 back in week one.

“The same is going to happen — stay focused, watch film and keep on practicing hard,” said senior Ethan Bolin before knowing the playoff opponent, on what it would take in the week of practice leading up to the playoff game to be prepared. “It doesn’t matter who we play. Everyone has a 0-0 record going to playoffs. Anything can happen.”

Knowing it needed a win to make the playoffs, Shawano started fast and dominated Green Bay West in the first half.

On the first offensive play of the game, senior Brayden Dickelman broke free for a 58-yard touchdown run to put Shawano ahead.

After the Hawks’ defense made a stop on fourth down, Dickelman carried the ball on each play of Shawano’s second drive before capping the drive with a 4-yard touchdown run.

Earlier in the drive, the senior eclipsed the school record for most rushing yards in a single season. Dickelman ended game with 1,326 yards, breaking Kory Hyvonen’s mark of 1,255 rushing yards from 1994.

“It really means a lot,” said Dickelman of breaking the record. “I guess I could have had it a couple weeks ago, I’ve had some runs called back, but it means a lot more on senior night in front of all my family.”

Dickelman continued playing, but had his touches limited the rest of the contest. Instead, Shawano’s offense turned things over to junior quarterback Gage Timm and the passing game.

On the host’s third offensive possession, Timm connected with sophomore receiver Elliott Lowney three times and junior Kaleb Lowney once to move the ball down the field before Timm scored on a 2-yard run.

Despite West’s ability to move the chains a few times, Shawano’s defense always rose to the occasion to keep the visitors off the scoreboard.

After the Wildcats had moved the ball to midfield on the next drive, Shawano junior Nicholas Kohn registered a sack to push West into second-and-20. The visitors weren’t able to convert and had to punt the ball back to Shawano.

The first three plays of the ensuing drive — a pass from Timm to Elliott Lowney and runs from Dickelman and Kaleb Lowney ate up 49 yards to move the ball to the West 21-yard line.

After an incomplete pass, Timm raced into the end zone to make it 28-0.

West’s next drive was extended multiple times by fourth-down penalties by the Hawks, but Shawano

forced back-to-back incompletions from the 7 to get the ball back with 1 minute, 39 seconds to go in the half.

It took Shawano just two plays and 41 seconds to move the ball 93 yards.

Dickelman busted free for a 48-yard run before Lowney scored on a 45-yard run.

The Wildcats’ only touchdown in the contest came on the first drive of the second half, but Shawano responded with another touchdown drive to seal the convincing win.

Kaleb Lowney did the heavy lifting on the drive, carrying the ball several times before punching the ball into the end zone from a yard out. It capped a strong day from the offense, which punted just once (on its final possession).

Shawano’s 5-4 overall record is a big improvement from a 2018 season that saw the team win just once.

“A lot of it is us working hard in the weight room and getting better as a team,” said Dickelman of the four-win improvement. “Some of the distractions we’ve had, we kind of just pushed them to the side. Last year, they got to us, but this year, we did a good job of playing hard, keeping our heads down and finishing games.”

“It’s special for our program and for our kids. To bounce back after the year we had last year where we were close in a lot of football games. To come out this year and be able to finish some of those close games and then to be able to qualify for the playoffs shows how far we’ve come

Wisconsin stunned on road by Illinois

Badgers' playoff chances take hit

CHAMPAIGN, ILL. — The plan was for Wisconsin to roll into a showdown with Ohio State next week unbeaten, with a defense putting up historic numbers and a Heisman Trophy contender at running back.

Illinois had other plans.

James McCourt kicked a 39-yard field as time expired and the Illini pulled off the biggest upset of the college football season, knocking off No. 6 Wisconsin 24-23 on Saturday.

"Our program, we needed to get a signature win. I was just hoping today was the day, and the day came," said Illini coach Lovie Smith, the former Chicago Bears coach who entered the game 11-31 overall and 4-26 in the Big Ten since taking over Illinois in 2016.

"Against the No. 6 team in the country, we played them toe-to-toe," Smith said. "We saw so much fight. We

learned an awful lot about ourselves. We're pumped up. One of the best wins we can possibly have at this stage in our program."

