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Edwards' swan song with Kids coming

Shawano alum keeps showing off the woodwinds in Wisconsin performance tradition

Nathan Edwards got up on the stage of Shawano Community High School one last time July 5 as a member of the Kids From Wisconsin, performing as part of a state tradition that goes back to 1969.

The Kids From Wisconsin are in the 55th season of summer entertainment that gives youth with musical talent a chance to shine for communities across the state. Shawano has a long tradition of having at least one performer in the ensemble, whether those performers are singing a tune or playing an instrument.

"I saw the 2019 show when they did it here at the high school," Edwards said during the Shawano stop of the tour.

Edwards is in his fourth year with the program but only the third of performing live with the group. He said that the pandemic canceled the 2020 tour; instead of meeting as a group to perform, they did video recordings and put them all together.

"I think this will be the best one yet," Edwards said. "I have the most solos this year."

Edwards claims that "by some miracle," he passed the 2020 audition, which happened just before everything was shut down in Wisconsin, and he's been making music ever since.

"It's a tough gig to get into," Edwards said. "I did it as a hail Mary to get some auditioning experience, but I was very lucky."

Edwards — who plays woodwind instruments like the flute, saxophone and clarinet — is going into his junior year at University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. He plans to major in clarinet performance, as his dreams are set to be in a pit orchestra on Broadway.

"This show, I'm playing four different instruments," Edwards said, noting he likes being a jack-of-all-trades with instruments. "Last year, I played five. Whenever they need someone to play a flute or a clarinet role, I take that. It's a lot of very high heart sopranos a lot of the time. It's a very cool part of the organization."

Each year brings in new performers, most of whom only perform with the Kids troupe for a summer or two. It's rare that performers get

four summers with the group like Edwards, but he enjoys being able to make new friends each year.

"All the troupe members with me are just great people and lifelong friends, truly," Edwards said. "I also enjoy the performing experience. Just getting out and doing gigs where you get to perform six days a week at this high of a caliber, and get paid for it, it's an awesome experience."

Edwards' love of performing is what has brought him back to the

Kids year after year.

"I came at a good time, when they needed a woodwind player," Edwards said. "I was lucky because I was young enough where I could do it for four years. There's just something about being on a stage with a crowd that loves you."

While the Kids' visits to Shawano always draw a crowd, the biggest crowds Edwards and his colleagues face are at the Wisconsin State Fair in August, playing multiple shows

throughout the duration.

"It's definitely the best two-week period, because that's where the Kids originated from," Edwards said. "Originally, they only performed at the state fair, and it's nice because it's our home turf. There are a lot of people who come (to the fair) just to see us, and it's such a great crowd. I like it because I'll be performing one day, and then I'm randomly packing my instruments and then I hear my name, and it's just random from someone from school or another family member who just happened to be there that day."

Like many Kids members from Shawano before him, Edwards credited the SCHS music and performing arts programs for providing the foundation for excellence that has helped him become part of something bigger.

"I think we have an excellent music program, at least on the band side of things," he said. "The jazz band is really highly caliber, and that really lends itself to this level of playing. This is not classical playing (with the Kids) by any means."

While improvement is expected from one year to the next, Edwards is amazed at his playing ability now compared to his first summer.

"It's leagues apart," Edwards said. "I remember looking back at videos of me playing at a piccolo solo that first year. I was looking at that and thinking, 'Oh, my goodness.' A few years of college have helped to improve my chops and tone a little."

While Edwards likes the road lifestyle that programs like Kids From Wisconsin provide, he also likes bringing the group home to meet the parents and the rest of his hometown.

"It's just something to come here and see familiar faces in the crowd," Edwards said. "It makes you perform a little harder, which is the best part of it. Coming back here, I hope there are members in the band and choir programs that see it is awesome to go on and do crazy things like this, to just reach for the stars."

