School panel hesitant about livestreaming board meetings

Advocate surprised at committee's resistance, lack of research

SHAWANO — The idea of livestreaming Shawano School Board meetings was not greeted with enthusiasm Monday, much to the dismay of the local resident who pitched the idea.

The matter went before Shawano School District's policy and curriculum committee, and members expressed concern that having board members conducting business live and on camera for full board meetings and committee meetings would curtail discussions and not be cost effective for the district.

Speaking after the committee meeting, Shelby Kaveinga, a former teacher and the Shawano resident who suggested that the board livestream its meetings, expressed irritation at not only the chilly reception the idea received, but that it took this long to get a public airing. Kaveinga said the idea had been brought forward months ago, only to be delayed.

"I was surprised there wasn't more discussion," Kaveinga said. "I figured they would have done their research and brought information forward to share."

Kaveinga was hopeful that, if the district did livestream its meetings, it would get community members more involved and create a richer dialogue as the board tackles education matters. She noted that even though the name has "live" in it, community members unable to view the meetings at their designated times could still view them later if the district kept an archive.

"All of the districts I've looked into, they archive them. They stream them live, and you can view them on their websites," Kaveinga said. "They have written notes that you can read, so there are many avenues to access the information, whether it's live or catching up later."

During the committee meeting, board member Mart Grams said the school districts that he researched

archive their meetings on their websites.

"That takes up a lot of space," Grams said.

He added there was a concern that the streaming might inadvertently be left on if the board has to go into a closed session.

"Sometimes that stymies the conversation," Grams said.

Board member Diane Hoffman, the committee's chairwoman, echoed Grams' sentiment about livestreaming stymieing conversation, but she was also concerned the video meetings could be used out of context.

"The dialogue isn't as real," Hoffman said.

The committee's comments surprised Kaveinga. She challenged the assertion that livestreaming the meetings would curtail discussion of issues.

"Your concern should be no different than somebody sitting here and watching you guys," Kaveinga said. "Your conversation shouldn't be stymied by me sitting here in the audience or if 100 people showed up. If you livestream it, and one person watches it or 500 people watch, your conversation should be the same, regardless of the means by which we're receiving it."

Kaveinga said she reached out to school districts who livestream their meetings as well, and she didn't find the resistance to the method of recording.

"They are all in favor of it," Kaveinga said. "They all support it and say it creates a transparency with the community."

Kaveinga noted that the bulk of the discussions on many issues brought before the school board are hashed out in committees, like at the meeting held Monday, which leaves many who attend the full board meetings con-

fused about the details on the issues.

"Those are yeah and nay decisions, but what happens here (in committee meetings) affects me as a parent and as a community member," Kaveinga said. "To attend today, I had to get a babysitter to watch my children so I could come, just so I could have an idea of what's going on in my district. This is a very simple solution to allow people to feel more connected to you and what you're doing in this district."

Kaveinga said she has the backing of other members in the community who have posted concerns about school district issues on Facebook and other social media platforms.

Hoffman said she'd received word from school board president Tyler Schmidt that some school districts had started the livestreaming but later shut it down. When asked by Kaveinga which districts did that, Hoffman could not provide specifics.

Kaveinga said her research showed only one district shutting down livestreaming, and the reason was it was not compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act in that the district could not provide closed captioning on the videos.

Superintendent Randi Anderson suggested that research be done to find out what costs and technology would be involved with livestreaming meetings, especially with a convention for the Wisconsin Association of School Boards coming up. She expressed concern about livestreaming through social media platforms and suggested instead that meetings could be recorded and utilized through cable channel 99, which she said is available for the district's use.

Kaveinga suggested the board members go one step further and speak with teachers, staff, parents and other community members to get their thoughts about whether livestreaming is a good idea.

"They elected you to these positions," Kaveinga said. "Let's see what they think."

State temporarily closes Washington Inn

Cecil supper club must correct violations before restaurant can open to public again

CECIL — The Washington Inn Supper Club in Cecil remains temporarily closed as of Thursday while the owners address issues raised by a state inspection of the restaurant earlier this month.

According to the Wisconsin Department Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, Bureau of Food and Recreational Businesses web site, a routine inspection of the restaurant was done on Jan. 3 and found a number of violations needing to be corrected.

A reinspection of the facility is required before the restaurant can reopen.

A notice posted outside the restaurant states that “due to unfortunate events, the Washington Inn will be temporarily closed for business.”

The Leader has reached out to the state for additional details, but those details were not available by press time.

Washington Inn owner Darwin Olsen said the violations are being corrected.

More information, including a full interview with Olsen, will be posted online in the coming days and a more detailed story will appear in Wednesday's edition.

Easley wins Trucker award for school honors

Retired teacher keeps busy checking eyes, building sets

CLINTONVILLE — Lowell Easley has received a Trucker Recognition Award from the Clintonville School District for making a difference in the local schools.

Superintendent Dr. David Dyb said that the award was presented because of his work with the Clintonville Lions, including helping with vision screenings at the schools. His set-building skills, especially with school plays, were also a factor, he said.

Clintonville School Board president Ben Huber agreed, noting that, “He is a retired teacher that is busier now than when he was teaching.”

Easley retired from the district at age 57 and said at the time he would not be back in school. But after about six months, he already missed being before the kids. He spent most of his years teaching sixth grade but he came back to substitute for 10 years in elementary and high school. He taught English, spelling, reading and science.

Easley attended Northern Michigan University and earned his undergraduate in elementary educa-

tion, being certified for kindergarten through eighth grade.

