Gillett School District officials state their case

They tell the city passing a referendum question would maintain existing services

Gillett Public School District officials got a little pushback when they presented the Gillett City Council with their case for a Nov. 8 referendum question.

The district is asking voters for permission to exceed state-imposed revenue limits by up to \$600,000 a year. A similar question was defeated in April by a 53% to 47% margin.

During a presentation to the council, Superintendent Todd Henscik said the district is just trying to maintain existing services, which had been supported for three years by a successful referendum question in 2018.

"We're not looking to do anything more, or add anything else, or any building or anything else like that," Henscik said.

After losing the April referendum, the Gillett School Board made a number of cuts as it prepared the 2022-23 school year budget.

"We did cut several teachers, a bus route, delayed buildings and grounds projects, reduced all paraprofessional hours down from 8 to 7.5 hours a day. We took \$200,000 in fund balance designated for use over this school year," Henscik said.

The district also used its grant under the federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) fund to pay for six teachers, but because that was a one-time expenditure intended to help districts recover from COVID-19 related lockdowns, those dollars will need to be replaced somehow if the teachers are going to remain.

Henscik said passing the referendum is crucial to maintaining school programs and services.

"If we cannot have this \$600,000

per year for the next three years, we're going to have to make some very, very deep cuts, and that's the last thing anybody wants to do," he said.

The property tax mill rate will stay the same and actually decrease even if the referendum passes, Henscik said, in part because of an unusually large increase in equalized valuation. The mill rate is the tax levy per \$1,000 in valuation.

"We feel like we've been good stewards of your taxpayer dollars," he said. "We were authorized to levy an additional \$600,000 for the past three school years; we only levied on average \$450,000 because that's all we needed. We make that promise to you again that we're only going to take what we need."

Board member Ron Lenz said the board has been tightening its belt for a long time, and especially since the April question failed.

"We're doing that by making the necessary cuts to satisfy the lack of a referendum," Lenz said. "The thing is we can't do that for too many years in a row or we're going to end up with large class sizes, less teachers, maybe some programs out altogether — not making any threats, but too many of those are going to cause a cycle of less students."

Lenz noted that his children graduated from Gillett, his six grandchildren are current students and his wife taught there for 37 years.

"It's a great school and we need to keep it up, and all we can do is come here and ask for money," he

said.

Alderman Gary Spaulding interrupted the presentation when Lenz said asking voters for help is the district's only option.

"That's not true. That's not true. There's other resources to get money out there," Spaulding said. "You gotta start running that school more like a business instead of reaching into the constituents' pockets all the time."

He said some school districts have established "innovation centers" funded with donations from local businesses. Spaulding said he toured a school with such an innovation center, various industrial education shops and a 600-seat auditorium.

"They're running it like a business, and they're selling it to the community," said Spaulding, who did not identify the district in question.

Henscik said Gillett would love to have such innovation centers.

"If we know any businesses in our community that would be willing to donate that, I would love to have those conversations," he said.

Mayor Josh McCarthy said the Gillett School District provides value to the community, citing its efforts to help his daughter and other students who fell behind during the statewide COVID closures.

"It's a great set of teachers that do their job at such a high level," McCarthy said. "I can't thank the school district enough for not only my child but other students who were struggling during that time."

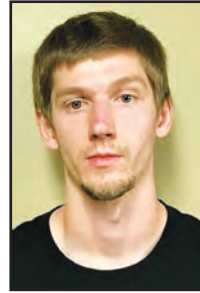
Suspect in custody in double homicide

A Little Suamico man is being held in connection with the Oct. 2 shooting deaths of a woman reported to be his mother and her new husband at the home the three of them shared.

Oconto County Sheriff Todd Skarban said David W. Steinmetz, 27, was arrested in connection with the deaths of Paul R. Brennan, 75, and Lori (Steinmetz) Brennan, 55, who obtained a marriage license from the Oconto County Clerk's office on June 24.

Two counts of first-degree intentional homicide are expected to be forwarded to the Oconto County District Attorney's Office in the near future, Skarban said. Although the family identified Lori Brennan as Steinmetz's mother, the sheriff did not confirm that

was identified as a person of interest a short time later, and he was apprehended in the parking lot of Thompson's County Market in Oconto not long after that.

"Our response was aggressive, appropriate and timely," Skarban said. "I would like to thank my team for their solid police work and their quick response in taking the suspect into custody."

Deputies were called to 1251 Melissa Blvd. shortly after 9 a.m. Oct. 2 and found the couple's bodies outside the mobile home with multiple gunshot wounds. David Steinmetz

The sheriff declined to take questions at the brief news conference, saying any possible motive and a timeline of events would be spelled out in the criminal complaint once Steinmetz has been charged.

"Please, please respect the privacy of the family as they deal with the terrible tragedy and the loss of their loved ones," Skarban said.

Lori Brennan's family started a GoFundMe page to help raise funeral expenses.

"The loving couple was only married two months. The family is heartbroken and in such shock," according to the summary on the fundraising page. "The family is mourning the huge loss of a mother/father and amazing grandparents."

Online court records indicate David Steinmetz, who is in custody at the Oconto County Jail on a probation

hold, is no stranger to law enforcement. He has been in and out of the state prison system for the past 10 years, most recently convicted of aggravated battery of an elderly person and manufacture and delivery of amphetamine in 2017.

Steinmetz was sent to prison on a felony charge of possession with intent to deliver THC and misdemeanor convictions for possession of THC and theft in 2012. His record also includes a misdemeanor conviction for possession of a controlled substance in 2015.

He was released from Oshkosh Correctional Institution into a supervised living facility on Dec. 2, 2020, and that halfway house released him April 30, 2021. As part of his sentences, he has been on extended supervision after serving out his initial incarceration. He has listed the Melissa Boulevard address as his home since July 2017.

Gillett chamber of commerce is off to a strong start

Turnout seen as encouraging for homecoming events and Harvest Days

The newly formed Gillett Area Chamber of Commerce planned to hold its first official meeting at noon Oct. 13 at the Gillett Fire Station, 310 W. Park St., Gillett.

The chamber was organized earlier this year and played a key role in making this year's Gillett High School homecoming a community-wide celebration, including the first-ever Harvest Days event downtown and at Zippel Park on Oct. 1, said Katie Daul. She made her remarks during her tourism and marketing commission report to the Gillett City Council on Oct. 6.

"We had a lot of people walking through, a lot of people driving through who stopped in to visit. We had 20 vendors at the park," Daul said.

The celebration included a beanbag tournament, dress-up days at the schools and a well-attended community bonfire, along with yard signs people displayed at their

homes showing they were staff or alumni.

"The purpose of that is really to show support in the community for schools," Daul said. "It does take a school to have a successful community, so that partnership is really important."

The events were well received and the group plans to be part of homecoming again next year, Daul said.

The new chamber is open to businesses and individuals, and the organization plans to ask for support from the city, whether it be by membership or providing startup funds, she said. Membership rates vary depending on whether it is for an individual, large or small business, church or other nonprofit.

Daul said the city at some point could consider dissolving its tourism and marketing commission and letting the new chamber take over that role.

"We feel that we are the umbrella for tourism and marketing and all the other organizations that support the city with either scholarships for the kids or small civic groups, but as a chamber that's our job," she said.

Mayor Josh McCarthy said he talked with some of the vendors at Harvest Days, and they were impressed by the turnout.

"They said there was a lot of

foot traffic for a first event and are interested in coming back," McCarthy said.

Carthy said. "If we have that much engagement, it's always a positive."

Gillett council learns about police mutual aid

Concerns raised about coverage when officers are away from city

The Gillett police chief used his monthly report to the city council Oct. 6 to explain how mutual aid agreements work to provide safety across Oconto County.

Chief Shane Breitenbach said he heard some comment in the community after his squad car was spotted recently responding to an incident in the Breed-Mountain area.

The incident — a serious car crash — fell in the realm of mutual aid among the county's small cadre of law enforcement agencies, Breitenbach said.

"Most people think — they have a certain number in their mind — how many officers are on (duty) in the county. I've heard everything from 20, 30, 'There's gotta be 40 people.' There isn't," he said. "In Oconto County at any given time, for the most part there's four deputies. That's it. When you consider four deputies in an area that's 1,100 or 1,200 square miles, that's not much."

Although the county has a huge land mass, its population of 40,000

can't afford police departments the size of larger communities, Breitenbach said. He estimated that at any given time, the city of Oconto has three or four officers on duty; Oconto Falls usually has two, sometimes three, while Lena and Suring have an officer but not 24 hours a day.

On the day in question, Breitenbach said two deputies were in Townsend after a drug overdose death, another deputy was handling the case of an unresponsive female in Abrams, while the fourth deputy was processing evidence at the office in Oconto.

Three crashes occurred right in the center of the county at that time.

"I was the closest to two of the crashes," Breitenbach said, and so he went to Breed. "Under mutual assistance, mutual aid agreements through the state, any law enforcement agency can reach out to any other law enforcement agency for assistance, and that's a typical example. There was no one else. There was me. I was the only one available."

For another recent incident, a domestic argument involving a weapon located near the county line, he was the only officer who could assist the lone deputy who was responding.

"When people come up and ask questions, I'm more than happy to explain. To be transparent and explain how these things happen helps everyone understand — when they do see something that seems to be a little off — to know why, the reasons

behind it," Breitenbach said.

Alderman Debbie Rudie said that when the fire department goes to a call outside of the city, they make sure there's staff available to cover the city.

"When you're going to Breed, because you're telling me you're the closest one and nobody else is around, if we have a call here in the area that we're paying for, who's going to take care of that?" Rudie asked.

Breitenbach said it comes down to the severity of the call. "Anything that has to do with health or safety" is going to get priority, he said.

He added that he has responded on multiple occasions to reports of pulseless, non-breathing people outside the city.

"At that point, there's nothing happening in the city, but someone's dying, and I know and dispatch knows I'm going to get there before anybody else," he said. "It's imperative that life trumps someone's barking dog or there's a fender bender in a parking lot."

Mutual assistance agreements are reciprocal, he added. If a serious incident were to occur in Gillett while Breitenbach and sheriff's deputies were away on other calls, the Oconto County Emergency Dispatch Center would automatically call the Oconto Falls Police Department. If those officers couldn't respond, Shawano County would get the call, he said.

"We all have to work together,"

Breitenbach said. "It may not be in our areas. But to get the job done and get it done safely, we have to rely upon each other."

Fire Chief Kurt Hicks noted that his department has 15-25 firefighters, so it's possible to send four people and a truck to another community while still being able to cover the City of Gillett.

"Police don't have that, not in small towns," Hicks said. "And it is critical, when these things happen — if they can get him there quicker, that's what they're going to do."

"It's not like Gillett's hanging out in the wind," Breitenbach said. "That's not how it works. Everyone's covering everything, but it's getting the most important people to the most critical incidents first."

"It seems to be a lot lately," Rudie said. "I think we just need to talk about it more."

Mayor Josh McCarthy said Gillett recently added a fourth officer to its rotation and suggested that Oconto County should also review its law enforcement roster.

"The county needs to get more officers, period. One, the county has grown; two, there's more incidents. That's something that they need to figure out," McCarthy said. "It boils down to: 'How much of our city resources are we spending going other places?' And I think that's the basis of the question."

