Can season turn around after OT win against Dallas?

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Packers to build off of confidence for playoff run

Rookie receiver provides much-needed spark for a stagnant offense

After describing the week nine loss to the Detroit Lions as “rock bottom,” quarterback Aaron Rodgers was not ready to give up on the season after a week 10 win against Dallas.

“I felt like that was the bottom and it was only up from there,” said Rodgers. “I think a lot of the battles that we face are between I and I — between the person that can go out there and dominate, and knows that they can, and the little voice in your head that tries to knock you off that confident perch that you’re on.”

Worries of falling to 3-7 were squashed though with Green Bay’s recent overtime win over the Dallas Cowboys. While a 4-6 record is not considered great — or even good — it does shine a small bright light onto a team that has been looking for one since week four. Not only a win, but an emotional win against former head coach Mike McCarthy may be what this Packers team needs to get it’s season back on track.

A major reason for Green Bay’s win over Dallas came on the back of rookie wide receiver Christian Watson, who not only recorded his first receiving touchdown, but his first three receiving touchdowns. A performance like this from a receiver looked to be somewhat of what the Packers need this season, as the offense has gotten very stagnant at times.

Rodgers has talked in detail over the past few weeks about getting Watson more involved in the offense, something that was unable to happen due to injuries. If Watson can stay healthy, this game against Dallas may be the piece that general manager Brian Gutekunst held out at the trade deadline for.

“Obviously, he’s really, really fast,” said Rodgers. “We’ve got to get him to catch the ball a little more consistently, but not much negative you can say after his performance tonight.”

Getting back into the win column is a bright spot for Green Bay, not only to stay in playoff contention, but to also give the team something to build off of. The win over Dallas almost proved to be a statement win for Green Bay, showing the other teams in the NFL that

the Packers are not just going to lay down and die this season. Getting back to the run game seemed very apparent for Green Bay, something Rodgers knows has to be used in order to continue to build momentum.

“I think that we can run the football pretty well and you’ve got to in the wintertime,” said Rodgers, referring to Green Bay’s 207 rushing yards against Dallas. “With the question marks in protection at times and the health of our receivers, I feel like this is definitely a formula that can work for us. We still have to throw it downfield, but until people are going to give us a heavy dose of one-high, we’re going to run the football and then use play-action to take some shots downfield.”

Head coach Matt LaFleur said that a win like this, over the Cowboys, should give the Packers

enough confidence to build off of for their next game. Confidence is something that Green Bay needs at this point.

Suffering a five-game losing streak in the middle of the season and seeing multiple players go down throughout the season with major injuries was shaping up to be a recipe for disaster, especially at a time when Rodgers’ future with the team is unpredictable. With a multitude of teams that are over .500 left on it’s schedule, confidence should be the number one thing that Green Bay rallies around as they look to make a push for the playoffs.

“I do think it’s tough anytime you do go through a stretch like that — it’s hard to shut out the negativity,” said LaFleur. “There’s a lot of negativity out there and you just can’t let that filter in and affect what you believe. That’s something

we talk about all of the time, you have to believe in yourself and you have to believe in the guys next to you.”

Circling back to Watson, LaFleur seems to know that getting the young receiver as much confidence as the team can will only have a positive result for Green Bay. Establishing a number one receiver should give Green Bay the personnel that they need to open up running lanes and to continue to effectively run the football.

“Christian, obviously he’s got elite size and elite speed and I do think that he’s going to continue to get better and better, because I see him and how he works on a daily basis,” said LaFleur. “That gives us confidence in terms of just wanting to continue to go to him in some critical moments.”