He found there was a teaching job opening in Clintonville, and another in Antigo. When he interviewed with then-principal Reed Newton in Clintonville, he was offered the job. Easley accepted, and he said he has never regretted it, spending his entire teaching career in Clintonville.

Easley later earned his master's degree in administration and library science at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.

Easley and his wife, Penny, adopted their daughter, Erin, and they have three grandchildren.

“It was my granddaughter Makayla that got me involved in set building,” Easley said. “She was in fourth grade when Mary Beth Kuester got her involved in the Mielke theater in Shawano. She worked with Brandon Byng (now the artistic director for Clintonville's Phoenix Players). I got involved in the set building. I got my carpenter skills by watching others and by doing. I like to work with wood. I have a workshop in my basement.”

When Makayla became involved in the productions at Clintonville

High School, Easley again became involved in set building. He spent over 200 hours building sets for the recent production of “Mamma Mia.”

Easley said it had a highly involved, elaborate internal structure that took a lot of planning. He has 16 pages of the design.

Easley is currently kept busy working with the plans for the Uni-

versity of Wisconsin Singers that are returning to Clintonville High School on Feb. 14.

“I am so proud to have the people in this area have an opportunity to hear talent of this quality in Clintonville. It is a fundraiser with a portion of the funds going to the Lions Club and a portion to the high school music department,” he said.

Easley has helped with constructing 59 wheelchair ramps that the Lions have installed in Clintonville. He said he recalls constructing a ramp for a lady when it was 20 degrees below zero.

Easley is also involved in the Lions' rose sale.

Don't look for Easley to slow down any time soon. He said volunteering and being involved in the school district and the community is good for retired citizens. It helps to give them a social life that they might not have otherwise.

The Trucker Recognition Award was established to recognize someone with a school-community connection who has made a positive impact. Anyone may submit a name for recognition.

Trying to recycle? You might be doing it wrong

Public works gives dos, don'ts on recyclables

SHAWANO — The Shawano Public Works Department, on behalf of the county's Solid Waste Management Board, is putting the word out about recycling rules as a reminder of the dos and don'ts of recycling.

Public Works Director Scott Kroening said there are no significant changes to the rules this year, but there are some things residents have been doing for years with their recycling that they shouldn't be doing at all.

Those blue plastic recycling bags you've been using, for example, are bad.

"I can remember back in the day, we used to put all our recyclables in blue plastic bags," Kroening said. "They really stood out and made it easy for the garbage person to tell the difference between the garbage bags and recycling bags."

Nowadays, according to Kroening,

with the changes in how the recycled materials are sorted, the plastic bags and wraps get tangled in the sorting machines and must be cut out, causing the entire line to be shut down.

All recyclable items should just be placed in your bin, Kroening said.

The rules apply countywide, though, Kroening said, they might be more accurately described as suggestions.

"Like we do in the city, if we see you've got plastic bags out we'd probably send you a letter and say, 'please, don't put your recycling in plastic bags,'" he said. "It's not like your recycling won't get picked up. It's just a guideline basically to help us do a better job of recycling, which ultimately in the end helps our bottom line and helps the facility in Outagamie County do a better job of recycling and they can give us a cheaper price."

Currently, the Shawano County

Landfill transfers all its recyclables to the Outagamie County Recycling and Solid Waste Facility, as there is no recycling facility at the local landfill.

The Outagamie facility, which is made up of three counties, Brown, Outagamie and Winnebago, is the closest facility available.

"Even Green Bay takes their recyclables to Outagamie County," Kroening said. "They do a great job in a very difficult market."

While recycling used to be profitable for municipalities, it has for years been a necessary expense.

"A few years ago, we received a check for the recyclables, but now we just receive a bill," Kroening said. "We remain hopeful that another market will emerge and the need for the recycling material will improve."

Kroening said one way that everyone can help is to recycle correctly and provided the following guidelines:

- **Plastic:** Household bottles, jars, jugs, dairy containers, lids including produce, bakery and deli containers are acceptable. Plastic bags, wrap, film, motor oil bottles and Styrofoam are not acceptable and should be included in the garbage.

- **Paper:** Newspaper, inserts, cardboard, paperboard, food boxes, milk, juice and soup cartons, office and school paper, junk mail and catalogs, phone books, other books and magazines are acceptable. Tissue paper, pet food bags and shredded paper are not acceptable.

- **Metal:** Aluminum bottles and cans, steel, tin cans and empty aerosol cans are acceptable. Aluminum pans, foil, empty paint cans and scrap metal are not acceptable.

- **Glass:** Food and beverage bottles and jars are acceptable. Window glass, ceramics, china and drinking glasses are not acceptable.

Snow shoveling causes impacts to health

Heart attacks possible with strenuous activity

APPLETON — With people on Facebook posting, "This is heart attack snow," Dr. Simone Fearon, physician leader with ThedaCare Cardiovascular Care, is urging residents to take it easy when clearing their driveways after recent snowstorms.

"Snow shoveling raises your heart rate and blood pressure more quickly and more dramatically than other types of exercises," Fearon said, "and because it involves moving your arms a lot, it's more strenuous than other exercises."

Fearon also noted that because snow removal happens in a cold environment, blood vessels constrict more, making hearts work harder.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, about 100 people, typically men, have a heart attack during or just after shoveling snow each year in the United States.

Fearon offers these suggestions for those who must shovel snow:

- Exercise daily to prepare your body for shoveling. Most people should get 30 minutes of exercise at least five days a week. Working

your heart regularly prepares it for shoveling.

