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Be Great Graduate could come to Shawano

Specialist could work with at-risk high school students, be their advocate

SHAWANO — A Boys and Girls Club program that has seen success with helping at-risk students graduate in Green Bay could be coming over to the Shawano School District.

Wendy Crawford, co-chairwoman for the board for the Shawano Boys and Girls Club, presented the Be Great Graduate program to the district's executive committee on Wednesday. She recommended a specialist be hired by the district to work with students who have become disillusioned and could possibly drop out if intervention does not take place soon.

"The Green Bay Boys and Girls Club was kind of the test market for this concept," Crawford said. "This started in 2010 with the Green Bay School District and the Boys and Girls Club of Greater Green Bay. Because of the success of this program, state funding was added to include Oshkosh, Appleton, Milwaukee with a total of 35 school districts now."

The specialist would work with up to 20 at-risk students a year at the freshman level for the first two years of high school. The goal is to eventually make it so students' interest in education will return, and they'll be able to get back on track to make it through their junior and senior years, according to Crawford.

"The specialist would be a Boys and Girls Club employee, but the hiring process would be a joint process between the Boys and Girls Club and the school district," Crawford said.

The specialist would help the students to find specific academic interests and provide coaching with homework, she said. There would also be input for the students on how to take notes, prepare for tests and more.

The expected salary for the position is \$50,000. Eventually, the position would be jointly paid for three ways by the state, the district and the

local Boys and Girls Club. However, the 2020-21 school year, when this program could start in Shawano, is in the middle of the state's biennial budget, so until the Wisconsin Legislature works on a new budget next year, the club and the district would each need to come up with \$25,000 to start the program in September.

The position would not be limited to the school year, and the specialist would work with the students part-time during the summer months, as well, according to Crawford.

"The nice thing is that this position would remain connected with the students during the summer, and in the summer, they offer college field trips," Crawford said.

So far, Be Great Graduate has boasted a 92% graduation rate, according to Crawford. Shawano School District's four-year graduation rate is about 89%, according to Superintendent Randi Anderson.

"There is a percentage of students that this program targets very well," Anderson said.

Rod Watson, associate principal at Shawano Community Middle School, said he could easily think of a number of current eighth-grade students that Be Great Graduate would be perfect for.

"I could give you 40," Watson said to the committee. "Our teachers have up to 110 students each, depending on what they teach, so one of the weaknesses of secondary education is that it can be pretty bleak for students who are really seeking connections."

Nick Curran, district business manager, recalled a Green Bay newspaper story that told about how a specialist with the program not only helped one student with academics but also with obtaining a driver's license and filling out college applications.

"It's not only going to help them to graduate here, but it's also going to help that next step of getting them going to college," Curran said.

Because the Shawano Boys and Girls Club is directly affiliated with the Green Bay organization, there would be an advantage in being able to tap the group for help as the local program got off the ground, according to Crawford.

"When I was hearing this, the picture of an onion came to mind," Crawford said. "We're peeling off the layers of a student who, due to whatever the circumstances, is hardened and has checked out and who doesn't care. Little by little, that one-on-one person who is trusted and really an advocate for that student can perhaps begin to connect."

Anderson said the program is a sound one, but the trick is going to be how to raise the money — on both sides. She noted that the recently formed 100+ Women Who Care program in Shawano County might be a resource that either entity could approach for some funding.

"There's got to be other entities out there, too," Anderson said.

School board member Beth MacFarlane, who also sits on the Boys and Girls Club board, said the position's benefits makes it important that funding be sought out, especially if the state ever decides to pull funding for Be Great Graduate, which currently sits at \$2.8 million.

"You can never count on the state," MacFarlane said. "Right now, the state's saying they're very interested in this, and I think that's fabulous, but five or 10 years down the road, the state might be saying something different, and then we're stuck. I think we're better off trying to find the funding between us and the Boys and Girls Club. If we get stuff from the state, that's just a bonus."

The proposal will go before the full school board on Monday.

Woman bound over for trial in ATV crash

Dementer accused of trying to kill self, children

SHAWANO — A New London woman accused of trying to kill herself and her two children in an apparently intentional ATV crash in August was bound over for trial after a preliminary hearing Tuesday in Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court.

Samantha A. Dementer, 27, pleaded not guilty at the hearing to two counts of first-degree recklessly endangering safety in connection with the Aug. 28 crash in the town of Pella.

She could face a maximum 12½ years in prison and a \$25,000 fine on each count if convicted.

She is free on a \$12,000 signature bond and is scheduled for a pretrial conference April 28.

Assistant District Attorney Catharine White told the court Tuesday that Dementer clearly was aware of the wrongfulness of her actions, given that she begged a passerby who stopped to help after the accident not to call emergency services to respond.

White also noted that Dementer's blood/alcohol count was 0.34%, more than four times the legal driving limit of 0.08%.

Dementer's attorney, Elisabeth Stockbridge, said the state had not provided any testimony regarding the extent of the injuries to the

children and failed to show probable cause for the charges.

Judge James Habeck disagreed and said the state had shown that Dementer acted with disregard for human life, citing in particular her blood/alcohol level.

Shawano County authorities were called to the crash site on Evergreen Road near County Road D shortly after 11 p.m. Aug. 28.

Deputies found an ATV in a ditch and a woman later identified as Dementer laying on the ground crying and yelling with a baby in her arms. Another child was also on the scene.

According to the criminal complaint, Dementer exclaimed, "How could I do this to the kids?"

Authorities later learned that, while being transported to the hospital, Dementer told the ambulance crew she had crashed on purpose and was trying to kill herself and her children to be with her mother, the complaint states.

Dementer's grandmother told authorities it was the two-year anniversary of Dementer's mother's death.

Dementer later denied to authorities she had crashed the ATV intentionally. She admitted to having been drinking that day, according to the complaint.

The children, ages 2 and 4, sustained minor injuries in the crash, including scrapes and bruises.

State court primary Tuesday

Three candidates will face off Tuesday in a primary election for a seat on the state Supreme Court.

