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Oconto Falls to add strength and conditioning coach

Bellin Health agrees to provide coach at no cost to district

OCONTO FALLS — The Oconto Falls School Board has renewed its training services contract with Bellin Health for three years with the addition of regular visits from a strength and conditioning coach.

The board acted after Athletic Director Jerry Moynihan worked out an agreement that provides the services at no cost to the school district.

In his presentation to the board, Moynihan said health care providers started offering strength and conditioning coaches about three years ago in addition to athletic trainers. Bellin has done athletic training for Oconto Falls for about 25 years, he noted.

He did some research at that time, but it was just after the district had laid off about 11 employees, Moynihan said.

"I never brought it to you because I thought it would be very embarrassing if I asked for \$30,000 to \$40,000 to bring someone in to lift weights and train them while you just laid off the tech ed teacher and so on," he said.

The issue was raised about a year ago when a group of parents who have been working with a private strength coach came to him and recommended the district hire one.

He looked into it again and asked other schools in the North Eastern Conference about their athletic training and strength and conditioning programs. The first thing he discovered was that the districts that had strength and conditioning were also the most successful athletic programs.

He received bids from Bellin Health and Synergy of \$14,000 and \$47,000, respectively. He was reticent about approaching the board with the proposal until he learned that "Luxemburg-Casco and Wrightstown were getting that service for zero dollars" as an add-on to their athletic training contacts with Bellin.

"So we approached them and said, 'We want the same thing that our competitor is getting,' Moynihan said. "We have to play that team, we have to play Luxemburg-Casco, you know, 20 times this year in our events."

After some back and forth, Bellin agreed to supply the strength and conditioning coach for 16 hours a week in exchange for extending the current contract for three years, with a fourth-year option if Oconto Falls chooses. The strength coach will come for 24 hours a week during the summer.

What's in it for Bellin? A chance to get business from the athletes and their families.

"It's getting them through the door and being here and having that name and face," he said.

Hopefully the strength coach will work in partnership with the physical education teacher in the district's strength and conditioning class, Moynihan said.

"To me it was a pretty good deal for us to be more like our competitors, to be on the same playing field," he said.

Board member Sharon Stodola-Eslien asked why Prevea, which is affiliated with the local hospital, was not asked for a quote.

Moynihan and Superintendent Dean Hess said the last time Bellin Health renewed its athletic training contract, the district did ask Prevea for a bid, but they did not yet have such a service and were not competitive.

If Prevea remains interested, they have three years to start a program and be better prepared when bids are sought in three years, they said.

"That would be helpful for the hospital to know about that now so they have the time necessary to spool up for what the needs are for the next time to be competitive," Hess said. "Some of the things we're talking about it takes significant time and effort to meet those requests."

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Clubs sponsor snowmobile safety course

the course with a recommended minimum age of 11½. Those born after Jan. 1, 1985, and at least 12 years old must have snowmobile safety certification to operate on public areas. If a student is under the age of 16, the certification must be obtained in a classroom setting, there is no online class availability. Parents and adults are encouraged to enroll and participate.

Fees for the course are \$10 per student. Fee is waived if the student, parents or grandparents are members of Red Arrow or Paul Bunyan Riders. There is no actual snowmobile operation for the class, classroom only.

Nov. 9 dedication set for veterans monument

Close to 400 commemorative bricks may be laid

OCONTO FALLS — As a new veterans monument nears completion, plans have begun for a Nov. 9 dedication ceremony in time for Veterans Day.

Organizers chose that date so it would not conflict with previously scheduled Veterans Day events.

"It's just too much to do all in one day," said Bob Maloney, who has spearheaded the fundraising campaign for Oconto Falls American Legion Post 302. "The schools do such a great job with the (Veterans Day) programs at the high school and elementary school that we just didn't want to get in the middle of that."

Dedication is to take place at 11 a.m. Nov. 9, a Saturday morning.

Maloney told the Oconto Falls School Board on Sept. 9 that they are recruiting local veterans who graduated from Oconto Falls High School and had careers in the military to speak at the dedication ceremony.

The Oconto Falls School District agreed to let veterans groups erect the monument on a small parcel just south of the district office on North Farm Road. Construction began this summer.

"We're extremely happy with

where we're at with the monument," Maloney said. "I'm happy that I don't have to come here and twist arms anymore. Now I'm twisting arms in the community trying to get the funds. But I'm happy to announce we have all of the funds that we need; we've surpassed our budget, and now we'll work toward financing that maintenance fund."

