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Mental health a priority concern for counties

5-year improvement planning process underway to address public health issues

SHAWANO — Addressing mental health issues will be the top concern of public health officials in Shawano and Menominee counties over the next five years, based on a community health assessment drafted by the local public health department.

Alcohol and drug abuse placed second on the list of priorities, followed by chronic disease.

Those priorities were identified partly by examining regional data from hospital records that included disease conditions and hospitalization rates compiled by the state Department of Health Services, along with demographic information collected through census data.

A community health survey was also conducted over the summer of last year to solicit feedback from Shawano and Menominee county residents on what they believed were the top health concerns in their communities.

The survey had 471 responses.

The collected data and survey results were then presented at a community meeting last month where the 65 community members who attended voted on the top three priorities that should be the focus of a community health improvement plan.

All local health departments in

the state are required to go through a health improvement planning process every five years.

The process is guided by a steering committee that was put in place of May of last year.

"We have a wide reach with this steering committee and it's a pretty diverse group," said Nicholas Mau, community health educator with the Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department. "It represents the tribes, county services and some local non-profits."

Each of the priorities identified in the community health assessment will have its own task team made up of community members and professionals related to those topic areas, according to Mau.

"They will select goals and objectives and strategies to address those issues," he said.

The last community health assessment conducted for Shawano and Menominee counties in 2014 identified alcohol and drug abuse as the top health concern.

The local drug court and expansion of the drug take-back program were two of the initiatives that came out of the task team meetings focused on addressing that issue, Mau said.

Early childhood development and physical activity and nutrition rounded out the top three priorities in 2014.

Mau said he wasn't surprised to see mental health at the top of the priority list this time around.

He said mental health is connected to many other health-related issues.

"You could almost say mental health is the root cause of some of these other problems," he said. "I believe it's important we address mental health as its own issue because when we improve mental health and people's ability to cope with mental health issues, this would feed into improvement of chronic disease and how people approach preventative health or how they address substance abuse."

The task teams assigned to each of the health assessment priorities will hold about four meetings between March and June, Mau said.

"During that time, they'll develop strategies and create a plan," he said.

The next phase will be implementing those goals and objectives over the course of the next five years through partnerships with other entities and agencies in the community.

"This whole process should be community-driven," Mau said. "If you don't have that community buy-in, the work isn't as effective and it isn't as far-reaching."

The task teams will decide how often they want to meet over the next five years to monitor and report on progress.

"We are hopefully empowering the community and mobilizing partners that are already doing some of this work to achieve some reportable outcomes for the next five years," Mau said.

County primary results mirror statewide tally

Voters in Shawano County cast ballots Tuesday in the state Supreme Court primary with a vote tally that mirrored the results of the rest of the state.

Incumbent Justice Daniel Kelly and Dane County Circuit Judge Jill Karofsky emerged as the top vote-getters and will compete in the April 7 general election for a 10-year term

on the bench.

Marquette University Law professor Ed Fallon finished a distant third in Tuesday's three-way contest.

With 97% of precincts reporting Wednesday morning, Kelly won 50% of the statewide vote with a tally of 343,163; Karofsky garnered 256,379 votes or about 37%; and Fallon finished with 87,485 votes or 12.7%

In Shawano County, Kelly won 2,465 votes; Karofsky 835 votes; and

Fallon garnered 268.

The results still need to be certified by the Board of Canvass, which meets Thursday.

A total of 3,568 ballots were cast in Shawano County in Tuesday's primary. That's about 16% of the county's 22,204 registered voters.

County officials had expected a low turnout, given there was only one statewide race on the ballot.

Board approves graduation specialist position

Finding funds to pay employee still to be determined

SHAWANO — The Shawano School Board approved a new position Monday that would help at-risk high school students get back on track, but it will only come to be if the money can be found for the position.

The graduation specialist position, presented by the Shawano Boys and Girls Club to the Shawano School District's executive committee last week, is a \$50,000 per year position that would be equally funded by the district, the club and the state. However, the state is in the middle of a biennial budget, so money could not be made available until next year. Also, the local Boys and Girls Club does not have the money earmarked for such a position, nor does the school district.

That means the local entities will need to figure out other funding sources for the time being, as the district is interested in having a specialist start work with the next school year, which starts in September.

Board member Chuck Dallas suggested asking Dollars for Scholars and area family foundations if they would be interested in funding the position until more permanent arrangements could be made.

“Why Judge Eberlein gave that money to the (Dollars for Scholars) cause was to keep the at-risk kids off the streets and out of jail,” Dallas said.

