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Oconto Falls schools get a new website

Analytics show nearly two-thirds of users access the site on their phones

The new Oconto Falls School District website streamlines the online experience for visitors, students and staff, the district's technology chief told the school board Nov. 13.

Technology director Corey Jeffers mentioned the overhaul of ofpanthers.com during his report on his department's activities keeping the district connected to the internet.

The new website went live earlier this month and has earned good grades so far, Jeffers said.

"One of the reasons for the new website was better responsiveness,"

he said. "Our account integration is far better, announcement alerts are better, the directory improvements are good, and our analytics are much better, too."

Because it's a smaller site in the grand scheme of things, the Google search engine is a little slow to adopt to the change.

"Our previous website had about 1,800 pages on it; our current one has about 70," Jeffers said. "It's better to have fewer, because then there's fewer places to find the things you actually need, but it takes a long time for Google to go back and crawl those sites and say, 'Oh, this is the one you're using now, not the one you've been using for the last six years,' and then remove those."

The analytics show that about 62% of visitors are accessing ofpanthers.com via a mobile device, about 36.5% are on a desktop or laptop, and 1.3% are using a tablet, he said.

"Most of the time our designs are meant to be looked at on a palm first, so they might be kind of weirdly

stretched out at times on a really large screen because very few people are looking at it on a very large screen," Jeffers said.

Recent technology department activity has included bringing in 600 new Chromebooks for students in grades two through five. The devices, designed solely for internet use, are usually replaced every four years but federal funding allowed the turnaround to happen more quickly, Jeffers said. Oconto Falls High School also got new staff laptops this fall.

A couple of incidents this fall proved the wisdom of installing more redundancy into the system, Jeffers said. The school board approved redundant firewalls about two years ago.

"Earlier this semester, one of those firewalls went down and then jumped to the other firewall, which was really helpful because our district would have been without internet for approximately seven hours that day," Jeffers said. "We were out for four minutes."

During the same month a crew

working in Abrams accidentally cut a fiber optics line, he added.

"That would have impacted us, in fact it did impact us," Jeffers said. "Right around the time it was cut, all of our internet traffic stopped. Luckily we ended up having a second line that comes in from a different location in state. That picked up, and honestly nobody even noticed."

Without the redundancy, the district's internet outage would have lasted for about 12 hours, he said.

The report was part of a tech-heavy agenda that also included demonstrations from two Washington Middle School VEX Robotics teams, who are building robots for competitions scheduled later this school year.

Thirty-one students are building a total of 15 competitive robots, adviser Anthony Grulkowski told the board. They saw demonstrations from Team Overload and Team Ava Cubed, the latter so named because it is comprised of three students named Ava.

- Change your diet: Eliminate caffeine, spicy food or drinking liquids

late in the evening.

- Practice timed voiding: Empty your bladder based on the clock and not your urges. This can help establish more control over your bladder.

- Take medication: Medications known as anticholinergics can help relax the bladder.

- Work with a physical therapist: Many physical therapists can help you train your body in urge-suppression techniques, strengthen pelvic floor muscles and identify lifestyle changes to decrease the need to utilize the restroom frequently.

- Surgical solutions: InterStim Therapy is a minimally invasive, nerve-stimulation procedure which can yield long-term improvement or

even cure an overactive bladder.

- Consider BOTOX injections: When injected into the bladder muscle, BOTOX can help treat overactive bladder symptoms. When medication like anticholinergics do not help or can't be taken, BOTOX is often recommended.

- Low-risk electrical stimulation: Percutaneous Tibial Nerve Stimulation (PTNS) is a non-surgical treatment used to help relax the bladder muscle.

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Avenue of Lights scales back after tree loss

Emerald ash borer deforested Oconto Falls' North Main Street

The emerald ash borer has claimed thousands of trees across Wisconsin in recent years, and now the scourge has led to changes in a longtime Oconto Falls Christmas season tradition.

The Oconto Falls Lioness Club announced last week that because many trees had to be removed along North Main Street near East Side Beach, the lighted corridor from Highland Avenue into downtown Oconto Falls cannot be recreated this year.

After the invasive ash borer was discovered in the city, the state Department of Natural Resources recommended removing trees that could be affected to stop the spread of the pest.

"The DNR recommended removing the trees right away, so we started basically as soon as the lights came off in the spring," City Admin-

istrator Peter Wills said Nov. 13. "We removed around 65 trees, not just in the East Side Beach area but throughout the city."

The Lioness Club is in the process of decorating the beach area and Lotter Park with figurines and lights, as usual. The annual celebration featuring Christmas caroling and Santa's visit will continue, starting at 6 p.m. Nov. 25 at the East Side Beach shelter.

The club will not be seeking sponsorships or putting out signs this year.

"We hope to bring back the Avenue of Lights in its full splendor very soon and appreciate your understanding

while we navigate the changes we need to make to adapt to the ever-changing landscape," the announcement said.

Wills said in May that the city will be seeking donations to support the planting of new trees. The City Council approved a donation and memorial policy May 9 allowing for a plaque bearing the names of those supporting the new trees or to be used as a memorial.

Emerald ash borer was spotted in both Oconto and Shawano counties in 2020, in Shawano city trees in 2021, in Menominee County in 2022, and in April 2023 in Oconto

Falls and just west of Gillett.

It is a beetle native to China that attacks ash trees starting at the top and working its way down, before the tree is completely dead. First discovered in Wisconsin about 20 years ago, EAB kills all varieties of ash trees (white ash, green ash and black ash) but is not known to affect any other Wisconsin tree species. More than 99% of Wisconsin's ash trees are expected to die, according to the DNR.

