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Charges filed after accidental shooting

Baraboo man held in death of his sister

Bond was set at \$10,000 cash for Christopher G. Halase, 29, Baraboo, after he was formally charged Aug. 26 in connection with the shooting death of his sister.

Halase is charged in Oconto County Circuit Court with second-degree reckless homicide and homicide by negligent use of a dangerous weapon, both felonies, and a misdemeanor count of operating a firearm with a controlled substance.

Judge Michael T. Judge adjourned Halase's initial appearance until Sept. 17 and ruled that any firearms

be removed from his residence if he makes bail.

Ashley Halase, 31, of Reedburg, died Aug. 21 after her brother, Christopher, reportedly pointed a gun at her and it discharged as she sat talking on a bed in their mother's home near Mountain.

The criminal complaint said all witnesses confirmed there were no disagreements or arguments before the incident, which appears to be accidental.

Judge granted a motion to seal the "probable cause document" used to take Christopher Halase into custody because it contains the vic-

tim's name, which is listed only as "AH" in the criminal complaint.

District Attorney Edward D. Burke Jr. said authorities cannot release the woman's name because of Marsey's Law,

the state constitutional amendment that was passed in an April referendum to expand crime victims' rights.

The law refers to crime victims' right to privacy, which is being interpreted in this case to include a victim's name. NEW Media determined Ashley Halase's name via other sources.

Suring Labor Day Celebration is underway

The Friends of the Suring Area Public Library "Twice Sold Tales" book sale kicked off the 90th annual Labor Day Celebration in Suring, which continues through Monday.

The sale runs 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sept. 3-5 at the Village Municipal Building Learning Center, 604 Main St., Suring. On the last day of the sale, \$2 bag sales will be held all day Saturday. All proceeds from the book sale will be used for programs and purchases for the library.

A 4x4 truck pull sanctioned by NEW Motorsports is the highlight beginning at 7 p.m. Friday at Veterans Memorial Park, where most of the weekend's activities are centered. The Suring Area Historical Society plans a brat fry at Art & Jean's Corner Store from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Chicken booyah to go will be available at the American Legion Hall starting at 5 p.m. Friday and continuing through Monday, or while supplies last. The food stand at Memorial Park also opens at 5 p.m. Friday.

Saturday's highlights include tractor pulls all day, with weigh-ins starting at 7:30 a.m. and the competition

getting started at 10 a.m. The evening grandstand event is the Farm Tractor & NEW Hot Farm Classics Tractor Pull starting at 7 p.m. Craft and rummage sales along Ehlinger Street begin at 8 a.m., and the Suring Area Historical Society Museum will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

On Sunday, a demolition derby is scheduled at noon, and the annual Senior Citizen/Grand Marshall Award Ceremony is planned at 7

p.m. at the bandstand, honoring Phil and Elaine Fischer, of Suring. The day's festivities are capped by fireworks at 9 p.m., "rain or shine."

The annual Suring Lions Club parade is scheduled at 10 a.m., with lineup near the school for the trek down Main Street. One concession to COVID-19 concerns is that the club asks that candy be handed out by gloved volunteers rather than tossed from floats.

Oconto Falls High School students place high in FBLA virtual national conference

Proceedings of Aug. 28

Sklarr S. Bond was set at \$3,000 cash for Dyllon Drake Edwards, 25, Oconto, who is charged with bail jumping in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 23. His initial appearance was adjourned until Sept. 17.

A place for pollinators

Bees and butterflies thrive among the wildflowers at Camp10 Nature Garden

In a secluded area seven miles northeast of the village of Lena, a small patch of wildflowers marks the beginning of a haven for butterflies and bees.

Jeff Behnke is developing a two-acre botanical garden called Camp10 Nature Garden just off North Creek Lane.

"It's probably about one-fifth done," Behnke said. "In another couple of years, it's going to be pretty cool."

It's already pretty cool, as monarch, northern crescent and clouded sulphur butterflies, dragonflies and bumblebees flit among a field of wildflowers under the trees.

Behnke was establishing food plots for local wildlife to enjoy on land owned by his parents, Delmar and Ruth Behnke, but he didn't want to put one too close to the road. So he conceived of a natural area to "provide beauty and habitat for pollinators of all kinds with walkable paths for people to enjoy and learn from."

