Falls woman arrested on drug trafficking charges

Housemate is linked to large federal meth seizure

OCONTO — Bail was set at \$15,000 cash for an Oconto Falls woman arrested for alleged drug trafficking in her home and three other felony charges.

Nova J. Winans, 20, appeared Oct. 8 before Oconto County Circuit Judge Michael T. Judge, who set bond and scheduled the balance of her initial appearance for Thursday.

According to the criminal complaint, Oconto County authorities received a tip Oct. 3 that an Oconto Falls

man, Christopher Ullmer, had called two women from the Brown County Jail, asked them to tell Winans to get bail money from his safe, and alerted them to “clean out the house because the police knew about the house.” Jail inmates are told that their phone calls are routinely recorded.

Ullmer, 22, had been arrested Oct. 2 on several drug charges in Brown County. After hearing about his phone call, Oconto County officials obtained a search warrant for the house he and Ullmer shared on Indianwood Drive.

An officer who made a traffic stop after Winans drove away from the home saw the safe partially covered in her back seat, the complaint said.

According to the sheriff's department, searches of the car and home resulted in confiscation of 156.28 grams of methamphetamine, 23.72 grams of MDMA, 63.9 grams of hash-

ish oil, 26.69 grams of marijuana, 3.54 grams of cocaine, illegal obtained prescription medicine, drug paraphernalia, two firearms and U.S. currency.

She is charged with felony possession with intent to deliver amphetamine, designer drugs and THC, maintaining a drug trafficking place, and misdemeanor possession of cocaine.

Ullmer is one of nine people who also have been federally indicted in connection with what officials are calling the largest methamphetamine bust ever made in Northeast Wisconsin. Fifty-eight pounds of meth were seized when a search warrant was executed in Grand Chute in Outagamie County. Ullmer is charged in U.S. District Court with conspiracy to distribute a controlled substance.

Child porn charges filed against Little Suamico man

State detected images being downloaded, complaint says

OCONTO — A Little Suamico man faces five charges of possession of child pornography after a search warrant was executed at his home Oct. 3.

Edward J. Gille, 60, appeared Oct. 8 in Oconto County Circuit Court, where Judge Michael T. Judge set bond at \$15,000 cash. The balance of

his initial appearance is scheduled for Thursday.

According to the criminal complaint, in May the state Division of Criminal Investigation identified an I.P. address that was downloading child pornography. The address was traced to Gille's address on Geano Beach Road.

Working with local authorities, investigators drafted a search war-

rant for Gille's property Oct. 1, Judge approved the warrant Oct. 2, and the Oconto County Sheriff's Department executed it on Oct. 3.

Nine specific images of prepubescent girls in sexual poses were found on Gille's computer and transferred to an evidentiary CD, and five images constitute the felony charges that were filed last week, the complaint said.

McCarthy named Gillett interim mayor

Nanette Mohr chosen as council president

GILLETT — As expected, the Gillett City Council on Oct. 7 named Council President Josh McCarthy to serve as interim mayor through the remainder of former Mayor James Beaton's term in April.

The council then split on the matter of who should replace McCarthy as council president. Alderman Deb Rudie nominated Matt Stroik, and Marie Blaser nominated Nanette Mohr.

With McCarthy no longer voting and the candidates abstaining, Alderman Sandra Hubbard joined Blaser in choosing Mohr, two votes to one.

The six council members signed and presented a letter to Beaton on Sept. 30 asking for his resignation because he lost his home when his business was sold earlier in the month. Citing state statute 17.03(4), they claimed he had vacated his office because he was no longer a Gillett resident.

There is no evidence the council

ever met or voted to send the letter, which was nonetheless signed by all six aldermen. They have made no comment about how the letter was approved.

Beaton signed a "release and separation agreement" during a meeting that was closed to the public at the beginning of the council's Oct. 3 meeting. Under the agreement, Beaton received a lump-sum payment representing his salary for the rest of his term through April (\$2,762.50) in exchange for his resignation.

When the council reconvened in open session, it voted unanimously to approve the agreement in the first public acknowledgment of the discussions with the former mayor. NEW Media is considering whether

to ask the Oconto County District Attorney's Office to investigate the matter as a violation of the state open meetings laws.

