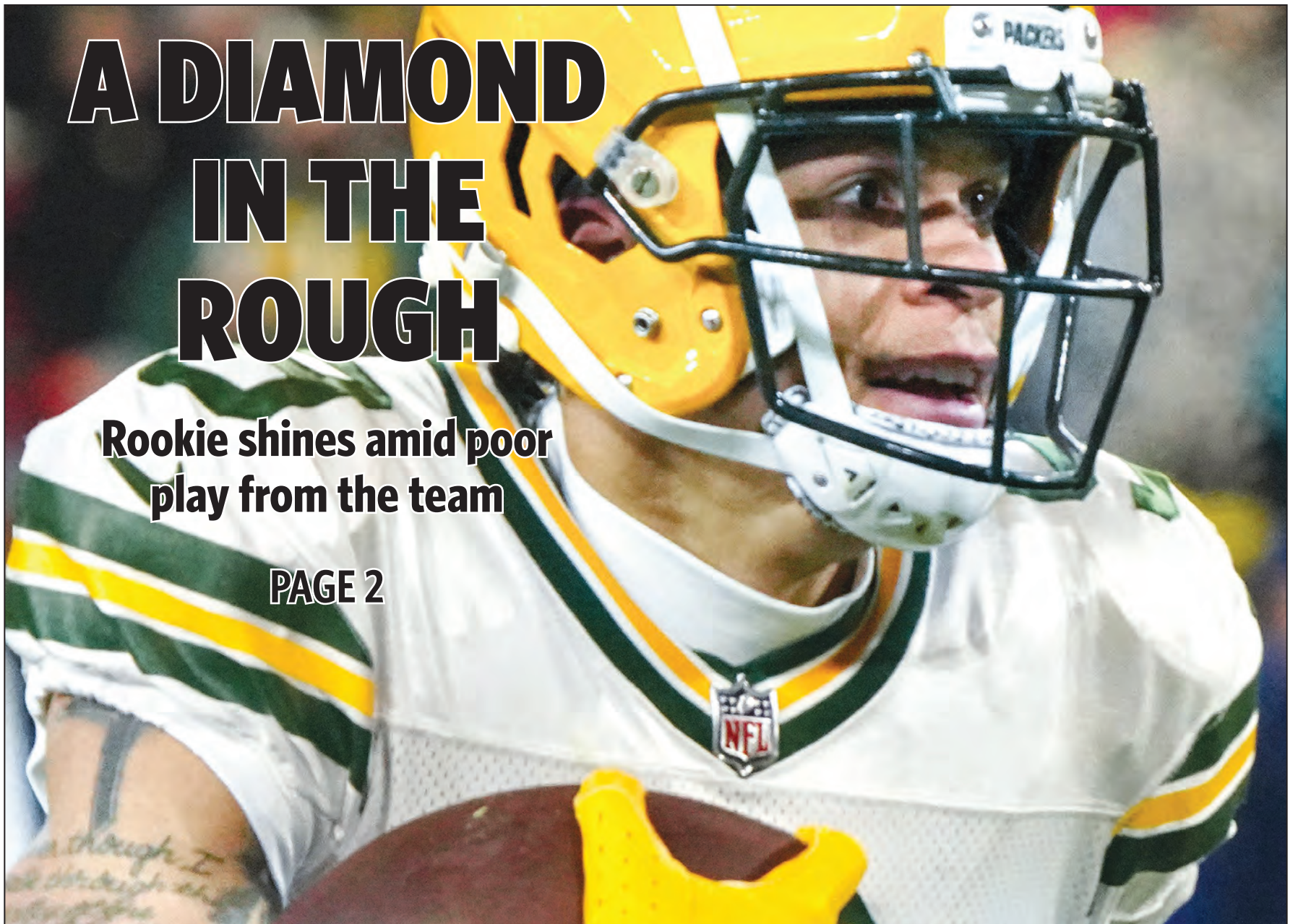

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Watson the playmaker Pack's offense needs

North Dakota State product has 5 touchdown catches in last 2 games

While the season is not going the way that the Green Bay Packers hoped, there have been bright spots that have appeared.

Rookie wide receiver Christian Watson has become one of those bright spots and a major part of the offense.

With the receiver problems that Green Bay has experienced in the offseason and during the regular season, seeing a receiver who looks confident is a sound sign for Packers fans.