Renovation of classrooms nears completion, while new gymnasium scheduled to be done next May

The Bonduel School District voters approved a \$12.5 million referendum last year to improve its existing facilities, and the work is still in progress.

Work on renovating classrooms at Bonduel Middle-High School was recently completed as the new school year started, with new parking areas for students, staff and visitors. The school's front office and the district office have relocated from the renovations and are ready for business.

The reason for the relocations is that the former school parking lot is the site for the new gymnasium that was included in the referendum package. The gym is still under construction, though, with the hopes that it will be finished by May 2023 in time for the high school graduation.

"If you know anything about construction, though, there are a lot of unknowns," Superintendent Joe Dawidziak said in an interview on Oct. 6. "We're on a really good schedule."

The gym is not the only item that

still needs to be worked on, however. Over at Bonduel Elementary School, some renovation work needs to be completed around the front office to provide more secure access. Dawidziak noted that while the doors need

to be unlocked by office staff in order for someone from the outside to gain access, the office is not by that front door, so someone could easily bypass the office and proceed to other parts of the building.

That was an issue with the middle-high school, as well, but the relocation of the front office closer to Green Bay Street resolved the problem.

Among the issues resolved with renovating the middle school and high school classrooms was putting in an updated heating, ventilation and air conditioning system. The oldest part of the building, constructed in the 1950s, did not have air conditioning.

Those classrooms also did not have windows to allow natural light into the classrooms, which Dawidziak noted was an important factor to get students focused on learning.

He added that there are still a few things that need to be completed on the middle-high school beyond the gym, but most of the renovation work has been completed.

"There's still going to be a lengthy punch-list attached to this," Dawidziak said, noting that a sign indicating where the school's front office is among those items.

A big surprise nestled among all the construction work is that, even with having to pay off the referendum

debt, there will be a lower tax rate in the district. When the referendum was shopped to voters, district officials explained that there would be a 16 cent increase in the tax rate for the foreseeable future.

However, the recent wave of inflation includes hiking up property values, and Dawidziak expects that the 2022-23 tax rate will end up being \$7.15 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation, which means a property worth \$100,000 will see \$715 in Bonduel school taxes. The current rate is \$8.43.

"I think we're in a pretty good spot," Dawidziak said. "What we thought was going to be 16-cent impact is going to be negative 50 cents. That's pretty dramatic."

He added that the \$7.15 rate is not final and could depend on a couple of factors solidifying in October.

Dawidziak said that the district was expecting a 3.5% interest rate on paying back the referendum debt, but the current economy resulted in Bonduel getting a 2% interest rate, which should save the district money in the long run.

Even though voters gave the green light to the referendum in April 2021, construction was not able to start at that time due to supply chain issues. As a result, construction began earlier this year, but Dawidziak is still hopeful that the work can be finished by 2023.

"In a different time prior to this and in a different world was that, when you went out to bid, you bid everything, and everything was on a timeline," Dawidziak said. "For our project ... it's been all over the place. The issue isn't just with supply chains; it's with the lead times on things, as well."

The biggest issue was getting the needed supply of metal, according to Dawidziak, so the district approved a bid for just that part of the project before bidding on any other building materials.

"The lead time at the time was a year (for the metal)," Dawidziak said.

The lead times could change quickly, as well, he noted. In a couple of cases, materials arrived much earlier than anticipated, but most of the time, something would be promised in October, and two weeks later, the district would get word that the arrival date was pushed back one month, then two, and so on.

"The interesting thing is that there doesn't seem to be a rhyme or reason to those things and the timelines attached to them," Dawidziak said. "That has been a unique circumstance."

The continuous changes have brought out parents and community members to see how the schools are changing, according to Dawidziak. Be-

cause of the weird timelines, it seemed doubtful that the needed work on the middle and high school classrooms would be done by the time the school opened in late August, getting a waiver from the Wisconsin Department of

Public Instruction to do so due to the original construction schedule.

"A lot of people drive around here to see the progress," Dawidziak said. "A lot of people didn't believe we were going to start on time, but we

did. There were some growing pains with that, but we did. What I prepped my staff for with a pretty chaotic fall has not been the case."

Masons donate device to Gillett Fire Department

Shawano Area Masons have presented the Gillett Fire Department with a fire suppression device on behalf of the fraternal order's now-defunct Gillett Lodge.

"We decided because we have history here in Gillett that we are going to provide Gillett with a fire suppression tool," said Dan Ascher, who made the presentation during the Oct. 6 meeting of the Gillett City Council.

The eight-pound, \$1,200 device is easy to use — an early responder pulls two pins and throws it through the window of a fire scene, Ascher said.

The discharges "a very strong aerosol mist," not harsh chemicals, to suppress the flames, he said.

"In the product demo, they had a kitchen that was on fire from a

dishwasher — hot plastic, smoky, nasty," Ascher said. "A young fire-

man pitched one of these in a window, and the kitchen was not really

damaged at all. The wonderful thing about this is there is not much water damage."

The donation was funded by an organization called Acts of Kindness through the Wisconsin Masonic Foundation.

The device is also recyclable — once used, a department sends it back to be recharged and reused, he said.

Fire Chief Kurt Hicks said the device will be kept in Police Chief Shane Breitenbach's squad car.

"Quite frankly, the first on scene at a fire in Gillett is police," Hicks said. "This really is a great tool to have. It really depletes the oxygen source, which is your fuel source for those fires."

A first responder can potentially "knock that fire right down to nothing," he said.

Plantar fasciitis impacts 3 million each year

Three million cases of plantar fasciitis are reported in the United States every year, according to statistics from the Mayo Clinic, making it one of the most common causes of heel pain.

"Plantar fasciitis is inflammation of the plantar fascia, a thin layer of tissue running along the bottom of the foot from the heel bone to the toes," said Stacey Grosnick, a physical therapist with ThedaCare Orthopedic Care. "Anyone can develop plantar fasciitis, and it can be extremely painful because the inflammation causes swelling, which increases the tension on the fascia and surrounding tissue and nerves. Then, every step someone takes further increases that pressure, especially the first steps in the morning."

Why people develop plantar fasciitis can sometimes be a mystery.

"We know that people who are on their feet a lot often suffer from it, as do runners, people who have significant changes in their weight or those who adopt a new, intensive sport or exercise activity, such as a boot camp," Grosnick said. "There are times that we cannot pinpoint the exact cause."

Non-supportive footwear can also be a factor. Industrial workers, nurses, other hospital staff and res-

taurant workers are examples of professions susceptible to the malady. Grosnick said that it's important those folks wear shoes offering good support.

If people are standing on concrete or hard floors all day, they should consider a cushioned mat to stand on.

Grosnick said treatment of plantar fasciitis by a physician usually involves a recommendation to take an anti-inflammatory drug and sometimes to temporarily wear a walking boot to take pressure off the fascia. They might also recommend a heel cup to relieve pressure on the heel or a night splint.

"At night when we're sleeping, our foot is in a more plantar flexed or relaxed position," Grosnick said. "That places the plantar fascia in slack, and when it's inflamed, it tightens up overnight. That's why the first few steps in the morning are very painful for some people. A nighttime splint keeps the foot in a more neutral position, so that when you get up in the morning, it's not quite so painful to take

those first steps."

Physical therapy is a great treatment approach for plantar fasciitis.

"We'll suggest and perform some stretching exercises and analyze their gait to make sure they are walking efficiently," said Grosnick. "Improper walking mechanics can impact plantar fasciitis. We'll also make sure the various joints in their feet are moving the way they should mechanically, and we'll work on strengthening their calf muscles. Sometimes we'll use dry needling to release trigger points."

Grosnick also noted physical therapists focus on the foot's arch.

"Most of us think we have one arch in our foot," she explained. "There are actually two; one we see from the side and one that goes across the top of our foot. That's called the transverse arch. Both need good support. We'll work on all the intrinsic muscles in the foot — the muscles between all the bones that help maintain the shape of the foot."

Besides suggesting exercises and checking body mechanics, physical therapists will focus on footwear.

"We recommend wearing good shoes that are appropriate for whatever work or activity a person is involved in," she said. "Shoes with good arch support and cush-

ioning are important, and sometimes we'll recommend orthotics — either an over-the-counter pair or custom orthotics that we'll design for them."

Rest, icing and stretching the fascia are some of the home remedies physical therapists suggest.

"Freezing a bottle of drinking water and then rolling the bottom of your foot over can help relieve pain and inflammation and stretches the fascia a bit," she said. "Rolling a golf ball under the foot is another way to stretch that tissue. Doing those activities a couple of times a day, for 10 to 15 minutes, should provide some relief."

Plantar fasciitis can become a chronic problem for many people, and for that reason Grosnick recommends wearing shoes at home.

"Many of us like to come home and kick off our shoes," she said. "Anyone who's had foot problems should wear shoes at home. I recommend different brands of sandals for those who really don't want to wear shoes. We're still on our feet often at home and we still need to wear supportive shoes, but they can be something more casual like sandals. Otherwise, people can become a hamster on a wheel, chronically repeating the inflammation."

AG candidates weigh in on transparency

Josh Kaul and Eric Toney are miles apart on many issues, but when it comes to open government, the candidates vying for Wisconsin attorney general in the Nov. 8 election agree: More money is needed to handle enforcement of the state's transparency laws.

The Wisconsin Freedom of Information Council sent questionnaires to Kaul, the Democratic incumbent, and his Republican challenger, Fond du Lac County District Attorney Eric Toney.

The state Department of Justice, which the attorney general heads, is empowered by statute to interpret and enforce Wisconsin's public records and open meetings laws. The department's Office of Open Government handles that job, in addition to responding to public records requests.

In assessing the office's strengths and weaknesses, both candidates mentioned the office's processing times for handling public records requests and responding to inquiries. Toney said the office is not presently prioritized and that DOJ's response

proper administration and enforcement of these laws." He criticized Kaul for not updating advice online since May 2021, and for posting few responses to public records requests on the DOJ website.

Kaul said the Office of Open Government "does an excellent job with the limited resources available," but that more resources would allow it to respond more quickly. He highlighted the office's efforts to provide guidance on open meetings law challenges during the early days of the pandemic and for parsing the effects of Marsy's Law on public records access.

The candidates also commented

times to public records requests have increased sharply during Kaul's tenure.

Both candidates cited the need for more funding. Toney wrote that he would "apply sufficient resources and prioritize the

on two recent state Supreme Court decisions involving the public records law.

In the first case, *Friends of Frame Park v. City of Waukesha*, the court in a 4-3 ruling changed the standard for when requesters can recover attorney's fees in lawsuits over access to public records. The decision makes it easier for government authorities to avoid paying a requester's attorney's fees by voluntarily releasing the requested records after a lawsuit is filed.

Both candidates expressed concern about the ruling, which Kaul said "removed a key check on unnecessary delays in public records compliance, undermines transparency in government and, in many cases, could make obtaining records cost-prohibitive."

Toney said he would work with the Legislature to address the issues raised by the decision, saying "legal maneuvering by well-funded government lawyers should not absolve members of the public from remedies for violations of public records law."

