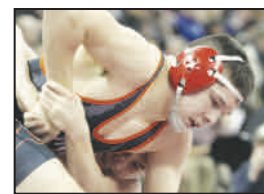

Mother Nature, fundraisers, resignations make up Top 10 stories

OCONTO FALLS — As we take down the 2019 calendar and hang the new 2020 calendar on the wall, we look back on a year when Mother Nature did her best to beat down Oconto County but persistence and a sense of humor got things done, when leadership changed suddenly, and when justice proved to be something that can happen quickly or over a matter of decades.

Here are the Times Herald's picks for the Top 10 news stories of the year just ended.

1. A forest leveled

Oconto County Sheriff Todd Skar-

ban said the damage from a July 19 windstorm in the northern part of the county was the worst he's ever seen, including the 2007 tornado that struck the Mountain area.

The storm that struck between 8 and 9 p.m. that night introduced the word "macroburst" to most county residents. Not one of the tornadoes that struck across the state that night, the macroburst — "an outward burst of strong winds at or near the surface with horizontal dimensions larger than 2.5 miles and occurs when a strong downdraft reaches the surface," Google says — leveled thousands of trees and left more than 40,000 residents and businesses without power, some for as many as eight days.

At a special Aug. 1 meeting the County Board voted to award \$10,000 grants and \$50,000 interest-free loans to the towns of Breed, Bagley, Brazeau, Doty, Lakewood, Mountain, Riverview and Townsend, which were hardest hit. They'll have until Aug. 1, 2022, to pay back the loans to the county's General Fund.

Gov. Tony Evers requested a federal disaster declaration for Oconto and 17 other Wisconsin counties and two tribes for damage sustained from severe storms, tornadoes, and flooding in July.

Since approved, the declaration provides federal disaster assistance to help local governments and electric cooperatives recover some of their costs from responding to the storms,

protecting citizens, removing debris, and repairing roads and other infrastructure.

ATV trails and the Mountain Lookout Tower were closed for five weeks as federal, state and local crews worked with volunteers to clear downed trees from the massive storm. More than 125 members of Team Rubicon – a coalition of military veterans, first responders and others who send volunteers into disaster areas to help with cleanup – arrived Sept. 28 and worked non-stop through Oct. 12 in the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest as part of the effort coordinated by the U.S. Forest Service and the Oconto and Langlade County Forestry Departments.

“We kept hearing from our Facebook page and phone calls, ‘Gee whiz, why don’t you have it open yet, it’s been a couple weeks, etc.’” Red Arrow Snowmobile and ATV Club President Gary Wagner told Evers when the governor visited during the Team Rubicon campaign. “But now these same people are commenting after they get an opportunity to get up here and go for a ride in the back country and the woods and they’re saying ‘Oh my God, I guess I do understand now.’ You have to get out in the woods to see the devastation.”

2. High water and rising

As the northwest portion of Oconto County began what are expected to be years of recovery, attention turned to the southeast portion of the county along the bay of Green Bay, where the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers predicted that problems caused by record-high water levels are going to get worse before they get better.

“I hope we don’t we don’t have ice shoves, I hope we don’t have flooding in spring, but the way it’s looking, and the projections of the Great Lakes, I don’t think that’s the case,” Emergency Management Director Tim Magnin told the County Board in October, a week after high winds brought water coursing over the lake shore, closing Bay Shore Road near Oconto’s Breakwater Park and other shoreline roads.

“There were people who had to leave their residence because of the water,” said Supervisor Rose Stellmacher, who lives on County Road Y in the town of Little River.

At an informational meeting in early November, Lauren Fry of the corps said all of the Great Lakes except Michigan-Huron set records this summer, with levels even higher than the previous records set in the mid-1980s, and record highs can be expected over the next six months for Lake Michigan-Huron, which is actually considered one lake and is about

11 inches higher than in January 2019.

“The past five years were the wettest five years of the last 120 years of record-keeping in the Great Lakes region,” Fry said.

The troubles continued Nov. 27 when strong northeasterly winds pushed water over the shore, again closing Bay Shore Road and part of County Road Y and also washing out the road to the Splinter Causeway at Breakwater Park. The first major snowstorm of the season Dec. 1 knocked out 10,000 electric customers and made the high water problems worse for a time.