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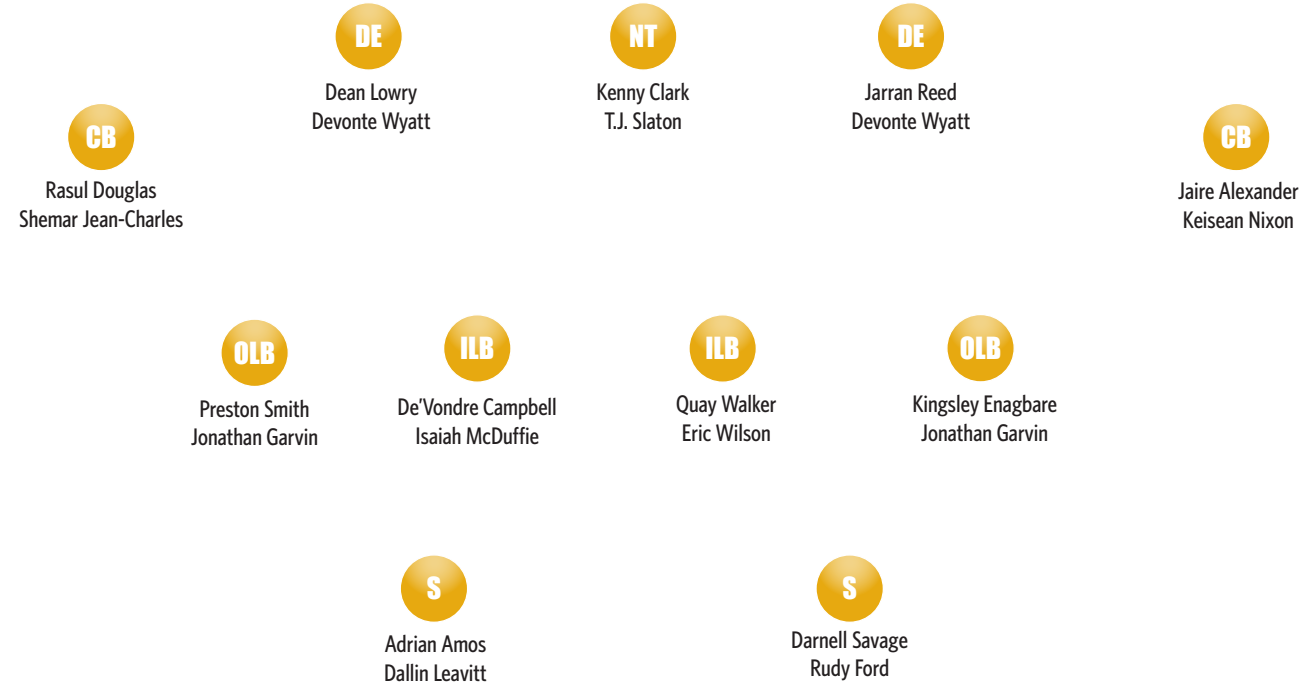

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ROOKIE CLASS UPDATE

Having collected three of the first 34 selections in the 2022 NFL Draft, the Green Bay Packers had a chance to add some instant impact to a team coming off three consecutive 13-win seasons.

With the season entering the stretch run, the Packers maybe haven't quite gotten what they had hoped for from their 11-man class. The arrow is pointed up, though.

Five players have started at least one game. Linebacker Quay Walker has played about 80% of the snaps. Zach Tom has started games at left tackle and left guard. All three rookie receivers have scored touchdowns.

Here is a look at the Class of 2022.

• First Round (22nd overall): LB Quay Walker

Walker was in the starting lineup from Day 1 of training camp and hasn't left. The first linebacker off the board, Walker and Jacksonville's Devin Lloyd — the Butkus Award-winning linebacker from Utah and the second linebacker selected — are running neck-and-neck for the rookie tackles lead.

Walker has tackled well, forced a couple fumbles, gotten some pressure as a blitz, stepped up in coverage vs. Dallas and took a nice step in his career by replacing injured veteran De'Vondre Campbell as the defensive communicator.

Before taking that role for the game against Detroit, Walker half-jokingly worried about his "country" accent being a challenge for his teammates to understand in the huddle.

"Yeah, he'll go to South Georgia every once in a while in his speech," position coach Kirk Olivadotti said. "All joking aside, he really did do a nice job. It takes a little bit more studying maybe just to make sure you get all the calls, not just the part of the call that's important to you — the words that are in there that apply to everyone."

The NFL keeps tackle data dating to 1987. The Packers' rookie record for tackles was set by A.J. Hawk with 121 in 2006. Walker's on pace to get 117.

• First Round (28th overall): DT Devonte Wyatt

Wyatt's been given limited opportunities, a byproduct of joining a line with established veterans Kenny Clark, Dean Lowry and Jarran Reed and promising second-year player T.J. Slaton. Because of a nondescript training camp and preseason, he failed to force his way into the lineup.

He's 14th among rookie defensive linemen in snaps. He has shown some

juice as a pass rusher.

