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No bail reduction for 1976 murder suspect

A motion to suppress DNA evidence is argued in court

An elderly Lakewood man accused of murdering a Green Bay couple in 1976 will stay in the Marinette County Jail, probably until his scheduled trial in July.

Raymand L. Vannieuwenhoven, 83, has been incarcerated since he was arrested in March 2019 and charged with the shooting deaths of David Schuldes, 25, and Ellen Matheys, 24, at the McClintock Park campground in the Town of Silver Cliff in July 1976. Matheys had also been sexually assaulted.

The case went unsolved for more than 40 years until, investigators say, DNA found with Matheys' body was positively matched to Vannieuwenhoven in early 2019.

The trial, which is expected to take up to two weeks starting July 19, has been delayed both by COVID-19 concerns and several months when the defendant suffered a mental setback that left him temporarily not competent to assist in his own defense.

At a motions hearing Jan. 29, defense attorney Travis Crowell asked Marinette County Judge James A. Morrison to reduce the \$1 million bond to allow his release to his family or at least to a nursing home, although Vannieuwenhoven objected to the latter option.

"My dad died in the nursing home," he said, interrupting his attorney's argument. "I don't want to go there."

The defendant is in a category of vulnerability to COVID and has various other medical issues that make the jail a dangerous place for him, Crowell argued.

"The main considerations when you look at somebody who's presumed innocent are they a flight risk, and I think Mr. Vannieuwenhoven's been in northeastern Wisconsin his entire life," he said, "and is he dangerous, and Mr. Vannieuwenhoven can barely walk."

"How do you suggest I protect him?" Morrison responded. "One of the risks is ... with a suspect in a case like this is the potential to harm

himself. How do I protect him from that?"

District Attorney DeShea Morrow argued that where he's being kept in the county jail — away from the general population and with 24/7 nursing care — is already the safest place.

Morrison asked Sheriff Jerry Sauve, who attended the hearing, if officials had investigated alternative sites for his care.

"We've looked at the potential for other options, and I've come up empty," Sauve said. "I've researched this, I've talked to my colleagues across the states, and they scratch their heads and say, 'Sheriff, you've got a new one on us.' So we continue to do our best. I don't know, your honor, how I answer your question."

"I think you just did," Morrison said.

The judge said he's not persuaded that COVID is an issue in the jail, and in any case the defendant is safer there than in a nursing home or with a family member.

"If you can come up with a plan that would be as secure for Mr. Vannieuwenhoven, I would be happy to look at this motion again," Morrison said in denying the defense motion. "If you can come up with a plan that (he) would not harm himself and be compliant with medication, I would be very happy to look at that."

Earlier, Morrison heard testimony from two officers about the effort

to reportedly trick Vannieuwenhoven into providing a sample of his DNA. A defense motion asks Morrison to suppress the DNA evidence on the basis it was a warrantless search and therefore violates the Fourth Amendment prohibition on unreasonable search and seizure.

Marinette County Detective Todd Baldwin testified how Parabon NanoLabs, a Virginia firm that uses DNA and genealogical research to identify crime suspects, was able to trace the sample in Matheys' body to the Vannieuwenhoven family, specifically Raymand and his two living brothers. A fourth brother is now deceased, Baldwin said.

After detectives surreptitiously gathered DNA samples and eliminated the other two brothers, Baldwin said they were unable to get a sample from Raymand through usual means, such as searching his garbage — Lakewood doesn't have a garbage collection system.

Because Lakewood is in the next county, Baldwin enlisted Oconto County Chief Deputy Darren Lasowski to come into the Lakewood home and ask the defendant if he would fill out a short survey about policing in the area, further asking him to seal the completed survey in an envelope.

Crowell asked why they didn't just ask Vannieuwenhoven for a DNA sample.

"There's other potential suspects, and I don't want to get anyone tipped off down the line," Baldwin said.

Morrow argued that a number of higher-court decisions have ruled it's OK for police to use deception to obtain evidence. The two sides have submitted written briefs to argue the point.

Morrison said he would like to write the decision regarding the visit.

"I'm sure that regardless of the decision I make, the losing party will appropriately want somebody at the Third Circuit Court of Appeals or higher to look at it," Morrison said. "So I don't want to do that orally, I'm going to write an opinion."

Proceedings of Jan. 29

Dina Renick Hudson, 48, Oshkosh, waived her right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on a charge of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (fifth or sixth offense), in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 21. Arraignment was scheduled for March 11.

