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Deputies justified in fatal shooting, report concludes

Bubb had 'commented that he's not going back to jail'

An investigation by the state Department of Justice Division of Criminal Investigation concludes that two Oconto County Sheriff's deputies were defending themselves when they shot and killed a gun-wielding suspect on May 17.

Jacob W. Bubb, 26, of rural Suring, died at the scene in the basement of the home where he sometimes stayed along County Road Z in the town of Bagley northeast of Suring. Oconto County District Attorney Edward Burke announced last week that after reviewing the DCI report, the deputies were justified in using deadly force.

DCI investigators submitted the report to Burke on June 17, and the Justice Department released 200 pages, in redacted form, on Sept. 2.

Bubb was awaiting trial on a felony charge of substantial battery and misdemeanor charges of criminal damage to property and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that

allegedly occurred April 10, 2019. In another pending case, he faced misdemeanor charges of carrying a concealed weapon, operating a firearm while intoxicated, and possession of drug paraphernalia after an incident that allegedly occurred Feb. 6, 2019.

A warrant was issued for his arrest after he failed to appear for a Feb. 13 court hearing. According to the DCI report, the sheriff's office had issued a caution report on Bubb's warrant advisory because he had "commented that he's not going back to jail," and it was also known Bubb was a methamphetamine user and known to carry a handgun.

According to the newly released documents:

Deputies gathered information that Bubb may be staying at the residence on County Road Z and converged on that location. The homeowner told deputies that he wasn't sure if Bubb was there but he had a place in the basement where he sometimes stayed.

The deputies, including Deputy Kevin Christensen and Sgt. Ben Schindel,

went down to the basement and found Bubb sitting on a couch holding a handgun to his own temple. Schindel yelled, "Put the weapon down, put the gun down," and he and another deputy deployed their tasers at Bubb.

Christensen told investigators that during the confrontation deputies yelled "drop the gun" several times and Bubb responded "I'll do it" each time. After being tased, Bubb looked at Christensen "with a very angry look," started to stand and lowered his arm from his head with the gun moving toward Christensen. At that point Schindel and Christensen opened fire, striking Bubb; Schindel said he fired two or three times, and Christensen said took eight to 10 shots.

Both officers said they feared for their own lives as well as the lives of the other deputies in the room.

Christensen has been an Oconto County deputy for more than three years, and Schindel for more than four years.

Convicted child sex offender faces new charges

SanRoman went to prison in 2004

An Oconto man convicted of child sex assault nearly 20 years ago faces 21 new felony charges.

Bond was set at \$250,000 cash Thursday for David J SanRoman, 44, Oconto, after he was charged with four counts of first-degree sexual assault of a child under age 12, four counts of causing a child younger than 13 to view or listen to a sex act, four counts of exposing himself to a child, two counts of repeated sexual assault of a child, three counts of bail jumping, and one count each of child enticement for sexual contact, witness intimidation, and second-degree sexual assault of a child, having to do with incidents involving pre-teen girls

that date back as far as 2016.

SanRoman was already awaiting trial on a bail-jumping charge from a Jan. 17 incident, in which he was arrested after a domestic dispute with a woman with whom he was prohibited to have contact.

He had been charged with strangulation-suffocation, battery and disorderly conduct for a domestic abuse incident that occurred in April 2019, but a jury found him not guilty except for the misdemeanor disorderly conduct count. In March of this year, Judge Michael T. Judge placed SanRoman on one year of probation and ordered him to have no contact with the woman until the January case is resolved.

Judge authorized a warrant for SanRoman's arrest Aug. 24 after he failed to appear for a final pre-trial conference. In addition to the 20 charges related to alleged abuse of young girls, SanRoman faces a count of felony bail jumping for his non-appearance.

During Thursday's court appearance, Judge reaffirmed his order that SanRoman have no contact with the woman and also ruled that if he were to make bail, he can have no contact with anyone younger than age 18 and must maintain absolute sobriety, with no possession or consumption of alcohol or any controlled substance without a valid prescription.

Online court records indicate that in 2004 SanRoman pleaded no contest to second-degree sexual assault of a child and was sentenced to four years in prison followed by six years of extended supervision. He was sent back to prison in 2009 and 2012 after violating the conditions of his extended supervision, the online records show.

Judge adjourned SanRoman's initial appearance on the new charges until Sept. 17. In the meantime he remains incarcerated in lieu of bond in the Oconto County Jail.

