4 die in Oconto house fire

Notification of
relatives was still
in progress early
this week

OCONTO — Counselors were made available at Oconto High School on Saturday to help grieving students after a mother and three children were killed early Friday morning in a house fire.

The wooden two-story frame house at 907 Fabry St. was fully engulfed when firefighters arrived just before 3 a.m., Fire Chief John Reed

said.

“During the suppression efforts, four individuals and one pet were found deceased in the fire scene,” Reed said in a news release Friday afternoon.

Fabry Street was closed to traffic, and police and fire personnel remained at the scene all morning. Shortly after noon, an excavator was deployed to knock down part of the house to reach the smoldering blaze.

“Our thoughts and prayers are with the family and friends of the victims as we deal with this tragic loss in our community,” Police Chief Michael Rehberg said.

As of Monday morning, the identities of the victims were not being released because local authorities were still awaiting confirmation that a close out-of-state relative had been

notified about the deaths, Rehberg said.

Oconto departments were being assisted by the state Department of Justice Division of Criminal Investigation, the Oconto County Sheriff's Office and fire departments from Oconto Falls, Little River, Pensaukee and Bellevue.

OCONTO FALLS — A volunteer who has helped a kindergarten teacher for 16 years is this year's Oconto Falls Friend of Education.

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Hansen plans to retire from state Senate

Lawmaker's nephew declares candidacy

GREEN BAY — A longtime state senator serving eastern Oconto County announced his retirement last week, two days before his nephew announced his candidacy for the job.

Sen. Dave Hansen, D-Green Bay, has represented the 30th Senate District — which stretches from eastern Brown County north to Marinette — since 2000. His announcement said he plans to serve until the end of his fifth term next January.

"I have been blessed in so many ways: meeting Jane and her agreeing to marry me, the birth of our three daughters Kathy, Cari and Christy; the addition of our three sons-in-law, who together with our daughters have further blessed Jane and me with 11 terrific grandkids and also being given the privilege to serve on the Brown County Board and in the Wisconsin State Senate," Hansen said. "I am proud to have led a life of public service for more than 40 years."

He noted that Dec. 18 was his 72nd birthday, "and as much as it has become a cliché in politics, I truly am retiring to spend more time with my family."

Hansen survived a recall election in 2011 that was launched after he and 13 other Democratic state senators fled to Illinois in an attempt to prevent a quorum and a vote on what eventually became Act 10, a spending bill that altered collective bargaining

laws affecting public employees.

"I will miss the many friends I have made in the Legislature and state government just as I look forward to continuing the many friendships I have made back home as a state senator," he said. "It truly has been a privilege to represent what I consider to be the best place in the world, with the best people, to live and raise a family."

Jonathon Hansen, a mortgage lender at Nicolet National Bank, is serving a second two-year term on the De Pere City Council. He said he plans to campaign on pragmatic solutions to help district residents.

"I will work to ban taxpayer dollars from going to companies that ship jobs overseas or out-of-state, oppose corporate welfare, fight to protect family farms and reduce property taxes by closing the 'dark store' loophole," he said. "I will also prioritize cleaning up PFAS contamination while holding the perpetrators accountable, and directing state economic development assistance to small businesses that create jobs right here in northeast Wisconsin."

In Oconto County, the district includes the city of Oconto and towns of Abrams, Little River, Little Suamico, Oconto, Pensaukee and Stiles.

Suring man gets 10 years for meth sales

Bunch also faces charges in Indiana

GREEN BAY — A rural Suring man found with more than a pound of methamphetamine and a gun in his house was sentenced Jan. 15 in federal court to 10 years in prison and seven years' supervised release for distributing methamphetamine.

Jamie A. Bunch, 50, was arrested in Oshkosh last July while delivering more than 1.76 ounces of methamphetamine to a confidential informant. A search warrant executed at Bunch's Suring residence recovered more than 500 grams of methamphetamine, a handgun loaded with hollow point ammunition, digital scales and drug packaging materials, according to court documents.

Bunch was on release from a methamphetamine distribution charge pending in Indiana at the time of his arrest in Oshkosh. He also had a 2006 conviction for cocaine possession in Henry County, Indiana.

Bunch has been detained since his arrest. U.S. District Judge William Griesbach had refused to release him citing Bunch's alleged drug dealing in Wisconsin while being prosecuted for the same offense in Indiana, and the potential lengthy sentence he faced in federal court in Wisconsin.