Incumbent Justice Daniel Kelly is being challenged by Marquette University Law professor Ed Fallone and Dane County Circuit Judge Jill Karofsky for a 10-year term on the bench.

The top two vote-getters will advance to the April 7 general election.

Fallone has said he wants to "depoliticize" the bench, while Karofsky has promised to end corruption.

Kelly was appointed to the bench by former Gov. Scott Walker.

Shawano County Clerk Pam Schmidt said a large turnout is not expected Tuesday, which is typical for a spring primary in which there is only one state office on the ballot.

"Comparing to 2016 and 2018 when there was about the same on the ballot, we had about 15% of the registered voters that voted in those elections," Schmidt said.

Shawano County has 22,204 registered voters.

Polls are open Tuesday from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

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Shawano Recreation Center pool manager retiring

Dave Kolitsch leaving after 33 years; will be replaced by Tara Kelliher

SHAWANO — It has been 33 years since Dave Kolitsch plunged into the deep end of being pool manager at the Shawano Recreation Center.

As he approaches the age of 57, the time has come to hang up his trunks. His last day is March 2.

It's a job he says he'll miss.

"If you stick with it that long, you either like it or you're crazy," Kolitsch said. "Some people say I'm crazy, but I think it's because I like it. You know the old saying, 'if you love your job it's not like working.'"

Kolitsch grew up in Appleton and was a competitive swimmer.

He moved to Green Bay where he worked for the YMCA and was water-front director at the YMCA summer camp.

He heard Shawano was looking for a pool manager at its recreation center and "I was lucky enough to get it," Kolitsch said.

Parks and Recreation Director Matt Hendricks likes to say Kolitsch has taught nearly the entire community how to swim during his three decades in Shawano.

Maybe not everybody, Kolitsch said, "but a lot of them."

"We usually have nine sessions of swim lessons a year," he said. "That's a lot of kids."

Many of the children he has taught have been the sons and daughters of the kids he had taught years earlier. Some have even been third generation.

"I've had some kids that took lessons and became lifeguards and actually help teach some lessons with us," Kolitsch said. "That's cool to see."

He'll also run into former swim students, adults now, who remember him when he's out and about in the community.

"They say, 'Hey, you taught me swim lessons,'" Kolitsch said. "I love those kinds of stories. Those are my favorites."

Not all of Kolitsch's swim students are children.

"Classes range from six months up through senior citizens," he said. "So we run the full gamut."

In addition to swimming lessons, the recreation center offers a variety of pool-related programs, including aerobics, paddle board yoga and Joints in Motion, which allows people with arthritis to do a little stretching.

"We teach whatever's needed, basically," "If we can find a way to do it, we'll do it."

The swim lessons are what he'll miss most about the job, he said.

"When you see the kids smile and you see the adults smile, when they realize they can do something they maybe didn't think they could do, that's my favorite part," he said.

The job also carries some heavy responsibility, particularly the training of lifeguards.

"The responsibility is probably what weighs on my mind the most," Kolitsch said. "I'm training these lifeguards. These lifeguards are watching out for other people's lives. All that responsibility."

Recruiting lifeguards can sometimes be a challenge, Kolitsch said, but the center currently has an excellent staff.

"They're almost all high school kids," he said. "They're good kids. They work hard."

Kolitsch's job of pool manager will take on a new title, becoming aquatics coordinator after he leaves, but with

the same duties.

Tara Kelliher, who has been working for the recreation center for several years in various capacities — including spending a year and a half painting the mural that surrounds the pool — will be the new aquatics coordinator.

In addition to swimming lessons, the job entails managing the pool chemicals, coordinating staff, training and certifying lifeguards, organizing swim lessons and getting that information out to the community.

"I was originally hired to paint the mural," Kelliher said. "They kept me on for different projects."

Kelliher has spent a couple of years working with Kolitsch, who had already begun thinking about retirement.

"I thought, 'that's not such a bad job,'" Kelliher said. "You get to be physical. It's not just one activity. Also, a big huge one for me is, the people here are awesome. They're a really good team. They're really encouraging. If you have a good idea, they find out a way to make it happen."

Originally from Ashwaubenon, Kelliher has been in Shawano for about 14 years.

Painting and making custom cakes has been Kelliher's part-time vocation.

"At some point, as my kids got older, I knew I would have to make a shift and go back to full time work," she said. "This seemed like the right thing."

Kolitsch said he would like to do some traveling in his camper after retirement, though that won't be his first priority.

"I tell people I'm going to sleep in on the first day and after that we'll see," he said. "I plan on relaxing but not just sitting in my recliner all the time."

Kolitsch said he'll miss the job.

"I am going to miss this," he said. "The people here are great. The patrons that come in here are fantastic. They've all been wishing me well and telling me I can't go, but then I introduce them to Tara, and they're OK with that."

Next Pulaski superintendent named

Space led Goodman-Armstrong Creek for 3 years after 2 decades in Wabeno

PULASKI — The community and the school district's approach to learning attracted Pulaski's next superintendent to the opportunity.

The Pulaski School Board announced Monday it had selected Allison Space as the next district superintendent and will begin contract negotiations.

Space has been superintendent of the Goodman-Armstrong Creek (GAC) School District for the past three years. Prior to that, she had served in Wabeno schools, including seven years as elementary principal and 12 years as a third grade teacher.

"I cannot say enough about how special GAC is. We are the second-smallest district in the state; you would never know it by what we do," Space said Thursday. "We do things differently here, but our students have many of the same experiences big schools have. We are a family: Our staff is out of this world and everyone cares about

each other."

When Space met with Pulaski school officials and community members, she said she got a sense that something similar is happening in the larger school district.

"Knowing that Pulaski is grounded in their philosophy to give students a second, third and fourth chance definitely told me they put students and families first in all of their decision making," she said. "This matches my personal philosophy of knowing that all students can grow and learn through any situation. I believe that everything is 'figure-out-able,' I believe working through problems, with all voices at the table, is important."

Space she was drawn to Pulaski when its job posting said they were looking for a leader deeply rooted in the Professional Learning Communities mindset and process, where educators meet regularly and work collaboratively to find ways to improve their teaching skills and students' academic performance.

