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Traditional ways seen as deterrent to victimization

Panel looks at issues surrounding missing, murdered native women

KESHENA — Reversing the trend of missing and murdered indigenous women will require a fundamental shift by tribes back to traditional ways, experts said in a panel discussion held Thursday at the College of Menominee Nation.

Menikanaehkem, a Menominee-based organization, hosted the two-hour forum that examined issues that contribute to indigenous women being victimized and the crimes left unsolved. They also looked at grassroots organizing by tribes to get the issue off of state and federal back burners and how indigenous rematriation — allowing women to be on the same level socially with men — helps deter gender-based violence and for the victims of that violence to heal.

It is difficult for advocates to pinpoint the number of missing and murdered indigenous women, but it is estimated there are thousands in the United States alone. Federal statistics do not break down such cases by race and the same is true for many states, including Wisconsin.

One thing that most on the panel agreed on was that the woes experienced by Native American women both on and off the reservations dates back to European colonization.

Lori Lemieux, a member of the Bad River Tribe, said that centuries of being seen by “settlers,” the colloquial term for white people who expanded the boundaries of America, as inferior have fostered a mistrust in the criminal justice system. Many tribal people who are victimized are afraid to speak up for fear of retaliation.

Lemieux saw that mistrust first hand when she experienced a sexual

assault in the 1990s. She reported what happened, but she has never seen justice.

“I was wanting to be heard,” Lemieux said. “I had no faith in law enforcement. That is a big fear that remains still.”

Maria Haskins, a member of the Lac Courte Oreilles Band of Ojibwe, has worked with the criminal justice system and child protective services. She said she has seen many young boys and girls who have had to leave the reservations for various reasons. Many of the them experience trauma from those experiences, and some run away from home and fall prey to substance abuse, human trafficking and other issues.

“When you have the exposure to all of these elements, you’re placing yourself and the community at risk,” Haskins said.

Mary Webster, a Menominee who sits on Menikanaehkem’s women’s leadership cohort, noted that many tribes have lost their way mainly due to historic attempts to “Americanize” Native Americans through the boarding schools, where children were separated from their families and forced to abandon their language, culture and values.

Webster has 17 grandchildren, 13 of them girls, and has had a discussion with them about being cautious when out in public because Native Americans are targeted more often for crimes.

“As a community, we need to have things in place so that our people aren’t put back where they’re used to,” Webster said. “The big thing is having culture and tradition, and that starts with the teachers — parents.”

Marisa Cummings, a member of the Buffalo Tail Clan of the Sky, said that with most Native American

women, it’s not a matter of if they’ve experienced sexual violence but how many times. She said it’s important to talk about the offenders in the community, especially if they are in leadership roles, and how to rehabilitate them.

“How, as women, do we organize in a way that is a culturally-based way and a healing-based way of addressing those perpetrators,” Cummings said. “We don’t want to throw anyone away ... and we want them to heal and be productive and kind.”

Reestablishing matriarchal societies with tribes resonated with the tribes and was seen as a way to give women a voice in a society where men are in the majority in leadership.

“Matriarchy is women, ourselves, holding that duty to take care of one another and our children,” Haskins said, adding that it is important to teach indigenous values to others.

Lemieux noted that the matriarchs need to make sure children know who they are and where they come from. She sees many girls and young women who don’t have that structure.

“We are the backbone,” Lemieux said. “We are the lifegivers.”

Cummings said that matriarchy, in this day and age, requires relearning how to be a woman. In traditional tribes, women historically held a fair amount of power, but it was equal to what men held.

“It’s all about this balance — women carry the water, and men tend to the fire,” Cummings said. “We had a way of doing things where it wasn’t one being over the other.”

Kristin Welch, a Menominee tribal member who moderated the forum, pointed out that the women’s issue is more than a Menominee issue or a Wisconsin issue, and the only way

action could be taken is if people everywhere organize to force the issue from a place of silence.

"This issue isn't just in one place, so we can't just organize in one place," Welch said. "It's important to have all of those voices represented. This is global."

She added that state Assembly and Senate bills to form a task force to tackle the issue of missing and murdered indigenous women are still sitting in committees and have received no public hearing.

It was important, above all, not to give up the fight for the indigenous women who have never come home, especially if they are still alive somewhere, Lemieux said.

"I think about those women every day," she said. "Some of this fight is not just about empowering us as much as it is holding those responsible for investigating these missing people and making sure the work continues."

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Action delayed on Clintonville animal situation

CLINTONVILLE — The Clintonville Common Council took no action Dec. 10 on a plan to close the city's animal shelter after 35 people attended and spoke out against the proposal.

The item on the agenda involved a proposed contract with the Clintonville Veterinary Hospital, 300 S. Main St., for stray animal boarding services. City Administrator Sharon Eveland said she estimated a savings of \$4,500 a year by contracting with the vet clinic.

