Local grad goes full speed with training, internship

Friedman preps for cross-country season, career in food science

MENOMONIE — The summer of 2019 was anything but a time to relax for Mike Friedman, who is a senior this fall at University of Wisconsin-Stout. Quite the opposite. He took things up a notch or two.

On weekday afternoons, the food science and technology major has been, on average, going on an 11-mile run in and around Menomonie. A member of the Blue Devils cross-country team, he's following coach Matt Schauf's off-season training schedule — about 80 miles a week — to prepare for the fall season.

The long runs come after he's risen at about 4:30 a.m., driven about 60 miles round trip to Chippewa Falls

and worked a full day to prepare for something else — his career. Friedman interned at Jacob Leinenkugel Brewing as a food scientist. He was part of the quality assurance team overseeing the brewing of many Leinie's brands.

After getting a taste of the brewing industry the past few months, Friedman, of Oconto Falls, would love the chance to work full time for a company like Leinie's.

"It would be really cool to work for a craft beer company. The process is unique. I love using my hands and knowledge," Friedman said, aware that opportunities in the industry have multiplied in recent

years with the growth of craft beer sales and small breweries.

"I like representing Leinie's. It has a rich history and is a prestigious company. I enjoy seeing the product being bottled. It's very satisfying, knowing it's being shipped out all over the country," he said.

Along with brewmaster John Hensley, Friedman has a mentor in Preston Beyer, who graduated in May from UW-Stout in food science. Beyer, of Plymouth, had the same internship as Friedman and was hired full time at Leinie's.

Friedman said part of the job satisfaction, even as an intern, is his role in the production process. In

the quality assurance area, he has a variety of daily duties.

A dozen times a day, when brew tanks are changed, he tests finished beer for color, calories and specific gravity, the latter to help track the percentage of alcohol content.

He tests beer on the bottling line for the correct torque on the caps, checks fill line levels and pulls samples for bacteria growth and wild yeast growth tests.

Tests for sulfur dioxide are conducted on beer that is aging. Levels of the chemical compound, which forms during the fermentation process, have government restrictions.

He also routinely tests the spring water used in the beer to make sure it's meeting Leinie's standards.

Friedman's work has taken him into the labs, brewing and bottling areas, beer aging cellars and more at the historic brewery, which started in 1867.

"I'm seeing a little bit of everything," he said.

Valuable experience

The internship is being coordinated through the Cooperative Education Program in UW-Stout's Career Services. In co-op positions, students receive a competitive wage and earn academic credit while reporting to

their academic adviser.

The food science and technology program requires an internship. "An internship is pivotal for students to gain industrial experience and exposure to the food industry sector," said Cynthia Rohrer, food science program director.

"This co-op has enabled Mike to get involvement at a company related to his field of study along with a better understanding and practical application of his course work and how it relates to real-world food industry settings, as well as a clearer picture of his career goals," she said.

Friedman began working at Leinie's on May 20 and finished Aug. 16.

"Mike is a very dedicated student and is eagerly engaged in many aspects of food science, which led him to his valuable co-op experience at Leinie's," Rohrer said.

The food science program at UW-Stout prepares graduates for jobs such as food technologists, food scientists, technical consultants and product development managers, as well as research and development directors for food manufacturers, research labs and government agencies.

Friedman says he's especially

enjoyed the lab-based classes, which have covered sensory, analytical and chemical aspects of food science.

He became interested in the food science field while in high school. He competed in track, cross-country and wrestling, and during that time began paying close attention to nutrition to improve his fitness level.

"I had to eat well," he said.

He was a three-time state cross-country meet qualifier at Oconto Falls. At UW-Stout, he placed ninth in the conference meet in 2018 and received national all-academic honors.

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County road projects near completion

Most work in northern Oconto Co. should end soon

OCONTO — The state Department of Transportation says three of four major construction projects in Oconto County are on track to be completed in September as originally projected.

The fourth, replacement of the Pensaukee River bridge in Krakow, is scheduled for completion in November.

Approaching the end are the resurfacing of 4½ miles of state Highway 32 from County Road AA to Parkway Drive in the town of Mountain; a 9½ mile stretch of Highway 32 from County Road W in the town of Mountain to Big Hill Road in the town of Lakewood; and a 151-acre wetland mitigation project on Peshti-go Brook along state Highway 64 in

the towns of Brazeau and Bagley.

