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Gillett parade, fireworks are on again

Truck show committee agrees to handle organization

GILLETT — Organizers of the Roy Hubbard Memorial Truck Show in Gillett have agreed to run the city's annual Independence Day parade and fireworks this year after the Gillett Civic Club dropped out, citing CO-VID-19 concerns.

The parade is scheduled at its usual time, 2 p.m. July 4, although the parade route will be altered somewhat because part of the traditional route is under reconstruction this summer, and judging of floats will not take place this year. The parade theme is "Saluting Our 2020 Seniors."

Fireworks will also take place at Zippel Park the evening of July 4. People interested in donating to the fireworks fund may send a check made out to Roy Hubbard Memorial Truck Show to RHMTS, P.O. Box 64, Gillett, WI 54124, or give the check to any member of the truck show

The second annual truck show was held at the park June 19-20 and featured more than 70 semi-trailer trucks, live music and local food vendors. Zippel Park was the scene of a fireworks display Friday night, and a truck parade down Main Street concluded the festivities Saturday night.

The Gillett City Council approved a list of two dozen health precautions submitted by the truck show committee, including refunds for truck owners who decided not to come and social-distancing guidelines for attendees.

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OCONTO COUNTY CIRCUIT COURT

Proceedings of June 19

Judge Michael T. Judge revoked a deferred judgment agreement and found Brittany Fagerstrom, 33, Seymour, guilty of possession of methamphetamine, in connection with an incident that occurred April 16, 2018. Judge ruled that Fagerstrom had violated the terms of the agreement. He scheduled sentencing for Aug. 17 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

After a preliminary hearing Breanna B. List-Kimball, 28, Oconto, was bound over on four counts of burglary, two counts of felony bail jumping, and two counts of misdemeanor bail jumping, in connection with incidents that allegedly occurred in late April and early May. Arraignment was scheduled for July 16.

In a separate case, List-Kimball pleaded no contest to misdemeanor charges of criminal trespass to a dwelling, theft and bail jumping, in connection with an incident that occurred June 3, 2019. The trespassing count was reduced from felony burglary. Judge Michael T. Judge placed List-Kimball on 18 months probation and ordered her to maintain absolute sobriety and complete any treatment deemed appropriate by the Department of Corrections. He also imposed \$1,463.50 in fines, fees and court costs and ordered her to have no contact with the victims in the case.

Proceedings of June 18

Brandon P. Conradt, 24, Suamico, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on charges of fleeing or eluding an officer in a vehicle, two misdemeanor counts of resisting an officer, and one misdemeanor count of striking a K-9 officer, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred April 28. Arraignment was scheduled for July 16.

Edward A. LaRock, 35, Peshtigo, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on charges of fleeing an officer in a vehicle, first-degree recklessly endangering safety, and misdemeanor counts of resisting/obstructing an officer, bail jumping and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 17. Arraignment was scheduled for July 2.

Proceedings of June 17

Zachary A. Dronso, 27, Shawano, pleaded no contest to a charge of injury by intoxicated use of a vehicle in connection with a July 5, 2019, crash at Valley View Road and Red Maple Lane in Townsend. Judge Michael T. Judge scheduled sentencing for Aug. 17 and ordered a presentence investigation.

Evan Robert Hunter Bubolz, 22, Gillett, pleaded no contest to a misdemeanor count of bail jumping in connection with an incident that occurred Sept. 17, 2018. Charges of felony burglary and misdemeanor criminal trespass to a building were dismissed but read into the record. Judge Jay N. Conley issued fines and fees totaling \$463 and sentenced Bubolz to nine months in jail, concurrent to a Shawano County jail sentence.

Ashley R. Hardy, 19, Pound, waived her right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on a charge of theft of movable property worth between \$10,000 and \$100,000, Feb. 3. Arraignment was scheduled for July 16.

After a preliminary hearing Ricky C. Blasing, 48, Oconto, was bound over on charges of first-degree recklessly endangering safety, witness intimidation, and misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 1. Arraignment was scheduled for July 15.