After scoring five touchdowns in the past two games, Watson took the lead for most receiving touchdowns by a rookie wide receiver as of Nov. 17.

"I think we had all our playmakers, and he stepped up the last two weeks, the last two games, the last five days," said Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers on Watson. "The last few days, no drops. He caught everything today. Yes, we have to get him the ball more."

Watson has game-breaking speed that should only open up the middle of the field for Green Bay. It has come to the point where if Rodgers sees Watson with only a corner over him, it seems likely the quarterback will air it out and let Watson run under it.

That is part of the reason why Green Bay traded up to draft the North Dakota State product. Randall Cobb returning to the field also opens up Watson to continue to run go and post routes.

Cobb's rapport with Rodgers has been on display for almost a decade, forcing defenses to respect the middle. If the Packers can create a complimentary high-low route combination with Watson and Cobb, the team may look a little more like what fans are accustomed to seeing.

With Green Bay's inconsistency running the ball this year, Watson has shown that he can provide those much-needed sparks to keep the Packers in games.

Rookie receiving is something that the Packers haven't had in many years, and Watson has proven that he can be the guy in Green Bay.

Sitting at 4-7, the question surrounding the Packers is when do

you sit Rodgers and let Jordan Love get some much-needed QB experience?

While that does sound preferable, the Packers may not want to mess with the potential budding relationship and connection between Rodgers and Watson. If all else, Watson will probably never play with a quarterback better than Rodgers, so this is much-needed experience for the young wide receiver.

Even with the poor play and poor record, head coach Matt LaFleur is not totally ready to give up on the season in favor of younger players yet.

"You guys know how my mindset is: It's every day and it's one game, and that's the mentality," said LaFleur. "I have a hard time processing it any other way."

LaFleur's comments make it seem that he believes the Packers are still alive and can make a run toward the playoffs.

While that is technically true,

when does someone like Love get his opportunity? It also begs the question of when does Watson see more work?

Though he has caught five touchdowns in the last two games, those touchdowns have accounted for more than half of his receptions in those games.

The theme surrounding the Packers this year has been inconsistency with the offense and defense both putting together a good game on the same day. At times this season, the defense has looked like the strength of the team — Tampa Bay — and other games where it has looked as bad as it has in recent years — Tennessee.

While Watson figures to help bring some consistency to that offense, where does that come on the defensive side of the ball?

Rashan Gary is lost for the season, and Eric Stokes is on injured reserve. The Packers look like they need a "Christian Watson on defense," or someone to step up and

lead the defense.

"We're not in a very good position right now, that's for sure," said LaFleur. "We're going to get back to work and try to make some of these corrections because it's disappointing."

"Whether it's your coverage busting defensively, whether it's protection busts and/or any mistake in regards to the mental errors, that's extremely disappointing, especially where we are at in the season."

LaFleur is right. Eleven weeks into the season, the Packers are still making preseason mistakes — whether that's missing blocks, not communicating on defense or mismanaging the clock.

In a team with a lot of question marks, one thing is for certain — Watson is a dynamic playmaker who has proven that he can jumpstart a stagnant Green Bay offense.

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TELLING PACKERS STATISTICS

The movie “Hope Floats” has nothing to do with football. But with their victory over the Dallas Cowboys, the Green Bay Packers’ playoff hopes were afloat.

Then the Tennessee Titans came to town and produced the sequel.

“Hope Sunk.”

The Packers were booed off the field before halftime and again late in the fourth quarter before the frozen fans headed to the exits. Barring a miracle, the 27-17 loss to the Titans will have been the final torpedo shot into the underachieving Packers.

Headed into Sunday night’s game at the powerhouse Philadelphia Eagles, here are six individual statistical reasons why the Packers have been such underachievers.

Aaron Rodgers: Efficiency

During his MVP seasons of 2020 and 2021, Rodgers was around 69% completions, 4,200 yards, 43 touchdowns, five interceptions and 8 yards per attempt. This year, he’s at 64.6% completions, projections of 3,930 yards, 29 touchdowns and 11 interceptions, and 6.8 yards per attempt.

There are a myriad of reasons, starting with the obvious of the off-season trade of Davante Adams. Adams was a great player who got open most of the time. What a luxury. And what a security blanket to know that, whether it’s first-and-10 in the first quarter or third-and-8 in the fourth quarter, that the No. 1 read on any play would get open.