The \$919,000 bridge project started in mid-August and will replace the existing structure on Highway 32 over the Pensaukee River with a new

bridge and retaining wall.

The project will also replace a wing wall on a box culvert and conduct concrete surface repair on another box culvert. Other construc-

tion elements under this contract includes excavating, grading, asphalt paving, beam guard, and signage.

This week the contractor is scheduled to continue to form up and

pour the bottom portion of the north abutment, place riprap, and set the concrete girders.

Highway 32 is closed at the bridge, and traffic is detoured.

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Gillett council accepts grant for pay loader, seeks bid for generator

Mayor is uncomfortable with only 1 quote

GILLETT — The Gillett City Council moved forward with one major purchase and delayed action on another after a pointed discussion Thursday night.

Aldermen accepted a \$50,000 matching grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture for a new pay

loader, as recommended by the Public Works and Utility committees.

Mayor James Beaton said the city will be looking for a used machine within the limits of the match, which allows for a purchase of up to \$100,000.

"The balance of the \$100,000 will not be borrowed, that will be expended from city funds, once we locate a machine," Beaton said.

There was considerable more discussion about a request to spend about \$100,000 to purchase a backup generator for the city's Well No. 2.

Utility Director Ron Anderson said the issue came up during a recent extended power outage. The

well's backup and booster date to the 1960s and are "not enough to keep the city satisfied."

Anderson said the city could pay for the purchase by delaying replacement of a department pickup truck and other maneuvers.

"I think this is a good time to do this because if something ever happened to that well station over there, we have really no means to keep up to anything," he said.

The city asked three companies for estimates, but only one came back, Anderson said.

Beaton chastised the utility committee for voting to make a recommendation based on a solitary quote.

"This is a big amount of money, end of the year; only one quote makes me a little nervous," Beaton said.

Committee members said they trusted that Anderson was acting in the best interest of the city and made the recommendation because the city needed to act.

"It is a critical matter, but it's a non-emergency," Beaton said.

Anderson said he could probably find at least one other company willing and able to provide a quote for the council to consider at its next meeting.

Arnold W. Anderson Sr., 100, Oconto Falls, passed away peacefully on Sept. 3, 2019, with family present. He was born Nov. 11, 1918, to Anton and Astrid (Nelson) Anderson and lived a mile from the home he grew up in most of his life. Arnold worked with his father and brothers at Anton Anderson Lumber Company logging, sawing and planing lumber.

Arnold married Viola VandenBush on April 11, 1942. The couple lived in California where Arnie worked for Consolidated Aircraft on B24 bombers. While there he developed a patent for the driving mechanism for the plane.

After returning home, he worked in the family lumber business until he formed Anderson & Schuettpelez with Russell Schuettpelez. Many homes were built by their hands. They also built and owned several post offices in the area, which they rented to the government until they were sold in 1997.

After Russell's retirement, Anderson Supply Company was started so that Arnie could continue providing building supplies to friends and family into his 90s.

He served from 1957 to 1997 with the REA (Rural Electric Association), also known as the Oconto Electric Co-op where he held the positions of secretary, vice president, chairman and national delegate. It has been a cooler than normal a few weeks here in our area, bringing a taste of fall and things to come as summer begins to fade. Already, the signs of the coming fall are becoming more and more numerous in our forest, meadows and gardens.

I took a hike through the Navarino Wildlife Area recently and was surprised to find large sections of forest dominated by already red-denning maples. The colors of fall are definitely beginning to show and this is the perfect place to watch them unfold as autumn arrives.

The wildflowers of late summer

have also resulted in a spectacular display of colorful, wonderfully textured wild mushrooms in our forests and even right in our own backyards. Take a closer look as you explore the fall woodlands and



and fall are also putting on a spectacular display. Classic fall blooms such as the many varieties of goldenrod, Joe pye weed, black-eyed Susan, wild sunflowers of many varieties, white turtleheads and gorgeous blue bottle gentians are all in bloom now.

