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Photography studio has new home in Wittenberg

Szutkowski specializes in baby photos

WITTENBERG — In four short years, photographer Patience Szutkowski has grown her business, Premier Portraits By Patience, from a part-time setup in the corner of her living room to a thriving full-time occupation.

She recently moved her photography studio into the lower level of the Long Chiropractic Center at 500 W. College Ave. in Wittenberg.

Specializing in photos of newborns through 1-year-olds, Szutkowski says she is known for her style which includes bold uses of color and texture.

Newborn sessions are scheduled within 14 days of birth, and she has a wide variety of hand-knitted outfits designed specifically to fit her tiny subjects. She noted that many of the newborn outfits purchased are just too big; providing the outfits for newborns gives her more control over the look of the final product.

“My stepmom is my source for all the knitted outfits, and I once had her create one for a 4-pound newborn,” said Szutkowski.

Self-taught, she took a photography class in high school and learned the building blocks of Photoshop. She identifies herself as a visual learner and has perfected her craft through trial and error. She also acknowledges that the internet is a wealth of information.

Szutkowski, who competed in pageants and modeled, said she originally thought she would do that kind of photography. After her sons were born, she discovered that she really loved baby pictures and changed her focus.

Her business has grown through word of mouth, and she admits Facebook has been a huge help. When clients post the pictures she’s taken, it can expose her work to hundreds of potential new clients. Most of her clients are from central Wisconsin, and some of her clients drive two hours to come for the photo sessions, she said.

The newborn shots are the most popular shots, according to Szutkowski, who also offers packages including photos at the different

milestone markers.

“At three months, they’re starting to make eye contact. At six months, most can sit up, and at nine months they’re starting to crawl,” said Szutkowski.

At the one-year mark, she offers a fun smash-the-birthday-cake session as an option. She orders the cakes with any special theme requests from Hanke’s Sentry Foods.

With more than 100 backdrops to choose from, she generally gets a feeling from the clients as to which ones might be appealing. She shoots one neutral setting and then a bolder one.

“My style is a lot of color pattern and texture,” said Szutkowski. “I can see the end result in my head, and it generally surprises the customers when I come up with a look they would have never imagined.”

A session fee, between \$150 and \$300, is all inclusive and includes the digital images. For milestone pictures, she provides about 20 pictures in three different outfits. She also sells the images on a variety of products, including canvases, brag books, loose prints and hardcover books. She notes that the sets of three identical mini books which have magnets on the ends and fold out accordion style are extremely popular because each set of grandparents can have a copy.

Szutkowski will also take photos of the birth process. For \$750, she will

be on call at 38 weeks with her phone charged and her gas tank full. She arrives when they are ready to deliver, stays about two hours after the birth to get pictures of the family, weight and details. She stays at the head of the bed and said the photos are intimate but discreet.

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Fred Berner, editor and publisher of the Antigo Daily Journal, passes away

ANTIGO — If you've spent any amount of time in the area, you have probably encountered the writings of Fred Berner, longtime editor and publisher of the Antigo Daily Journal.

Berner showed up for work Nov. 25 and died at his desk. He was 71 years old.

The Berner family has owned the newspaper for 115 years.

After he graduated with a journalism degree in 1970 from the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, he found his way back to Antigo in 1972 and has been working at the paper ever since.

Berner was one of the leaders of the United Way campaign in Antigo.

He served on the Wisconsin Newspaper Association Board of directors for many years and was a longtime member of the board of di-

rectors of M&I Bank.

According to longtime employee Lisa Haefs, Berner not only represented the past but also planned for the future.

Realizing all the changes that are coming

to the newspaper business, Berner knew that the future of the newspaper depended on becoming part of a larger organization.

After much research, he found the Adams Publishing Group, which fit his philosophy of community journalism.

He signed the papers in June and planned to retire last week.

Haefs also noted that Berner loved the newspaper business.

Whether it was reporting on the good things that brought the com-

munity together or the bad things that could tear people apart, he was a chronicler of the community.

He always wore a suit or sport coat and always carried a camera in his pocket.

If needed, he would deliver papers.

"He loved Antigo with an unrivaled yet quiet passion.

He mourned its shortcomings and reveled in its successes," said Haefs.

A funeral Mass was held at 10:30 a.m. Saturday at St. John Catholic Church in Antigo, with Rev. Charles Hoffmann officiating.