Rodgers has strong connections with Allen Lazard and Randall Cobb, but they’re not Adams. The most talented receivers on the roster are rookies Romeo Doubs and Christian Watson, but Doubs has missed most of the last three games with a high-ankle sprain and Watson missed so much time with a hamstring injury, concussion and feared concussion that he didn’t play more than 40 snaps in a game until his breakout performance in week 10 against Dallas.

Combined, the players with the connection aren’t super-talented, and the players who are talented don’t have the connection.

The interceptions number, while still quite good, is noteworthy. He hasn’t thrown more than eight interceptions since tossing 11 in 2010.

“If we play up to our potential, we can win our last six games. I’m confident in that,” Rodgers said after a shaky performance vs. the Titans. “Obviously, I’ve got to play up to my

potential. Tonight wasn’t it.”

Allen Lazard: Not No. 1

During training camp, Rodgers called Lazard a No. 1 receiver. It was a ludicrous statement at the time and ludicrous today. Lazard is a quality player and excellent role player. Every team would love to have someone like him. A No. 1 receiver, though? No way.

As a supporting player, Lazard was coming off three consecutive seasons in which he averaged about 36 receptions, 480 yards and five touchdowns. Lazard was never a focal point for defensive coordinators, but he is now.

The raw numbers are there with 38 receptions for 529 yards and five touchdowns. His 13.9-yard average is the best mark of his career. However, after catching 67.8% of his targets in 2021, 73.3% in 2020 and 68.6% in 2019, he’s at 58.5% this season. It’s harder to get open when you’re facing better cornerbacks.

AJ Dillon: Powerless

At about 245 pounds of bulging biceps and thick thighs, Dillon should be a nightmare for defenses. He is, in a way. He’s almost never brought down by just one defender. On the other

hand, he’s generally stopped by one defender before being taken down by a host of others.

According to Pro Football Focus, 32 running backs have at least 90 carries entering week 12. Dillon ranks 20th

with 117 carries but is just 26th with 17 missed tackles, 28th with eight carries of 10-plus yards, 19th with 2.93 yards per carry after contact and 30th in elusive rating, a metric that attempts to measure the impact of a runner independent of his blocking.

The Packers hoped Aaron Jones and Dillon could carry the load, literally, in the post-Davante Adams offense. Jones has been great, but Dillon has been a bit underwhelming.

Elgton Jenkins: Not at home

As a rookie left guard in 2019, Jenkins didn't allow a single sack. As a Pro Bowl left guard in 2020, he allowed one sack. Forced out to left tackle to replace David Bakhtiari in 2021, he allowed two sacks in eight games before suffering a torn ACL.

The Packers moved him to right tackle, their weakest spot on the line, with the belief that Jenkins' talent and proven versatility would be enough to overcome any lingering affects from the knee injury.

In nine games, he's allowed three sacks — two at right tackle and one since moving back to left guard. Jenkins is a high-quality player. He'll be much better once the knee injury is fully beyond him. But, headed into the stretch run, he has not been a dominant player.

Kenny Clark: Not much pressure

Clark's a two-time Pro Bowler and one of the best three-down defensive tackles in the NFL. He's not Aaron Donald but he's right in that next tier, which he demonstrated at the start of

the season.

In the first three games, Clark recorded two sacks and five quarterback hits, according to the official NFL stats, and three quarterback hits and 13 pressures, according to PFF.

In the last eight games, Clark has only one sack and one quarterback hit (vs. Dallas), according to the league, and one sack, zero quarterback hits and 16 pressures, according to PFF.

He's on pace for 25 pressures, which would be the fewest of his career.

Eric Stokes: Year 2 disappointment

If not for one poor game at Minnesota last season, the first-round pick might have earned All-Rookie honors. Teams count on quantum leaps forward from players in their second season, so what would Stokes for an encore?

According to PFF, Stokes gave up a 51% catch rate, 6.1 yards per target and a 79.1 passer rating while missing 9.2% of his tackle attempts as a rookie.

This year, he allowed an 84% catch rate, 11 yards per target and a 125.8 passer rating while missing 16.1% of his tackle attempts before suffering a season-ending ankle surgery against Detroit.

With Stokes' slide and Rasul Douglas going from a 50.8% completion rate in 2021 to 71.8% in 2022 and Jaire Alexander going from 50.7% during his All-Pro season of 2020 to 58.7% in 2022, it's no wonder why the Packers' defense has been such a disappointment.

