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Pack's GM excited about team's d-line, OLBs

Team needs improvement at WR and on special teams

The Green Bay Packers once again have their eyes set on winning the Super Bowl after suffering a heart-breaking divisional round loss to the San Francisco 49ers back in January.

This offseason though, the Packers underwent a change on offense, as two-time All-Pro wide receiver Davante Adams was traded to the Las Vegas Raiders in the offseason. This opens up a major vacancy in the receiving room, as Adams was targeted 169 times in 2021. Those 169 targets were tied for second in all of the NFL.

The Packers combated Adams' departure by signing wide receiver Sammy Watkins, who spent 2021 with the Baltimore Ravens. The team also drafted three more wide receivers who made the 53-man roster — second-round pick Christian Watson, fourth-round pick Romeo Doubs and seventh-round pick Samori Toure.

Toure finished the preseason with nine receptions for 125 yards. Due to his performance in preseason games and in training camp, Toure found a spot on the active roster over Juwan Winfree, who has been with the team since 2020. Winfree was recently signed to the Packers' practice squad.

"Those are some tough calls," said Packers General Manager Brian Gutekunst, when talking about keeping Toure over Winfree. "Samori really started to excel towards the second half of training camp. Samori's ability in the slot and his ability to get open really intrigues us."

With four new faces in the receiving room, buzz surrounding the running back duo of Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon has commenced. The duo are currently the only running backs on the Packers' depth chart, but 2021 seventh-round pick Kylin Hill, who will miss the first four games of the season, figures to be in the mix as well.

With the lack of depth currently at the running back position, Gutekunst said that a wide receiver could help to fill that void.

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"I think that the emergence of Amari Rodgers doing some stuff back there on gameday could help us," said Gutekunst. "We have some flexibility there, so that was part of the decision (to only keep two running backs on the active roster)."

In regards to the defensive side of the ball, Gutekunst said that a major focal point of the defense will be the defensive line. The Packers enter season with six defensive linemen on the active roster — Kenny Clark, Dean Lowry, Jarran Reed, T.J. Slaton, Devonte Wyatt and Jonathan Ford.

"We are excited about our defensive line group — we think it is very deep," said Gutekunst, noting the talent at each position, as well as on the practice squad. "If we have to dig into depth, we feel pretty good about it."

Outside linebackers were also a point of emphasis during Gutekunst's Aug. 31 press conference, as Gutekunst said that he feels comfortable on the state of that position

room.

"We have had some guys with Rashan (Gary), Preston (Smith) and Jonathan Garvin coming back — J.J. (Kingsley Enagbare) is really the only new one — obviously Tipa (Galeai) is there as well — so, really four of those guys have been here and we know what those guys are," said Gutekunst. "Jonathan and Tipa have really taken some nice steps and obviously Preston and Rashan are real-deal players. I think for us, as we go through it, when Rashan and Preston come off of the field, those other guys have to hold their own."

Special teams was a major issue for the Packers in 2021, as a myriad of special teams mistakes led to many scoring opportunities for the opponents. This included San Francisco blocking a punt and returning it for a touchdown to tie the game late in the fourth quarter in the divisional round of the playoffs.

In the offseason, the Packers hired Las Vegas special team coordinator

Rich Bisaccia to help rebuild that unit.

"I think that we have done a little bit of things that might be out of character for us, as far as some of the guys that we brought in that don't play as big of a role on offense or defense, but are more heavy special teams players," said Gutekunst, on what has changed in the offseason with special teams. "We will kind of see how that goes. We have to get better there to accomplish the goals that this team wants to accomplish."

Over the last three regular seasons, the Packers have compiled a record of 39-10, giving head coach Matt LaFleur the NFL record for most regular season wins in their first three seasons as a head coach. With that 39-10 record though, the Packers are just 2-3 in the playoffs over that stretch, with two losses coming in NFC Championship Games.

With Aaron Rodgers on the team for his 18th season, the most in Green Bay history, the Packers are once again looking to compete for a championship.

"It is the same thing as last year, just winning the (NFC) North again and just hoping to get over that hump and make it to the Super Bowl," said Green Bay Packers guard Royce Newman, on his goals for the team for the season.