1 killed, 1 injured in rollover

A man was killed and a woman hospitalized after an one-vehicle rollover in the town of Spruce on Oct. 9.

The Oconto County Sheriff's Department said dispatchers were notified about 5:53 a.m. that the crash had occurred on County Road M east of Neta Lane in the town of Spruce.

Justin M. Hensel Sr., 34, Suring, was thrown from the sport utility vehicle and died at the scene. His passenger, Brittany D. Van Hecke, 31, was taken by ambulance to a Green Bay hospital for treatment of her injuries.

According to the accident report, Hensel drove onto the eastbound shoulder and apparently overcorrected. The SUV began to spin and entered the north ditch, overturning in the soft ground. He was ejected and pinned under the vehicle when it came to rest, the report said.

The sheriff's office was assisted by Lena Fire Department and Oconto Falls Ambulance Service. Sheriff Todd Skarban said an investigation was underway involving his department, Wisconsin State Patrol and the Brown County Medical Examiner's Office.

Free recycling bins added to new waste collection deal

City cost works out to \$6.90 per 18-gallon bin

OCONTO FALLS — Every household in Oconto Falls will get an 18-gallon recycling bin, and crews will pick up recyclables every week instead of

every other week, under a new agreement that takes effect Jan. 1.

The Oconto Falls City Council approved a contract with Great American Disposal, or GAD, a month ago but held off on the decision regarding the recycling bins pending further study.

As the city conducted that further study, GAD sweetened the deal, which originally called for the 1,132 households in the community to receive a free bin in exchange for the city paying \$260 a month for the five-year length of the contract.

By the time the contract reached the City Council on Oct. 8, GAD had reduced the price by half, and the city will now pay \$130 a month.

Alderman Mat McDermid said that doing the math, the monthly fee spread over five years amounts to \$6.90 per bin.

"It's a heck of a lot cheaper than what we can buy them for," City Administrator Vicki Roberts said.

The monthly fee will be eliminated if the city agrees to extend its contract, she added.

The agreement is for five years,

with the price locked in for 2020 and increases limited to not more than 4% in 2021, not more than 3.5% in 2022 and not more than 3% in 2023. There would be no increase in 2024 if the city agrees to a five-year contract extension at that time.

Under the existing system, garbage is collected weekly, and city employees take care of curbside recycling every other week. Oconto County administers the recycling part of the program. Both services will be offered weekly starting in the new year.

‘Bite Back’ bills aimed at Lyme disease pass Senate

Measures head to Assembly

MADISON — A package of four bills aimed at fighting Lyme disease in Wisconsin passed the state Senate on a voice vote Oct. 8 and have been sent to the Assembly for consideration.

State Rep. Jeff Mursau, R-Crivitz, is the lead co-sponsor of the “Bite Back” package in the Assembly.

“The problem of Lyme disease is

growing and shows no signs of slowing after the annual number of cases has doubled in the past decade,” said Sen. Robert Cowles, R-Green Bay, the bills’ main sponsor. “I’ve personally seen the impact that Lyme disease can have on someone’s life, and I’ve heard stories about how Lyme disease has impacted other residents’ lives. By approaching the awareness and prevention of Lyme disease through the ‘Bite Back’ package, we can ensure that the Legislature has made a bold first step and fostered continuing discussions to combat Lyme disease and other vector-borne illnesses in our state.”

The four proposals approved by

the Senate last week include:

2019 Senate Bill 296: Requires signage that raises awareness of Lyme disease, informs on how to prevent tick bites and encourages visitors to check for ticks after visits to be posted in common areas of properties in the state Parks System.

2019 Senate Bill 297: Requires the sale of bug spray, one of the easiest methods to prevent tick bites, in certain state parks and forests when their park or forest office is open and staffed.

2019 Senate Bill 298: Requires information to raise awareness of Lyme disease, inform on how to prevent

tick bites and encourage people to check for ticks after spending time outdoors to be published in informational brochures at state parks. This legislation also requires that similar information is posted on the DNR’s digital and print platforms in May of each year, which is Lyme Disease Awareness Month.