Three hundred commemorative bricks have been completed and shipped to be placed in the monument, and another 50 to 100 are on order, he said, adding that the response has been gratifying.

"We were hoping once we started that the interest would pique and we would start getting phone calls," Maloney said. "And I'm here to tell you that (post Commander) Terry Umentum loves going to the post office every day now because there's a check or two or three or four. Our community members really stepped up when it came to supporting the veterans and this monument."

Oconto residents sent to federal prison for meth sales

GREEN BAY — Two Oconto residents have been sentenced to prison after pleading guilty to the charge of conspiracy to distribute 50 grams or more of methamphetamine.

U.S. Attorney Matthew D. Krueger announced Benjamin McNamara, 33, and Kristine Olson, 32, both of Oconto, were sentenced along with Gregory Ives, 41, of Mounds View, Minnesota.

Chief Judge William C. Griesbach imposed a 10-year prison term

followed by 10 years of supervised release for McNamara. Olson received a six-year prison sentence followed by six years of supervised release. Ives was given 10 years in federal prison followed by five years of supervised release.

According to the indictment and other court documents, between June and September 2018, Oconto County Sheriff narcotics investigators met with several confidential informants who advised that Olson was selling methamphetamine in Oconto County and surrounding areas. In September,

Investigators tracked Olson and McNamara as they traveled to Minnesota, where they had been purchasing multiple ounce quantities of methamphetamine from Ives.

On Sept. 27, 2018, law enforcement stopped Olson and McNamara in their vehicle upon returning from Minnesota. Court documents indicate a search of their car revealed a bag containing 212 grams of methamphetamine (later tested to be approximately 98% pure) and 11 separate baggies containing 44 grams of methamphetamine. Ives was later

arrested for selling the methamphetamine to Olson and McNamara.

McNamara and Olson were charged in Oconto County Circuit Court last October, but their cases were dismissed and transferred to the federal court in Green Bay.

This case was investigated by the Wisconsin Department of Justice-Division of Criminal Investigation, Oconto County Sheriff's Department, U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, and Wisconsin State Patrol. The case was prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney William Roach.

Next round of Wisconsin broadband grants now available

MADISON — The Public Service Commission of Wisconsin last week announced the first round of broadband grants appropriated in the 2019-2021 state biennial budget.

This initial \$24 million grant round is the largest in state history and greater than all seven previous grant rounds put together.

"Wisconsin lags behind the national average when it comes to getting our people access to broadband inter-

net," said Gov. Tony Evers. "This investment demonstrates our strong commitment to connecting the underserved areas of our state."

"Access to broadband is no longer a luxury, but a necessity," said PSC Chairwoman Rebecca Cameron Valcq. "With students' school work increasingly being done online, exciting advances in telemedicine, and telecommuting becoming more commonplace, these grants serve to connect people

and provide opportunity to all parts of our state."

The 2019-2021 biennial budget, which Evers signed in July, provides \$48 million over the biennium for broadband expansion grants. Additional grant rounds for the remaining funds will be announced next year.

Grants to Oconto County include a \$600,000 grant awarded to Bertram Communications LLC to install fixed wireless towers serving more

than 4,300 customers in the towns of Breed, Riverview, Brazeau, Lakewood, Townsend, Doty and Mountain, and a \$49,230 grant to help Nsight Teleservices pay for installing two miles of fiber optic cable through the Oconto Falls Business Park.

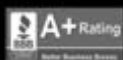

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School district closes on land near high school

Annual short-term loan is for cash flow purposes

OCONTO FALLS — The Oconto Falls School District has closed on the purchase of 105.94 acres across from the Oconto Falls High School along County Road I.

"That's been quite a process," Superintendent Dean Hess told the Oconto Falls School Board during its Sept. 9 meeting. "It's been a long time coming."

He expressed appreciation to the board for its efforts and the community for its support. No immediate plans are in the works for the property, but school officials have repeatedly said a decision will need to be made to bring the aging Washington Middle School building up to code or replace it within the next five years.

The board also approved \$4.7 mil-

lion in short-term borrowing through R.W. Baird, the lower of two bidders for the loan.

"This is an annual process that we go through," said Kim Sinclair, district accountant. "The funding that we get for the school year doesn't come in until later, so we need the cash now."