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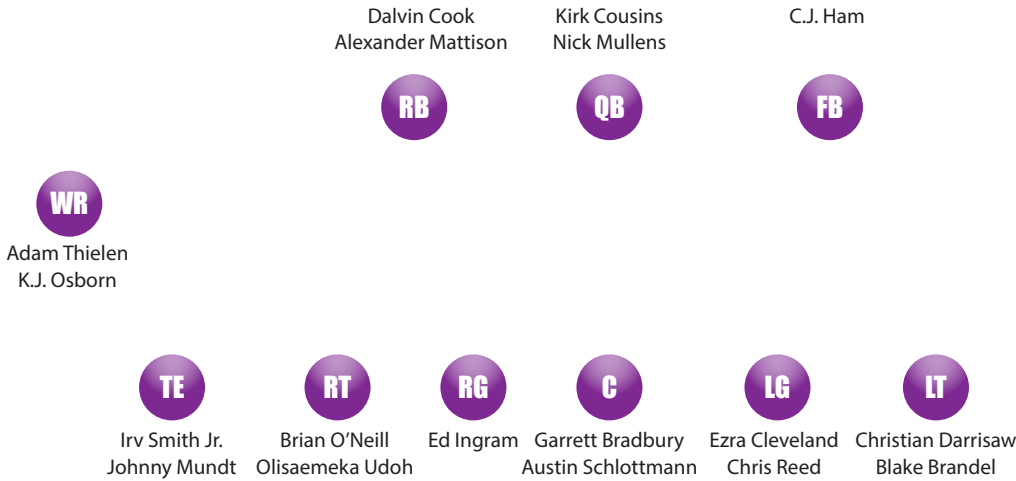


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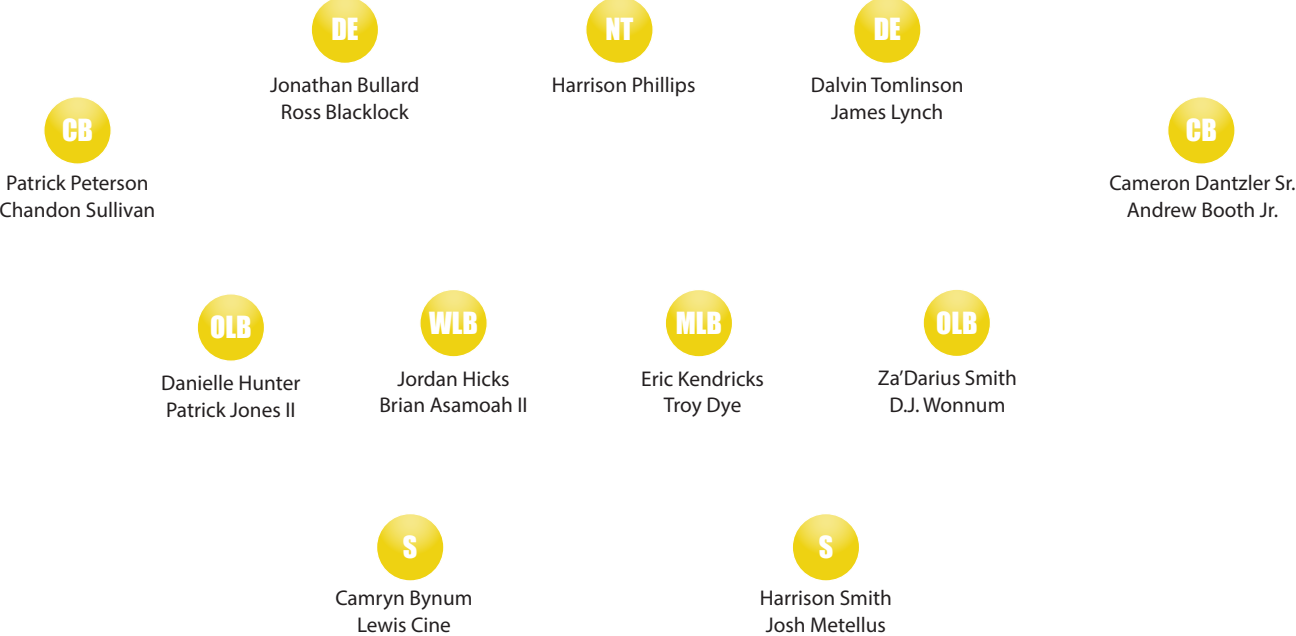
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VIKINGS DEPTH CHART

Morgan Burnett retires as a Green Bay Packer

Former safety Morgan Burnett, who played eight seasons (2010-2017) in Green Bay, has informed the club of his decision to retire with the Packers.