Bunch pleaded guilty in October to possession methamphetamine with the intent to distribute. In exchange for his guilty plea, Assistant

U.S. Attorney William Roach agreed to dismiss the firearm charge, which carried a mandatory consecutive five-year sentence.

Because of the amount of methamphetamine involved in the case, Bunch faced 10 years to life in prison. His attorney, Thomas Phillip, and Roach agreed to jointly recommend that Bunch be sentenced to 13 years in prison.

Phillip wrote the court that 13 years in prison was sufficiently to promote respect for the law and hold Bunch accountable for his actions. Also, Bunch faces additional prison time depending on the outcome of the Indiana case.

Instead, Griesbach imposed a 10-year term citing Bunch's age, his willingness to plead guilty, and the fact that the longest sentence he had served prior to this conviction was just nine months, Roach said.

"(The judge) said 10 years was a fair and just sentence," Roach said.

Unlike other drug investigations, Roach said, Bunch was arrested after only one controlled buy. That, and the search of his residence that recovered the approximately pound of methamphetamine, constituted the evidence against him.

"The investigation was short but significant," Roach said.

After completing his federal sentence in Wisconsin, Indiana authorities have told Roach that they are interested in prosecuting Bunch, Roach said.

GILLETT — The Gillett School Board has hired Cooperative Educational Service Agency (CESA) 8 to help conduct the search for a new superintendent.

Todd Carlson plans to retire June 30 after a long career in education, including the last six years as Gillett superintendent.

The board heard presentations from CESA 8 Dec. 18 and the Wisconsin Association of School Boards on Dec. 30. After a week of deliberation CESA 8 was selected during a special meeting Jan. 7.

The board hopes to post the position soon and have the new person in place in time for a smooth transition.

Setting goals will help when gardening time returns

The new year is upon us and with it, already, gardener's dreams are becoming more and more enticing as catalogs begin to arrive and seeds begin to show up on the shelves of local garden centers.

January is a time to set goals for the gardening year, as well as a time to indulge in a little bit of a fantasy as we explore new plant varieties and botanical temptations that bloom on each and every page of our favorite garden catalogs.

Do you have goals in mind for

your goal is to try to grow food and become more self-sufficient.

the coming growing season? Are there new plants you wish to try? Are there plants that you have seen in botanical gardens or other gardens that you wish to try at home? Maybe

Whatever your garden dreams are for the coming year, you can make them happen.

One of my immediate suggestions is, of course, to simply spend more time in the garden. We all get so busy with "things" and "activities" that we often forget to spend some time in the garden each and every day.

Ideally, the time spent in the garden should vary by day. Don't fall into the habit of only going into the garden at certain times of the

day, because you have no idea what you will miss. Different things in bloom, different creatures visiting the garden, different lighting that often transforms the garden into a whole new perspective.

Spend some time in your garden after dark, as well. This may sound silly at first thought, but when you walk into your garden beneath the moonlight and begin to let your eyes adjust, your garden plants take on a whole new life after the sun goes down. Some colors seem

to glow, almost neon, in the night garden. Plants in silver, white, pale yellow, pale blue and other colors take on a whole new life after the sun sets.

After dark, you may notice a whole new fragrance in the garden, as well. Many annuals and perennials put forth their strongest fragrance at night to attract night-flying pollinators such as moths and other insects.

Another suggestion for a garden goal for the coming year, if you haven't already done so, is to start your own compost pile or compost bin in your backyard. Nothing beats treasured garden gold as a top dressing and soil amendment in just about any garden bed or border. The best part is it's free. You don't need to spend a ton of money to start your own compost pile for composting.

Along the same lines, another resolution is to install a rain barrel or a rain garden planting. Both are excellent ways to conserve rainwater and prevent harmful runoff directly into our precious waterways.

With a rain barrel, rainwater can be stored for long periods of time to be used to water your garden plants. A rain garden filters rainwater naturally and slowly into the water table and provides a source of stunning beauty, using native wildflowers and grasses.

Many gardeners have a goal each year to grow more food at

home but end up frustrated or not meeting this goal. Try making it more fun by growing unusual varieties of fruits, vegetables and root crops that you may not find anywhere else. If you have children, grow fun and exciting plants to keep the kids excited as the growing season matures.

Try growing food in a different way. There are many fun and exciting ways to grow crops that go beyond traditional rows. Try companion planting or vertical gardening; try some of the fun and unusual ways to grow potatoes and onions, such as in containers or raised beds or straw bales.

Another simple resolution that comes as a surprise to many gardeners is to grow more houseplants. For some reason, outdoor gardeners are often intimidated at the thought of growing indoor plants. There is a misconception out there that houseplants are so much harder to take care of.