Judge James A. Morrison approved defense motions filed in advance of a March 2-4 jury trial for Joshua M. Waschbisch, 32, Oconto, who is charged with possession of methamphetamine, maintaining a drug trafficking place, possession of narcotic drugs and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred April 30. Meanwhile, new charges of felony bail jumping and misdemeanor resisting or obstructing an officer were filed against Waschbisch, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 27. Attorneys for both sides were asked to let the court know by Feb. 9 if the matters can be resolved and a plea hearing scheduled.

After a preliminary hearing, Robert P. Shampo Jr., 29, Peshtigo, was bound over on charges of fleeing an officer in a vehicle (second and subsequent offense), possession of THC (second and subsequent offense) and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia, operating a motor vehicle while revoked and failure to install an ignition interlock device, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Oct. 21. Arraignment was scheduled for Feb. 11.

After a preliminary hearing, Tayler T. Kellogg, 22, Suring, was bound over on charges of second-degree recklessly endangering safety and misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 4. Arraignment was scheduled for Feb. 17.

Proceedings of Jan. 28

Logan D. Race, 17, Oconto, waived his right to extradition and was extradited to Dickinson County, Michigan, in response to a fugitive warrant that was filed Dec. 28. He also faces Oconto County charges of child abuse intentionally causing harm and misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 10; attempted armed

robbery, felony bail jumping and misdemeanor bail jumping, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Dec. 28; and stalking, harassment and two counts of misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 24. This was his third appearance of the week in Oconto County Circuit Court (see below).

Casey Joel Benson, 30, Ashwaubenon, pleaded no contest to theft of movable property, in connection with an incident that occurred Nov. 6, 2019. The charge was reduced from a felony in a plea agreement. Judge Michael T. Judge sentenced her to 13 days already served in the county jail and assessed court costs and fees totaling \$473.

Joseph R. Arndt, 39, Gillett, pleaded no contest to misdemeanor counts of criminal damage to property, battery and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that occurred Oct. 20, 2019. The first charge was amended from a felony in a plea agreement. Judge Michael T. Judge withheld sentencing and placed Arndt on two years of probation.

William E. Pasterski, 31, Green Bay, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to strangulation-suffocation, substantial battery, bail jumping and misdemeanor charges of criminal damage to property and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Nov. 26, and bail jumping, possession of methamphetamine and misdemeanor resisting or obstructing an officer, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Dec. 5. A pre-trial conference was set for Feb. 11.

Keith W. Vorin, 44, Green Bay, pleaded not guilty to charges of felony possession of methamphetamine and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Oct. 19. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for Feb. 11.

Proceedings of Jan. 27

A Feb. 9 jury trial was rescheduled to May 5 for Tamara A. Hrabik, 41, Oconto, on a charge of straw purchasing of firearm, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Sept. 29, 2019. A final pre-trial conference was set for April 14.

A jury trial was again rescheduled, this time to May 18-19, for

Jared Ronald Barber, 27, Lena, who is charged with victim intimidation, strangulation-suffocation and misdemeanor battery, criminal damage to property, two counts criminal damage to property, four counts disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 24, 2020. A final pre-trial conference was scheduled for May 3.

Bond was set at \$100,000 cash for Logan D. Race, 17, Oconto, after he was charged with stalking, harassment and two counts of misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 24. His initial appearance was adjourned until Feb. 11. Race had been taken into custody at some point after a Jan. 25 court appearance (see below).

Proceedings of Jan. 26

After a preliminary hearing, three counts of bail jumping were dismissed without prejudice against Michael A. Musial, 34, Eagle River, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred March 31.

Norbert M. Milquet, 43, De Pere, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to aggravated battery, strangulation-suffocation and misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Nov. 22. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for March 11.

Proceedings of Jan. 25

A Feb. 3-5 jury trial was rescheduled to Aug. 18-20 for Richard H. Deinert, 73, Fremont, who is charged with aggravated battery of an elderly person, misdemeanor battery and two misdemeanor counts of disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Dec. 18, 2019. A final pre-trial conference was set for Aug. 3.

A Feb. 16-18 jury trial was rescheduled to Aug. 18-19 for Christopher M. Earley, 46, Oconto, who is charged with second-degree sexual assault and misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Dec. 16, 2018, and injury by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle and injury by use of vehicle with a prohibited alcohol content, in connection with a Jan. 26, 2019, crash. A motion hearing and final pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 19.