The announcement was made Aug. 30 by General Manager Brian Gutekunst.

Burnett was originally selected in the third round (No. 71 overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Packers out of Georgia Tech.

He started all 102 regular-season games and all 11 postseason contests he played in with Green Bay.

Burnett contributed to teams that won the NFC North five times, finished with 10-plus wins on six occasions and won Super Bowl XLV.

Over his eight years with the Packers, Burnett registered 721 tackles (556 solo), nine interceptions, 7½ sacks, 69 passes defended, eight forced fumbles and nine fumble recoveries.

He finished with 100-plus tackles four times and was the only Packer to surpass 100 tackles each season from 2011-14.

Burnett finished No. 3 among Green Bay safeties (since 1982) in career sacks, trailing only Leroy Butler (20½) and Mark Murphy (11), according to STATS.

In the playoffs, Burnett recorded 66 tackles (54 solo), two sacks, two interceptions and eight passes defended.

Burnett finished his career playing a season with the Pittsburgh Steelers (2018) and a season with the Cleveland Browns (2019), playing 19 games with 10 starts over those two years.

KEYS TO THE GAME

The Green Bay Packers will travel to face the Minnesota Vikings at 3:25 p.m. on Sept. 11 at U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis. FOX will televise the game.

History

Packers leads 64-56-3, including 1-1 in playoffs. Packers coach Matt LaFleur is 1-2 in Minneapolis.

Coaches

Green Bay – Matt LaFleur, 39-10, fourth season. Minnesota — Kevin O’Connell (first season).

When the Packers have the ball

Minnesota’s defense is led by Ed Donatell, who coordinated the Packers’ defense from 2000 through 2003. He will be tasked with fixing a Vikings defense that had fallen on hard times. Under former coach Mike Zimmer, the Vikings fielded

defenses that ranked inside the top 10 in points allowed every season from 2015 through 2019. However, they ranked 29th in 2020 and 25th in 2021.

Donatell has been attached to the hip of Vic Fangio for years. That means a 3-4 base defense and a lot of two-deep coverages, which will force Aaron Rodgers and Co. to be patient.

That scheme only works with a strong pass rush. The Vikings should have that with Danielle

Hunter and former Packers star Za’Darius Smith lining up as the outside linebackers. Hunter had back-to-back seasons of 14½ sacks in 2018 and 2019. He missed 2020 following back surgery, then had six sacks in seven games in 2021 before suffering a torn pectoral.

There are injury concerns with Smith, too. He had a total of 26 sacks in 2019 and 2020 but missed most of last season with a back injury.

To combat Hunter and Smith,

an obvious key to the game will be the availability of left tackle David Bakhtiari and right tackle Elgton Jenkins, both of whom are coming off torn ACLs.

"I can get through the season," Bakhtiari said Sept. 5. "It's going to be fine. You have to just manage while playing."

"I'm just getting back in the swing of things. So, I mean, I think there's normal rust and then new normal with three surgeries, so just kind of working that out and figuring out what my routine is."

Dalvin Tomlinson, Jonathan Bullard and Harrison Phillips are the defensive tackles, with Ross Blacklock the first man off the bench.

Tomlinson, a second-round pick by the Giants in 2017, has started 80 of a possible 81 games in his career. He's never been to a Pro Bowl but he's not far off that level. The rest of the group is suspect.

Phillips started a career-high eight games last season for Buffalo and Bullard has 15 starts in six seasons. Blacklock, a second-round pick by Houston in 2020, started three games in two seasons and was acquired in a trade last week.

Eric Kendricks and Jordan Hicks form a high-quality tandem at inside linebacker. Kendricks had 143 tackles, five sacks, eight tackles for losses and two interceptions last season.

The Vikings replaced Anthony Barr with Hicks. He started every game the past three seasons for the Cardinals, with a career-high 150 tackles in 2019 and a career-high four sacks in 2021.

The secondary is the weak link, though it remains to be seen if the Packers' revamped receiver corps can take advantage.