- Warm up your muscles before heading outside. Walk in place or stretch to get blood circulating and muscles moving.

- Take breaks while shoveling to give your heart a rest.

- Stay hydrated. People can become dehydrated in cold weather. Drink water before and after shoveling.

Fearon noted that the signs of a heart attack while shoveling are similar to any heart attack, shortness of breath, pain in the middle or left side of the chest, tightness in the chest, pain in the shoulder and arm or heaviness in the chest.

"Many times people think they may have pulled a muscle or have acid reflux, but those symptoms can definitely signal a heart attack," she said. "Not everyone experiences a heart attack in the same way. If you have any of these symptoms or other unusual symptoms while shoveling snow or shortly thereafter, it's important to seek immediate medical attention."

She warned that anyone with cardiac risk factors should be very cautious about shoveling snow, especially men over the age of 40, those who are smokers, have high blood pressure, high cholesterol or diabetes.

Heart issues aren't the only health concerns associated with snow shoveling. Back injuries, hypothermia and falls with injuries to wrists, hips, spine, neck and head can also occur while shoveling or blowing snow, according to Fearon.

To lessen your risk of injury while removing snow this winter, keep good posture with a straight

back and use your legs and arms to lift the snow rather than your back, Fearon said. People should avoid jerking or twisting, and they should dress appropriately for the conditions to prevent hypothermia.

People should also be aware of slippery conditions, according to Fearon. They should walk like a penguin taking small, shuffling steps rather than longer steps in slippery situations. Falls can be particularly dangerous for older people as broken backs and hips can lead to other complications. Head and neck injuries can be life-threatening to anyone.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT FOR THE FEBRUARY 18, 2020 SPRING PRIMARY ELECTION

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 10 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. ***Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.***

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application for an absentee ballot by mail or in person.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is: 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 13, 2020.

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

Voting an absentee ballot in person

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified below for casting an absentee ballot in person.

No in-person absentee voting may occur on the day before the election.

Changes planned for school meal payment policy

Amount owed, alternative meals among the planned revisions

SHAWANO — Vague wording in the Shawano School District's policy on negative meal account balances has meant confusion for parents and staff.

That could be changing, as the district's policy and curriculum committee met Monday to discuss new guidelines that would apply at all schools and not make the cutoff point open to interpretation by individual schools. The current policy is confusing for parents who learn they're behind in paying for their children's meals and for staff who are unclear what the threshold is for negative balances.

Bobby Reed, the district's food service director, said that the district currently sends notifications to parents when they owe \$10 or more for breakfast and lunch. For reduced-price meal recipients, that allows quite a few meals to

be racked up, but for those families that pay full-price, four or five lunches usually meet the notification threshold.

However, the district policy does not specify the dollar amount, according to Superintendent Randi Anderson. The policy only says "the permissible negative balance amount" and that students who exceed that amount will be given "an alternative meal."

"I know that there have been conversations, historically, but they did not get documented and implemented," Anderson said. "That's one of the things we want to bring back to the board."

The alternative meal policy has not been enforced, according to Reed, as there are no clear-cut policies on what constitutes a proper meal in lieu of what is being served that day. While high school students are barred from accessing a la carte items, there's nothing in place for the lower grades, and as a result, some balances are hundreds of dollars in the red, he said.

"I've talked with other school districts," Reed said to the committee. "Oconto Falls is very strict, even at the elementary level. When they get below \$10, they have to go

to the office and pick up a brown bag that has a cheese sandwich in it."

Board member Alysia Pillsbury did not like the idea of adopting the strictness that Oconto Falls has in place.

"I'm not in favor of humiliation," Pillsbury said. "I'm also not comfortable with \$10. It's too low."

Anderson agreed, noting that she herself has failed on occasion to keep up with her child's meal payments.

"I am one that the child should not have to pay for the consequences of an adult behavior," Anderson said. "It's not for my child to put money into her account. It's for me, as an adult to put money into the account."

The board members on the committee agreed there needs to be one policy enforced across the board.

"I'm absolutely against having principals decide at random," Grams said. "There's got to be a policy."

Although not finalized, the committee bandied about the idea of cutting off the account at \$50 and looked to staff to figure out what an appropriate alternative meal is without subjecting students to the stigma of being in the red. The revised policy is expected to return to the committee for a recommendation before it's presented to the full board.

TO: ALL SHAWANO COUNTY DOG OWNERS

Pursuant to Section 174.052 Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Shawano County that rabies vaccinations and dog licenses are required under the statutes.

Vaccination by a veterinarian against rabies of all dogs is required (Section 95.21 (2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 5 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. Older vaccinated dogs must be revaccinated when the certificates expires or within 3 years of the previous vaccination. Presentation of evidence that the dog is currently immunized against rabies must be presented when obtaining dog licenses.

All dogs 5 months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3.00 upon presentation or evidence attesting to the same and \$8.00 for the unneutered male or unspayed female dog, or one-half of these amounts if the dog became 5 months of age after July 1 of the license year. These minimums may be supplemented by local municipal action. The fee for a multiple dog license is \$35.00 for the first 12 dogs. There is an additional fee of \$3.00 for each dog over 12 dogs.

PENALTIES

A late fee of \$5.00 shall be assessed the owner of each dog 5 months of age or over who fails to obtain a dog license by April 1, 2020.

An owner who fails to have a dog vaccinated against rabies as required by statute may be required to forfeit not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100.00. 2020 dog licenses must be obtained from your local treasurer. Area local treasurers are listed below.