"This told me Pulaski believes that

all students can achieve at high levels and they will do whatever it takes to achieve what is best for the learner," she said.

Pulaski's historical pride was evident as she explored the area, as well, Space said.

She became deeply invested in the GAC school community, and while she "can't wait to grow and learn together" in Pulaski, Space said she will be leaving Goodman-Armstrong Creek with a heavy heart.

"The board of education is forward thinking and does an amazing job of being there for their staff. Each and everyone involved in making the day special for our students holds a special place in my heart," she said. "So many times we have pulled together as a community and made a difference for our kids ... I am so thankful for the experiences, connections and relationships this position has given me."

Pulaski School Board President Michael Voelker said Space was picked from a group of three finalists who met with the board and two advisory pan-

els comprised of district residents, staff, faculty and administrators.

"Allison is an experienced, dynamic leader with a true passion for education," Voelker said. "She understands the

values of our community and is committed to serving our children, families and everyone who has a stake in the performance of our outstanding community schools."

Space earned her superintendent's license from Marian University and her principal's license from UW-Milwaukee. She also earned a master's degree in science from St. Norbert College and a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Silver Lake College.

The other finalists were superintendents Laurie Asher, of Seymour, and David Bridenhagen, of Shell Lake.

Space will take over as superintendent July 1.

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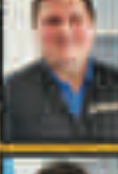

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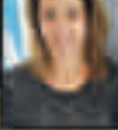

Keshena man pleads guilty to sex offenses

Incidents involve minor, adult woman

GREEN BAY — A Keshena man with a prior child sex conviction pleaded guilty Wednesday in federal court to sex offenses involving a minor and an adult female.

According to court documents, a 13-year-old girl accused Peter S. Awonohopay, 37, of sexually abusing her twice between July 4 and Aug. 15, 2018. The minor said Awonohopay came into her bedroom and lay on her bed. They were both facing the same direction.

The minor said Awonohopay took her pants and underwear down below her knees and also pulled his pants and boxer shorts down. He penetrated her anus with what she described as his "part." She said it felt uncomfortable and she pulled away and got up, dressed and left the room.

The minor told a FBI agent and a Menomonee Tribal Police detective in November that on another occasion in the summer of 2018, Awonohopay got into bed with her and

directly touched her genitals.

In an incident involving an adult female, Awonohopay, knocked on the door of a Keshena woman's residence on the night of June 17, 2019, and entered after no one answered.

Awonohopay saw the woman, identified only as Jane Doe, laying on a mattress, according to court documents. Awonohopay pulled his pants down and then pulled the blanket off the sleeping woman. He then pulled her underwear down and touched her left buttocks. He tried to roll her onto her back in order to have sexual intercourse with her when she woke up.

After the woman awoke, Awonohopay said she yelled at him. He apologized, put on his pants and shoes, and left the house.

The woman reported the sexual contact to the tribal police telling them she awoke to the defendant, who was naked from the waist down and was dragging her to the bottom of her bed. She said she yelled at him and pulled a blanket back over herself while the defendant dressed and left.

The officer arrested Awonohopay a short distance from the woman's residence and took him to jail, where he confessed, according to court documents.

Awonohopay was indicted in November for abusive sexual contact

involving the Keshena woman, and in December, he was indicted on two counts of sexual abuse of a minor.

According to the plea agreement, Assistant U.S. Attorney Andrew Maier will recommend a 13-year sentence on the sexual abuse of a minor charge plus two years in prison on the abusive sexual contact charge at his June 23 sentencing before District Judge William Griesbach.

The defense can recommend a lesser sentence for Awonohopay.

He originally faced maximum penalties of four years in prison, a \$250,000 fine and five years to lifetime supervised release on the abusive sexual contact charge. He faces maximum penalties of 10-30 years in prison, a \$250,000 fine and five years to lifetime supervised release for each count involving sexual abuse of a minor.

Griesbach will consult advisory

sentencing guidelines which factor in the seriousness of the offenses, any prior convictions and any other relevant conduct.

Griesbach sentenced Awonohopay in May 2006 to three years and five months in prison and three years' supervised release for conviction of two counts of having sex with a minor. Awonohopay's sentence also included a \$2,000 fine and a \$901 restitution order.

Griesbach subsequently revoked Awonohopay's supervised release and in January 2011, sentenced him to two years in prison for violating conditions of his release including using Oxycodone, failing to make restitution payments and having unauthorized contact with a female under 18 years of age.

Awonohopay remains in custody until sentencing.

Local seaman remembers 'The Longest Day'

Cecil veteran's ship 'invaded' France in 1961 movie

SHAWANO — The Longest Day actually lasted a week.

That was the time that the U.S. Navy's Sixth Fleet participated in filming the 1962 Darryl F. Zanuck film "The Longest Day," a documentary drama about the Allied invasion of Normandy on June 6, 1944. The invasion was the start of the final push to bring World War II in Europe to an end.

For one local veteran, it was a week he never expected when he joined the Navy in 1959.

Curtis Lienau, Cecil, was a master-at-arms on the USS Pocono AGC 16. In 1961, their tour included the Mediterranean Sea and, eventually, the French site that stood in for Omaha Beach in the film.

His ship was the communications flagship, joined by others in the background as a flotilla. Ahead of them, an armada of smaller ships created the impression of the invasion.

"They sent the little landing craft first, then the big ships in the back, with smoke coming out of their pipes," he explained. "It was such a dramatic thing with hundreds of little boats in front of you. That's what made the movie."

He estimated "thousands" of sailors were involved in the recreation of the invasion.

Lienau has seen the film and said

he found it very interesting. He couldn't pick out his ship among the many onscreen, but he said he enjoyed watching the battle and thought it was "very realistic."

Though it appeared authentic in the movie, not everything was as it seemed. The "wooden" crossed barricades on the beach were made of rubber for the filming.

One of the aspects that was realistic, though, were the explosives.

"A frogman blew his hand off setting devices to explode on the shoreline. Those were real explosives going off," Lienau recalled. He said it was the only injury that he heard of during the filming.