In the other case, *Wisconsin Man-*

ufacturers and Commerce v. Evers, the state Supreme Court held 4-3 that business groups are not entitled to challenge the Wisconsin Department of Health Services' decision to release data regarding employers linked to COVID-19 outbreaks. WMC and other trade associations had sued to block disclosure of this data, which the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel requested.

Kaul said he agreed with the decision, which he described as a "straight-forward application of the relevant statutory language." Toney, echoing the dissenting justices, said the case raised serious privacy issues and suggested there may be "instances where third parties must be able to intervene" in records cases, although this ability "shouldn't automatically be presumed."

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may submit a request to vote an absentee ballot to their municipal clerk. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen who:

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may make written application to your municipal clerk for an absentee ballot in person, by mail, by fax, by email or at MyVote.wi.gov.

Your written request must include:

1. your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote
2. the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different from the address above
3. your signature
4. a copy of your photo identification*

Highway: The highway budget anticipates \$1,152,469 of equipment purchases in 2023, which will be funded by highway depreciation charges of \$737,469 and county sales tax of \$415,000.

Health & Human Services: The Health & Human Services budget applies \$769,472 of their fund balance to reduce the department's 2023 tax levy request to \$3,949,376.

Capital Projects: Capital project purchases for 2023 amount to \$1,531,077, including \$465,000 for computer and related equipment, \$40,000 for various repairs at the Beyer Home Museum, \$180,000 for various courthouse projects, \$149,077 for F&P dump truck, \$185,000 for F&P backhoe, \$102,000 for other F&P projects, \$300,000 for sheriff vehicle replacement, \$10,000 for resource grade GPS, and \$100,000 for vehicle leases.

Debt Service: The \$1,778,000 debt payment in 2023 will be funded by the county sales tax fund in the amount of \$472,311 and the county debt levy in the amount of \$1,305,689.

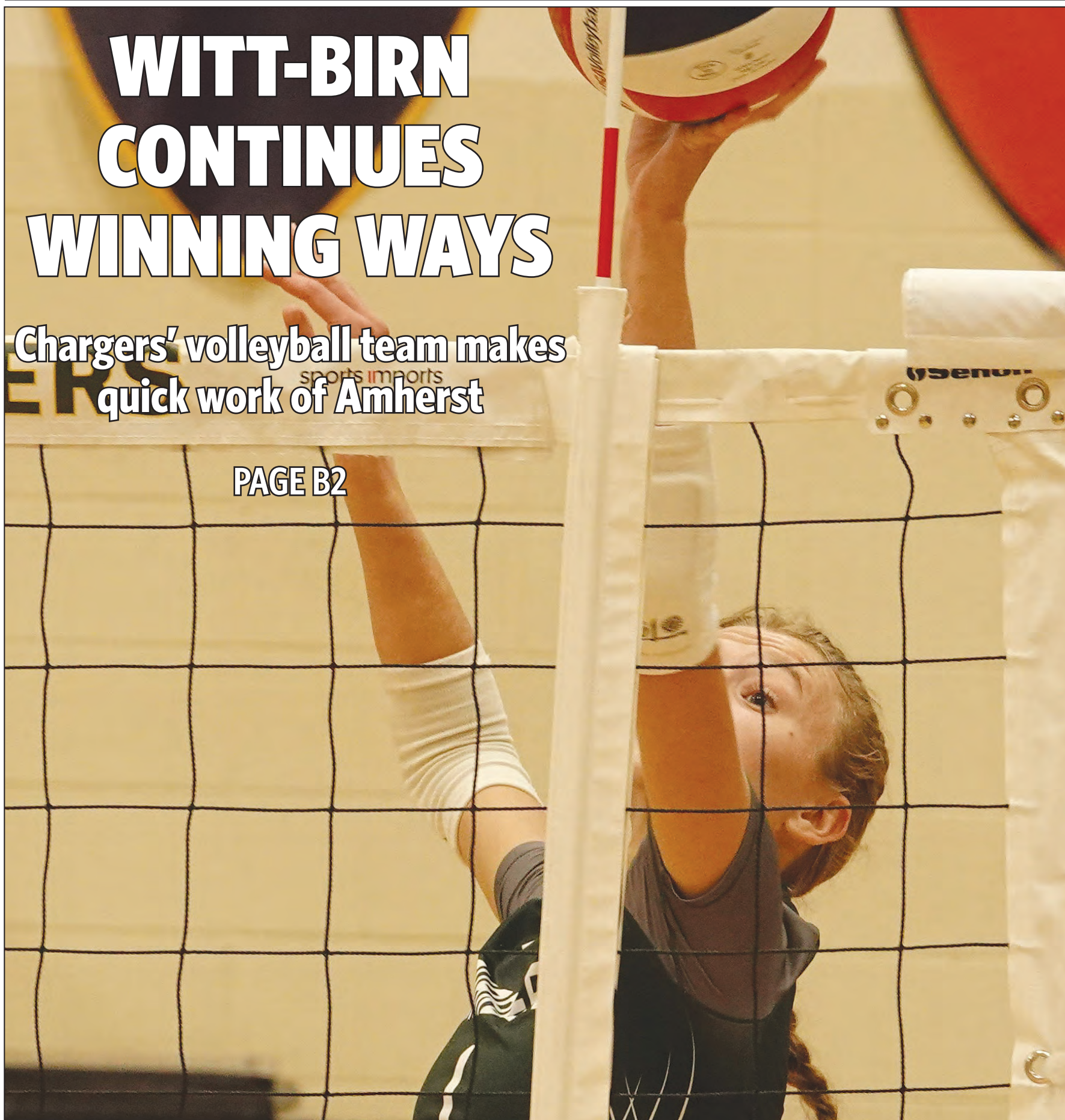

Witt-Birn cruises past Amherst

Chargers take control early, rarely let off

A Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division volleyball match between Wittenberg-Birnamwood and Amherst looked to be a good one on paper.

Witt-Birn had other plans though, controlling the match right from the start and rolling to a 25-16, 25-15, 25-16 victory on Oct. 4 in Wittenberg.

The Chargers were guided by the powerful lefty-swinging London Metropulos, who delivered the kill after kill. But it wasn't just a one-player show, as Reese Rogowski, Payton Foster and Layla Huffman also provided big kills. Foster and Lilly Betry set the attackers up all night, while Allison Linke and Kiara Deruchowski joined in to provide great coverage on defense.

In other words, Witt-Birn dominated as a team.

"It felt really good," said Metropulos. "We were kind of nervous for this game because we had two more games that we got to play our best at. I think our communication was super good tonight and that helped, it was a little quieter too, so that helped so we could all hear each other. That really pulled us through to the end, communicating the whole way through and calling out plays."

"We talked a lot. We kind of just took control of the game from the beginning," said Foster. "We were hustling and moving for every ball."

Metropulos delivered several kills early on to help the Chargers jump out to a comfortable lead. Huffman added a couple kills to stretch the lead to 12-7.

Witt-Birn took complete control with a 7-0 run as Rogowski served. Metropulos added a couple more kills on the run and several other points came on Amherst attack errors.

Metropulos continued to rack up the points for the Chargers before ending the set with another kill.

"I've been focusing on placing a lot more and just getting that top spin right down so it just drops real quick," said Metropulos on what helped her to a big night.

Amherst won the first point in set two for a rare lead, but Witt-Birn stormed back with six unanswered points, with Betry serving four aces on the run. Rogowski later delivered a kill to help the Chargers go up 9-3.

Amherst chipped away at the deficit, but kills from Foster, Huffman and Rogowski got the hosts back on track. The visiting Falcons later got within two before Metropulos had two kills to restore order.

Metropulos had two more kills, with Melaina Granquist and Foster following with a kill each to make it a 21-13 Witt-Birn lead. The Chargers ended the set on a 4-0 spurt, with a Foster tip finishing it off.

"We have been playing really good recently," said Foster. "At practice, we're just practicing hard and making sure we keep improving on what we're working on."

Set three was a bit of a struggle early on for Witt-Birn, as the team fell behind 5-1. The Chargers responded with a 5-0 run behind more strong serving from Betry.

The hosts looked to be in control with Rogowski serving and after a couple Metropulos kills made it 16-12, but Amherst rattled off the next few points to tie it up.

After a timeout, Witt-Birn scored nine unanswered points to finish off the match. Betry served four more aces and Metropulos added a few more kills to her stat line to help the hosts finish things off.

With the win, the Chargers won at least a share of the CWC-East title. Witt-Birn can win the conference outright with a win at Weyauwega-Fremont on Oct. 11. Results from that match will appear in the Oct. 21 paper, but can be found online at www.newmedia-wi.com before that.

Shawano scores big Bay win over Seymour

Hawks' freshman Nordin helps team win on senior night

The Shawano Community High School volleyball team earned a big Bay Conference win over Seymour on Oct. 6 in Shawano.

The Hawks won by scores of 25-18, 18-25, 25-19, 25-18 on their senior night. The team honored Megan Dillenburg and Alix Heath by winning against Seymour for the first time since the duo were freshmen.

"It really means a lot," said Dillenburg of the win. "We knew they were going to be a tough team. We really came out and played as a team — we played really good together. It just means a lot to win on senior night."

While the night was about the seniors, Shawano freshman Leah Nordin stole part of the spotlight after racking up kill after kill. She said the team was deploying a 5-1 rotation for the first time, and singled out the passing of Heath, the team's primary setter.

"I'm going to be setting my middles a lot more because they are definitely some of the best hitters we have on our team," said Heath of the new rotation. "Even if we have a double block (to go against), no matter what they always get a kill and know where to place the ball. We definitely had good passes and good hits. All together, pass, set, hit, it was a good game."

Shawano jumped out to an early lead in set one before Seymour eventually tied it at six. A kill from Amelia Klement followed by some strong serves and aces from Coral Cook helped the Hawks go up 11-6.

The teams battled back and forth over the next several points, with kills from Dillenburg and Cook keeping Shawano ahead before Nordin and Cook had kills to push the lead to six, 18-12. The Hawks extended the lead to nine as Cook served before finishing off the set.

Set two began fine for Shawano, with Cook, Nordin, Ellie Huebner and Abby Bystol recording kills, but Seymour used a 9-0 run to take

control. The Hawks continued to fight and got back into the match

after four straight Seymour errors as Dillenburg was serving.

Cook and Nordin delivered kills — with Nordin tallying three straight — to get Shawano back within three, 20-17. Just when it looked like Shawano may pull off the big comeback in the set, Seymour won five of the final six points to even the match up.

Set three started slow for Shawano, with the team down 6-2, but a kill from Nordin capped a 5-0 Hawks' run and gave the hosts the lead. The back-and-forth battle continued with Seymour pulling ahead, only to have Shawano go on another 5-0 run as Cook served and Nordin delivered multiple kills.

Shawano didn't relinquish the lead from that point, with Bystol heating up with several kills, Dillenburg adding a couple kills and Sam Richter serving an ace to make it a 19-13 lead. Seymour got within three points late, but kills from Cook, Nordin and Bystol helped wrap up the set.

"It was just overall a really good night," said Nordin. "We had a lot of good digs, a lot of good hits, a lot of good tips, we had really good coverage, especially on blocking."

Bystol and Nordin posted a couple kills early on in set four to help the Hawks out to an early lead. Later, a block by Nordin and kill from Coral made it 10-4 and led to an early Seymour timeout.