Study: Immunotherapy effective in slowing breast cancer

ThedaCare Cancer Center will seek patients for research

APPLETON — Women in the advanced stages of breast cancer have a treatment that could potentially help them live longer.

It is called immunotherapy, and it uses a person's own immune system to fight cancer.

"It is difficult to slow tumor growth

with chemotherapy alone in patients with advanced breast cancer," said Dr. Alexander Starr, an oncologist and hematologist at ThedaCare Cancer Care in Appleton. "Now special combinations of drugs — chemotherapy plus medications that may build the immune system to spot and destroy cancerous cells — are showing remarkable results."

Starr cited a recent study which focused on using immunotherapy for women with advanced-stage breast cancer.

"The study showed a decrease in

the risk of the disease worsening or death by 40% when patients were given the immune building medication compared to chemotherapy alone," he said. "This likely halted the progression of cancer by two additional months and extended the life of the patient by an additional 10 months."

Other trials now look at administering the treatment earlier in the disease state. Oncologists believe this might lead to an even longer life for patients with metastatic advanced breast cancer. ThedaCare Regional Cancer Center plans to recruit patients for

this national phase III study in 2020.

Added benefits can come with immunotherapy. Unlike like standard chemotherapy, which often leaves patients sick, immunotherapy can reduce side effects such as nausea and hair loss. Still, it is important to understand the other potential effects of immunotherapy.

"Your immune system becomes hyper as it works extra hard to fight cancer," Starr said. "There are concerns about inflammatory conditions, such as non-infectious pneumonia and hepatitis."

Gen. Qassem Soleimani killed — so what?

By now, you have heard that Gen. Qassem Soleimani (Shia Muslim) was killed as his motorcade left the Baghdad International Airport on Jan. 3. Soleimani was the commander of the Iranian Islamic Revolutionary Guard Qud Forces. The Qud Forces are to shape the region favorably to a Shia

Iran by carrying out unconventional war and intelligence gathering operations outside the territory of Iran.

Under the direction of Soleimani, the Quds supported the Taliban with material and money. Soleimani and his proxies fought in Iraq, Yemen, Syria and Lebanon, as well as locations around the world. Soleimani used proxy fighters to attempt an assassination in Washington, D.C.

President Barack Obama's attorney general, Eric Holder, charged Manssor Arbabsiar, a naturalized U.S. citizen, and Gholam Shakuri, a commander in the Quds, for planning to assassinate Saudi ambassador Adel al-Jubeir at a D.C. restaurant. They planned to use a bomb; FBI Director Robert Mueller stated that many lives would have been lost and named the investigation "Operation Red." The U.S. Treasury designated the Quds as a terrorist organization in 2007. In October 2011, the Obama administration targeted Soleimani by freezing his financial assets.

Soleimani is the strategic genius behind Iranian efforts to control and disrupt the region, and he accomplished this through proxy fighters in Yemen, Syria, Lebanon, Afghanistan, Africa and Iraq. Gen. David Petraeus said that killing Soleimani is bigger than killing Osama Bin Laden or al-Bkr al-Bagdadi, and I agree. I compare the elimination of Soleimani to the killing of Japanese Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto during World War II.

The first time I saw a photo of or heard the name Qasem Soleimani was in spring 2005. I was in a briefing being given by the Third Infantry Division. The focus of the security brief was to discuss and describe the EFP (Explosively Formed Penetrator). This new IED (Improvised Explosive Device) had recently appeared in the Iraq battlefield and could penetrate armor.

An EFP penetrates armor and rattles around inside the vehicle, severing arms, legs, etc. A large portion of the brief included photos of Soleimani and other Iranian Qud leaders known to be pushing into Iraq and teaching the use of the EFP.

The commander that I replaced in Salman Pac was killed by an EFP along with three others in October 2005. It is estimated that about 700 Americans were killed by EFPs. Was killing Soleimani legal?

Obama used drones throughout the Middle East over 2,000 times during his administration. Besides combatants, civilians were killed, and among those killed was Anwar al-Awlaki. Al-Awlaki was a Yemen American imam,

and the Obama administration accused him of aiding al-Qaida and that he was a recruiter for fighters in Yemen, but to date no evidence of these claims have been released. Al-Awlaki was the first American citizen killed by a drone without due process. Do you remember the press making a big deal of the killing of an American citizen?

Is it legal for President Donald Trump to commit this attack? According to United States Code 50 3093(c) (2), the president is required to brief the Gang of Eight. The Gang of Eight is made up of leaders in the House and Senate and the Intelligence Committee.

Under "extraordinary circumstances" when the president believes "it is essential to limit access" to information about a covert action, the president can limit reporting to the Gang of Eight. According to the War Powers Act, military actions must be reported within 48 hours. The War Powers Act also permits the president to commit U.S. forces for a limited period of time. Would you trust Adam Schiff, the Democratic head of the intel committee, with something as sensitive as this?

You can see on some major news shows, female anchors are wearing a hijab in honor of Soleimani. Soleimani lead what was the Badr Corp in Iraq, which is a Shia militia. I have seen various accounts of Iraqis celebrating the death of Soleimani.

I have received several messages from Shia interpreters that I used in Iraq, and they are thankful Soleimani

is dead and thankful for Trump. I have spoken with others that have served in Iraq, and they are hearing the same from Iraqis they are in contact with. Does the news report this? The news shows large crowds mourning in Iran, but what do you expect in a totalitarian country?

