Flooding disrupts life along the bay shore

High water, erosion is a growing concern

OCONTO — The county's director of Emergency Management told the County Board on Thursday that the problems caused by high water on the Great Lakes are going to get worse before they get better.

"I hope we don't we don't have ice shoves, I hope we don't have flooding in spring, but the way it's looking, and the projections of the Great Lakes, I don't think that's the case," Tim Magnin said as he presented

the latest five-year renewal of the county's Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan Agreement with Bay-Lake Regional Planning Commission. "So we're going to have to start planning hopefully to mitigate some of those issues beforehand and educate the public."

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers met Oct. 18 with officials from the city of Oconto and the towns of Little River, Oconto, Pensaukee and Little Suamico, to discuss flooding along the shore of Green Bay.

The group discussed flooding and erosion along the bay shore and the impact of high water on properties along the bay.

Afterward officials announced a town hall meeting to alert the affected public about the predictions regarding the future of the bay shore for the next five months and educate home and business owners about

how to respond to prevent life safety issues.

Magnin said it was clear at last week's meeting that the engineers are concerned.

"They usually don't give any advice as far as predictions or warnings, and they are now, and that's not normal," he said. "This is coming direct from the engineers, who are saying this is not a good thing and it's not going to be pretty."

Water levels on the lakes are at an all-time high, and residents got a taste of what could be in store Oct. 15 when high winds brought water coursing over the lake shore, closing Bay Shore Road near Oconto's Breakwater Park and other shoreline roads.

"We were living on an island on Tuesday," said Supervisor Rose Stellmacher, who lives on County Road Y in the town of Little River. "We were fine because we're higher,

but there were people who had to leave their residence because of the water.”

The county expects to receive a grant to update its Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan, which is due every five years and covers the response to disasters from high water to severe snow and wind storms. Federal and state funds account for most of the \$25,620 agreement with Bay-Lake to develop the plan update.

Having a plan in place speeds up the process when requesting funds after disasters occur, such as the 30-inch April 2018 snowstorm or the windstorm that devastated northern Oconto County in July, Magnin said.

“We get everybody’s heads together, look at this plan and revise it,” he said.

The high water concerns will be addressed in the short term by actions like sandbagging and making sure evacuation plans are in place, Magnin said.

“What more can we do? We can’t build a dike tomorrow,” he said. “We want the public to be aware so they don’t get this false image that somebody’s going to save the day.”

Magnin also updated the County Board on talks with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to document the July wind-

storm damage. Oconto is one of 17 counties and two tribes declared eligible for disaster relief from the storm, which also spawned nearly a dozen tornadoes around the state.

FEMA hosted an exploratory call with the affected towns Oct. 16 to get the process started, and the affected departments were scheduled to meet Wednesday to start working on the

necessary paperwork for reimbursement of cleanup costs, Magnin said. The next meeting with FEMA is scheduled for Nov. 15.

The city of Oconto is in the running for disaster funds related to the flooding and erosion issues, which is a separate event, he said.

Paul Ehrfurth, director of the Oconto County Economic Develop-

ment Corp., reported that the federal Economic Development Administration has authorized \$587 million fund for areas that have been declared natural disasters in 2018 and 2019.

To qualify for the grants, local projects need to provide a community with resiliency to deal with future natural disasters, and there needs to be a job-creation component as well, Ehrfurth said.

The announcement has revived some interest in siting a hospital in the Lakewood area, he said. Under the EDA program, the county could apply for a grant to fund construction of a water distribution network to replace the many private wells in the area.

In response to a question from Supervisor David Parmentier, Ehrfurth expressed doubt that the program could be used to help bay shore homeowners if a disaster area is declared there.

“There needs to be an economic development, job creation component,” Ehrfurth said. “If somebody wanted to, for example, build a hotel out by the marina, that would be a job creator and that might qualify for something like this, but just to get the money for the resiliency won’t work.”

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Gillett gets a moment in the spotlight

Tooth Fairy petition story goes around the world

GILLETT — Gillett Elementary School Principal Curt Angeli figures he's on "Minute 14½" of his 15 minutes of fame after his whimsical letter to the Tooth Fairy made national news.

It started Oct. 9 when a first-grader playing ga-ga – a variant of dodgeball – realized he had lost his loose tooth, potentially missing his opportunity to cash in with the famous tooth collector.

At the boy's request, Angeli dashed off a letter explaining the situation.

