Bakhtiari, Jenkins sidelined with injuries

3 O-line backups took the field in week 1

After a 23-7 loss to the Minnesota Vikings, the Green Bay Packers have their sights set on Chicago, as they host the divisional rival on Sept. 18.

During the game, Vikings wide receiver Justin Jefferson had a career day, recording 184 receiving yards and two touchdowns. While that does call for concern on the defensive side of the ball, another major problem for the Packers was on the offensive line.

The Packers were without star linemen David Bakhtiari and Elgton Jenkins on Sunday, leading to Minnesota recording four sacks. Left guard Jon Runyan also left this game to be evaluated for a concussion.

"I think they had four sacks or whatever," said Green Bay Packers head coach Matt LaFleur, talking about the Vikings defense and Jefferson. "Didn't stop their big-time playmakers and allowed them to make big-time plays. If you do that, you're not

going to win very many games in this league."

LaFleur also touched on former Green Bay Linebacker Za'Darius Smith, who now plays for Minnesota, impact on the game, as he was in the Packers' backfield all day.

"He had a critical sack fumble. He had another sack on a third down," said LaFleur. "You know, we knew Z was going to be amped up and ready to go, and he is a great player. Give them credit, they had a great scheme."

"They weren't going to try to give up big plays. They definitely kept a lid on top of us for the most part, and when you do that and you're trying to throw some big-time plays, that allows sometimes the pass rushers to hit home."

Talking about the offensive line, Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers said that whoever is on the field should be prepared to play.

"These guys are NFL players," said Rodgers. "There's expectation whoever is in there that they're going to play well."

Green Bay Packers center Jake Hanson echoed words of his previous teammates saying that the offensive line did not come prepared to play.

"We knew what they were going to throw at us," said Hanson. "There

were looks that we have seen from our defense in the past. We just did not go out and execute the way we should have."

With Chicago coming to Green Bay, the Packers will once again have their hands full with Robert Quinn, who was second in sacks in the NFL last season with 18½ sacks. In order to stop Quinn and company, Hanson said that consistency throughout the game is the key to getting into a groove.

"There were a lot of good things, but so many bad things that outweighed some of those positives," said Hanson. "That is the biggest thing in this game is the consistency. We have to be able to stack drives and be able to do it over and over again. We cannot let big plays or the defense get in the way of the production of our offense."

During training camp, the Packers experimented with different combinations of players, including Zach Tom and Rasheed Walker. That has been due in part to Jenkins and Bakhtiari being sidelined with their injuries.

With both players' statuses to return up in the air, running backs Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon and tight ends Robert Tonyan, Mercedes Lewis, Josiah Deguara and Tyler Davis may have to play a bigger role as blockers.

"Dave and Elgton are doing every-

thing they can do and are day-to-day, but certainly it does put a little bit of strain, but that is not an excuse," said LaFleur on the effect of not having the linemen. "We've got to adapt. We've got to adjust. We obviously didn't do that, and we've got to be better."

Tonyan is one of the players who missed part of training camp to suit up in the first game. Playing on the offensive line, Tonyan said that as the pressure grew, the game became tougher to play.

"It is tough playing from behind in those circumstances, but I think putting this behind us and focusing on next week is going to be key," said Tonyan.

Beyond the Bears, Green Bay faces Tampa Bay and New England, who should once again feature strong pass rushing. Chicago should be a big test for every offensive lineman, as the first game in Lambeau Field in the 2022 season should have the fans excited.

While it is early in the season, dropping a divisional game puts Green Bay back in a tiebreaker scenario. For Green Bay to avoid another divisional loss, strong offensive line play will be needed while Bakhtiari and Jenkins continue to rehab their injuries.

