Driver in fatal crash gets 13 years

14-year-old girl was killed, another teen seriously injured

A former Sobieski man will spend up to 13 years in prison for the December 2018 crash that killed 14-year-old September Deneys, of Abrams.

Cade Wied, 20, of De Pere, was sentenced June 29 to four years in prison, followed by two years of extended supervision, for second-degree reckless homicide; four years in prison, followed by two years of extended supervision, for second-degree reckless injury; two years in prison and two years of extended supervision for knowingly driving with a suspended license and causing death; one year in prison and one year of extended supervision for driving with a suspended license and causing injury.

He also was sentenced to two years in prison and two years of extended supervision for bail jumping after

supervision.

A jury in April convicted Wied of the four felony charges, along with a misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer. On the misdemeanor charge, Judge sentenced Wied to the 270 days he has already served in the county jail.

Data recovered from the car indicated Wied was driving down Sampson Road in Abrams at 88 mph when

he was caught driving again last December. Oconto County Judge Michael T. Judge ruled that the sentences will be served consecutively, for a total of 13 years in prison and nine years of extended

it went out of control and crashed into two trees around 7:30 p.m. Dec. 14, 2018.

Deneys was killed in the crash. Wied and another passenger, Josh Christiansen of Oconto Falls, then 17, were treated for serious but non-life-threatening injuries at area hospitals.

Conditions of the extended supervision include that Wied earn his high school diploma equivalence, have no contact with the victims and their immediate family unless waived in writing, complete all assessments, counseling and treatment deemed necessary by his agent, and pay all court-ordered financial obligations and DOC supervision fees, totaling \$3,153.

A hearing was scheduled for July 6 to determine the amount of restitution Wied must pay.

Oconto County reports

rise in tick-borne illnesses

Oconto County Public Health has issued an alert to encourage the public to be aware of ticks and take steps to prevent tick bites.

The alert notes that a number of diseases can be spread by ticks, including Lyme disease and anaplasmosis.

As of July 1, Oconto County has recorded 10 cases of anaplasmosis among county residents this year, compared to nine in all of 2020.

Anaplasmosis symptoms include fever, chills, severe headache, muscle aches, nausea and vomiting. Like other tick-related illnesses, anaplasmosis can be treated effectively with an antibiotic. If anaplasmosis is not treated, it can cause respiratory failure, bleeding problems, organ failure or death. Getting timely diagnosis and treatment is critical to prevent severe illness from tick-related illnesses.

To prevent tick bites and tick-related illnesses, the department recommends:

- Use repellent on skin and clothing: Use insect repellent with that contains at least 20%-30% DEET, 10%-20%

Picaridin, 15%-20% IR3535 or 30%-40% oil of lemon eucalyptus on exposed skin and clothes to prevent tick bites; follow the instructions on the repellent label. Also, apply permethrin to clothes, shoes and gear. Do not apply directly on skin.

- Wear appropriate outdoor clothing: Wear long sleeves, long pants and long socks to keep ticks on the outside of clothing; tuck shirts into pants, and pants into shoes or socks to keep the ticks on the outside of clothing; wear light-colored clothing to make ticks easier to spot.

- Avoid direct contact with ticks: Walk in the center of trails and do not brush up against plants on the edge of trails; avoid wooded and brushy areas with tall grass and leaf litter.

- Check for ticks after being outside: Check your full body carefully after being outside, even in your own yard; pay special attention to your armpits, behind the knees, scalp, in and around ears, inside the belly button and groin; before going inside, make sure your clothing, gear and pets don't

have ticks; take a bath or shower as soon as possible after coming inside to find and wash ticks off of your body; place clothes in a dryer on high heat for 10 minutes to kill any ticks that may be on clothing.

- Quickly remove any ticks you find on your body: Grasp the tick with a tweezers as close to the skin as possible; if a tweezers is not available, use your fingers and cover your fingers in Kleenex; pull upward and out with a firm and steady tension; get rid of the tick by putting it in alcohol or flushing down the toilet.