The filming took about a week, Lienau said. Actors were on several of the large vessels. Although many of the scenes were filmed "over and over," the actual shots of the invasion were "pretty much one time."

The officers on the Pocono were involved with the actors, he said, but most of the crew didn't get to see them. He said he was supposed to get a commendation for his part in the movie, but it never came.

The other impact of the ship's participation, he recalled, is that "we ate good. Porterhouses for 560 crew members," he said, and the 500 Marines aboard the ship.

The film is available through the Shawano County Library.

Voting should be made easy for everyone

While being a parent may arguably be the most important role many of us take on, being a good citizen is a close second.

Our democracy works best when all who can vote do vote and every vote is tamper-proof and secure. As the history of the United States shows, this was not always the case. The struggle to secure the vote has been a long and hard fight for many.

The United States Constitution did not originally define who was eligible to vote, allowing each state to determine who was eligible. In the 18th century, voting was restricted to white males with certain net worth in shillings or personal property and/or owned a certain amount of land. Beginning around 1790, individual states began to reassess property ownership as a qualification for voting in favor of gender and race.

Voting rights were not guaranteed until after the Civil War when four constitutional amendments were ratified to extend voting rights to different groups of citizens.

In 1870, non-white men and freed slaves were given the right to vote by the 15th Amendment. However, Jim Crow laws such as literacy tests, poll taxes and religious tests were implemented in some of the states and local communities.

It took until 1964 before a poll tax payment was prohibited from being used as a condition for voting in federal elections. Before the passage of the 24th Amendment, the require-

ment to pay a fee in order to vote had kept low-income citizens, both white and black, from taking part in elections.

Women weren't allowed to vote until 100 years ago when the 19th Amendment was ratified. In early America, women weren't allowed the same rights as men. Married women could neither own property nor legally claim any money they might earn.

The women's rights movement didn't organize itself as a national fight until 1848. In 1890, the National American Woman Suffrage Association lobbied for voting rights in a state-by-state basis. Women took to the streets and some were arrested for their civil disobedience. Then-President Woodrow Wilson took note, and in 1918, he came out in support of the movement. The Senate passed the 19th Amendment on June 4, 1919. A progressive Wisconsin legislature was the first to ratify the amendment. After the required three-fourths of the states ratified the it, the constitutional amendment was officially adopted on Aug. 26, 1920.

While the 15th and 19th amendments allowed citizens the right to vote without regard for their race, color or gender, Native Americans weren't allowed to vote until the pas-

sage of the Snyder Act of 1924, also called the Indian Citizenship Act.

During the 1950s and 1960s civil rights movement activists were repeatedly subjected to mistreatment and violence. As a result, then-President Lyndon Johnson called for voting rights legislation with the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

A third voting rights movement was enacted to lower the voting age from 21 to 18. Activists noted that most of the young men who were being drafted to fight in the Vietnam War were too young to have any voice in the selection of the leaders who were sending them to fight. The 26th Amendment was ratified in 1971.

Securing the right to vote for everyone has been a hard fight, but in the present day, the "right to vote" is being denied for other reasons.

Wisconsin's voter ID law was enacted in 2011 after Republicans took control of the legislature and the statehouse. This law requires citizens to show an approved photo ID to cast a ballot.

In 2013, the Supreme Court gutted the Voting Rights Act, allowing the GOP to pass more ultra-restrictive voting laws.

In 2016, a Wisconsin judge further suppressed the vote by allowing limits on times and dates of early voting, a 28-day residency requirement and restrictions on the use of student IDs for voting, all of which were Republican-adopted laws that aimed at making voting harder and less convenient.

The United States is almost alone among industrial countries and other democracies in putting most of the burden of registering to vote on individual voters. In Gov. Tony Evers' budget proposal, he directed the Department of Transportation to enter into an agreement with the State Elections Commission to provide information and facilitate automatic voter registration. However, the GOP members on the Joint Finance Committee eliminated this provision.

Let's get voting right. No one should have to take time off work or stand in a long line. How about having voting on weekends or making election day a federal holiday? Vote-by-mail systems have already been implemented in four states with reviewers saying its fair, safe and easy.

