County jail officer deploying to Ukraine

Brandon England is a member of combat team headquarters

OCONTO — An Oconto County jail officer is among approximately 160 members of the 160 Wisconsin Army National Guard soldiers from the 32nd “Red Arrow” Infantry Brigade Combat Team headquarters who are scheduled to mobilize for deployment to Ukraine later this month.

Brandon England, who has been employed at the jail since May 2014, was honored for his service during the Aug. 22 meeting of the Oconto

County Board.

In the Guard he is Warrant Officer England, serving as an intelligence analyst and is scheduled to be activated this month for one year.

“This is Warrant Officer England’s fourth activation and deployment,” county Veterans Service Officer Ron Christensen said in a recognition that was read to the board. “He was previously activated in 2004 for one year with service in Kuwait, August 2009 for one year with service in Kosovo and again in September 2011 for two years with service in Germany, Kosovo and Ireland.”

The brigade headquarters, based

at Camp Douglas, will deploy in support of the Joint Multinational Training Group-Ukraine, where it will serve as the headquarters element overseeing a group of multinational “partner and advise training teams” based at the International Peacekeeping and Security Center in western Ukraine, according to Capt. Joe Trovato of the Wisconsin National Guard.

“The Red Arrow Soldiers will work alongside several NATO allies to assist in building professional units capable of defending Ukraine’s sovereignty and territorial integrity,” Trovato said. “Since 2015, U.S. Army

Europe has trained and advised Ukrainian security forces in western Ukraine by mentoring Ukrainian cadre and assisting in the development and enhancement of ranges and training areas."

Christensen described England as "the finest example of the Citizen/Soldier that our country has come to rely on" and said the Reserve and National Guard forces have borne a heavy burden since 9/11.

"It is extremely difficult to live the life of a normal civilian and then shake it all up when your country calls," Christensen said. "What is even more difficult is to put it all back together when you return a year later. That transition can be extremely difficult."

He included England's wife, Kristina, and their young daughters Hailey, Kelsey and Carley, who will also bear the burden of not having husband and father for a year.

"What I believe is important to Warrant Officer England is that he knows that he is supported by his family, his employer and his community," Christensen said, pledging his support to England and his family.

Jail Administrator Carol Copp told the board that she thought it was important to recognize England "and

let him know that we do support him very much as well as his wife and kids, because this won't be easy."

The county has worked to support England's National Guard service, which has involved occasional absences for training.

"I just want you to know how much we appreciate you," Copp said. "You've been an amazing correctional officer, you are clearly a wonderful husband and father, and you will be missed while you're gone, and we'll anxiously wait your safe return."

County Board Chairman Paul Bednarek presented England with a certificate of appreciation for his service to the county and the country from the full board, which gave him a standing ovation.

Trovato said the deployment comes at a time when approximately 800 other Red Arrow Soldiers from the 32nd Infantry Brigade Combat Team are deployed with both the Appleton-headquartered 2nd Battalion, 127th Infantry and the Eau Claire-based 1st Battalion, 128th Infantry. The 127th remains deployed to Afghanistan, while the 128th mobilized in July in preparation for its own mission in Afghanistan.

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SBA disaster aid available to nonprofits

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Small Business Administration announced last week that certain private nonprofit organizations in Wisconsin that do not provide critical services of a governmental nature may be eligible to apply for low-interest rate disaster loans following a presidential disaster declaration resulting from damage caused by severe storms July 18-20.

Oconto County is one of 17 coun-

ties and two tribes affected by the declaration. Examples of eligible non-critical nonprofits include, but are not limited to, food kitchens, homeless shelters, museums, libraries, community centers, schools and colleges.

Private nonprofit organizations may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business assets.

The interest rate is 2.75% with terms up to 30 years. Applicants may be eligible for a loan amount increase up to 20% of their physical damages, as verified by the SBA for mitigation purposes. Eligible mitigation improvements may include a safe room or storm shelter to help protect property and occupants from future damage caused by a similar disaster.

The SBA also offers Economic

Injury Disaster Loans to help meet working capital needs, such as ongoing operating expenses to private nonprofits. Economic Injury Disaster Loan assistance is available regardless of whether the organization suffered any physical property damage.

The filing deadline to submit applications for physical property damage is Oct. 28. The deadline to submit economic injury applications is May 27.

UW-Extension offers corn silage field day

LENA — A corn silage field day is being held Sept. 5 near Lena. The focus of the field day will be corn silage harvest and usage, along with forage management best practices.