"He has been a kid I think has gotten better every single week," defensive coordinator Joe Barry said. "His play is going to increase. And, obviously, the more you play, hopefully the more plays you make. He's a young kid that's just learning, learning how to be a pro, working, and that's all we can ask for. Hopefully, with more opportunities there's a chance for more splash plays."

• Second Round (34th overall): WR Christian Watson

The Packers traded their two second-round picks to the rival Vikings to zoom up to near the top of the second round to get Watson, the small-school receiver with the big-time skillset.

Through no fault of his own, his rookie season had been a disappointment. He had knee surgery following the offseason program, meaning he missed the start of training camp. He missed three full games and parts of two others with hamstring issues. He missed most of one game with a concussion and half of another over fears of a concussion.

When he did play, he made minimal

impact. For the first nine weeks, he had two noteworthy plays: a dropped 75-yard touchdown pass on the first play of the season at Minnesota and a touchdown run against Chicago.

Then came week 10 against Dallas. Watson shook off back-to-back drops to catch four passes for 107 yards and three touchdowns. A 58-yard touchdown on third-and-1 in the second quarter could change the trajectory of his season — and the team's season.

"I think that catch probably on the atomic level shifted a lot of different things for him, exorcising some energetic demons," quarterback Aaron Rodgers said. "I'm proud of him. Obviously, he's really, really fast. He's got to catch the ball a little more consistently, but not much negative you can say after his performance tonight."

• Third Round (92nd overall): G Sean Rhyan

A left tackle at UCLA, Rhyan spent most of training camp playing left guard. He struggled through the transition and hasn't been close to earning snaps on offense.

"Sean, he's got a helmet on game-day, so anyone who does, you better be

ready and be prepared to be a starter," offensive coordinator Adam Stenavich said. "He's a guy that's progressing every week. He's learning how to become a professional, learning what it takes to be successful in this league, and he has a ways to go, yes, but I like how he's coming along."

• Fourth Round (132nd overall): WR Romeo Doubs

Through the first six games of the season, Doubs was third in the rookie class with 22 receptions and first with a 75.9% catch rate. But he was shut out at home vs. Washington (four targets, zero catches, two drops) and suffered a high-ankle sprain on the opening play at Detroit.

"You guys who've got to know him, he's calm, cool and collected," receivers coach and passing-game coordinator Jason Vrable said. "That's how he plays out there. He loves ball. Since I met the kid when he came on his (pre-draft) visit, that's the one thing I knew from him. I'm like, 'This kid truly loves football, above everything else.'"

"He prepared, he had a great offseason. I know you guys always talk about how he's making some plays

in practice, and it was the truth. You could see it, you could feel it from him. I told him it was only a matter of time before you start climbing.”

Doubs has deep speed, good hands and a pro’s mentality. There might be some growing pains on offense this year, but the Packers have to be thrilled with a potential Watson-Doubs pairing as the future centerpiece of their passing attack.

• Fourth Round (140th overall): OL Zach Tom

Tom arrived for duty in May with a lofty goal. He wanted to be the next Elgton Jenkins, a lineman capable of contributing at all five offensive line positions.

He’s three-fifths the way there in terms of game snaps. Through the first 10 games, Tom had played 96 snaps at left guard, 86 at left tackle and 13 at right guard. There’s no doubt he could handle right tackle and center if asked.

Tom got worked over a few times by some crafty veterans but, by and large, he’s never been a consistent problem in his four games in which he got considerable playing time.

Ultimately, the interior spots will be Tom’s forte, Stenavich said.

“He doesn’t have your typical tackle body with the length and all that stuff,” Stenavich said. “He’s very athletic, he’s stout, he’s more physical than you think in the run game. Very intelligent. I think inside would probably be his best position as his career progresses. But he’s shown to be all right on the edge, too. He has that versatility to do everything.”

• Fifth Round (179th overall): OLB Kingsley Enagbare

A golden opportunity was handed to Enagbare. With no proven depth behind Rashan Gary and Preston Smith, the No. 3 spot was up for grabs during training camp. Enagbare won that role and has grown into a solid contributor.

According to Pro Football Focus,

Enagbare didn’t have a single pressure in his first five games. The next five games, he had two sacks and eight pressures. With Gary out with a torn ACL, Enagbare will spend the rest of his rookie season in the starting lineup.

“It’s definitely a confidence thing,” Enagbare said. “Like I tell some of the guys who might not be confident now, I tell them for me, it started off with preseason, I really didn’t go against any starters.