For those who missed the Shawano performance, there are plenty of Kids shows left, including July 19 at 6:30 p.m. at Antigo High School, 1900 10th Ave., Antigo.

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Packard Caribbean has deep family ties

Kuester siblings spend lot of time on vehicle now housed at FWD Seagrave Museum

After spending a lot of time and money restoring a 1953 Packard Caribbean, Bob Kuester was thinking of selling the car.

"When I bought the car, it didn't have an engine or transmission and it didn't have an interior, but the body work was pretty much done," said Kuester, who joined his cousins, Mary Beth Kuester and Kay Doran, to display the vehicle at the Iola Car Show.

"It needed everything," he said. "It had been in an accident, so the right front fender was dented up. The fellow that had it prior to me didn't do much of a job restoring it. The pieces didn't fit."

Although Bob now lives near Dallas, Mary Beth and Kay, who are sisters, live in Antigo. All three grew up in Clintonville, where the Kuester family operated a Packard car dealership on Main Street for several years.

"Three generations of us went to Clintonville High School," Doran said. "We all grew up there. What's left of the family is now scattered like most families, but it was a good place to grow up."

Bob Kuester purchased the car in Texas and oversaw its restoration, a three-year process.

"I've been brought up with Packards," he said. "The first Packard we had that was restored for my father was a 1929 Packard 640 Roadster. After Dad died, I got that car and sold it to a fellow in Florida. Then, I bought a 1953 Mayfair, which is a two-door hardtop. People ask, 'How do you do that?' I said, 'Well, you just take one piece at a time.' I started with the engine, then the transmission, then the suspension. Then, we started working on the sheet metal, like the right fender."

Bob Kuester attended the first Iola Car Show in 1972 with his father.

"We were driving a 1932 Cadillac," he said. "When I was still living in Wisconsin, we came to every one of these shows and Dad always showed his 1929 Packard Roadster. Since I moved to Texas, I've only been up here three or four times."

Bob Kuester purchased the gulf

green metallic Caribbean in New Braunfels, Texas, about a decade ago.

"A collector had it and was going to restore it," he said. "He got part way through it and he gave up. I can put them together mechanically, but the painting, the upholstery, the body work, you have to have somebody who knows what they're doing. There are a lot of restoration shops down there that specialize in cars like this. I have a very close friend who's a mechanic and really gave me a lot of guidance. It turned out very well and it's a very nice driving car. Everything's new in that car. It's like a new car."

Bob Kuester never planned on keeping the car.

"Mary Beth said, 'Don't sell it to anybody else outside the family, sell it to me,'" he said. "She wrote the check and she got the car."

Mary Beth Kuester now owns the car with her sister. It also has a permanent home at the FWD Sea-

grave Museum in Clintonville.

Doran serves on the museum's board of directors.

"Our family had the Packard dealership and when my sister and I were little girls, we lived up above the garage, right downtown on Main Street," she said. "We lived up there in the late '30s until after World War II. You can still see the building, it says, 'Kuester Block.' The dealership was around from the early '40s until '56 or '57."

"We were always associated with the implement business, the car business. My dad was into steam engine restoration and (Iola Car Show founder Chet) Krause bought almost all of my dad's stuff after my dad died. My dad was into steam tractors and his brother Bill - Bob's dad - was into cars, predominantly Packards."

Detroit-based Packard Motor Car Co. manufactured the Packard Caribbean, a full-sized luxury car, from 1953-56.

"The Packard was a high-end car and people were looking a little bit less," Doran said. "We also sold Diamond T trucks, which was a high-end truck."

"In the '20s and '30s, the Packard was a premium automobile," Bob Kuester added. "Even through their demise in '56, they still were a premium automobile."

A new Packard Caribbean sold for \$5,200 in 1953.

"In 1953, you could buy a real nice car for under \$2,000," Bob Kuester said. "Like this Lincoln Continental over here. In 1956, you could be a very nice car for under \$3,000 and that car sold for \$10,000. You'd find them in the bigger cities where the wealthy people would buy them."