The academic year runs from September through June, but school district revenues come largely through property tax collections and state aids — both of which arrive about halfway through the year, necessitating short-term borrowing to maintain cash flow.

BMO Harris won the contract to handle the district's banking and investment needs for the next three years.

"I'm very satisfied with the relationship," said Sinclair. "They've come and visit me quarterly and make sure that all the needs we have are met."

Oconto Falls hires private garbage pickup firm

Great American Disposal will also provide weekly recycling pickup

OCONTO FALLS — Depending on a decision to be made next month, the city may save as much as \$10,000 on waste disposal next year and get twice as many curbside recycling pickups for its residents.

Great American Disposal has entered into an agreement with the city of Oconto Falls for weekly recycling pickup, effective Jan. 1, 2020.

The City Council voted to accept the contract with GAD rather

than continue the current system, where city employees take care of curbside recycling every other week and Oconto County administers the program.

City Administrator Vicki Roberts presented figures showing that GAD's proposal to provide weekly garbage pickup amounts to approximately \$67,110 in 2020 and adding single-stream recycling pickup increases the figure to \$77,749.

"Essentially we're just paying the difference between the 67 and the 77 — an extra 10,000 — to have the recycling picked up curbside," Roberts said.

The status quo has a comparable cost, but that includes two employees collecting recycling for about two full days twice a month, hours that could now be used for other city tasks.

"The bottom line is we save 10 grand a year by going with GAD,"

Alderman Kevin Rusch said.

Roberts said they solicited estimates from two other private companies, but "they were off the charts" compared with GAD.

Alderman Marty Coopman said the weekly pickup "would be an end to the confusion of 'when is recycling week' and it also will probably help probably up the recycling (quantity) by going to the single stream."

Rusch asked public works director Terry Magnin how the city workers' time could be diverted.

"It's going to come in handy for snow plowing and at the same time we're just going to delete the summer help, and we'll be doing our own grass, or when bathrooms or maintenance at the ball fields, do some more trees, whatever we got going on," Magnin said. "I think it's going to free up a lot of things. We're behind on some things yet."

GAD offered an alternate bid that includes providing 18-gallon recycling bins for all city customers for an additional \$260 a month, or \$3,120 in 2020. The council unanimously accepted the bid that does not include those bins, but Rusch asked that the matter be brought up again at the council's next regular meeting on Oct. 8, to give them more time to think about it.

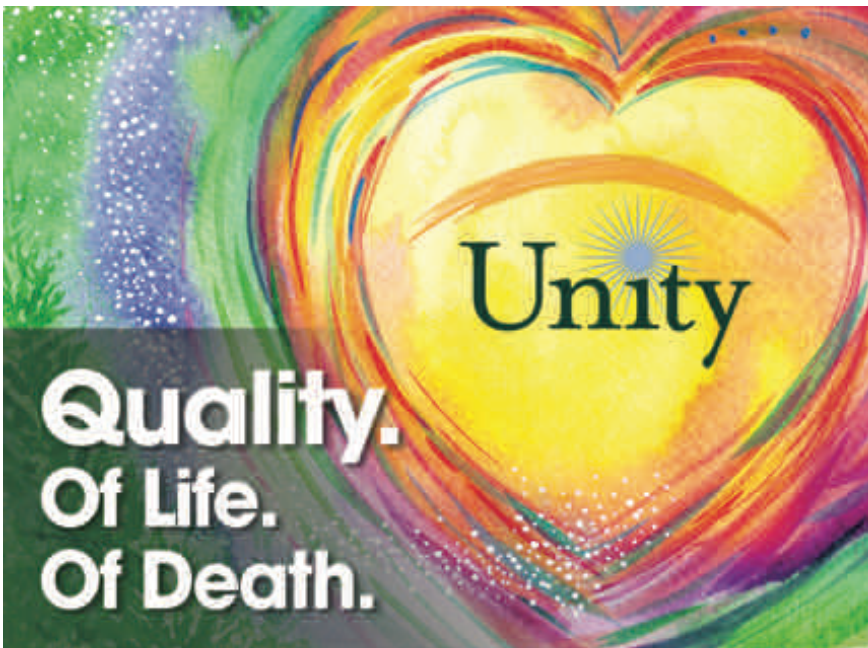
"This (contract) doesn't take effect until the first of the year, so we have time," he said.