After removing the tick, clean the bite site with rubbing alcohol and wash your hands. Do not use petroleum jelly, a hot match, nail polish or other products. Do not handle the tick with bare hands or squeeze the tick.

Highway 22 due for 2026 reconstruction through Gillett

Preliminary plans to be completed next summer

State Highway 22 through Gillett is due to get a makeover in 2026, and the state Department of Transportation is asking for public input now.

DOT planners held a virtual meeting June 30 to explain the plans for rebuilding Highway 22 from Finnegan Lake Road north to the intersection of state Highways 22 and 32.

The project design is available at wisconsin.gov under its "Projects and Studies" menu, and comments are being sought through late July by contacting project designer Kim Bradley at Kimberly.Bradley@dot.wi.gov or Kimberly Bradley, P.E., Wisconsin Department of Transportation, 944 Vanderperren Way, Green Bay, WI 54304.

Bradley told her digital audience that the purpose of the work will be to address deteriorating conditions along the state highway, which goes through the city as North Mackenzie and West Main streets. Plans are to replace the storm sewer, make intersection improvements and install new concrete pavement, curbs, gutters and sidewalks along the route. Bradley said the cost of the new curbs, gutters and sidewalks will be borne as part of the state funding of the project, not by the property owners.

Traffic is expected to be detoured using County Roads U, V and H and state Highway 32, but the DOT intends

to maintain local access to businesses and residents during construction.

The intersection where East and West Main streets and McKenzie came in for much of the discussion during the virtual meeting. Bradley pointed out that the plan includes a median that would prevent left turns into or from Railroad Street.

"The only reason for that is Railroad is very close to Main Street," she explained. "You have a lot of roads coming in at roughly the same spot; it's just not as safe. So if we can eliminate some of the movements, that's improving it. That's making it safer."

Pastor Chris Byars of St. John's Lutheran Church (the "Clock Church") inquired about access to the church during and after construction. An-

drew Fulcer, the project manager, said they'll be having discussions about how best to get in and out during construction.

The median at Railroad Street does appear to block left turns from the church's McKenzie Street parking lot as well.

Bradley also told Byars that the new road will need a little more land to improve sight lines as drivers round the corner.

"We are cutting it closer, but we will not have to be impacting the building whatsoever," she said.

The state expects to acquire a sliver of land from the church for that purpose, Bradley said.

Byars suggested that the DOT consider erecting a barrier at the corner

to prevent vehicles from clipping the church building, as well as a crosswalk for pedestrians.

The project planners also heard from Superintendent Todd Hencsik of the Gillett School District about getting school buses in and out of their property on West Main Street while the work is underway.

"We will definitely be coordinating with the school district" prior to and during construction, Fulcer said.

The timeline calls for preliminary plans to be completed next summer, with real estate acquisition beginning in fall 2023, utility relocations in fall 2025 and construction during spring and summer 2026.

OCONTO COUNTY CIRCUIT COURT

Proceedings of July 1

Christopher Alan Barstow, 36, Marinette, pleaded no contest to charges of bail jumping and possession of methamphetamine in connection with an incident that occurred May 6. Barstow had previously pleaded guilty to possession of methamphetamine, in connection with an incident that occurred July 29, 2020. Judge James A. Morrison scheduled sentencing in both cases for Aug. 11.

Jacob W. Oestreich, 32, Oconto Falls, pleaded no contest to a misdemeanor count of disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that occurred May 19, 2020. In a plea agreement a felony charge of attempted aggravated battery was dismissed but read into the record. Judge James A. Morrison placed Oestreich in the Volunteer in Probation program for one year and imposed but stayed a 90-day county jail term.