“For me, it was whether or not I can play versus the starters. ‘Can I hold my own?’ As the season went on, it started with holding my own to ‘Can I make plays against those guys?’ It went from that to, ‘How consistently can I do it?’ Now, it’s, ‘Can I start dominating guys.’”

• Seventh Round (228th overall): S Tariq Carpenter

An intriguing package of size and speed, Carpenter has been limited only to action on special teams.

He made his first tackle against Dallas, dropping premier kick returner KaVontae Turpin at the 12 on a fourth quarter kickoff.

• Seventh Round (234th overall): DT Jonathan Ford

If opportunities for playing time have been scarce for the first-rounder Wyatt, they’ve been nonexistent for the seventh-rounder Ford.

He didn’t play a single snap through 10 games.

• Seventh Round (249th overall): OT Rasheed Walker

After drafting Walker, general manager Brian Gutekunst said he wasn’t looking for another lineman but Walker was too good to pass up. A starting left tackle at Penn State, injury issues hurt his development during training camp.

Offensive line coach Luke Butkus coached him hard, and Walker probably made the team based on his

performance in the preseason finale at Kansas City. He has not played through 10 games.

• Seventh Round (258th overall): WR Samori Toure

A star at Montana, Toure transferred to Nebraska for his senior season. That decision got him drafted. He was given the nickname “Capt. Casual” for a bit too nonchalant of an approach during training camp. That earned him a spot on the inactives list for the first six games.

Necessity got Toure thrown into

the fire, and he made a big-time play on a touchdown catch at Buffalo. If the Packers eventually fall out of playoff contention, they’ll need to give Toure most of the snaps that are going to Sammy Watkins.

“I think ‘83’ has shown some progression for sure, especially the last few weeks of making some plays, and that’s directly tied to his practice habits,” Rodgers said before the Dallas game. “I haven’t called him Capt. Casual in weeks. He’s been really practicing his balls off and doing a good job.”

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Q&A WITH JOHNATHAN ABRAM

Johnathan Abram was a first-round draft pick by the Raiders in 2019. He started 27 games in 2020 and 2021 and the first six games of 2022 but was released on Nov. 8.

The Packers claimed him off waivers the next day. A few days later, he helped make the tackle on the opening kickoff against Dallas.

Q: What have these past few days been like, going from playing off the bench to being released to being claimed by the Packers?

A: I'm excited. It's an unfortunate situation having to up and move in the middle of the season, but I look forward to the new start. The guys have embraced me. The coaching staff has embraced me. It's been nothing but welcome and love, so I look forward to it.

Q: Did you need a fresh start?

A: I wouldn't say I needed one, but I'm eager for the opportunity, just planning on taking advantage of the one I have now.

Q: What do you have to prove?

A: I don't have anything to prove. I've played a lot of football, a lot of good football and people around the

league notice that, which is kind of why I'm here today, so like I said, I'm just happy for the opportunity.

Q: You were teammates with Keisean Nixon with the Raiders. He said you're close friends.

A: That's one of my best friends. I'm excited to be back here with him. We don't plan on enjoying the cold, but we're going to make the most out of it together. Probably going to make some snow angels or something."

Q: He also said you have matching tattoos.

A: Oh, yes, we do. We have shark tattoos. Yes, we have matching shark tattoos.

Q: Why sharks?

A: Because sharks, the motto is, "On Mondays, sharks don't wake up and say it's Monday. They wake up and just eat."

Q: When did that happen?

A: We got it about two years ago.

Q: Did you go together? How did that happen?

A: Kind of more so we talked about getting matching tattoos and that was the one tattoo that I kind of wanted and then when he actually saw it on me, he kind of wanted to follow up with the same.

Q: You and Darnell Savage were drafted in the first round in 2019. Do you get to know him before the draft?

A: I spent a lot of time with Darnell. I look forward to working with him and Adrian (Amos). My previous DC (defensive coordinator) at Mississippi State, Bob Shoop, he coached Adrian in college. So, I watched a lot of his film, him playing nickel. We actually wore the exact same number, 38.

I got to spend some time with Darnell when we were at the Senior Bowl for the draft. Leading up to it, we had a little back and forth going about who was going to be the first safety to get taken. He kind of beat me on that one. Shoutout to him.

Q: You were teammates with Elgton Jenkins in college.