2019 Senate Bill 300: Establishes a 19-member tick-borne disease study committee to create a report for the legislature within 36 months on consensus-based recommendations for changes in our state’s approach to Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases.

Driver charged with negligent homicide

A witness said the pickup went through a stop sign, complaint says

OCONTO — The driver of a pickup truck involved in a fatal collision with a motorcycle was scheduled to make an initial court appearance Wednesday, charged with homicide

by negligent operation of a motor vehicle.

According to the criminal complaint filed in in Oconto County Circuit Court, Damian Lee Murphy, 18, of Abrams was driving a pickup truck southbound on County Road J in the town of Pensaukee around 10:43 a.m. Aug. 14.

A witness said the truck failed to stop at a stop sign at U.S. 41 and collided with a northbound motorcycle, the complaint said. Albert W. Repert, 71, of Midlothian, Illinois, died from his injuries a short time later.

The charge is a Class G felony, which is punishable by up to 10 years in prison, a \$25,000 fine, or both.

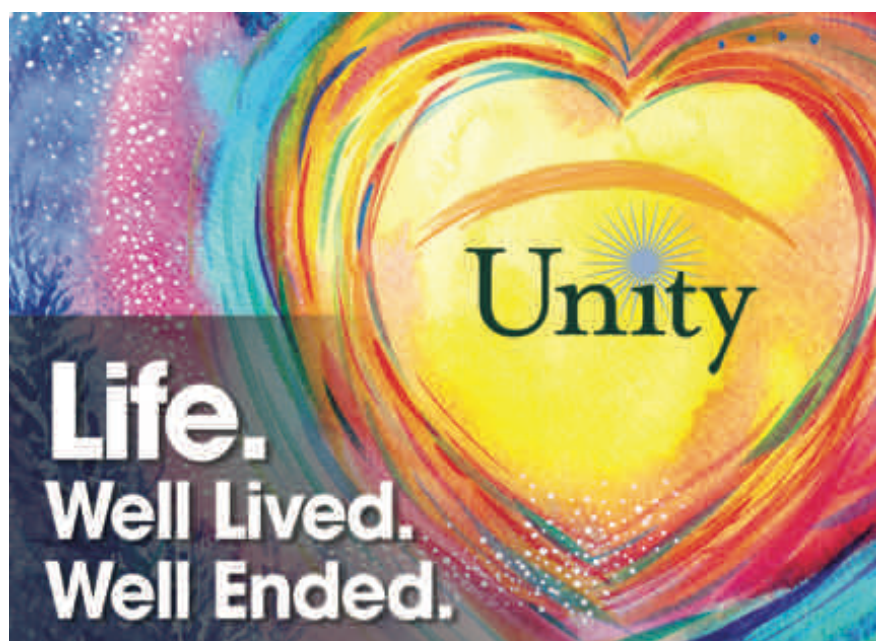

Mobile mammography unit fights breast cancer in rural communities

Truck travels on regular basis to Prevea Health centers in the area

GREEN BAY — During October's Breast Cancer Awareness Month, Prevea Health and its hospital partners are reminding women about the importance of breast health and breast screenings.

In May 2018, Prevea Health, in partnership with HSHS St. Vincent,

St. Mary's, St. Nicholas and St. Clare Memorial Hospitals, launched a 3-D and digital, mobile mammography unit to provide residents in rural communities greater access to breast health screenings.

The mobile mammography unit is equipped with mammography technology that has the capability to provide 3-D and/or digital images. It features two changing rooms and a waiting room, and is staffed by a registered mammography technologist. It travels on a regular basis to Prevea Health centers in Oconto, Marinette, Gillett, Mountain, Lena, Pulaski, Kewaunee, Luxemburg, Manitowoc, Plymouth, Shawano and Seymour, as well as to area businesses.