"As a trained principal and hobby dentist, I can verify that there is definitely a gap in (the boy's) teeth that was not there this morning when he came in," the principal wrote. "Please accept this letter as official verifica-

tion of a lost tooth and provide the standard monetary exchange rate you normally use for a real tooth."

Charmed staffer Jenna Carlson posted the letter on Facebook, where it quickly went viral.

As of Sunday night the original Facebook post had reached more than 1,100 "Likes" and had been shared by over 3,200 other users.

The story captured the imagination of local, and then not-so-local, television stations.

"It's interesting when (school secretary) Becky (Pockat) says, 'Curt, there's a call for you on Line 3,' and I asked who it is and she said, 'CNN,'" Angeli told the Gillett School Board on Thursday.

The cast of Good Morning America also chatted up Angeli, with co-host Michael Strahan asking the "hobby dentist" for help with his famous gapped front teeth.

"When Michael Strahan looks at you straight in the eye and says, 'Prin-

cipal Angeli?' I'm listening," Angeli said.

The tale has also been covered by international news outlets like the U.K.'s Daily Mail.

Kidding aside, the principal said it was overwhelming to be recognized for one of the little things that reflect what he and his staff do for the kids every day.

"It's really humbling and grounding for me, because ... this is just a letter I wrote literally in 10 minutes and I didn't even keep a copy of it," he said. "I didn't think about it until I walked in the following Monday and there was a news crew, and I'm thinking, 'Uh oh, what did I do?'"

And with all the bad news out there, Angeli was tickled to be part of a "feel-good" story.

"Maybe it was my letter that got out, but we have staff members who are doing this each and every day for every kid," he said. "It's affirming for us, because we know we do it for the right reasons and we know people appreciate it."

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"We're excited to be moving home."

County re-ups with Extension

2020 budget is slightly lower than 2019

OCONTO — The Oconto County Board on Thursday unanimously approved its 2020 contract for service with the University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension.

Regional director Nancy Crevier said yes, the full name of UW-Extension has changed after a systemwide reorganization.

"As of July 1 we did go back under the UW-Madison campus, which was our home campus to begin with, so we're excited to be moving home," Crevier told the board.

The contract is very similar to last year's, with some clarification of

language regarding risk management and liability, she said.

The county's share of salaries is also being figured in a new way. In the past the state paid 60% of any wages and salaries, with the county picking up the other 40%. Now the county pays a flat \$41,500 fee for each full-time equivalent employee, closer to 50-50, Crevier said.

But there are some benefits to the new system, especially when one of the Extension educators gets a raise, she said.

In the past if there was a salary increase, "We would come back to the counties and ask the county to put in their 40% of that – that's not happening now, there's the one flat fee and any increases are assumed by the university," Crevier said.

The budget covers 3.5 educators – three in the fields of Agriculture, Communities, and Human Development & Relationships, and a 4-H program coordinator who is shared

with Marinette County.

Oconto County's total cost of the contract is \$137,000, which is included in the 2020 county budget that the board will consider Thursday.

"This year's budget was \$137,940, so it's actually just slightly less," Administrative Coordinator Kevin Hamann said.

The position of agricultural agent has been vacant since Sarah Mills-Lloyd left in August, and Extension has been waiting to fill the position until after the 2020 budget was approved.

There was discussion among Marinette, Shawano and Oconto counties to possibly share two agents and not fill the Oconto County opening, Hamann said. But the Shawano County Board voted against the idea, as did the Oconto committee, so it was left as a full-time Oconto County position.

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No contest plea entered in child sex assault

OCONTO — A Sobieski man accused of sexually assaulting a toddler pleaded no contest Thursday, avoiding a jury trial that had been scheduled for Nov. 20.

Jeremy V. Hoover, 32, entered the pleas to one count of second-degree sexual assault of a child and one count of possession of child pornography, in connection with incidents that allegedly occurred in 2017 and 2018 involving sexual contact with a girl who was younger than 2 years old.

As part of a plea agreement, six related felony charges were dismissed but will be read into the record at sentencing, which Oconto County Judge Jay N. Conley scheduled for 10 a.m. Dec. 18. Under the agreement District Attorney Edward D. Burke Jr. plans to recommend a prison sentence of no more than 15 years and follow the recommendations of a presentence investigation with regard to conditions of extended supervision after the years of initial incarceration.