“We’ve seen flooding, we’ve seen unprecedented erosion, and going into ice season we don’t have some great warm and fuzzies about what we’re going to be seeing in the next coming months,” said Krystle Walker, a public information officer with the Corps.

3. Honoring local heroes

Fulfilling a vision that the late Marie Magnin first voiced eight years ago, a new Oconto Falls Area Veterans Monument was dedicated Nov. 9 during an hourlong ceremony at the high school and a short program at the monument next to the school district offices.

“This was a community partnership effort,” organizer Bob Maloney said. “The project was and is a partnership between our community, local veterans, the American Legion Post 302, the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 302, and the Oconto Falls School District. Working together, we accomplished our goals on building that Marie Magnin started.”

Her original vision was for a monument in the same Center Avenue

block as the city’s longtime veterans memorial, but the fundraising effort stalled for several years, and Magnin eventually endorsed the plan to build the monument near Woodlawn Cemetery on a parcel of land just south of the Oconto Falls School District offices.

Sadly, she did not live to see the project finished; she died April 24, three weeks before the final agreement to use the school district property was approved.

“Marie knew we had her back in getting the monument built, and I’m sure she would have liked to thank you for the School Board’s support,” Maloney told the board at its May 13 meeting.

4. Gillett mayor removed

James Beaton’s life was upended in early September when his business partner sold Legacy Funeral Chapels in downtown Gillett and the apartment upstairs where Beaton lived while working as funeral director.

He had waged a successful write-in campaign in April 2018 to become mayor of Gillett, a term marked by an often contentious relationship with the City Council.

On Sept. 30, Beaton received a letter, signed by all six aldermen, citing the state law that says that failure to maintain residency results in the office being vacated.

“As a community, we would like to ask you if you would resign from your office,” the letter stated. “Failure to resign would result in a due process hearing.”

During a closed-door meeting three days later, Beaton agreed to resign in exchange for a lump-sum payment of the \$2,762.50 he would

have earned had he served the last six months of his term. The public was not informed about the controversy until after the mayor was gone.

“They don’t want me there,” Beaton said regarding the six aldermen. “I could have dug my heels in, but how would that help anybody?”

He also questioned the genesis of the letter.

“I haven’t been able to get an answer to the question: When did they have a meeting to decide this? There were no notices of a special meeting or anything like that.”

City Attorney Kate Sloma said she did not write the letter. Questions about how the council arrived at its decision to ask Beaton to resign, who wrote the letter, and how it was signed without a public meeting were referred to acting Mayor Josh McCarthy, who never returned the Times Herald’s phone calls.

5. A new clerk of courts

Mike Hodkiewicz, who served as Oconto County clerk of circuit courts for nearly 29 years, submitted his resignation July 10 to Judge Michael T. Judge and Jay N. Conley, effective Aug. 2.

He had been re-elected in November 2018 to another four-year term in the office he has held since 1990.

“When I ran for re-election for the last time, it was not my intention to give up the best job I ever had with more than three years remaining on my term as clerk of Circuit Courts of Oconto County,” he said in a letter addressed to the County Board.

Without going into detail with the board, Hodkiewicz alluded to friction with the judges and their staff that had been ongoing for about four years. In his resignation letter to Judge and Conley, he took a somewhat sharper tone.

“You will have the opportunity to appoint a much better clerk of courts until the time of the next election by the people of Oconto County,” Hodkiewicz wrote. “The last almost four years have been extremely difficult in dealing with the situation, problems and tensions surrounding your judicial assistant. You clearly have made a clear choice, a choice I wish you the best with in the future.”

Trisha L. LeFebvre, who worked for Hodkiewicz for 25 years including 18 months as deputy clerk of courts, was appointed to fill the remainder of his term.

6. Oconto Falls Dog Park opens

Girl Scout Emily Gonnering of the Oconto Falls High School Class of 2019 raised \$25,000 in 15 months to build the new dog park along North

Maple Avenue, which will be open from 7 a.m. to dusk between April 1 and Nov. 1.

City Administrator Vicki Roberts said there was a run on City Hall to buy dog licenses shortly before the Aug. 17 grand opening, once word got out that only licensed dogs would be able to use the park.

7. An arrest in a 1976 double murder

The man police believe murdered a Green Bay couple at a Marinette County campground in 1976 lived quietly in the area for nearly 43 years, settling with his late wife in Lakewood 17 years ago.

