New voting machines rolled out and ready

Tuesday's primary first 'live' use of machines in most municipalities

OCONTO — The first election using Oconto County's brand-new voting machines is a small one, but County Clerk Kim Pytleski isn't taking any chances.

With a state Supreme Court primary the only race to be decided Tuesday, Pytleski said she would usually order enough ballots to cover about a 6% voter turnout. She ordered for 25% just in case.

"I would love it if we had a 25% turnout. That would be spectacular," she said Friday. "I don't anticipate that."

Supreme Court Justice Daniel Kelly is facing a challenge from Jill Karofsky, a Dane County circuit judge, and Ed Fallone, a Marquette University law professor. The two top vote-getters will advance to the April 7 election with a 10-year term on the state's highest court at stake.

The expected light turnout will help municipal clerks and poll workers — and voters — become familiar with the newly purchased ImageCast Evolution precinct tabulation hardware. It replaces the Edge system, where people voted electronically on a touchscreen, and their choices were printed out on a roll of paper that served as the official record.

Except for the towns of How, which will make the switch in April, and Underhill, which will get new machines later this year, voters next week will be handed a paper ballot to mark and then feed into a single machine to count the votes electronically.

The local clerks went through a training session last month before the machines were distributed around the county. Pytleski said it's been a positive experience so far but admits

there's a level of anxiety.

"It is not easy to move from one piece of equipment to another at any point, but in a presidential year — four elections — there's just a lot of added stress simply from what's on the ballot," she said.

The Edge machines were in place already when Pytleski became county clerk more than 10 years ago, and she said they served the county well over that decade.

"With all the recounts and recalls and everything that we had, it was

spot on, because you can't accidentally cross over party lines or overvote a ballot or things like that," she said.

Those kinds of user error are now a greater possibility. If a voter makes a technical mistake like voting for both a Republican and a Democrat in partisan primaries, the machine will reject the ballot. Poll workers will then "spoil" the ballot and give the voter a new sheet; voters have up to three chances to get it right.

"The biggest message I'm asking voters is to have patience," Pytleski said. "What I've told all of the poll workers is to slow down."

Officials prefer that voters use the pens that will be placed in the polling booths – Papermate Flairs, chosen for their quick-drying ink – and absentee voters can use any ball-point pen. Pytleski cautioned especially not to use Sharpies, which can bleed through a double-sided ballot and confuse the results, or glitter pens, which can muck up the machinery.

One advantage the new machines have over the old system is greater ease of use for people with disabilities who need help marking the ballot. In Americans with Disabilities Act mode, it even fills in any not-quite-perfect marks so the ballot can't be distinguished from others, thus preserving the privacy of the voter's choices.

With foreign interference in U.S. elections a campaign issue for nearly four years now, election security is a hot topic.

"We are really being watched on what we do. I don't mean to sound critical, but Iowa didn't help," Pytleski said, referring to problems tabulating the results of the Iowa Democratic caucuses last week. "My fear is, I don't want confidence to go down based on what somebody else

does. Look at our work."

The city, village and town clerks serving across Oconto County do great work, she said.

"I mean, they put their heart and soul into making Election Day a good day for everyone," Pytleski said.

Hackers from Russia, Ukraine or anywhere can't manipulate the results because the system is not connected to the internet in any way. The free-standing machines tabulate

the precinct's results, which are then hand-delivered to the clerk's office by the next day. The results are called, emailed or faxed to Pytleski, who takes care to call them "unofficial results" until confirmed when they actually arrive at her office.

"The way Russia could impact Kim Pytleski is by undermining people's confidence in my ability to do my job," she said.

Although voter confidence might be shaken, the results are the results, Pytleski said. The ImageCast Evolution system contains "multi-factor authentication" practices to ensure there is no tampering.

In the event of a recount, the county is small enough that the paper ballots can be efficiently recounted by hand in a public meeting.

They can be tedious, but Pytleski admits she actually likes recounts, which usually reveal that the votes were tallied accurately on Election Night.

"I like them because I get to show everybody, 'Look, we did a good job,'" she said.

All polling sites will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday for the spring primary election. Wisconsin's partisan presidential primary is scheduled to coincide with the spring general election April 7.

OFHS dance captains compete at state level

Two come home with state recognition

OCONTO FALLS — For the first time in the history of the Oconto Falls High School dance team, two members have taken home state titles.