KEYS TO THE GAME

The Green Bay Packers will travel to face the Philadelphia Eagles at 7:20 p.m. on Sunday at Lincoln Financial Field, Philadelphia. NBC will televise the game.

History

In a series that dates to 1933, the Packers lead 29-17 (28-15 regular season; 1-2 playoffs).

The Packers have won six of the last eight, including 30-16 on Dec. 6, 2020, at Lambeau Field. Aaron Jones put the icing on the cake with a 77-yard touchdown run.

The last meeting in Philadelphia came in 2016. That was game one of "Run the Table," with Green Bay winning 27-13.

Coaches

Green Bay — Matt LaFleur, fourth season. Philadelphia — Nick Sirianni, second season.

When the Eagles have the ball

The Eagles boast a well-rounded offense. Before their week 11 game, they ranked third with 27.3 points per game. They were sixth in rushing with 142.7 yards per game and second with 7.90 yards per passing attempt.

They were fourth on third down (47% conversions), second on fourth down (75%) and third in the red zone (72.7% touchdowns). They were also No. 1 with only seven turnovers.

With Eagles quarterback Jalen Hurts, Green Bay's defense will face a challenge on par with going against Buffalo's Josh Allen. Hurts should be right in the middle of the MVP conversation. He's having a fantastic season.

As a quarterback, he was third with a 106.5 passer rating and second with 8.37 yards per attempt. Plus, he'd added 354 rushing yards (3.8 average). Between passing (14) and rushing (seven), he'd accounted for 21 touchdowns.

Miles Sanders was 10th with 710 rushing yards. He was averaging a robust 4.97 yards per carry.

Aaron Rodgers could only wish he had a one-two receiver punch of A.J. Brown, who was acquired in a trade with the Titans, and DeVonta Smith, last year's first-round pick.

Brown is a big man and a big-play threat with 44 catches for 725 yards and six scores through 10 weeks. Smith had a team-high 46 catches, which he'd turned into 481 yards and three touchdowns.

The Eagles will be down one key cog with tight end Dallas Goedert on

injured reserve. He's third on the team with 43 receptions.

Green Bay's pass defense, which gave up 333 too-easy passing yards to Titans quarterback Ryan Tannehill, needs to cut out the mental mistakes that let receivers run free through the secondary.

"Yeah, that was certainly disappointing," LaFleur said. "I thought for the most part we did a pretty good job defending the run. Any time you hold Derrick (Henry) to under 100 yards and a little over 3 yards a carry, that was a pretty solid effort. It leaves you a little susceptible on the back end, where you've got to be good.

"The thing that's disappointing is just the busts, when you have guys that don't play their responsibility and you get guys running free. That happened on three of the big, explosive plays that they had."

The offensive line is excellent with left tackle Jordan Mailata, left guard Landon Dickerson, center Jason Kelce, right guard Isaac Seumalo and right tackle Lane Johnson.

Mailata, a former rugby player from Australia, is the weak link but the Packers have struggled to create pressure without Rashan Gary.

When the Packers have the ball

Heading into week 11, Philadelphia was eighth with 18.6 points allowed per game and third with 302.4 yards allowed per game.

The Eagles are superb against the pass, ranking second in yards per game (177.2) and yards per play (5) but vulnerable against the run, where it's 20th in yards per game (124.8) and 26th in yards per carry (4.74). It is a big-play unit, ranking first with 20 takeaways and fifth in sack percentage.

The defensive front is robust. At

the trade deadline, the Eagles acquired Robert Quinn from the Bears. He ranked second in the NFL in sacks last year. And last week, they added veteran defensive tackles Linval Joseph and Ndamukong Suh off the street. Throw in veteran Brandon Graham and that, incredibly, is the Eagles' No. 2 defensive line.

As for the starters, the tackles are Fletcher Cox and Javon Hargrave with Josh Sweat and Haason Reddick manning the edges. Reddick, a former standout in Carolina, had 6½ sacks and three forced fumbles.

Sweat has 3½ sacks and team-leading totals of 12 quarterback hits and eight tackles for losses. While the multi-time Pro Bowler Cox is the big name, Hargrave is the secret star with a team-high seven sacks.