Marinette and Oconto county sheriff's deputies arrested Raymond L. Vannieuwenhoven, 82, in early March after authorities said technology unavailable in the 1970s matched him to DNA found on the body of Ellen Matheys, who was murdered with her fiancée, David Schuldes, in a Marinette County campground.

8. Prison sentences for a fatal crash

Cory Folts, 22, of Oconto Falls died instantly Sept. 29, 2018, when a pickup truck crossed the median on U.S. Highway 41-141 and crashed head-on into Folts' car as the driver

and her passenger fought over the steering wheel.

In plea agreements, Kelly Crispin

of St. Paul, Minnesota, and Eric Solomon of Plymouth, Wyoming, pleaded no contest to homicide by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle and second-degree reckless homicide, respectively. As Folts' family and friends looked on in separate court hearings, Solomon was sentenced to 10 years in prison and Crispin to 7½ years, followed by equal amounts of time on extended supervision.

9. Cities celebrate birthdays

The county's three cities during 2019 all passed significant anniversaries since receiving their charters.

Gillett held a jubilee celebration in October to mark the 75th year

since it transformed from a village into a city in 1944.

Oconto Falls introduced a commemorative coin to celebrate 100 years since the city was chartered in 1919.

Oconto commissioned a new batch of its namesake beer among other observances of its 150th anniversary.

10. Tooth fairy note goes viral

Gillett Elementary School Principal Curt Angeli's characteristic whimsy kicked in Oct. 9 when a first-grader lost a loose tooth and, with it, a chance to earn some cash from the Tooth Fairy.

Angeli quickly dashed off a letter explaining what happened and asking the fairy to "Please accept this letter as official verification of a lost tooth and provide the standard monetary exchange rate you normally use for a real tooth."

Charmed staffer Jenna Carlson posted the letter on Facebook, where it quickly went viral. The story captured the imagination of local, and then not-so-local, television outlets, where Angeli's letter was featured on CNN and ABC's Good Morning America, among others around the world.

Proceedings of Dec. 20

Jennifer Dawn DeHart, 39, Abrams, was placed on two years probation for possession of methamphetamine, in connection with an incident that occurred March 16. Judge Michael T. Judge withheld sentencing and ordered DeHart to maintain absolute sobriety during probation, obtain a high school diploma or its equivalent, and complete any counseling ordered by her agent.

Jesse James Peterson, 37, De Pere, was placed on three years probation for false imprisonment and misdemeanor battery, after a three-year prison term and three years of extended supervision were imposed and stayed. The charges stemmed from an incident that occurred July

14. Judge Jay N. Conley ordered Peterson to maintain absolute sobriety and full-time employment during probation and to undergo any assessments determined by the Department of Corrections including anger management, following through on all recommendations.

Darrick P. ATV / UTV ROUTE ORDINANCE

SECTION I - TITLE AND PURPOSE

The title of this ordinance is the Town of Spruce All-Terrain Vehicle/Utility Terrain Vehicle Route Ordinance. The purpose of this ordinance is to establish all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle routes in the town and to regulate the operation of all-terrain vehicles and utility terrain vehicles in the town.

SECTION II - AUTHORITY

The Town Board of the Town of Spruce, Oconto County, Wisconsin, has the specific authority to adopt this All-Terrain Vehicle and Utility Terrain Vehicle Ordinance under s. 23.33 (8)(b) and (c), Wis. Stats.

SECTION III - ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE

This ordinance adopted on proper notice with a quorum and roll call vote by a majority of the town board present and voting, provides the authority for the town to designate all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle routes in the town and to regulate the use of those routes and all-terrain vehicles and utility terrain vehicles in the town, designates all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle routes in the town and provides for the regulation of the use of those routes and of all-terrain vehicles and utility terrain vehicles in the town.

SECTION IV - OPERATION OF ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES AND UTILITY TERRAIN VEHICLES

Pursuant to s. 23.33 (4) (c) 4., Wis. Stats., except as otherwise provided in s. 23.33 (4), Wis. Stats., no person may operate an all-terrain vehicle or utility terrain vehicle on the roadway portion of any highway in the town except on roadways that are designated as all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle routes by this ordinance. Operation of all-terrain vehicles or utility terrain vehicles on a roadway in the town that is an all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle route is authorized only for the extreme right side of the roadway except that left turns may be made from any part of the roadway that is safe given prevailing conditions.