Wendy Crawford, co-chairwoman for the Shawano Boys and Girls Club, recommended speaking to other districts that have graduation specialists and see how they have funded their positions to see if there's a way to bring a specialist to Shawano without breaking the bank for her club or the school district.

Specialists are in place through the Greater Green Bay Boys and Girls Club, the parent entity for Shawano's club, in the Green Bay, Denmark, Howard-Suamico and Ashwaubenon school districts. There are also graduation specialists in place in Milwaukee, Oshkosh, the Fox Cities and Fond du

Lac, and there is interest from school districts in Seymour and West De Pere, according to Alex Garza, director of school-based services with Green Bay's Boys and Girls Club.

The specialists work through a program called Be Great Graduate.

“It's really a statewide initiative,” Garza said, “and it works.”

Garza told the board that the program is voluntary for students. Participants can expect to meet with a specialist once a week, and that specialist will help the students by looking at grades, food insecurity and school involvement to help them get back on track.

“What we're trying to do is serve the whole child,” Garza said. “Yes, grades are important. Attendance is important, but the proof is in the relationship. We're starting to see some returns on that.”

Because high school classrooms can have up to 30 students, it's tough for teachers to be able to provide the one-on-one attention that many at-risk students need, according to Garza.

“If they need a place to just share what's going on in their head, we do everything through a trauma-informed

lens,” Garza said.

Randi Anderson, Shawano School District superintendent, told the board that the position would be valuable to the district.

“We have a segment of our population that we're missing,” Anderson said. “This, obviously, is a good opportunity to build those relationships and is a very cost-effective model. If we can save 20 kids and have them cross the stage and get the golden ticket — a diploma — then it really opens doors.”

Michael Sleeper agreed with Anderson, noting that the transition from middle school to high school can be a difficult one, and many students have at least one failing grade in their freshman year, with a few having multiple low grades.

“Catching those students in the transition from middle school to high school, which is a traumatic step, for the first time in their lives, if they don't pass a class, there are dire consequences,” Sleeper said. “Focusing on that freshman-sophomore group, having that extra assistance is invaluable.”

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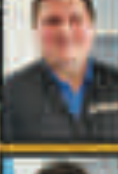
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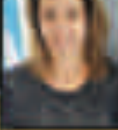

Teacher of the Year award resurrected — and multiplied

Shawano schools seek to honor outstanding educators

SHAWANO — The resurrection and expansion of a Teacher of the Year award for the Shawano School District passed the school board with a unanimous vote — in concept.

Still needing to be worked out is how the district plans to honor the winning teachers, whether it is a cash prize to the teacher, a cash prize to a favorite charity or additional personal days for the teacher. The district's executive committee was leaning toward the charity option, but the board did not make a determination.

The award, once just a single award, will now become five awards — one for each of the schools in the district and a fifth award for a specialist not necessarily in the classroom bound to one school. Previously, the single award had been paid for from the Jefferies Fund, which ran out of money and prompted the district not to honor a teacher in 2019, according to Scott Zwirschitz, Shawano Community High School principal.

"Our teachers do a lot of great things," Zwirschitz said. "They have a lot of great moments on a regular basis, but we're looking for that teacher in all the buildings and the specialist that have gone above and beyond in the past year or even in previous years."

The winners will also be feted at an end-of-the-year celebration instead of during the high school graduation, according to Zwirschitz.

"Many times, an elementary teacher was selected, and they'd come to the high school graduation," Zwirschitz said. "It was very difficult getting them there for the occasion, and it wasn't around the people they work with on a day-in,

day-out basis."

A committee was formed following the 2019 graduation to look at how the district could continue the teacher honor, even without an outside benefactor. One of the things determined by the committee was that winners of the award would be ineligible in future years.

"You don't want certain people, just because of the job they do, to get the award more than once," Zwirschitz said.

Nominations would be an open process, with students, parents and community members getting the opportunity to offer candidates for the honor.

"It isn't just certain people like we used to have," Zwirschitz said.

This year's nominees will need to be submitted by April 1 to the human resources director at the administrative office, 218 County Road B, Shawano, WI 54166. After that, administrators will be screening the nominees to make sure they meet all the criteria, according to Zwirschitz, and then a committee comprised of past winners will select the five recipients.

School board member Michael Sleeper said the charity option was best, not only in his opinion, but of those at the school he'd spoken with prior to the board meeting. He noted that paying a cash award directly to the teacher would mean that it would be taxable income and therefore be "watered down."

"Unanimously, the teachers I talked to said yes, paying it forward would be great," Sleeper said. "The concept of gifting forward to an organization of that person's choice has really another opportunity for great gratification and getting the dollars to where some real impactful things would be done."