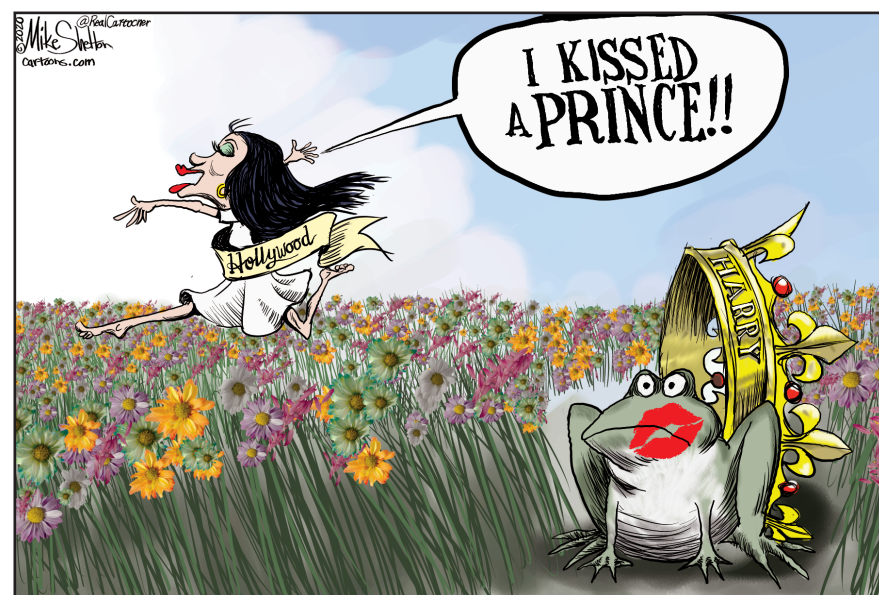
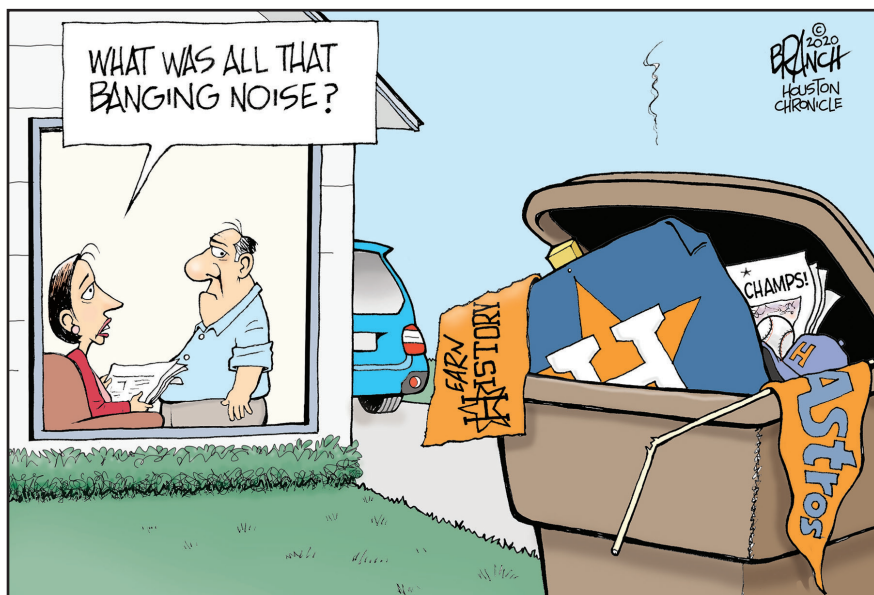
Iran will respond, but very carefully. Iran was given billions by the Obama administration, but with the sanctions placed by Trump, their money is running low. Kim Jong-un is taking notice.

In 2019, Iran attacked six ships in the straits of Hormuz, conducted war games with Russia and China, blew up a Saudi oil field and shot down a U.S. drone. Trump stopped the military response to the drone that was shot down. I believe it was measured response because no American life was lost.

Iran has been at war with the United States since 1979, and they chant "Death to America" every chance they get. In August 2019, I published an article titled "American foreign policy — how it works." Remember DIME.

Trump has talked to Iran through diplomatic back channels. Information by Trump: This was done to prevent a war, not start one. Now Trump has used the military. Trump has used economics by applying sanctions. U.S. foreign policy is at work; well done.

Founder of Twig's Beverage found second career as Shriner clown

SHAWANO — Friends and family of Floyd "Twig" Hartwig this week remembered the founder of Twig's Beverage not only for the business legacy he left behind but also for the second career he pursued after he retired.

Hartwig passed away Jan. 10 at the age of 92.

"Our community lost a great man," said his son, Dan Hartwig. "There's a lot of things he did for the community."

Those involvements ranged from coaching baseball to Twig's participation in a host of veterans groups, as

well as other organizations such as Knights of Columbus, Shawano Eagles Club, Shawano Rotary and Shawano Masonic Lodge 170.

He will likely best be remembered for starting Twig's Beverage in 1951, an idea that came to him while recovering from wounds he sustained during the Korean War.

"He was shot in both knees," Dan said. "And he's laying in this Tokyo hospital and he comes up with this idea because he liked the bottling business, he liked refrigeration. He was big into that."

Hartwig was a graduate of Milwaukee School of Engineering, where he studied refrigeration.

"He went to work at a lot of the breweries down in Milwaukee and worked on their refrigeration units," Dan said. "He had a passion for those kinds of things."

Hartwig's softball buddies offered to help him get his bottling

company going.

"Being shot through both knees, he was going to struggle a little bit," Dan said.

Hartwig would send his military checks home to invest in bottling equipment.