Proceedings of June 15

An Oct. 29 jury trial was scheduled for Randy L. Brempell, 49, Lena, who is charged with possession of drug paraphernalia to manufacture, compound, convert, produce or store methamphetamine and misdemeanor operating a motor vehicle while his license is revoked, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 28, 2019. A final pre-trial conference was set for Oct. 16.

Tanya M. Pasek, 30, Suring, was placed on probation through Dec. 20, 2021, on charges of bail jumping and misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that occurred June 12, 2019, and another count of bail jumping, in connection with an incident that occurred June 27, 2019. Two other counts were

dismissed but were read into the record. Judge Jay N. Conley imposed and stayed a six-month jail term concurrent with a Shawano County sentence.

An Oct. 20-21 jury trial was scheduled for Scott C. Leurquin, 36, Green Bay, who is charged with false imprisonment and misdemeanor counts of battery and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred last Aug. 4. A final pre-trial conference was scheduled for Oct. 12.

Bailey John Skrobel, 23, Green Bay, pleaded no contest to possession of a firearm by a felon in connection with an incident that occurred Dec. 5. Judge Michael T. Judge scheduled sentencing for Aug. 27 and ordered a presentence investigation.

Proceedings of June 11

A bench warrant was issued for Ryan L. Messinger, 35, Green Bay, after he failed to appear for his arraignment on charges of operating a motor vehicle without the owner's consent and felony bail jumping, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Nov. 13.

Cameron J. Gretzon, 20, pleaded not guilty to charges of strangulation-suffocation, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Feb. 26, 2019, and misdemeanor sex with a child age 15-19, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred last Feb. 24, 2019. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for Aug. 13.

A Sept. 9 jury trial was scheduled for Randy R. SanRoman, 40, Green Bay, who is charged with possession of THC (second and subsequent offense), and possession of drug paraphernalia, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Sept. 27. A final pre-trial conference was scheduled for Aug. 31.

Judge Michael T. Judge scheduled an Oct. 29-30 jury trial for Dylan D. Walk, 28, Abrams, on a felony charge of strangulation and suffocation, as well as misdemeanor animal mistreatment and two misdemeanor counts of disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Dec. 5. A final pre-trial conference was scheduled for Oct. 26.

Joseph R. Arndt, 39, Gillett, pleaded not guilty to charges of second-degree recklessly endangering safety, misdemeanor battery and disorderly conduct in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Oct. 20. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 16.

Brandon M. Pecor, 35, Green Bay, pleaded not guilty to charges of bail jumping and misdemeanor counts of hit and run and operating a motor vehicle while his license was revoked, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Nov. 26. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for Aug. 13.

Brittany L. Hansen, 29, Gillett, pleaded not guilty to charges of making false statements regarding her medical assistance eligibility, and failure to report income in applying for food stamps, in connection with incidents that allegedly occurred in 2016. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 16.

Alexander Rhode, 31, Suring, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on a charge of misstating facts in a food stamp application, knowingly traffic food stamps, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred in April 2019. Arraignment was scheduled for July 20.

Victor J. Alberts, 54, Lena, pleaded not guilty to two counts felony child abuse, in connection with incidents that allegedly occurred Dec. 1 and Jan. 17, as well as four counts of misdemeanor disorderly conduct. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 16.

Jason C. Demerath, 43, Oconto, pleaded not guilty to failure to provide sex offender information, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Oct. 15. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 16.

Proceedings of June 8

Judge Jay N. Conley sentenced Joshua B. Steadman, 28, Suring, to four years in prison followed by seven years of extended supervision for second-degree recklessly endangering safety and battery to a police officer, in connection with an incident that occurred Sept. 25. Eight other charges were dismissed but read into the record.

Suring man dies in one-vehicle rollover

A Suring area man was killed Sunday night in a one-vehicle crash northeast of the village.

Oconto County Sheriff Todd Skarban said deputies were called around 9:41 p.m. to the scene of a one-vehicle rollover along County Road Z just north of Golf Course

Road in the town of Maple Valley.

The 44-year-old victim, who was the lone occupant, died of injuries sustained in the crash, Skarban said.