SECTION V - DESIGNATION OF ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE (ATV) AND UTILITY TERRAIN VEHICLE (UTV) ROUTES

All roads deemed as Town Roads will be designated ATV/UTV routes as indicated with the proper signage. This will be a 1 year trial with review to follow after 1 year of usage. (Amended 7-16-18)

SECTION VI - CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE AND UTILITY TERRAIN VEHICLE ROUTES

Pursuant to s. 23.33 (8) (d), Wis. Stats., the following restrictions are placed on the use of the town all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle routes designated by this resolution.

A. Routes shall be marked with uniform all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle route signs in accordance with s. NR 54.12 (7), Wisconsin Administrative Code. No person may do any of the following in regard to signs marking town all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle routes:

1. Intentionally remove, damage, deface, move, or obstruct any uniform all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle route or trail sign or standard or intentionally interfere with the effective operation of any uniform all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle route or trail sign or standard if the sign or standard is legally placed by the state, any municipality, or any authorized individual.
2. Possess any uniform all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle route or trail sign or standard of the type established by the department for the warning, instruction, or information of the public, unless he or she obtained the uniform all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle route or trail sign or standard in a lawful manner. Possession of a uniform all-terrain vehicle and utility terrain vehicle route or trail sign or standard creates a rebuttable presumption of illegal possession.

B. Operation shall be subject to all provisions of s. 23.33, Wis. Stats., which is adopted as a part of this ordinance and fully incorporated herein by reference, pursuant to s. 23.33 (15), Wis. Stats.

C. A copy of this ordinance shall be sent by the town clerk to the Department of Natural Resources, the Oconto County Sheriff's Department and any other law enforcement agency serving the Town of Spruce's jurisdiction.

D. The following restrictions shall apply to all operation of all-terrain or utility terrain vehicles on town roads:

1. Maximum speed of 25 miles per hour unless otherwise designed differently. (Amended 12-11-2019)
2. Operation on hard surface of road only; and
3. Operation of all-terrain vehicles or utility terrain vehicles in single file only.

The town reserves the right to amend, modify, or change these restrictions in the future.

SECTION VII - ENFORCEMENT

This ordinance may be enforced by any law enforcement officer authorized to enforce the laws of the state of Wisconsin.

SECTION VIII - PENALTIES

The penalties under s. 23.33 (13) (a), Wis. Stats., are adopted by reference.

SECTION IX - SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this ordinance or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications of this ordinance that can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are severable.

SECTION X - EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance is effective on publication or posting. The town clerk shall properly publish this ordinance as required under s. 60.80, Wis. Stats. Adopted with Amendment to section VI (D 1) /Passed this 11th day of December, 2019.

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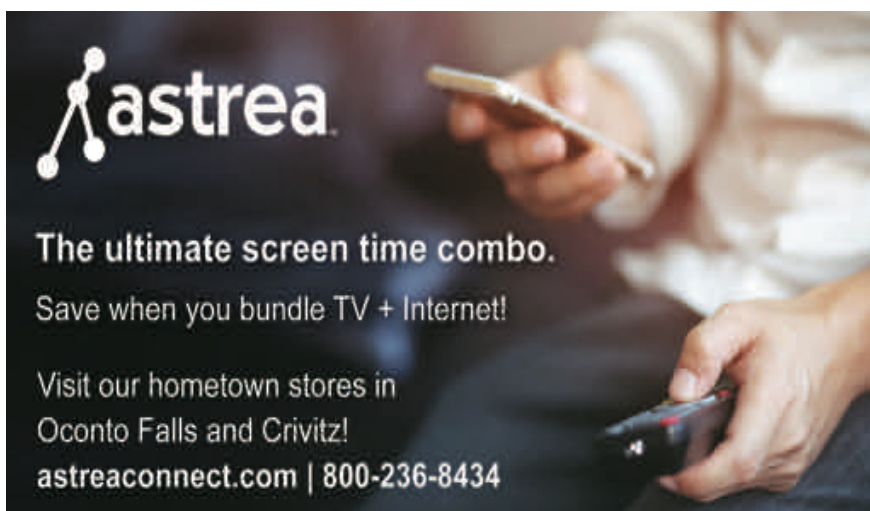
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Annual Gillett Wreath Hunt is on

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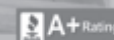
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THE GARDENING YEAR

Poinsettias can be cared for year-round



Poinsettias come in a variety of colors and are easy to grow, even well after the Christmas season.