The linebackers are former Wisconsin star T.J. Edwards, and Kyzir White. Edwards has blossomed into a really good pro after entering the league as an undrafted free agent in 2019. He had 86 tackles, two sacks, five tackles for losses and five passes defended through 10 weeks. White is second with 63 tackles.

Starting cornerbacks Darius Slay and James Bradberry are excellent. Josiah Scott mans the slot. C.J. Gardner-Johnson and Marcus Epps are the safeties. Slay has three interceptions and, according to Pro Football Focus, has allowed a 43.1% completion rate and 41.2 passer rating.

Bradberry is practically a carbon copy with three interceptions, 43.1% and a 41.2 rating. Gardner-Johnson had five interceptions in three seasons with the Saints but has six in his debut season with Philly.

Special teams

In Football Outsiders' rankings, Philadelphia ranked 24th and Green Bay is 30th.

Undrafted rookie receiver Britain Covey, one of the top returners in NCAA history while at Utah, handles kickoffs and punts. He's found the NFL to be more difficult than the Pac-12. He's averaging 6.5 yards per punt return and 20.6 yards per kickoff return.

Jake Elliott is the kicker. He's 6-of-8 on field goals this season. In his sixth season, he's 60.0% for his career from 50-plus yards.

Arryn Siposs is the punter. He's averaging 46.3 yards per punt with a net average of 41.8. Opponents are averaging only 6.7 yards per return.

For the Packers, veteran receiver/punt returner Dede Westbrook, who signed to the practice squad last week, could make his debut.

Packers drop to 4-7 after loss to Titans

Green Bay has now lost 6 of its last 7 games

A 333-yard and two touchdown performance from Ryan Tannehill put a quick end to the Green Bay Packers' momentum, as the Tennessee Titans took down the Packers 27-17 on Nov. 17 in Green Bay.

Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers finished the game with 227 passing yards and two touchdown passes. Rookie wide receiver Christian Watson was once again the benefactor of Rodgers' touchdown passes, scoring both of them.

Watson has now recorded five touchdowns in the past two games, accounting for 30 of Green Bay's last 48 points. Watson became the first rookie wide receiver for the Packers to record multiple touchdowns in back-to-back games since Max McGee in 1954.

The loss stops any momentum that Green Bay had from its emotional win against Dallas last week, as the Packers have now lost six of their past seven games.

It was obvious that Green Bay's gameplan was to stop Titans running back Derrick Henry — something that they did well, holding the All-Pro to 87 rushing yards on 28 attempts. Henry accounted for two total touchdowns, running one in and passing one on a jump-pass.

While Henry failed to top the 100-yard mark, Tennessee took control of the clock in the first half, as Green Bay totaled just 19 plays. One of Tennessee's drives lasted 19 plays for just over 10 minutes in the second quarter.

"Obviously, extremely disappointed right now," said Packers head coach Matt LaFleur. "To put on a performance like that, I just don't even know what to say. It was nothing like a few days ago, and that's why you're only as good as your last game."

Veteran wide receiver Randall Cobb found his way back into the lineup, returning from injury. Cobb led the team in receiving with 73 yards on six catches.

Allen Lazard added another 57 yards on five catches. In terms of rushing, the Packers only ran 19 times, with Aaron Jones accounting for 40

yards, A.J. Dillon accounting for 13 and Watson recording three.

"They stopped the run. They gloved us in the back end," said Rodgers.

After releasing wide receiver/punt returner Amari Rodgers the week prior, Keisean Nixon provided the best return of the season, returning a punt to the Tennessee 44-yard line late in the fourth quarter.

Down 10, the drive instantly stalled, as a Jones reception, a Jones rush and an incompletion intended for Lazard forced fourth down with 5:26 remaining. On fourth down, Rodgers' pass, intended for Lazard, was incomplete and the Titans took back over.

From there, Tennessee's drive lasted just 16 seconds as a Preston Smith sack forced the Titans to punt.

Following the punt, Green Bay put together a 10-play drive, with Rodgers throwing for 49 yards on the drive.

Faced with fourth-and-one from Tennessee's 44-yard line, Jones was stuffed by Titans linebacker David Long Jr., forcing Green Bay to turn the ball over on downs.

Tennessee opened the game strong, with Henry accounting for 18 total yards. The drive was capped off with Tannehill completing a 14-yard touchdown pass to backup running back Dontrell Hilliard.