New Shawano County clerk of courts selected

SHAWANO — A new Shawano County clerk of courts has been selected to replace Susan Krueger, who retired from the job on Feb. 1.

Ethan Schmidt, currently a team leader with Shawano County Sheriff's Department's dispatch center and a volunteer firefighter, "is in the process of being appointed," according to county Corporation Counsel Tony Kordus.

The clerk of courts is an elected position. Schmidt would fill out the remainder of Krueger's four-year term in office, which expires in January 2022.

Schmidt was selected by the county's circuit court judges, William

Kussel Jr. and James Habeck.

Kordus, who is running in April for the judge's seat being vacated by Habeck's pending retirement, provided input during the selection process but didn't make the final decision.

Kordus said Schmidt could be sworn into office as soon as Thursday Feb. 26, but that hasn't yet been confirmed.

Schmidt was once named Employee of the Month by the Shawano County Sheriff's Department for helping deliver a baby over the phone in November 2016.

He was also previously named Fireman of the Year for the western portion of Shawano County, according to Kordus.

'We are here to stay; we are here to grow'

Genex plans expansion, job growth with merger complete

SHAWANO — The Cooperative Resources International logo is disappearing from the area, but that does not mean the company that has made a name for itself in cattle genetics is packing up and moving the herd out of town — quite the contrary.

Genex, which started in Shawano in 1940 as the Tri-County Breeders Association and has gone through multiple name changes in 80 years, will still be

operating in Shawano and the town of Richmond, and future expansion and improvement are in the works, along with more jobs.

Genex invited community leaders to a tour of some of its facilities Tuesday to show some of the improvements being made, as well as how far it has come in recent years.

Many of the bulls that make up Genex's herd are housed at a facility in the Stony Hill area of the town of Richmond. There is currently a \$1 million building project that will construct

new semen collection rooms and a prep laboratory for initial processing.

"We're going to be just looking at the semen, evaluating it and seeing if it can continue to be processed at the main lab in Shawano," said Brian Preder, production site manager.

The design is meant to be efficient so that Genex is wasting neither time nor space to collect semen samples and start them through the process, Preder said. He noted that the collection parlor is expected to hold up to 30 bulls at a time to allow for easy

collection, and there are two identical breezeways that help to easily move bulls from their barn stalls to the parlor itself for daily collections.

The project is expected to bring in at least four full-time jobs to the Stony Hill facility, with 30 new employees expected to be added to the existing 200-employee base for Genex at all of its Shawano County facilities, and is part of a \$10 million construction plan for Genex over the next three years.

"We looked at the future and thought, 'What do we all need?'" said

Huub te Plate, Genex chief executive officer. “We will be upgrading barns. Many of these barns were built for all mature bulls. Now, we produce semen on much younger bulls, so there is a lot of renovations going on.”

However, there is a bonus for folks in the town of Richmond. In order to make the Stony Hill facility viable in the modern technological area, a high-speed internet fiberoptic cable had to be laid down. As a result, town residents will benefit from faster internet in an area known for poor cyberspace reception.

Many of the changes are expected to modernize facilities that are 30 years old or more. It will also increase Genex’s bull capacity and improve animal welfare.

Cooperative Resources International merged in October 2018 with Koepon Holding BV in the Netherlands, and the CRI headquarters became the headquarters for Genex, which had been the parent company.

“Koepon was in the same business we were in, genetics marketing,” te Plate said. “CRI and Koepon were combined and decided to keep all of the marketing arms but combine background functions. We went through a fair amount of consolidation, and now we’re ready to put that behind us and grow again.”

Now, the holding company is Urus, which is on the signs for the Fellman Center distribution building on East Elizabeth Street in Shawano. That facility has since expanded to become the largest bovine semen distribution center in the world, according to te Plate, doing business with about 100 countries.

“All of that semen comes from the shop here,” te Plate said.

Genex moved into its current processing facility in 2013, taking up a small portion of the building, according to Warren Raddatz, Urus director of distribution. Since then, it has doubled in size to accommodate the demand.

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“We have up to 7 million units of semen stored on this site alone,” Raddatz said. “We do all the international shipping, all the domestic shipping out of this location.”

Genex accounts for about 40% of the Urus organization, he added, with about 30 million units of semen marketed annually, which equates to about one insemination every second of the day.

“That’s a pretty big deal,” te Plate said.

The Stony Hill facility and another facility just west of the Wolf River are now known as Peak Production Centers. Combined, they make one of the five largest bovine semen collection locations worldwide, according to te Plate, and Genex plans to make it event bigger.