A: That's my boy. I'm excited to be back here with him and Preston Smith. We kind of talked about it, we're joking about bringing back the Bulldogs together. We have Kylin Hill here, as well. We're going to kind of make this Green Bay Bulldogs.

Q: Georgia's the Bulldogs, too. There are a few of those guys here.

A: Hey, I went to Georgia, as well, too. So, I kind of get to play both sides

of the field. Go Dogs.

Q: I had read that you had a big shoe collection. Do you still?

A: Yes, I do.

Q: About how many pairs?

A: I had around 700 shoes at one point in time. But recently, I started to get rid of some things, some old shoes I didn't wear. I kind of started to filter out all the Adidas stuff because I'm a Nike athlete now. I kind of slimmed up a little bit.

Q: You didn't throw them away, did you?

A: Never. But wear all of them, though. I try to wear everything. I wear something new every day. Today I have one — Family Pack, only one of 223. 136/223. This is the Family Pack from Jordan, Art Basel.

(Note: That particular pair of shoes, which are green and black so a good fit for his new team, can be purchased for about \$10,000.)

Q: Did you pack those?

A: No, I wore those. I had to come in style.

Q: In that story, I think it said you have a whole wall of shoes?

A: I have a room dedicated to shoes.

Q: How big is the room?

A: It's a big room.

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Nelson, Sitton to be inducted into Packers Hall of Fame

The Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame Inc. will induct former Packers Jordy Nelson and Josh Sitton at the 52nd Hall of Fame Induction Banquet, announced Nov. 1 by Packers Hall of Fame Inc. President Tom Konop.

The banquet is scheduled to be held Aug. 31, 2023, in the Lambeau Field Atrium.

Information about tickets for the banquet, which begins with a cash bar at 4 p.m., with the dinner and program to start at 5:30 p.m., is still being finalized and will be released in the near future.

Wide receiver Jordy Nelson was selected by the Packers in the second round (36th overall) of the 2008 NFL Draft out of Kansas State. He played nine seasons (2008-14, '16-17) in Green Bay and appeared in 136 regular-season games with 88 starts.

He ranks No. 4 in team history in receptions (550), No. 6 in receiving yards (7,848), No. 3 in touchdown receptions (69) and No. 4 in 100-yard receiving games (25).

Nelson is the only player in team annals to record three seasons with 13-plus TD receptions (2011, 2014, 2016). He and WR Sterling Sharpe (1992-94) are the only players in franchise history to register three straight seasons with 85-plus receptions (2013-14, 2016).

Nelson posted 1,250-plus receiving yards and 13-plus touchdown catches in the same season three times in his career (2011, 2014, 2016), the fourth most in NFL history. Nelson was selected to the Pro Bowl and named second-team All-Pro by The Associated Press for his performance during the 2014 season in which he set career highs in receptions (98) and receiving yards (1,519) while also hauling in 13 touchdowns.

After missing the 2015 season due to a knee injury, Nelson became the first Packer to be named the NFL Comeback Player of the Year by AP after registering 1,257 yards on 97 receptions with a league-high 14 receiving TDs in 2016.

In the Super Bowl XLV victory, Nelson became just the fourth receiver in Super Bowl history with nine-plus receptions for at least 140 yards and a touchdown. Nelson finished his career playing one season (2018) with the Oakland Raiders.

Guard Josh Sitton was originally selected by the Packers in the fourth round (135th overall) of the 2008 NFL Draft out of the University of Central Florida.

He played eight seasons (2008-

15) in Green Bay, starting 112 of 121 regular-season games and all 13 postseason contests in which he appeared. From 2009-15, he started the most games (110) by a Packers offensive lineman.

During his time with the Packers, Sitton was named to the Pro Bowl three times (2012, '14-15) and earned second-team AP All-Pro honors three times (2013-15).

Sitton was named the 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association and was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate in 2010, 2011 and 2013.

He was a key member of teams that won a Super Bowl (XLV) and four division titles, finished with 10-plus wins six times and made the playoffs seven times. Sitton blocked for offenses that ranked in the top 10 in points seven times and in the top 10 in yards six times.

He helped protect quarterback Aaron Rodgers during seasons where he was named NFL Most Valuable Player by AP twice (2011, '14), a Pro Bowler (2009, '11-12, '14-15) five times and first-team All-Pro two times (2011, '14).