Tony Adams picked off a pass by Jack Coan for the Illini (3-4, 1-3 Big Ten), who were 30 ½-point underdogs, at midfield with 2:33 remaining that set up the winning drive.

Dre Brown's tackle-breaking 13-yard run got Illinois (3-4, 1-3) to the Wisconsin 25 with 34 seconds left and then the Illini set up McCourt to attempt a winner. The junior kicker was down the middle with the field goal to give Smith the most significant victory for Illinois in years.

"No matter if it's an extra point or a game-winner you kind of have to take the approach that every kick is the same because if you take a different approach you might get thrown off or something might be a little different," said McCourt, who missed a 40-yard attempt in the first quarter.

Fans rushed the field when it was over and "Jump Around" — a signature song at Wisconsin's Camp Randall Stadium — blared through the speakers at Memorial Stadium.

"It was amazing," Adams said. "It was an amazing feeling."

After the first six weeks of the college football season produced few surprises at the top of the rankings, there have now been major upsets in consecutive weeks. Last week it was then-No. 3 Georgia losing at home to South Carolina in double overtime. Wisconsin becomes the second-highest ranked team to lose to an unranked foe this season.

This was even more stunning.

The Badgers had not trailed this season, allowing only 29 points with four shutouts in six games. Illinois lost to Eastern Michigan earlier this season and has not even been bowl eligible since 2014. Instead, the Badgers (6-1, 4-1) blew a nine-point lead in the final 9:46 of the fourth quarter on Saturday.

Illinois beat a ranked team for the first time since 2011 and knocked off a ranked Big Ten team for the first time since 2007, when the Illini beat No. 1 Ohio State in November on their way to a Rose Bowl appearance. The last time Illinois beat a ranked Big Ten team at home was October 2007, a 31-26 victory against No. 5 Wisconsin.

Heisman contender Jonathan Taylor rushed 28 times for 132 yards and one touchdown for Wisconsin, but he also lost a fumble in Illinois territory in the fourth quarter.

"We had two drives late in the game that ended in turnovers," Wisconsin coach Paul Chryst said. "It's always hard to win on the road, and that made it even harder. We just have to move on and learn from this."

Coan was 24 of 32 passing for 264 yards and a touchdown, but his second turnover of the season came at a crucial time. He sailed a pass on third-and-5 that Adams grabbed to give the Illinois a short field against the No. 1 defense in the nation.

Illinois had cut Wisconsin's lead to 20-14 late in the third quarter on a 43-yard touchdown run by Reggie Corbin.

Wisconsin had opportunities to pad its lead, but settled for a field goal after a first-and-goal from the 3 and then Taylor fumbled at the Illinois 25.

After the fumble, the Illini ripped off a 75-yard touchdown drive, capped by Brandon Peters' 29-yard pass to Josh Imatorbhebhe to make it 23-21 with 5:53 left.

Giannis looks to improve as Bucks' leader

Milwaukee eyeing another big season

MILWAUKEE — Last season's loss to Toronto in the Eastern Conference finals stung Giannis Antetokounmpo.

So much so that the NBA MVP admitted it took several days for him to be able to sleep at night after he and the Milwaukee Bucks blew a 2-0 lead against the eventual NBA champion Raptors.

Antetokounmpo said his priority during the offseason was to become a better leader, both on and off the court.

"Mostly, you just gotta be more vocal," Antetokounmpo said. "You gotta lead by example. You gotta be able to accept criticism by your coach, by your teammates, and be OK with it. That's what a leader does. I know that my team knows who I am. They trust me. They know I'm going to put my body and everything I have on the line for this team. By doing that, everything else will take care of itself."

The Bucks won a league-best 60 games a season ago, and took home MVP, Coach of the Year (Mike

Budenholzer) and Executive of the Year (general manager Jon Horst) honors. But their goal was to bring the city of Milwaukee its first NBA title since 1971. That didn't happen.

Now, with both Kawhi Leonard and LeBron James out west, Kevin Durant on the shelf in Brooklyn and the core of Antetokounmpo, fellow All-Star Khris Middleton, first-team all-defensive guard Eric Bledsoe and Brook Lopez back together, anything less than another deep playoff run for the Bucks will be deemed a failure.