Colorful and traditional poinsettias are a holiday staple and many families enjoy the beauty of these classic plants during the season. It is possible to keep your poinsettias looking healthy and beautiful for most of the year, even to get them to re-bloom next year at about the same time.

Poinsettias make great house plants, even outdoor plants in the garden during much of summer, before they need to be brought back indoors to prepare for rebloom the following Christmas.

Keeping the plant warm, away from cold drafts and properly wa-

terted are keys to keeping the plant alive and healthy through the winter season. Considered tender tropical plants here our area, poinsettias are fairly easy to grow and care for and it is worth the effort to try to experiment with these plants once the holiday season is over.

Overwatering is a common problem with poinsettia care. Good-intentioned growers assume the plants need to be much wetter than they truly need to be. Poinsettias can actually go fairly dry between waterings and do not respond well to heavy watering. Follow the directions on the care tag you should receive when purchasing the plant. The plant should be potted in light, fluffy potting soil and should not

feel overly heavy to the touch. For much of the winter season, simply keeping the poinsettia in a warm, bright place and watering appropriately is all that is needed up until early April. The location should be 65-70 degrees. By this time, the leaves will probably begin to fall off, and this is perfectly normal. You can begin to cease regular watering and allow the plant to go into a period of dormancy. You will still need to water occasionally to keep the stems looking green and healthy, even though

they will be leafless for sometime. Again, this is perfectly normal. The plant is not dead. It is just dormant. Once the leaves fall off, move the poinsettia to a cooler area, ideally about 60 degrees.

After about a month, in about the middle of May, many growers will prune back poinsettia plants to about 4-6 inches and begin regular watering once again, moving the plant back into a brighter and warmer location. Now is also the time to repot the plant, giving it a new home in a slightly larger pot. New growth will begin to appear in a few weeks.

Poinsettias grow quite well outdoors in our area and can spend the entire summer season in the garden in a location with partial shade or potted and grown on the deck or patio. Avoid direct, bright sunshine and during the summer.

Wait to move the plant outdoors until about June 1 or so, depending upon the weather. Poinsettias do not like temperatures below 50 degrees.

During the summer months, once in July and once in August,

pinch back the tips by an inch or two to allow full, bushy growth. You can simply pinch off the chips with your fingers, or, use a pruner or scissors. Fertilize the plants every two weeks or so with a well-balanced fertilizer.

In September, move the plant indoors once temperatures fall below 60-65 degrees.

The fall season is the most intimidating for poinsettia growers as the plant does need about 6-8 weeks of dark treatment in order to

produce the colorful bracts they are famous for.

Poinsettias need a minimum of 12 hours of total darkness each day during much of fall in order to produce the buds and bracts. While sunlight is still needed during the daytime, the plant needs to be placed somewhere where total darkness will be experienced for about 12 hours.

This may mean moving to a different location in the home, or, simply placing a box or other item over the plant for half of the day. Even small amounts of light can affect the coloration, so be sure the plant receives a period of complete, total darkness during this time period.

This period of alternating light and darkness should occur from about Oct. 1 into early November.

During mid to late November, move the plant back into a warm, lighted condition and enjoy the magic of the colorful transformation.

Whiting, Stegeman state title wins top Times Herald stories of 2019

Gillett cross-country teams make it to state

Editor's note: The following is a list of the top five sports stories for 2019, as voted on by NEW Media editorial staff.

1. Whiting caps freshman wrestling season with state title

Oconto Falls' Clayton Whiting had high expectations for himself in his first high school wrestling season. The then-freshman lived up to the hype, taking first at regionals and sectionals before capping the season with a 2019 state title in the Division 2 152-pound weight class.

Whiting knocked off three seniors on the way to his state title, winning three decisions. His 9-0 decision win in the first-place match capped a 48-3 season.

"It's kind of crazy; everyone is like, 'Oh, he's just a freshman. He shouldn't be nothing.' But I'm a whole different other person out on the mat — I can change people's minds like that," said Whiting after winning state.

Along with his state title, Whiting was also named to the North Eastern Conference first team.

Oconto Falls' Tyler Budz and Gillett/Suring's Sam Lemens also ended their seasons competing at the state tournament.