Joshua M. Waschbisch, 32, Oconto, asked to withdraw his no-contest pleas to possession of methamphetamine, in connection with an incident that occurred April 30, 2020, and felony bail jumping, in connection with an incident that occurred Jan. 27. Waschbisch's attorney also asked to withdraw from the case. Judge James A. Morrison granted the attorney permission to withdraw and said he will not rule on the plea request until Waschbisch has a new attorney. In another matter, Morrison set bond at \$20,000 cash on more recent charges of battery by a prisoner, aggravated battery of an el-

derly victim and two counts of felony bail jumping, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred in the county jail March 16. A status conference was scheduled for Aug. 3.

David L. Reignier, 36, Oconto Falls, pleaded not guilty to two counts of strangulation-suffocation, victim intimidation by use of force, false imprisonment, and misdemeanor counts of battery and criminal damage to property, in connection with three incidents that allegedly occurred in April. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 15.

Proceedings of June 30

Jason K. Palomaki, 35, Green Bay, was sentenced to 18 months in prison, followed by two years of extended supervision, for possession of methamphetamine and a misdemeanor count of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (second offense) in connection with an incident that occurred Dec. 25. Judge Jay N. Conley ruled that Palomaki is eligible to participate in the Substance Abuse Program, which can lead to early release upon successful completion. During extended supervision he must maintain absolute sobriety, have no contact with anyone known to use, possess or sell illegal drugs, complete an AODA assessment and follow through with all recommendations of the treatment provider and comply with any assessments and any resulting recommendations made by the Department of Corrections.

Koltin Winchester Grzybowski,

20, Coleman, was released on a \$5,000 signature bond after being charged with injury by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle, injury by use of a vehicle with a prohibited alcohol content and second-degree reckless endangerment, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 15. A preliminary hearing was scheduled for Aug. 17.

Jordan D. Hall, 34, Green Bay, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over to circuit court on charges of felony possession of THC (second or subsequent offense) and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred April 25. Arraignment was scheduled for July 15.

An Oct. 28-29 jury trial was scheduled for Justin J. Kubiak, 31, Lena, on charges of second-degree recklessly endangering safety, strangulation and suffocation, and misdemeanor pointing a firearm at another person, battery and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 18. A final pre-trial conference was scheduled for Oct. 18.

Proceedings of June 29

Randall J. Robenhorst, 60, Little Suamico, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over to circuit court on three counts of first-degree child sexual assault, child enticement and three other felony counts, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May

27. Arraignment was scheduled for July 15.

After a preliminary hearing, Steven L. Anderson, 60, Suring, was bound over to circuit court on charges of fleeing an officer in a vehicle and a misdemeanor count of operating while revoked, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Feb. 26. Arraignment was scheduled for July 15.

A jury trial was rescheduled to Dec. 14 for Anthony P. Pack, 32, Neenah, who is charged with strangulation-suffocation and misdemeanor battery and disorderly conduct in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred in Gillett on Oct. 18, 2018. A final pre-trial conference was scheduled for Dec. 3.

Proceedings of June 28

Schad M. Playman, 41, Oconto, pleaded no contest to a misdemeanor charge of receiving stolen property and was sentenced to 65 days in the county jail that he has already served, in connection with an incident that occurred Jan. 30. Judge Michael T. Judge levied court costs and fees of \$473. The charge was amended from felony burglary in a plea agreement.

Bond was set at \$10,000 cash for Trevin L. Dornier, 50, Green Bay, after he was charged with operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (fifth or sixth offense), in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred June 26. His initial appearance was adjourned until July 15.

Arbor View Gardens donated to CMN

35-acre public garden becomes environmental research station

An interest in horticulture and the region's natural environment inspired Andy and Sheri Gleisner of rural Waupaca County to devote more than two decades to developing a unique botanical garden for area residents and visitors.

As retirement approached, their commitment to the land itself and the broader topic of environmental education moved them to donate 35 acres of their property to the College of Menominee Nation.