Shawano didn't let up after the short break in action and soon led 15-5. Nordin and Dillenburg had kills on the 5-0 run, with Cook again providing strong serving.

Seymour got within five, 18-13, but strong serves from Bystol pushed the lead back to eight and forced Seymour to burn its last timeout. The visitors snuck back within five again, but three kills from Nordin set up a match-sealing kill from Dillenburg.

"Don't stop pushing," said Dillenburg on what the team can take away from the big conference win. "Even though we lost that second set, we came back strong in the third set and won in the fourth set. It's not over until it's over."

Shawano has one final conference match remaining, as the team will head to Xavier (undefeated in conference) on Oct. 11. The Hawks then have the conference tournament on Oct. 15 in Green Bay before the postseason starts up.

After a false start moved the ball back to the Bears' 26-yard line, junior quarterback Noah Weier found senior Gaven Vance wide open down the middle of the field for a 74-yard touchdown.

"We knew coming in that they were gonna be in cover 3, so I just had to pick whichever one was open of the two," said Weier. "That's just good gameplanning by coaches. Good route by Gaven. I didn't have to do much for that to be a touchdown. When you can get those easy ones to start, it makes the rest of the game a lot easier."

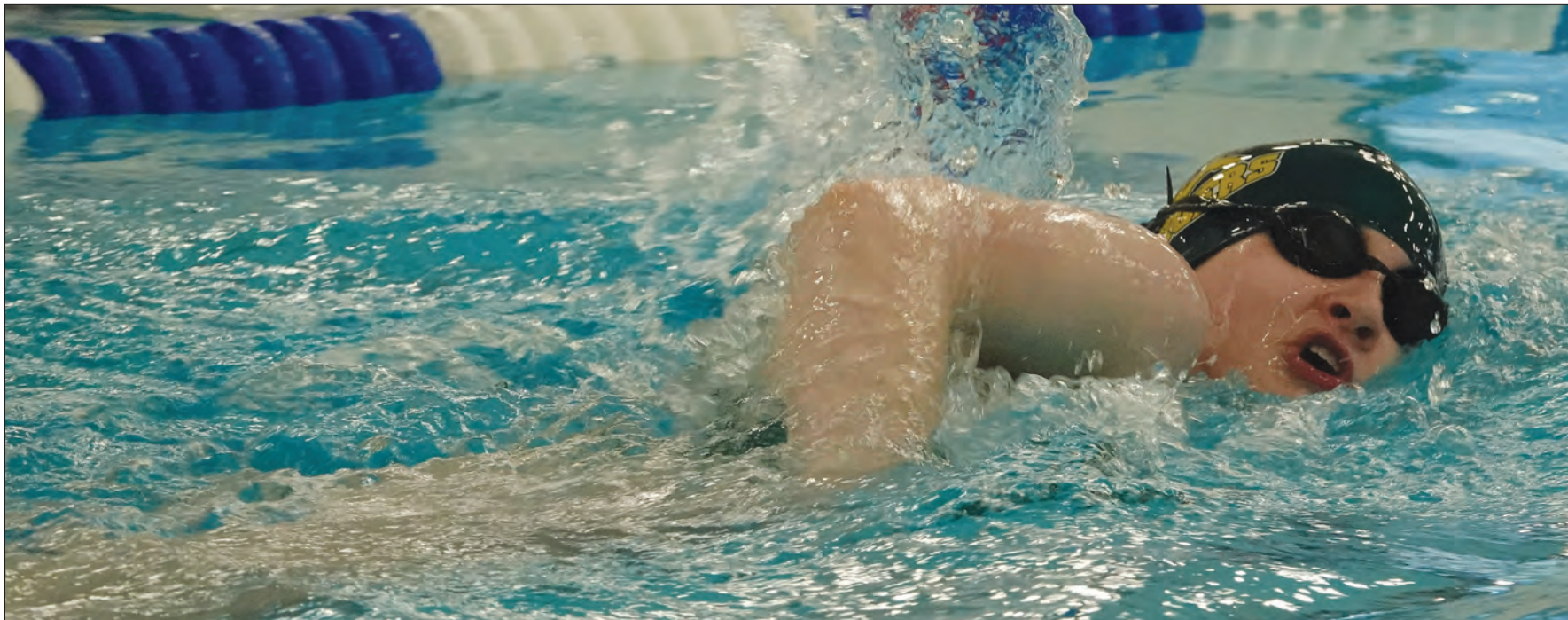

Oconto Falls suffers overtime loss to Crandon

Loss on senior night puts season in sudden death

A 30-22 overtime loss against the Crandon Cardinals on Oct. 7 puts the Oconto Falls Panthers football team into sudden death to keep its season alive.

After Oconto Falls built a 22-14 lead with just under eight minutes left, Crandon came back, scoring the last 16 points to win. Now sitting at 4-5 on the season, the Panthers need to win their next matchup against Crivitz to keep their season alive and qualify for a playoff spot.

"This is my 15th year coaching and being in the playoffs, you do what you do and you are who you are in week nine," said Oconto Falls head coach Nick Bohl, on preparing for the last game of the year. "Your preparation and routine stays the same. You are not going to do anything crazy because it is now playoffs."

Running was the name of the game for both teams, as Crandon racked up 319 yards on the ground, led by Mason Mullins' 122-yard performance. Oconto Falls senior Braden Vandermoss led the Panthers with 81 rushing yards on seven attempts. Fellow senior Skylar Dalton added another 67 rushing yards on 21 attempts. In total, Oconto Falls recorded 261 yards on the ground.

The Panthers' defense started hot as they held Crandon to just eight plays on the first drive, ending with a stop on fourth-and-two.

From there, Oconto Falls took over at its own 43-yard line. Twenty-six rushing yards from Dalton and 17 receiving yards from senior Kody Vorpahl set up a fourth-and-goal from the 8-yard line. The Cardinals' defense stepped up and sacked Oconto Falls quarterback Carter Hill on a pass attempt, turning the ball over.

Oconto Falls then almost immediately regained possession, as Crandon fumbled at its own 26-yard line.

Dalton set up a a third-and-short

with two straight rushes for eight yards to end the first quarter. A false start set the Panthers back, before Hill was once again sacked in the red zone and after an incomplete pass on fourth down, the Cardinals took back over at it's own 29.

The Panthers defense held the Cardinals to a punt, where after a bobbled snap, Oconto Falls was called for roughing the punter, giving Crandon 15 yards and a first down. From there, the Cardinals methodically worked their way down the field, with Caden Palubicki carrying the load, totaling 27 rushing yards. Tight end Kaleb Samz opened the scoring with a 5-yard receiving touchdown from quarterback Logan Gretzinger.

Oconto Falls immediately responded with a scoring drive, starting with a 20-yard rush from sophomore Wyatt Laughrin. Four plays later on third-and-12, Hill hit Vorpahl for a 26-yard gain to set up a first-and-goal from the 5-yard line.

Vandermoss punched in a 5-yard touchdown on the next play. Adding a 2-point conversion run from Dalton

put the Panthers up two with a just over a minute left in the first half. Crandon quickly struck back, going 81 yards in 1:06, finishing with a Palubicki 3-yard rushing touchdown.

Opening the second half down 14-8, Oconto Falls first drive consisted of nine straight rushes, with a 26-yard rush from Vandermoss being the highlight. Dalton ultimately capped the drive with a 4-yard rushing touchdown, followed by a Laughrin 2-point conversion.

Up 16-14, the Panthers forced a turnover on downs on the Crandon's 9-yard line. After an offsides against Crandon, Vandermoss ripped off a 60-yard rush, before Dalton fumbled on the very next play, giving the ball back to the Cardinals on their own 37-yard line. On the second play of the drive, Gretzinger was intercepted by sophomore Cole Bozile.

Badgers win Leonhard's debut, topping Northwestern

Mertz tosses 5 TDs

The nerves that hit Jim Leonhard during the week as he prepared for his first game following longtime boss Paul Chryst's firing were long gone by the time game day rolled around.

He woke up feeling just fine. This made his day better.

Graham Mertz threw for a career-high 299 yards and matched a career high with five touchdowns, Chimere Dike set personal bests with 185 yards receiving and three TD catches, and Wisconsin dominated in interim coach Leonhard's first game, pounding struggling Northwestern 42-7 on Oct. 8 in Evanston, Illinois.

Braelon Allen added 135 yards rushing. He also threw a 23-yard touchdown late in the second quarter, and the Badgers (3-3, 1-2 Big Ten) raced out to a 28-0 halftime lead on the way to an easy win in their first game since Chryst was fired.

"There was a lot more nerves throughout the week than there was today," the 39-year-old Leonhard said.

"Game day is game day. I've been a part of a lot of these, obviously not in this role. This is the reward. You put in the work, you put in the time and you should have confidence when you step off that bus that you have the right plan, you have the right guys, you put them in position to have success."

Wisconsin decided to make a leadership change following losses by a combined 55 points to Ohio State and Illinois, led by former coach Bret Bielema. Chryst was let go in his eighth season and replaced by Leonhard, a former All-America safety in his sixth year as defensive coordinator and seventh on staff at his alma mater.

"I lost one of my best friends that I saw every day," said linebacker Nick Herbig, who spoke to Chryst on Oct. 7. "I miss that guy for sure. I know he was watching us."

Herbig wouldn't reveal much about his conversation with Chryst, though he said Leonhard had a message to the team.

"He told us it was still coach Chryst's team. We're playing for him," Herbig said.

Mertz completed 20 of 29 passes.

Dike had touchdown receptions of 52 and 21 yards in the first half as well

as a 6-yarder in the fourth quarter. He caught 10 passes and easily surpassed his previous high of 106 yards.

Wisconsin racked up 515 yards in all and finished with 193 on the ground after being held to 2 yards rushing on 24 carries for its lowest total since 2015.

Northwestern (1-5, 1-2 Big Ten) lost its fifth straight since opening with a win over Nebraska in Ireland. The Wildcats are 6-16 since beating Wisconsin at home in 2020 on the way to winning the Big Ten West.

Ryan Hilinski threw for 147 yards and was intercepted twice.

The Badgers missed a field goal on the game's opening drive, but they took control with touchdowns on their next two possessions.

Mertz capped a nine-play, 98-yard march when he hit a wide open Skyler Bell for a 15-yarder, and Wisconsin wasted little time adding to it.

Kamo'i Latu intercepted Hilinski near midfield. Three plays later, Dike caught a pass from Mertz over the middle to start the second quarter and outran several defenders for a 52-yard score.

Dike set up another touchdown with a 43-yard catch, this time hauling in a 21-yarder from Mertz midway

through the quarter to bump the lead to 21-0. Allen took a direct snap and threw a 23-yard TD to Chez Mellusi with just over two minutes left in the half to make it a 28-point game.

Northwestern had a chance to score just before the break, only to come away empty-handed when Jack Olsen missed a 21-yarder on his first attempt this season as time expired.

The Wildcats converted a fourth-and-1 at the 4 in the final minute and threw two incompletions before coach Pat Fitzgerald opted to go for the field goal with two seconds remaining and the ball on the 3. Fans booed and they weren't happy, either, when the kick went wide left.

