School board approves four-day week in person

Wednesdays will be for virtual learning, teacher prep, deep cleaning of buildings

The Oconto Falls School Board has asked administrators to move forward with a four-day in-person class schedule for all students this academic year.

Board members also voted July 29 to require face masks for staff, students and visitors in school buildings and buses, with exceptions considered for medically certified conditions and certain other situations.

They postponed a decision until October on whether to suspend bus pickups for students who live one to two miles from their schools, after Superintendent Dean Hess said it will be hard to predict how many students actually use the buses until after the school year starts, with a number of parents planning to provide their own transportation.

"I'd feel more comfortable coming to the board (with a recommendation) in October," Hess said. "I'd rather avoid that hardship on families at this time."

Administrators had recommended that elementary school students meet face-to-face on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, with Wednesdays set aside for deep-cleaning buildings, virtual instruction and teacher training and preparation.

Middle and high school students would be split into two "cohorts," with half meeting in person Monday and Tuesday, the other half Thursday and Friday, and the rest of the week in virtual learning.

A survey of parents found four out of five believed their children should be in class as much as possible.

"I have a concern with our not honoring 80-some percent of our parents who want to go face-to-face as much as possible," board member Sharon Stodola-Eslien said.

Board member Ken Harter noted that a number of students don't have very good access to the internet, which would be a must for virtual education to succeed.

Hess acknowledged the "anxiety" that administrators have in balancing the best interests of students and staff in terms of both education and safety, and he said as a science teacher he's

troubled by recent data about positive tests in Oconto County.

"When people share with me that it took three months to get 50 cases, three weeks to get 100, and now we're at 149, that doesn't lead me to believe scientifically that those numbers are going to go down anytime soon," he said.

As of July 29, no one had died of COVID-19 in Oconto County, but just to the south 50 deaths had been recorded in Brown County, and the spike in confirmed cases was moving north, Hess said.

Stephanie Landreman, principal of Washington Middle School, said it's a challenge to balance the often contradictory priorities that kids should be in school full-time but only with a litany of safety precautions.

"I'm responsible to keep the kids safe, and that's really hard to do when I can't cohort them," Landreman said. "They should be in school, there's no doubt about that, but then there's so many guidelines to follow that it gets really hard."

The board unanimously voted to go with the four-day week at all school levels.

Despite some community resistance, the board and staff also agreed that a mask requirement is an essential part of the safety effort.

"I would not support an option that does not require masking where it can be done," board member Jan Stranz said. "Obviously there are students who need help with certain things like speech and hearing and maybe other medical conditions where a physician would say no, for this student it would be detrimental, but the same things happens when we vaccinate people — there are some people who for some reasons cannot be vaccinated, but that's why the rest of us do have vaccinations, we protect ourselves and we protect those others who can't participate in that same protection."

Board member Clint Gardebrecht noted that Japan, a country with twice as many people as Minnesota and Wisconsin combined, has reported half as many COVID-19 cases as the two states. The difference, he said, is that the Japanese government imposed a mask requirement early in the

pandemic.

The board also approved recommendations for restarting fall sports and slowly reopening the weight room at Oconto Falls High School.

The school is following the lead of the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA), which currently is postponing the start of cross-country, girls golf, tennis and swimming to Aug. 17 and football, volleyball and soccer to Sept. 7.

Athletic director Jerry Moynihan said additional precautions will be taken, including, for example, cross-country teams running in waves.

"The Oconto Falls team will run, and then five minutes later or 10 minutes later, the Luxemburg-Casco team runs, so the kids aren't by each other," he said. The 20-team invitationals of past seasons are also being canceled in favor of dual, triangular or quadrangular meets.

With collegiate conferences and other states dropping their fall sports schedules, Harter asked if the WIAA had simply postponed a decision to move fall sports to the spring or cancel them altogether.

"We're not going to play much football in March when there's snow on the ground," Moynihan said, while acknowledging that the WIAA's position could change.

Board members OK'd the revised schedule, as well as relaxation of the social distancing rules in the weight room to allow students to "spot" for one another. No more than 10 people are allowed in the weight room at one time, and Moynihan said they've been able to bring in as many as 40 students a day for weight training using the staggered schedule during July.

This was the last Oconto Falls School Board meeting planned using Zoom videoconferencing technology, which they have been using since March. The board's regular Aug. 17 meeting, and the district's annual meeting that night, have been scheduled for the Falls Area Performing Arts Center inside Oconto Falls High School.

The July 29 meeting video had about 480 views by the end of the 3½-hour meeting.