Beginning around 1975, the couple did extensive restoration and planting on the former farm land and, in 2000, opened it to the public as Arbor View Gardens. The botanical array now there features many varieties of wildflowers and other flowering

plants, the state's largest collection of woody plants, outdoor art installations and facilities for educational and social events.

The area has been occupied by European settlers since an 1830s treaty ceded more than 4 million acres of ancestral Menominee land to the U.S. government. In choosing to donate their property to the college, the Gleisners noted their desire to see it return to the trust of an American Indian community and to continue its educational purpose. CMN checked both boxes.

While the public gardens chapter in the land's life ended with the transfer of deed to CMN, its role as a place for environmental, conservation and biodiversity education will continue. CMN President Christopher Caldwell says planning has begun on ways members of the college faculty and staff of CMN's Sustainable Development Institute can make use of the property's special characteristics.

"We are grateful for the careful stewardship the Gleisners have given to this piece of Mother Earth," Caldwell said, "and for their thoughtfulness in placing it in the care of an American Indian tribal college."

"We can envision any number of valuable environmental research station projects happening there that will reflect our relationship to the earth and respect the care it received from Mr. and Mrs. Gleisner. It has already been mentioned in relation to our continuing academic work on the impact of climate change, phenomenology in this region, sustainable agriculture and ancient gardens of the Menominee people, and for classes such as natural resources, geoscience and soil microbiology."

Having access to a large area that is fenced and cleared of invasive species adds to its research potential, Caldwell added.

"We have demonstration gardens adjacent to the college's Keshena

campus, but having additional space a few miles distant offers control sites that can extend knowledge gained in projects," Caldwell said.

The development of Arbor View Gardens benefited from Sheri Gleisner's professional teaching background in public schools and Andy Gleisner's expertise in horticulture. Aiding in their project was Andy Gleisner's mentor and horticulture professor at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Dr. Edward Hasselkus.

A former curator of the UW Arboretum's Longenecker Horticultural Gardens, Hasselkus offered professional advice to the Gleisners and provided nearly 20% of the woody species for the Arbor View collection. Other plantings on the property include many non-invasive plants from around the world that are acclimated to Wisconsin conditions.

The research station is located at the County Road C and Palmer Road intersection in Embarrass.

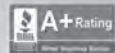

41 years in education show students need the best

As I reflect on my 41 years in education, I am reminded of how crucial it is for all young people to have the supports and resources they need to be successful in school and life.

Growing up in Mississippi during the Civil Rights era, I was one of 14 children in our family. We lived in poverty, surrounded by a racially segregated environment. By today's standards, I would have been considered at-risk. Although our family did not have much financially, we had nurturing parents who, even with limited educational attainment, realized the value of education and saw it as our passport to a better future.

Despite certain adults in our school having disdain for us because of the color of our skin, my brothers, sisters and I went home to encouraging parents who told us we could be anything we wanted. Fueled by the inequities and injustices I saw and experienced as a child, I desired to be an educator. I wanted to make a positive change and impact the lives of others. I wanted to make sure those who looked like me did not succumb to the feelings of inadequacy that others

tried to impose on me. My upbringing and lived experiences shaped me and sparked a passion early on in my life, which has never wavered. As a teacher for a decade and then a principal for 11 years in the Madison Metropolitan School District, the principles of equity and advocacy became my North Star.

I brought those same goals to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction in 2001, where I served as an assistant state superintendent. In 2019, I was presented with the opportunity of a lifetime when Gov. Tony Evers appointed me to be Wisconsin's first Black state superintendent. I am proud of the department's efforts during my time in office to apply the principles of equity and advocacy so all Wisconsin students might experience success.

Early on as state superintendent, I recall an occasion which touched me deeply and reemphasized my mission.

A small group of young women approached me with tears in their eyes telling me the impact seeing a Black woman in a statewide leadership position had on them. This moment served as an important reminder why a young girl from Mississippi chose to devote her life to education and helping others.