“We are here to stay,” te Plate said. “We are here to grow.”

Pacifiers and thumb sucking are a part of childhood

I'm often asked about thumb sucking and pacifiers. It's important to know neither thumb sucking nor pacifier use is very problematic. Here are some tips to help with pacifiers.

Limit your child's use — don't allow them to have the pacifier all the time. Think about pacifiers as "transitional objects" to help transition from wakefulness to sleep or through a stressful situation.

Check on your child 15 minutes after falling asleep. If they haven't spit the pacifier out, remove it.

If you use them in the car, put the pacifier away when the car ride is over.

My pacifier rule is "gone at age 2." At this age, find all the pacifiers and cut the nipple off at the base. Bring the broken pacifier to your child and let him or her throw it away. They don't know you can go buy a new one. Dispose of all the others. Don't hide them, or they will find them. Children will quickly transition to an age appropriate object such as a stuffed

animal or blanket. About 85% of thumb suckers will stop by the time they are 3½. For those who don't, the first time they suck their thumb in school, they may get some gentle teasing, which is usually enough to get them to stop.

The main concern with thumb sucking is the effect on their permanent teeth. If your child is still sucking their thumb when they begin to lose their baby teeth, talk to your child's doctor or dentist. Dentists or orthodontists can place an appliance in their mouth to prevent thumb sucking, and there are also some thumb guards sold in stores or online that work well.

Heart disease deaths linked to birth month

APPLETON — A warning to women born in the spring or summer months: Pay attention to your heart health.

A new study makes a stronger link between girls born in those seasons and a slight but significant increase in cardiovascular disease deaths later in life.

Dr. Simone Fearon, medical director and physician leader with Theda-Care Cardiovascular Care, explains at times, she considers woman’s birth month as part of her patients’ medical history.

“Previous studies have indicated that when and where a woman is born impacts cardiovascular disease,” she said. “This research helps us better understand the possible connection. It emphasizes the need to better educate women born in the spring or summer about their heart and how to keep it healthy.”

She points out that this study, unlike other ones, had controls in place for family medical history and socioeconomic factors.

The findings add to the growing body of evidence on the topic. Researchers analyzed data from more than 115,000 female nurses in the U.S. between the ages of 30 and 55 who were followed for nearly 40 years (1976-2014). During that time, more than 43,000 of the participants died, including 8,360 deaths from heart disease. Researchers noticed a link with their birth month.

The new research details women born in the months of March to July are at particular risk for dying from

cardiovascular disease, with April births having the highest risk. Women born in the month of December are at the lowest risk.

Despite these new findings, it still is not clear why the birth month matters. Researchers suspect it might have something to do with seasonal changes in a pregnant woman’s diet and the lack of sunlight before birth. Doctors agree more research needs to be done on how cardiovascular disease risks can be lowered from the earliest stages of life.

Meanwhile, Fearon notes with the season a female is born becoming a potential risk factor for heart disease, it’s important for these women to take preventive measures for their cardiovascular health.

“If you’re a spring or summer baby, these findings don’t mean you’re destined to die from cardiovascular disease,” she said. “It is a good starting point for conversations between providers and patients about what steps are being followed to help lower the risk of heart disease.”

Fearon made some recommendations to help lower the risk of heart disease:

- Know your blood pressure and cholesterol numbers.
- Exercise regularly, especially cardio workouts.
- Make heart-healthy food choices.
- Quit smoking and limit alcohol intake.
- Manage stress by practicing self-care, taking time to step away from life’s responsibilities to relax or socialize with friends.

What we have is failure to communicate, but thanks

This might come as a surprise to Mark Zuckerberg and the rest of Silicon Valley, but I'd just like to go on the record and point out that I am not a drone.

At least I don't think I am. In this day and age of technological slavery, we all have to wonder. Do we even have free will anymore? (Give me a minute, I'll ask Alexa and get back to you.)

I'm also thankfully not a Facebot, one of those people whose lives are determined by their Facebook pages.

What set me off on this is my Gmail account. Because Gmail seems to assume that we can't think for ourselves. That we don't have the necessary intelligence to craft a cogent reply to an email.

Let's set aside for the moment the very disturbing fact that Gmail or some kind of robotic algorithm is reading your email correspondence. Somewhere there is a Gmail bot that is tracking every message that anyone sends you and is reading it — and apparently understands it — and is presumably tracking and reading your replies.

That's bad enough.

What I find really troubling is that my Gmail account is now crafting my replies for me, or at least suggesting them.