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Speaker urges crowd to ‘start listening’

Oconto Falls hosts annual community salute to those who have served

Students at Oconto Falls High School and local veterans heard a message of unity Nov. 10 from the son of the last soldier killed during the Vietnam War.

Col. William Nolde died as the result of artillery fire near An Loc on Jan. 27, 1973, just 11 hours before a truce took effect in accordance with the Paris Peace Accords. He is listed as the last official American combat casualty of the war. Byron Nolde, chief executive officer of Oconto Electric Cooperative, is second-youngest of William and Joyce Nolde's five children, four sons and a daughter.

He shared with the Oconto Falls audience about an eerie feeling he had that January day before his uncle and aunt came to the door with the news about his father, a career military man who had served in Korea and was wrapping up his third tour of duty in Vietnam.

Because of the unique circumstances, William Nolde was honored with a funeral procession in Washington, D.C., and buried in Arlington National Cemetery. His son shared a memory of meeting with President Richard Nixon in the Oval Office.

"We were headed into the office, and he had an aide come up to him and say, 'Sir, you have 15 minutes with the Nolde family,'" Byron Nolde said. "He cut the individual off right away and said, 'I will decide how long I will talk to the family,' and that was it." The visit lasted more than an hour, and the president talked individually with each member of the family, he said.

He turned to the local veterans, who were assembled in front of the podium, and told the students they deserve everyone's thanks.

"Think about this: All these vets out here that have served, whether they served in peacetime, conflict or war doesn't matter," Nolde said. "They all went with that same attitude. They knew they could be called upon to make that ultimate sacrifice."

He described his mother as "a tough lady, an awesome person," who

was thrust into a position where she had to deal with national attention and the press and handled it all with dignity and strength.

"My mom was a Methodist, my dad was a Catholic, and when they got married that was a tough thing back then," Nolde said. "But those are the freedoms that those individuals fought for. You know, you've got the freedom to marry who you want, live where you want, and go where you want, and that's just to name a few."

Nolde's talk was about "God, country and family," which he said his father often talked about. God or religion gives us a moral compass, defining right from wrong, and veterans' willingness to sacrifice for the country

helps make it strong, he said.

He likened the military and the Oconto Falls community to a family and said that families may fight but ultimately respect, love and listen to one another.

"We've always had disagreements, that's OK to disagree, but the biggest thing we all have to do is start listening," Nolde said. "Listen to the other side, listen when something's being said. What made America great is two sides would argue and state their case, and then they came together on usually a better solution, because one side or the other isn't exactly right. When you listen and combine and make the right changes, you come up with the best solution."

OFHS principal Stuart Russ opened the proceedings by saying veterans are owed "a debt of gratitude that we can never fully repay," and he urged the students to learn from the veterans in their families.

"They have have seen the world and experienced things that most of us can only imagine. Their stories are a treasure trove of wisdom and experience," Russ said. "Talk to them about their service and ask them to share their stories. You will not be disappointed."

Bev Umentum, president of American Legion Auxiliary 302, led the Pledge of Allegiance and presented a 70-year service pin to Ruth Trudell, who quipped that the Legion asked her to serve when she was a brand new bride.

"The ink wasn't dry on the marriage license and they were after me to be a member of the American Legion Auxiliary," Trudell said.

Senior class representative Timothy Cornette added his thanks to the veterans and said his fellow students have much to learn from them.

"Talk to them; listen to them; hear what they have to say," Cornette said. "They are the ones who allowed to be American and live in a country with more freedom than you can imagine. We can't thank you enough, veterans, for all you have done and all that you sacrificed for you and for us to be here today."

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Safe Kids Coalition receives \$6,500 grant

The Oconto County Safe Kids Coalition, in partnership with Oconto County Public Health, has announced the receipt of a \$6,500 grant from the Leon H. and Clymene M. Bond Foundation.

The coalition will use the funding to implement five life jacket loaner stations throughout the county. The life jacket loaner stations will include life jackets for infants through adults and will be in place by summer 2024. Grant funds

will also be used to update signage with instructions for proper use on the existing life jacket loaner stations.

"This project is a true local partnership, and we are very grateful to the Leon H. and Clymene M. Bond Foundation for this wonderful opportunity," said Debra Konitzer, Oconto County health officer. "Thanks to this funding, Oconto County Safe Kids Coalition has been able to partner with Oconto

County Lumber, Vital Signs and the Oconto Falls High School Technical Education students for the supplies and building of the life jacket loaner stations."

The coalition is part of Safe Kids Worldwide, a nonprofit organization working to help families and communities keep children safe from injuries. Members of the local coalition come from law enforcement, fire departments, Wisconsin Economic Development, ATV clubs,

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, local municipalities and Oconto County Public Health.

According to Safe Kids Worldwide, among preventable injuries, drowning is the leading cause of death for children ages 1-4. In addition, most drownings are accidental and can be prevented with life jackets.

DATCP extends organic food processing deadline

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) has extended the deadline for organic food processors and producers to apply for reimbursement of costs related to organic certification from USDA's Organic Certification Cost Share Program to Dec. 8.

Farms and businesses that produce, process or package certified organic agricultural products are eligible to be reimbursed for 75% of certification-related costs — up to \$750 per category of certification — for expenses paid during Oct. 1, 2022, through Sept. 30, 2023. Farms or businesses must be located in Wisconsin and currently

certified or be actively seeking certification through an accredited certifier during that time frame.

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Saving seeds a very simple garden task

By now, most of our garden plants have gone to seed with the coming of November. This gives us a great opportunity to collect and save the seeds of some of our favorite plants, especially annuals, tomatoes, peppers, perennials and native wildflowers and grasses.

Collecting and saving the seeds of our garden plants is not as intimidating as it seems. In fact, it is one of the simplest garden tasks we can enjoy.