This field day opportunity is being sponsored by the Marinette and Oconto County Extension offices and is hosted by Alsteen Farms, 9399 Belgian Road.

Dr. Joe Lauer, University of Wisconsin-Madison Extension corn agronomist, will be the featured

presenter. He will be offering a post-mortem of the 2019 corn planting and growing season and how it will impact corn silage harvest. Following Lauer will be Kimberly Kassube, Shawano agriculture agent, leading a discussion on the dairy cow's perspective of 2019 corn silage and how management practices may impact cow performance. Included will be such aspects as working with low-starch corn silage, kernel processing and other factors.

The final portion of the program will feature corn silage harvest planning assistance opportunities in the area, along with a discussion of other forage species' management. Both perennial and overwintering annual forages are going to need to have optimum management this fall so that they can best meet the quality and yield goals which will be needed in 2020.

The event starts at noon and lasts until 2:45 p.m. A \$5 registration fee

includes lunch and handouts. This field day event follows another event being hosted by Alsteen Farms that morning, a NRCS-sponsored soil health field day. That program begins at 9 a.m. and concludes at noon.

FSA now accepts debit card payments

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency is expanding its payment options to accept debit cards and Automated Clearing House debit.

These paperless payment options enable FSA customers to pay farm loan payments, measurement service fees, farm program debt repayments and administrative service fees, as well as to purchase aerial maps.

"Our customers have spoken, and we've listened," said Bill Northey, USDA's undersecretary for farm production and conservation. "Finding ways to improve customer service and efficiency is important for our farmers, ranchers, producers and forest landowners who work hard for our nation every day. Now our customers can make electronic payments instantly by stopping in our offices or calling over the phone."

Previously, only cash, check, money orders and wires were accepted. By using debit cards and ACH debit, transactions are securely processed from the customer's financial institution through Pay.gov, the U.S. Treasury's online payment hub.

While traditional collection methods will continue, offering the new alternatives will improve effectiveness and convenience to customers while being more cost effective. In 2017,

the average cost to manually process checks, a process that included navigating multiple systems, cost USDA more than \$4.6 million. The expanded payment options will cut the time employees take processing payments by 75%.

"At USDA, we're focused on modernization to improve customer service," Northey said. "If half of our customers use these new payment options, we'll see a \$1 million savings in one year. These new payment methods are one part of a much larger effort to expand options for our customers, as well as to make our services more effective and efficient."

The announcement marks the beginning of a multi-phased roll-out of new payment options for USDA customers. Ultimately, payment option flexibility will be extended to allow farmers and producers to use debit cards and ACH debit payments to make payments for all FSA programs, including farm storage facility loan repayments, farm loan facility fees, marketing assistance loan repayments, Dairy Margin Coverage administrative fees and premiums and Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program fees.

New facility serves users of the Nicolet State Trail

GILLETT — The weather was perfect Aug. 27 when the new trailhead facility for Nicolet State Trail was delivered to its permanent home at Zippel Park in Gillett.

Built for the city with the help of a pair of federal and state grants,

the trailhead was constructed at Huffcutt Concrete Inc. in Chippewa Falls and trucked to Gillett by River City Transport. Ideal Crane Rental provided the final boost to lift the 70,000-pound building onto its foundation.

The structure features two unisex restrooms, each with two stalls and two showers for use by people us-

ing the trail, as well as a mechanical room.

The county-operated state trail meanders for more than 89 miles through the Nicolet National Forest from Gillett in Oconto County to the Michigan state line. The trail follows the same corridor built by railroad companies in the late 19th century to open up Wisconsin's pine and hard-

wood forests for the timber industry.

All-terrain vehicle use is allowed on the trail during the summer through Oct. 31 in Oconto County. ATVs are permitted year-round in Forest and Florence counties.

Landscape shrubs ideal as rest stop and dining opportunity for birds

With September, many of our landscape trees and shrubs become a bounty for songbirds beginning migration south for the fall. Landscaping and gardening for birds is becoming more and more popular as people become aware of the problems birds face during the migration, as well as upon the return to and from their destinations. Providing a valuable food source for them is a simple and pleasurable way to become a part of the natural world.

There are many excellent choices

for landscape shrubs to be used throughout our gardens, yards and properties that produce bountiful berries for songbirds to consume during fall migration, as well as during the long winter season for those birds that

stay with us all winter long.

In addition to the nutritious and vital source of food they provide for songbirds, these shrubs are also decorative and ornamental in the garden, serving multiple purposes. There are shrubs available for just about any soil and light situation, making them an important part of the landscape.