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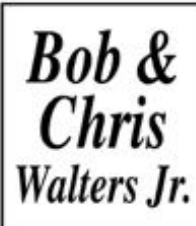

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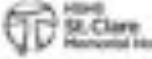

Tamaracks provide golden glow in late autumn

The end of October finds the tamaracks in all of their autumn glory. Our only native conifer that loses its needles completely every fall and regrows new ones each season, tamaracks are amazing when dressed in their golden autumn color.

Tamarack is especially common in our area given their preferred habitat choice of bogs, swamps and wetlands. Throughout most of the summer season, the trees go largely unnoticed. However, as late October and early November arrive, the tamaracks undergo a splendid transformation.

Tamarack is native here in Wisconsin, often growing alongside other native trees such as oak, spruce and pine. They are most often found in moist or wet areas, especially sphagnum bogs, cedar swamps and wetland edges. Where large stands of them grow together, the fall display is simply breathtaking.

For gardeners and property owners with drier landscapes, there are many garden hybrids of

tamarack, also called larch, available in many different shapes, sizes and forms. Be aware, however, that most of these are of European descent and not truly native here in North America.

Garden hybrid tamaracks are especially attractive to gardeners who enjoy unusual conifers and specimen plants. Many have been bred to grow

in a weeping or irregular form. Varied directions larch is one of the most common, along with weeping larch, where the branches weep vertically, much like a weeping willow.

Tamarack trees are an important food source for many native birds and wildlife species. This tree produces rather small cones that are upright, providing a perfect food source for many small songbirds that migrate through and spend the winter in our area. Squirrels, chipmunks and

other wildlife also feed on the seeds and cones.

One of my most memorable nature experiences was to walk beneath the grove of tamaracks in full color in early November while a soft breeze ruffled through the treetops and sent a gentle, golden rain cascading to the earth below. It was incredible to walk beneath the tamarack rain. I will never forget that experience.

Because their needles are very short and soft, there is really no cleanup involved once the tamaracks began to lose their needles. By spring, the tiny needles have decomposed, and the new growth begins to appear in star-like clusters along every stem during the month of May.

Enjoy the tamaracks in all their glory this weekend throughout our area. With the oaks, the tamaracks and beeches are the remaining trees left to showcase their spectacular autumn beauty.

Gibraltar edges Suring in playoffs

Stuart has another big game on ground for Eagles

SURING — Suring came up on the wrong end of a 30-28 playoff matchup against Gibraltar on Friday.

Logan Stuart had another monster game on the ground for second-seeded Suring. The senior carried the ball 34 times, totaling 223 rushing yards and all four of the team's touchdowns.

All the other Eagles combined for just 49 yards of offense.

Third-seeded Gibraltar scored a pair of touchdowns in the second quarter to take a 16-0 lead.

Suring turned the ball over three times in the first half, but its defense only surrendered the two scores.

"We made too many mistakes,

obviously, is what cost us the game," said Stuart. "We knew we could still compete and win if we cleared those mistakes up in the second half, but we didn't limit those mistakes enough."

Suring cut the deficit in half when Stuart scored a 9-yard rushing touchdown, and then the team converted on a two-point pass attempt just before halftime.

The teams each scored once in the third quarter, with Suring's coming on a 2-yard Stuart run. The Eagles' two-point run attempt failed, leaving the team with an eight-point deficit entering the fourth quarter.

Suring scored two touchdowns in the fourth, but another failed two-point conversion paired with a final Gibraltar touchdown was too much to overcome.

Stuart scored on a 12-yard run for the first score, but the two-point pass conversion failed.

After Gibraltar scored its final touchdown to go up 30-20, Suring's Dequez Sepulveda returned the ensu-

ing kickoff to the Gibraltar 5-yard line, setting up Stuart's final touchdown. Stuart scored on a 1-yard run, and Suring connected on a two-point conversion pass to get within two points, but the team eventually ran out of time.

The Eagles ended the game with the ball, getting to the Gibraltar 6-yard line but failing to get into the end zone.

Suring caps the year with an 8-2 record, with both losses coming to Gibraltar.

"The team fought until the very end and left everything on the field," said Suring coach Mitch Taylor.

"Even though the result didn't turn out the way we wanted, it showed the resolve and commitment that these gentlemen put forth throughout the season. I am very proud of these players and how they came together as a team and a family. We had a lot of adversity thrown at us this year, but one thing is for certain — they never quit and gave it their all."

"Even though we lost, you can't take away the remarkable season we had in the first year of 8-man," said Stuart. "I couldn't be prouder of my team, and I have a forever bond with my teammates."