"We've always been interested in restorations," Doran said. "Our family is a bunch of gearheads from way back, girls as well as boys. We love the smell of rust and axle grease."

Role-plays provide chance to be someone else

I am presenting an interpretive role-play called “Lucy Loved Lakewood” at 1 p.m. July 22 at the Holt and Balcom Logging Camp Museum in Lakewood. I debuted it at the

Oconto County Historical Society’s Beyer Home Annex in April, and it was well-received. The presentation details Lucy Rumsey Holt’s indispensable role in preserving the history of northern Oconto County. I love sharing Northwoods history, and dramatic presentations are the most popular programs at the camp.

My hour as Lucy includes an exhibit of rare photographs of northern Oconto County taken by and of her from 1894 to 1938. The collection depicts the Holt family’s wide circle of family and friends as they enjoyed getaways at Island Lodge, a secluded summer retreat on a large island in Archibald Lake. Built by Holt crews in 1896 and only accessible by boat, the lodge is still used by Holt descendants for summer vacations.

My introduction to the Holt name came in 1993 when I saw it on the property abstract for land we bought on the Townsend Flowage. I didn’t really take notice until my cousin, Lee Stehula, mentioned it one night in 2006. The McCauslin Lions owned the logging camp back then, and as president, Lee was in charge of the site.

He recruited my husband to help with school tours still hosted annually for area fourth graders studying Wisconsin history. Jon agreed and volunteered me, too. Thus began an odyssey that included unexpectedly becoming head contractor and sole fundraiser of a site-saving restoration that took from 2007 to 2013.

As a token of appreciation from the Holt family, I was invited to visit Island Lodge, where I enthusiastically accepted an offer to sit in Lucy’s chair. I am convinced that experience bewitched me. I began researching her life, finding an inspiring story of a woman who was

a hundred years ahead of her time. I subsequently made friends with several of Lucy’s descendants who said I knew more about her than they did.

Truth be told, Lucy and I are as different as can be — except for both of us having a lead foot, an abiding affection for white pines and a desire to record history. I was raised on a dairy farm; she was from high society. As a devout Presbyterian, Lucy never smoked, drank, swore, gambled or danced. I

admit that I have done all of those things. Yet when I put on my Lucy costume and look in the mirror, I see the faint reflection of a halo over my hat.

I’ve been doing role-plays for a very long time. To become someone else on stage for an hour or so is as enjoyable as shoe shopping or drinking wine with girlfriends. That sort of amazes me, because I was never in dramatic productions when I was in school. In fact, back then I was very self-conscious and

uncomfortable in the limelight. Really.

Somewhere in my 30s, I discovered that portraying both real and fictitious people was a great teaching strategy. It was a humbling experience to learn that the kids paid more attention when I was someone else, but I swallowed my pride and went with the flow.

I played Becky Thatcher (Tom Sawyer’s love interest) as a grown woman. I did Catherine Dickens, long-suffering wife of Charles who flaunted his affairs while she dutifully raised their children. I especially loved doing Hatshepsut, an Egyptian pharaoh who brought economic prosperity to her beloved Egypt. She built monuments, temples and pyramids but was basically erased from history by her jealous stepson who forced her to commit suicide, then removed her name from all of her achievements and inserted his instead.

The best role of my life was Catherine, the madame of the Red Light Saloon. Maybe it was the red dress, the bling, the feather boas, the freedom to be a teeny-weeny bit naughty on stage. Whatever. When I put on that costume, I felt like I was Cate. Why not? I’m convinced that in a previous life, I was a lumberjack’s lady.

Yes, yes, a century ago, Lucy Holt would never associate with the likes of Cate. However, there is an interesting connection. Saving vulnerable young women from being ensnared in the Chicago sex trade was a key mission of the Lake Forest Presbyterian Church that the Rumsey family attended. Lucy obviously condemned the sin and not the sinner, so I think she’d forgive Cate and highly approve of the fact that she does reform in the end.