Still to come are the incredible asters. New England aster, blooming in rich purple and yellow, is a favorite of many and usually begin to appear about the middle of September, lasting all of the way till Halloween. Smooth aster, in sky blue, along with Heath aster and frost aster in bright white are others that will shortly be filling our fields, gardens and roadsides with their amazing color and explosive bloom.

The arrival of September also means an incredible migration is underway. Monarch butterflies are on the move and continue to swell in number as they move south through the area. If you're lucky, you may have a monarch roost on your property. A roost is a special tree or section of trees where monarchs in an area gather each night at sunset to spend the evening resting among the sheltering branches. At sunrise, the gathering

breaks up and the monarchs move on.

Hummingbirds are also migrating heavily at this time and making stops along the way wherever colorful blooms in our yards, gardens and meadows invite them to fuel up for their journey south.

The sandhill cranes are gathering in ever increasing numbers each night as families of birds begin to join together in staging areas, such as Navarino, where they will remain throughout most of the fall season until the wetlands freeze up, forcing them to journey south.

As the weeks of September pass by, the colors will intensify as more and more forest trees begin to turn color. In October, the color will peak as the oaks, tamaracks and witch hazels really begin to shine.

Enjoy exploring our area forests and natural areas, as well as your own backyard to seek out the sign of autumn that are growing with each new day.

Falls surges past Clintonville in home opener

Panthers rally late in first set before earning sweep

OCONTO FALLS — A rally late in the first set propelled the Oconto Falls High School volleyball team to a North Eastern Conference sweep of Clintonville on Thursday.

Oconto Falls fell behind early in the first set and eventually looked to be on their way to dropping the first set as the hosts trailed 23-19. The Panthers won seven of the next eight points, including the final five to claim the first set 26-24.

"In the first set, it was one of those things where we always seemed to be behind by two or three, just trying to catch up. We were making mistakes and giving them some free points," said Oconto Falls coach Rochell Otto. "There was a

call that could have went either way and it went in our favor. We really got lucky to come away with a win in that first set and it turned out to be a huge momentum swing..."

Oconto Falls won the second set 25-13 before taking the final set 25-17 to finish off the sweep.

The first set saw Clintonville grab the first three points before Oconto Falls responded with three points of its own to tie it up. But the visiting Truckers regained the lead and didn't relinquish it until late in the set.

Trailing 24-21, it was senior Natalie Brauer and sophomore Emmie Magnin that led the Panthers' comeback.

Brauer started the 5-0 run with a tip kill, before Magnin served a pair of aces to tie it at 24. A Clintonville attack error gave Oconto Falls its first lead before sophomore Hailey Peitersen finished off the set with a tip kill.

"This was our first (home) match, so I feel like everybody was a bit nervous," said Brauer. "But we worked

as a team and were able to pick each other up, so that really helped. Then we just kept pushing."

The Panthers opened the second set by taking the first five points, with senior Samantha Coron serving for the final four points.

Oconto Falls was able to work its lead up to seven, 14-7, and force a timeout.

"We were on a roll and we had high energy," said Magnin on the team's second set after rallying in the first set. "We kept pushing and played really well together."

The Truckers took the first point out of the timeout, before the Panthers claimed the next six to go up 20-8. Coron was again serving as the hosts went on their run.

Clintonville was able to cut its deficit down to nine after a couple of Oconto Falls errors, but the Panthers closed the set strong by taking the final four points.

The final set was reminiscent of the first, as Clintonville worked out to a lead and looked to be in control.

But after trailing 10-6 and taking

a timeout to regroup, Oconto Falls roared back to life. The hosts went on a 12-2 run behind strong serving from Peitersen and juniors Amelia Rice and Abbi Remic.

After a Clintonville timeout, Oconto Falls finished off the set strong. Brauer tallied several kills down the stretch, including one for the final point of the night.

Brauer finished with 10 attack kills, while Magnin led the team with 11. Junior Jayden Arndt had eight kills.

Coron had 16 service points on the night, serving six aces along the way. She also totaled 26 assists. Sophomore Karlie Kowalczyk led the team with nine digs, while Rice had seven and Magnin six.

With the win, Oconto Falls improved to 8-2 on the young season.