Robins, cedar waxwings, gray catbirds, eastern bluebirds, brown thrashers, thrushes of all species, grosbeaks, cardinals, finches and many others enjoy eating the fruits and berries of backyard shrubs.

Many of these species are with us all winter long, changing their habits specifically to make use of fruits, nuts and berries during the winter season. Many of these birds may eat insects and seed during summer and fall, switching to fruits for the winter.

One of the best sources of nutritious food for songbirds during the fall and winter season are the many different species of viburnum found in our area. There are native species of viburnum, as well as many garden hybrids, all of which produce clusters of nutritious, important berries for bird on the move.

Ninebarks are another important source of food for fall and winter birds. Dense clusters of lacy blooms from summer transform to plump, juicy fruits during late summer and fall, ideal for birds as they begin the long journey.

All of our dogwood species are also excellent for birds, providing

food and shelter.

In addition to readily available food sources, berry producing shrubs

also provide important shelter for songbird during the migration, as well as during the winter season. Finding

shelter from predators quickly and easily is important to songbirds, even those visiting backyard feeders where hawks stalk relentlessly and take any opportunity to strike.

Conifers provide excellent shelter, as well as another source of food in the form of fruits and cones in a variety of sizes, shapes and forms. There are juniper berries, white-cedar fruits, tamarack cones, spruce cones and, of course, pine cones. All of these are an excellent source of food for a variety of different bird species ranging in size from tiny nuthatches and chickadees to the larger woodpeckers and even crows.

Other shrubs and small trees that produce berries and fruit for birds that are important during the fall and winter migration are crab apple, mountain ash, staghorn sumac, oaks, hazelnuts, serviceberry, black cherry, highbush cranberry, chokeberry, roses and others.

Add a few of these to your backyard landscaping and enjoy reaping the benefits of colorful, vivacious, trusting songbirds that will be drawn to their delicious, important bounty.

An opinion about Major League pitchers

I've been a baseball fan for as long as I can remember. Some of my heroes from my childhood were major league pitchers. And after the Boston

Braves moved to Milwaukee and became the Milwaukee Braves during my eighth-grade year, I had some new heroes to admire: Lew Burdette, Bob Buhl, and Warren Spahn chief among them.

It wasn't only the pitchers, though, who became new heroes for me. Del Crandall, Eddie Mathews, Joe Adcock, Johnny Logan, Andy Pafko, and Billy Bruton came in that transfer.

I want to talk about pitchers, though. I watch a lot of Brewers games now, and I'm always interested in the way the announcers talk about the pitchers today. They're constantly talking about "pitch count" and they become concerned when a pitcher starts to get beyond 100 pitches. And they're always really pleased if a pitcher makes it through six innings. Whatever happened to complete games?

In 2018, there were only 42 complete games, which is a pretty small percentage when you consider there are 30 teams and each team plays 162 regular season games, and there are many (anywhere from 12 to 22) playoff games. So 42 complete games out of nearly 5,000.

Compare that to Warren Spahn's career. Spahn threw 145 complete games in seven years for the Braves. Over his 23 years in the majors he threw 328 complete games. Lew Burdette had 128 complete games in his career. Bob Buhl had 111. So pitchers in "the good old days" certainly earned their pay.

There are some amazing stories about some of those old-time pitchers. I remember listening late into the night when I was a sophomore in college to one of the most amazing games ever played (in my opinion). The Braves were playing the Pirates in Milwaukee, and it was Lew Burdette versus Harvey Haddix for the Pirates. What Haddix did that night was spectacular.

Haddix pitched 12 perfect innings (still the all-time record) while facing one of the most dangerous line-

ups in baseball: The Braves had won the pennant the two previous seasons and they had Hank Aaron and Eddie Mathews. It's fallen through the historical cracks for a remarkable reason that somehow, Pittsburgh lost the game.

So Haddix pitched 12 perfect innings — no hits, no runs, 36 batters. There was one problem, though: Milwaukee starter Lew Burdette had a shutout going himself. Pittsburgh had plenty of chances, pounding out 12 hits in all, but they left eight men on base, unable to come through in a big spot. The game went to extra innings, and in the bottom of the 13th, someone finally blinked: Pirates third baseman Don Hoak booted a Felix Mantilla grounder, and just like that, the perfect game was up in smoke.