If I’ve piqued your interest, why not take a drive to Lakewood on July 22 to see “Lucy Loved Lakewood”? Relax in our air-conditioned cookshack and learn about this amazing woman. You will be educated and entertained; I promise.

Pageant Players take audience back to onakow

Last month, the Menominee Pageant Players brought the Native American Tourism of Wisconsin Conference attendees to their feet. At the event in Keshena, the group concluded their presentation as they do every show — with an intertribal dance that they invite everyone to partake in.

The 2023 conference ran from June 20-22, and it featured events ranging from traditional storytelling and crafts to business and partnership building. NATOW's mission is "to promote tribal tourism and economic development, while highlighting the beauty, diversity and cultural dynamism of the 11 federally recognized tribes of Wisconsin."

The organization notes that "Tourism is the leading industry in tribal economies and plays a critical role in generating employment and revenues for essential governmental services for tribes and their members." The conference was a chance to highlight some of the events that each tribe promotes.

One of the events highlighted was the Menominee Pageant, held annually in the tribe's famed Woodland Bowl in Keshena. From 1937 to the 1970s, the Menominee people staged their theater tradition that mixes audio recordings and pantomime with live drumming, singing and dancing. The shows highlighted Menominee history and cultural teachings through performance, and they drew spectators from throughout the nation.

Since 2016, the College of Menominee Nation has honored an elder's request to revive this traditional art form. The producers of the show range from CMN staff to community members, the core of which make up the Pageant Players Guild. Having heard of the annual production's success, NATOW booked the Pageant Players for an after-dinner presentation.

Beginning with an overview, the presentation shared documents of "oration" being a part of Menominee tourism that dates back to at least 1878. Further, the Woodland Bowl amphitheater has been rec-

ognized as a performance space for more than 100 years. In 1937, the Menominee people staged the first pageant for the "tin can tourists" who parked their campers on tribal land. News of the inaugural event spanned the country, including a story from Florida's Sarasota Herald, which called the gathering "a good time."

The reason for the NATOW address was to promote the forthcoming pageant. At 9 p.m. Aug. 2, the group will stage a new script titled "Onakow," which is the Menominee word for yesterday. The show's billing states, "Combining scenes from classic pageants with new work celebrating Restoration, 'Onakow' showcases how Menominee values both guided the ancestors and continue to inspire their descendants."

After the presentation and a video invitation to attend the August

show, the Pageant Players took to the stage in their regalia. Shannon Wilber then addressed the crowd on the group's behalf.

Wilber said: "The pageants have allowed many opportunities to be grateful and proud of our culture and to realize how far our people have come, but the greatest reward is when you give of yourself. It is about bettering the lives of others, being part of something bigger than yourself and making a positive difference."

Wilber then cued the Wolf River Singers and they started an intertribal song. Wilber said to the NATOW participants, "We welcome you all to join us, just like we do to end our pageant performances."

With the beat of the drum, many of those assembled left their chairs behind for the chance to participate in the song. Among those who joined in was Wisconsin Tourism

Secretary Anne Sayers, as well as tribal leaders from throughout the Badger State.

After the song ended, Menominee pageant veteran Ron Bowan Sr. approached the group and thanked them for their work.

"Having been a part of these shows in the past, tonight meant so much to me," Bowan said.

The other attendees seemed to echo their approval, as they asked for photos with the Pageant Players.

While the 2023 NATOW conference got a look at "Onakow," the hope is that tourists from throughout the state will join in the fun during the full production this August.

Old school archery's romance lives on

I've been to many archery events over the years, most of them involving compound bows.

These mostly 3-D archery competitions involve shooting foam animal-shaped targets in realistic hunting settings at hunting distances from 20-50 yards. With today's high-tech compound bows, such shots are not overly difficult. Modern bows fitted with



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carbon limbs, machined aluminum risers, pulleys that allow a shooter to hold as little as 15% of the bow's draw weight, lighted sights, drop-away arrow rests and other George Jetson gadgetry makes this once-primitive hunting tool seem as far away as a stone-tipped spear.