The agreement is for five years, with the price locked in for 2020 and increases limited to not more than 4% in 2021, not more than 3.5% in 2022, and not more than 3% in 2023. There would be no increase in 2024 if the city agrees to a five-year contract extension at that time.

ALDERMAN KEVIN RUSCH, Oconto Falls City Council

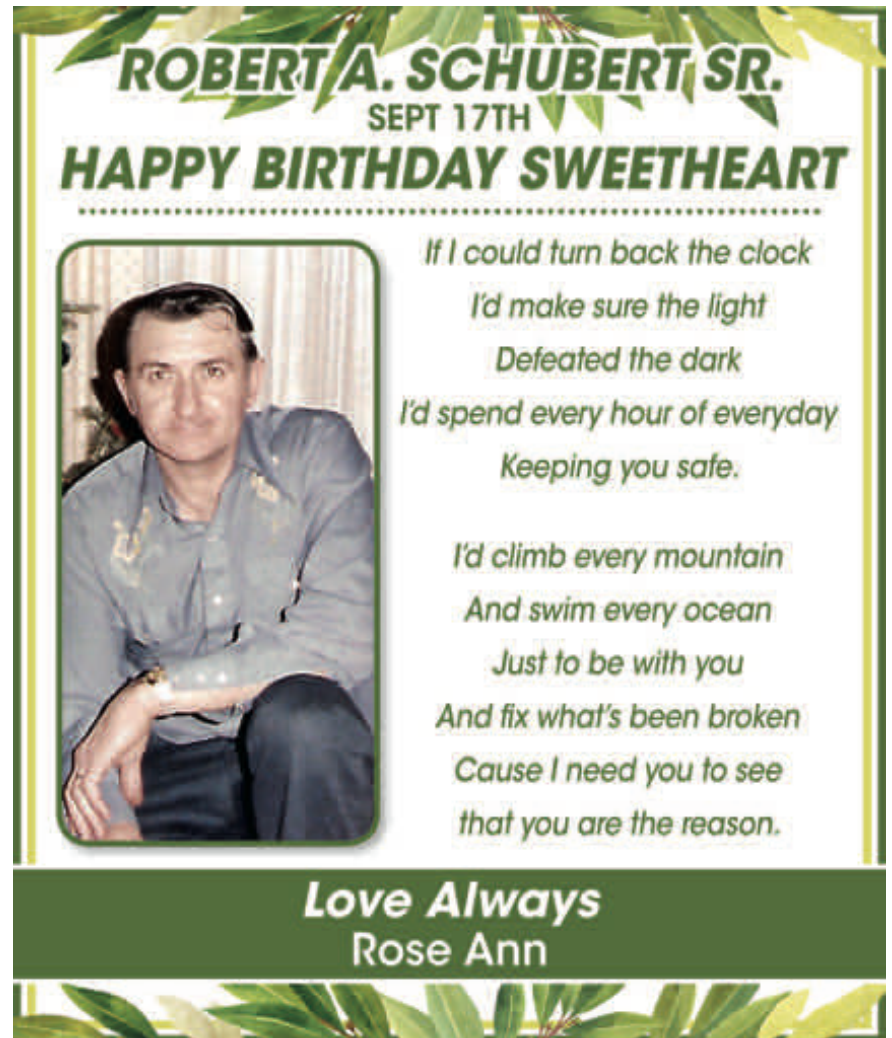


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Five-way police mutual aid agreement passed

Contract includes Oconto Falls, Gillett, Lena, Suring and Oconto departments

OCONTO FALLS — A mutual aid agreement among the Oconto Falls, Gillett, Lena, Suring and Oconto police departments has been formalized in writing with approval by the Oconto Falls City Council on Sept. 10.

Mayor Brad Rice said like the municipalities' fire departments, the agreement has been in practice for some time but is now part of a contract.

City Administrator Vicki Roberts described it as a "boilerplate" agreement.

"We have done it but now this is more of a formality that we have to have an agreement in place," Roberts told the council.

The document states that the five departments agree "that greater efficiencies, economy, service and protection may occur" by each municipality providing help to one another as needed.

The local chief of police, or their designee, is authorized to ask for or provide help as needed, such as an emergency call in which a law enforcement officer is down or in danger; an eminent or serious emergency in progress such as a serious crime, medical emergency or other situation of an eminent threat or serious threat to life or property; or a situation where one community has an officer available to provide backup who happens to be closer than an officer in the community that has jurisdiction.