The key to collecting and saving seeds is to keep them dry. The most common mistakes seed collectors make is to allow them to get to moist or damp. This results in quick losses as the seeds simply rot away or become infested with mold.

To prevent this, one of the simplest things we can do is store seeds in paper envelopes or paper bags, rather than sandwich bags or plastic.

They can also be stored in airtight glass jars, plastic vials or other containers that can be placed in a cool, dry location for the winter months.

The seeds of annuals, especially easily collected ones like marigolds, cosmos, zinnias, sunflowers and others, are easy to obtain in the garden. Simply snap off flower heads

and remove the seeds with your fingertips.

For large quantities, place seed heads in a paper bag or a covered pail and shake vigorously. Many of the seeds will separate, allowing you to easily remove the chaff and store the seed.

Seeds from perennials, such as hosta, coneflower, black-eyed Susan, aster, delphinium, columbine, lupine and many others, can be collected and stored the same way. For a fun mixture, simply combine all of the seeds together and plant that way in the spring.

Garden edibles, such as tomatoes and peppers, are also wonderful choices for saving seed. Especially true of heirloom varieties of tomatoes and peppers that come true to type from seed, collecting and saving this precious resource is a money saver and it allows you to grow a large variety of plants.

There are many different ways to collect and save the seeds of peppers and tomatoes. From simply scooping them out and allowing them to dry, to emulsifying, to placing them in a blender to separate the seeds and other methods. A simple online search will showcase all of these different ways to collect and preserve heirloom tomato and

pepper seeds.

Saving seeds is a fun and enjoyable garden hobby. The more you explore, the more you will enjoy propagating your own plants from seeds harvested right at home.

Sixteen years ago, a coach helped save an athlete's life, and now the athlete has helped the coach get the recognition he deserves.

Rep. Peter Schmidt, R-Bonduel, presented Shawano Community High School teacher and coach Steve Stomberg with a Hometown Hero award during the Assembly floor session Nov. 7.

"Steve Stomberg is deserving of this award for so many reasons," said Schmidt. "Steve has been a pillar in the Shawano community for more than three decades. When he is not teaching and coaching, Steve often uses his free time to volunteer in the community."

Stomberg has been teaching agriculture education and serving as an FFA adviser for the Shawano School

District for 31 years. Wisconsin's best-kept secrets exposed

Twig's Beverage in Shawano one of over 80 things unveiled by travel writers in 'Secret Wisconsin'

Lambeau Field didn't make the list for "Secret Wisconsin: A Guide to the Weird, Wonderful and Obscure," but that's to be expected, because it's hardly a secret.

Twig's Beverage and the Sun Drop Museum also aren't really a secret to locals, but they made the list for "Secret Wisconsin," a guide for some of the small-town uniqueness that makes the Dairyland State the place that it is. Buried beneath the cows and Green and Gold memorabilia are over 80 places and things that Tom Manus and Kristi Flick Manus have discovered as travel writers, and the couple say there's plenty more that didn't make this book — indicating "Secret Wisconsin" might have a sequel or three.

"The way we travel is by road trips on back roads and two-lane highways," Manus said during a book signing event Nov. 11 at the Sun Drop Museum. "We're small-town travel specialists."

For the Eau Claire couple, the love of Wisconsin prompted pulling back the curtain on some of the amazing things hidden in small towns. Flick Manus grew up in Madison, while Manus was a convert after getting married in 1995.

"This helps to get families to get out and take road trips, to make memories," Manus said. "We finally decided, after all these years, we should tell other people about it."

Flick Manus noted that the places in the book will not cost families a small fortune. The most expensive venture will cost \$64.80.

"We want families to get out and see the state," Flick Manus said.

The travel writers heard about Twig's Beverage on the wind and decided to check it out. They visited while the Sun Drop mural was being created outside the bottling facility. While visiting, they got to see how the bottles are filled, how Twig's specialty sodas are created and the museum that showcases three generations worth of Sun Drop history.

"We came over, checked it out and fell in love with it," Flick Manus said. "It's one of those that people locally know, but not necessarily statewide, and we wanted to make sure everybody in the state knew about it. It's very unique."

However, the initial visit did not

prepare the couple for the return trip for the book signing, when they saw cases of soda constantly moving past them for customers.

"It's got such a cult following," Manus said.

"It's such a show," Flick Manus added. "I can't even imagine. The bottles go in. The bottles go out."

Of course, there's much more than Twig's in "Secret Wisconsin." Flick Manus said that one of the favorite things for the couple is a Friday morning fish fry in Kenosha.

"At 7:30, you can go and get your fish," she said. "It's in a bakery called Oliver's Bakery."

Manus added that the owner of the bakery has owned it for 40 years and

worked a few years before that, but when asked how the tradition started, she had no idea.

"It's just a given," Manus said. "People order ahead of time, and she sells out every week."

Manus noted that the things found in "Secret Wisconsin" can't always be found on the first couple of pages of Google Search. One of those things came to light as the travel writers visited Durand and discovered in a place called the Corral Bar an 1885 circus poster that's 55 feet long and 9 feet tall.

"It was temporary. It was only supposed to last two months," Manus said. "The owner and his brother bought the bar and the building next to it to turn it into an event space. When he started tearing the wall out to build a doorway, he cut a hole that was really big, and he noticed there was a really colorful buffalo staring back at him. That got his curiosity up, and he started carefully removing everything."

An expert from Baraboo checked out the poster, according to Manus, and said it was the best preserved poster he'd ever seen. The poster is now behind glass in the Corral Bar's

event room, he said.

Another favorite for the couple is a place called Gravity Hill in Lafayette County near Shullsburg. Flick Manus said that the hill is a road where people put their vehicles in neutral "and the forces of nature pull your car uphill."