Sitton finished his career starting 26 of 27 games played for the Chicago Bears (2016-17) and Miami Dolphins (2018).

New punt returner

After Amari Rodgers fumbled on a punt return in London against the Giants, a play that wound up swinging the momentum, Green Bay Packers special teams coordinator Rich Bisaccia said he wasn't going to "****can" Rodgers over one play.

After Rodgers fumbled on punt return against Dallas, a play that also swung the momentum, Rodgers finally was benched.

"It sucks for Amari," coach Matt LaFleur said. "I feel for him, obviously, because he's a guy that works his butt off on a daily basis. I know he wants to go out there and excel and that was a tough break.

"Obviously, it was a critical turnover that we can't have, that's something we talk about all the time: The ball is everything, and when you have it in your hands, you hold it for everybody in this organization, and we can't put it on the ground, especially when we're in a situation in a tight ballgame, going to get the ball at midfield. I thought he had a decent return, and we coughed it up. We can't do that."

The decision poses a real conundrum for the franchise.

General manager Brian Gutekunst didn't just use a third-round draft pick on Rodgers in the 2021 draft. He gave up a fourth-round pick to trade up to select Rodgers.

About 1 2/3 seasons later, Rodgers' career looks like a lost cause. As a receiver, Rodgers has been a nonfactor. Even with veteran slot receiver Randall Cobb on injured reserve and the passing game a weekly struggle, Rodgers has been an afterthought on offense.

His lack of impact on offense would be OK if Rodgers was providing impact as a returner. He hasn't made much of an impact on special teams, either. After the fumble against Dallas, Rodgers had four fumbles. That was tied with Denver running back Melvin Gordon for most fumbles by a nonquarterback.

During his brief career, Rodgers had eight receptions, seven fumbles and zero touchdowns.

"I really like Amari Rodgers," Bisaccia said. "Jersey No. 8 has put himself and put us in some bad situations. So, you have to coach the man first, and then coach the player. We have to go through both of those things when these situa-

tions arise."

Ford tough

Necessity, as the saying goes, is the mother of invention. Similarly, necessity forced a big change in the secondary.

With starting cornerback Eric Stokes out following season-ending surgery, defensive coordinator Joe Barry found opportunity. With former first-round pick Darnell Savage struggling at safety and cornerback Rasul Douglas not making much of an impact in the slot, Barry moved Douglas into Stokes' spot at corner, slid Savage into the slot and inserted Rudy Ford at safety.

That hardly could have worked better against Dallas. Douglas allowed only one catch and Ford made two big-time interceptions. The first interception took at least a field goal off the board for Dallas. Both interceptions were turned into touchdowns by the offense.

Would Barry have made those changes had Stokes not been injured on the opening series at Detroit?

"That's a good question. I don't know," Barry said. "I like to tell you guys all the time that I think options are very good, definitely when it comes to defensive personnel. Of course, losing Eric and losing Rashan (Gary) are huge losses for us, but it was cool that we were able to, in a roundabout way, get Rudy on the field and he stepped up in his opportunity, which was great to see."

A Pleasant addition

On the Monday before the Packers played at the Lions, Detroit

fired its secondary coach, Aubrey Pleasant.

Last week, LaFleur added Pleasant to his staff as a consultant. They've worked together in Washington in 2013 and with the Rams in 2017.

"He's a really knowledgeable guy when it comes to the game, and I thought he could bring a different

perspective to our offensive staff just seeing it through the lens of a defensive coach," LaFleur said. "He's a guy that I've always really respected how he works. I think that perspective has been helpful, not only game-planning but also to really see ourselves, how a defensive coach might break us down and see us, so we hopefully can stay as unpredictable as possible."

A native of Flint, Michigan, Pleasant was a starting safety at Wisconsin in 2008.

"He's going to do a lot of self-scout work for us," LaFleur said. "We were watching a bunch of tape together today, just talking coverage and trying to figure out different rules. I think that's always an important part to it from when you're game-planning is you always want to try to figure out how are they coaching these guys on the other side based on whatever coverage and how you best attack somebody."

"Because you're always trying to manipulate whatever it is you're going against and maybe pull somebody out of a window so you can open it up for somebody else."

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Watson records 3 TDs in OT win over Dallas

Packers snap five-game losing skid

The return of long-time head coach Mike McCarthy was overshadowed by a career day from rookie Christian Watson during Green Bay's 31-28 overtime win against the Dallas Cowboys on Nov. 13 in Green Bay.