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Search warrants lead to numerous drug arrests

Sheriff promises more details later

The Oconto County District Attorney's Office is processing a number of people who have been arrested for the manufacture, sale and use of methamphetamine in the county.

Sheriff Todd Skarban announced Friday that on Sept. 6 his office, in cooperation with local and state agencies, executed search warrants throughout Oconto County after months of investigation.

"This investigation is ongoing, with additional arrests expected," Skarban said in a news release. "Additional information will be released at a later time."

The number of arrests and their names were not immediately released.

The Oconto County Sheriff's Office is a member of the Northeast Tri-County Drug Enforcement Group (NETDEG) and was assisted by agencies of NETDEG during this investigation including the Forest County and Shawano County Sheriff's Offices and the Marinette Police Department, along with the Wisconsin Department of Justice Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) and the State Patrol.

"We appreciate the time and efforts put forth by these assisting agencies," Skarban said.

The sheriff said the department is committed to promoting a safe,

healthy, and drug-free community.

"We ask for your assistance in reporting any tips on the illegal sales, manufacture and distribution of narcotics within our communities," he said. "Help us pursue those that traffic these dangerous drugs."

Tips can be reported to 920-834-6900, Skarban said. He also said help is available for people who are struggling with addiction to seek help and begin recovery.

"If you or someone you know is struggling with addiction, please reach out for more information to start the process of recovery," he said.

Wisconsin joins Google antitrust investigation

MADISON — Attorney General Josh Kaul announced Monday that Wisconsin is joining 49 attorneys general in a multistate, bipartisan investigation of tech giant Google's business practices in accordance with state and federal antitrust laws. The bipartisan coalition, led by

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton, announced plans to investigate Google's overarching control of online advertising markets and search traffic that may have led to anticompetitive behavior that harms consumers. Legal experts from each state will work in cooperation with federal

authorities to assess competitive conditions for online services and ensure that Americans have access to free digital markets.

Past investigations of Google uncovered violations ranging from advertising illegal drugs in the United States to now three antitrust actions

brought by the European Commission. None of these previous investigations, however, fully address the source of Google's sustained market power and the ability to engage in serial and repeated business practices with the intention to protect and maintain that power.

'Ye Ye' recalls when granddaughter received her name

Our granddaughter Zoe just had her 17th birthday, and it reminded me of the time 17 years ago when we traveled to California for a 10-day

visit to meet her for the first time. So I went back into my files and found some notes about that visit.

Remember the Paul Simon hit of the late 1980s "You Can Call Me Al"? Well, you can me "Ye Ye."

That's a Mandarin Chinese family name for the paternal grandfather, and you can call Marilyn "Nai Nai."

Our daughter-in-law, Nerissa Li-Ting Wong (now Wong-VanHaren), is Chinese, but she was raised in Hawaii, and she and our son, Mark, had decided to try to preserve as much cultural heritage as they could for little Zoe.

While we were there, Mark and

Nerissa held a "red egg and ginger party," a sort of "naming ceremony" at which they introduced their daughter to their friends and whatever family could make it. It is traditional in Chinese families to present their newborns to the community on their one-month birthday, and to present their guests with a red-dyed egg decorated with the child's name and to serve candied ginger.

A crowd of about 40 people jammed Mark and Nerissa's little house in Menlo Park to join in the festivities and to partake of some authentic Chinese food prepared by Nerissa's mom, Rita, who was there from Honolulu.

In the "ceremony," Mark brought Zoe into the room dressed in a cute little pink satin gown with an antique lotus flower collar from China, red silk shoes, and a jade necklace. Of course, she was adorable. (Can a grown man get away with using "adorable"?) He sang her a song he'd composed for her, and then he and Nerissa began the speech-making, addressing all their remarks to Zoe.

In their remarks, they expressed their hopes for Zoe and their promises to her. Then "Po Po" Rita did the same, followed by me, then Marilyn, and then our oldest son TJ ("Da Bo" — "big elder paternal uncle"), who represented all the VanHaren siblings. Zoe's paternal grandpa, Bill Wong ("Gung Gung") could not be there, but he sent a poem he'd written in Chinese — and the English translation.

It was a very beautiful and moving ceremony, full of tradition and sentiment. People who know me well know that I am really sappy at family events, so, of course, I cried and got all choked up as I was giving my little speech. But the crowd was very understanding, so I think it was all right.