The Panthers will look to keep things rolling in their next contest against Freedom on Thursday. That home game will also serve as parent's night for the Panthers.

Men's choir was enchanting experience

I have often publicly stated that I cannot read music. I don't know a C from a B or an E from an F. I don't know a sharp from a bass clef. The terminology is lost on me, sort of like a foreign language that I can't read or translate.

Having said that, I have also stated many times that I like to sing — as long as I'm not asked to do a solo. I like the anonymity of being a chorus member so that if a mistake is made, I can always pretend that someone else did it.

That explains why about 20 years ago I allowed myself to get talked into singing in a new men's choir at our church. Our liturgist at the time, Ellie Costello, started a group she called the Men's Chant Schola.

There were about 10 guys, and I suppose we really should have

been called a "schola cantorum" (a school for chant) because a lot of our rehearsal is spent being taught the chants we are to sing. We sang in the choir loft high above the main floor so that our music filled the church without any amplification.

One of the reasons I decided to participate in the group was that I had some very clear memories of having learned some Gregorian chant music when I was a kid at St. Anthony School in Oconto Falls, back in the days when we still used Latin in the Mass. We had a nun, Sister Aidan, who was our principal and taught seventh and eighth grades, and she used to drill us on the notation of Gregorian chant.

I'm not sure why, and I'm pretty sure we never actually sang it, but we learned about it. Music class at St. Anthony in those days consisted mostly of singing songs from the Golden Song Book on Friday afternoons. (Maybe it was called the "Golden Book of Favorite Songs"?)

Gregorian chant is very closely tied to the image of Catholic liturgy.

If you watch any documentary

that mentions the church or the pope, what music do you hear playing in the background? If it isn't Schubert's "Ave Maria," then it's probably chant. In most of our parishes today, there are at least two generations who have grown up never having heard or sung any Latin chant.

There are many kinds of chant in the Catholic liturgy. Gregorian is the most common, and it's from the pure Roman tradition. Its origins are obscure, but we know that during the time of Pope St. Gregory in the late sixth century, it was collected, codified, and refined and it continued to be written for many centuries.

Don't worry. I'm not about to display my vast knowledge of Gregorian chant; I'd just like to have you think in a little different dimension for a few minutes.

My memory of the chant music we learned back in grades seven and eight is pretty sketchy; my memories are more about the process and the memorization we had to do. I can't remember much about the actual singing, just the chant notation itself.

In the Gregorian system of nota-

tion, the staff had four lines instead of five as in modern music. The notes, for the most part square in shape, are placed on the lines or in the spaces between the lines as in today's music, but the notes had funny names.

I can't remember them all, but there was a "punctum," a square note, which was the most common. There was a "rhombus," which was a diamond- or lozenge-shaped note (it was shaped like a rhombus). There was a "quilisma," which was a squiggly note. There was another note that had a tail, but I can't remember what it was called.

It's funny how things stay with us, isn't it? Stuff I learned more than half a century ago is still floating around up there in the gray matter, but I sometimes forget why I went to the kitchen.

Still, the memories from those days of grade school come back to me each time I went to Men's Schola practice. I like that. Unfortunately, the men's schola group was sort of short-lived.

Some tales about birds that will ruffle your tail feathers

The other day, someone told me about blue jays molting. I had no idea they molt in late summer. I watched for the jays to come to our feeder. I was surprised to see the once beautiful, proud and sassy jays looking so pathetic.

All of the feathers on their heads were gone. They looked so shabby and unkempt. I observed they didn't chase the other birds away like they normally do. I decided to do a little research. As old as I am, I never noticed bald-headed blue jays before.

What I learned is most birds have late summer molts. Some birds have a second molt in the spring, but blue jays only have one.

Did you know once a feather has grown to full size, it is no longer connected to the blood supply? Birds get a new set of feathers annually.

Both the blue jays and the cardinals have beautiful feathers on their heads.

When they lose them, the rest of their feathers are beginning to look dull and worn.

Cardinals and most songbirds lose their wing feathers one at a time from each wing. New feathers replace them before other wing feathers fall out. This molting process ensures the birds can continue to fly. Isn't Mother Nature wonderful?