Under the proposed contract, there would be a four-day holding period for the animals, after which they would become the property of

the hospital. Should the animal be adopted, the adoption fee would belong to the hospital. The hospital would only accept animals presented by a designated official of the city.

The city would pay a daily boarding fee of \$18 per day for a dog and \$10 per day for a cat during the holding period, under the contract. If necessary, the city will also pay for the euthanasia and cremation of an unclaimed animal after the holding period. If the animal is to be euthanized, the city will be assessed for the actual daily boarding fees up to a total of seven days charge.

Should it be deemed proper to euthanize an animal prior to the holding period, the hospital would not be liable for the animal's death under the

agreement, but the city would still pay the euthanasia fee.

The current shelter is managed by Liz Sorenson, who helped to create Shawano Cares About Critters.

"This took me by surprise," Sorenson said. "I was expecting to be invited to the meeting to be honored for five years of service and instead was also told I would be out of a job."

Alderwoman Tammy Strey-Hirt took exception to the council's actions.

"It was bad to honor Liz Sorenson tonight and then tell her that she will no longer have a job," she said.

Clintonville resident Jill Meyer said she adopted a "best cat ever" from the shelter. She suggested the issue be tabled so residents could develop a friends group to support the shelter.

Eveland said entering into the contract with the vet clinic was not a last minute decision, claiming it was discussed at the public hearing for the

city budget and is included in it.

"Let's not go to dark ages," Frankowski said. "We need additional time to work this out."

Clintonville resident Laurie Vollrath said she saw many holes in the contract and suggested the council should "save \$4,500 somewhere else."

Manawa resident Karen Larson said she had been a vet technician and has 20 cats of her own.

"This is a difficult situation," Larson said. "Liz takes time out of her life when some animals don't settle down."

Alderman Jim Supanich said he had several phone calls on the subject and thought the council needed the public support. He suggested that the matter be postponed for six months to find a better solution.

Alderman Chuck Manske said he was happy the city found Clintonville Veterinary Hospital to take on the animals but thought it wise to put off a decision and get the public involved.

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NOTICE OF SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL VILLAGE OF WITTENBERG

MUNICIPAL CODE 8.05 SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL. (1) SIDEWALKS TO BE KEPT CLEAR. The owner, occupant or person in charge of each and every building or structure or unoccupied lot in the Village fronting or abutting any street shall clean, or cause to be cleaned, the sidewalk in front of or adjoining each such building or unoccupied lot of snow or ice to the width of such sidewalk and to the street surface within 24 hours after the cessation of a snowstorm. When the ice has formed on any sidewalk so that it cannot be immediately removed, the persons herein referred to shall keep the same sprinkled with salt, ashes, sawdust or sand. (2) DEPOSIT IN STREET PROHIBITED. No person shall deposit, or cause to be deposited, any snow or ice taken and removed from his premises or elsewhere upon any sidewalk, alley, parkway, public place or street in the Village. Snow shall not be piled at or near intersections so as to obstruct the view of pedestrians or operators of motor vehicles. (3) REMOVAL BY VILLAGE. The failure to remove or the deposit of any snow or ice upon any sidewalk, alley or street of the Village contrary to the provisions of this section shall be and is declared to be a nuisance and, in addition to the penalty provided for violation of this section, the Village may summarily remove any snow so deposited and cause the cost of said removal to be charged to the owner of the property from which said snow or ice has been removed. If not paid within 30 days, such charge shall be extended upon the current or next tax roll as a charge for current services, as provided in §66.0627, Wis. Stats.

Start and Stay Active *this Holiday Season*

It's that time of year again: recovering from overeating at Thanksgiving and attending holiday festivities, ranging from work parties to family gatherings. It's always a challenge to try to fit in exercise during the hustle and bustle of the holiday season, but where there is a will, there is a way. Let's start something different this year, rather than waiting until Jan. 1 to start your health resolutions. Beat the holiday blues by increasing your water intake, becoming or staying active, and enlisting a friend or family member to hold you accountable.

Rule #1: Water consumption is vital

The rule of thumb is to consume the number of ounces of water equal to one-half of your body weight. For example, if you weigh 150 pounds, you should aim to consume 75 ounces of water daily. Drinking this much water may not apply to everyone. If you have problems with retaining water like in congestive heart failure or chronic kidney disease, please speak to your doctor about the appropriate amount daily water intake.

When it comes to exercise, hydration is key to having a good workout. Our bodies can lose upwards of 10 percent of water weight when exercising. If we don't replenish the water we lose, we can become increasingly fatigued, mentally foggy, and sluggish. By staying hydrated and sustaining an active lifestyle, the benefits include weight loss, increased mood and better sleep. Consuming water can help in weight loss by suppressing hunger and thwarting off our desire to consuming high caloric foods with limited nutritional value.