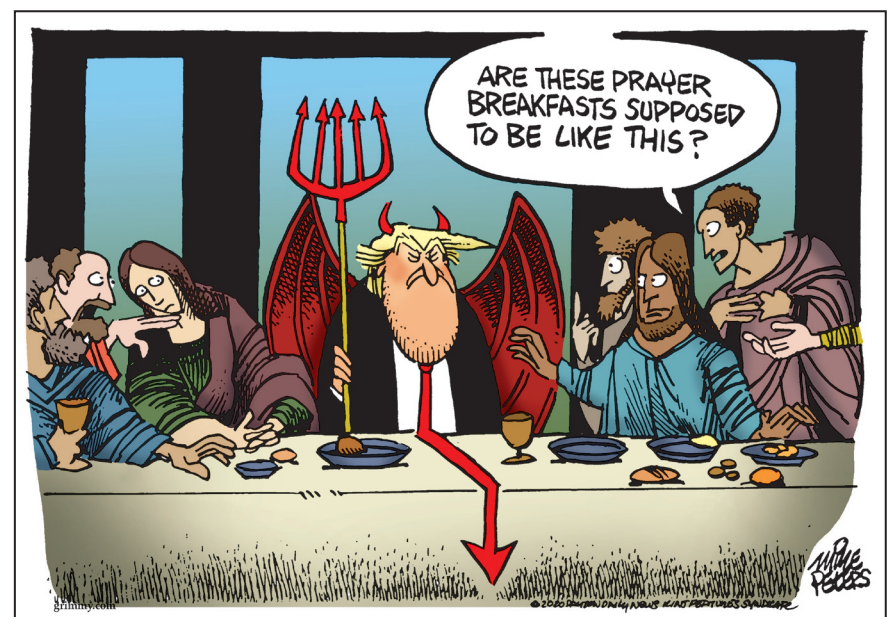
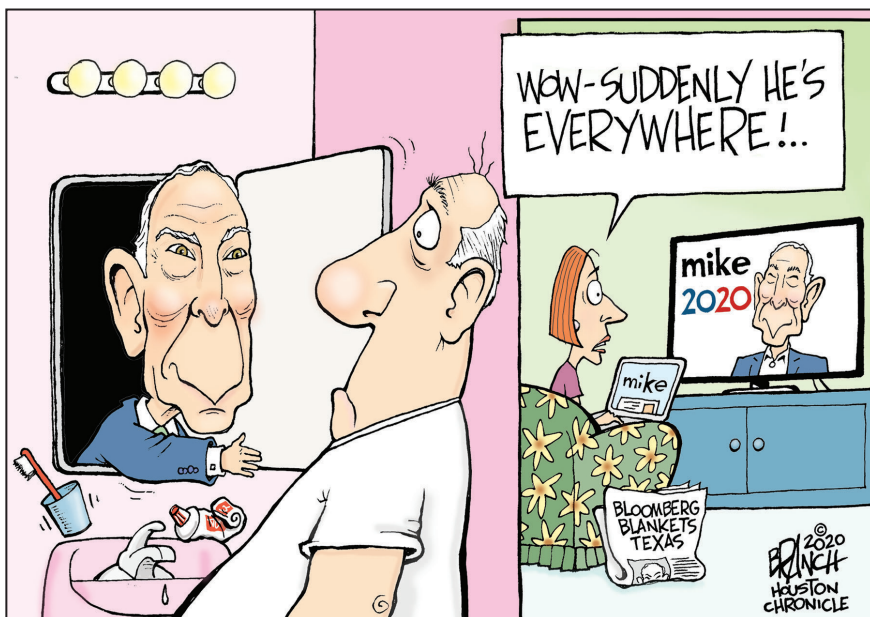
Election Day is the one day when every citizen has as much power as anyone else. That moment when you're in the voting booth, the power of your vote can make a difference.

If you aren't registered to vote, go to www.myvote.wi.gov or register at the polls on Election Day. You can vote early with your municipal clerk beginning two weeks before an election or have an absentee ballot sent to you.

As Fighting Bob La Follette said, 100 years ago, "The cure for the ills of democracy is more democracy."

Let's take the cure. Vote.

Teacher of the Year award revived

District seeks to honor five recipients annually

SHAWANO — The Shawano School District is looking to change its Teacher of the Year program, but it will need to raise at least \$5,000 to make its plans come to fruition.

The district's executive committee met Wednesday and discussed changing the parameters now that the Jefferies Fund, which provided the original donation for the award, has been depleted. Until last year, the district honored a teacher annually at Shawano Community High School's graduation.

"Historically, we have had an award, and there were funds set aside by an individual, and then we awarded a teacher," said Superintendent Randi Anderson. "We're recommending that we remove that out of the graduation ceremony."

Anderson also recommended that the program expand to include a teacher of the year from each of the four schools, plus a fifth teacher considered a specialty teacher that might teach at more than one school. The teachers would be recognized at the district's staff celebration at the end of the school year in June.

The teachers would be nominated by other teachers, staff, students and community members, according to Anderson. The nominations would be sent to the human resources department by April 1. District administrators and past winners would review the nominations and select the recipients.

Anderson said the administrators pondered what would be the most effective way to honor the teachers and had two options. One was to give the winning teachers an extra personal day to be used the following year,

while another option was to give a cash award.

"We currently have \$300 and something odd change left over from that initial donation," Anderson said.

The committee liked the idea of a cash award, but instead of something for the teachers, members thought it might be more meaningful if they gave the money to a nonprofit of the teacher's choosing, similar to what the Shawano Area Community Foundation does through its annual Celebration of Giving. Committee members also recommended the award be \$1,000.

"I like the idea of paying it forward," said school board president Tyler Schmidt.

Board member Michael Sleeper agreed, thinking the paying it forward option would entice service organizations like Rotary and Optimists to give toward the endeavor. He noted that fellow board member Chris Gull is already in favor of fundraising for the awards and thought the entire school board should weigh in on the final amount to be given.

Schmidt said he wanted to make certain that the organizations that agreed to give would be able to do so on an annual basis.

"I don't want to do it, and then next year we don't do it," Schmidt said.

The committee recommended taking the matter to the full school board, which meets Monday.

Thin ice, fewer spearers stretch sturgeon season

The entire effort of spearing a lake sturgeon through the ice hinges on a single toothpick.

Holding Randy Lee's heavy, handmade stainless-steel spear head to the metal end of a long wooden spear handle is a toothpick that is slid through holes in each piece. When the spear is thrown toward a swimming sturgeon, handle and spear stay

together. A twist of the handle separates the two when the toothpick breaks, allowing the fish to be dragged up and inside the shanty by a rope. A second, tethered rope keeps the handle from sinking to the bottom.

Spearing a sturgeon through a 4-by-8-foot hole in the ice seems like an improbable task, and for many of the frozen chosen, it is. Some faithfully drag their shanties and gear every February to Lake Winnebago, sit six hours a day staring down that greenish, eerie hole and may not see a fish for years, even decades. Patience doesn't fully cover it.

The odds of spearing a fish are about 9% on Lake Winnebago, where the water is 9-16 feet deep, and if the water's murky as it is some years, the chances of seeing a sturgeon near the bottom are slim.

On the Winnebago system's upriver lakes (Poygan, Butte des Morts and Winneconne), the water is mostly much shallower and often clearer, offering better views of the gray submarines. Odds exceed 60% for taking a fish there.

Spearers on all lakes use PVC pipe "ladders" or white siding strips to lay on the bottom to help the spearer see shadows of fish that pass over them. Spearers used to use cut potatoes, but the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources now requires spearers to retrieve everything they lower down the hole.

The DNR used to allow spearing on the upriver lakes every five years, and most spearers would then abandon the big lake in favor of the shallow ones. Increasing interest in the sport and closely monitored harvest quotas prompted

the DNR to use a lottery system in 2007 for the upriver lakes tags.