2. Stegeman wins state pole vault title

Suring Mitch Stegeman enjoyed a strong high school athletic career, capping it with some big-time honors and accomplishments in his senior season.

Stegeman ended the school year competing in three track and field events at the 2019 State Track and Field Championships. Stegeman came in seventh in the 300-meter hurdles, fifth in the high jump and cleared 14 feet to take home a Division 3 pole vault title.

"I am super excited to have placed first. It was a goal of mine ever since I started vaulting in sixth grade," Stegeman said. "Freshman and sophomore

year, I was the top Division 3 vaulter in my grade. Last year was a little disappointing because I didn't go up any, but this year was just a dream

come true."

Stegeman, who was the ninth Suring boy to win a state title, earned 16 points on his own, which tied Suring for 11th among the Division 3 state boys teams.

A few months earlier, Stegeman was dazzling on the basketball court, helping Suring reach the regional title game.

Stegeman was named the Marinette & Oconto Conference's Player of the Year after averaging 18.9 points.

3. Both Gillett cross-country teams make it to state championships

With young, yet experienced rosters, the Gillett cross-country teams believed they could both make it to state. The girls and boys teams were able to achieve that goal, taking first

at sectionals to qualify for the WIAA Cross-Country State Championships.

Both teams turned in strong showings at state, with the girls team placing second and the boys seventh.

Sophomore Ryann Wagner took 20th overall as an individual to lead the girls team, while junior Sylvia Hansen came in 32nd. Sophomore Angela Mosconi took 62nd, freshman Cheyenne Krueger was 67th and freshman Kasey Hansen placed 69th to fill out the team score. Freshman Megan Wagner and sophomore Alaina Herzog were also ran at state.

"It (taking second as a team) means the absolute world to me," said Sylvia Hansen. "These girls on my team gave everything they had this season and it showed today. I'm so proud and so blessed by God to be a part of such

an amazing, hard-working group of people that I can share my love for running with.”

Alex Peterson led the boys team, finishing 38th overall. Junior Derek Hanson came in 48th, while sophomore Connor Hanson took 81st. Freshman Evan Peterson placed 95th and junior Riley Engebretsen 97th to cap the team score, while sophomore Antonio Lizarrag was the team's sixth runner.

Earlier in the season, the girls and boys teams each captured M&O titles.

4. Suring football team makes playoffs

After making the playoffs as an 11-

man team in 2018, the Suring football team made the transition to 8-man this fall. Behind a huge year from senior Logan Stuart, the Eagles tied for the MONLPC-8 title and earned a No. 2 seed for the playoffs.

Stuart led the way, eventually being named the conference's offensive and defensive player of the year. He rushed for 2,475 yards and 32 touchdowns while racking up 162 total tackles and forcing six fumbles on defense.

“It's truly an honor, and I couldn't be happier. I'm so glad that my last football season in high school went as well as it did, and I got to enjoy it with the best team I could've asked for,”

said Stuart.

A total of seven Eagles were named to an all-conference team.

Suring's only regular-season loss came to Gibraltar, who would eventually be the team that knocked the Eagles out of the playoffs.

5. Five track and field athletes shine at state meet

It wasn't just Stegeman that turned in a strong showing at the 2019 State Track and Field Championships, as individuals from Gillett and Oconto Falls also had success there.

Oconto Falls' Kari Albrecht, a junior at the time, competed in the 100

hurdles. Albrecht took eighth in the prelims, which qualified for the finals, where she again placed eighth.

Gillett's Bo Krueger, also a junior at the time, qualified for the finals in the discus. Krueger made the podium (top six) with a sixth-place finish.

Teammate Aubrey DeBauch, then a sophomore, also ended the season on the podium. She placed sixth in the 300 hurdles.

Then sophomores Sylvia Hansen and Derek Hanson also competed at state for Gillett.

Hansen finished seventh in the 1,600 before taking 11th in the 3,200. Hanson came in 10th in the 1,600.

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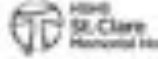
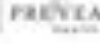
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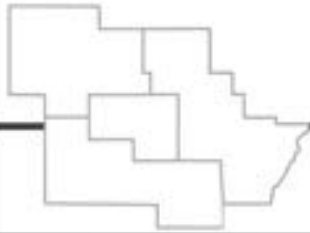