"It's a really quirky and unique thing," she said.

From the world's oldest sanctioned bowling alley in Milwaukee to a museum in Luck bearing the world's largest yo-yo as a reminder that Duncan Yo-Yos used to be manufactured in the community, there are plenty of hidden gems within easy driving distance for anybody living in Wisconsin.

"We go to grocery stores and talk to people," Manus said. "That's where we find unique things — local people at the grocery store. We don't tell them we're travel writers or anything. We just say, 'Hey, what's there unique to do here?' and then they just start talking. In small towns, people are proud of what they have. You don't see that in the big cities."

Good Samaritans help out with runaway cows

"Hey, you need some help?"

Not waiting for a reply and without a second thought, the Good Samaritans got out of their truck and hustled down the driveway.

My husband and a repairman were in our basement working on an issue. I was in my office, and their voices were coming up through the furnace vent as loudly as if I was standing right next to them. The conversation turned to farming and, chuckling quietly to myself, I recalled the very first article I ever wrote was called, "Farmer Stance" back in July 2003. With a short hiatus, I've been at this writing thing a while.

Getting two farmers together, retired or actively farming, is a sight to behold. Readjusting the gnarly baseball cap on the once full head of hair and leaning on a scruffy pickup truck speaks louder than words — they're there for the long haul. Another more comfortable position is arms folded across the chest, legs spread shoulder-wide. Yup.

Hashing out corn or soybean prices or milk prices and then, inevitably, the talk turns to the weather — it being an inexhaustible topic. We either have too much moisture, not enough moisture, too much sun, not enough sun; vast topic. Vast.

At any rate, these fellas were talking and I was losing interest and pretty soon his cell phone jingled. That ended the session and as he was making his way up the basement steps I heard him holler, "Kk-aaa-yyy!" A one-syllable name morphs into three when there's an emergency.

Heart sinking because I know that tone, I pushed my computer chair back and in my haste it almost crashed to the floor. Running to the kitchen window, my eyes confirmed the yell my ears had heard. The cows were out. Oh-no-oh-no-oh-no.

Black and whites were on a field trip, seemingly everywhere, tails high up over their heads. Stumbling into shoes and pulling on a coat, I sprinted out without even fully getting arms through sleeves. There, I noticed to my left, were those two good-sized (very helpful to be sturdy) fellas who had witnessed the pandemonium and stopped in to help. Bless their hearts.

The cows, at that point, were making hefty indentations in my pliable lawn just around the corner from

the heifer barn. The heifers were safe in their barn, thankfully, but they were egging on the escapees by loudly encouraging them, which only added to the high-headed, eyes-wide, snot-sailing, tail-flying energy of the fugitives. They were having fun. We were not.

As we tried to round them up, their adventure took them down the hill past the heifer barn astonishingly staying out of the corn field, started to go down to the woods but thought better of it (whew), trashed through a pile of sawdust, through a manure pile — stacked there only because we'd had six inches of rain lately and it was too muddy to spread — in and out of a machine shed, behind the barn and back up around the opposite side.

Some we corralled in from where

they busted out (a gate my husband had gotten sidetracked and forgot to shut — farmer stance), a few got coaxed inside using the big sliding barn door, and the rest came through using the front gate. They got out going through one gate and got back in through three.

We have anywhere from 50-70 cows here on a regular basis. Altogether, we corralled 56 cows this day. The repairman that was here in the first place, the two Good Samaritans that had stopped, and my husband and I were the cowboys at this rodeo.

At one point I was spreading my arms out wide hollering, "Hey, hey, hey!" A cow who was really gutsy stood stock-still with her head down and then made a move toward me, about 10 feet away. I held my ground and just kept talking trash to her. A flashback, quick as lightning, flew through my head.

A couple years ago, a Black Angus 400-pounder had sent me to the ER when she head-butted my chest, sending me sprawling, hitting my head on a jagged cement ledge. Seven staples and five stitches later and a whole lot less blood, I was sent home

with a maturing case of post-traumatic stress disorder. Bizarre, as I'd been around animals my whole life, but the Black Angus breed is a feisty lot and didn't last long on the farm. Thankfully, this black and white Holstein finally gave in and swung her ample body around toward the gate and where she belonged.

Getting everybody back in, we heartily thanked our helpers. They scoffed: "What are neighbors for?" They weren't even neighbors, and with a wave they headed out.

Hearing my name shouted in a manner that implies the cows are out can bolt me out the door quick as lightning. Thank you, God, for Good Samaritans.

("Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.'" Luke 12:36-37)

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Young people scammed more than elderly

People ages 18-24 reported losing more money to scams than older age groups, according to a new report published by the BBB Institute for Marketplace Trust (BBB Institute), the International Association of Better Business Bureaus' educational foundation.

"Targeting our youth: How scams are impacting ages 18-24" highlights scam types, tactics and trends based on data submitted to BBB Scam Tracker between January 2022, and June 2023.

Employment scams continue to be the riskiest scams for ages 18-24,

making up almost 30% of scams reported by this age group to BBB Scam Tracker. This scam type had the highest median dollar loss of all scam types reported by this age group (\$1,819).

Other risky scams include online purchases, cryptocurrency, rental, investment, fake checks or money orders, phishing, romance, advance fee loans and credit repair/debt relief.

"It's important that we spread awareness about employment scams, especially to younger people," said BBB Institute executive director Melissa Lanning Trumpower. "About 43%

of employment scams reported by this age group included a mention of fake check scams. Many reported being told to deposit checks into their accounts and then transfer funds to a vendor to pay for training or office equipment. By the time they realized the check was bad, the money was gone. We must make sure young people understand it takes time for checks to clear and to be sure they're good."