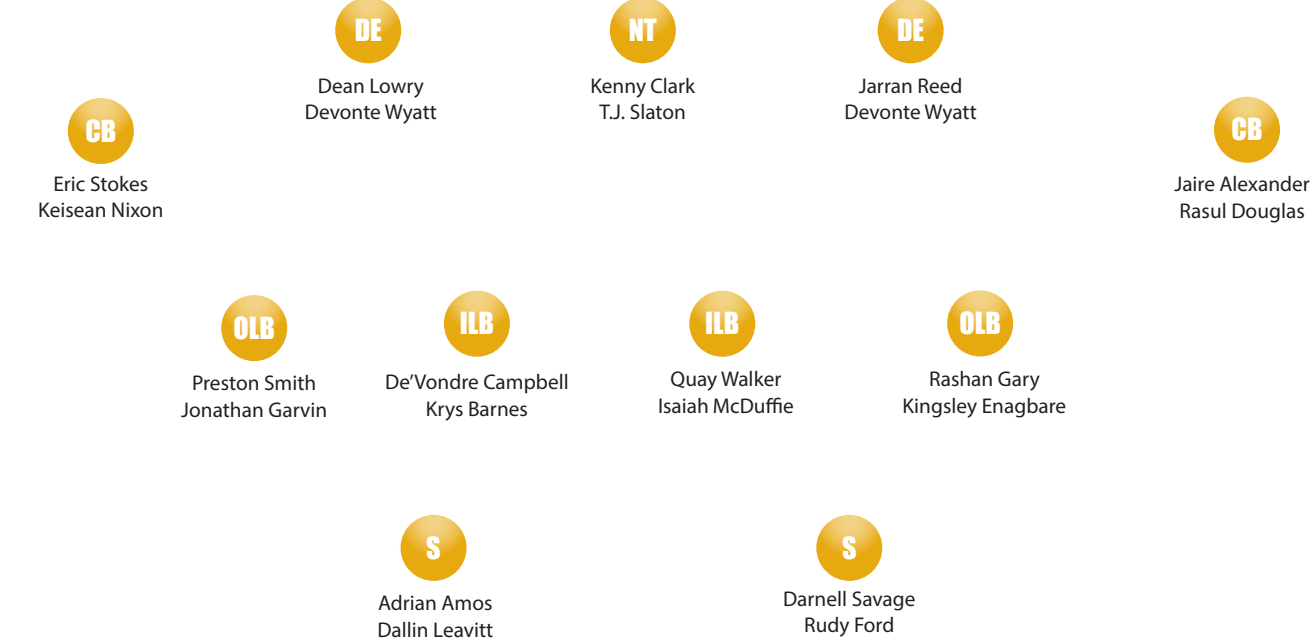

Packers offer limited standing-room-only tickets

The Green Bay Packers have a limited amount of standing-room-only tickets available for each regular-season contest at Lambeau Field this season.

The tickets, priced at \$89 each (plus applicable fees), allow fans to stand in the area behind sections 432s to 442s, on the fourth level of Lambeau Field's south end.

In addition to standing behind the seating sections in that area, game attendees can use the viewing platforms on either side of the sections. Concession stands and restrooms are readily available in the concourse area.

The Invisalign Gate on the south side of the stadium is the recommended stadium entrance gate for those with standing-room-only tickets.

Tickets currently are available for purchase online. To access the page to purchase tickets, visit packers.com/tickets and click on individual games to view available tickets. The tickets will be listed as standing room only. A limit of eight per household has been established.

Additionally, the tickets are not able to be resold on NFL Ticket Exchange.

Packers lead the series 103-95-6. They've won six in a row, 11 of the last 12, 15 of the last 17 and 21 of the last 24.

Coaches

Green Bay – Matt LaFleur, 39-11, fourth season. Chicago — Matt Eberflus, 1-0, first season.

When the Packers have the ball

Eberflus was hired because of his strong track record as a defensive coordinator. That side of the ball had been trending the wrong way, going from first in points allowed in 2018 and fourth in 2019 to 22nd last year, when the Bears plunged to 6-11.

Chicago allowed only 10 points in the season-opening win vs. the 49ers, but who knows what that means considering the game was played in a swimming pool.