After a sacrifice bunt from Mathews and an intentional walk to Aaron, slugger Joe Adcock came to the plate — and that's when Haddix made his only mistake of the night:

Adcock hit what appeared to be a walk-off home run to deep right-center, but Aaron thought the ball had simply bounced off the wall, so he cut across the diamond back to the dugout rather than rounding the bases. Since Adcock had passed him and Aaron had left the basepaths, both men were ruled out, and the game ended 1-0 on Mantilla's run.

Haddix was still hung with the hardest-luck loss in baseball history — a final line of 13 IP, 1 H, 1 R, 0 ER, 8 K.

In 1991, the Committee for Statistical Accuracy in Baseball announced that a no-hitter would be redefined as "a game in which a pitcher or pitchers complete a game of nine innings or more without allowing a hit," meaning Haddix's gem no longer qualified. When he was made aware that one of the greatest games ever pitched no longer had a place in the record books, his response was: "It's OK. I know what I did."

For teams in the current era, having a pitcher work as deep as the seventh, eighth, or ninth inning is a huge bonus. A deep and strong bullpen has become the most desired weapon in the majors since pitch counts and inning limitations have become the norm for monitoring starters.

We Brewers fans may never see another complete game, and I say that's too bad.

Stuart lifts Suring over Lena/STAA

Eagles move to 2-0 in conference play

LENA — Logan Stuart rushed for three touchdowns and the Suring High School football team overcame a heap of penalties to earn an 18-6 MONLPC-8 road victory over the Lena/St. Thomas Aquinas Academy co-op on Thursday.

The first half saw both teams possessing the ball for long stretches, trying to wear the opposition down. It was a gutsy call by Suring coach Mitch Taylor that changed the complexion of the game.

Up 6-0 and facing a fourth-and-1 from its own 10-yard line late in the first half, Taylor decided to roll the dice and put the ball into the hands of Stuart.

The move paid off in a big way, as the Eagles' offensive line created a sizable hole for Stuart to run through and past the first down marker. But the senior didn't stop there, breaking through a couple of tackle attempts before sprinting the remainder of the

field for a 90-yard touchdown.

"We gutted one out. I mean, fourth-and-1 on the 10 and we get a 90-yard touchdown. That really was the game right there for us," said Taylor.

"Yeah (on it being a big decision to go for it), but when I go out there and I go, 'Let's punt it' and I got Logan going, 'I'll get it.' I'm like, 'Okay, I trust you.' And that's the thing, he's earned it, he's sacrificed four years — he's been playing since (he was) a freshman and at a high level. I kind of figured actually it might go because just his determination, he did that last week too."

The crucial play gave Suring a 12-0 lead, and the Eagles' defense held up in the final minute-plus to take that lead into halftime.

Suring punted on its first possession of the second half, but got the ball right back when junior Kegyn Lambrecht picked off a pass to set the visitors up at the Lena/STAA 25-yard line.

Just two plays later, senior quarterback Jayden Geniesse scampered into the end zone from 15 yards out, but a holding penalty wiped out the score. The Eagles were eventually able to get into the end zone on a 1-yard run by Stuart.

Penalties hindered Suring all night, so despite moving to 2-0 in conference play, the Eagles know they will need to clean things up if they hope to continue piling up the wins.

"We definitely battled hard in it. We really need to improve on our game a lot from this (game), penalty wise, blocking wise, just round off better as a team. But I mean, we fought hard until the end and that's what drove us to this win," said Stuart, who opened the scoring with a 4-yard rushing score in the second quarter.

"I think all of know that we have a lot more in us. It's still good to know that we can get a W even while playing bad," said Geniesse.

Suring's defense rose the challenge on multiple occasions after being put in bad situations.

In addition to their interception, the Eagles halted co-op drives inside the 30-yard line four times, forced three three-and-outs and made two fourth-down stops.

Lena/STAA's lone touchdown came on the final play of the contest, as senior Simon Gard scrambled into the end zone from six yards out as time expired.

Lena/STAA was flagged after the

play, so the officials called the game as the extra point or two-point try would not have determined which team won.

Despite a second straight loss to open the season, Lena/STAA co-coach Dale Lange was pleased with the effort shown against Suring.

"I'm happy with what we've improved on but I know we need to get the errors cleaned up," said Lange. "We need to hit our blocking assignments a little better. On some of our pass routes, we missed some of our open receivers at times. But everything is correctable, but I thought we looked a lot better."

In week three, the co-op will hit the road to battle Wabeno/Laona on Friday, while Suring hosts Gibraltar on Friday. Both games are slated for 7 p.m. starts.

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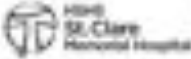
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CLOTHESLINE CONVERSATIONS