About 19% of employment scams from this age group mentioned schemes involving inspecting or re-shipping packages.

Online purchase scams made up

29.1% of all reports submitted by ages 18-24 with 81.4% reporting a monetary loss.

Young adults were more likely to report being targeted by text message or internet messaging than other age groups. The contact methods with the highest likelihood of a monetary loss (susceptibility) included website and social media. The contact methods with the highest reported median dollar loss were phone call, text message and in person.

This group reported a higher percentage of scams targeting them on Instagram and X than other age groups.

Authentic engagement in education essential

This September, I delivered my State of Education address in the Wisconsin State Capitol. I talked about the incredible teaching happening in our classrooms to prepare the future leaders of this state, and I shared some of the inspiring insights I have learned from our students. I focused on the critical moment in which we find ourselves: a moment when we can choose hope, or we can choose destruction in the way we support our children, their schools and our communities.

I choose hope. I want you to be part of creating and continuing that hope, together, as a part of our community engagement and strategic planning.

That's why I'm inviting you — the people of our great state — to a conversation about the future of public education in Wisconsin. When we announced the launch of our strategic planning process in August, we showed our belief in the importance of parental engagement, community input and civil discourse, just as we did with our release of the Department of Public Instruction's nonpartisan civics scope and sequence.

Civil discourse is what I believe in, what is being taught in classrooms and what parents in all corners of Wisconsin are teaching their children. Meaningful parental and community engagement is what we at the DPI are encouraging through our strategic planning survey, as well as in-person and virtual engagement sessions. Authentic engagement in education is the best way to serve our kids — not legislative mandates.

As a parent and an educator, I know our voices are needed right now. There are some who are intent on tearing down public education — and our trust in public service. These de facto extremist groups and their allies in the legislature perpetuate false accusations, make vitriolic attacks

and engage in intimidation. The fact is, when we see this kind of behavior from students in our schools, we call it for what it is — bullying — and we do something about it. We intervene. We redirect. We take the opportunity to pause, listen, learn from each other and grow.

We currently see legislation being debated that is not designed to support students, meet their needs, improve academic outcomes and strengthen the future of our state. Instead, this legislation is aimed at destroying trust between families and schools, threatening the freedom to read in school and in public libraries, and raising the specter of punishment for discussing ostensibly controversial — but, actually, very relevant — topics.

Through it all, these extremist groups and their allies claim they're protecting children. They claim they stand for liberty. There is nothing liberating about a war against democracy in which our kids are the collateral damage. Neither these bills nor these groups actually amplify parental voice; for that, we need authentic parental and community engagement like our

strategic planning sessions, in addition to the communication and collaboration I know educators and parents are engaged in across our state as they work together to serve the needs of the kids we all care so deeply about.

Here is my message to Wisconsin: Do not look away. Do not get distracted by hyperbolic claims or willful misinformation. Do not feed into fear or stoop to their level. Civil discourse is essential to our democracy and our democratic institutions, and it poses an existential threat to extremist groups.

You know where you can find authentic community engagement? In our inclusive, welcoming classrooms and libraries where kids can be themselves, explore great books and big ideas, and learn about the beautiful, diverse and hopeful world around them.

That engagement, that joy, is what we, the parents whom extremist groups do not represent, must speak out to defend. I should know. I'm a mom, and that's what I'm doing today.

YOUR RIGHT TO KNOW

Reopening court discussions was a good idea

On Oct. 9, the Wisconsin Supreme Court held a lively, 35-minute discussion on whether to allow the deletion of certain eviction records from Wisconsin's online court records system. I'll get to that topic in a moment; what's remarkable is that we were able to witness this discussion at all.

In 2012, a divided Wisconsin Supreme Court voted to close its administrative conferences. These are conferences where the court considers changes to rules that affect the court system, procedures used in civil and criminal matters, and ethics rules for attorneys and judges.

Arguing in favor of closing the conferences, then-Justice Patience Roggensack opined that to "sit out here in public and philosophize ... is really not the best use of our time," as quoted by Wisconsin Watch.

The late Justice Patrick Crooks countered, "I think it's vitally important that the public be able to see what we do and how we do it. ... This would be a major mistake, to close what has been open."

In the end, the justices voted to close the court's administrative conferences on a vote of 4-3. This August, on another 4-3 vote, the court's newly constituted majority decided to again make these conferences open to the public. Administrative conferences do not include deliberations on cases, which are not and have not been open.

This was a welcome change. As intimidated by Justice Crooks, open administrative conferences give the public insight into the work of the court and the basis for its decisions on rules petitions.

That was apparent during the court's open discussion of the rule change proposed by tenants rights ad-

vocates to shorten the record retention period for court records of evictions where no money judgment is entered from 20 years to one year. Not only was the meeting in open session, but it was streamed on WisconsinEye and is still available for viewing.

The advocates said the change was needed to make rental housing more available, because landlords frequently rely on online court systems when deciding whether to lease an apartment or other housing. They also noted that the impact of the current retention rule disproportionately affected Black and Latino households.

The court also heard from opponents of the change, including the Apartment Association of Southeastern Wisconsin. In their discussion, court members considered the administrative burden to clerks and the court system that the change would cause, citing their own experiences, as well as the impacts to transparency and access to records in general.

Reasonable minds can disagree on the impacts of the change to the evic-

tion record rule, but it was refreshing to see the court's members consider the competing issues and interact with one another on a matter of substance.

Open administrative conferences may also result in better decision-making. Chief Justice Annette Ziegler joked at the beginning of the meeting that if the group were in closed conference, the meeting may "take about five minutes," which was apparently the norm. In the open session on the eviction record change, the court's members had a much longer and more thoughtful discussion.