Survivors, in addition to his longtime companion, Kay Schroeder, include his sister, Mary Jo Berner, Eagle River; niece, Betsy Ross, Denmark; nephews, Russell F. (Deborah) Ross, Jacksonville Beach, Florida, John Ross (Stephanie), De Pere, Flynn and Fletcher Ross, Nashville, Tennessee; and his Antigo Daily Journal family.

Clintonville tax rate up slightly

Common council approves 2020 budget

CLINTONVILLE — The Common Council approved the 2020 budget at its Nov. 19 meeting in the Community Center.

Taxpayers in Clintonville will see an increase of 54 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. The new tax rate will be \$10.64 per \$1,000 of assessed value. That is a tax increase for the city's portion of the property tax bill of \$44.41 for a home assessed at \$80,000, the average assessed value of a home in Clintonville.

The total tax levy is \$2.38 million,

which is \$128,799 higher than the 2019 budget.

"The more I read the budget, the more I'm impressed. It gets better every year," said Mayor Richard Beggs. "The budget format is revamped and easier to understand. Overall, it is good for the city. It doesn't include money for the swimming pond, but we'll get there."

Clintonville resident Terry Lichtenberg appeared before the public hearing for the budget Nov. 18 in support of something being done to provide outdoor swimming.

According to City Administrator Sharon Eveland, the city's assessed value is about \$400,000 higher than the previous year. The city had a 1.27% net new construction rate.

Eveland reported that the city lost about \$5 million in value as the result

of a settlement between the state of Wisconsin and Creative Converting over its equalized value, which is assessed by the state. This resulted in a tax refund of \$107,000 to Creative Converting as part of the settlement with the state regarding its equalized value.

The new budget includes a 2% cost of living allowance for city employees.

The health insurance premiums for 2020 will increase by 34%, and the budget will absorb those costs.

The budget also includes a part-time community service officer. It also includes hiring an assistant city administrator and reorganization of the public works department.

The tax levy is to cover a balance of \$875,757 of debt service. The 2020 total budget for debt service is just over \$1 million.

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Ballbachs celebrate beekeeping with barn quilt

GRESHAM — Shawano County's 356th barn quilt, called "Honey-bee," is on display on a barn owned by John and Lorraine Ballbach Jr. at W9790 Thurner Lane, north of Gresham.

They chose the pattern featuring a honeybee because they are full-time beekeepers.

"We think the Shawano County barn quilts are just awesome and have always wanted one for our farm," Lorraine Ballbach said. "Ours is beautiful. I love it."

John Ballbach has been a beekeeper since he was 16 years old, helping his father on their farm near Port Washington. His parents, John Sr. (also known as "The Bee Man") and Rae Ballbach, got into the bee business after John Sr. quit his foundry job. At their peak, they were running 600 hives.

After selling their farm in Port Washington, they purchased the farm on Thurner Lane north of Gresham from Dan Thurner and his family, who were dairy farmers and owned 80 acres. John and Rae relocated in 1989, moving "up north" for better honey production.

At that time, John Jr. and Lorraine lived in Random Lake and kept bees as a hobby. In 2009, Lorraine quit her job in hospice care and started selling raw local honey with her husband. They had 12 hives by 2010.

In 2018, John and Lorraine left Random Lake where they'd lived for 19 years and relocated to the farm north of Gresham. They have 75 hives today and hope to raise even more.

Because of Wisconsin's cold winters, the Ballbachs take most of their hives to Paducah, Kentucky, in December, leaving only a handful in Wisconsin. When they bring them back in the spring, they have to "queen check" to make sure the bees didn't kill off the queen bee.

"Whenever there is stress in the hive, like traveling for a long distance in a car, the bees blame the queen and kill her," John said. "Of course, if that happens, we have to install a new queen, which is a process in itself."

The Ballbachs sell their honey and beeswax products on their farm and at various farmers markets and festivals throughout Wisconsin. They feature several varieties of honey, including basswood, which has a light minty aftertaste, tradi-

tional clover and summer blend, which is a mixture of everything the bees collected over the summer.

They also have starthistle, which has a caramel taste.

"We look forward to people com-

ing to visit and see our honey farm," Lorraine said.

Information on their farm is available on their Facebook page, John and Lorraine's Hobby Honey Farm.