Between May 2018 and September 2019, the mobile mammography

unit and its staff have provided 1,346 patients in these rural communities with mammograms. Out of those 1,346 patients:

- 129 patients required additional imaging for suspected breast cancer;
- 9 patients were diagnosed with breast cancer;
- 99 patients received a mammogram for the first time; and
- 15 patients had not had a mammogram in more than 8 years

"Many of these patients are women who may not have otherwise received a mammogram due to the burden of having to travel to another community far away where services are available," said Tammy Piehl, radiology manager at the Prevea Breast Center in Allouez. "Our mobile unit allows us to take these lifesaving

breast screenings directly to them. If we can catch cancer early with a mammogram, it is likely more treatable."

All women should talk with their health care provider about the appropriate timing for screening mammograms, especially women who are age 40 or at high-risk. A schedule will be based upon an individual's health. At age 40, any woman may wish to begin regular screening mammograms. By age 45, women should have a screening mammogram and continue to have one at least every other year.

Pulaski HS students raise pheasants

Sophomore hopes to have started an ongoing program

PULASKI — Pulaski High School agriculture students have latitude for wide-ranging semester projects depending on their interests.

Raising fish such as perch or trout for sale, planting and maintaining a school forest, helping raise plants in the PHS greenhouse, maintaining a tropical fish tank and others involving raising farm animals are examples.

One of the latest projects, started by sophomore Landon Holewinski last spring, is raising poultry, in general, and pheasants, in particular.

PHS agriculture teacher Kaleb Santy said last spring 100 pheasant chicks and 100 eggs were delivered to Pulaski High School.

From those came 156 birds – some of which were recently released near PHS – and others that have been or will be sold to hunters to use to train dogs or those who would want to stock their wooded areas for hunting purposes.

“Hopefully, all of them can end up as somebody’s main course,” Santy said.

The pheasants were first raised in pens at Pulaski High School but were moved to a spacious flight pen built by Santy and fellow teacher Kare Goodness, outside of Pulaski. Once they reached about five pounds in weight, they were ready to release or sell.

Money raised from the sale will go back into the program for future projects. Right now, Santy said, they

plan to raise another 100 pheasants in the spring of 2020.

Along with the pheasants, Holewinski cared for 10 chickens last spring and also had 76 chicken eggs in incubation at PHS.

After taking Animal Science first semester in the 2018-19 school year, Holewinski was looking for a new challenge in the Ag Department. He and Santy designed an individualized course centered around poultry.

Holewinski's love for poultry goes beyond the classroom. At home, he has 52 chickens he tends to daily.

"I started with a small amount. As my interest grew, I wanted to expand to new breeds, and I began building my flock," Holewinski said.

His independent study course description labels him with the daily responsibility of caring for all birds in the Ag Department.

"Every day, I have to feed and water the pheasants and chickens. I take care of their bedding and keep updates on their health," he said.

Earlier this year, Holewinski won the Wisconsin Bird and Game Association Youth grant. He also received a gold rating on his proficiency award for diversified livestock.

"My favorite part about my poultry production class is that I get to do what I love not only outside of school, but inside it, too," Holewinski stated. "I am excited to further my knowledge of poultry and see where it will take me."

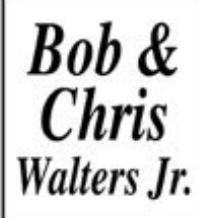

Historic Mountain Fire Lookout Tower provides great view of fall colors

For those willing and able to climb to the top, the Mountain Fire Lookout Tower offers a spectacular view of fall colors in the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest.

Just a hop and a skip off state Highway 32 in the town of River-

view north of Mountain, the 100-foot tower was erected by the Civilian Conservation Corps during the winter of 1934-35 under the direction of the U.S. Forest Service. It was part of a 19-tower network for almost 35 years and is the only hub of that net-

work still standing after the towers were replaced by aerial surveillance in the 1970s.

The tower served as a radio relay station for the Forest Service and the Oconto County Sheriff's Department from 1977 to 1992; it was restored in

1994 and again in 2015-16. It has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places since 2008.

Enjoy the view while you can; hours are 8 a.m. to sunset. The tower is due to close for the season at the end of the month.