Another open conference on an administrative petition is scheduled for Dec. 11. This time, the issue under discussion is the proper standard for when appellate courts can stay a lower court decision pending appeal.

For just the second time in more than 10 years, the public will be welcome to sit in.

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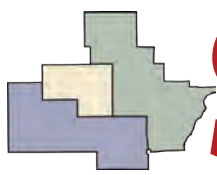
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Swimmers bring home medals from state meet

Farmers reminded to check runoff risk for manure

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is reminding farmers and manure applicators to check the runoff risk advisory forecast before spreading manure on fields.

This tool helps determine the potential for manure runoff from a field depending on weather conditions and soil temperature.

The runoff risk advisory forecast includes maps showing short-term runoff risk for manure application. The maps account for soil saturation, temperature and precipitation on a scale of 1.5 square mile grids. The National Weather Service updates the forecast four times daily.

"A nutrient management plan helps determine where to spread, and the proper application rate, while the

runoff risk advisory forecast helps determine when to spread. Assessing current field conditions is just one step in the process farmers should use to make decisions," said Andrea Topper, DATCP nutrient management outreach specialist. "Farmers who don't have a plan can talk to their crop consultant or county conservationist to develop one."

To help reduce nitrogen loss during fall manure applications, it is recommended to:

- Wait until soil temperatures are less than 50 degrees Fahrenheit. When soil temperatures are above 50 degrees, soil microbes are very active and create a more leachable form of nitrogen.

- Apply manure to an actively growing crop, such as winter wheat or

a cover crop, to help scavenge some of the nitrogen that otherwise might be lost.

Farmers should contact their crop consultant, county land conservation office or the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for help identifying alternatives to high-risk spreading. These professionals can help identify fields where the risk is lower and alternative practices, such as stacking manure in a safe location.

DATCP reminds manure haulers and drivers to put safety first when traveling on roadways to avoid spilling manure, prevent injuries and protect the health of people

and the environment.

"About one-third of preventable transportation-related manure spills are due to operator error," said Kevin Erb, University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension conservation professional training program manager. "Attentive driving and maintaining your equipment are two ways to reduce the risk of an accidental manure spill. An accidental spill is not illegal, but failing to properly report and clean it up is."

All agriculture and livestock operations must report spills or runoff affecting water to the DNR's 24-hour emergency spills hotline at 800-943-0003. More information about planning and prevention is available at <http://dnr.wi.gov/topic/agbusiness/manurespills.html>.

Avoid ash trees when placing deer stands

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) cautions hunters to avoid placing deer stands in or near ash trees this deer hunting season as they start scouting properties.

Most ash trees in the southern half of Wisconsin, Door County and the Mississippi River counties are dead or dying from emerald ash borer infestation. Although emerald ash borer is not as widespread in other parts of the state, the invasive insect continues to be found at additional locations throughout Wisconsin. Unreported infestations are also likely present.

It is important to place and maintain tree stands carefully, as trees infested with emerald ash borer may unexpectedly snap or drop large branches. Hunters should also be cautious around ash trees when on the ground, especially in windy conditions, as infested trees are susceptible to branch and stem breakage.

“Dead and dying ash trees are structurally weaker than healthy trees, so they are not safe places to put deer stands,” said Bill McNee, DNR forest health specialist. “In many cases, it can be hard to tell if a tree has been infested by emerald ash

borer, so hunters should place deer stands in other types of trees instead.”

Ash trees can be identified through two key features: opposite branching patterns, where two branches come off the main stem directly across from each other, and compound leaves with 5-11 leaflets.

Tree stand accidents are the leading cause of serious injury to deer hunters. Research shows one in four bowhunters has experienced a fall or

near-fall from an elevated stand.

No matter the type of tree stand, follow these basic safety rules:

- Always wear a full-body harness, also known as a fall-arrest system. Connect to your tether line and keep your tether line short. The tether is designed to keep you in the seat, not to catch you after you fall.

- Always have three points of contact while climbing into and out of the tree stand, including two hands and one foot or two feet and one hand at all times.

- Always use a haul line to raise and lower your unloaded firearm or bow into and out of the stand. You can also use the haul for other things, like a heavy backpack.

- Use a lifeline when climbing up and down; this keeps you connected from the time you leave the ground to the time you get back down.

Additional tree stand safety information is available on the DNR's tree stand safety webpage at <https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/education/OutdoorSkills/TreestandSafety>. Hunters can also participate in the Tree Stand Manufacturers Safety Course. The free, interactive course takes just 15 minutes to complete.

DNR announces 2024 wild turkey, pheasant and waterfowl stamp design contest winners

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced the winners of the 2024 Wisconsin wild turkey, pheasant and waterfowl stamp design contest. Many wildlife artists from around the state submitted over 30 pieces for judging.

Each year, Wisconsin wildlife artists enter to have their paintings featured on the next renditions of the wild turkey, pheasant and waterfowl stamps, which are available for purchase through Go Wild and license agents. By purchasing stamps, hunters, conservationists and stamp collectors fund habitat management and restoration around the state.

While hunters are required to purchase stamps to pursue these birds, anyone interested in supporting grassland, wetland and forest management activities is encouraged to purchase a Wisconsin wild turkey, pheasant or waterfowl stamp to support conserva-

tion in the state.

This year's judges were Paul Smith, an outdoor news writer for the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, Mark Kakatsch from the Wisconsin Wildlife Federation and Bill Koelpin Jr., a professional wildlife artist.

Kenosha resident Jim Tostrud won first place in this year's wild turkey stamp competition with a portrait featuring a close-up of a gobbling tom. Tostrud has been an avid outdoorsman, turkey hunter and a professional wildlife artist for much of his life, and he has competed in Wisconsin's salmon and trout stamp contests in prior years as well.