Dort hurt

Leonhard said defensive back Cedric Dort was feeling "much better" after being taken from the field on a cart early in the third.

Dort hit his head on the ground and stayed motionless for several minutes after breaking up a pass early.

He eventually sat up, and teammates surrounded him before he was carted off the field.

Cheddar, more at heart of Belle Plaine Cheese

Brandls have owned company for 50 years, selling 80 different flavors of Wisconsin cheese

This year marks the 50th anniversary of Don and Diane Brandl's ownership of the Belle Plaine Cheese Factory.

The cheese factory originally began in 1894 when 13 farmers created a co-op, and changed hands several times over the years. In 1972, the Brandls took over the business.

Before purchasing the cheese factory, Don Brandl was already an experienced cheese maker, helping his father-in-law make cheese and worked at a different cheese factory when he was 18 years old.

"I took it over and it flourished. The equipment was all in here but I improved on the equipment. I had to put trucks on the road and keep the trucks updated," Brandl said.

At the time of the purchase, Diane was pregnant with her fourth daughter, eventually adding on a fifth a few years later. The factory had living quarters, and for a time the family lived there.

"The living quarters were quite small," Brandl said. "We added on two rooms to make room for the family. After 10 years, we built a new home just south of the factory."

As a family of seven, the business was a family affair. The daughters all helped their parents from time to time at the factory.

"Over the course of the 50 years, the five of us girls helped out wherever was needed," said Darcy Stempa, Brandl's daughter.

Brandl added: "They had to fill in when we were short of help."

The Belle Plaine Cheese Factory would make its own cheese onsite. At its height, they made over 10,000 pounds of cheese each day.

"There were approximately 50 farmers shipping their milk here," Brandl said. "We made cheese for a little over 28 years here. Mostly colby, monterey jack and pepperjack. We could be thankful, though, that we had smaller farmers back in the years otherwise it wouldn't be possible that we would have been making cheese. Thanks to the farmers we were able to carry on the business of making cheese."

Eventually the decision was made

to stop cheese production and focus specifically on retail, in the hopes that it would be less labor intensive. In doing so, the Brandls were able to expand and offer their customers more flavors of cheese.

"I had to have something to do," Brandl said in regards to his semi-retirement. "We developed these flavor cheeses over the years so now it's gotten into quite a variety of cheeses. It would be pretty hard to make all of the varieties in one place."

The family is proud to offer cheese from all over Wisconsin and still packages some of the cheese for sale.

"We get it from all quality chee-

semakers around Wisconsin. It's strictly Wisconsin cheese," Stempa said.

The Brandls also age their own cheese.

"Every day is a challenge," Brandl said. "We are the only cheese store outside of the grocery store in the area."

Customers who visit now will not only enjoy the 80 different flavors of cheese, but also the antiques and memorabilia that are for sale. Collecting North American taxidermied animals became a hobby of Brandl's, and customers can now peruse the onsite museum while shopping.

"Time goes by quickly when you

love what you're doing and you enjoy what you do," Brandl said. "We thank the many cheese customers over the years who have supported us. If it wouldn't be for the farmers, we wouldn't have cheese or a cheese factory. I wouldn't have the opportunity to have a career in the cheese industry."

The factory is located at N3473 Wisconsin Ave. in the Town of Belle Plaine. Signs are located off of state Highway 22 providing direction to the store. Cheese can be ordered and shipped April through November. It is open Monday through Friday 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Saturday 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. For information, call 715-526-2789.

Belle Plaine farm celebrates sesquicentennial

Retzlaffs keep dairy operation all in the family as they've kept agriculture tradition alive

Retzlaff Century Farms, owned by Nathan and Tajia Retzlaff, is celebrating its sesquicentennial anniversary this year in the Town of Belle Plaine.

However, the dairy farm has actually been in operation and owned within the family for 159 years. A true family operation in every sense, the Retzlaffs are assisted by their young children, Raymond and Oliver.

During the Lincoln Administration in 1863, ancestor Carl Retzlaff purchased the farm of 80 acres from Hannah Wescott. Over the years, the family farm has been passed on through the generations and has significantly expanded and changed.

A recent addition has been the family's switch to a new free stall barn.

"We took over and we were still in the tie stall barn," Tajia Retzlaff said. "Then we bought the majority of the neighbor's herd. We didn't have to buy a lot of cows to fill the free

stall barn. Now we're done. No more expansion."

Now the Retzlaffs own 340 acres and rent over 200 more, farming hay, corn and wheat. However, the main focus is the cows.

"It's always been dairy," Tajia Retzlaff said. "We are currently milking 216 today. We milk three times a day."

The Retzlaffs do a lot to ensure their cows are well taken care of. As Tajia Retzlaff said, "they're pets."

Proper nutrition, illness management and consistent care are crucial in a farm of this size. However, most notable is the family's approach to daily operations.

"We're hands on," Nathan Retzlaff said. "That's the way we've always been. That's how we lasted 160 years."

Their two sons are also a large help in this regard, especially since they are so interested and involved in many aspects of the farm's day-to-day operations. While their parents are the sixth generation to own the farm, one day the ownership will be passed on to the

seventh generation. In many ways, the sons are training for that time.

"You're always farming for the next generation," Tajia Retzlaff said. "Everybody has their set chore and to make sure it's completed by the end of the day even though they are in school. They come home and do their chores. Raymond likes pigs more. Oliver likes cows. They do 4-H. They do sports. They want to participate in dairy judging. We definitely are in an area where it takes a tribe to raise a family."

Grandparents, extended family and a crew of full-time and part-time workers help as well. Even neighborhood children looking to gain experience working with the cows have been known to lend a hand on a part-time basis.

Unsurprisingly, over the years many challenges have faced the family farm.

"We had a barn fire where we lost our cows and quite a few calves in February of 2019," Tajia Retzlaff said.

"We have one survivor."

For Nathan Retzlaff, there are sacrifices one has to make to keep the farm going. When hundreds of cows need to be milked several times a day, it is difficult for him to be able to find time to participate in activities that are most important, such as attending his son's sports games. Farm management can also be a challenge.

"You can't start from scratch anymore. I can't believe how hard it is to find workers," Nathan Retzlaff said. "Everything's getting more expensive. It's changed so much."

However, the farm and cows remain incredibly important to the family. Ensuring the success of the farm today, ensures success of the farm for their sons and future generations. Despite the challenges and difficulties, there are other benefits. The farm serves as a gathering place for extended family and friends.

"There's one thing that's pretty cool about it," Nathan Retzlaff said. "Everyone comes back to the farm."

Thorpe's memory still carries lightning

Jim Thorpe's Sac and Fox name was Wa-tho-Huk. Although the English translations of his tribal name vary, "Path Lit by Lightning" is the most poetic way to describe the moniker given

to the child born during a thunderstorm. Nearly 70 years after Thorpe's death in 1953, his latest biographer David Maraniss employed that poetic translation as the title of his lauded new book on "the greatest athlete who ever lived."

Maraniss knows how to recognize a good story. The two-time Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist is the author of "When Pride Still Mattered," the definitive biography of Green Bay Packers coach Vince Lombardi that served as the basis for the famed Broadway production.

Yet, Maraniss wrote that in 2003, he balked when Oneida Nation of Wisconsin tribal member Norbert Hill Jr. told him to write a biography of Jim Thorpe. Maraniss explained that he had other books planned, but because of Hill, a seed had been planted. "Four years ago, my interest in Jim Thorpe sprouted into obsession."

Last month, Maraniss, a Madison native, thanked Hill before a crowd of over 320 people gathered at the Rock Garden Supper Club in Green Bay. The evening's program served as the kick-off event for the Brown County Library's Local History Series, drawing sponsorship from Wisconsin's own Oneida Nation and the Green Bay Packers.

Thorpe's ties to Wisconsin predate his birth. While he was a member of the Sac and Fox tribe of Oklahoma through the paternal enrollment practices at his birth in 1887, he had a higher Native American blood quantum from his mother. Charlette Thorpe was Potawatomi, Menominee and Kickapoo, the former two being tribes who remain on a portion of their ancestral land in the Badger State.

Thorpe's football hero was also from Wisconsin. When Thorpe was 11 years old, he attended the Haskell Institute, a boarding school in Lawrence, Kansas, where he met an Oneida Nation member who inspired him. Maraniss quotes Thorpe's admiration: "An Indian by the name of Chauncey Archiquette on the regular Haskell squad was my football idol, and in our scrub games with the homemade football, I always tried to emulate him."

Even though Maraniss's text is framed by Thorpe's success in sports, he told those who

came to his lecture that Thorpe afforded him "the chance to illuminate the Native American experience through obstacles in his life." He added that Thorpe's alma mater, the Carlisle Indian Industrial School in Pennsylvania, "is the heart of my book."

While at Carlisle in 1912, Thorpe had what Maraniss called the greatest single year any American athlete has ever had. That summer witnessed Thorpe winning gold medals in the Olympics in the pentathlon and decathlon in Stockholm, Sweden, beating his opponents by "a larger point amount than anyone before or since." Thorpe also served as the captain for the Carlisle football team that fall. In a time when athletes played both offense and defense, Carlisle's team earned a 12-1-1 record, outscoring opponents 454 to 120 en route to leading the nation in scoring.

Thorpe was famously stripped of his Olympic glory

after the nation's media realized he was previously paid to play minor league baseball using his own name, thereby disqualifying him from

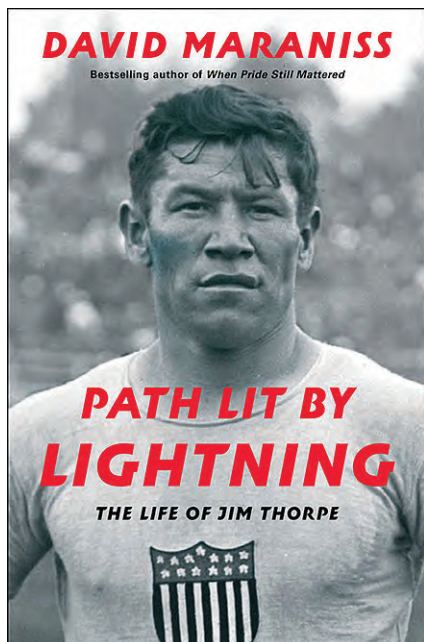
the amateur status required to compete in the games. Maraniss explained this was an injustice as the entire Swedish Olympic team was paid, as were numerous "amateur" athletes in the minor leagues who used aliases in what was called "the Pocahontas league," because so many people were called John Smith. Thorpe's medals and records were posthumously restored this past July.

Thorpe went on to play for both Major League Baseball and the upstart American Professional Football Association. He served as the first president of the latter, and Maraniss noted that Thorpe lending his world-famous name was essential to the success of what was later rebranded as the National Football League.

Maraniss noted that Thorpe's greatness was unparalleled. In 1950, he was recognized by the Associated Press as the "Greatest Athlete of the Half-Century," with Babe Ruth coming in a distant second. In 1963, Thorpe was an inaugural member of the NFL Hall of Fame.

After the event ended, I asked Hill what he thought of Maraniss's presentation. He responded: "There were 50 Oneidas in that room, and all of them stood up a little bit taller after hearing what he said."