Rule #2: Stay active

Staying active during an already hectic time can seem nearly impossible. This year, dust off that spin or stationary bike, treadmill and your workout video sitting on the shelf and start an

exercise plan before enjoying the delicious food options. Consider completing your workout first thing in the morning before everyone else wakes up. Beginning your day with a workout has been shown to result in increased mood and energy for the day, which is why I exercise in the mornings before helping my patients. According to health.gov, both aerobic and strengthening activities are important to good health and have the following recommended guidelines for adults:

- Aerobic activity at a moderate level, at least 2 hours and 30 minutes a week.
- Muscle strengthening, at least 2 days a week.

You can learn more about what kind and how much physical activity you need by going online to health.gov.

Examples of aerobic exercises include: running, skiing, ice skating, sledding, snow shoeing, biking, stair climbing and swimming. Another great option during the colder winter days are free videos on YouTube that include exercises for beginners. Pinterest also has many work outs available in calendar form, helping you to keep track of which type of workout to do each day.

Remember, you do not have to complete a full 30 minutes of physical activity all at once. Small 10-15 minute workouts can also be beneficial. Consider splitting up your 30-minute workout: break and take 15 minutes to complete a brisk walk, followed by 15 minutes to eat your lunch. Also, don't forget to warm up before and cool down after exercising by stretching before and after your workout. This is very important to prevent injury. If you are currently

living a sedentary lifestyle and would like to begin a workout regimen, consider visiting your healthcare provider for a physical to make sure you are able to safely exercise.

Rule #3: Stay accountable

Becoming or staying active during a busy time of year, especially when it's cold, is difficult, but not impossible. Remember, if you don't use it, you lose it! If you live in town, bundle up and go for a walk with a local friend or family member. If you don't have close-by friends to exercise with, tell your friends and family members that you'd like to stay active this time of year and make a game out of it by investing in pedometers, a wearable tracking device or downloading apps and challenging each other to see who can walk the most steps per day or week. When someone holds us accountable, we are more likely to follow through with our promises and commitments.

Whether 2019 has been your best year yet, or the year you wish to leave in your past, you cannot afford to neglect your physical health. Good physical health can prevent many health problems and conditions. At a minimum, make a commitment before 2020 comes to increase your water intake and create a regular workout plan.

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State Public TV features Aniwa auto museum Dec. 26

MADISON - Aniwa's Motorama Auto Museum is featured in an all-new episode of Wisconsin Life, 7 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 26 on Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) Wisconsin.

Local PBS stations include WPNE-TV, Channel 38, Green Bay and WHRM-TV, Channel 24, Wausau available as over-the-air broadcast or through most cable and satellite providers.

Host Angela Fitzgerald travels to the museum, 4381 Stradale Lane, Aniwa, to the museum to check out over 400 rare and unusual vehicles. She gets a tour and history lesson from curator Tom Zatloukal who shows her around his one-of-a-kind collection.

It is also the home of the SSZ Stradale, designed and manufactured in Marathon County, by Zatloukal between 1984 and 1999.

According to Wikipedia, SSZ stands for Sprint Speciale Zatloukal. Zatloukal, an Alfa Romeo racer and restorer, based his design on the Giuletta and his aim was to produce a high performance version with a

lightweight and wider body than the standard production SS. The original intent had been to produce a one-off vehicle for personal use, dubbed "The Zatlmobile," but it was so well received by Alfa aficionados, Zatloukal started manufacturing the cars.

The museum's Facebook page bills itself as Wisconsin's largest auto museum. The 501(c)(3) non-profit, charitable organization says it uses 100% of donations to advance "our mission to educate current and future generations by preserving and displaying 20th century automobiles for their historical value, unique engineering and aesthetics."

The museum, including the Alfa Heaven collection of over 60 vintage Alfa Romeos, the largest in North America, is housed in multiple buildings and covers nearly 20 acres. It's now closed, reopening in May and staying open through October. The museum's email is cosmo@alfaheaven.com.

Decorative sign business grows out of house painting

Kelly Lettau sells her signs at craft shows

WITTENBERG — In 2010, a friend asked Kelly Lettau to paint her home.

The stay-at-home mom was looking to create a stream of income, so she agreed and rolled out her business, That's How We Roll.

The painting business has become so popular that Lettau now books her jobs two to three months out, she said. As part of her services, she does a walk-through of the property before sending the customer a quote and then meeting in person to discuss color options.

"Most people have an idea of what color they want," Lettau said, "but it's also my job to help them if I think that color might not work."

It doesn't happen often, but she admits that sometimes people are

set on a certain color they later find doesn't work or is hard to live with and needs to be repainted.

Her husband, Rick, has a full-time milk and grain trucking business. Five years ago, he started helping his wife with the larger projects to help them go faster. Each year, they go to Parade of Homes to stay up on top of color trends.