OCONTO COUNTY CIRCUIT COURT

Proceedings of Oct. 9

Nick J. VandenHoven, 30, Green Bay, was sentenced to three years in prison, followed by five years of extended supervision, for second-degree reckless endangerment and misdemeanor criminal trespass, in connection with an incident that occurred Sept. 12, 2018. Judge Jay N. Conley gave VandenHoven credit for 392 days already served since his arrest. Conditions of his extended supervision include that he maintain absolute sobriety and undergo assessments and/or treatment for alcohol and other drug abuse and anger management, as well as a psychological evaluation. A final pre-trial conference was scheduled for Jan. 13.

purple as October arrives.

The first juncos of the season have now arrived and we see them letting along the trail, their telltale flashing white tail feathers showing as they take flight just a short distance in front of us on the trail.

In the October breeze, acorns tumble from the treetops, bouncing along the pathway in front of us, while chipmunks and squirrels busily work to gather them up and store them for the coming winter.

The trail system at Navarino Nature Center and Navarino Wildlife Area is extensive and it is possible to walk for many miles enjoying the colors and beauty of the season. Trails lead over the oak and pine ridges, as well as through tamarack bogs, prairies, wetland and prime aspen, birch and maple forests.

Now in fall autumn bloom, enjoy the beauty of unusual witch hazel, a Wisconsin native shrub that grows along the trail system in many areas. The thin, wiry, yellow flowers can be seen blooming along the bare stems of these large shrubs.

Hiking along the trail, you'll also spot a number of beautiful fall fungi, now in full show as the cool weather and dampness of autumn take hold.

Each evening, the sandhill cranes return to the wetlands to roost by the thousands during the month of October, a spectacular end to an autumn day exploring the beauty of Navarino.

Slow start, errors hurt Gillett in loss

Team helps raise money for teacher

GILLETT — The Gillett High School volleyball team was unable to overcome a slow start in a nonconference loss to Bonduel on Oct. 7, with final scores of 25-16, 25-17, 18-25, 25-21.

Slow starts to the first and second sets had Gillett playing catch up, and it led to some errors that helped Bonduel extend its lead. Most of the errors came on attacks, but a few came after miscommunications and lack of rotation from the lineup on the court.

Co-coach Erin Buhrandt said the team tried to experiment with a new lineup in the first set before working junior Karissa Schaal back into the lineup after her recent ankle injury in the second set.

Senior Grace Wickman had a kill to open the first set for Gillett, but Bonduel took the next eight points to seize control.

Gillett slowly worked its way back into the set, getting within two points three separate times before Bonduel gave itself some cushion with a 4-0 run. The Tigers lost 12 of the set's final 16 points.

"I think it was just a lack of talking and really working together as a team that created errors that were unforced," said Gillett junior Emily Umentum on the team's slow start.

Gillett started the second set losing the first three points but tied it at four after some strong serving from Umentum and a tip from Schaal. Bonduel regained control with a 6-0 run, and the Tigers were never able to get within three points the rest of the set.

A kill from Schaal trimmed the deficit to three, but the visitors took nine of the next 13 points to take a 2-0 lead in the match.

While many teams might have folded and given up hope for a comeback, Gillett found new energy in the third set.

Tiger players credited their fight after the first two sets to Amy Shaw, the school's Spanish teacher, who is battling cancer. Gillett wore pink jerseys on the night to fight cancer, with the proceeds going to Shaw.

Schaal led the charge in the third set, tallying several of her eight total kills and a couple aces to help the team to an early 8-4 lead.

Bonduel rallied to tie the set at eight before the Tigers went on an 8-1 run. Junior Emelie Horsens posted two of her four attack kills during the run, while junior KayLee Huebner provided strong serving, including an ace.

The closest Bonduel got the rest of the set was four, but Gillett ended the set by taking the final three points.

"We needed to get going because if we lost that third (set), we were done," said Schaal. "We decided, 'Hey, Mrs. Shaw is here, so let's show her what we can do and let's go get this.'"