Senior captains Autumn Payette and Emma Howey and junior Brett Norling were recognized at Monday's Oconto Falls School Board meeting for representing the school as soloists in the state dance competition at the La Crosse Civic Center on Feb. 1. Howey and Norling were named to the All-State Team.

The team made history by having all three soloists advance to the state competition.

The dance team competed in D4 Pom and D3 Hip Hop at the Wisconsin Association of Cheer/Pom Coaches Eastern Regionals at Kimberly High School on Jan. 25, with the three soloists advancing to state.

All three competed with jazz solos that they personally choreographed, and each was scored in front of a panel of state judges.

Being chosen for the All-State Team is the highest level of placement a dancer can receive in Wisconsin, and the Oconto Falls varsity squad is celebrating these history-making placements, coach Laura Kostreva said.

Great Lakes remain at record highs

Local officials working together to help residents prepare for spring flooding

OCONTO — It's not a question of if, but when, flooding will happen along the bay shore this spring, Oconto County and municipal leaders warned in an update for bay shore residents last week.

County officials are working with the towns of Little River, Oconto, Pensaukee, Little Suamico and the city of Oconto to monitor and provide preparedness information to residents.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Detroit District, announced that January 2020 water levels were higher on all lakes than they were in January 2019, and are expected to continue that trend into the spring and summer.

According to Corps records, lakes Michigan and Huron both set new record high January levels, previously set in 1987. Lake Superior set new record high January levels previously set in 1986. Lake St. Clair tied its record high level set in January 1986.

"It is likely that water levels on lakes Michigan and Huron will set new monthly mean record high levels over the next six months," said John Allis, chief of the Great Lakes Hydraulics and Hydrology Office, Detroit District. "This sets the stage for coastal impacts and damages in 2020 similar to, or worse than, what was experienced last year."

The Corps urges those impacted by the high water levels of 2019 to prepare for similar or higher levels

again in 2020. The most recent six-month forecast of Great Lakes water levels shows water levels continuing to be well above average and near record high levels over this period.

Affected areas of the Bay Shore and Oconto River flooding areas are in the planning and watch stage, local officials said in a news release.

"Officials are committed and focused on preparing for upcoming flooding events," the release said. "Citizens will play a critical role in

this matter. More information and flood preparedness meetings will be scheduled in the near future."

The release listed actions property owners can take to prepare and protect their property include:

- Look into getting flood insurance.
- Many people are relying on sump pumps, have a battery back up for it.
- Move items you want to protect to higher ground, such as shelves.

- Check in on neighbors, especially the elderly to see what help they need to prepare.

- Have a plan for pets.

- If you're asked to evacuate, do so. The decision to evacuate is not made lightly and officials really need residents to evacuate.

- It takes time to set up a shelter, so arrange a place in advance of where you'll go in the event of evacuation.

- Sign up for Code Red. Go to www.co.oconto.wi.us click on "Code Red" to sign up for weather updates and emergency alerts.

Late winter and spring is a period of seasonal rise on all of the Great Lakes due to increased rainfall and runoff. Water levels typically peak in the summer or early fall. Significant erosion continues in many locations as water levels remain extremely high. Strong storm systems and resulting large waves have led to substantial erosion along much of the Great Lakes coastline.

Residents can find additional information on the Oconto County website (www.co.oconto.wi.us), where under quick links (Southern Oconto County Flooding) there will be a frequently asked questions list. The latest information can be found on the Facebook page Oconto County Sheriff's Office.

The Detroit District Corps of Engineers monitors and forecasts Great Lakes' water levels and provides the data and analysis at www.lre.usace.army.mil.

Notice is hereby given of a spring primary election to be held in Oconto County on the 18th day of February 2020, at which the officers named below shall be nominated. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Paper Ballots are Used

The voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

When using an electronic ballot marking device ("ImageCast Evolution-ICE") to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall touch the screen or use the keypad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone in a manner that would reveal how the ballot is marked.

Spoiled Ballots

If the voter spoils a paper or optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall deposit the voted ballot in the ballot box or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit and shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit.

After an official touch screen ballot is cast, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Pesticide applicator training session planned

OCONTO FALLS — A pesticide applicator training session is being offered this winter for any Oconto or Marinette county agricultural producers needing to recertify or become certified to apply restricted-use pesticides.