Watson caught just four balls, but those four went for 107 yards and three touchdowns, including Green Bay's longest passing touchdown of the year at 58 yards.

"It feels amazing, obviously to have the guys rally around me and picking me up," said Watson, noting his two early drops. "I wasn't down — I was calm, cool and collected."

The young receiver was not the only one busy on Sunday, though, as Aaron Jones carried the ball 24 times for 138 yards and a touchdown. A.J. Dillon added another 65 rushing yards on 13 attempts. With the help from others in the offense, quarterback Aaron Rodgers took only 20 passing attempts, completing 14 of them for 224 yards and three touchdowns.

The emergence of Watson is a bright spot for Packers fans, players and coaches as the second-round draft pick had been limited to just six receptions through the first nine games of the season. Injuries have hampered his rookie year, but he said this performance just might be able to get him over that hump.

(Aaron Rodgers) and (Matt) LaFleur both said that we are going to come back to you," said Watson. "That hit me at home. Obviously, I know the plays that I can make and the plays that I make every day at practice. To see that they still have faith in me, means the world."

Watson was not the only breakout star of the game, as on defense, safety Jonathan "Rudy" Ford recorded two first half interceptions of Dallas quarterback Dak Prescott. This came on the back of starting Ford at the safety spot, while Darnell Savage moved to a slot-corner role.

"Both of those picks were critical in our ability to keep the game close and go up on them," said LaFleur.

Dallas entered the fourth quarter up 28-14, with Green Bay marching. Watson's second touchdown catch, a 39-yard crossing route, brought the Packers to within seven with just over 13 minutes remaining in the game.

Green Bay held Dallas to a punt on its subsequent drive, giving the ball back to Green Bay with 8:57

remaining in the game. A 3-yard reception on third-and-two from Watson, 61 combined rushing yards from Jones and Dillon and a 7-yard reception from Sammy Watkins, set up Watson's third touchdown of the game, from 7 yards out.

From there, Green Bay once again forced Dallas into a quick punt before taking over with 1:38

remaining. Green Bay only ran two plays — two Jones rushes — in a minute and eight seconds, before an incompletion forced Green Bay to punt. Rodgers was noticeably upset when talking about the mismanagement of time on the team's last possession in overtime.

"Just every single play call probably," said Rodgers, on why he was

upset about the drive. “Obviously I didn’t have a ton of attempts to-night, but I felt that I was in pretty good rhythm. I felt like I threw the ball exactly where I wanted to to-night, and I wanted a chance to go win the game.”

The Cowboys won the coin toss in overtime and methodically marched down the field, with running back Tony Pollard, wide receiver Ceedee Lamb and tight end Dalton Schultz getting involved. That drive stalled, though, as a holding penalty pushed Dallas back 10 yards, before two straight incompletions forced the Cowboys into a turnover-on-downs.

Jones carried much of the load on Green Bay’s only overtime possession, totaling 14 rushing yards and an extra 15 on a facemask penalty. The major play of the drive came though when Rodgers hit wide receiver Allen Lazard on third and short in the middle of the field for a 36-yard gain.

“We had kind of been setting that play up for a while throughout

the game and it hadn’t been there, hadn’t been there, hadn’t been there,” said Rodgers, on Lazard’s 36-yard reception. “Allen and I kind of had a conversation on the sideline and felt like if we came back to that play, it had a chance to be there. He’s pretty proficient at that route.”

McCarthy’s homecoming was eventually spoiled by the right leg of Mason Crosby, who converted a 28-yard field goal to win the game. The win for Green Bay also snapped Dallas’ perfect, 195-0 franchise record when leading by 14 or more points at the beginning of the fourth quarter.

“There were a lot of demons that were exorcised today,” said Rodgers. “We were obviously on a really tough stretch, five in a row. There were a lot of things that we turned around today, just coincidence that Dallas was in town.”

Not only was Rodgers enjoying the win over his former head coach, but LaFleur was noticeably emotional after the game when talking about what this win meant to the team.

“It was more when I went into my own locker — I had to kind of gather myself quickly,” said LaFleur, as he fought back tears. “You know, I care about these guys — we put a lot into this and it is tough

at times. It means a lot to us, and to be down and fight and continue to fight — that’s what you want to see.”