Oconto Falls reinstates middle school sports

Administration had recommended suspending the season due to COVID-19

Student athletes from Washington Middle School in Oconto Falls will compete in sports this fall after all, after the school board reconsidered its decision to suspend fall sports until further notice.

During a special meeting Sept. 2, the board reversed its decision and OK'd fall sports and extracurricular groups to meet on a 6-1 vote.

The board had accepted the recommendation of its middle school staff on Aug. 17 but reconsidered after hearing from coaches and parents who said students could be safe with the proper safety protocols to contain COVID-19.

Four schools that compete with Oconto Falls on the middle school level — Hortonville/Greenville, Freedom, Little Chute and Seymour — are moving ahead with fall sports.

Three others — Clintonville, Shawano and New London — are planning to run fall sports in the spring. Girls volleyball will be played from mid-February through March, while cross-country and football are scheduled from early to mid-May through the beginning of June.

About a half-dozen speakers asked the board to allow the fall sports teams to play in the fall.

Rochelle Otto, head volleyball coach and a volleyball mom, noted that the district is moving ahead with fall high school sports and asked the board to give middle school students the same opportunity.

Under WIAA guidelines, which don't affect middle schools, if schools are unable to complete at least half of a fall schedule, they may try again in the

spring, Otto said.

"I'm asking you to give Washington Middle School students a chance to play this fall, and if it doesn't happen, we can move to the spring season," she said. High school volleyball players competed for seven weeks in a summer season with no cancellations, Otto said.

Carrie Hill of Oconto Falls Youth Football said the private organization is moving forward with 65 fourth-through sixth-graders and 15 coaches, and a GoFundMe page raised more than \$8,000 in 24 hours to support a seventh- and eighth-grade program if necessary.

"This program is supported, wanted, and needed," Hill said.

Jon Dunks, Washington Middle School instructional coach, said his

recommendation to suspend fall sports has not changed. The number of positive tests for COVID-19 has spiked in Oconto County since late July, including the county's first three deaths from the virus.

"The recommendation that's been given to you has not been made lightly," Dunks said. "We recognize the fact that this isn't what we want. We all would want for things to go to normal and for our kids to be out there participating in all athletics and being in school five days a week. We also recognize that the circumstances right now make that very difficult."

The Oconto Falls School District opened classes Sept. 1 with students in school four days a week and Wednesday used for virtual learning and cleaning of buildings.

Board members Clint Gardebrecht and Adam Adler, whose sons were active in sports during the summer, said the students and their parents should make the decision.

"Let's not kid ourselves, seventh- and eighth-grade boys are still going to be out there practicing," Gardebrecht said. "I would almost bet the school may do a more stringent job of holding the coaches and everyone accountable to strict measures, not that the Youth Football programs aren't."

Jan Stranz, the board vice president, cast the only no vote.

"I don't want to put your kids at risk any more than I already have," Stranz said. "I really struggle with that."

School board stands pat on middle school question

Oconto Falls won't consider future of Washington Middle School before 2022

The Oconto Falls School Board is sticking with its original schedule for a referendum on whether to replace or renovate aging Washington Middle School.

The district is entering the fourth year of a five-year operational referendum; voters gave the district permission to exceed state-imposed revenue limits through the 2021-22 school year, and the school board expects to ask voters to renew that commitment next spring.

Consulting firm Nexus Solutions has been conducting an audit of district buildings, especially Washington Middle School, with an eye toward an extensive upgrade of the existing building or construction of a new middle school.

The plan has been to bring a new operational referendum to district voters in April 2021 and to present a plan for the future of the middle school and other district buildings in 2022.

Mike David, director of business development for Nexus, suggested the board consider bringing both referendum questions forward next spring.

"It allows you to address the construction faster," David said. "Construction inflation over the last 50 years have averaged over 5% a year ... You also have some interest-rate concerns to consider," with borrowing rates at all-time lows.

Holding the two votes together would reduce the possibility of "referendum fatigue" that might be caused by presenting referendum questions two years in a row, David said.

He prefaced his remarks by saying the timing doesn't matter to Nexus; the consultant just wants the board to know its options.

Superintendent Dean Hess recommended that the board stick with the original plan, in part because so many other challenges are in progress right now, especially the response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"There are a lot of things going on that are outside our control," he said. "The operational referendum is the greater priority."

Hess also said he's concerned that the process would feel "rushed" with not enough time to fully inform taxpayers about the

reasons for the questions.

The board agreed with Hess' reasoning.