For now, Patrick Peterson and Cameron Dantzler will man the corners, former Packers defender Chandon Sullivan will handle the slot, and Harrison Smith and Camryn Bynum will line up as the safeties.

Smith has been picked for six of the last seven Pro Bowls. He had a career-high 114 tackles last year after matching his career high with five picks in 2020. The futures, however, are first-round safety Lewis Cine and second-round cornerback Andrew Booth.

When the Vikings have the ball

O'Connell comes from the same Sean McVay coaching tree as LaFleur.

"I think it definitely will look a lot like our offense, but they have a different set of skill players, so you have to prepare differently,"

said Packers linebacker De'Vondre Campbell.

There's been a lot of hype about Green Bay's defense, and for good reason. With high-quality talent at every position, there's no reason why this shouldn't be a top-five unit. But the Vikings will pose a great opening test, with Kirk Cousins at quarterback, Dalvin Cook at running back and receiver Justin Jefferson leading a fleet of superb pass-catchers.

"They got some talented players, even at the quarterback position," Campbell said. "Kirk Cousins is a good quarterback. He knows how to get the ball out of his hands quick. It's going to be a tough challenge."

Jefferson is the best playmaker in the division. As a rookie in 2020, his 1,400 receiving yards were the most by a rookie in the Super Bowl era. Last season, he caught 108 passes for 1,616 yards and 10 touchdowns. He's got speed, route-running skill and excellent hands.

Veteran Adam Thielen has 24 touchdown receptions the past two seasons, No. 3 receiver K.J. Osborn caught 50 passes for 655 yards and seven scores last year, and the Vikings are expecting a breakout season from third-year tight end Irv Smith.

Cook and Alexander Mattison are Minnesota's version of Aaron Jones and AJ Dillon. Last year, they combined for 1,650 rushing yards and 66 receptions. Cook is a stud with 1,135 rushing yards in 2019, 1,557 yards in 2020 and 1,159 yards in 2021. In seven career games against Green Bay, he has games of 191 total yards and one touchdown and 229 total yards and four touchdowns.

The front will consist of left tackle Christian Darrisaw, left guard Ezra Cleveland, center Garrett Bradbury, right guard Ed Ingram and right tackle Brian O'Neill. The tackles are excellent, Bradbury

is the weak link and Ingram, a second-round rookie, is the unknown.

Special teams

Is Green Bay's new special teams actually improved? The Vikings will provide a test for a unit that Rodgers hopes can simply "break even."

The biggest challenge? Kickoff returner Kene Nwangwu averaged 32.2 yards with two touchdowns last season. Rookie Jalen Nailor, a sixth-round pick with big-time speed, might handle punts.

While longtime Packers kicker Mason Crosby is back after missing all of training camp following knee surgery, Minnesota's Greg Joseph made 33-of-38 field-goal attempts including 7-of-9 from 50-plus yards.

Ryan Wright beat out incumbent punter Jordan Berry, who was excellent last season with 26 inside-the-20s vs. three touchbacks. Wright averaged 52 yards per punt in the preseason.

After free agency and the draft, offseason practices and training camp, the time is here. For the 12th time, the Green Bay Packers are ready to take aim at a second Super Bowl championship during the Aaron Rodgers era. The journey will start Sept. 11 at the Minnesota Vikings.

Roadblocks, as always, stand in their way.

Here are five questions that must be answered for the Packers to be dancing under the confetti at State Farm Stadium in Glendale, Arizona, following Super Bowl LVII on Feb. 12.

1. Health of the offensive line

On Dec. 31, 2020, All-Pro left tackle David Bakhtiari suffered a torn ACL at practice. A few weeks later, the Packers gave up five sacks in a five-point loss to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the NFC Championship Game.

With a healthy Bakhtiari, the Packers probably would have at least won that game to reach the Super Bowl.

On Nov. 21, 2021, Pro Bowler Elton Jenkins suffered a torn ACL in a three-point loss at Minnesota. With Bakhtiari unable to overcome his knee injury, the Packers were shocked 13-10 by the San Francisco 49ers in the divisional playoffs. Had Green Bay's best linemen been available, they probably would have at least won that game.