The Oconto County Sheriff's Department and Brown County Medical Examiner's Office continue the investigation. The Gillett Area Ambulance Service and Suring Fire Department also assisted. The name of the victim will be released at a later date.

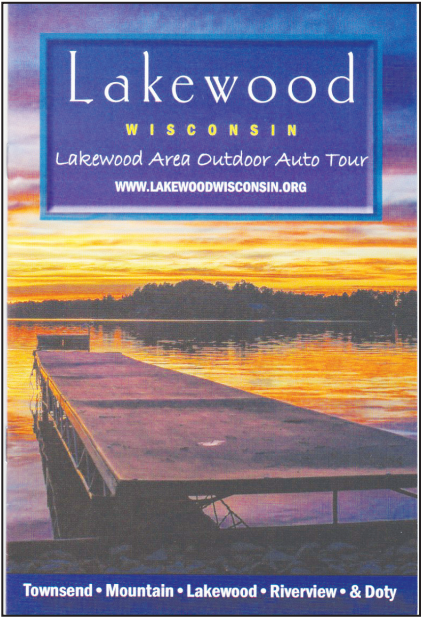
Tourists are flocking to the northwoods after being cooped up for nearly three months, an Oconto County Board supervisor said last week.

Wisconsin DOT offers tips to help senior drivers with roundabouts

They are one of the few places where you can be coming and going at the same time.

Roundabouts, a relatively new passageway on Wisconsin highways, pose challenges for some senior citizens, says the American Automobile Association.

A roundabout is a small traffic circle that allows vehicles to make turns without stop signs or lights. Roundabouts move traffic by allowing the car or truck in the circle to have the right of way.

Roundabouts are found at less than one percent of the intersections on the state highway system, according to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

As of 2016, 3% of state-controlled intersections have traffic signals. Of the state's 383 roundabouts, 220 are on the state highway system and 163 are on local highways.

Roundabouts may be considered as an alternative when building

new intersections or when doing a complete reconstruction to correct safety or reduce congestion, the DOT says.

They credit roundabouts with reducing the number of severe injury crashes and deaths; providing good economic value; reducing delay and improving traffic flow and providing a greener alternative with less vehicle idling, lower fuel emissions and less wasted fuel.

Even with these advantages, roundabouts can be the intersections most avoided by some drivers.

However, the DOT offers some driving tips to make it possible go through roundabouts without going around the bend:

- Slow down.
- Watch for and obey traffic signs.
- Move into the correct lane the direction you want to travel as you approach the roundabout.
- Yield to pedestrians and bicyclists as you enter and exit the roundabout.
- Yield to all lanes of traffic on

your left before entering.

- Keep your speed low and stay in your lane within the roundabout (do not change lanes within the roundabout).

- Exit carefully to your destination. Use your right-turn signal, in front of the splitter island just prior to your exit, to indicate your intention to exit.

- Watch for large vehicles.
- If there is no oncoming traffic, you do not have to stop.

Navigating with large vehicles

By Wisconsin law, drivers must yield right-of-way to trucks and other large vehicles (and combinations of vehicles, such as trucks towing boats or RVs towing cars) measuring at least 40 feet long or 10 feet wide.

That means, give space to larger vehicles when approaching and driving through roundabouts.

The law was passed in the interest of safety, as commercial trucks can weigh up to 80,000 pounds, and most larger vehicles have an

expanded turning radius.

Drivers are asked to remain mindful that all motorists approaching a roundabout must yield to any traffic already within a roundabout, as signed and per law.

If two large vehicles approach a roundabout at the same time, the vehicle on the right must yield right-of-way to the vehicle on the left.

Driving bicycles in a roundabout If you are riding on the shoulder or bike lane, merge into the traffic lane before the shoulder ends.

- Signal your intent to move into traffic.
- Once inside the roundabout, don't hug the curb.
- Ride close to the middle of the lane to prevent cars from passing and cutting you off.
- Watch for cars waiting to enter the roundabout, as they may not see you.
- If you do not want to ride your bike in the roundabout, use the sidewalk and proceed as a pedestrian.