Hartwig's father, Leonard, known as "Shorty," was a famous barber in town, Dan said, and he hoped his son would follow in his footsteps, but Hartwig wasn't interested in that.

"He wanted to think up his own legacy and he thought up this bottling company," Dan said.

The first two flavors offered — Bullseye Root Beer and Goody Orange — didn't go over too well, according to Dan.

"You don't hear of those anymore," he said.

"Not too long after, a guy by the name of Charles Lazier came and asked him if he would do Sun Drop," Dan said.

Sun Drop was a drink that started in St. Louis and Lazier was looking for a Wisconsin bottler.

"That's how Sun Drop got into the state of Wisconsin," Dan said. "And it just ballooned from there. Sun Drop was fast becoming our number one drink and still is today."

Hartwig retired in 1986 and turned his attention to a new pursuit.

"He had a passion for being a Shriner clown," Dan said. "When he retired, he set out in that direction."

Hartwig attended and graduated from clown college in Baraboo.

"He enjoyed going to the Shriner hospitals and seeing the children there," Dan said. "There's a lot of people who benefited from him being a clown. Even in the local areas. He went to parades, birthday parties and things like that."

Hartwig was known as Twig the Clown.

"He was probably one of the best

clowns I ever clowned with," said Jim Herman, aka Jimbo the Clown, one of Hartwig's fellow Shriners and Masonic lodge members.

Herman, who was 2019 president of the Beja Shriner Clowns, said he and Hartwig would travel all over the state to do their clowning.

"Personally, he was just a very good friend," Herman said. "He was a very nice, gentle, sweet man. He was a great clown."

Hartwig's special expertise was making balloons.

"He was a genius," Herman said.

"He was just so good at it, it was unbelievable."

Even after he could no longer travel to do his clowning, Hartwig continued to make balloons in the nursing home, Herman said.

Herman said Hartwig was also really good with the children they visited.

"He was very patient," Herman said. "Sometimes kids can get a little impatient when everyone wants balloons at the same time."

Herman said it takes a special per-

sonality to be a clown.

"You have to have a persona the public likes," he said, adding that Hartwig had that. "He was such a gracious guy it was unbelievable. I will miss him desperately."

Wendy Crawford of Leadership Shawano County and one of the organizers of Sun Drop Dayz commented on Hartwig's legacy.

"If there wasn't any Sun Drop, there would be no Sun Drop Dayz," she said.

"You think about the people in Shawano who love Sun Drop. If it wasn't for Floyd Hartwig bringing it to our community, we just wouldn't have this beloved soda," Crawford said.

"I have so much respect for somebody from his generation who started from such humble beginnings and then created what he did and influenced our community the way he did," she said.

Nancy Smith, executive director of the Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce, said Hartwig had a tremendous impact on Shawano and beyond.

"He leaves behind an impressive

legacy with Twig's Beverage and his amazing family," she said. "From his military service to his community service, he was a truly generous and giving man. The Shawano community collectively raises a glass bottle of Sun Drop in his honor."

Hartwig's family posted a tribute to him on the Twig's Beverage Facebook page titled The Art of Legacy:

"I think the saddest part of it all is that you expect the world to stop. He deserves for the world to pause for a while and understand what it just lost."

"He was just a man and this is just a soda."

"To some extent that will always be true. But once you go off to war, get a bullet once through the hand, return to war, and get another bullet through both legs, coming home to create a machine with his wife Valda that's been running for over half a century is no small feat. I won't begin to mention the other countless organizations and activities this man was involved in over his life."

"So make sure to have yourself a Sun

"Karla, I've got to say you've made my life easier here and helped me, guided me along," Whealon added. "I've known Karla for many years when she worked up in the town of Wescott and that was the greatest steal the city ever got."

Getting through difficulty with help and prayers

In all the years I've written farm columns, my husband has been my very first editor. If he does not approve, it does not see print. He's allowed me to be open and candid, true to life as I've written about all aspects of dairying through the years — machinery breakdowns, weather and harvest issues, cows sick and even dying. If my husband OKs it, I've written about it.

So now, I've been given permission from my husband to share a deeply personal difficulty we're experiencing in the hope that if you or a loved one may be going through something similar, know you're not alone. God is helping us, and He'll do the same for you. Believe and receive.

Recently, my husband had shoulder replacement surgery, repaired with stainless steel and plastic. Leading up to the surgery, he had to meet certain requirements that would ascertain a successful outcome. He passed with flying colors.

With all the flu going around everywhere and me coughing for three weeks prior to surgery, we were holding our breath that he would not get sick. The surgery date finally arrived, he was healthy and we were chomping at the bit to get 'er done, arriving at 5:30 a.m.

The night before, he was instructed to wash completely with an anti-septic soap, which was included with the pre-op package, and the morning of surgery back in the shower at 3:30 a.m. for the same treatment. Upon arriving at the hospital, he was instructed to wipe down with anti-septic wipes. He was germ free and wrinkled at that point.

Finally, after two full hours, he was ready for surgery. I told him I loved him, we kissed goodbye and I was shown to the waiting room for my least favorite thing in the world to do — wait.

Wait. Wait. Wait. Mindless TV blathering in the room next door.

Watching people with deer-in-headlight eyes go in. Go out. Wait. Wait. Wait. Prayed. Felt the Holy Spirit's calming affect wash over me. Wait. Finally, "Kay?"

It was the doctor. Sitting almost knee-to-knee he

told me the surgery was a success, nothing extraordinary, which was very good news. He patted that adjoining knee comfortingly, telling me it would be just a bit yet while the patient was in the recovery room. With a reassuring smile, he left.