Anyone wanting to purchase and/or apply restricted-use pesticides for agricultural production must become certified by either attending the sessions or taking a self-study exam. The cost is \$40 for the five-year license, reference book and educational session materials.

As rules change every year, any producer who applies pesticides on a for-hire basis should review their need to be private vs. custom applicator certified. Any certified pesticide applicator can apply pesticides on a for-hire basis on up to 500 acres for three or fewer producers, which includes the application of propionic acid as a hay preservative. If anyone applies on more than that amount, they need to be certified as a custom applicator.

Although not necessary, it is recommended that any person who uses pesticides of any sort learn about proper pesticide application and safety principles by attending. Farm employees also benefit from getting certified, even if they don't directly apply pesticides. The safety lessons learned at this session may save your farm from a problem in the future.

The next session is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Feb. 28 at Oconto Falls Community Library, 251 N. Main St.

Local sessions are facilitated by crops and soils agent Scott Reuss and sponsored by Oconto and Marinette County Extension offices. Training materials must be purchased through the Marinette County Extension office; call them at 715-732-7510, e-mail sreuss@marinettecounty.com or stop at the office in the Marinette County Courthouse. Coordinating the self-study option should be done via the same methods.

Blueberries require patience from home gardener

Extension educations notes they are 'very different critter'

SHAWANO — Blueberries are an exercise in patience because they're "a very different critter from basically anything else we grow," Scott Reuss, Marinette County University of Wisconsin-Extension educator, told 118 people interested in growing the fruit Jan. 30 at Qualheim's True Value Hardware.

The presentation was one of a series of how-to sessions for home gardeners.

Although he covered the spectrum of growing and maintaining blueberries, Reuss concentrated on soil preparation and maintenance in his light-hearted introduction to the temperamental crop.

This included his tongue-in-cheek planting advice, "Roots go down, stems go up."

"This is the one where there isn't much leeway when it comes to taking care of your soil," he said.

He was firm in saying, "Don't buy your plants until your soil is ready" and that could take an entire year.

Productive soil starts with siting the blueberry patch, he said.

"Look up, look down, look around. Find full sun or your fruit production is going to suffer," he added.

They like well-drained wet soil with high levels of organic matter and really don't like frost pockets, the Extension educator said.

Also be aware of blueberries' need for water, he cautioned, especially if you have to carry buckets any distance. In a drought year, he said, every mature shrub will need upwards of 100 gallons nearly daily.

Blueberries absolutely require a fairly acid soil, with a pH of 4.5 to 5, he said. The average pH in our area is 6.5, he said. One reason that iron, an essential part of blueberry growth, is taken up by the fruit better in soils with a lower pH.

In much of southeastern Shawano County and southern Oconto County, limestone is very near the surface and growing blueberries is really not an option, he cautioned. One possible approach, accord-

ing to Reuss, is work in a lot of elemental sulfur, up to four pounds for a typical 10 foot by 10 foot plot, at least 12 inches below the surface and wait a year. An alternative is serviceberries, also known as juneberries, although they have seeds more like grapes, Reuss said.

Take in a soil sample for an analysis from precisely where you plan to plant the blueberries down to the square yard, he advocated. "Just make sure it's an accredited lab," he added.

Reuss said gardeners need to remember most of Shawano County falls in Zone 4, a measure of plant hardiness. Reuss said gardeners want blueberries rated Zones 4 "or at least Zone 5 if you're willing to try it." As an illustration of the hardiness zone scale, Reuss said, "Your living room is probably Zone 7, depending on how cold you let it

get overnight."

"Not only do they need really low pH's, they don't have the same kind of root structure as any other plant that you grow in your garden. They don't have root hairs," Reuss said.

Unlike other plants, blueberries have to rely on what Reuss called their "true roots" for nutrient uptake. That's why gardeners need to add abundant amounts of organic matter, he added. Leaves in the fall, including conifer needles, are the cheapest alternative, he said. Although sphagnum moss is an alternative, Reuss said it's not a sustainable resource and one to avoid.

"Mulch matters. It is a big deal," Reuss said, adding mulch aids in weed control and more efficient water retention.

Grass clippings can be part of the mulch but need to be mixed with other, coarser, more stable materials

like wood chips and bark chips. Do not use butternut or black walnut leaves, he said. Conifer needles actually benefit blueberries but also can invite meadow voles and other pests.