Down at the bottom of any email I receive, there are generally three suggested replies, which allow you to just click on that button so you

don't have to actually reply yourself.

The most common is the word "thanks."

I'm sorry, but, "thanks?"

Is that really something Gmail figured I couldn't come up with

myself. The word "thanks" needs to be suggested to me because I'm too stupid to say "thank you?" (Which is actually usually the second, more formal option.)

Is it just that Gmail suggests clicking on the word "thanks" to save me the arduous, draining, tedious and time-consuming effort it would take to actually have to type out five letters?

I don't know how I should feel about that. Oh, wait, let me ask Gmail. Oh, Gmail says I should feel "insulted." "Thanks," Gmail.

Because my Gmail account is a work-email in my capacity as a reporter and involves either asking people questions or seeking information or setting up some time for a meeting, other commonly suggested replies have included "Got it," "Got it, thanks," "Got it, thank you," "Sounds good," "Sounds good, thank you," "Great," "See you then," "See you then, thanks," "I've scheduled that meeting," and even "Cool," "Pretty cool," and "Nice."

I think you can tell from the suggested replies that we are not dealing with difficult concepts here. I really feel I am capable of handling these things on my own, Gmail, but "thanks (anyway)."

The suggested replies could at least be more varied. How about "thanks, but no thanks," "bite me," "up yours," or "I've scheduled that meeting for when pigs fly."

There's a broader issue here. It's not just about Gmail. It's about being able to think and communicate and live for ourselves.

Apparently, we are no longer capable of this, and I'm not just talking about Gmail replies.

Because we now have something called "adulthood," which the Urban Dictionary defines as "to carry out one or more of the duties and responsibilities expected of fully developed individuals," or in other words, growing up.

This, according to Time Magazine, has apparently become a trend and new favorite word of millennials, who actually take classes in adulthood, or being a grown-up, because it's just not something they know how to do on their own.

I don't really have a problem with the concept of a class that teaches you how to behave like an adult. In fact, I would happily recommend such a course for Donald Trump.

There are some things that are supposed to come naturally, as part

of the maturing process, as part of the learning process. If you screw up, you (hopefully) learn from that and you grow.

It's called "trial and error." If you replace that with robotic algorithms that are going to make these decisions for us, we cease to grow as human beings. We stop thinking for ourselves. (At least I think we do. I'll check with Alexa and get back to you.)

So, what am I suggesting here? Simply that, just as in all those dystopian science fiction novels, the thing to do is fight back. I'm suggesting resistance.

I, for one, will never give the robotic algorithm the satisfaction of clicking on one of its suggested replies. Even if the only response I can think of is, "thanks," I will type the word out myself before I ever click on the "thanks" button.

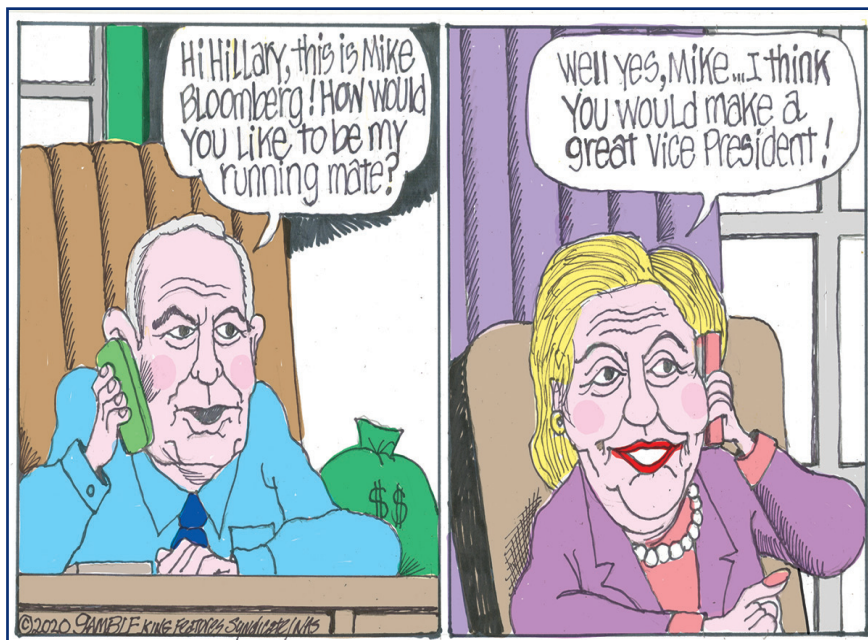
It's just my way of saying, "I am not a drone," though even that will probably eventually become a standard Gmail reply.