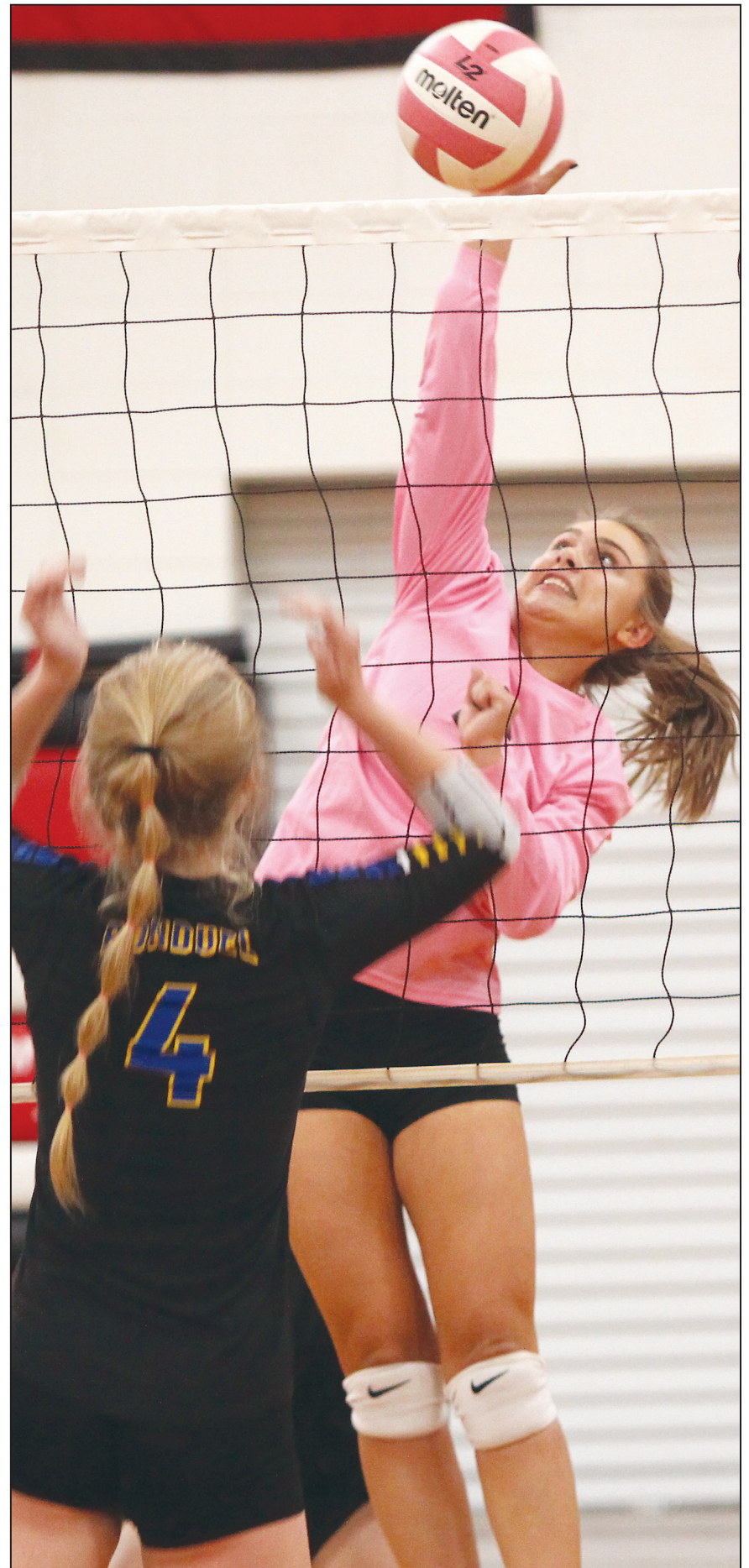
Gillett continued its strong play into the fourth set, going back and forth with Bonduel before going ahead 19-17 on a Wickman kill and Bonduel error. The Bears surged ahead with a 5-0 run and finished the set on an 8-2 run to finish the match.

Wickman led Gillett with 11 total kills, while Schaal had 12 digs. Umentum and junior Aubrey DeBauch joined Emelie Horsens with four total kills.

Umentum finished with a team-high 14 assists, while sophomore Naomi Anker had 17 digs. Huebner and senior Sophie Horsens each chipped in with eight digs.