Now, it takes about seven or eight years of application points to draw an upriver lakes tag. Just 500 tags a year are issued for the upriver lakes, while there is no limit on Winnebago tags.

I was one of those lucky 500 this season after eight long years of waiting. I'd tried spearing on Winnebago once, and found it like staring at the old TV test pattern for six hours. I vowed I'd never spear on that lake again.

I was so excited before opening day that I could barely fall asleep. The alarm clock went off at 4 a.m. and I was soon meeting my co-worker Chris Lee and his father, Randy Lee, both of rural Winneconne. Randy's brother, Ray Lee, joined us.

All three are experienced spearers and graciously agreed to supply me with the spears, gaff, shanty and most other gear necessary to stick a sturgeon. Their passion for the sport is palpable, but somewhat hard to understand for a novice.

"It's a pretty unique sport," Chris Lee said. "Outside of Wisconsin, nobody's heard of it. I like it better than deer hunting because it's different."

Chris, 37, has managed to spear four sturgeon in his life. Like many of his family members, they only spear on Poygan, never Winnebago. Someone in their family or group of friends seems to have an upriver lakes tag each season, but it's a long wait for that cherished piece of paper for each of them.

Randy steers his well-worn

Chevy truck toward our shanties in the dark. On opening day, we bang around over frozen ruts, following trails in the snow. Unlike Lake Winnebago, where the ice is dicey and many spearers were forced to use ATVs and snowmobiles to move their shanties and gear, Poygan has a solid 12 to 15 inches of ice (the latter is protected from the wind and ice shoves, which helped make portions of Winnebago 's ice thin).

Sunday's blizzard left more than 6 inches of fresh snow on the lakes. Monday's trek to our shanties was guesswork, and Randy aimed at barely visible, drifted truck tracks. He turned on a GPS unit, but it was slow to warm up. We finally spotted a shanty in the pre-dawn, the landscape looking like the South Pole.

Chris and I sat in the shanty for two mornings, from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m., the legal spearing hours. We never saw so much as a bluegill. We were in about 9 feet of water, and could barely see the strips of white vinyl siding placed on the bottom. Chris returned to work Monday, while I took the day off and tried another shanty owned by a friend, located to the south in shallower water.

The water here was only 6 feet deep and I could clearly see the white PVC pipe "ladder" on the bottom.

The decoys (traditional carved wooden ones resembling fish and random, oddball ones like a white ceramic coffee cup, a shiny blank CD and a flashy copper jello mold) didn't work.

At 11:20 a.m. Monday, my painful boredom was snapped when I saw a fish swimming close to the surface! I grabbed the spear where it hung from the shanty's ceiling by a nail and readied it. The narrow, long fish had a spot on its tail. Not a sturgeon. I relaxed and went back to being bored.

The brightest spot of the week-end occurred just after 8 a.m. Sunday, when we heard some yelling and saw three people in a shanty 100 yards from us waving. A 55.2-inch, 36-pound sturgeon lay in the snow, and retired Winnebago School District special education teacher Diane Maki, 65, was more than happy to get her photo taken with her first fish.

Her home is within a few hundred yards of shore in the town of Poygan and Spruce Lane, where we put in.

"It took me by surprise because it was on my side," she said, "He came in more on the top, above the decoy. Josh (Revoir, son-in-law,)

said, 'Go!'"

Her aim was true and four of the spear's five tines stuck the fish just behind the gills.

"It didn't put up a fight right away," Maki said.

She also shared the shanty with husband Larry Maki, who speared a 60-pounder in 2017.

She's going to keep applying for upriver lakes tags, especially since the state allows tag holders to give them to kids ages 12 to 17, and she has eight grandchildren who may want to try this patience-testing, unique sport.

With just a bit over half last year's shanty count this year on all the lakes, and fewer spearers, the harvest is down, too.

As of Tuesday, Winnebago spearers had tagged just 102 fish and upriver lakes spearers had tagged 163, both far from the quotas set for female and male fish. The upriver lakes season is often over in just a few days, but spearers there will enjoy another weekend on the ice.

Park committee picks design firm for Clintonville pond

Project expected to cost \$1 million

CLINTONVILLE — The city's park and recreation committee is moving forward with plans for a new outdoor swimming pond by selecting a design firm.

The community has been without the use of an outdoor swimming facility since its pool building was damaged by fire several years ago.

Justin McAuly, park and recreation director, updated the committee Jan. 30 on the status of the project. He said the old pool has been cleaned up, and the next steps are to get a design plan in place and seek a surveyor to find a site for the installation of the pond. McAuly said he is getting quotes for surveyor services.

The Common Council has already voted to go ahead on plans to install a swimming pond. Normally, officials would need to seek bids from three companies for such a project, but McAuly recommended that they go with a design plan and bid from CRS

Design, a Verona company, that did a preliminary conceptual plan last year.

"Technically, we're supposed to seek three bids, but I don't know if there are many companies out there. These swimming ponds are not being built every day," McAuly said.

He said the committee could take special consideration in this case and vote to hire CRS Design because of the city's relationship with the company and its familiarity with the project.

"But that's completely up to you guys," said McAuly.

The CRS Design proposal includes the development of a site clearing plan, a site plan, grading plan, landscaping plan, project estimates and plan renderings for an acre swimming pond.

It would include a floating sport park with inflatables, a shallow swimming area, a rental area for swimming, a beach area that would include sand volleyball, shade areas, rental shelter, open beach space and a route to a dock to help with those with disabilities get

into the water.

An entry building, concession and restroom building and a building for the mechanics would be included.

The original bid to build an outdoor swimming pond was \$1.5 million. McAuly said he told CRS Design he wanted a project closer to \$1 million, and they agreed to scale it back.

The design for a swimming pond by CRS design would be \$19,670.

Committee member Chuck Manske made the motion that they recommend to the finance committee that they deviate from regular procurement policy and not seek three proposals. The committee also recommended the city select the proposal from CRS Design for the design phase of the swimming pond and not to exceed \$20,000 with the money to come from the outdoor swimming facility account. Both recommendations were approved.