As Maraniss proved, Wa-tho-Huk's memory still carries some lightning.

As the third child in a big farm family, my birthday was really the only day of the year when I felt special. This naturally made me overly partial to October. I liked picking hickory nuts a heckuva lot better than picking rocks. Raking leaves into huge piles to play in was a lot more fun than cutting the lawn with a push mower or pulling weeds in the garden.

I also liked the slower pace of late October on the farm. By Halloween, the harvest was in, the butchering done, the fruits and vegetables canned and frozen. Even as a young girl, I felt a deep satisfaction in knowing we were ready for winter.

A special bonus was that my folks finally had a chance to spend what they now call quality time with us, especially on Sunday afternoons when we went for rides to visit the relatives.

Now that I live in the Northwoods, October has a special charm all of its own. Gone is the high humidity that breeds yucky mold and stinky mildew. No more gnats to swallow, mosquitoes to repel, deer flies to swat away, hornets and wasps to outrun, and no more disposing of dead ants that expire from a lethal sugar orgy in my hummingbird feeder. All are replaced by the invigorating sights and smells of fall. Even breathing is easier, because the air has a crisp quality that sanitizes body and soul.

OK; nothing is perfect. October does come with a lot of work, especially if you live on a lake. Over the years, Jon and I have settled into a relatively reasonable division of labor. I tidy up the garden; Jon splits

and stacks the firewood. I rake the leaves; he brings in the dock. I put away the lawn furniture; he winterizes the boat. I pack up the lawn ornaments; he watches football. I wash the windows; he watches Westerns. I give the house a deep cleaning; he goes fishing at his cabin in Vilas County. Like I said, nothing's perfect.

October is a bittersweet month, a time for lasts. One last visit from the kids; we won't see them again until the holidays. One last chance to wear shorts, T-shirts and summer sandals — soon to be replaced by bulky sweaters and sensible boots. One last session in the porch swing; one last pontoon boat ride around the lake; one last cocktail on the deck on that last lovely bonus day we always get. Knowing these are lasts, I take the time to savor them, so it's all good.

On the hunt for hunter ed instructors

While teaching hunter safety in Waupaca with another instructor Oct. 1, something magical happened.

A boy about 12 ran excitedly toward the parking lot of the church, where fellow instructor Chris Hazen and I were teaching a group at our tree stand safety station.

"Dad, I passed!" the boy yelled as he approached his dad's car.

I caught my breath and felt my eyes getting ready for tears. I didn't want to embarrass myself in front of this group of kids, so I pinched them back.

There's no payment for the hundreds of volunteer instructors who share their time and talents in order to help new hunters, trappers, bowhunters and ATV riders learn the safe and legal way to do things, but the rewards are enormous.

I've taught hunter education since 1987, first in Iowa, then in Wisconsin. Our current group, headed by Paul Pienckowski, has taught more students than almost any other group in the state and has won several awards for our efforts. We've had classes as large as 130 students, thanks to our dedicated group of more than 20 teachers.

While every instructor has to give up a few weekends a year, especially during bow season, seeing a young boy or girl pass their field test is always worth the effort.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources hopes to recruit more outdoor education instructors because of a decline in these volunteers statewide, which in turn makes it more difficult for young hunters to get their credentials for hunting on their own.

It's no secret that hunting has been losing participants nationwide in recent years. Youngsters have school sports, video games and dozens of other distractions. Add in more single-parent families (many of whom never learned to hunt) and older hunters leaving the sport, and you have a recipe for declining numbers.

Although hunter numbers briefly shot up during the COVID-19 pandemic, in part because more people found themselves looking for

outdoor activities and also because there was more need for economical ways of feeding families, hunting license sales have begun to decline again. And there are fewer volunteers nationwide and Wisconsin is following the pattern, said Ashley Van Egtern, the DNR's hunter education program specialist.

Van Egtern, essentially the assistant administrator for the state's hunter safety program, has worked closely for many years with administrator Jon King, who left on June 28. She was preparing last year's program report and noticed the decline in instructors, which was accelerated by the pandemic (for a brief period, there were no in-person hunter ed classes and even those under age 18 were permitted to take online classes alone to satisfy their mandated education in order to hunt alone).

Instructor numbers declined 19% from 2020 to 2021, with about 2,600 active volunteers. Last year, 28,243 students statewide were certified through 315 traditional, 165 internet field day, 31 archery and 12 online-only classes. The number of students has actually risen in recent years, from 21,893 in 2019 and

25,425 in 2020, according to the 2021 report.

"In terms of volunteer instructor recruitment, this is the first year that we've joined forces with our Office of Communications and launched an instructor recruitment campaign that involves social media, GovDelivery email marketing, our Outdoor Skills Trailers and the actual instructors themselves," Van Egtern said.

In addition to the personal rewards of seeing a youngster's beaming face when they pass a class, volunteers feel pride in the huge contribution they collectively make to a safe hunt.

In 1966, there were 264 Wisconsin hunting accidents. The state launched a voluntary hunter ed program in 1967, which became mandatory in 1985 for those born Jan. 1, 1973, or after. Blaze orange was mandated in 1980 (blaze pink is now also legal).

Hunting accidents have dropped by more than 95% since the mandate, with 12 accidents (including one fatality) in 2021. Hunting is statistically one of the safest of all sports.

As of March 1, all students ages

17 and younger must attend an in-person course (either a traditional class or an internet class with a field day) in order to be certified to hunt alone. Virtually anyone at any age (there is no minimum age) may hunt as a mentor with a licensed hunter (search "mentor hunting" on the DNR website for details).

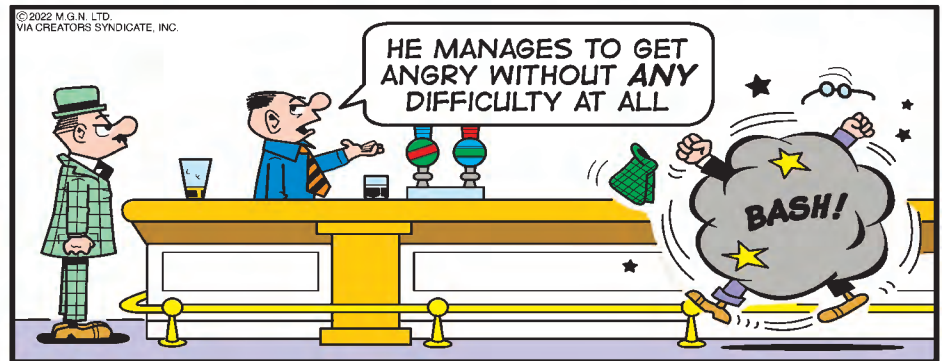
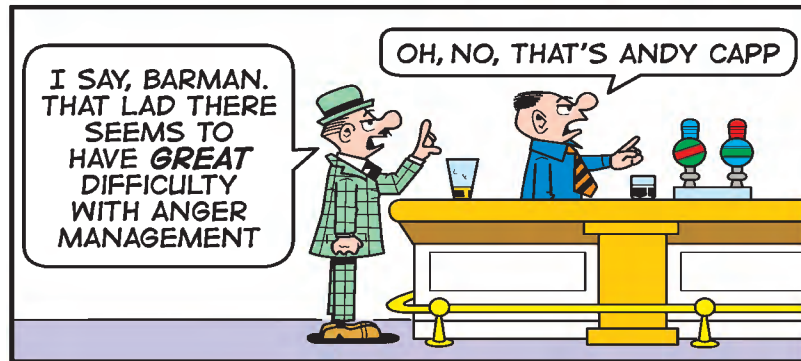
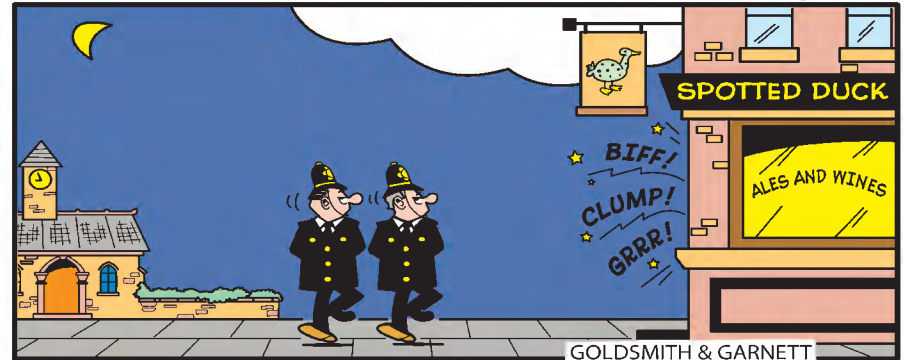
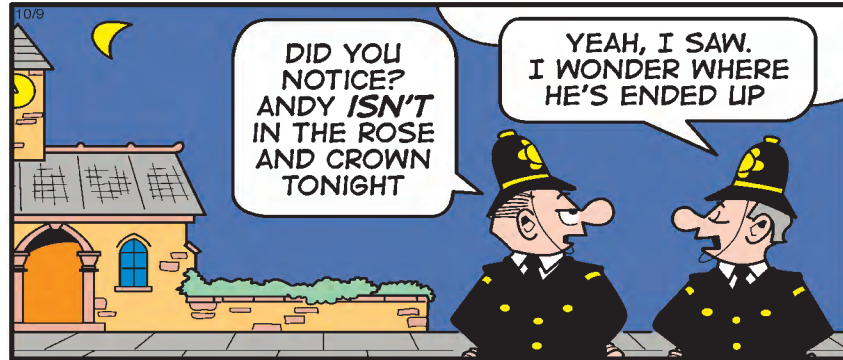
The recruitment goal is to get 450 new instructors this year, with a long-term goal to add about 700 a year. The DNR provides regular training classes for both new and existing instructors, as well as equipment for classes, including "action sets," which are non-firing firearms.

Instructors get regular incentive gifts for milestone anniversaries, and can also win recognition and gifts through the Wisconsin Hunter Education Instructor Association, but the real reward is the satisfaction of helping new hunters join our satisfying and historic sport.

Rodgers, Smith not worried about record

Run defense and running game among areas that need improvement

After a loss to the New York Giants in London in week five, the Green Bay Packers currently sit with a 3-2 record, good for second place in the NFC North.

Out of the three wins for the Packers on the season, only one has come by more than three points. While this may raise the alarm for some fans, that may need to be how Green Bay wins this season. That of course is not a bad thing, as it can be very hard to win games in the NFL.

The Giants are not a bad team by any means, as they now sport a 4-1 record heading into a week six matchup with the Baltimore Ravens. Still, the Giants were down three wide receivers and a starting defensive lineman in the week five matchup. Starting quarterback Daniel Jones was also nursing an ankle injury.