Give a few a try this winter season. Many are extremely tolerant of poor conditions and will do well. Easy-to-grow plants such as snake plants, ZZ plants, philodendron, succulents and even herbs make the gardening season even more enjoyable.

Oconto Falls boys fall to Clintonville

Panthers on wrong side of 2nd-half run

OCONTO FALLS — The Oconto Falls High School boys basketball team could not recover from an early second-half run in a 67-55 North Eastern Conference loss to Clintonville on Friday.

The visiting Truckers went on an 18-2 run in the second half to break open a game that Oconto Falls controlled for most of the first half.

"I thought we had some poor offensive possessions. It's not like we were missing good shots — we were taking some bad shots," said Oconto Falls coach Gary Regal. "That was the tale of the second half. At crucial times, even when we got back into it, we started forcing some things and then had two (defensive) possessions

in a row where we lost our guy and gave two wide-open 3s. That really hurt us."

Down 47-34 with 11 minutes, 39 seconds to play, Oconto Falls was able to bring the score within 10 points on multiple occasions, but it couldn't string enough defensive stops with points on the offensive end together to overcome the deficit.

Jarod Parsons converted two straight field goals to make it a seven-point game, 49-42, with just under six minutes to play, but Clintonville responded with an and-one.

Panther senior Zach Parsons answered with a three-point play of his own, only to have Clintonville hit a 3-pointer on the other end to make it a 10-point game with 4:25 to play.

After the Truckers pushed the lead back up to 13 points, Oconto Falls got field goals from senior Joey Walters and Jarod Parsons before a free throw from senior Mitchell Manns made it 58-50 with 1:47 to play.

Clintonville was able to seal its win from the free-throw line, converting its next six attempts to go back up 14.

Junior Garrett Vervelde hit a triple and Jarod Parsons converted another shot down the stretch, but the hosts eventually ran out of time.

"They started hitting some 3s. We had some mental lapses on defense where guys weren't covering where they were supposed to and they just started hitting 3s," said Jarod Parsons of the early second-half run by Clintonville. "On the offensive end, they started to pressure us a little bit more and then we just couldn't get back in our rhythm."

Jarod Parsons converted seven field goals in the game and led Oconto Falls with 16 points. Walters added 12 points, while Manns had 10.

Despite allowing Clintonville to score on its first three offensive possessions of the game, it was the Panthers that were able to work out to

an 18-9 lead. Manns scored six points during the run, while Jarod Parsons converted a pair of and-ones and had eight points.

Clintonville was able to trim the deficit to two, but then had its leading scorer (Aiden Polzin) go to the bench with two fouls.

The Panthers looked to be on their way to taking over the game in the final minutes of the half after going up 30-24 on a Manns' 3-pointer, but Clintonville grabbed the momentum by ending the half on a 5-0 run.

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New charges filed in child sex assault case

OCONTO — The defendant in a child sexual assault case has been accused of an earlier attack on the same victim.

Christopher C. Royce, 32, of Mountain, was charged last April after the then-13-year-old girl told her mother about the assault, which allegedly happened Nov. 23, 2018. According to the criminal complaint, Royce agreed to drive her home at the request of her parents, who were his friends, but instead he allegedly drove to a secluded area and assaulted her in his car.

During a court hearing Jan. 13 that was originally planned as the final conference before a trial that would have occurred this week, a new complaint was filed charging Royce with a second count of first-degree sexual assault of a child and two counts of child enticement for sexual contact.

The complaint details an incident in July 2018 during which Royce and the girl allegedly walked to a secluded area, where he is accused of kissing and inappropriately touching her several times. The girl only

recently came forward to talk about the earlier incident.

Bond was set at \$50,000 cash, and a preliminary hearing was scheduled to have taken place Tuesday.

The case had already taken an unusual turn when two men were charged with threatening a witness in the case.

Court documents indicate that April 12, two men wearing camouflage bandanas broke into a Townsend area home brandishing weapons and told the homeowner that he “needed to recant his statement regarding a sexual assault case against Christopher Royce.”

Paul Chartrand, 37, of Oconto Falls, pleaded no contest to witness intimidation and is now serving three years of probation after a 10-year term of prison and extended supervision was imposed and stayed.

On Friday, Tracy Raymond Sullivan, 53, of De Pere, pleaded no contest to a charge of burglary while armed with a dangerous weapon. Judge Michael T. Judge scheduled sentencing for March 27 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.