About Zoe's name: Zoe's full name is Zoe Hui-Lian Maiele Wong-VanHaren. That's a pretty long handle for a 5-pound baby girl, but every part of the name has some significance, and therein lies a story. "Zoe" is Greek for "life." "Hui-Lian" is Chinese for "Lotus Flower" (In honor

of that, the day's menu included lotus root salad and lotus seed-filled sweet buns!). "Maiele" is Hawaiian for "eloquent speaker." Wong-VanHaren, a combination of the two family surnames, is from the Chinese for "Yellow" and our family name which is a Dutch geographical name.

Our family is very cosmopolitan: a Chinese daughter-in-law and two "hoppa" (Hawaiian for a biracial child) grandchildren, Zoe and her brother Trevor Hui-Feng. That's Mark's family. Chris' family includes grandson Tyler and his three Korean siblings — Melanie Ja-Hyun, Carter Min-Kee, and Stephanie Ka-Eul. Mike's family includes Ella and Nolan. T.J.'s family includes Kim, his Japanese-Chinese wife, and their kids Cameron and Sloane.

When they all get together for family functions, which doesn't happen anywhere near as often as I'd like it to be, it's wonderful to see how they become a "family." We are blessed.

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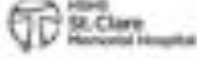

Sedums blossom beautifully

Succulents work well with perennial, annual plants

Some of the busiest plants in the garden now in mid-September are the beautiful sedums. Members of the succulent family, sedums bloom late in the season, providing plentiful pollen and nectar for fall butterflies and bees, as well as other pollinators such as hummingbirds.

Sedums peak in bloom right about the time that monarch butterflies and hummingbirds are migrating south, making them a popular choice for these creatures on the move. Late season pollen sources are also important

for honeybees, as well as native bees such as bumblebees, mason bees and others.

Blooming after Labor Day, often even past Halloween, depending upon the weather, these plants are an excellent choice

for the garden, and they work well with many other popular perennial and annual choices.

Pairing wonderfully with ornamental grasses, black eyed Susan, Russian sage, as well as late blooming annuals

als like zinnias, cosmos, marigolds, moss roses, dahlias and others, sedums are excellent companion plants in the garden, providing an exceptional fall showcase.

As many of our ornamental grasses begin to change to vibrant colors during the fall season, The beautiful coloration, as well as the striking plumes and feathery seed heads combine to create an attractive combination with the large, flowering clusters of sedum in pink, rose and red.

There are many varieties of sedums to choose from. Some are spreading and creeping, growing no more than a few inches off the ground. Others are upright and may grow two feet in height. There are sedums with colorful foliage, as well. Foliage may be found in shades of green, blue, turquoise, maroon, near-black, as well as variegated in green and white or pink and white.

Gardeners often discover that certain sedums “flop” over creating a bare spot in the middle of the

plant. This is a common issue with sedums in the garden. However, it is usually caused by incorrect

placement in the garden.

Since these are succulents, they need to be planted in dry, sandy or

gravelly soil. Gardeners who plant them in soil that is too rich or loaded with compost will often find that the plant will wilt or flop over. Sedums do not do well in rich soil. They actually thrive in poorer soils than most garden plants, Breaking many traditional gardening rules. Too much water will also cause this condition. Sedums thrive on low amounts of moisture.

Each year, plant breeders introduce new varieties of sedum for gardeners to choose from. The latest trends in sedum hybridization include taller plants that resist toppling, as well as richly colored foliage in red, maroon and black. "For some, including myself, this was our first 18-hole invitational, so we can use what we did today as a starting

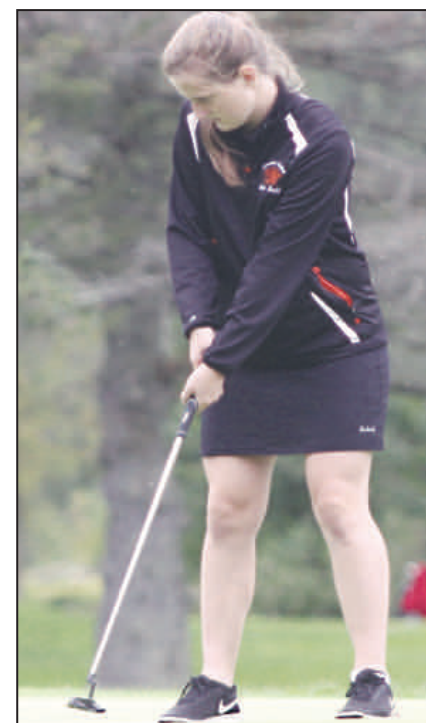


Oconto Falls' Danielle Darby follows through on a putt during the Oconto Falls Invite on Sept. 9 at River Island Golf Course.