Relief flooded me. If I had known what was to come I would have flitted right over relief and dove headlong into fret. While the surgery was a success with no complications there, the aftereffects of a nerve blocker along with the anesthesia was what would become a huge stumbling block.

Finally allowing me to return to his room, we hunkered down for an overnight stay full of sleeplessness and interruptions. The nurses were simply phenomenal. They are the ones that should haul in the salaries the NFL hands out to football players. Seriously. They do life.

Just after surgery, my husband's first recollection was a nurse telling him emphatically, "Breathe. Just breathe!" Due to the nerve block, he could not take deep breaths, so he needed oxygen. Four liters of oxygen. After, just before release, the nurse on shift was astounded that he had upgraded to zero oxygen from receiving four liters just that morning. He went from a complete oxygen mask at four liters, to a nose-inserted tube with two liters and gradually, nothing at all. Amazement filled the room.

This was due to constant prayer

and my husband's absolute determination to get the heck out of there. They would not release us if his oxygen level was compromised. We walked. Up and down the hall. Used the breathing machine. Took deep breaths. Kept moving.

Everything in our bodies is stressed when we go through a traumatic invasion. His breathing was affected, bodily functions became sluggish. Basically, my husband's bladder went to sleep. Thus it was necessary to perform bladder scans, determining that indeed, the kidneys were working, the urine just wasn't coming out in the regular manner. To remedy that, a catheter was inserted in the bladder. Not once, not twice, but three times and because he could not eliminate, one was inserted for the ride home and dealt with there for ...?

The things once thought were important I scoff at and ignore, routines out the window. My entire focus is taking care of my husband, being optimistic, helpful, not talking so much, dissolving in a flood of tears at times, resulting from sheer exhaustion and self-doubt. I am no nurse. I hover. He tells me, "Quit worrying so much." Tearfully I tell him, "I'm not worrying, I'm fussing. Worrying doesn't do anything; fussing does something. There's a difference."

Oh, the prayers lifted up by our family and friends, the pleas for divine help and the relief that comes from turning it over to Him. The circumstances may not change, but how I look at them does.

Our neighborhood. What can I say? We are so extremely blessed. One day at church (this was before the surgery when I was fretting about feeding the animals and plowing snow, beseeching the Father, "How can I do all of this?"), our neighbor and my husband were talking. He had just sold his cows after 40-plus years of milking twice a day, every single day.

"Got something for me to do?" he asked.

Say what?

He lives just down the road. They talked. He drives his bucket tractor over every day to feed our Angus, and if it snows, he'll plow our driveway and yard. Our other neighbors offered, and then delivered, ready-to-heat food. I received this food after our daughter in Texas had texted us her friend had just prayed for someone to deliver a meal to us.

Sometimes answered prayer makes my head spin. Why? Why are His children surprised? I think it's because a grateful heart, not expecting, is simply awed when it happens.

Physical therapy, as he's able, is coming along slowly but surely. This catheter is a stumbling block, complicated and time consuming, and just plain yucky, interfering with his thought-out time table. Concern about infection, and performing the cleaning, etc., makes me unsure, questioning myself. It's very hard to see my strong, hard-working farmer husband toddle and shuffle here and there inside the house, totally dependent on me.

Because of the many prayers and encouragement we've received from so many people, we remain upbeat and positive and do see a faint light beckoning at the end of a long tunnel. For now, we just take it one day at a time, sometimes moment-by-moment. With the help of family, friends and neighbors, and because of our deep faith and trust in our Heavenly Father, we'll press on, for we know from whom our help comes.

Menominee Indian girls pull away from Gresham

Beaulieu-Morgan scores 35 points to lead Eagles

KESHENA — The Menominee Indian High School girls basketball team used a 19-3 run to end the game to claim a Central Wisconsin Conference crossover matchup against Gresham on Tuesday.

Up 48-43 and giving several starters a breather on the bench, Menominee Indian's second unit helped the team extend its lead.

The big run started with a bucket from freshman Kaysha Wilber after she grabbed on offensive rebound.

After Gresham sophomore Valarie Cervený answered with a field goal, Menominee Indian junior Mimi Beaulieu-Morgan delivered two clutch 3-pointers to push the host's lead to 12 — Beaulieu-Morgan's first triple turned into a four-point play after she was fouled on her follow through.

Freshman Mariah Fish's fast-break bucket pushed the lead up to 14 before the Eagles' starters returned. Another basket from Beaulieu-Morgan forced a Gresham timeout with 3:22 to play.

"I had a substitution group. We put a man-to-man press on. I think it was down to five points (the team's lead) and they brought it back up to 12," said Menominee Indian coach Michael Skenadore on the run. "Those are some of our younger players and we're really happy for them to get out and get some good time on the court."

Gresham junior Kaylee Bohm hit a free throw with 3:07 to play, but it was the final point the Wildcats scored in the contest.

Beaulieu-Morgan scored Menominee Indian's final two points in the contest, capping a 35-point performance. The junior hit six 3-pointers in the game, scoring 17 points in the opening half and 18 more in the final 18 minutes.

The win could be a turning point in the Eagles' season, as the team had dropped several tight games this season before finishing off Tuesday's game strong.

"It's a big confidence boost for us because we're a team that really gets down on ourselves — not each other, but ourselves. So, once we see that we can do things (closing a game out instead of coming up short) then we go into the next game thinking we're going to do a lot better because we learned more from the last game," said Beaulieu-Morgan.