Serving as the chief advocate for Wisconsin schools has allowed me to use my voice to support all youth, especially the underserved; those who have not had the same opportunities or access as others. At the same time, being the state superintendent has put me in a unique position to see our young people finding their own voices, becoming leaders and critical thinkers and pushing for change in their communities.

I am proud of the strides we have made, but our state still has miles to go. Wisconsin cannot continue to have the widest achievement gap in the nation. As a state, we must do more to support our most underserved students — children of color, those living in poverty, those with different abilities, our LGBTQ students, English

language learners, our gifted students and so many more. I know Wisconsin can be better.

Reducing and removing barriers to our students' success should be our common goal. Activist Marian Wright Edelman once said, "Education is for improving the lives of others and for leaving your community and world better than you found it."

No one should have to be convinced that supporting our children and their education is the right thing to do. We all have a vested interest in the outcomes of our young people.

As I retire from my formal role in the coming weeks, I remain dedicated to our children and will stay engaged in ensuring they have what they need when they need it. Our state can only achieve this vision when our leaders and our communities put differences aside and work in unity to make a change in the name of our children. All of Wisconsin's students deserve us showing up as the best versions of ourselves.

UW System leader in thwarting coronavirus pandemic

"Having launched a vaccination site at a few campuses, the system did save the state, and I want to say that publicly. The system saved the state, in its responsibility and its actions."

Those are the words of one of our newest members of the University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents, Dr. Ashok Rai, president and CEO of Prevea Health in Green Bay. He made the comments at the regents meeting this month in Milwaukee during a discussion of the role UW System played in combating the insidious COVID-19 pandemic in our communities.

From providing \$500 tuition credits to nursing and pharmacy students who administered vaccines or worked in health care settings to opening community testing sites to launching community vaccination centers on our campuses — including with Prevea — the UW System saw a need and found a solution.

You can't imagine how proud I was to hear Dr. Rai's words, and how grateful I was that he said them publicly. What a stirring testament to the students, staff, faculty, deans, chancellors and everyone else who contributed their time and talent to those initiatives. It could have only happened in Wisconsin.

Through June 5, we administered more than 264,000 doses of the vaccine. Twelve of our universities, in every part of Wisconsin, hosted and facilitated vaccination sites.

When we stood up these sites starting Jan. 18 with Prevea at UW-Green Bay, the seven-day average of new daily COVID-19 cases was

more than 1,900 in Wisconsin and 27 people died. As of Monday, June 21, that average was 69 daily cases with zero deaths. That's great news for all of us, and we're glad we could do our part.

We also administered 1.24 million COVID-19 tests on our UW System campus testing sites, as of June 15. In fact, only Wisconsin had a statewide community testing program at the height of the pandemic last fall to help slow the spread of the virus by enabling hundreds of thousands of people to get free and fast COVID-19 tests at our universities. It was a herculean effort, but one that used a great Wisconsin asset — our public universities.

I remember the day we opened our community vaccination site at UW-Oshkosh in early March. Through one entrance to the Culver Family Welcome Center, the area's elderly ambled through the Great

Hall and into the Grand Ballroom for their vaccinations. They and their loved ones looked relieved and happy. Through another entrance, the region's residents lined up by the dozens for a rapid-results COVID-19 test being administered in a partitioned part of the ballroom.

You could see both groups from a single second-floor vantage point — we were at once inoculating the most vulnerable and helping everyone else prevent the spread. It was the kind of image that stays with you and lets you know we are making a difference.

Dr. Rai recognizes what the UW System means to the state of Wisconsin. Knowledge producer. Economic driver. Problem solver. We're glad to have helped our communities emerge from the pandemic and look forward to what our future will bring.

Three Oconto Falls High School baseball players were named to the North Eastern Conference second team.