The feathers on their bodies can be lost simultaneously, so you may see birds with bald spots. Tail feathers fall out slowly, a few at a time.

The molting lasts about six weeks. When the birds are molting, they need more food to grow new feathers and to compensate for the heat their bodies lose due to feather loss.

Often when the birds molt, they stop singing and fighting. They often sulk and hide. It's almost as if they know their appearance has changed. Perhaps it is just a lack of energy or weakness as their body goes through the changes.

Several of you have asked me to retell some of my bird experiences. I guess I can embarrass myself again and tell you about our talking myna bird.

His name was Sam. We purchased him from owners of a photography business.

The owners told us they had to get rid of him because he often insulted their customers. Sam could speak quite clearly. He could do an amazing wolf whistle, too.

Our kids thought Sam was hilarious. He could mock anyone's laugh, and he often did, having our neighborhood kids in stitches. His vocabulary was sometimes x-rated. He had quite a potty mouth. We tried to teach him manners to no avail.

When I worked for Citizens Bank, we had sales teams. I was a captain of one of the teams. Employees and members of the board of directors were all assigned a team. It was expected that the captain of the winning team would have members over for a few snacks and refreshments before being treated to a nice dinner at a supper club.

My team won. I was worried about Sam's foul mouth, so I decided to cover his cage before my guests arrived. It was my hope he would sleep.

When my company arrived, someone laughed. Sam heard and imitated the laugh. One of the board members,

Bill Ruechel, asked, "Where is that laughing coming from?"

Before I could stop him, he looked beneath the cover and there was Sam staring back at him.

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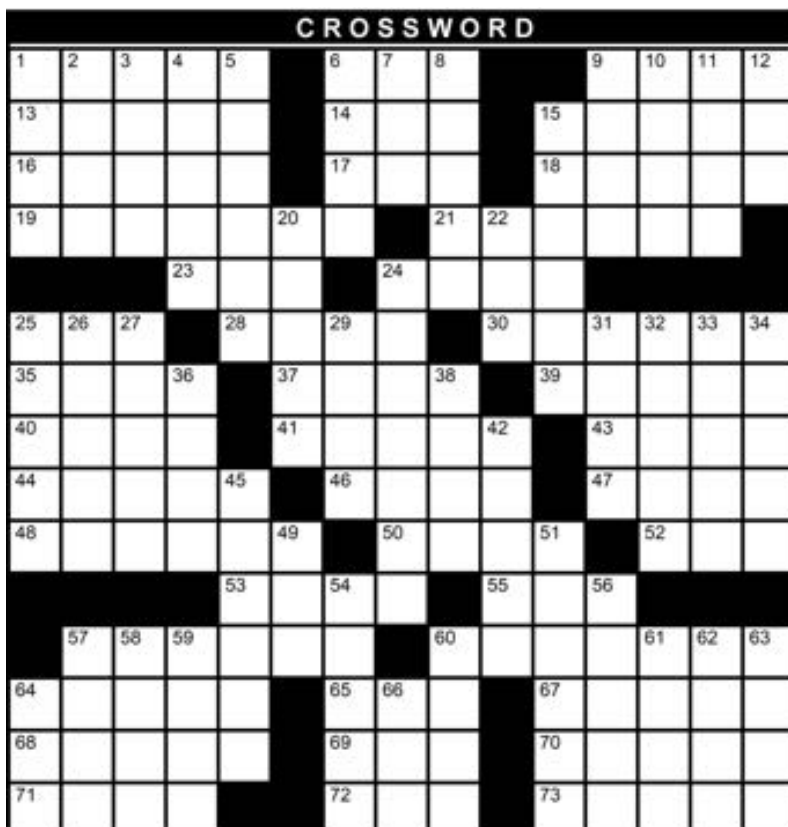

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Extension assists farmers at corn silage harvest

Extension of Marinette and Oconto, and Counties is again planning to assist area livestock producers as they plan and start corn silage harvest. There will be a number of events at which producers will be able to bring corn samples to have analyzed for whole plant moisture.

Corn silage harvest will be starting soon, but individual farms and fields will experience significant differences in moisture due to the extreme moisture conditions this year. Testing of corn fields for moisture is very important to planning both when to start chopping and what field order to progress through.