To fill lag time between painting jobs, Lettau decided in 2016 that she wanted to do some sort of work from home. She'd noticed a developing trend in home decorating with signage and found some ideas on the internet. With her personal computer and a Cricut machine, she was able to print off scenes and sayings to stencil onto boards. This was something she could do in a spare bedroom and close the door when she wasn't working on a project.

"People come to me all the time with original, creative thoughts," she said. "I can enter it into my computer program and add special fonts or graphics to make it a one-of-a-kind piece."

Recently, Lettau started adding

frames to the signs. She cuts and stains them in the garage and then attaches them to the signs in her workroom. Some of the signs are for shelf or tabletop decoration, but the ones to be hung on a wall are outfitted with hooks for easier hanging.

Lettau generally does two craft shows each year. This was the third year she took part in the Honey Hunter's craft fair Nov. 30, which found a new location at the Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School this year. She had reserved two booths, but when some vendors had to back out due to the weather, event coordinator Stephanie Anderson offered her an extra booth for free. Lettau had enough inventory to fill all three booths; by the end of the day, she had very little left to bring back home.

Her next event will be the winter craft show at the Birnamwood gymnasium, which is held in February or March. Lettau likes to do craft shows close to home as it helps support local crafters. She admits she would be happy to do more shows, but she just doesn't have the space to store the inventory.

Karen Schairer, owner of Autumn Acres a farm and corn maze venue in Birnamwood, is Lettau's sister-in-law. This fall, Schairer offered a private "Sips and Succulents" event in the barn on Thursday nights, which combined wine sampling with creating a pumpkin-based centerpiece with succulents. She asked Lettau for some help to make the barn look cozy for the event by displaying some of her signs. The signs were so popular that Lettau brought in more to sell on the weekends when Autumn Acres was open to the public.

According to Lettau, her most popular signs include fall or Christmas themes. She can also work with Bible verses or popular quotes. Personalized wedding pieces can be created with at least a two week notice. She stays away from using any trademarked graphics or sayings.

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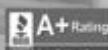
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Fire risks abound during holiday season

Holiday decorations offer a festive look to the season, but they can also pose a fire hazard. As you decorate this December, ReadyWisconsin encourages you to keep fire safety in mind.

"There are many potential fire hazards to consider," said Dr. Darrell Williams, Wisconsin Emergency Management administrator. "Be aware of those risks while getting ready for the season, while also considering what to do in the event a fire does start."

Christmas trees are a common source of fires in the home during the holiday season. According to the National Fire Protection Association, there were an average of 160 home fires nationwide each year between 2013-17. Of those, 44% of tree fires were the result of issues with electric distribution or lights, while a quarter were the result of a candle or some other heating source being too close to a tree.

It can take only seconds for a tree fire grow into a large blaze. Live trees should be kept at least three feet away from heat sources, such as a fireplace or heater. Heat will dry out a real tree, causing it to more

easily ignite when exposed to heat, flame or sparks. Live trees should be watered every day.

Inspect holiday lights each year and replace strands that have worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Follow manufacturer's instructions for limits on the number of light strands that can be connected. Remember some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.

Never link more than three light strands together, unless the directions indicate it is safe to do so. Make sure to periodically check the lights. If the wires are warm to the touch, unplug and remove them. Be sure to turn off all lights on trees and other decorations when going to bed or leaving the house, and unplug extension cords when they are not in use.

Most home fires caused by candles occur on Christmas Eve, Christmas or New Year's Day. Never leave a burning candle unattended, and make sure they are kept at least 12 inches away from flammable materials. Never place candles where children or pets could accidentally knock them over. Instead of lighting real candles, consider using battery-operated flameless candles.

Reservation timber thieves sentenced

GREEN BAY — Five area men have been sentenced in federal court for conspiring to steal timber from the Menominee Indian Reservation valued in excess of \$400,000.

The men logged timber for Menominee Tribal Enterprises (MTE) in designated areas on the reservation. But, on at least 100 occasions, the defendants and others used forestry equipment to cut down extra trees beyond what MTE authorized and sold them at sawmills, according to a statement by the U.S. Attorney's office.

Those sentenced on Tuesday were:

Dugan R. Webster, 42, Shawano, 20 months, \$219,100 restitution, Arthur P. Fish, 49, Keshena, 18 months, \$408,248 restitution, Chauncey J. Webster, Jr., 49, Neopit, a year and a day, \$178,322 restitution, Derrin B. Webster, 21, Neopit, seven months, \$178,322 restitution, and Melvin T. Caldwell, Jr., 44, Neopit, three months, \$99,000

restitution. All men were also placed on three years' supervised release.

Chauncey Webster, Jr., was a logging contractor for MTE. His crew included Derrin Webster and Arthur Fish. Chauncey and Derrin Webster cut the trees. Fish, who had the only Commercial Driver's License among the conspirators, transported the timber to mills outside the reservation for profit, according to a sentencing memo Assistant U.S. Assistant Attorney Andrew filed with the court.