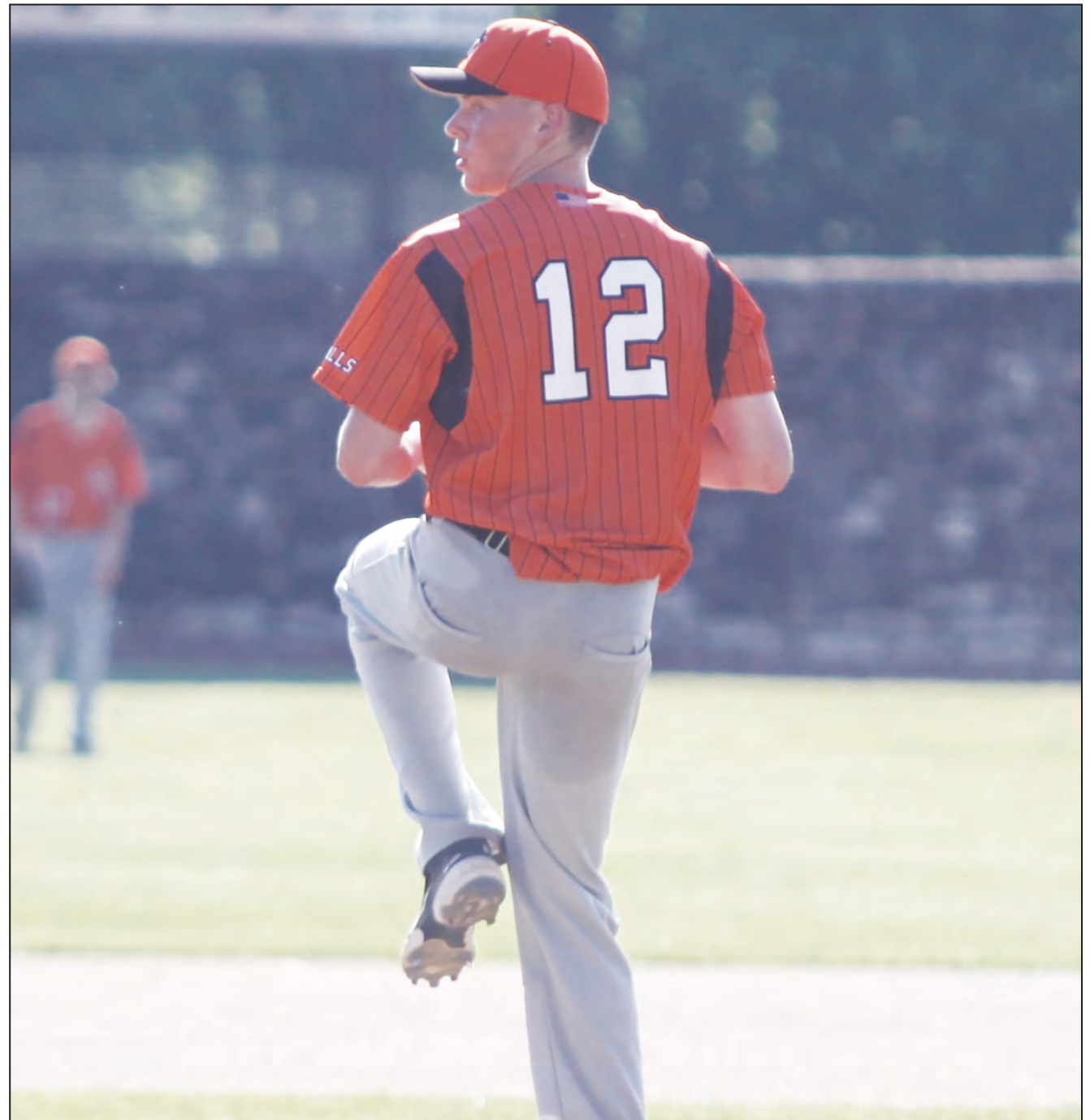

"This all-conference award tells me that I can do better than what I did this season. I am aiming for first team next year and that is my goal."