If the finance committee approves the recommendations, the Common Council will be asked to approve them.

Notice is hereby given of a spring primary election to be held in Shawano County and Menominee County on February 18, 2020, at which the officers named below shall be nominated. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column submitted to a vote in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Paper Ballots are Used

The voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used,

The voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone in a manner that would reveal how the ballot is marked.

Spoiled Ballots

If the voter spoils a **paper ballot**, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a **touch screen** ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **paper ballot** is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall deposit the voted ballot in the ballot box or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit and shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Vehicle break-ins plague city

During his monthly report to the Shawano Common Council on Wednesday, Police Chief Dan Mauel once again urged city residents to keep their vehicles locked.

Mauel reported a string of vehicle break-ins that took place in January, along with a vehicle theft.

“We had one stolen car and a bunch of cars gone through,” he said.

Mauel said the incidents were technically not even vehicle break-ins given that the cars were unlocked.

“You need to lock your cars up. You need to take your keys out,” he said. “I say it all the time, and I guess I’m going to continue to say it until people start locking their stuff up.”

City removes treasurer duties from clerk

The currently vacant position of Shawano city clerk/treasurer will be reduced to only city clerk when that post is filled.

The Shawano Common Council on Wednesday approved transferring the clerk’s financial duties to the finance department, which didn’t exist when former clerk/treasurer Karla Duchac first took that job eight years ago.

Duchac retired last month. The city is in the process of advertising to fill that position.

Bid awarded for street reconstruction

The Common Council approved a

bid for street and utility reconstruction on stretches of two city streets to David Tenor Corp. of Green Bay.

The work includes Lafayette Street from Green Bay to Fourth Street, and North Washington Street for a total project cost of \$810,506.

The city street portion of the contract comes to \$430,025, the water utility portion if portion will be \$194,832 and the sanitary sewer utility will cover \$185,648 of the project cost.

Purchases approved for police, City Cab

City officials approved the purchase of mobile radios as part of the Shawano Police Department’s ongoing process of replace all of its

current radio communication equipment.

The Common Council approved a quote from Nielson Communications, Inc. of Green Bay in the amount of \$9,698 for additional radios.

The council also approved a quote from JW Flooring of Green Bay in the amount of \$3,650 for the flooring portion of the police department conference room buildout.

The radios and conference room were part of the city’s 2020 capital improvements budget.

The council also approved the purchase of a wheelchair-accessible minivan for City Cab at a cost of \$36,454 with 80% federal funding. The city’s cost will be \$7,290.

Butterfly garden planned for Seven Maples Nature Area

CLINTONVILLE — A butterfly garden is being planned as a new feature of the Seven Maples Nature Area, said Justin McAuly, Clintonville’s park and recreation director.

He told the park and recreation committee Jan. 30 that a garden of native plants will help attract and protect many butterfly species.

“We are losing many of our butterflies because of the loss of habitat,

urbanization and business density,” McAuly said.

The Seven Maples Nature Area was gifted to the city in June 2016 by the family of Lynne Simpson. It consists of 17.2 acres and is located at 150 13th St. It was her wish that the parcel be developed into a nature or park area, McAuly said, and that native plants be used in any plantings.

Plants in the butterfly garden could include common milkweed, switch grass, asters, lupine, goldenrod, sunflowers, Joe Pye weed, marigolds and

cone flowers. McAuly said he found a place in Westfield where he can obtain native plants and expects to find additional locations. He was optimistic that they may even be able to attract the rare Karner blue butterfly to the area.

The proposed butterfly garden will likely be kidney or oval shaped. It could be a raised or flat with some sort of barrier, said McAuly.

“I think there should be some sort of walkways or trails so visitors can get up close to the plants,” said Chuck Manske, committee member. “There

needs to be space in between the plants and there should be signage.”

It was suggested that there be benches in the garden.

“Photographers may even want to be getting up close for pictures,” said Steve Kettenhoven, committee chairman.

“The funds to do the project could come from the landscaping account and may be about \$2,700,” said McAuly, who added that he will keep the committee informed on the progress of the project.

Bears' Robaidek, Troxel combine for 39 points

BONDUEL — After a back-and-forth first half battle with Algoma, the Bonduel High School girls basketball team decided to pick up the pace. The result was the hosting Bears controlling the rest of the contest to secure their 15th straight win by a final score of 52-33.

A three-point play from junior Kara Troxel gave Bonduel a 19-18 lead with 5:18 to play in the opening half. After Troxel's free throw, Bonduel applied its full-court pressure to take control.

Sophomore Allaina Robaidek was able to convert a layup off a steal the first time the Bears put on the press before Troxel converted a fastbreak layup. Robaidek then buried a 3-pointer to put the hosts up 26-18 and force an Algoma timeout with 1 minute, 41 seconds to go in the half.

The Wolves hit two 3s before the halftime buzzer sounded, but Robaidek added another triple to give the Bears a five-point cushion at the break.

"I felt that we were having a little trouble guarding them off the dribble, so we went to zone," said Bonduel coach Jerry Reinke. "Our kids actually like to play a little more up-tempo — now the last few weeks, we haven't played much press and stuff like that but I felt that if we could get into a press and get the game going a little faster, maybe into a track meet, it would benefit us."

"We haven't played much zone of late but I just thought we needed to go to it. We've got some length and a couple guards that can move pretty good on the top (of the 2-3 zone) and I think it makes it a little more difficult to get some of those shots off and that

was the thinking behind it."

Bonduel stuck with its full-court pressure and 2-3 zone in the second half. The combo proved to be effective, as Algoma scored just nine second-half points.

After Algoma made the first basket of the second half, it didn't score another point until nearly nine minutes had elapsed. The Wolves next points came on a pair of free throws with 3:44 to play before a three-point play with 56.9 seconds to go.

"It (putting on full-court pressure) gives us a lot of momentum and it seems when we play our full court that we hustle so much more," said

Robaidek. "It also wore them down, so they were tired and we had some easier shots (on the offensive end)."

"I think our team is pretty quick and we have good hands," said Troxel. "By switching to the full-court pressure, it scares the other team into thinking they have to pass it right away and our hands are always ready so that helps us shift the momentum."