Sarah J. Hujet, 37, Gillett, was placed on three years of probation

after a prison sentence was imposed and stayed for possession of methamphetamine, in connection with an incident that occurred April 16, 2020. The probation includes 10 months in jail, but Judge Michael T. Judge ruled that six months may be suspended if Hujet does not violate terms of her probation, which include maintaining absolute sobriety and completing an alcohol and other drug abuse assessment with follow-through. She was given credit for 34 days already served.

Michael E. Ullmer, 21, Oconto Falls, was placed on two years' probation after a prison sentence was imposed and stayed for possession of THC with intent to deliver THC, in connection with an incident that occurred Oct. 4. Judge Michael T. Judge ruled that among other conditions, Ullmer must maintain absolute sobriety and employment and serve 60 days in the county jail, with 21 days credit for time already served.

Alexander Louis Boatright, 22, Maple Grove, Minnesota, pleaded no contest to tampering with a GPS tracking device, in connection with an incident that occurred Jan. 8, 2020. Judge Jay N. Conley scheduled sentencing for April 6 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Logan D. Race, 17, Oconto, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on charges of child abuse intentionally causing harm and misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Aug. 10, and attempted armed robbery, felony bail jumping and misdemeanor bail jumping, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Dec. 28. Arraignment was scheduled for Feb. 11.

Christopher K. LaLonde, 30, Cecil, pleaded no contest to possession of methamphetamine in connection with an incident that occurred Oct. 28. Judge Jay N. Conley scheduled sentencing for March 29 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Delinda Colleen Ward, 51, Oconto, was committed for treatment after Judge Jay N. Conley accepted a psychologist's report regarding whether she was competent to proceed on a charge of possession of THC (second or subsequent offense), as well as misdemeanor charges of lewd and lascivious behavior and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred June 22.

Oconto Falls wins regional title

Panthers send 9 wrestlers to sectionals

Nine Oconto Falls High School individual wrestlers qualified for sectionals while the team won the Division 2 Oconto Falls Regional on Jan. 30 in Oconto Falls.

The Panthers racked up 233.5 points, well ahead of second-place finishing Seymour (192).

To qualify for sectionals, individuals had to place either first or second in their weight class. Five Panther wrestlers claimed first, while four took second.

Garrett Ganter (106), Graeson Pankratz (113), Trevor Schindel (160), Clayton Whiting (182) and Mitch Kallies (285) were the first-place finishers for Oconto Falls. Landon Budz (120), Jaden Ganter (126), Luke Trepanier (132) and Jeremy Caldwell (152) claimed second.

Garrett Ganter, Pankratz, Whiting and Kallies all needed just one win to place first in their weight classes.

Kallies picked up a 3-2 decision win, while Whiting pinned his opponent in the second period. Ganter won by pin in the third period.

Pankratz, a state qualifier last year, earned a 7-1 decision win in the first-place match.

"It feels good to qualify for sectionals. It's just one more step closer to making it to the state tournament," said Pankratz. "My expectation for sectionals is quite simple, and that is to win it. I think it's definitely doable to take first."

Schindel wrestled twice on the day. In the semifinals, he claimed a 6-1 decision win. In the first-place match, he won with a pin late in the second period.

"For me, qualifying for sectionals during my senior season is just accomplishing one of my goals this year," said Schindel. "My expectation at sectionals is to wrestle to

Caldwell wrestled four times to earn his sectional spot. He started the day with an 11-3 major decision win, but lost a 16-9 decision in the semifinals. With his season on the line, Caldwell pinned his opponent in the third-place match and then earned another win by pin in the second-place match.

The three other second-place finishers for the Panthers wrestled only twice. The wrestlers were awarded second having already defeated the wrestlers they would have faced in the second-place matches.

Budz earned a 7-5 decision win to start the day before losing by pin in the first-place match. Jaden

Lena has 4 wrestlers qualify for sectionals

The Lena High School wrestling team had four individual wrestlers qualify for sectionals after competing in the Division 3 Lena Regional on Jan. 30 in Lena.

Lena placed fourth as a team with 134.5 points. Coleman won the regional title with 304.5 points.

To advance to sectionals, wrestlers had to place either first or second in their weight class.

Lena's Dylan Comins (106) and Sam Marquardt (132) were the top finishers in their respective weight classes. Jayden Belongia (113) and Frank Desjarlais (285) each came in second.