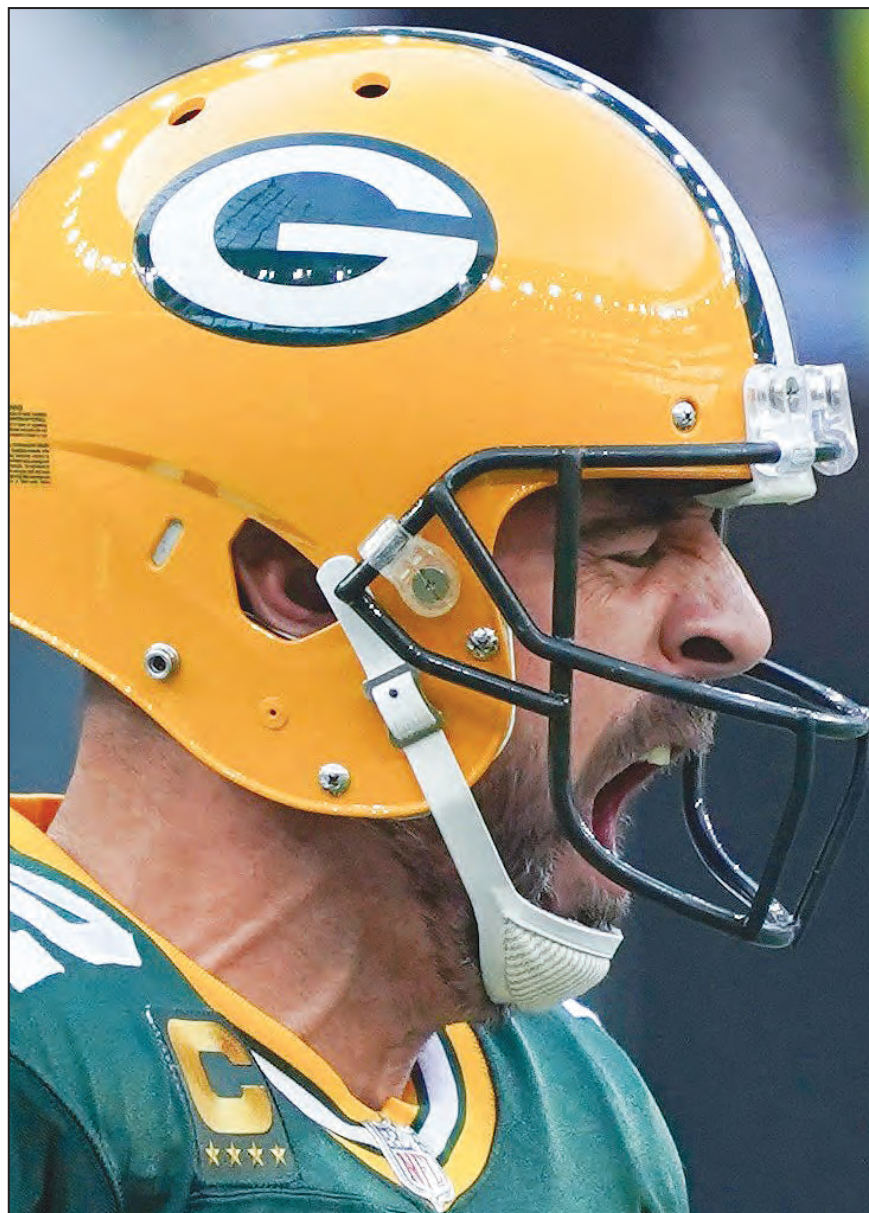
So how did a team, being down three offensive weapons, a defensive tackle and using an injured quarterback beat the Packers, who on paper look like one of the better teams in the NFL?

Linebacker Preston Smith pointed to too many mistakes costing the Packers in their week five loss.

"I feel like we were playing pretty well overall," said Smith. "We are making too many mistakes that a lot of teams are capitalizing on."

A sore point for the Packers' defense this year has been their inability to properly stop other teams' run games. On the season, the Packers are giving up an average of 126.4 rushing yards per game. This was something that the Giants were able to exploit, as their star running back Saquon Barkley led the way with 70 yards on 13 attempts, and the Giants totaled 125 yards on the ground.

"There's a lot of mistakes we made, a lot of things we could have did better and a lot of plays we wish we had back," said Smith. "The result is the result. We just got to make sure we're critical of ourselves when we watch the film — critical of the mistakes we made, fix those mistakes, move forward with a positive attitude and an at-

titude that we are going to attack next week and make sure we don't make those mistakes again."

The rushing defense hasn't been the only thing that has needed improvement, as the offense as a whole has seemingly underperformed to start the season.

In the three wins this season, Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon have combined for at least 24 rushes. In their two losses, the running back duo have totaled just 15 and 19 rushes. It has become obvious that Green Bay needs its run game to get going, something that was not very apparent in week five, as the two totaled a combined 19 rushing attempts, with Dillon having just six.

While having two games of less than 20 rushing attempts for Dillon and Jones, losing two of the first five games and giving up 126.4 yards per game causes the alarm to begin to sound, Packers players and coaches are not worried about the remainder of the season.

"I really feel like we still got a lot of potential," said Smith. "We still have a lot left in front of us. We don't feel like we've played a complete game as a team yet. There's a lot of things we can work on to get better, move forward, to get to that caliber team we're known for being, to play at a high level and make sure that we don't make a lot of mistakes where other

teams can capitalize."

Though it seems like Green Bay has yet to fully put together a 60-minute win, there are a lot of positives to build off of for the the next 12 games.

Rashan Gary recorded another sack against the Giants, pushing his total to five on the season, good enough for a tie for sixth in the NFL.

When given the ball, Jones has once again proved to be one of the best runners this season, recording a 6.4 yards per carry average.

Finally, punter Pat O'Donnell has downed 12 punts inside of the 20-yard line in 2022. O'Donnell has punted just 21 times this season.

The Packers also have their next two matchups against the New York Jets and the Washington Commanders, who have a combined record of 4-6. If there was any opportunity to correct mistakes, it is in either of the next two games, before a week eight matchup against the Buffalo Bills.

"I'd feel better at 4-1 for sure," said quarterback Aaron Rodgers. "We got to handle adversity a little bit better. We're a little bit of a roller coaster team at times. Our best teams have been a little bit more steady. We got to find that rhythm, that steadiness."

With new faces all over the Packers team, Rodgers said that there is still an expectation to win games. With Green Bay possessing a 3-2 record, Rodgers said that there is a lot of season left for the Packers to build a playoff resume.

"There's a standard that we've played at for a long time. Just because the faces change doesn't mean that standard changes. That's a hard concept I think to grasp sometimes," said Rodgers.

"We hold ourselves to a really high standard. I hold myself to a high standard. We're just not quite there yet. So, I trust Matt (LaFleur) and the staff and the conversations we'll have this week that we'll clean some things up. This team — we're five weeks in, and there is plenty of football left. We can't squander any more games like this though because the season is going to be pretty tough."

KEYS TO THE GAME

The Green Bay Packers (3-2) will host the New York Jets (3-2) at noon Lambeau Field in Green Bay. FOX will televise the game.

History

There aren't many teams that own the all-time series lead over the Packers. The Jets are one of them. The Jets lead 8-5, but the Packers have won the last three, including 44-38 in overtime in 2018.

In the last game at Lambeau Field, the Packers won 31-24 on Sept. 14, 2014. The Packers trailed 21-3 early in the second quarter but Aaron Rodgers threw three touchdown passes — two to Randall Cobb sandwiched around an 80-yarder to Jordy Nelson.

Coaches

Green Bay — Matt LaFleur, 42-12, fourth season. New York — Robert Saleh, 7-15, second season.

When the Packers have the ball

The Jets are 16th in the NFL in points allowed with 23.6 per game. It is a unit with some obvious strengths and some obvious weaknesses.

First, the strength: The Jets are stingy and opportunistic. They rank fifth in the NFL with just 4 yards allowed per carry. After forgetting about the run last week against the Giants, LaFleur presumably will want to lean heavily on Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon this week.

New York's defense is a formidable roadblock to that plan. Having stopped the run, the Jets have taken advantage with seven interceptions, one off the NFL lead.

Now, the weakness: The Packers will go from facing one of the best third-down and red-zone defenses to one of the worst. The Jets are 28th on third down (48.4% conversions) and 26th in the red zone (68.8% touchdowns). Is Green Bay, which ranks 22nd in scoring and hasn't played more than one quality half in any game, good enough to

take advantage, though?

The Jets operate out of a base 4-3 alignment. They have a strong line with Carl Lawson and John Franklin-Myers on the edges and Sheldon Rankins and Quinnen Williams as the tackles. Williams, the third pick of the 2019 draft, has a team-high three sacks.

Lawson, who suffered a torn Achilles at Green Bay during last year's joint practices, has 2½ sacks and is second in the NFL with 14 quarterback hits. Jermaine Johnson, the 26th pick of this year's draft, is the next man up at end and has 1½ sacks.

The linebackers are Quincy Williams, C.J. Mosley and Kwon Williams. Mosley has a team-high 51 tackles and Alexander is second with 29. They have not been factors as pass rushers (zero sacks) or in coverage (Mosley has one pass defended).

The cornerbacks are first-round pick Sauce Gardner and D.J. Reed, the safeties are veterans Lamarcus Joyner and Jordan Whitehead, and

Michael Carter enters in nickel situations. Each of those five have an interception, with Joyner leading the way with two.

Gardner, with a team-high six passes defended, looks like the real deal. Gardner and Reed, a journeyman until this season, have held their opponents to about 50% completions, according to Pro Football Focus. Whitehead, who is third on the team with 26 tackles, knocked Jones out of the 2020 NFC Championship Game while with the Buccaneers.

When the Jets have the ball

The Jets enter the week ranked 11th in scoring (23.2 points per game) and 12th in total offense (356 yards per game). They are ninth in passing per game (259) but 26th in passing per play (6.05). That's fairly mediocre but they scored 40 in an upset win over the Dolphins last week and have a lot more perimeter talent than the Giants.

Quarterback Zach Wilson, the second overall pick of last year's

draft, missed the first three games due to injury but has won his starts each of the last two weeks. He's completed 56.1% of his passes for 462 yards with one touchdown, two interceptions and a 73.9 rating. In 15 career games, he's thrown more interceptions (13) than touchdowns (10).

The Jets like to run the football with second-year player Michael Carter and rookie Breece Hall. Hall, the 36th pick in this year's draft, leads the way with 275 yards and a 4.9 average. Carter had almost 1,000 total yards as a rookie. Hall and Carter are tied for third on the team with 17 receptions; Hall has a 79-yarder on his resume.

Polished rookie Garrett Wilson, the 10th pick of this year's draft, leads the team with 23 receptions. He had eight catches for 102 yards and two touchdowns vs. Cleveland in week two and is effective on the perimeter as well as the slot.

Veteran Corey Davis is a home-run threat with his 17 catches for 299 yards (17.6 average) including a 66-yard touchdown. Elijah Moore, a second-round pick last year, caught 43 as a rookie and has 16 catches this season as the third receiver.

Tight end Ty Conklin, formerly of the Vikings, is a reliable blocker and underrated receiver. He's second on the team with 21 catches.

Left tackle Duane Brown, left guard Laken Tomlinson, center

Conor McGovern, right guard Nate Herbig and last year's first-round pick, Alijah Vera-Tucker, formed the offensive line last week.

Vera-Tucker, with starts at right guard, left tackle and right tackle already this season, is going to be a stud. The interior trio isn't very good and the Packers have given Brown trouble in the past.

Special teams

This will be a battle between two of the top special teams in the NFL. By Football Outsiders' analytics, the Jets are No. 2 and the Packers are up to No. 11.