Most of Bonduel's points on the offensive end in the second half came on fastbreak chances. After 3-pointers from Robaidek and Troxel and a bucket from junior Madison Kurey gave the team an 11-point lead with just over 10 minutes to play, Troxel

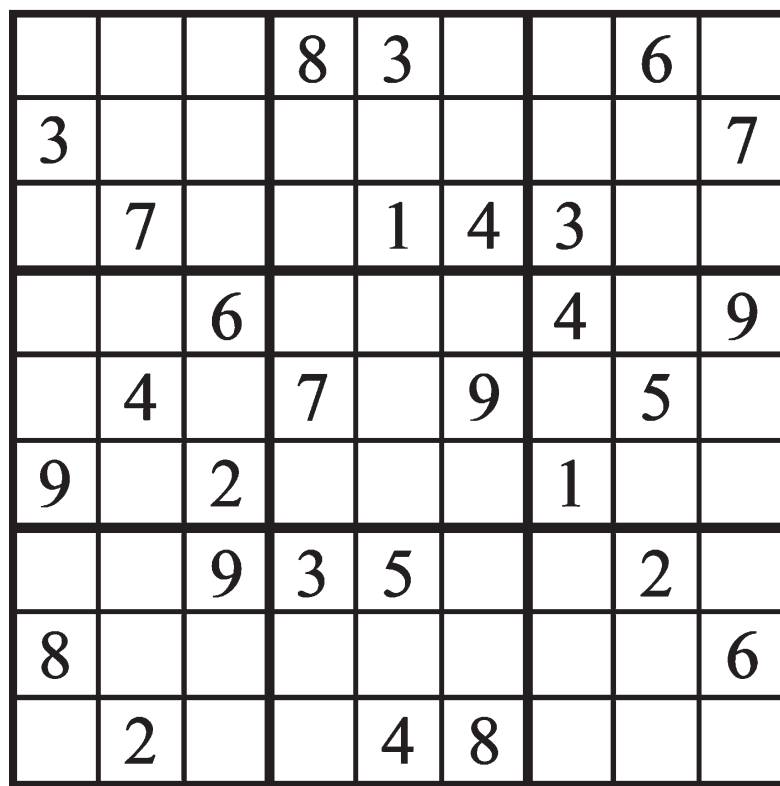

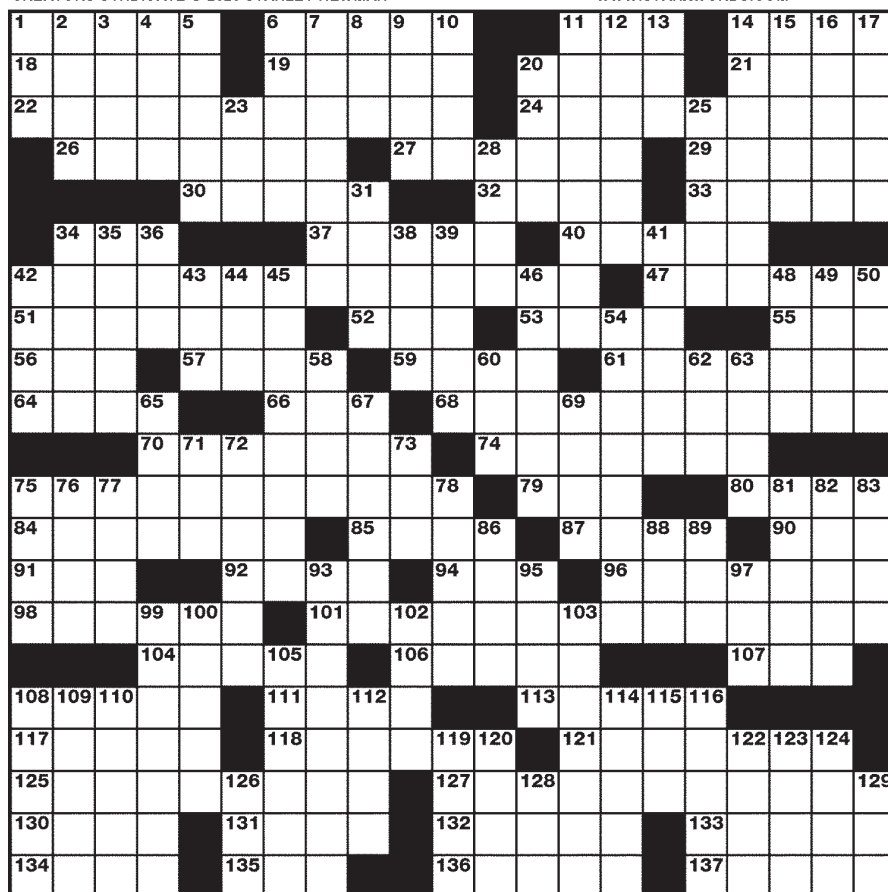

Sacred Heart changing early childhood programs

By NEW MEDIA STAFF

SHAWANO — Sacred Heart Catholic School announced this month that it is making changes to its early childhood programs for the next school year.

The preschool program for 3-year-old children is going from a half-day three days a week to a full day. There is also an option for a half-day program that would go five days per week. The program has a tuition rate of \$1,200 for the entire school year.

The 4-year-old kindergarten, currently a half-day program, will go to a full-day program in the 2020-21 school year. Parents who send their children to 4K will be charged \$1,575 for the year.

However, the changes to the program will mean that Sacred Heart will no longer be offering its

extended care program.

Principal Gary Cumberland sent out a letter to parents dated Feb. 4 that noted students who were involved in programs like the ones Sacred Heart plans to implement showed improvement in national studies, including writing their names, letter-word identification, language and literacy development, task orientation and peer social skills, among other skills.

"As we looked at the research on early childhood education and brain development, we explored expanding our programs," Cumberland wrote. "The research has shown that when instructing using curriculum that is developmentally appropriate, with child- and teacher-directed activities, emphasis on active learning and addressing all developmental areas, students will show increased academic and social skills."