On the front, Robert Quinn and Al-Quadin Muhammad are the defensive ends. Quinn ranked second in the league last season with 18½ sacks and added four forced fumbles. All 49 of his snaps against San Francisco came at right end, meaning a matchup against the left tackle, either Yosh Nijman or veteran David Bakhtiari.

Muhammad had six sacks last season with Eberflus in Indianapolis. Angelo Jackson and Justin Jones are the defensive tackles, with former Packers player Mike Pennel among the backups.

Roquan Smith is one of the best linebackers in the NFL. He had nine tackles in his debut after a power-house season of 163 tackles, three sacks and 12 tackles for losses last year. He's a sideline-to-sideline player. He is joined at linebacker by Nicholas Morrow, who had 78 tackles in 11 starts last season for the Raiders, and Matthew Adams, a backup with the Colts the past four seasons.

Third-year standout Jaylon Johnson and second-round pick Kyler Gordon are the cornerbacks, and former Pro Bowler Eddie Jackson and second-round pick Jaquan Brisker are the safeties. Kindle Vildor is the third corner in nickel situations.

Jackson, who had six picks in 2018, had his first since 2019 in the opener. The Bears think Brisker is going to be a star.

Three rookies play key roles, with Brisker and Gordon in the secondary and fifth-round defensive end Dominique Robinson (1½ sacks vs. San Francisco) coming off the bench.

"It was good by really all the rookies," Eberflus said Sept. 12. "You look at the way the rookies performed, from the punter to our nickel (Gordon) to Dominique to all the guys that played, Braxton, they all played well.

"And I think that's really a tribute to (general manager) Ryan Poles and his staff bringing the guys in here that have the maturity to be able to handle an NFL game, the coaches getting them ready, and then the guys going out there and doing it. I was happy with all the rookies."

When the Bears have the ball

Chicago's new offense is coordinated by Luke Getsy, the former Packers quarterbacks coach. In Green Bay, Getsy had Aaron Rodgers. In Chicago, he's got Justin Fields, last year's first-round pick who had a dismal rookie season with seven touchdowns, 10 interceptions and a 28th-ranked passer rating of 73.2.

Fields only completed eight passes in an epic downpour against the 49ers

but two of those were for touchdowns.

"He's been great with everything; footwork and timing, playing on time and the little details of playing quarterback," Fields said of Getsy. "He knows what drills to work, what I need to work on. He's been great. I love having him here."

The Bears can run the ball. David Montgomery and Khalil Herbert aren't exactly Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon but it's a quality tandem. Montgomery has topped 1,000 total yards each of his first three seasons. Herbert added 433 rushing yards last year as a rookie and had a team-high 45 yards vs. the 49ers.

Much like Green Bay, Chicago has limited options on the perimeter. Darnell Mooney, Dante Pettis and former Packers player Equanimeous St. Brown are the primary receivers. Mooney caught 81 passes for 1,055 yards last season, and Pettis and St. Brown scored against the 49ers. Tight end Cole Kmet had 60 catches last season.

The offensive line is the overwhelming weak link. Braxton Smith, a fifth-round rookie, starts at left tackle. A pair of former second-round picks,

Cody Whitehair and Teven Jenkins, are the guards, 2021 fifth-rounder Larry Borom is the right tackle and Sam Mustipher, an undrafted free agent in 2019, is the center.

Former Packers lineman Lucas Patrick split the playing time with Jenkins. There's no reason why Green Bay's front, which had a quiet game at Minnesota, shouldn't set the tone and control the line of scrimmage.

Special teams

The Bears have a reliable kicker with veteran Cairo Santos, who made 93.8% of his field goals in 2020 and 86.7% last season. They replaced new Packers punter Pat O'Donnell with Trenton Gill, a seventh-round pick. He averaged 46.2 yards on six punts in the monsoon.

Trestan Ebner, a running back selected in the sixth round, averaged 24 yards per kickoff return in his NFL debut. He's got 4.43 speed in the 40. Pettis, who's never been a full-time returner, handles punt returns.