As the 2022 season approaches, the status of Bakhtiari and Jenkins is in doubt. Regardless of whether they're on the field for the opener, the Packers will be in a great position if Bakhtiari is the starting left tackle and Jenkins is the starting right tackle for the playoffs.

"You're talking about two guys that are All-Pro players," coach Matt LaFleur said. "Whenever they do come back, we can't expect them to be at the exact same level as when they went out. I just think that's a little unrealistic. These guys

haven't played ball in a long time. You've got to knock the rust off and they're going to have to work through some things.

"But, certainly, they know how to play the game. They know what to expect when they go out there. Just their ability to communicate and see things, their experience speaks for itself. So, I do think there's going to be a ton of benefit to when we can get them out there. It definitely makes it a lot easier from a gameplan purpose."

2. Overcoming loss of Davante Adams

During the LaFleur era, the Packers won all seven games without Davante Adams. Now, can they win games over a 20-or 21-game stretch without arguably the best receiver in the NFL?

For the first time in Rodgers' superb run as Green Bay's starter, he'll be going into a season without a proven No. 1 receiver.

In 2011, when he won his first MVP, that receiver corps was so loaded that then-rookie Randall

Cobb finished seventh on the team in catches. In 2014, when Rodgers won his second MVP, he had Jordy Nelson, Cobb and then-rookie Adams as his big three.

During his MVP seasons of 2020 and 2021, the indomitable Adams became an uncoverable force, a marriage of Adams' talent, Rodgers' brilliance and their uncanny connection.

Did Rodgers force the ball to Adams? At times, sure. But, by and large, Adams got the ball because he was open.

Now, the question is whether the veteran trio of Allen Lazard, Sammy Watkins and Cobb will be good enough to get open in key moments of big games against excellent secondaries. And if not, when will the rookie duo of second-rounder Christian Watson and fourth-rounder Romeo Doubs be ready to help?

3. Lack of depth on defense

Green Bay's starting 12 on defense – the 11 in its base 3-4 align-

ment and nickel defender Rasul Douglas – might be the best in the NFL. It is a unit without a weakness.

The defensive line is as good as it's been since perhaps the Reggie White-led Super Bowl champions in 1996. Inside linebacker, seemingly ignored for years, has an All-Pro (De'Vondre Campbell) and a talented first-round pick (Quay Walker).

After ranking second in the NFL in pressures last year, outside linebacker Rashan Gary seems poised for stardom.

Good luck throwing against the cornerback trio of Jaire Alexander, Eric Stokes and Douglas. And the safety tandem of Adrian Amos and Darnell Savage is experienced and productive.

The problem is the depth. At some point, there will be injuries. How will the Packers fare when they're forced to dive into their depth chart?

Who will rush the passer if either Gary or Preston Smith are down?

Will opposing quarterbacks pick on Shemar Jean-Charles if he's forced into the fray at cornerback?

The top backups at safety, Dalin Leavitt and Rudy Ford, are on the 53 because of their prowess on special teams.

4. Run defense

Green Bay's path to defensive dominance seems simple. Force opposing offenses into third-and-long and make them throw against that elite secondary before Gary, Smith and defensive lineman Kenny Clark deliver the pain.

Can the Packers stop the run, though? It has not been the unit's strong suit over the years, though the additions of defensive tackle Jarran Reed in free agency and Walker with the first-round pick should help.

Whether it was Mike Pettine or last year with Joe Barry, Green Bay has leaned on a lot its dime packages. That means a sixth defensive back replaces one of the linebackers.

With coverage-poor linebackers, that was deemed the best way to handle pass-happy offenses. The addition of Walker could change the equation.

Because Walker and Campbell are excellent in coverage, Barry barely lined up in dime during training camp.

Logically, the run defense will be better with two 240-pound linebackers instead of one 240-pound

linebacker and an extra 200-pound defensive back.

5. Curse of the special teams

There are three certainties in life. Death, taxes and putrid special teams.

Last season, the Packers finished 32nd in Rick Gosselin's exhaustive special teams rankings. Nothing new there.

They finished 20th or worse in seven of the past nine seasons. That

includes ranking 29th in 2020, 26th in 2019, 32nd in 2018, 29th in 2016 and 32nd in 2014. They have not fielded a top-10 unit since 2007, a feat that defies explanation.

