Wittenberg-Birnamwood school board goes paperless

WITTENBERG — In an effort to save money and curb waste, members of the board of education for the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District are reading documents and reviewing reports on Chromebooks. The laptops, given to school board members this fall, are Chromebooks that were previously used by students.

According to Superintendent Garrett Rogowski, going paperless will save the board money, as copying and printing costs were a big expense. The annual budget alone can be 100 pages or more, Rogowski said, and each of the nine board members needs a copy of that and many other reports during the year.

Students typically use the Chromebooks for four to five years before wear and tear plus software upgrades require that they be replaced, Rogowski said. Normally, the outdated laptops get recycled out of the district or sold at a minimal cost to graduating students, he added. This batch has gone to school board members.

“We knew the old Chromebooks were functional, and we don’t need them to do anything other than send documents and announce meetings,” said Rogowski.

Joani Miller provides the tech support for the district, and she has worked to educate the board members on how best to use the Chromebooks.

“It’s a bit of a learning curve, and help is available if we ask for it,” said board member Kristy Meredith. “It’s different from my computer at home and the one I use at work, so I’m learning some of the finer points of navigating through the documents.”

Rogowski noted that copy paper, ink and wear and tear on the district’s copy machine are all expenses that the district will save, in addition to the work hours saved by no longer printing and coordinating report packets for the nine board members. He hopes to put together an analysis of the cost savings of going paperless over time.

NOTICE OF SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL VILLAGE OF WITTENBERG

MUNICIPAL CODE 8.05 SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL. (1) SIDEWALKS TO BE KEPT CLEAR. The owner, occupant or person in charge of each and every building or structure or unoccupied lot in the Village fronting or abutting any street shall clean, or cause to be cleaned, the sidewalk in front of or adjoining each such building or unoccupied lot of snow or ice to the width of such sidewalk and to the street surface within 24 hours after the cessation of a snowstorm. When the ice has formed on any sidewalk so that it cannot be immediately removed, the persons herein referred to shall keep the same sprinkled with salt, ashes, sawdust or sand. (2) DEPOSIT IN STREET PROHIBITED. No person shall deposit, or cause to be deposited, any snow or ice taken and removed from his premises or elsewhere upon any sidewalk, alley, parkway, public place or street in the Village. Snow shall not be piled at or near intersections so as to obstruct the view of pedestrians or operators of motor vehicles. (3) REMOVAL BY VILLAGE. The failure to remove or the deposit of any snow or ice upon any sidewalk, alley or street of the Village contrary to the provisions of this section shall be and is declared to be a nuisance and, in addition to the penalty provided for violation of this section, the Village may summarily remove any snow so deposited and cause the cost of said removal to be charged to the owner of the property from which said snow or ice has been removed. If not paid within 30 days, such charge shall be extended upon the current or next tax roll as a charge for current services, as provided in §66.0627, Wis. Stats.

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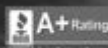

the case, and Allison immediately sees a lot of her son, Dan, in the young officer. Together they look into a probable stalker hanging around the farm. While walking the property, Allison discovers that the once-pristine Cider Creek is stained and probably contaminated.

When Andy stops at an abandoned paper mill, he is captured. Soon the "dumpers" have Allison in their clutches, too. It takes a miraculous rescue from an unexpected individual to get them to safety.

But just when it looks like they have the culprit figured out, the plot takes a wild twist. As the killer closes in, Allison will need not only her wits, but also a lot of luck on her side.

We all know that friends aren't always friends and those we sometimes fear are harmless, but a good author can make you wonder right up to the last chapter. Your public library has dozens of books that will keep you guessing. This would be a good week to drop by and check it out.