Kicker Greg Zuerlein is 8-of-9 on field goals. He's got a big-time leg — hence his "Greg the Leg" nickname. He's 3-of-3 from 50-plus yards this season and all but three of his kickoffs have produced touchbacks. Given the state of Green Bay's return game, the Packers probably would be thrilled to start every possession at the 25.

Braxton Berrios averages 25.5 yards per kickoff return and 14 yards per punt return. Punter Braden Mann has placed nine punts inside the 20 with zero touchbacks and a 42.8-yard average.

Green Bay's Amari Rodgers was benched for kickoff returns last week but was back in that role when Christian Watson dropped out with a hamstring injury. He's fumbled two punts the last four weeks.

Rodgers' deep passes

Remember that old Nike baseball commercial with the tag line of "Chicks Dig the Long Ball"?

One of the great passers in NFL history, Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers digs the long ball, too. En route to winning his fourth MVP award last year, Rodgers completed 39.1% of his deep passes — throws 20-plus yards downfield — according to Pro Football Focus.

He was even better with 41.6% marksmanship in 2020. Rodgers led the NFL with 1,242 yards on deep passes and his 12 touchdowns were only one off the NFL lead as he won his third MVP.

This year has not been close to his standard. In a passing game struggling to find its footing without All-Pro Davante Adams and speedster Marquez Valdes-Scantling, Rodgers is one of the worst deep passers in the league. Of 28 quarterbacks with at least 12 deep passes, Rodgers is 24th in accuracy (27.3%) and yards per attempt (8).

He went 0-for-5 in the loss to the Giants. LaFleur stopped short of saying Rodgers needs to throw the ball better but that seemed to his point.

"I know on that third down late in the game, there was pretty good coverage," LaFleur said. "I know there was a little bit of contact but you're rarely going to get that called. And a couple of the other ones, we just ... let's just face it, the further you throw the ball down the field, the less percentage it is that it's going to be complete.

"And so, I'm sure you always would like to throw the perfect ball on every play, and that's just not going to happen every time. I think there's some things we can do from a protection standpoint to maybe give Aaron a tick more time to him being balanced in the pocket and then the wideouts creating separation. I think everybody can improve."

Can-do attitude

A hallmark of Green Bay's offense are "can" plays. For instance, LaFleur calls a specific running play that Rodgers "can" change to a specific passing play, typically a "run solution" that's a quick flip into the flat.

Giants defensive coordinator Wink Martindale dared the Packers to pass the ball by inserting an additional defender into the box. So, Rodgers threw the ball — a lot. There

were 41 passes vs. only 20 runs.

Giving a veteran quarterback latitude at the line of scrimmage is smart football. After all, why be stuck running a play that he knows has no chance to work based on the defense's alignment and tendencies? Throwing the football vs. a loaded box is smart football, too, just as is running the ball against a light box.

The drawback to that approach was obvious on Sunday. Without Adams, the Packers don't have a go-to receiver to take advantage of defenses that are focused on stopping the run. So, Rodgers kept throwing the football and the team's top playmakers, running backs Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon, became complementary pieces. Jones had 13 carries and Dillon had only six even though they routinely had success.

"Going into the game, controlling

the line of scrimmage was going to be pivotal," LaFleur said. "I thought we did have some vs. loaded boxes where we got some really good push up front and we were getting like 5 yards a carry. After looking back at it, it's definitely a fine line.

"We had a lot of runs called where we were throwing those run solutions. And the thing is, it's kind of a double-edged sword because the run solutions were being pretty effective. It's just that it does limit you in regard to now you're not getting two of your best players the ball. I've got to do a better job of making sure that we're getting those guys the necessary touches. We've got to be — I'm talking to myself — more disciplined in our approach in terms of making sure that they get the necessary touches throughout the course of the game."

Amari Rodgers' struggles

With no role on offense whatsoever, last year's third-round pick, receiver Amari Rodgers, has been limited to return duty.

The Packers benched him on kickoffs against the Giants but he was back on the field after rookie Christian Watson suffered yet another hamstring injury. On punts, he fumbled against the Giants — his second in four weeks.

"I told him during the game, I said, 'You have got to do a better job of taking care of the football. That's part of your responsibility,'" LaFleur said. "He does a great job fielding the punts, no doubt about it. But it's just the ball carriage. And once you put that on tape, guess what's coming your way? Those guys are going to be clawing at the football.

"The Jets do a great job of that. You can see it all over their tape, their ability to punch. We call it punch-hammer-rake at the ball. And so we know it's coming, now we've got to make sure we do a good job of protecting that football."

Crossing guards

The secondary was supposed to be the strength of the Packers. And in some ways, that's been the case. Green Bay ranks second with 177 passing yards allowed per game and eighth with 9.1 yards per completion.

However, the Packers have intercepted only one pass — the Giants are the only team with zero — and have been eaten alive on crossing routes. Of the 885 passing yards allowed, 327 have come on crossing routes — most in the NFL, according to PFF.

The Packers have to get that fixed as they'll face a much better receiver corps this week vs. the Jets than they did vs. the Giants' injury-plagued group.

"No. 1 is the urgency to get lined up and get ready to play," LaFleur said. "Going back and watching the tape, there were moments when we got other crossing routes that we were all over, that we were glove-y. And then there's times when we're just a little bit off and guys are moving around and not in the best position pre-snap and we have a hard time taking those crossing routes and we get beat.

"If you're a little late, you're going to get beat and you're going to give up big explosive plays and we all know that explosive plays lead to points."

Packers fall to Giants in London

Green Bay's offense shut down in second half

Aaron Rodgers had warned before the Packers' trip to London that the team's habit of only putting together one good offensive half per game wasn't sustainable.

The New York Giants proved him right.

Rodgers and his offense were shut out in the second half for the second time in three games and Green Bay's defense couldn't bail him out this time as the Giants erased a 10-point halftime deficit to beat the Packers 27-22 at the Tottenham Hotspur Stadium on Oct. 9.

Green Bay led 17-3 in the first half and 20-10 at halftime, but didn't score again until a deliberate safety by the Giants in the final seconds.

"It was the tale of two halves," Packers coach Matt LaFleur said. "They kicked our butt in the second half."

It's not the first time that's happened this season.

In week 3, Tampa Bay also held Green Bay without a score in the second half, but the Packers still held on for a 14-12 win after a defensive stop on a 2-point conversion.

Last week it was the opposite story: the Packers struggled offensively in the first half then came alive in the second to beat New England in overtime.

"Offensively, we haven't put two halves together," Rodgers said. "There's a lot that factors into that — everything from calls to execution, to the momentum, to defensive stops to adjustments that we make. ... There's games like this where our defense is not going to be up to their normal standards, and we've got to pick them up. And we had chances — a lot of chances."

The Giants did their best to limit those chances, using the clock in the second half by putting together three straight long scoring drives to go up by 7 at 27-20 with 6:08 left in the fourth quarter.

The Packers were in position to score on their first drive in the sec-

ond half before Rodgers was sacked to take them out of field-goal range. They went three-and-out on the next drive after three straight incomplete pass attempts.

On their final drive, they drove down the field but were stopped on the Giants 6-yard-line after two straight passes by Rodgers were deflected by defenders.

Rodgers finished 25 of 39 for 222 yards and two touchdowns. But he failed to connect with his receivers on a number of deep throws, another recurring theme this season.

"We're just not quite on the same page at times," Rodgers said about why the team is struggling to go deep. "We got to go back and

look at it. I don't want to make a blanket statement right now. Definitely not an emotional blanket statement."

However, Rodgers defended the decision to go for all pass plays on the three-and-out series as the Packers moved away from the run game.

"I do like all three of those calls, 100%. And I felt like we were really close to executing," Rodgers said. "There was at least two opportunities to get first downs there."

The offense wasn't entirely at fault. The Green Bay defense came into the game ranked No. 1 in the NFL on third downs but couldn't get a stop in the second half.

And they allowed Giants quarterback Daniel Jones to run 10 times for 37 yards despite playing with a sore ankle, including several scrambles for first downs. After opening the game with consecutive three-and-outs, New York scored on its next five drives.

"They executed off a lot of our mistakes," Packers linebacker Preston Smith said.

"They had opportunities to get first downs when we could have executed a lot better."

Q&A WITH ERIC WILSON

The Green Bay Packers signed linebacker Eric Wilson off the New Orleans Saints practice squad on Oct. 4.

In 2020 with the Minnesota Vikings, Wilson started 15 games and set career highs with 122 tackles, eight tackles for losses, three interceptions, eight passes defended and two forced fumbles.

Q: You went to London with the Saints, came back to the states and now you're going back to London. How challenging is that?

A: I'm super-big into nutrition and sleep, hydration, all those little things that make a big difference. So, when you land, your performance is pristine because you take care of your body. I think that's huge and to sleep as much as we can on the plane there. So, when we get there at 7 a.m., we're ready to go.

Q: How do you deal with the change in time zones?

A: Just trying to match your sleeping schedule with that in London. Since we get there at 7 a.m., sleep as much as you can so when

you wake up, you're up all day. Then, by the time you're ready to go to sleep, you stay on that schedule and getting a full night's rest. You wake up from that full night's rest, you're recovered and ready to go.

Q: When the Packers signed you, did you know you were going right back to London?

A: Yeah, I did. I thought that was interesting. I started laughing. It's no big deal. I don't mind it. It's fun to travel and go overseas and play in different places. Even when we travel in the States, it's fun. I'm trying to make the most of it. We played at the same place and we're staying at exactly the same hotel, too.

Q: I understand the challenge of going to London. How about the challenge of coming back? Because there's no bye week to get reacclimated — it's right back to work to play the Jets.

A: You try to get as much sleep as possible. When we're coming back, I think we get in like early, like 2 a.m. or something, so you want to stay up as much as you can then. After a game, you might be a little tired. A nap here or there won't hurt but after you continue to be consistent with

that, it's a pretty easy transition.

Q: Doing a little research about you after the Packers signed you, I read that you got a "Wilson" tattoo on the chest but in the font of a Wilson football.

A: So, me and a group of friends actually did it in high school. All of our last names are Wilson. One was my running back, one was the quarterback and I played receiver. So, all of our last names were Wilson so we got a Wilson (tattoo). One has it on their arm. Another one has it on their back. I have this one.

Q: Was that one of your first tattoos?

A: Yeah, I think it was my first tattoo ever. Trying to help win games and help the team win a championship, that's all of our goals. I think we all have our individual roles and whatever that might be — do it at the best of our abilities. That's my goal coming into every day, getting better and help this team win.

Q: You started a bunch of games with the Vikings but what can you bring to the special teams?

A: I've met with Rich (Bisaccia) and I met with Byron (Storer). I've

been in some meetings and been out there. I think the basis is guys play hard, they play fast. Taking care of that one-third of the game is so important because it can win games. Winning special teams can win games, winning the field position battle wins games. Because that's the first offensive play, that's the first defensive play that happens in the game. That transitional play is very important to help the defense or help the offense. It's really important.

Q: You had that big year in 2020. Can you do enough on special teams here to jumpstart you into the second part of your career?

A: Yeah, definitely. I think regardless of the game or situation, special teams can help win the game. Field position, making big plays, making turnovers on special teams can create huge swings in our favor.