By the time the area is completed, Behnke said, it will probably feature a pond, a cluster of swamp milkweed and another plot where he wants to plant flowers specifically for swallow-tail butterflies.

But this spot is just the beginning of his vision. With the support of his wife, Candice, he established a nonprofit organization, Camp10 Nature Gardens, "to see if we can get other people to grow nature gardens." At least one other local farmer has expressed an interest in establishing a garden on his property.

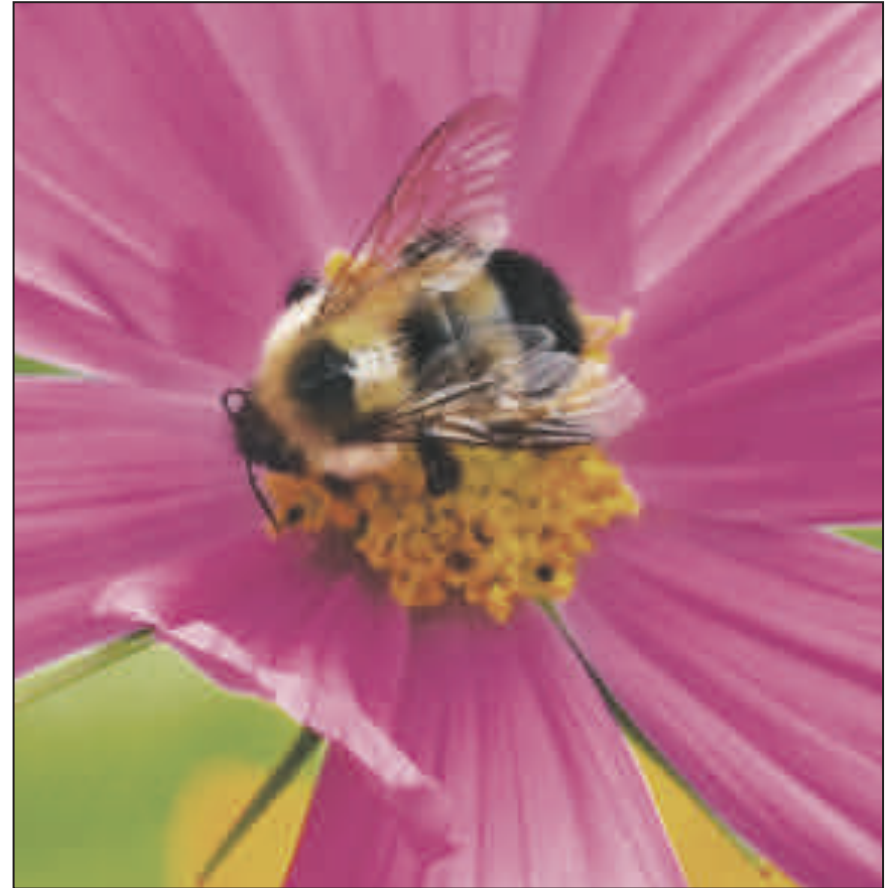
The core values of the fledgling group are:

- Replacing and adding to the habitat that is required for pollinators to thrive;
- Providing habitat to study for educational purposes;
- Keeping the community involved in nature.

As time goes on, Behnke hopes the group will be able to establish multiple two-acre gardens in the Lena area, create scholarships for students studying into nature-related fields and create educational resources and events held at the gardens.

The public is welcome to drop in and get an early taste of the concept. To find it, take County Road A east of Lena, turn north onto County Road J and after three curves take a left onto North Creek Lane. The driveway to Camp10 Nature Garden is on the right after about a quarter-mile; signage is still pending.

