Public Health copes with surge

COVID-19 has taken almost all of the division's time for nearly eight months

COVID-19 has supplanted all of the routine activities of the Oconto County Public Health Department, the county's public health director reported to the County Board on Sept. 24.

The county saw a big jump in the number of positive tests for the coronavirus in recent weeks, averaging more than 13 new cases every day, Public Health Division Manager Deb Konitzer told supervisors. And the spike escalated in the following days.

When Konitzer spoke to the board, the county had recorded 729 cases of COVID-19 since the pandemic was declared in early March. By Sunday the number had grown to 878, or another 149 in five days.

"My staff is getting completely worn out, and we're having a hard time finding limited-term employees to help us," Konitzer said. Earlier this year the board authorized up to five limited-term registered nurses to help with COVID-19 contact tracing, but attracting those professionals has been a challenge.

The workers call people who have tested positive and help find anyone they may have been in close contact with. "It usually takes at least an hour when we have a positive case, because they have lots of questions."

The pandemic has taken almost all of the Public Health Division's time for nearly eight months, she said.

"Everybody's tired. We don't get to do all the things that we're in Public Health to do, all the other things — our immunizations, our child passenger safety program, none of that's happening because we're all doing COVID work," Konitzer said. "We're in crisis mode."

The disease is not just affecting the elderly, she added. Middle-aged people in their 40s and 50s represent the highest amount of hospitalizations, and there has been a significant increase in positive tests among children since Aug. 30, although they do not seem to be catching the virus at

schools, where strict safety measures are being enforced.

Larger gatherings and a lack of attention to safety measures are contributing to the community spread, Konitzer said.

"Nobody wants to hear that. It's our community events, it's our birthday parties, it's our weddings, it's our funerals," she said. "People don't social distance, and the culture in Oconto County is not to wear masks, and that hurts us."

Social distancing and masks make a big difference in the spread, Konitzer said, encouraging members of the County Board to be "ambassadors and role models" for social distancing and the use of masks.

Woman's remains found after three years

Security camera images provided final necessary clue

Remains found by searchers Sunday afternoon are believed to be those of a Marinette County woman who disappeared more than three years ago.

Jeanette Fullerton, who was 83 when she apparently walked away from her home in the Town of Wagner, was the subject of a Silver Alert and numerous searches in the area after she disappeared Aug. 9, 2017.

The Wagner Fire Department and Marinette County Sheriff's Office organized a new search after a property owner on Schultz Road, about two miles away, found images

of Fullerton sitting on his porch that morning on the memory card of a security camera he hadn't checked in all that time.

Marinette County Sheriff Jerry Sauve said more than 110 volunteers

converged on the area Sunday. After about four hours, one of the search teams found items of clothing and subsequently bones nearby, Sauve said. The clothing and footwear

matched what Fullerton was last seen wearing before she disappeared.

"These findings are about two miles from her home and about one half-mile through woods and swamp from where recent trail camera photos were discovered of Jeanette the morning she went missing in 2017," Sauve said.

The remains are to be examined forensically to confirm they are those of the missing woman, he said.

The Fullerton family, fire department and sheriff's department thanked the volunteers, as well as businesses and individuals who donated and prepared food for the search teams.

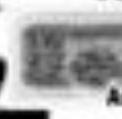

Emergency radio system to be upgraded

\$3.6 million project will take about a year and a half

A consulting firm has been hired to guide Oconto County through a \$3.6 million upgrade of its emergency radio system.

PSC Alliance will serve as project coordinator for the project, which aims to bring the communications system among police, fire and rescue services up to date.

The Oconto County Board in July approved a plan for the first upgrade of the system in 15 years, covering 11 radio towers — two more than currently exist — with goals of replacing outdated equipment, improving portable radio coverage and the ability of neighboring agencies to communicate with each other, and reducing traffic congestion on the radio dispatch channels.

When the last upgrade was

implemented around 2006, it was expected to last 10 years. This project is expected to take up to a year and a half and provide reliable service for 10-15 more years, Administrative Coordinator Kevin Hamann told the board.