Green Bay's special teams had a solid debut under new coordinator Rich Bisaccia. Amari Rodgers had a 12-yard punt return and O'Donnell's four punts yielded only 7 return yards.

Q&A WITH AARON JONES

Q: What gives you confidence that the team will bounce back vs. Chicago?

A: Just knowing that the biggest jump comes from week one to week two in the league, and that's probably one of the biggest jumps that you'll see through the season. That's with all teams. We know what it takes, we know it starts (with) the North and we've got another North opponent coming in, so we've got to handle business.

Q: Were you frustrated after getting only eight touches against the Vikings?

A: No, sir, I'm not frustrated. I just do what I can when my number is called and make the most of every opportunity I get.

Q: Then the quarterback was frustrated for you. Aaron (Rodgers) said you needed more touches.

A: It definitely puts a smile on your face knowing that he wants you to be getting the ball, as well, not just yourself who wants it.

Q: After the game, Aaron (Rodgers) was talking about mental mistakes with some of the young

players. How long did it take to get to where you needed to be in terms of the mental mistakes?

A: It definitely is a challenge. I would say it comes with time and reps – game reps at that. But I would say normally after the second, third game, you see those mistakes and those things leaving and guys getting more comfortable. But, like I said, it comes with those game reps.”

Q: So you have to see those situations in a game?

A: For me, it was different. I had four weeks where I didn't play any offense. But I got to sit there and watch and look and learn. So, I mean, everybody learns in different ways. Some people learn by actually taking a rep. Me, I learn from both – watching and taking the rep.

I take those notes down, so when it's my turn to get out there, I know what to expect or what's coming. Now that I'm on the field, I want to stay on the field.

Q: In retrospect, was it easier to not have to play right away?

A: Definitely, I think that did have its plus to it. At the time, to me, it didn't. I wanted to play. But it gave me a month. I think I was on two special teams. The first week, I wasn't even active.

So, it did give me the time to see the speed of the game, what's going on in our offense, understand it and what we were trying to achieve both on special teams and on offense. Now I look back on it, I'm thankful for that time. Everything happens for a reason.

Q: Is there a fine line between getting more touches now but staying fresh and strong for later in the season?

A: You want to keep your backs healthy for the whole season, 17 games plus the playoffs. You want to keep 'em fresh, but you also want to give them a workload, as well. Where is that fine line when you have two very good, capable backs? I do like being fresher towards the end of the season, when other guys are beat up at the end, you're a little bit fresher, so it does help.”

Q: You guys have a strong history of bouncing back after a loss. What's the secret to that?

A: Just getting back together as a team, going back over what happened

the previous week and how can we grow from that, knowing that this year it's a division opponent coming in. You never want to start off 0-2, especially in your division. So, we've got to handle business and just be ready to execute at a high level.”

Q: You passed Hall of Famer Tony Canadeo and moved into fourth place on the team's career rushing list on Sunday. What does that mean?

A: It is crazy to me. I think I saw it yesterday on Twitter or something. It took him I don't know how many games, I can't remember the stat, but I was like, 'Wow, it does seem like it happened pretty fast.' But that lets me know I'm doing my job at a pretty high level and I look to continue to do that.

It's honestly a blessing because there's been a lot of running backs here over the 100 years and to have my name in history with some of those greats is special.”

Q: Speaking of history, you're sixth all-time (among all running backs with 600 career carries) in yards per carry (5.1) alongside guys like Jim Brown and Barry Sanders.

A: I've got to get up to No. 1. I keep that 9.8 (yards per carry vs. Minnesota), we'll be good. (laughter)

Bouncing back

The Pack need to bounce back. Fortunately for the Green Bay Packers, the Chicago Bears are next on the docket.

The Packers performed miserably in their season-opening 23-7 loss at the Minnesota Vikings. Offensively, the makeshift line struggled, receivers weren't open and coach Matt LaFleur inexplicably forgot about his running backs. Defensively, a veteran group in the secondary was its own worst enemy against premier receiver Justin Jefferson.