Mulch provides temperature modification.

"By having the mulch on there, we keep the soil and the roots at a much more stable temperature," Reuss said.

This is important because of blueberries' intolerance of drought conditions, he added.

"Their roots will literally cook," he said.

From planting, there are another few years before you can start reliably harvesting fruit, Reuss said. In that respect, blueberries are no different than raising a fruit tree "because it's also a woody plant," he added.

Home gardeners should consider the "half-high" blueberries, hybrids between the "high" and mostly-wild "low" varieties, Reuss said. Most of the available varieties came from plant breeders at the University of Minnesota, assuring their hardiness.

Reuss listed these varieties as being adapted to this area: North-blue, Northcountry, St. Cloud, Patriot, Bluecrop, Pink Popcorn and Bluecrop.

Signs of spring popping up earlier than normal

With both December and January seeing overall temperatures well above normal,

it should be no surprise that, already, the signs of spring are beginning to pop up throughout our woodlands and gardens. It won't be long before spring's official arrival, and Mother

Nature is already gearing up for the big change.

A few weeks ago, the first cardinals and chickadees began to sing their sweet spring love songs. House finches joined the chorus, as well.

The high-pitched, siren song of the cardinal is one of spring's most welcome signs and, right on schedule, cardinals in our area have begun to sing. Usually, each year about Valentine's Day, the cardinals begin to serenade the sunrise with their piercing song of joy.

Black-capped chickadees, our friendly little black and white friends, also fill our yards, gardens and woodlands with their sweetly sung love song. Many people have heard this song but have not connected it to the tiny chickadee. For most, the only sound they are familiar with from these birds is the telltale "chickadee, dee, dee" call.

Their sweet spring song is a two- or three-part whistled phrase. Some say the chickadee is singing "pee wee," while others liken the chickadee's sweet song to the word "cheeseburger." Either way, the sweet spring song of the chickadee has begun, and there is no going back.

The house finch, our glorious red finch, sings now with an explosive, continuous warbling that erupts from the treetops with a contagious energy and enthusiasm.

Soon, other songbirds will join the chorus. Mourning doves will begin to sing their forlorn love song from treetops, telephone wires and rooftops. The tufted titmouse will also burst into glorious song, though this bird is not as common here in central Wisconsin as it is in the southern part of the state.

Another sure sign of spring as the drumming of woodpeckers that has

now begun. Drumming is a different display than the sound made by feeding woodpeckers hammering on tree trunks and logs. Drumming is a purposeful, fast-paced, echoing display designed to make sure other woodpeckers in the area know that they are about to infringe upon a male's territory.

Often, woodpeckers seek out hollow logs, metal flashing on telephone poles, even our chimneys, to perform their drumming ritual as the intent is to create as much noise as possible, and the birds have discovered that certain objects create a better sound than others.

The emergence of pussy willows is another sign of spring and already, they are beginning to emerge in Waupaca, Shawano and Out-

agamie counties, as well as points south. The tiny, fur-lined catkins are bursting forth from buds set last year, protecting tiny flowers that will begin to bloom in March and April, attracting the season's first flying insect pollinators.

Speaking of pollinators, our warmth last week caused honeybees in some hives to emerge and begin taking flight in the warm sunshine. I observed honeybees drinking from snow melt puddles, even from the snow itself, to quench their thirst. See my Facebook page for the amazing video of honeybees in action.

Dogwoods are beginning to blush in bright red and willows are beginning to transform into spring amber and gold. Skunk cabbage is beginning to bloom in area wetlands. I

discovered several plants blooming at Hartman Creek State Park this past week.

On open water, many species of ducks are beginning to perform their elaborate courtship displays, many of which consist of head and neck pumping, bizarre noises and passionate dancing on the open water.

Even if winter still holds a tight grip, the signs of spring are beginning to show and, as the calendar move closer and closer to March, the changes will continue and the dreams of area gardeners and nature lovers will swell along with the growing tide of the season.

ADRC office to expand

OCONTO FALLS — Oconto County has entered into a modified lease for its Aging and Disability Resources Center to accommodate expanded services for people and their families who are dealing with dementia.