Green Bay got on to the board late in the first quarter, as Rodgers hit Watson in the back of the end zone on a free play for 14 yards. Cobb provided the big play on the drive, taking a crossing route for 24 yards. The subsequent extra point was blocked.

Henry scored his first touchdown of the game on a 10-play drive from Tennessee that included a 9-yard reception from wide receiver Robert Woods on a third-and-seven.

Green Bay answered back on its

first drive on the second half on a Mason Crosby field goal to cut the lead to five. Scoring continued to pick up as Tennessee immediately marched down the field, culminating in Henry's touchdown pass to tight end Austin Hooper.

Green Bay's next score came on the next drive with a Watson 8-yard touchdown, followed by a Jones two-point conversion.

A 16-yard receiving touchdown from Hooper proved to be the dagger, as Tennessee's defense held Green Bay out of the end zone for the remainder of the game.

"They were obviously more physical and made a lot more plays than we made," said LaFleur. "There was no consistency in terms of being complimentary, offensively and defensively."

Q&A WITH SAMORI TOURE

Samori Toure started his collegiate career at Montana before transferring to Nebraska for his senior season. A seventh-round draft pick who was given the nickname Capt. Casual for his work habits, Toure didn't play the first six weeks of the regular season.

He made his NFL debut in week seven at Washington and caught a 37-yard touchdown pass against Buffalo in week eight.

Q: Where did the Capt. Casual nickname come from?

A: They felt like I wasn't giving the effort or the finish that I should, and I agree with that. You're supposed to burst for 15 (yards) every time you catch the ball, and there were a few times I didn't do that and (coach Matt) LaFleur would always say, 'You look real casual out there. You're never going to be able to reach your potential if you're not really just finishing and stop being casual. Be more intentional with everything.'

So, that's kind of how that nickname came about. You don't want to be known as that guy who's casual, so I guess my practice habits just started

to gradually get better.

Q: Did that bother you?

A: I wasn't mad, but I was just like, 'Dang, that's not what you want to be known for.' Like I said, you don't want one of the greatest quarterbacks thinking you're casual, so I'm like, 'All right, if that's what they think of me, I've got to change something.'

Q: Is that just your personality?

A: Yeah, I think that was a big part of it, just because I'm so laid back off the field. I kind of let my laid-back personality carry over to the field. Once I step on that field, I can't be laid back anymore. I can still be calm, cool and collected, but I've got to be intentional with everything.

Q: Was there a moment when you cranked it up?

A: I think '12' said something about it. He pulled me aside after practice and was basically saying, 'You could be really good; you've just got to finish everything. Be intentional with everything,' and he said, 'I think you

should be suiting up by midseason.' So, that was a moment where I was like, 'OK, I need to step it up.'

Q: That first career touchdown at Buffalo, did you keep the ball?

A: Yeah, I kept the ball. It's in my locker.

Q: Any plans for it?

A: Just take it home. Maybe eventually frame it. I don't know. I might ask him to sign it, but I don't know if I want to ask him.

Q: Coming out of high school, what did people miss that led you to Montana?

A: It was probably a mixture of things. I never really went to any camps until I was going into my senior year, so I kind of started behind the eight-ball. I was in Oregon, which isn't considered California or Texas when it comes to recruiting. So, people were watching my film saying, 'Who is he going against?'

And then the last thing would be my size. I was probably 160 soaking wet coming out of high school. So, it was a combination of all those things.

Q: So, is the NFL a dream at that point in your life? Not that Montana is a bad program, but it's not a football factory, either.

A: Coming out of high school, yeah, that's the dream, obviously, but you can't even really think about that unless you play college. So, my whole mindset was I want to be able to play DI and dominate the DI level and then see what comes after that.

Q: Does being overlooked, whether it was in college or not being invited to the Scouting Combine motivate you? Or what is your motivation?

A: I have a lot of different motivations. My loved ones, my mom is definitely my No. 1. Yeah, I definitely let that stuff drive me. I'm used to that. It's been like that my whole career.

Definitely being the fifth-to-last pick in the draft, not being invited to the Combine, it's just a little extra motivation.

Q: So, once you got to the NFL, did you have to prove to yourself that you belonged?

A: I knew that from Day 1. During the draft, after Nebraska, I was realistic with myself. I had people in my ear telling me that I was going in the fifth round to the seventh round. I knew I was going to be Day 3 but I knew I was better than that. It's about showing everybody else.