Robert Wilkens, of New Holstein, took first place in the pheasant design contest with artwork depicting a rooster pheasant in the snow. Wilkens has been creating wildlife artwork since he was about 18. His interest in wildlife stamp design contests began with the

Late interception costs Packers a chance to win in Pittsburgh

Packers drop to 3-6, one ahead of Bears for third in NFC North

Green Bay's late push to win the game came up short, as quarterback Jordan Love was intercepted by Pittsburgh Steelers' defensive back Damontae Kazee to give the Steelers a 23-19 victory in Pittsburgh on Nov. 12.

Down four with 59 seconds to go in the game, Love and the Packers' offense marched down the field on the back of a 46-yard completion to Jayden Reed, an eight-yard rush from Love and an 11-yard reception from A.J. Dillon. With three seconds left in the game from the Steelers' 16-yard line, Love dropped back and forced a throw to Christian Watson resulting in the game-sealing interception.

"Last play of the game, I tried to take a shot to the end zone and dialed up a play that we work all of the time in practice," said Love, on the last play of the game. "We were just trying to get a shot right in line to Christian and the DB was able to jump in front of the route and make a pick."

Even though the team lost, Love continued to show traits of why Green Bay selected him in the first round of the 2020 NFL Draft. The Utah State alum completed 21-of-40 pass attempts for 289 yards and two touchdowns. Running backs Aaron Jones and Dillon split 22 carries, with Jones rushing for 35 yards and Dillon rushing for 70. Jones added another 19 yards through the air on four receptions.

Reed was the biggest benefactor of Love's day, as he caught five passes for 84 yards and one touchdown. Romeo Doubs was the recipient of Love's other touchdown, as he finished the game with three catches for 31 yards and one touchdown.

With defensive starters Jaire Alexander and Quay Walker out for the

game with injuries, Green Bay held Steelers' quarterback Kenny Pickett

to just 126 yards and no touchdowns. It was the run defense that struggled though, as both Steelers running backs, Najee Harris and Jaylen Warren, found the end zone. In total, Pittsburgh rushed for 205, with Warren recording 101 and Harris recording 82.

Much like the interception to end the game, earlier in the fourth quarter, Green Bay, down 23-19, faced a second-and-nine from the Steelers' 14-yard line. Love dropped back to pass and lofted a pass down the left sideline intended for Watson. The ball was tipped by a Steelers defender before being intercepted by defensive back Keanu Neal.

"It is very frustrating," said Love, on the continued turnovers late in fourth quarters this year. "We have been put in this situation a lot of times, and we have not found a way to win it. So yeah, it is frustrating, but we just have to find a way - dig deeper. But it comes down to so many

different plays throughout the course of the game that if we can execute better and take advantage of some of those situations, I don't think we will put ourselves into this situation at the end of the game."

The game plan late could have been different though as Pittsburgh blocked an extra point following Reed's touchdown. Assuming Anders Carlson makes that extra point, Green Bay is probably playing for the tie and kicking a game-tying field goal as time expired, as opposed to forcing a pass to the end zone.

With the Chicago Bears beating the Carolina Panthers on Nov. 9, the Bears moved a half of a game back of Green Bay with a 3-7 record. On top of that, Green Bay is currently slotted in for the sixth draft selection in the 2024 NFL Draft and the New York Times Playoff Simulator currently gives the Packers a 9% chance to make the postseason.

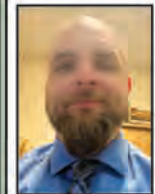

Packers will have opportunities to score on Chargers

Packers' offense vs. Chargers' defense

Green Bay did not win Sunday against the Steelers, but it'd be hard to come away from that game feeling anything other than encouraged on the offense.

Sure, they left points on the field. Yes, they might have missed a play here or there. The reality is, the Steelers have a pretty good defense, and the Packers nearly piled up 400 yards of offense against them.

AJ Dillon looked as good as he has all year, including breaking off a 40-yard run where he ran through a couple of arm tackles on his way down the sideline.

Aaron Jones is coming off a poor performance, but typically he does not have two bad games in a row.

The story, however, is Green Bay's passing game. Jordan Love had 288 yards passing on the day.

He threw a 36-yard touchdown to Jayden Reed, which may have been his best play of the season.

The Packers hit explosive plays against a defense that has made a living suffocating opposing offenses in 2023. They protected well against Alex Highsmith and TJ Watt as well.

The duo they'll face this week, while not as dynamic, will be Joey Bosa and Khalil Mack.

That's a formidable group, and both of them are capable of changing a game.

Apart from their pass rushers, the Chargers have one of the best safeties in all of football, Derwin James, roaming in their secondary.

The biggest caveat in James' career has been whether he's been healthy. He is healthy now and capable of making plays at all three levels of the field. The Packers are going to have to account for him to ensure he doesn't ruin the game. Asante Samuel Jr. has some sticky hands as well.

Despite all this star power, the Chargers' defense appears to be more bark than bite. They just gave up 41 points to the Detroit Lions. They give up an average of 21.8 points per game, which is good for 21st in the NFL.

Considering their head coach, Brandon Staley, is a defensive-minded coach, they should be better than that.

They haven't proven to be, so the Packers should have some opportunities to make plays.

Packers' defense vs. Chargers' offense

The Chargers' offense comes to town after having a huge day against

the Detroit Lions. They protected Justin Herbert, and he rewarded them with a big game. Herbert was brilliant against the Lions, throwing four touchdown passes.

Keenan Allen is still effective when he's healthy, and he proved that Sunday, tormenting the Lions for 175 yards through the air, including the game-tying touchdown.