Now there is nothing wrong with an efficient hunting weapon for a quick, clean kill. I've used compound bows successfully on many deer, just as I've used crossbows. If you want venison for the freezer and aren't overly concerned about the challenge involved, these two tools are probably the way to go outside of a rifle.

Since I started my archery deer hunting around 1974 with a laminated-wood Bear Grizzly recurve bow and Bear Razorhead broadheads on the tips of my feather-fletched wooden arrows, the romance of traditional archery never stopped whispering in my ear. I've yet to drop a deer with basic stick and string.

Now I was wandering the grounds of the Compton Traditional Bowhunters Rendezvous on June 16-18 in Berrien Springs, Michigan, with hundreds of others who shared my love of traditional recurves and longbows.

Nobody was talking about the latest gadget to make their bow shoot better

or faster. In fact, I got a surprise when my two friends and I got to the first of four 3-D shooting ranges. Nobody was keeping score. There was nobody with a scorecard. As a naturally competitive sort, I was taken aback at first.

True traditional archery means no sights. Arrows are normally shot off the shelf of the bow's riser, not an arrow rest. Shooting instinctively is similar to throwing a baseball: practice makes perfect. We were honing our shooting skills with every shot.

Almost anyone can learn to shoot a compound bow in about an hour, including kids as young as 6 or 7. In a few days, older kids and adults can routinely hit ping-pong balls at 20

yards or more. These arrow-shooting machines still take arms to hold them and draw them back, but they have taken most of the shooting challenge away.

The first target was a foam javelina at about 20 yards. Compton sets its targets at traditional archery distances, meaning you will never see a target more than 35 yards away. Trad hunters prefer to get closer to their quarry, just as the Indians did. Small saplings were directly in front of the target, and my first arrow was perfect: dead-center in the sapling.

After struggling to remove the arrow, my fellow shooters — Angie Petersen, owner of Far North Archery

(a traditional bow case maker) and her mother, Joyce, both of rural Wrightstown — and I decided to leave my arrow as a warning to others. A burly shooter in the group behind us asked if I had stuck an arrow in a tree. He then told me that he'd been able to remove it and left it by the shooting stake. I ran back to retrieve it.

There were lots of fallen logs by target two and once again, my arrow found wood. This time I was able to unscrew the shaft from the target point, leaving it for the wood nymphs.

The first range was a quick 22 targets, and there was only one where all three of us were able to make decent shots: the rear end of a fanning turkey target. We all needed a lot more practice.

After a quick lunch at the concession stand, we moved to our second and final range. An occasional arrow would skip off a tree limb and disappear for a bit, but with three sets of eyes, we normally found it. One of Joyce's arrows flew over the top of one target and onto the far shore of a small stream. I did a balancing act across a log to retrieve the arrow, then managed to put at least one boot in the mud on the way back. We returned to the grounds with all of our arrows.

As we watched shooters wandering the grounds and admired rows and rows of both new and vintage wooden, laminated bows, I realized what was missing from compound bows. They have no natural beauty or kindred spirit. They are as lifeless and boring as a crescent wrench.

I strongly recommend a visit to this annual gathering of traditional archers if the trad bug bites you. When it does, the only cure is to embrace the natural pull of natural wood and the primal call of hunting as they did centuries ago.

Winter wheat, drones part of ag field day

University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension is sponsoring a field day designed to help farms get the most from their winter wheat acres.

The day also features one of the newer technologies gaining usage in agriculture — drones.

Questions from attendees will be a key part of the day, as well. Other topics will include post-wheat cover crop opportunities and forage production options after wheat. A light lunch is being provided by Seed Concepts Inc. CCA CEU's are being requested for this event.