The checks Dugan Webster received from the mills were deposited in his personal bank account and distributed to the other defendants.

In September 2018 interview with an FBI agent, Chauncey Webster said he and the other defendants were working an area of blown-down trees near Camp 24 on the reservation. Maple, beech and other veneer-quality logs were taken to mills in Goodman and, after a fire there, to a mill in Mattoon.

Logs were also illegally removed during pulp wood and hardwood

seasons, according to court documents.

The defendants used spray paint to make it appear that they were working with trees that the MTE had designated for harvest.

Chauncey Webster told the agent that he spent some of the money he obtained from the illegal timber sales gambling and traveling to Las Vegas.

The FBI agent said that some of the best wood in the nation comes from the Menominee reservation and the amount that the conspiracy had taken to the mills was worth close to a half-million dollars.

The five defendants all pleaded guilty in July to timber theft.

In sentencing the defendants,

District Judge William Griesbach noted the seriousness of the crimes the defendants committed and the amount of loss to the tribe.

Griesbach also factored in the "terrible damage to the community caused by the defendants," necessitating a sentence that reflected the "impact on the community, along with the breach of trust the defendants each had with the tribe."

Griesbach also emphasized the strong cultural ties between the Menominee people and the forest, which they have protected and relied upon for centuries. The sentences were a necessary deterrent to those who might consider similar actions, undertaken out of greed, he said.

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One driver dead in early morning crash

Accident occurred in Waupaca County

TOWN OF DAYTON — One person was killed in a two-vehicle accident Monday morning in Waupaca County. The name of the deceased, the driver, has not yet been released, according to a press release from the Waupaca County Sheriff's Department.

The sheriff's department said the crash occurred south of the intersection of state Highway 22 and county Road QQ in the Town of Dayton in Waupaca County.

The department's initial investigation showed that a box truck traveling south, driven by a 58-year-old man, crossed the center line into the path

of a northbound semi truck, driven by an 80-year-old man. The semi driver was not injured but the Waupaca County Medical Examiner's Office pronounced the other driver dead at the scene, according to the release completed by sheriff's sergeant Kevin Studzinski.

The sheriff's office credited the assistance of the Wisconsin State Patrol, Waupaca Area Fire Department, Gold Cross Ambulance Service and the examiner's office.

The state patrol will continue to assist the sheriff's department in accident reconstruction.

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Green Bay 'innovation center' sidelined

MADISON - Not long after Foxconn Technology Group announced plans to build a manufacturing facility in southeast Wisconsin, the tech giant began making promises to share its model for economic development across the entire state.

But 18 months after purchasing its first building in downtown Milwaukee, there is little evidence that what Foxconn calls its innovation centers are moving forward.

Innovation centers were also announced for Green Bay, Eau Claire, Racine and Madison. Development directors in those cities say Foxconn now appears to be focused on its main manufacturing campus in Mount Pleasant.

Foxconn has said each innovation centers could employ between 100 to 200 people working in high-skilled jobs.

These jobs are eligible for state tax credits, which are administered by the Wisconsin Economic Development Corp. (WEDC).

Wisconsin Department of Economic Development (WDED) spokesman David Callender referred

all questions to Foxconn but added, "WEDC receives a report from Foxconn on Dec. 31 each year which WEDC uses to determine whether the company qualifies for the jobs credits," Callender said. "We do not monitor the project more frequently than that."

The story is similar in Green Bay, where Foxconn has been planning an innovation center along the Fox River since June 2018.

Kevin Vonck, Green Bay's development director, said early on Foxconn was meeting with contractors but plans have been paused. The company is now planning to start interior construction in 2020, Vonck said.

"I think they are re-evaluating their strategy throughout the state and their focus is on southeastern Wisconsin," Vonck said. "They are also seeing how this location correlates with each of the innovation centers throughout the state."

When the Green Bay project was originally announced, Foxconn said it would open by late 2018. Vonck said he would like for it to move faster, but understands development of any kind has fits and starts.

Buying from Shawano County's last cheese factory a destination 'experience'

Kust family provides Colby-style cheeses

TOWN OF PELLA — A variety of Colby-style cheeses from Oak Grove Cheese Factory, the last one still operating in Shawano County, is available to the public — but it takes a little persistence.

The business, W10198 Oak Grove Road, Clintonville, is about 13 miles southwest of Shawano and about 26 miles southeast of Wittenberg at the corner of County Road D and Oak Grove Road. Customers need to look for the door marked “Entrance,” go in, take two red metal steps to the left and go into the factory.

Although the oakgrovedairy.com website lists store hours from 6 a.m. to noon, “It’s pretty casual. Come in and get someone’s attention. We like to think of it more as an experience,” Jordan Kust said.

That approach to retail business may be more understandable given their work day typically starts around midnight.