The ADRC of the Wolf River Region — which serves residents of Oconto, Shawano and Menominee counties, as well as the Stockbridge-Munsee Community — has been expanding services at its Oconto Falls satellite office at 229 Van Buren St., county Health and Human Services Director Mike Reimer told the Oconto County Board during its Jan. 23 meeting.

"The additional services are for dementia care," Reimer said. "This is a state rollout over maybe the last seven years or so. ... We hired a dementia-care specialist, and we're making efforts to get our communities to understand dementia issues in our stores and our churches and roads, those types of things."

The county has rented the office space from JMAKAS Enterprises LLC since 2013 at a cost of \$1,850

per month for 2,715 square feet. The new lease provides an additional 476 square feet for \$395, bringing the total to 3,191 square feet at a monthly rent of \$2,245.

Federal and state funds pay for the ADRC's budget, so the money does not come from the county property tax, Reimer said.

Supervisor David Parmentier questioned the need to rent space rather than purchase a building for the ADRC.

"That's quite a chunk of cash for rent in Oconto Falls," Parmentier said.

Reimer said when the ADRC started, the department looked at buildings in Oconto Falls, Gillett and Lena, and this was the best alternative in terms of the amount of space available that could be compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act. The state has spent about \$100,000 to date on renovations.

"We chose this building because it is centrally located," Reimer said. "Everybody goes through Oconto Falls in the entire county, and it's worked out pretty well for us."

The board voted 30-0 to approve the new lease.

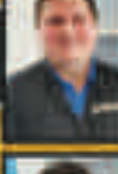

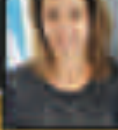

Falls dominant in final regional tune-up

Panthers post 3-0 dual record

OCONTO FALLS — The Oconto Falls High School wrestling team turned in a strong showing at a home quad Friday in its last action before regionals, posting a 3-0 dual record and having several wrestlers shine on the mat.

Oconto Falls opened the night with a convincing 64-9 win over Sheboygan South before tougher wins over Green Bay Preble (45-24) and Kewaunee (42-28).

"I am happy with both the outcome and the effort at the quad," said Oconto Falls coach David Brasier. "Our last couple weeks of the season, we have met with some pretty good competition — Luxemburg-Casco, Coleman, Wrightstown, Denmark and the Pulaski invite — and our guys struggled through. I believe the quad showed the benefits of wrestling that tough competition. We won most of the close matches, (three) in overtime, only gave up a couple pins and showed determination and grit — especially in the third period."

Brasier also said the team's showing was even more promising because a few starters were out with an illness or injury.

Sophomores Graeson Pankratz, Clayton Whiting and Jacob Kaminski, juniors Aidan Stary and Elijah Zielinski and seniors Brendan Konitzer and Tyler Budz all finished the night with perfect records for Oconto Falls.

"The night I had gives me a lot of confidence because I was working on particular moves at practice, and they worked for me," said Budz, who is just two wins shy of 100 in his high school career.

In its win over Sheboygan South, Oconto Falls only dropped two weight classes, with one of those being a forfeit.

Konitzer (113), Budz (138), Kaminski (182), Zielinski (285), sophomore Weston Borkovec (145) and freshman Mitchell Kallies (220) all won by pin for the Panthers.

Freshman Luke Trepanier (126)

and sophomore Jeremy Caldwell (195) came up clutch, each getting take-downs for sudden victories in overtime.

Stary (160) dominated on his way to a major decision win, while Pankratz (106), Whiting (170) and sophomore Jaden Ganter (120) all won by forfeit for the Panthers.

In Oconto Falls' win over Preble, Ganter got the dual started with an overtime win at 120 pounds. Trepanier (126) then earned six points after his opponent had to concede with an injury before Budz (132) won a decision to give the hosts a 12-0 lead.

Oconto Falls dropped the next three weight classes — two of which were forfeits — before Stary and Whiting got the team back on track. Stary picked up a 9-8 decision win at 160 pounds before Whiting earned a pin in 1 minute, 10 seconds, at 170 pounds.

After losing by pin at the 182 class, Oconto Falls' Kaminski earned a forfeit win at 195. Preble earned a decision win at 220 pounds, but the Panthers took the final three weight classes to come away with the dual win.

Pankratz (106) won by forfeit, while Zielinski (285) and Konitzer (113) each

pinned their opponents in the first period.