The Packers will need to rebound to avoid an 0-2 start. Having the Bears coming to town for "Sunday Night Football" should help. LaFleur is 6-0 against the Bears, with the four wins the last two seasons all decided by at least 10 points. Quarterback Aaron Rodgers is 22-5 against Chicago. He's thrown 16 touchdowns vs. zero interceptions with LaFleur in charge.

Green Bay has lost three in a row – the meaningless finale at Detroit, the playoff game against San Francisco and now the opener at Minnesota. But, in same-season regular-season action, the Packers have not dropped back-to-back games under LaFleur. That includes winning seven in a row after getting embarrassed by the Saints in last year's opener.

"I think that's just life in the National Football League. If you live on what you did yesterday, whether you win or you lose, you're not going to get better," LaFleur said. "We're always going to be very, very critical and hard on ourselves from a coaching standpoint, from a player standpoint, and try to make the necessary adjustments, try to make the necessary corrections and try to avoid this in the future as best we can.

"This league is a humbling league. You better be your best every opportunity that you get to go out on that field, otherwise you get stuck up here answering your guys' questions."

Alexander's role

One of those questions was about Green Bay's defensive game plan against Minnesota. The Vikings' stud receiver, Justin Jefferson, had nine catches for 184 yards and two touchdowns. On most of

those plays, he was wide open.

Why didn't the Packers use Jaire Alexander — the NFL's highest-paid cornerback — to shadow Jefferson?

That's easier said than done. Defensive coordinator Joe Barry

prefers a balanced approach to coverage. Last season, his secondary played man coverage 30% of the time, according to Sports Info Solutions. If a defense is playing man, then it's easy to have one cornerback assigned to one receiver. In

zone, it's impossible.

On those zone looks, Eric Stokes was the cornerback on the defense's right. So, the Vikings put Jefferson on the offense's left, away from Alexander.

One potential solution would

be to play man on third downs. On Sunday, Jefferson had two catches of 20-plus yards on third down as well as a touchdown on fourth down.

"I think that's something we'll talk about each and every week, and every week's a little bit different," LaFleur said. "But we have a lot of confidence in our other corners out there, too, whether it's Stokes or Rasul Douglas. So it's how exotic do you want to be and exactly what do you want to do?"

After the game, Alexander walked a fine line when discussing Jefferson's big day.

"The gameplan was to not allow '18' to beat us," he said. "We did much better in the second half than in the first half. Why I wasn't on him, that's not my call. Anybody who watches me play, you know that's what I want. But we played him much better in the second half, but in the first half he looked like a premier receiver in the league."

Back to the backs

With the offseason trade of Davante Adams, the Packers needed to find new ways to move the ball. Presumably, that would mean a heavier reliance on running backs Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon. That wasn't the case on Sunday, though. While Dillon had 15 touches (10 carries, team-high five receptions), Jones inexplicably only got the ball eight times (five runs, three receptions).

LaFleur blamed himself immediately after the game and again on Monday. To be sure, Jones and Dillon need more opportunities. On the other hand, tight end Robert Tonyan was playing in his first game following last year's torn ACL, veteran receiver Sammy Watkins was making his Packers debut and rookie receivers Christian Watson and Romeo Doubs needed opportunities, too.

"Everybody has their own desires and wants. The bottom line is you have to find a way to win the game," LaFleur said. "I think that's something that we struggle with each and every week. Because you'd like to get everybody involved. Certainly, if you have more plays, it's a hell of a lot easier to do."

"But we've got to put ourselves in better position to maximize on our opportunities. There was opportunities from an offensive standpoint to cash in. Certainly, first play of the game and not converting on a fourth down (at the Vikings' 1). We've got to be better in those situations."

That means improvement on third and fourth down, where the Packers were a combined 3-of-11.

Punt problems

On paper, it was a strong debut for new punter Pat O'Donnell. Having spent his first eight seasons in Chicago, O'Donnell averaged 44.8 yards on four punts with three placed inside the 20-yard line.