Jordan is one of two sons of current owners, Terry and Theresa Kust. Along with son Jared and brother Dave, the Kusts have guided the factory since 2000 when they took over from grandfather and father Bernard Kust. The elder Kust purchased the factory in 1972 from the Lemke family.

On the other hand, the Kusts said, if a customer sees a vehicle in the parking lot, someone is usually available to sell cheese.

People may be surprised that the curds at the factory aren’t the same as others sold in the area. They’re smaller and come from a different process.

“They’re still squeaky but they’re not the same as other curds,” Dave said.

The Kusts usually wrap their cheese with plastic deli wrap. Theresa said they can vacuum seal cheese for shipping but need a few days’ notice to

get that done.

Because the business is about 99 percent oriented to wholesale buyers with private labeling, the retail

business remains a sideline and a goal, according to the family. But they’re always willing to take a break from their factory chores to cut cheese to a

customer’s order.

“We try to take care of our customers. There aren’t too many people that own the factory are actually

making the cheese,” Jordan said. “It’s something I always wanted to do and I didn’t want to see the factory go to someone else.”

“We build those relationships and keep them,” Dave added, referring to the wholesale business.

“Consistency is the real challenge in getting the cheese to taste the same as it did six months ago,” Dave said.

Their factory is set up at this point to make only cheese in the “longhorn” style. Jordan said they’re not willing to try other styles of cheese, but want to grow their existing business. The focus has been on upgrading equipment and gaining manufacturing efficiencies.

Dave added they’ve found a profitable niche and trying other styles of cheese would mean “butting heads with bigger producers. We’re wired to catering to the smaller customers.”

Dave said cheese with the Oak

Grove label is a growing part of the business. That’s important to the business as distributors come and go, he added.

Dave said the factory first started in

1920 when a small group of area farmers formed a cooperative. That makes the business 100 years old in 2020, prompting Theresa to say, “We’ll have to throw a party.”

Theresa said the factory buys milk from 19 local dairies in roughly a 50-mile radius. Dave said they can’t afford to haul milk much further than that. The Kusts rely on their own three-truck fleet to pick up the milk.

Because the business is built on what Dave called “following the orders,” they occasionally buy additional milk from a broker.

In addition to their three truck drivers, the Kusts employ three people for packaging and two in production.

Making cheese was learned “just by being around it as a child,” Dave said. The younger Kust brothers nodded in agreement with Jordan saying they’ve been around the plant since they were small. Terry said he’d been in the factory since he was nine years old and it’s the only job he’s ever held.

Dave and Terry are licensed as cheesemakers from the State of Wisconsin. Dave said the state is one of the few in the nation that require licensing. That’s a goal for Jared and Jordan if the business can ever spare them long enough to go to the one-week course at UW-Madison or UW-River Falls, Theresa said.

Everyone is family at Salscheider's Bar

Oconto Falls bar is a community hub on Christmas Eve

OCONTO FALLS — You're a sweet one, Mr. Grinch.

There is not a single element of meanness in the Grinch cocktails, packages of prizes, small gifts and general air of merriment on Christmas Eve at Salscheider's Antique Bar and Liquor, 126 N. Main St., Oconto Falls.

In fact, to hear patrons talk about it, the family tradition that goes back 42 years is all about heart, sharing and family.

Salscheider's opens at 9 a.m. on Christmas Eve. Between that time at its 6 p.m. closing, Barb Salscheider and her family keep a steady stream of drawings, drinks and celebration going for hundreds of patrons.

"It's so packed you can't even imagine," said Al, a customer who declined to share his last name, but said he makes it a point to visit on Christmas Eve. Al, a friend and their sons make it a regular tradition.

The basket drawings start early and go on throughout the day, Salscheider said. "We've got a Bloody Mary basket, a Moscow Mule basket, stocking stuffers, salmon, herring, cases of beer," she explained. "They love to win—everybody loves to win," she said.

The baskets are only part of the draw, though, she said, "There's the camaraderie of being with people they know." There are also small gifts for everyone who comes in, and specialty drinks, like the candy-cane decorated "Grinch" cocktails.

The tradition started early in the

Salscheiders operation of the bar. Barb and her late husband, John, bought the bar 44 years ago. For unexplained reasons, 42 years ago Jon Meyer, one of their bartenders, started raffling things and "it just took off," she explained.

"He's a good salesman. He could sell you shoes with holes in them," she said. Meyer's charismatic nature and the family atmosphere in the bar combined for a lasting tradition, she said.

All of the Salscheider children — Bret, Stephanie, Johnners and Joey — come home to work on Christmas Eve, she said. Two work behind the bar, one works at the liquor store check-out and one helps with carryouts and restocking.

The staff has the day off.

She said the bar took a lot of hours to manage, and still does. She made the decision to keep the bar when her husband passed away and said her staff is key to keeping it open. In an era when

recruiting staff can be difficult, she said she doesn't have problems keeping staff behind the bar.