Enter Rick Bisaccia, who has a rich history of fielding good to great special teams. Plus, general manager Brian Gutekunst has given the chef some ingredients.

Leavitt, Ford and cornerback Keisean Nixon have strong histories on special teams, and veteran Pat O'Donnell is a good punter and excellent holder. The returner might not be great but the blocking could be better.

"I feel like we have a couple guys who are teamers – guys, that's how they make their money – and a couple other guys who need to embrace that role, especially young players who can do it and have done it in preseason but need to really embrace that might their main impact on the season," Rodgers said.

"We have some good leadership on there. We've got an older punter and older kicker that I feel really confident in their consistency. But we need some young guys to step up and play well, and we need the veteran guys to hold it down."

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Q&A WITH RANDALL COBB

Q: What's the challenge of having a second-year player (Amari Rodgers) and three rookies (Christian Watson, Romeo Doubs, Samori Toure) on the receiver depth chart?

A: As we get into the season, the playbook condenses a lot and there's a wide range of plays that get shrunk down based off of the coverages that we're going to see vs. the defenses that we're playing. The playbook will be what it is and it'll be a lot smaller.

I look forward to those guys having a lot less on their plate during training camp and being able to really dial in on the plan for that week. Every week's going to be different. Just having all the prep that we have, I think they're ready to go.

Q: As he enters Year 18, has Aaron Rodgers changed?

A: That man is one of the greatest competitors I've ever been around. It doesn't matter if you're playing football, if you're playing cards, he wants to win. It doesn't matter what it is. He brings that fire every day.

When you go from the preseason

to the regular season, the ante ups, you've got to put down on the table and really have a laser focus that's a little different. When we get into certain situations, he expects us to know exactly what we talked about the first week of training camp on any given play. It's just making sure that we understand what's before us and where we're trying to go.

Q: Thinking back to your rookie year in 2011, you had sort of a legendary debut with a couple touchdowns. Leading into that first game, what were you thinking?

A: Yeah, I thought I was getting cut.

Q: No way!

A: I really did. I didn't know how this worked. I look at it like that every year. You have to have something that drives you. My fear was always getting cut. I've always had that fear. You never know in this business.

I've seen some crazy things happen. I've seen guys get traded right before the season starts. Things happen in this league. You can never take anything for granted.

I remember my rookie year, I

had a thigh contusion. I missed a preseason game. I didn't know what was going to happen. I didn't know what my role was going to be. I was like, 'Hey, I'm doing this punt return/kick return thing. I'm going to give my all every time I step on that field

when I get an opportunity.' Because I was only playing eight to 10 plays offensively.

It's trying to make an impact anyway you can and doing your part and having your 1/11th show up.

Q: So thinking about yourself,

what are Watson and Doubs going to be experiencing before opener?

A: I think the biggest thing is understanding that every play matters and you don't know what play is going to be that play. It could be at any point in the game. Anything can happen. Injuries happen in this league.

You've got to train and be prepared like you're a starter. You've got to be prepared and know whatever role that may come up, because I may be thrust into a different position that I haven't practiced all training camp. So? Don't nobody care about that.

You've got to go out there and you've got to compete and you've got to know what you're doing. It's very important. Those guys know that. That's been a recurring message throughout training camp and it's going to be a lot of moving pieces to what we do. Like we said, we talk about potential. Now it's applying that potential and we'll see where they take it.

Q: What have you seen from Amari Rodgers and his evolving role in year two?

A: I think you can definitely see a comfort with him. He understands the offense. He understands his role and his role is evolving. He's lining up in the backfield. He's taking some

handoffs, running punt return. He's doing some gunner stuff.

It's a role that's evolving for him and I think you're seeing he has a certain ability and they're trying to find ways to get him the ball and get him on the field.

Q: LeRoy Butler (a new Pro Football Hall of Famer) and Morgan Burnett (who retired as a Packers) spoke to the team. What was that message?

A: I think the recurring message that both of them spoke on was how fast it goes and enjoying every moment of what we do because these are the moments that they look back on, being in the locker room, the team camaraderie, getting together, hanging out, the conversations and banter we have in here, the lunchroom and the cafeteria, the bond that you build and really being present.

That's what it comes back to is not living in the past, not thinking about the future but being present and being where your feet are, and really appreciating that moment.