Parties to pick nominees for state Senate, Assembly

Polls open 7 a.m.
to 8 p.m. Tuesday

Voters in eastern Oconto County have a partisan primary on either side of the aisle in the Aug. 11 fall primary election.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Democrats will choose their nominee in the 30th state Senate District, and Republicans will choose in the 89th Assembly District. Absentee ballots must be received by the time the polls close, and in-person absentee balloting closes at 5 p.m. Friday.

In Oconto County the two districts include the city of Oconto and the towns of Abrams, Little River, Little Suamico, Pensaukee and Stiles.

State Sen. Dave Hansen, D-Green Bay, is retiring from the seat he has held for 20 years. Sandra Ewald of Green Bay and Jonathon Hansen of De Pere have filed for the post as Democrats.

Ewald was operations presi-

dent of the Greater Green Bay Market for Aurora Health, where she had worked for 20 years, and her position was recently terminated as part of the provider's ongoing integration with Advocate Health Care Network of Illinois.

She lists her special interests as community member well-being (both health and financial), environmental protection, education and business and community job growth.

Jonathon Hansen is a mortgage processor for Nicolet National Bank in Howard. He is a former legislative aide in Madison and is currently serving a second term on the De Pere City Council.

His top issues include economic development in Northeast Wiscon-

sin, restoring civility to the political process, nonpartisan redistricting and affordable health care.

The winner will be on the ballot in November against Republican Eric Wimberger of Green Bay.

In the 89th Assembly District, incumbent state Rep. John Nygren, R-Marinette, faces a rare challenge in his own party primary.

Nygren has been elected to the Assembly since 2006, currently seeking his eighth two-year term. He has risen to leadership positions in Madison and serves as co-chair of the budget-writing Joint Committee on Finance.

He lists his top issues as education and especially rural schools, providing help for those who suffer

from addiction while also cracking down on the flow of drugs into communities and tax reform.

Andi Rich of Marinette founded Hammer Construction Company and operated the firm out of Peshtigo from 2014 to 2018, when she decide to pursue an insurance career with more flexible hours so she could spend more time resisting the proposed Back 40 sulfide mine along the Menominee River.

She lists her top issues as environmental protection, ending corruption in government and spending tax dollars wisely.

The winner will be on the ballot in November against Democrat Karl Jaeger of Marinette.

Most of the rest of Oconto County is part of the 12th Senate District, currently vacant after the election of U.S. Rep. Tom Tiffany, R-Minocqua, and the 36th Assembly District, where incumbent Jeff Mursau, R-Crivitz, is unopposed for reelection.

State Rep. Mary Czaja-Felzkowski, R-Irma, will face Democrat Ed Vocke of Minocqua in the 12th District on Nov. 3.

Proceedings of July 31

Bond was set at \$5,000 cash for John E. Timm, 41, Oconto Falls, after he was charged with possession of child pornography, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred July 29. His initial appearance was adjourned until Aug. 13.

Bond was set at \$2,500 cash for Christopher Alan Barstow, 36, Marinette, after he was charged with possession of methamphetamine and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia and operating a motor vehicle while his license was revoked, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred July 29.

His initial appearance was adjourned until Aug. 13.

Proceedings of July 30

He is scheduled to stand trial Sept. 9-11, with a final pretrial conference Aug. 17.

Anthony R. Mork, 28, Suring, pleaded guilty to possession of methamphetamine in connection with an incident that occurred May 5. Judge Jay N. Conley scheduled sentencing for Sept. 29 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Mark J. Pagenkopf, 50, Abrams, pleaded not guilty to charges of being felon in possession of a firearm and misdemeanor battery and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Dec. 13. A pretrial conference was scheduled for

An Oct. 29 jury trial was scheduled for Kevin J. Dotson, 36, Wauwatosa, on a a felony charge of bail jumping, along with misdemeanor counts of resisting an officer, battery and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred April 4.

A final pretrial conference was scheduled for Oct. 19.

Proceedings of July 27

Bond was set at \$150,000 cash for Kyle Andrew Collins, 32, Shawano, and

at \$25,000 cash for Jessica M. Hensel, 30, Suring, who are each charged with possession with intent to deliver amphetamines and possession with intent to deliver heroin, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred July 23.

Their initial appearances were adjourned until Aug. 13.

A three-day jury trial starting Jan. 20 was scheduled in the case of Cade Wied, 19, Sobieski, on charges of second-degree reckless homicide, second-degree reckless injury and two counts of knowingly driving with a suspended license in connection with the Dec. 14, 2018, crash that killed 14-year-old September Deneys and injured Wied and another youth.

A final pretrial conference was scheduled for Jan. 4.

A Jan. 28 jury trial was scheduled for David R. Smith, 52, Oconto, who is charged with operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (fifth or sixth offense), along with misdemeanor operating while revoked, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 4, 2019.