"It's, 'you pay them good and treat them good' and they'll stay forever," she said.

There are people who are alone at the holidays, she said, but not at Salscheider's.

Families come in to have some drinks and snacks, shake dice, and see their friends and neighbors. Workers from a local senior center may stop in after they serve a Christmas dinner for some elderly people with no other place to go, she said.

"It's a gathering place. Everybody comes uptown. It's just the thing to do," Salscheider said. "They treat me like I'm their mother."

When the Salscheider's bought the bar, they were only the fifth owners in its 100-year history. In that time it has gone from bar to ice cream parlor

during Prohibition in the 1930s back to a bar. Its former owner had antiques on display when they purchased it and they decided to keep the name, she said.

"We kept the same name — we figured we'll be antiques when we get out of here," she laughed.

The Salscheider family home is next door to the bar, and family life has revolved around the two buildings since they bought it, she said.

"We couldn't take a vacation, or tell our kids, 'Let's go to a movie or let's go shopping' — that never happened," she said.

Instead, she said, everybody in the community became family. And that's why they feel welcome on Christmas Eve.

"We just want to make a Merry Christmas. They are all in a good mood. If they aren't, we put them in a good mood," she said.

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Baldwin pushing for more CVSO funding

If passed, \$50M annually available for grants

WASHINGTON — U.S. Sen. Tammy Baldwin, D-Wis., has introduced bipartisan legislation with Sens. Dan Sullivan, Jon Tester and Steve Daines to expand community-based outreach that will help veterans access services to improve their health and wellness and prevent suicides.

The number of veteran suicides nationwide continues to rise, and approximately 14 of the 20 veterans who die by suicide each day are not receiving care from the Veterans Health Administration.

County Veteran Service Officers, or CVSOs, are often the first point of contact in the community for veterans and are on the front lines in this battle against veteran suicides by helping enroll veterans into the VA Health Administration.

The Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach Act will increase resources for CVSOs that will better connect more veterans to the services they need.

The act authorizes \$50 million

annually for five years to expand and support CVSOs or similar local entities, who currently assist veterans in obtaining critical benefits and services.

The VA will award competitive grants to CVSOs, through the states, to create, expand or support programs that promote health and wellness, prevent suicide and reach veterans who need help navigating the often-burdensome VA process.

By increasing the number of CVSOs, states will be able to better leverage their local and federal resources to serve our veterans.

"In 2017 alone, more than 6,100 veterans died by suicide — an amount nearly equal to the number of service members killed in action in Iraq and Afghanistan since 2001.

The veteran suicide rate has stayed relatively constant for the past 10 years, and we need to do something about it," Baldwin said. "County veteran service officers are on the front lines everyday working

to combat this tragic crisis, and this bipartisan legislation will support their efforts to provide needed services and solutions for our veterans that will improve their health and well-being."

Veterans are not always aware of the benefits available to them, and CVSOs are often the first to inform them of their eligibility.

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CVSOs are local county employees who are nationally accredited by the Department of Veterans Affairs to help veterans process their VA claims.

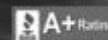

Packers escape with tight win over Bears

Green Bay locks up playoff spot

GREEN BAY — The Green Bay Packers built a comfortable lead before avoiding a late disaster in a 21-13 victory over the Chicago Bears on Sunday at Lambeau Field.

With the Packers' 11th win and a loss by the Los Angeles Rams, Green Bay guaranteed itself a spot in the playoffs.

For a second straight week, the Packers earned their win in a less-than-impressive fashion. Green Bay led the entire game, but couldn't put Chicago away, having to stop a lateral play near the goal line as time expired to seal the win.

"It wasn't always pretty. There were moments of really good football, I think really in all three phases, but a little too inconsistent," said rookie coach Matt LaFleur. "But it still was enough to get the job done, and that's the goal — to go 1-0 each week. Our guys have found a way now to do that 11 times."

Green Bay's defense set the tone early, forcing punts on the first two Chicago drives. On the second punt, the Bears were called for kick catch interference, setting the Packers up at the Chicago 35-yard line.

After picking up just six yards on the next three plays, Green Bay decided to go for it on fourth down. Quarterback Aaron Rodgers changed the play at the line of scrimmage based on the defensive alignment and found receiver Davante Adams over the top for a 29-yard touchdown pass.

Adams was heavily involved in the Packers' game plan, garnering 13 targets. He ended up catching seven passes for 103 yards.

After the touchdown drive, Green Bay's offense went dormant until halftime. The Packers' defense made the touchdown hold up though, surrendering just three points on a 30-yard Eddy Pineiro field goal near the end of the half.

Coming out of halftime, Green Bay's offense found new life, putting

together back-to-back scoring drives to create some separation.

Both drives lasted five plays, covering 73 yards on the first drive and 66 on the second.