However, the Vikings almost blocked three of the punts. There's

no doubt Chicago will see that on film and try to attack, as well.

"Definitely way too leaky," LaFleur said of the protection. "Guys have got to trust their teammate. They've got to trust themselves and the techniques that we work since the day Rich (Bisaccia, the new special teams coordinator) got here. I think you saw a little bit of that go away in the game. You've got to trust your technique, trust the way

you've been trained. You can't go rogue and deviate from that. I think there was a little of that that was going on.

"That's why there were a couple situations where there was way too much penetration. All in all, I thought Pat did a hell of a job punting the football. I thought our coverage was on point. For the most part, I thought our special teams did a nice job."

Packers beat up by Vikings in opener

GB has no answers for Jefferson

Justin Jefferson started his third season with Minnesota by smashing rival Green Bay for 184 receiving yards and two touchdowns, giving new Vikings coach Kevin O'Connell a 23-7 victory over the Packers in his first game on Sept. 11.

After accumulating the most receiving yards (3,016) in a player's first two years in the NFL, Jefferson set an all-time Vikings receiving record with 158 yards in the first half against a stacked Packers defense.

Kirk Cousins completed 23 of 32 passes for 277 yards without a turnover, targeting Jefferson on more than a third of his throws and keeping the Packers on their heels for most of the afternoon.

Aaron Rodgers' first game without Davante Adams was a struggle, and the three-time defending NFC North

champion Packers fell flat in their opener for the second straight season. Last year, they deftly rebounded from a 38-3 defeat by New Orleans, but a repeat will require some new wide receivers to quickly emerge in rhythm with Rodgers.

The Packers are going to need a healthy offensive line for once, too, after they played most of the second half with three backups.

Jefferson rewarded O'Connell for his first critical in-game decision by catching a 4-yard touchdown pass on fourth-and-1 to punctuate the first possession. When Adam Thielen ran a slant, cornerback Eric Stokes and safety Adrian Amos both turned inside — leaving Jefferson wide open in the flat after he came in motion across the formation.

Jefferson had a 36-yard reception for a score in the final minute of the first half to give the Vikings a 17-0 lead. He came close to a third touchdown on the previous drive, too, but his diving catch at the edge of the end zone was a bit too far for him to drop both feet down.

That drive yielded the first of two

field goals by Greg Joseph — who later made a career-long 56-yarder — and was set up by a 64-yard gain by Jefferson on a burst between Amos and fellow safety Darnell Savage to grab the heave from Cousins. The "MVP" chants from the fired-up crowd in Minnesota came soon after for Jefferson.

Allen Lazard, the leading returning receiver this year for Green Bay, didn't play because of an ankle injury. Starting tackles David Bakhtiari and Elgton Jenkins were also inactive.

Sporting a fresh haircut after a summer of personal rejuvenation, Rodgers returned to an offensive cast that needs plenty of work — the running back duo of Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon aside. Rodgers went 22 for 34 for 195 yards.

Second-round draft pick Christian Watson, who was taken after the Packers traded up with the Vikings for the No. 34 overall selection, juked past 12-year veteran Patrick Peterson on the first snap for the Packers and let what would've been a 75-yard touchdown pass slip through his hands.

Rough start

Rodgers and coach Matt LaFleur — the winningest coach in NFL history through his first three seasons — showed plenty of frustration on the sideline. The defense did, too.

Rodgers even had his NFL-record streak against division opponents of 38 touchdown passes without an interception stopped near the end of the second quarter when his see-what-happens heave was picked off by Harrison Smith. The last one was snagged by Detroit's Amani Oruwariye on Dec. 29, 2019.

Injury report

Packers LG Jon Runyan entered the concussion protocol in the third quarter and was replaced by rookie Zach Tom.

Rookie LB Quay Walker — the team's first round draft pick — departed with a shoulder injury in the fourth quarter along with backup CB Keisean Nixon.

Backup LB Krys Barnes, who replaced Walker, hurt his ankle and left on a cart in the fourth quarter.