One of just three wrestlers in his weight class, Comins was awarded the double bye, meaning his first match would be in the first-place match. In that match, Comins won by an 11-0 major decision.

"My expectation (for sectionals) is take it one match at a time and get to the finals and make it to the state tournament," said Comins.

Marquardt wrestled twice on his way to first. He started his day with a technical fall win in the semifinals

Belongia pinned his opponent in the semifinals. He then lost by injury default in the first-place match. Desjarlais pinned his semifinal opponent in 29 seconds, but he was pinned in the first period of the first-place match.

Gillett/Suring also competed in the regional, placing sixth as a team.

WIAA announces girls postseason brackets

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association released postseason brackets on Jan. 31.

The opening round of regional play is scheduled for Feb. 9. The second round of regionals is set for Feb. 12, with regional finals on Feb. 13.

The brackets will be reseeded prior to the sectional semifinals that are scheduled for Feb. 18, with sectional finals on Feb. 20.

Division 2

Shawano earned a No. 1 seed in its Division 2 regional pod.

The Hawks will open the post-season Feb. 12 against fourth-seeded Marinette. The winner will take on No. 2 Antigo or No. 3 Seymour in the regional final on Feb. 13.

Division 3

In Division 3, undefeated Bonduel also picked up a No. 1 seed. The Bears were bumped up a division when the WIAA evened out the amount of playoff teams in each division.

Bonduel will play Feb. 12 against the winner of the Feb. 9 playoff battle between fifth-seeded Menominee Indian and fourth-seeded Oconto.

Third-seeded Oconto Falls and second-seeded Peshtigo round out the regional pod.

In another regional pod, Wittenberg-Birnamwood earned a No. 2 seed and will open the postseason hosting third-seeded Clintonville on Feb. 12. The winner will take on top-seeded Amherst, fourth-seeded Northland

Pines or fifth-seeded Tomahawk in the regional final on Feb. 13.

Menominee Indian and Witt-Birn were also bumped from Division 4 to Division 3 for the postseason.

Division 4

Also bumped up a division for the playoffs, Gillett was handed a No. 4 seed in its Division 4 pod.

Prevea, Bellin open COVID-19 vaccination clinics

Locations in Oconto County include Oconto Falls and Oconto

Community COVID-19 vaccination clinics have been opened by Prevea Health at HSHS St. Clare Memorial Hospital in Oconto Falls and by Bellin Health at the Bond Community Center in Oconto.

Both clinics are providing vaccinations by appointment only.

The Prevea clinic is providing COVID-19 vaccinations to all community members eligible for the vaccine under the vaccination prioritization guidelines set by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services.

Currently, frontline health care personnel, residents in skilled nursing and long-term care facilities,

police and fire personnel and adults ages 65 and older are eligible for vaccination at the Prevea Community COVID-19 Vaccination Clinic at HSHS St. Clare Memorial Hospital, 855 S. Main St., Oconto Falls.

Appointment availability is dependent on available vaccine supply that is provided by the DHS. Community members should not present to the hospital for vaccination without an appointment.

The fastest way to get an appointment scheduled for COVID-19 vaccination through Prevea Health is with MyPrevea. Visit www.myprevea.com to set up an account at no cost. You do not have to be a Prevea patient to sign up for a MyPrevea account.

MyPrevea is also available as an app on any smartphone or other device.

If you do not have access or are unable to use the internet, call Prevea's dedicated COVID-19 vaccination line, 1-833-344-4373. (Do not call the hospital directly to schedule an appointment.)

The COVID-19 clinic at Bond Community Center, 1201 Park Ave., Oconto, is open 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday-Friday and 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturdays. Appointment availability will vary according to the vaccination allocation Bellin receives from the state.

Individuals may schedule via their MyBellinHealth account (free and available to patients and non-patients

alike) or by calling the Bellin Health COVID-19 hotline at 920-445-7313.

Those who are scheduling their vaccinations should note that both the hotline and MyBellinHealth are experiencing some delays due to high volumes of calls.

Vaccine-eligible patients and community members may have received a MyBellinHealth email or app notification that they are able to schedule their vaccine.

If so, they may follow these detailed instructions to schedule. If eligible individuals have not yet received this prompt, they are still able to schedule by following these detailed instructions or by calling 920-445-7313.

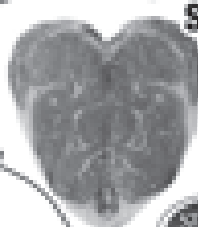