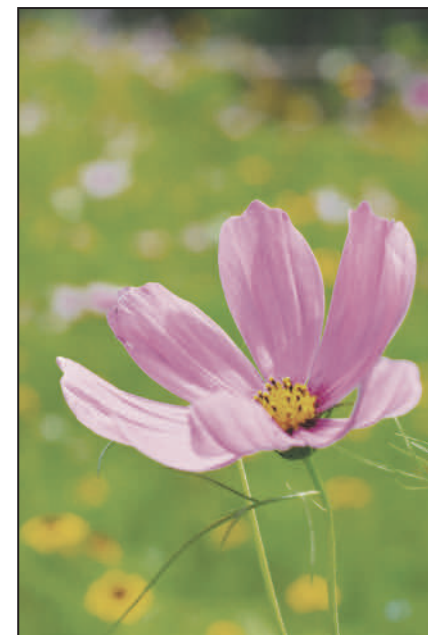

Be aware of signs loved one is contemplating suicide

Sept. 6-12 is National Suicide Prevention Week

Close to 800,000 people die due to suicide every year, which is one person every 40 seconds, according to the World Health Organization.

Navigating a pandemic and national unrest may contribute to this troubling statistic, as fear and anxiety may overcome us as we're trying to understand what's happening around us.

As National Suicide Prevention Week (Sept. 6-12) approaches, providers at St. Clare Memorial Hospital in Oconto Falls and its sister institutions remind everyone that if you or someone you know is having suicidal thoughts, you should call

the Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-8255, or dial 911.

Alyssa Van Duyse, an HSHS colleague and suicide prevention instructor certified by the national QPR Institute, says it's important to not only take note of your own feelings during this uncertain time, but also of those around you.

"The word 'suicide' is still thought of as taboo — especially in the Midwest because we're not so great at talking about our feelings," Van Duyse said. "That's why it's important to recognize the clues a person may be contemplating suicide."

Four ways someone may indicate they are contemplating suicide:

1. They give a direct verbal clue by saying something like, "I'm going to end it all," or "I wish I were dead."

2. They give a coded verbal clue by saying something like, "I'm tired of life. I just want out," or "I can't take it anymore."

3. They exhibit behavioral clues like increased risk-taking, self-injurious behavior or drug or alcohol use.

4. They shoulder situational clues like being fired from a job, being diagnosed with a serious illness or being bullied or humiliated.

During QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer) suicide prevention classes, Van Duyse instructs participants to practice asking the question, "Are you thinking about suicide?"

"If you practice it, it won't be so hard to ask if you ever have to ask someone in a real-life situation," she said. "Also, sometimes people who are considering suicide are relieved if you ask, because it indicates that someone noticed their struggle."

Prevea cites pandemic for increased use of online patient portals

Prevea Health says it has seen a significant increase in the use of its patient portal, MyPrevea, since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Patient portals, utilized by health care systems across the country, provide patients access to their health information online, 24/7. Patients can use these secure portals to message their doctors, request prescription refills, view lab results, schedule appointments and make payments.

"Patient portals put the ability to manage your health care right at your fingertips," said Amber Allen, executive director of primary care, quality and innovation at Prevea Health. "While convenient, they haven't necessarily been a flashpoint of consumer demand. This is changing, however,

as the COVID-19 pandemic is steering more patients toward the use of these portals and reminding us all how easy they make it to manage our personal health."

Comparing the average number of MyPrevea users between March and July 2019 to the average number between March and July 2020, the data shows a nearly 20% increase in the number of MyPrevea users.

Earlier in the pandemic and in an effort to curb the spread of COVID-19 throughout communities, health systems encouraged patients who did not feel safe leaving their homes, and/or with non-emergency health conditions, to use patient portals, virtual care and telehealth options for health care guidance.

"As the pandemic evolved and it was safe to welcome all of our patients back for in-person visits, many patients did in fact return," Allen said. "However, they continued to use the patient portal for other needs, such as messaging their doctor, as their use of it earlier in the pandemic allowed them to become more familiar with its capabilities. There are also some people who are still not comfortable with in-person visits during this time, so having access to the patient portal — as well as our virtual care and telehealth options — allows them to get the care they need while still in the comfort of home."

Studies also show the regular use of patient portals by those with complex conditions, such as diabetes, can

reduce hospital stays and trips to the emergency room.

Staying home and physically distancing is increasing internet and technology use, Allen said.

"The COVID-19 pandemic made us all become suddenly reliant on being able to work, learn and even shop from home with the use of technology," she said. "When you have access to a patient portal, such as MyPrevea, you can also manage your health care from home, and more people are now realizing how convenient that really is."