Lots of equipment needed to keep roads snow-free

Snowplows require constant care

SHAWANO — What does it take to keep Shawano County drivers on the road in the winter?

When snow falls, the Shawano County Highway Department responds with 44 drivers to plow 1,750 “lane miles.”

The department’s drivers, mechanics and support staff “take a lot of pride in what they do in providing the best level of service to the general public,” said Grant Bystol, Shawano County highway commissioner.

He explained a “lane mile” is used because a plow only does one lane at a time.

When the winter plowing season starts on Dec. 1 of every year, Bystol said the department has staff coverage 24 hours per day, working in seven-day shifts. About 64 of the department’s 72 full-time and part-time employees are assigned to snowplowing chores and other winter maintenance.

Drivers are on unpaid call at night while a “nighttime watchman” monitors conditions, particularly on state roads, Bystol said. The watchman also performs miscellaneous maintenance overnight.

Bystol added the county’s most seasoned operators work on state and county roads. “We wouldn’t throw a first-time driver out on Highway 29” with its high traffic volumes, he said.

The county covers 515 miles of state highways under a contract negotiated annually with the state Department of Transportation, about 600 lane miles of county roads and about 635 lane miles of township roads, also under contract.

Roads have different standards. The state calls for 24-hour monitoring and response to a snowfall for four-lane highways like Highway 29.

“That doesn’t mean bare pavement, but we’re not going to let it pile up to inches,” he added.

Two-lane state highways are under an 18-hour monitoring standard. Al-

though plowing is not required from 10 p.m. to 4 a.m., Bystol said the snowplows are usually out by 3 a.m. and then come off the road a little earlier.

Use of salt also varies. DOT specifies only granular salt or brine are to be used. County and township roads get a mixture of sand and salt. County roads such as A, B, BE and H with higher traffic volumes or more populated rural areas such as the Mooseyard in the town of Wescott will get “pre-wetted salt” or brine with their snowplowing.

Snowplows keep drivers on the road, but what does it take to keep a snowplow on the road?

Snowplowing calls for a balancing act between keeping roads clear and budget because we have to live within our means, Bystol said.

As part of that effort, the commissioner said the department tries to buy multi-purpose vehicles when adding to a fleet that costs about \$10 million of the county’s \$18 million inventory of highway department equipment.

“There’s a big jump in outfitting in the fall,” Bystol added.

It takes roughly six weeks to transform the trucks from summer-time construction configuration to snowplows. For trucks dedicated to state Highway 29, a pair of axles is taken off, and an underbody plow is installed. Wing plows are put on the left and right sides of the truck as well as the traditional front plow.

Trucks used on county and township roads usually have an axle taken off, but only a right wing plow and front plow are installed.

Keeping plows on the road requires each operator to monitor his truck’s condition and report any problems or breakdowns, Bystol said. A daily checklist is required of each driver. Hydraulic hoses, lights and the computers used to regulate the brine or salt/sand distribution often need attention, according to Bystol.

The cutting edges on the bottoms of plows and the “shoes,” metal pieces that help regulate the blade height off the pavement and assist with even blade wear, are the most frequent items consumed during the winter and cost the county about \$80,000 each year.

A truck will last about 10 years, according to Bystol, but that is more of a measure of the number of hours they’re used and how they’re used than years.

An exception are the 30-year-old FWD and Oshkosh vehicles that are exclusively snowplows with nine-foot V-plows. “V-plows” are much like the letter V and push snow in two directions, Bystol said.

They’re seldom used due to their size and operating cost, according to the commissioner, but “if we hadn’t had those on hand, we would have been at a standstill last April when there was a snowfall of more than 30 inches.”

Two people are needed to operate the FWD and Oshkosh vehicles contributing to the higher expense, Bystol said. Despite their age, they need lower amounts of maintenance, he added.

Graders are another weapon in the arsenal against very deep snowfalls, also armed with V-plows, Bystol said.

Snowplow driver finds success in the numbers

veteran snowplow driver,
shares experience

SHAWANO — His truck shook and jumped from hitting a ridge in the asphalt pavement on East Green Bay Street near Rusch Road in Shawano.

John Cooper said that's one reason why he rarely plows snow going over 25 mph with his Shawano County Highway Department truck.

"That can be scary, because the plow can catch and pull the plow under the truck. That'd do some real damage," he said from his driver's seat in the cramped cab.

A slower speed while plowing gives the plow much better contact with the road, he said. "There's a little less 'chop' than going 30-35 mph," he added.

Snowplow drivers have a lot of numbers besides miles per hour to remember and apply as they get traffic lanes open on state roads, then county roads, then by township roads.