It was a pair of Beaulieu-Morgan triples that helped the Eagles out to

a 14-0 lead to start the game.

Gresham responded with 19 of the next 24 points to tie the game with about five minutes to play in the first half. Cervený led the way for the Wildcats, scoring 12 of those points.

The teams traded buckets over the next couple minutes before Gresham junior Makayla Belongia knocked down three 3-pointers in just over a minute to put the Wildcats up seven, 30-23.

Menominee Indian ended the wild first half on a 8-0 run to take a lead into halftime. Senior Senihseah Wayka hit a triple and converted an and-one opportunity before

Beaulieu-Morgan stole the ball and converted a layup in the final seconds of the half.

Wayka and senior Alyssa Corn each finished with eight points for Menominee Indian, while sophomore Alezaha King added seven.

During Menominee Indian's big runs in each half, Gresham turnovers were a big part of the story.

"They (Menominee Indian) outplayed us in the second half," said Richard Belongia, who served as the team's head coach for the game with Newell Haffner home ill. "They didn't turn over the ball and we did. They put together a good half and we didn't."

"In the second half, we just made a lot of dumb turnovers. We weren't really working as a team — we just kind of fell apart," said Cervený, who led the team with 20 points.

Clintonville senior among the state's best rebounders

CLINTONVILLE — The Clintonville High School girls basketball team entered the season trying to replace an injured senior (Lizzy Weatherwax) and thinking some younger players might need to really step up. Senior Erin Viergutz has helped the team overcome some of the concerns and has the team in the thick of the North Eastern Conference race.

The post player has been a force on each side of the court, averaging 17.3 points, 13.9 rebounds (which ranks fourth-best in the entire state) and 2.3 steals per game as of Wednesday. Entering the week, she was the conference's top rebounder and fourth-best scorer.

"I don't know where we would be without Erin," said Clintonville coach Nick Yaeger. "Her game has really evolved over the last couple of years. She has always had that down low presence, but now she can shoot outside and also bring the ball up the court. She is very competitive. She leads by example."

Viergutz scored over 10 points in 10 of the team's first 11 games, tallying a season-high 28 points against Shawano on Dec. 3 and Marinette on Jan. 7. She also had a 24-point performance against New London on Dec. 9 and a 21-point game against Little Chute on Dec. 13.

The senior has pulled down 10 more more rebounds in eight of the first 11 games. She grabbed 28 rebounds against Shawano and 18 against Fox Valley Lutheran on Jan. 10.

This is the time of year when ice fishing's heating up, archery season's winding down, predator hunting is starting and planning for the coming year's adventures as you huddle around a fireplace with a hot chocolate and a notebook is a relaxing way for any outdoors lover to spend the weekend.

My current accumulation of paper clutter includes two noteworthy items: The All-Canada Show Guide, obtained from a mountain-sized stack of them at the Green Bay Cabela's store, and a 60-page catalog of hunting and fishing trips called Worldwide Trophy Adventures that I strongly suspect landed in my mailbox because of that same visit to Cabela's.

I skimmed through the All-Canada Show newspaper rather quickly, disappointed that there was very

little information on hunts. I think we all know Canada is a great place to fish, and most outfitters are going to treat you well, feed you well and maybe even give you free minnows.

But the ads that

would more likely draw me to the show this weekend at Green Bay's Oneida Casino Radisson Hotel and Conference Center would be those for trophy whitetails, predators or bears.

But the thick catalog of outdoors trips that I mostly can't afford burned up at least an hour of my valuable TV-watching time. Most of us have dreamed about African hunts, and I still hope to get there someday, either for plains game (semi-affordable) or dangerous game like Cape buffalo, leopards and other ornery critters (possible if I get really lucky on a scratch-off ticket, which I rarely buy).

A good friend and I have long discussed some wingshooting ad-

ventures, and the catalog was stuffed with dove hunting trips in Argentina, perdiz hunts in Uruguay (I had to look that one up, too — it's a red-legged partridge) and waterfowl hunts in Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan. Let the dreaming begin.

Anyone who's gone on an out-of-state or out-of-country hunting or fishing trip knows that planning is nearly as much fun as the trip itself. One lasts for months, and as we add to the gear list and preparations, we realize that everything's nearly perfect.

Then we actually go on the trip, forgetting the little things like sock liners and Chapstick and Chigarid (I got the worst case of chiggers I ever had on a Texas javelina and predator hunt a few years back), and suddenly realize that even though the trip is not perfect, it's the absolute best thing you could be doing for those few, precious days. Work and probably family are hundreds or thousands of miles away, and you should have been doing this years ago.

Planning such a trip or even talking about it is going to make your life better, if only for a few moments, hours or days. Doing it can be life-changing.

Right now, I'm preparing to go backpacking with another friend who has lost 90 pounds. I need to lose some weight myself, and walking around a mall or neighborhood just isn't going to hold my attention. The closest I've come to backpacking is a pair of Wyoming antelope hunts (one with bow, one with rifle), but we camped inside a rancher's mobile home, not a tent, and only walked a couple miles a day at best. This ol' hoss could use some exercise, and just practicing for the adventure with a heavy backpack is going to be more fun than trekking through the food court at Fox River Mall.

And if your dreaming is drifting toward the water, the WBAY Boat Show is Saturday and Sunday at Green Bay's KI Convention Center.

Remember, it doesn't matter if you actually buy a new boat, set up a trophy hunt or make it to a Canadian lodge — you'll have almost as fun huddling with a buddy or two at an outdoors show or even at home, dreaming of your next adventure outdoors.