Adams caught a 34-yard pass to get the first drive moving before Rodgers scrambled for 17 yards. Running back Aaron Jones ended the quick drive with a 21-yard rushing touchdown.

On a third-down play on the second drive of the half, Rodgers hit receiver Jake Kumerow up the right sideline, and the UW-Whitewater graduate stayed inbounds and broke multiple tackles on his way to a 49-yard gain. Jones also capped off that scoring drive, powering in from two yards out.

Instead of being able to ease to a win up three scores, Green Bay's offense went silent the rest of the game. The Packers only picked up one first down over their final five drives, which allowed Chicago to creep back into the game.

The Bears got a 27-yard field goal from Pineiro to open the fourth quarter before putting together a 13-play,

67-yard drive on their next series to make it a one-score game.

While the Packers' offense couldn't finish off the game, the defense picked up the slack.

Defensive lineman Dean Lowry picked off Mitchell Trubisky to end one drive. The Bears crossed midfield on the next drive before the Packers forced four straight incompletions to get the ball back.

Chicago got the ball back at its own 22 with just 36 seconds left, making a scoring drive seem highly unlikely, but the Bears hit on passes of 13, 22 and 9 yards to get to the Packers' 34 with nine seconds to play.

The Bears' next play was an incomplete pass from Trubisky into the end zone, although the ball was nearly caught for a touchdown off a deflection.

On the last play of the game, Trubisky hit running back Tarik Cohen on a short pass before the Bears lateraled the ball multiple times. Finally, the Packers were able to get to the ball carrier, forcing a fumble that was recovered by Pack-

ers cornerback Tramon Williams at the 2-yard line.

Looking back at the replay, had the ball been lateraled one more time to receiver Allen Robinson, the Bears likely would have scored and then had a shot at a two-point conversion to tie the game.

For a second straight week, the Packers didn't apologize for winning in lackluster fashion.

"We don't care how it happens, as long as at the end of the game it says a W in the win column," said Jones, who finished with 51 rushing yards. "We'll get it together, but however it has to come, we'll take it."

Rodgers completed just 16-of-33 passes for 203 yards in the game. Tyler Ervin sparked the Packers' return game for a second straight week, recording a 12-yard punt return and 45-yard kickoff return.

Green Bay will now prepare for a showdown with the Minnesota Vikings next Monday. The Packers would win the NFC North with a victory.

A: I want to become a journeyman electrician, have a family, land and a great house.

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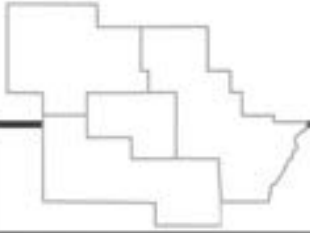

Annual Cow College features forage, feeding strategies

By LEADER STAFF

CLINTONVILLE — Registration is open for the 58th annual Cow College, presented by the UW-Extension and held at the Fox Valley Technical College regional center, 525 S. Main St., Clintonville.

Cow College is an annual educational program to connect dairy farmers and industry representatives with resources from the UW System. It will be held the first three Tuesdays in January.

The first two sessions will take place at FVTC. The final program includes a farm tour.

The first session, 1-3 p.m. Jan. 7, will feature Dr. Matt Akins, a UW-Madison Extension dairy nutrition specialist.

Akins will talk about how to use alternative forages, such as small grains, sorghum and Sudan grass, to replace alfalfa as a primary feed source.

Clintonville native Dr. Zach Sawall, a Vita Plus dairy nutrition specialist, will also talk about how to maximize milk components using dairy nutrition and feeding strate-

gies to boost profitability.

On Jan. 14, Dr. Paul Fricke, a dairy reproductive specialist with the UW-Madison Extension, will discuss his research on ways to get high-producing cows bred back on time.

Jim Livingston, Diamond-V dairy team regional manager, and Kimberly Schmidt, UW-Madison Extension agricultural educator for Shawano County, will also review how on-farm real-time TMR mixer evaluations along with monitoring dairy cow feeding behaviors can improve production while saving money.

That day's session will also run 1-3 p.m.

The final session will run from 10:15 a.m. to 2 p.m. Jan. 21 and will include a tour of Fietzers Dairy Farm, E8276 County Highway N, Manawa, followed by a tour of Clinton Farms, E8351 State Hwy 22, Bear Creek.

Fietzers features a 2016 Lely robotic milking system in a six-row natural ventilated barn with 360 cows.

Clinton Farms features a 50-cow Waikato rotary parlor with holding area for 250 cows and a six-row tunnel ventilated barn.

GreenStone Farm Credit Service will sponsor a lunch at FVTC center. Robert Netrefa from GreenStone will discuss opportunities for using Dairy Revenue Protection Insurance to help protect improved

milk prices.

The cost is \$5 per session or \$10 for all three sessions. Advance registration is required by contacting Schmidt at 715-526-6136 or kimberly.schmidt@wisc.edu.