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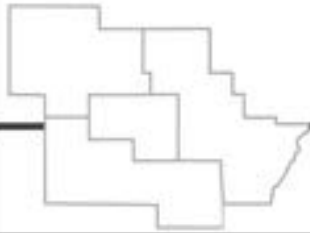

Mom remembered through incredibly delicious recipes

September is one of my favorite months. The cool crisp air is refreshing. I love the smell of hot apple cider and pumpkin pie. Fall is in the air. Soon the leaves will begin to change color. The football season is here. Kids are back in school. The most significant reason I love September is it's the month my mom was born.

The name September comes from the Latin "septen" for seven, since this was the seventh month of the Roman calendar.

September has several birth flowers — the forget-me-not, the morning glory and the aster. Although Mom didn't have a green thumb, she loved flowers. She especially liked morning glories.

The birthstone for the month is sapphire, and is supposed to give the wearer luck. My daughter has the birthstone ring her grandmother wore daily. I have a pair of her sapphire earrings.

Mom loved to cook and bake. She had numerous cookbooks. I shared them with family members, but I kept her small colorful pink, green and yellow recipe box. After she passed away, it took me a long time before I could open the box, years actually.

When I finally paged through the recipes Mother made our family for so many years, the memories overwhelmed me. My tears flowed as I held the handwritten recipe cards, remembering her standing in the kitchen wearing her apron and holding her favorite wooden spoon.

The first recipe I came across was her recipe for a dressing to put on cherry tomatoes. Seeing it is tomato season, I thought you might like it:

1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon garlic salt
1 teaspoon curry powder

2 teaspoon vinegar
½ cup sour cream
½ cup mayonnaise

Even as a young girl, I always considered my mother's birthday a very special day. In fact, I never missed spending a single birthday with her.

There wasn't always money to buy her something special. One year, when I was a young wife and mother, we had absolutely no extra money for even an inexpensive gift, so I decided to make her a card. Mix and press into the bottom and sides of a 9X13 pan

Fill crust with apple slices.
Place 1 cup sugar over apples.
Bake at 350 for 45 minutes.
Cool for 1 hour.

Make 2 small boxes or 1 large box of instant vanilla pudding according to directions on box.

Pour the pudding mix over the apples. Very good with Cool Whip and nuts on top.

Hunting Safety

The days are shortening and leaves are starting to change. For many of us that means we will soon be taking to the woods and fields for fall hunting. Now is the perfect time to remind ourselves about measures we can take to keep the hunt fun and safe.

SAFE HUNTING TIPS

Secure yourself to your tree stand: Injuries that result from falling from a tree stand are the leading cause of hunting injuries. Studies have shown that more than 80 percent of tree stand injuries involved individuals who were not wearing a fall arrest system (harness). Tree stand manufacturers are required to include a fall arrest system (FAS) with new tree stands – the key is taking it out of the package and learning how to use it ahead of time.

Prevent tick bites: As long as temperatures are above freezing, ticks have the potential to be active. Ticks are most active in spring and fall. According to the CDC, treating clothing with permethrin or using repellents with DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus or patch-

mentane-diol can help prevent tick bites.

Safely handle guns: Safe gun use is everyone's responsibility. Remember **TAB-K** when you head into the woods.

- Treat every firearm as if it is loaded
- Always point the muzzle in a safe direction
- Be certain of your target and what is beyond it
- Keep your finger outside the trigger guard until ready to shoot

Avoid drinking alcohol: Alcohol and hunting never mix. It's best to avoid drinking alcohol when handling guns or other firearms.

Check on your physical and heart health: Dragging your trophy buck out of the woods, or long hikes into the woods through rough terrain, can put a lot of stress on your heart and take a toll on your body. Make sure you are in good physical condition and ready to hunt! Start physically preparing for hunting early and if you get any symptoms like chest pain, chest pressure or lightness or arm or jaw pain with activity, contact your doctor immediately.