"The message to the team won't be that different than what it was going into last season," said Budenholzer, who is entering his second season in Milwaukee. "Really, our attack point is just what are we doing every day? How are we getting better every day? How are we competing every day? Are we playing unselfishly? Are we playing together? All those things that are just our core beliefs. If we're doing those on a day-in and day-out basis, the chips will fall where they may."

The Bucks open the season Thursday in Houston.

teams he played on with LeBron James.

"I think that there's a ton of freedom here for players to do what they do," he said. "There's a lot of special talent — unique talent — on this team, and (Budenholzer) gives us a lot of freedom to kind of figure some things out, and we did that in Cleveland, too. Let the great players be great, and just kind of give them space, and we all find

our spots to contribute and to be effective."

Korver signed a one-year deal with Milwaukee in July. The 17-year veteran reunites with Budenholzer, who coached Korver in Atlanta in 2015, when Korver made his only NBA All-Star team and Budenholzer won his first NBA Coach of the Year award.

Korver ranks fourth in NBA history in 3-pointers made with 2,351.

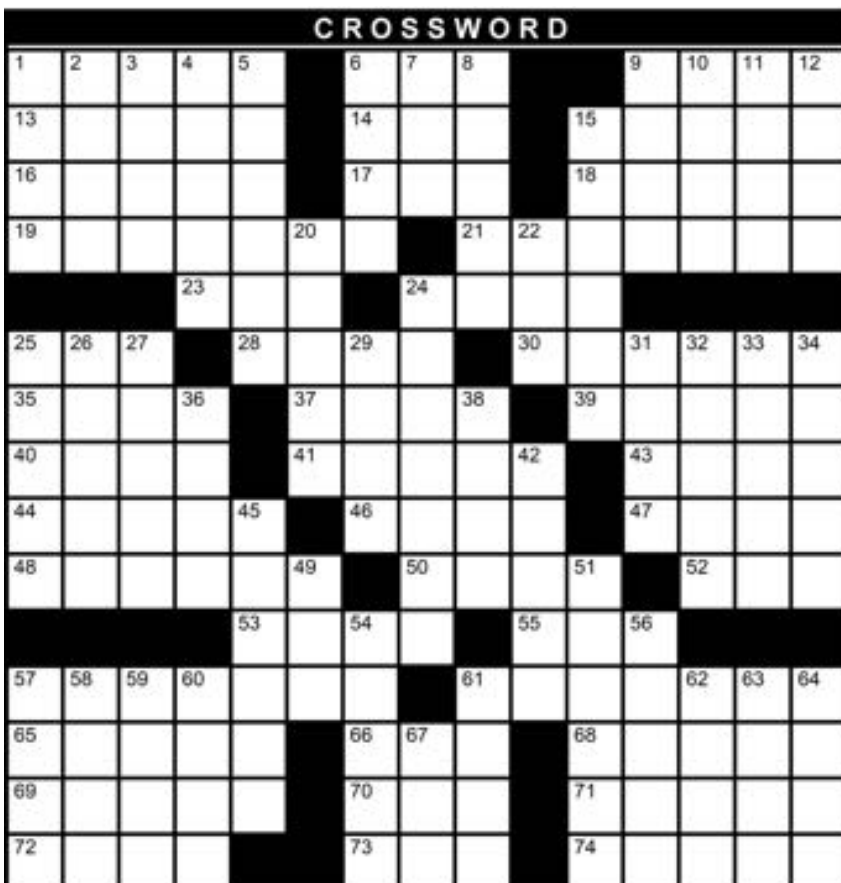

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Union official: Fired school guard gets job back

Anderson already has started another job in Madison

MADISON — A Wisconsin school district is rehiring a black security guard after he was fired last week for repeating a racial slur while telling a student not to use it, a union official said Monday.

Doug Keillor, executive director of Madison Teachers Inc., said that the union was contacted by school officials Monday saying interim Superintendent Jane Belmore decided to rescind the firing of Marlon Anderson.