"There's too much to worry about to get bored," he said as he headed toward Cecil on state Highway 22.

Worries, like the air temperature. Like the pavement temperature. Like the wind speed and direction. Like the snow depth.

Like 3,000 gallons of brine on his truck. On the night of Feb. 17, he was using "straight" brine brewed at the county highway shop in Shawano from water and 23.3% granular road salt as he started his assigned route from East Green Bay Street at the junction of Airport Road to the Shawano County line through Pulcifer. He knows that's enough to complete one round, just like he knows it takes 2-2½ hours to complete one "lap" of Highways 22 and 32.

He checked the snow depth a few miles northeast of Shawano by pulling a hydraulic lever to lower his blade.

"You always go down with the 'heel' first," Cooper said, then you follow that with the "toe." This approach reduces wear on the blade.

"Really not enough," Cooper judged, pulling the blade back up. He opted for distributing brine, "I just want to make sure that the

work traffic can get home."

Cooper's numbers in snowplowing started with 40 hours of in-house training followed by 40 hours of riding along with an experienced driver. He started in the Navarino area on township roads.

Training followed by a ridealong and then starting on township roads is the typical path for snowplow drivers in Shawano County, accord-

ing to Grant Bystol, county highway commissioner.

Given the width of his plows at 10-11 feet, plus the weight and length of his truck, just getting off the road, backing up or turned around can be a major chore, he said.

Two of the secrets of successful snowplowing are keeping to the centerline and always knowing where your plow edge is, Cooper

said as he peered out the windshield kept clear by a very hot cab heater.

That's due to another number he keeps in mind. Most roads have a 2% slope from the centerline to the ditch, Cooper said. You can use gravity to get the brine to flow where it will do the most good, he added.

Coming into a broad curve on the south end of Cecil, Cooper said, "I'm going to go a little high on the curve. That way, the brine will flow down the curve."

Cooper slows at intersections, such as where Highway 117 meets Highway 22 in Cecil, and hits "Blast" on his brine controls to put down more brine.

"That helps traffic not to slide through the intersection," he said.

Cooper's entire route is asphalt except for the Oconto County bridge near the north end.

"Concrete is a different kind of monster. Concrete freezes quicker. The radiant heat of the sun makes a big difference on asphalt," he said.

The worst time of day to plow is right at daylight, Cooper observed, because it's the coldest part of the night.

Wind and drifting are the worst for a driver, in Cooper's view, but he knows tricks to help drivers, as he did in a drifted area last week.

"I knew which way the wind was coming from so I 'cut' that side of the road back further. That helped for a few hours," he said.

"Cutting" or using the wing plow to get snow further off the road pushes the snow into balls. That tends to collect more snow and stay put, Cooper said.

Cooper later amended his "worst" statement.

"Really frigid weather, that's worst. That and ice," he said because removing ice requires a lot of heavy pressure from the plow.

Cooper found out early in his career that mailboxes are vulnerable although they are rarely knocked over by direct contact with a plow.

"If I have to clean up the shoulders, I'll go even slower because it's the weight of the snow ahead of the plow that breaks a mailbox," he said.

Street signs are also easy to snap off if plow drivers aren't careful in pushing the mounds of snow off the road at intersections. Again, it's the weight of the snow, not the plow, Cooper said.

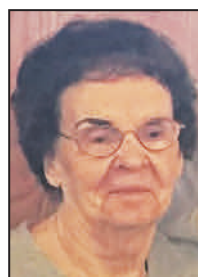

Sturgeon spearing on Lake Poygan: 30 hours by the hole

It's strange what you start thinking when you've been staring down a sturgeon spearing hole for hours.

An old Humble Pie tune came to mind: "30 Days in the Hole." This 1972 tune from the band's album "Smokin'" talks about someone getting caught with drugs and earning a jail sentence: "30 days in the hole."

When my spearing ended at 1 p.m. on Sunday, I'd spent exactly 30 hours staring down a 3-by-6-foot hole in the ice of Lake Poygan, crouching on a bar stool in a dark shanty. The stool makes it easier to see in the greenish, glowing hole — I honestly never touched a drop of alcohol in the five days I'd spent in a shanty, although I was definitely not the typical spearer for drinking only iced tea.

But if you aren't much of a drinker when you start this sport, there's a good chance you will want to learn by the time you call it quits for the season. I thought the wait for a deer to come past tested my patience for years as a bowhunter, and it still does. But sturgeon spearing makes watching paint dry seem like a front-row seat at the Indy 500.