Aside from the team playing for Shaw, the school also conducted a 50/50 raffle and had over 30 bucket raffles to help raise money.

"It was really emotional because we are so close to her, like everyone in the school is really close with Mrs. Shaw," Umentum said. "I think the whole team felt really good about helping her in any way we could support her."

ECLECTIC MIND

Sid's was the McDonald's of the 1950S

Author's note: This column originally appeared in the Beaver Dam Daily Citizen of Dec. 31, 2005.

Janus is the Roman god of gates and doors, beginnings and endings, and he's always represented with a double-faced head, each looking in opposite directions. January is named for Janus, and we have a tendency at the end of the year to look ahead and to look back. A new year is commencing and an old year is ending. Time seems somehow important to us at these junctures.

But it's always seemed a little strange to me the way we break time down into decades. You know: "The Fabulous '50s," "The Roaring '20s," etc., because to me, my life doesn't

break down that way. As I look back at my life, I realize that a lot of the phases of my life cross over decade lines, and some of them are way short of a decade. It isn't fair to cut history into slices of 10 years.

The Fabulous '50s, for example, for me was an odd 10 years because I went from grade school through high school and halfway through college in that decade. The '50s were known for many things. The Korean War started in 1950 and loomed large in our lives for most of the first half of the decade. In July 1953, about two months after I "graduated" from eighth grade, the United States, North Korea and China signed an armistice, which ended the "police action" in Korea, but it didn't bring about a permanent peace; the Korean people are still divided. Almost 30,000 American service members died in battle or from battle-related injuries, another 4,200 died from non-combat causes and 93,000 were wounded in action seriously enough to be evacuated. An additional 7,245

service members became prisoners of war. The "war" influenced everything – even after it ended.

Other factors which characterized the '50s were: white racist terrorism in the South; television and TV dinners; abstract art; the first credit cards; the rise of drive-in theaters to a peak number in the late '50s of more than 4,000 outdoor screens; hot-rods; "conformity" (remember when that expression crept into the language?); "middle-class values" (whatever that meant); the rise of modern jazz; and the advent of "fast food" restaurants and drive-ins. McDonald's was first franchised in 1955 in Des Plaines, Illinois.

There was no McDonald's in Oconto Falls when I was going through The Fabulous '50s. (There still isn't!) My friends and I spent a lot of our free time at Sid Johnson's Candy Shop on Main Street, right next door to the movie theatre. Sid's was the Oconto Falls equivalent to the soda fountains that became glorified in such classics as "Happy Days" and "American Graffiti."

At Sid's, you could order custom-made sodas and ice cream. Sid would mix soda water with flavored syrups to create carbonated beverages and ice cream floats, among other tasty treats. We'd stop there for a snack after school or after a ball game or movie. My sister and I would use the pay phone there to call home so our folks would come and pick us up. (We had this system, which everyone used: We'd put a dime in the phone, dial home and hang up after two

rings. Our parents knew that was the signal to come and get us, and we got the dime back to spend on a cherry phosphate or a black cow!)

"Messing around" or "goofing off" were popular expressions (and real pastimes), and Sid's was where we did it. Sid's had a great jukebox, too, and for a nickel, you could hear "Rock Around the Clock," "Cherry Pink and Apple Blossom White," "Unchained Melody," "Yellow Rose of Texas," "Ain't That a Shame," "Autumn Leaves," "Moments to Remember" or "Dance With Me, Henry."

Sid mixed up such frothy brews as strawberry floats; vanilla, strawberry, and lime phosphates; cherry and vanilla Cokes; banana splits; triple chocolate malts (chocolate ice cream with chocolate flavored malt powder and chocolate milk – phew!). They were all guilt-free, too, because fat and cholesterol were not buzzwords in the '50s. Hallelujah!

If you were like me, a teenager growing up in the "happy days" era of the '50s, then you know how special it was to meet your friends after school at the local soda fountain. Most of those soda fountains of yesteryear are gone now. But for us, Sid's was a town meeting place where kids could meet after school for a malt, play a tune on the jukebox, talk with girlfriends and boyfriends or have a game of pinball. Ah, the good old days! But that's enough looking back; time to look forward, right?