"Having a 3-0 night for sure does give me a lot of confidence," said Konitzer. "I just have to continue to work hard at practice and do what I set out for."

In the Panthers' final dual of the night, the team won eight weight classes.

Budz and Borkovec earned tight decision wins at 138 and 145 pounds,

respectively, before Stary won by forfeit at 160. Whiting — the top-ranked wrestler in Division 2 at 170 pounds according to wiwrestling.com — followed with a pin in 1:32.

Oconto Falls sealed up its win with four pins. Zielinski (285) and Pankratz (106) both pinned their opponents in the first period, while Konitzer (113) got a pin in the second period and Kaminski (195) notched his pin early in the third period.

The next time Oconto Falls' wrestlers take the mat, it will be for regionals. Antigo, Clintonville/Marion, Florence/Goodman/Niagara/Pembine, Marinette, Peshtigo and Seymour will fill out the Division 2 regional that Oconto Falls will host.

"This week, we are going to work hard like any other week — fix the things we need improvement on and get ready for regionals," said Konitzer.

"In these next couple weeks heading into regionals and sectionals, we do our best to maintain a typical practice routine," said Brasier. "Most important is to get and stay healthy."

The first matches of the regional are set to begin at 10 a.m. Saturday.

The momentum carried over to the second half, as Oconto Falls scored the first 16 points to take a commanding lead. More than 11 minutes of game action passed between Marinette's last points in the first half and their first points in the second half.

goal in the contest. Her eight points Friday were well below her season average of 16-plus points per game.

"In the beginning (of the game),

"We came in with a game plan of not letting Kitzinger get to the basket. I think we did a great job of containing her, plugging the lane, forcing her to go left. The kids executed the game plan that way. Defensively, they did an outstanding job," said coach Kaczmarek.

"It was nice that we didn't have to count on her with her being our leading scorer. We knew we had to all step in tonight and just work with each other, make the right passes and not settling for 3s."

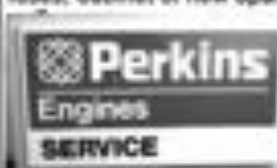

What you need to know *about Thyroid health*

With January being Thyroid Awareness Month, I want to focus on the thyroid gland—how it helps and how it can cause trouble.

The thyroid is an endocrine gland that makes, stores and releases thyroid hormones into your blood to help control your body's functions, including body temperature, weight, energy level and heart rate. It is located at the base of the neck, just below the Adam's apple, and is shaped like a butterfly with each wing, or lobe, on either side of your windpipe.

Think of the thyroid gland kind of like a moody teenager. When it is functioning properly everything is just fine: you have energy and you feel good. But when it doesn't work, life slows down to a crawl. It may be hard to be productive and you just might not feel right. When the thyroid works too much on the other hand you might be overactive. A normal thyroid gland regulates your metabolism, a catch-all term for the function of all the little systems in your body that make you you.

Just like a thermostat in your home, your thyroid gland can get set too high or too low. The most common problem associated with the thyroid gland is when it is set too high. This is called, respectively, hyperthyroidism, because of how it makes you feel. With hyperthyroidism your heart can beat faster, you can feel anxious, you might lose weight, the house might feel too warm and your hands might start shaking. There are a number of different causes of hyperthyroidism.

Dealing an overactive thyroid depends on the specific cause and can include taking medication to reduce the amount of hormone made by the thyroid gland, taking a radioactive iodine pill that actually kills off the thyroid gland cells or surgery to remove part or all of the thyroid gland.

Hypothyroidism is when the thyroid is set too low. Hypothyroidism can be caused by a mistake in your immune system where your own body attacks your thyroid gland. Usually hypothyroidism can be treated with a thyroid hormone replacement pill that is taken every day.

There are also tumors of the thyroid gland, the vast majority of which are not cancer. The ones that are cancer

make up about 3 percent. Most who see have a good primary care doctor and see him or her once a year.

There is one other thing about the thyroid gland that I find fascinating. Just about every country in the world had newborns for hypothyroidism within the first week of life. This is because there is about a one in three thousand chance that a baby will be born without the ability to make enough thyroid hormone which can lead to permanent intellectual disability and growth failure if not treated. This one small test and simple treatment can save over half a thousand children and their families from a terrible disease every year. When you think about the societal consequences to the disease, that is a remarkable win for all of us.