Randy Lee of rural Winneconne did everything an experienced sturgeon man could to help me jab one of these living dinosaurs. He supplied the shanty, cut the hole with a special sled-equipped chainsaw, supplied the beautiful stainless-steel spear heads he handcrafted more than 30 years ago (and named for his children), then drove me every morning and afternoon for five days across the ice-rutted lake in his well-seasoned Chevy pickup truck.

not wanting to look away for even a minute, fearing he will miss that once-in-a-decade (or even lifetime) shot at a sturgeon!

The spearing Feb. 15 went faster because I was sitting with Randy's son, Chris Lee, a co-worker of mine at 4imprint in Oshkosh. Chatting about sturgeon and life in general helps the time pass. We are in about 5 feet of water, and the bottom is visible.

Chris, 37, is a seasoned spearer, having tagged four fish on Poygan in his life. Although Randy has successfully speared on Lake Winnebago, they both now focus their spearing efforts on Poygan, where the shallower, clearer water improves the odds. But since the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources started a lottery system for upriver lakes sturgeon tags in 2007, it now takes about seven years (sometimes eight) of applying to finally get a tag there! This means that dedicated Poygan spearers, like some sort of human cicadas, only get to spread their spearing wings every seven years.

But that doesn't stop the Lees from enjoying aspects of the sport annually.

Randy most enjoys setting people up for the task.

Had I let him down? Had I been looking away from the hole when a gray submarine passed by, avoiding the spear?

As the days slip by, the spearer becomes even more focused,

"I haven't applied for a tag in three years," he said. "I just like being out here, seeing everyone and talking to them." He also visits the "party shacks" — oversized shanties or even tents set up strictly for groups of non-spearers — for a cold beer and a hand or two of sheepshead.

Randy walked into his brother Ray's shanty that Saturday morning, just in time to see a long, gray shadow approaching the hole.

"There's a fish!" he yelled. Ray struggled to get the spear's handle free from a hook in the ceiling where it hung.

Seconds later, the sturgeon started to turn, possibly seeing the movement above. But it was too late for the 25-pound, 4-foot fish. Ray threw and his aim was true. The tines of one of Randy's handmade spear heads found the back and penetrated. It was just after 7:30 a.m. and in minutes, Ray Lee was on his way to Critter's Sports in Winneconne, one of the designated weigh stations.

Randy's phone never stops ringing. He knows all the spearers in this section of ice, and his popularity never wanes. Later that morning, another friend, Kevin Larson, jabs a bigger sturgeon. Larson had just cut in that morning about 100 yards from our shanty. In all, four fish are speared close to us since opening day (Feb. 8).

Ray's daughter, Alysha Fuss, who also has a Poygan tag, moves into her dad's shanty, hoping his luck will rub off. She's joined by her husband, Adam Fuss. Watching others spear is almost a sport on its own, since tags take so long to get.

There was a knock on our shanty door Saturday morning. "DNR," came a voice. Spearers are required to let game wardens enter. When the door opened, it was Adam, just joking with us! He sat with us for awhile, sharing a few laughs.

But the joke was on him. Less than 15 minutes later, there was another knock on the door. "DNR." This time, it was the real deal! A female game warden checked my tag and left.

Sunday was the longest of all for me. Those minutes passed by so slowly, but I maintained my confidence that I'd get one. That didn't happen.

We pulled the shanty, a borrowed one with a cracked trailer tongue that Randy jury-rigged with a ratchet strap. As we bounced across the massive ruts of Poygan, I heard a loud bump.

The tongue had pulled completely free of the shanty. He tossed the damaged tongue into the bed of his truck, leaving the shanty for removal another day, perhaps on a trailer.

For only the second time since 2007, the upriver lakes season will go the full 16 days, ending Sunday (Feb. 23). Lake Winnebago's season also went the full term, mostly because of questionable ice. As of Tuesday, upriver lakes spearers were still 30 fish shy of the 95-fish adult female quota, and Winnebago spearers were 710 fish shy of the 855-fish adult female quota. Only 270 fish have been speared on the upriver lakes and 296 on Winnebago so far, a fraction of most years.

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF BONDUÉL, SHAWANO COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN that CHAPTER 28, TRAFFIC CODE, §28-15, ALL-TERRAIN/UTILITY-TERRAIN VEHICLE ROUTES, is hereby repealed and recreated as follows:

Sec. 28-15. – All-Terrain/Utility-Terrain Vehicle Routes

(a) *Intent.* The Village of Bonduel, Shawano County, Wisconsin hereby adopts the following all-terrain vehicle (ATV) and utility-terrain vehicle (UTV) upon roadways listed in subsection (c) of this section.