Vandermoss had Oconto Falls' top batting of the season at .377, tallying 23 hits in 61 at-bats. He also walked 10 times for a .458 on-base percent-

Deputy involved in shooting incident in Town of Red Springs

A deputy for the Shawano County Sheriff's Department is on administrative leave after being involved in a shooting incident in the Town of Red Springs.

The Wisconsin Department of Justice Division of Criminal Investigation is investigating the incident that occurred at about 9:30 p.m. July 1.

County dispatch received a 911 call from a witness reporting a single car accident on Upper Red Lake Road, north of Gresham. A deputy responded to the scene and came upon a single car crash with one man. The man allegedly had a gun in his hands and the officer directed the subject to put down the gun, according to a DOJ press release.

The release states the man did not put down the gun and raised the gun

toward the officer. The officer fired at the man and struck him. The man transported to a hospital and was being treated for non-life threatening injuries.

No law enforcement officers were injured during the incident, according to the DOJ.

DOJ is leading the investigation of the incident with help from Wisconsin State Patrol and Shawano Police Department.

DOJ is continuing to review evidence and determine the facts of this incident and will turn over investigative reports to the Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney when the investigation concludes.

The investigation is ongoing and no further information is currently available.

Lakewood Mardi Gras returns July 17-18: Live music, carnival, food, fun and a parade

The COVID pandemic curtailed plans for the 2020 Lakewood Mardi Gras after 65 consecutive years of the celebration, just as the many other popular events had to be canceled last summer.

However, the Lakewood Area Chamber of Commerce and the Mardi Gras Planning Committee have made the decision to hold the 66th Lakewood Mardi Gras on July 17-18 at the Memorial Park Pavilion. Though somewhat scaled down to only a two-day event, the organizers felt that the tradition that started in 1955 should continue, even if some changes were necessary.

The softball tournament that has been a staple of the Mardi Gras for many years will return, but will be scaled back to only a 12-team tournament. The games will be scheduled to start at 8 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday. Play will continue through Sunday afternoon until a champion has been determined. Also scheduled for Saturday morning is a pickleball tournament sponsored by the Chamber and the Lions Club. That tournament will be an individual switch doubles round robin tournament with registration at 8 a.m. and play to start at 8 a.m. Entries are due by July 12 at LAPPPlayers@gmail.com.

Saturday afternoon will be "Kids Time," and a couple of very popular events from two years ago will return. The kids Fish Pond, sponsored by the Lions and Trout Unlimited, will open at approximately noon. Arrangements have again been made with Mischief and Magic to be on the grounds on Saturday afternoon. A balloon twister and a henna artist will be on hand at about 1 p.m. There will also be a magic clinic, and a

magic show that will be on stage at approximately 2 p.m. These activities are free.

Another activity paying tribute to the area's logging history will take place at 1 p.m. July 17. The staff at the Holt and Balcom Logging Camp Museum will be putting on the presentation Lucy Loves Lakewood. The presentation is open to the public and is about Lucy Holt, who recorded both written and film accounts of the area in the early 1900s. The Logging Camp Museum is located on the grounds of the McCauslin Brook Golf Course.

Adults on the Mardi Gras grounds will be in line for some free evening entertainment as well, with the popular band Crankin' Yankees on stage Saturday from 7-11 p.m.

The concession stands will open for lunch on Saturday, and there will be a wide variety of foods and beverages available on Saturday and Sunday. The Chamber Food Stand will feature hot beef sandwiches on Saturday afternoon. Corn on the cob will also be available. The Lions Snack Shack will also be open and will be serving the usual brats, burgers, and dogs.

One of Sunday's highlights is the Mardi Gras Parade scheduled for noon through downtown and back to the festival grounds. There is no cost to enter the parade, and businesses and organizations are encouraged to be represented in the parade. Entries are asked to line up near the Lakewood Cemetery about 11:30 a.m. Sunday.

Following the parade, in addition to the softball tournament and other activities, music will be provided on stage by DJ Greg Tallier.