The company, which drafted the plan, submitted a proposal to the Emergency Management Committee to serve as project coordinator for 10% of the \$3.6 million price tag,

Hamann said.

“The committee said, ‘No, that’s too much. You need to sharpen your pencils and come back with a better price. So they came back with 8%, and that’s \$288,000,” he said.

The funds are included in the \$3.6 million overall cost. The resolution approving the PSC Alliance passed 29-0.

Suring joint library agreement approved

Village and six towns will administer library services

The towns of Brazeau and Mountain have agreed to join the Suring Area Public Library and complete the third joint library agreement in Oconto County between a local library and surrounding towns.

The towns join the Village of Suring and the towns of Bagley, Breed, How and Maple Valley. The 11-member joint library board will be comprised of the school district administrator or her representative, with the other positions apportioned among the municipalities by population after each census.

The Oconto County Board unanimously approved the new joint library agreement at its Sept. 24 meeting.

Administrative Coordinator Kevin Hamann said Suring joins Lena, which established a joint library agreement with its neighbors in 2015, and the

Lakes Country Public Library in Lakewood in 2019.

The county has been encouraging the six local libraries to form joint partnerships to help reduce the amount that neighboring counties can charge Oconto County — especially Brown County, which levied a \$132,000 assessment for 2019.

By state law, counties such as Brown that have consolidated library systems may charge neighboring counties for the use of their libraries, unless the neighbors have their own consolidated library systems or joint library agreements among municipalities.

Hamann conceded that the Suring agreement will reduce Oconto County’s obligation to Brown by only around \$325 a year, because most residents who use Brown County libraries are from the southern part of the county.

“I would say that 80% of the charges come from Little Suamico and Chase, probably some in Morgan and Pensaukee,” he said. “Until those towns form joint library agreements, we’ll continue seeing this charge from Brown County.”

Committees consider county administrator system

Oconto County has had an administrative coordinator for years

Two Oconto County committees are exploring the establishment of a county administrator system to operate county government.

For more than 20 years, Kevin Hamann has overseen county de-

partments as administrative coordinator for the County Board. Under state law, an appointed county administrator has somewhat more autonomy but is still hired and fired by the County Board. An elected nonpartisan county executive has even more power and is chosen by

the voters.

The board’s Executive Committee was scheduled to meet Tuesday to discuss what changes would need to be made to county ordinances, a copy of the proposed revised job description and information about compensation of a county admin-

istrator versus an administrative coordinator.

The Personnel & Wages Committee is also expected to review the proposal, with a recommendation coming later this year. If the change is approved, it would take effect in January.

Menominee County joins community services agreement

Oconto and Marinette counties have been working together since 2015

Menominee County has agreed to become part of the comprehensive community services intergovernmental agreement that also includes Marinette and Oconto counties.

The Oconto County Board unani-

mously approved the agreement between the three counties during its Sept. 24 meeting. The Marinette and Menominee county boards had already approved.

Chris Hanke, manager of the county's Community Services Division, said the program provides case

management services for both adults and children with mental health issues. Marinette and Oconto counties first formed a partnership in 2015 with Marinette County serving as the administrative body.

"Each county operates independently as far as providing services to

their community and their citizens," Hanke said, and funding is provided by the state through Medicaid.

The state encouraged Menominee to join with Marinette and Oconto to regionalize the service, Hanke said. The agreement is effective Jan. 1, 2021.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may submit a request to vote an absentee ballot to their municipal clerk. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least **28 consecutive** days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing or online at MyVote.wi.gov

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the election. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter or you may apply for an absentee ballot online at MyVote.wi.gov. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, proof of identification, and your signature. You may make application to your municipal clerk for an absentee ballot in person, by mail, by fax, by email or at MyVote.wi.gov.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is:
5 pm on the fifth day before the election, **Thursday, October 29, 2020.**

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

Voting an absentee ballot in person

You may also request an appointment to vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location beginning Tuesday, October 20, 2020 during the days and hours specified for casting an absentee ballot in person. *Absentee voting is by appointment only unless noted below.