A final pretrial conference was scheduled for Jan. 19.

Alexandria Tonya Beres, 19, Shawano, formerly of Lena, pleaded no contest to stalking and misdemeanor charges of reckless driving-endangering safety and operating a motor vehicle without a valid license on her person, in connection with incidents that occurred Sept. 10 and Oct. 21.

Judge Michael T. Judge fined Beres \$267.50 on the license violation; on the other charges, he scheduled sentencing for Sept. 18 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Proceedings of July 24

Notice of Partisan Primary and Sample Ballots August 11, 2020

OFFICE OF THE OCONTO COUNTY CLERK
TO THE VOTERS OF OCONTO COUNTY

Notice is hereby given of a partisan primary to be held in Oconto County on 11th day of August 2020, at which the nominees for the offices named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office under the appropriate party, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, if any, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the partisan primary, the voter shall select the party of his or her choice. Voting for candidates of more than one party may invalidate the ballot. The voter must cast a vote for individual candidates.

Where Paper Ballots are Used

- The voter shall choose the ballot of the party of his or her choice.

If the voter votes on more than one party ballot, no votes will be counted.

On the party ballot of his or her choice, the voter shall make an (X) or other mark in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

Where Optical Scan Voting is used

- If a party preference is designated, and votes are cast for ballot candidates of another party or write-in votes are cast in another party, only votes cast in the designated party will count.
- If a party preference is not designated, and votes are cast for candidates (or write-in votes are cast) in more than one party, no votes will be counted.

Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

When using an electronic ballot marking device ("Automark," "Express Vote," "Clear Access" or "ImageCast Evolution (ICE)" to mark an **optical scan** ballot, the voter shall touch the screen at the party of his or her choice. The voter shall then touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen at the party of his or her choice. The voter shall then touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

Spoiled Ballots

If a voter spoils a **paper** or optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a **touch screen** ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall then deposit the voted ballot in the ballot box, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit, and deposit the un-voted ballots in the discard box. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official touch screen ballot is marked, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Oconto County sheriff clarifies approach to mask mandate

Failure to wear a face covering is not enough to warrant deputies' response, Skarban says

Oconto County Sheriff Todd Skarban says his office supports individual actions to reduce the spread of COVID-19, but deputies will not be dispatched to respond to complaints if the only problem is that someone is not wearing a mask.

The sheriff issued a statement July 31 after Gov. Tony Evers declared that anyone age 5 or older must wear face coverings indoors or in enclosed spaces when non-family members are nearby.

As of Monday, Oconto County had recorded 183 positive tests for coronavirus and 5,618 negative tests, although the number of positives jumped by more than 120 since June 30. No deaths from COVID-19 have been reported in the county.

Skarban said his office supports such actions as social distancing, proper hand-washing and the use of hand sanitizers and protective personal equipment — includ-

ing masks — as well as business owners' efforts to protect their customers through safety barriers and disinfecting procedures.

"In order to provide some clarification, please be advised that at this time the Oconto County Sheriff's Office will not be physically responding to or investigating complaints made solely on individuals violating the governor's mask mandate," Skarban said. "As sheriff,

I must prioritize the use of our law enforcement resources. As a team, the Oconto County Sheriff's Office and Oconto County Public Health Department's goal is to achieve voluntary compliance while providing education, not punishment."

Deputies will continue to respond to reports or complaints from business owners who have asked an individual to leave for failing to comply with the face-covering mandate, he added.

"While these types of calls for service will be rare, enforcement may be necessary because they are situations where a disturbance is likely to occur," Skarban said. "Our focus would not be on the face-covering order itself, but rather the fact that the individual is not wanted in a particular place, or that the individual has been asked to leave and has not complied with the

request of the person in control of that premise."

Skarban asked people to do nothing about other people who are not wearing masks.

"Some people have medical conditions or circumstances that would make wearing a face covering difficult or dangerous," he said. "Wear your own mask, and stay six feet away if you are concerned."

The sheriff's department encourages residents to follow the recommendations of the county Public Health Department and Centers for Disease Control guidelines.

"We recognize that COVID-19 is an unprecedented health concern, and we are all in this fight together," Skarban said. "Be kind to one another and treat your community members the way you would like to be treated. As always, thank you for your continued support."

That, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 60.30(1e)(a), the office of the Town Clerk and Town Treasurer, shall be filled by appointment of a majority of the members-elect of the town board.

The term of office for the appointed position(s) shall be set by the town board, but may not exceed 3 years per § 60.30(1e)(c). The town board may re-appoint the officer(s) for additional terms.