"I'm a little hesitant to lay a building referendum on the community when we're in uncertain times here,"

board President Ron Leja said. "Some people don't know where their jobs are going ... I agree that the operational plan needs to go first; if we don't have that, the capital plan may need to be reduced."

Board member Sharon Stodola-Eslien said it would be "insensitive" to move too fast in uncertain economic times.

Any day on the water/ice was a good day to him. He loved going to his daughters home to play with her puppies.

One wouldn't know it, but Nick was a great cook, and he had an amazing singing voice. Bear was an avid Packers and Brewers fan, but wrestling never left his blood. He was very happy to see his great-nephew John win third place in his state title bout just a couple of weeks ago.

On Nov. 2, 2002, Nick married the love of his life, Margaret (Peg) Winters from Phelps, where she owned Sand Lake Pub and Wintersland Storage. Upon marrying Nick, they lived in Crivitz on Left Foot Lake with his loving dogs Lacey and Gidget (and Moose, Liza Dootlitttle and Budman who have previously passed). There he was able to just walk across the lake to fish.

He took great enjoyment out of watching the deer and birds come into his yard where he could watch them closely from his man cave. In that man cave, Nick ran several side businesses in his spare time. He wasn't happy if he wasn't talking to someone on

the phone. His beautiful smile would brighten any room.

Fall means food, and there are many farms in our area which focus on producing food products and selling directly to consumers. Whether you want to find a perfect head of cauliflower, a peck of apples for school lunches, or fresh farm eggs for baking, our area's farms are ready to meet your

needs.

One easy location to find information on 31 farms in Marinette, Oconto, and Florence counties that have food products available for sale is to look them up in the "Guide to Home Grown Produce," a free publication published by the Marinette office of UW-Madison, Division of Extension. Produce-Growers-Guide-2020-May-update.pdf or just search for Marinette Extension, look under the agriculture tab and click on Local Produce Guide.

The farms listed in the guide truly do have food products from A to Z. Right now, A certainly stands for apples. B probably means beef right now to most people, and there are 10 farms listed that sell beef directly to consumers. C means carrots which, along with many other root vegetables, are finishing their growth and ready for harvest. On the other end, S stands for squash, and T equals tomatoes, while Z can still mean zucchini, which are still readily available.

Some of the other food products listed in the guide include pork, chicken, eggs, winter squash, pears,

The Gillett Secondary School cross-country teams have enjoyed tons of success over the past few years. Derek Hanson has been at the center of the accomplishments of the boys team, and is looking to cap his high school career with another big season this fall.

Hanson made it to state for the first time as a sophomore, doing so as an individual a couple weeks after claiming the top spot in the first-ever Marinette & Oconto Conference Meet.

Hanson placed second at the conference meet last fall, then placed third at sectionals to help the boys team qualify for state. He placed 48th at state.

Q: What kind of individual goals have you set for yourself this fall?

A: The goals I've set this fall are a bit different due to the current health pandemic. I would like to be in the top 10 at the state championships, but I'm not sure if the state meet is going to happen this year. If it does not, getting a shiny new

PR (personal record) and signing to play collegiate sports would certainly be a goal I would like to achieve.

Q: As a senior, how will you help serve as a leader for the rest of the team?

A: I'm planning to continue being someone for the younger runners to look up to, continue using my knowledge of running to help prevent some common mistakes new runners make, and showing them that they can achieve what they put their minds to.

Aerobic conditioning is 80% of your training, so making sure you do it correctly is very important. Besides the science, however, discipline and consistency in your training are the two most important concepts in my eyes.

Q: What's your favorite memory of competing on the Gillett cross-country team?

A: My favorite memory with the team would definitely be last year when both the boys and girls teams won sectionals to qualify for state. That was the first year we've ever

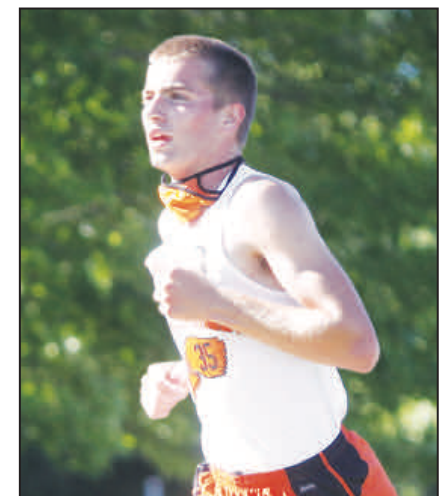