Anderson said in a Facebook post Monday afternoon, "I'm back!!" He said he learned of his rehiring while at his new job Monday.

"Thank you to the 1,000-plus students for allowing your voices to be heard and to all the people from

across the globe for reaching out to my family," Anderson said in his post.

Keillor said Anderson, 48, will be on paid leave as he works with the district on a transition plan back to the school.

"We are very pleased," Keillor told The Associated Press.

Belmore did not immediately reply to an email request for comment Monday.

Earlier, Madison School Board President Gloria Reyes said she asked the superintendent to rescind Anderson's termination and to review the use of racial slurs in school.

"As we experienced a series of racial slurs last school year, we had to take a stand — that we would unequivocally protect students from harm. That we would never excuse the deep pain of this hateful, violent language, regardless of intent," Reyes said.

But she added: "It is important that we do not harm those that we are trying to protect."

It was unclear if Reyes was

speaking for herself or the entire school board. She did not immediately return messages seeking comment Monday.

Earlier, Anderson said he was not angry about his firing because he has received "a busload of love" from supporters.

Anderson told WMTV-TV on Sunday that he hasn't had time to be upset because of support he has received. He said people have stopped him on the street to hug him. Students from Madison West High School also staged a walkout Friday in support.

Anderson said he was responding to a call Oct. 9 about a disruptive student when the student, who is black, called him obscenities, including the N-word. Anderson told the student not to call him that, repeating the slur.

The school district has said it has a zero-tolerance policy on employees using racial slurs.

Reyes had said last week she wanted the district to resolve a grievance over Anderson's firing as quickly as possible.

A district spokeswoman didn't immediately respond to a message from The Associated Press seeking comment on Reyes' statement.

The school fired Anderson on Wednesday, but the Boys and Girls Club of Dane County hired him, and he started Monday.

"I didn't have an opportunity to be mad, scared, worried or anything. I just got hit with a busload of love," Anderson said.

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Barn quilts hit 350

Colorful cows decorate latest project

Shawano County's barn quilt project has reached a total of 350 quilts on display on barns or farm buildings throughout Shawano County.

The project was started in 2010 by Jim Leuenberger, a local photographer in Shawano.

"Never in my wildest dreams did I ever imagine we would have that many barn quilts in Shawano County," Leuenberger said.

"The fact that the number is more than in any other county in the U. S. makes it even more remarkable," he added. "That's a real tribute to all the barn owners and sponsors who have supported and continue to support the project."

The 350th barn quilt is on display on a dairy farm owned by David and Dyan Gwidt at N1025 State Highway 55, Pulaski.

The quilt was a gift to them from David Gwidt's sister, Mary Ann Mynsberge.

"I enjoy seeing all the quilts throughout Shawano County and thought David and his family should have one too," Mynsberge said.

The quilt design was chosen by

the Gwidt family after Mynsberge had asked them to look for a pattern they liked. After looking through patterns on the internet, David asked his children what they thought of one featuring four colorful cows.

After considering several other designs, the children, Emma, Maddy, Sydney, Landon, Lydia and Emerson, voted unanimously for the cow pattern.

Mynsberge painted the quilt, which has been named Cows of Different Colors.

"We are just thrilled with how the quilt looks," David Gwidt said.

The 8 foot by 8 foot quilt, painted on two 4 foot by 8 foot sheets of 3/4-inch plywood, is mounted on the farm's original barn, which is over 100 years old. It was put on display by LeRoy and Keith Raddant of Raddant Electric in Shawano.

The original 120-acre farm was purchased by David's parents, John and Margaret Gwidt, in 1965 from John Baranczyk. John and Margaret had four children. David is their youngest son and has lived on the farm his entire life. He and Dyan

bought the farm from his parents in 1999.

Earlier this year, they modernized the farm by building a new barn and installing a robotic milking system. They now milk 120 Holstein cows and farm 400 acres. Their children are very active in dairy events within

their local 4-H club and help with farm chores.

"We are very excited to be a part of the Shawano County barn quilt project," David Gwidt said, "and want to thank Jim Leuenberger for all the enthusiasm and time he has devoted to the project."

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