Austin Ekeler is a nice player out

of the backfield, but the run game is more of an afterthought for the Chargers. Ekeler is best used as a receiver out of the backfield.

That probably bodes well for the Packers considering the run defense that we've come to expect showed up again Sunday. The Steelers are not a good running team and still were able to pile up more than 180 yards between their two backs. They aver-

aged more than five yards per carry.

The Packers' defense has been much better when they stop the run as opposed to when they don't.

The Chargers, however, don't appear to have much interest in running the ball, so the Packers should be able to focus on the pass game.

That, of course, is easier said than done.

Herbert is far and away the best quarterback the Packers have faced this season. They'll need to figure out some answers.

The secondary is likely the biggest concern going into this week. Jaire Alexander's status remains uncertain after he missed Sunday's game with a shoulder injury.

Carrington Valentine has had a strong two games since being inserted into the starting lineup for Rasul Douglas. He'll be joined by Corey Ballentine on the outside if Alexander can't go. Ballentine had a nice game against the Steelers as well.

The Chargers are going to be able to score points. It'll just be a matter of whether Green Bay can slow them down and keep up with their offense.

Special teams

The Packers' kicking game, which was strong through the early portion of the season, is starting to wobble.

Anders Carlson has missed a kick in every game since the bye week if not for a mulligan he received against Minnesota. He had an extra point blocked against Pittsburgh, which had a massive impact on the game.

Carlson's season as a whole still fits under encouraging, but the weather is starting to turn as the calendar gets closer to December. Kicking is only going to get more difficult, and the Packers have to hope Carlson is going to get straightened out.

Keisean Nixon had his best game of the season Sunday against the Steelers.

He had more than 120 yards as a kickoff returner and added a 12-yard punt return to his day as well.

The offense could use Nixon's burst as they continue to try and find their way.

The Chargers were ranked seventh on Rick Gosselin's special teams rankings from a season ago.

They're a good group, and they will exploit the Packers if they continue to make the same mistakes they have throughout the season.



Coming out of the halftime break, Keisean Nixon delivered a return of 49 yards, giving the Packers fantastic field position across midfield. It took a 4th-and-6 attempt to move the chains the first time on the series, but Jordan Love hit Aaron Jones for enough yardage to get the first down. Jones picked up another conversion with a 12-yard catch on 3rd-and-3. The Packers had to settle for a field goal, but that cut Pittsburgh's lead down to one point.

KEYS TO THE GAME

Herbert will be biggest QB challenge for Packers

The Green Bay Packers are coming off their best performance of the season in the passing game. Jordan Love piled up 288 yards through the air against a stingy Pittsburgh Steelers defense.

Unfortunately, the big mistakes that have plagued the Packers all season long reared their ugly head again. Love turned the ball over twice deep in the red zone, Anders Carlson had an extra point blocked, and De'Vondre Campbell dropped what could have been a pick six.

Those mistakes added up. The Steelers took advantage of them and beat Green Bay 23-19.

The Packers are 3-6, which is identical to their record at this time a year ago.

Much like this time a year ago, the Packers are facing a tough opponent at Lambeau Field. Last year, that was the Dallas Cowboys.

This year, it'll be the Los Angeles Chargers.

The Packers' season is likely on the brink this week. If they're going to get back on the winning side of things, here are the keys to protecting their home field.

Offensive tackles

vs. Joey Bosa and Khalil Mack

The Packers are familiar with Khalil Mack's work. He used to torment Green Bay when he was in Chicago. He made his Bears debut in the 2018 season opener. Mack nearly won that game by himself that night. He stripped DeShone Kizer when the Packers were in Bears territory to save three points.

Later he would intercept a Kizer pass that was returned for a touchdown. Instead, his performance became a mere footnote as Aaron Rodgers staged a 20-point comeback in the second half to help the Packers win 24-23.

Mack isn't the same player he was in Chicago, but he's still an effective pass rusher.

Joey Bosa is one of the better pass rushers in football as well. The Packers are in the midst of a tough stretch of opposing pass rushers.

They did a good job against the Steelers' tandem of Alex Highsmith and TJ Watt. Watt sacked Love once but wasn't the disruptive force he typically is. Highsmith did not record a sack either.

The Packers' offense, by extension, had one of its best games of the season. Love was effective through the air. He had explosive plays to Dontayvion Wicks, Luke Musgrave, Christian Watson and Jayden Reed.

He'll be looking to build on that performance this week. That'll be tough to do if Bosa and Mack are consistently in his lap.

Rasheed Walker started at left tackle last week with Yosh Nijman battling a back injury. It'll be interesting to see who starts Sunday if Nijman is healthier than he was a week ago.

Packers' secondary vs. Justin Herbert

The Packers' defense has done a

good job at keeping opposing teams out of the end zone over the last month. The most amount of points they've allowed since the 34 against Detroit in late September is 24, to the Minnesota Vikings.

They have been fortunate, however, in the quarterbacks they've faced.

The best one they've faced in that stretch, and perhaps all season, is Kirk Cousins. Cousins left that game early with an Achilles injury that ended his season.

Other than Cousins, the Packers have faced Jimmy Garoppolo, Russell Wilson, Brett Rypien and Kenny Pickett.

Wilson has had good seasons in the past but has struggled since getting to Denver. Of the others, one was benched (Garoppolo) and one was released after the game (Rypien).

Justin Herbert is a different animal. When discussing the league's best quarterbacks, he's on the short list.

A microcosm of Herbert's career took place Sunday against Detroit.

Herbert was brilliant, leading the offense to 38 points including a game-tying touchdown pass.

It didn't matter because the Chargers' defense allowed the Lions to kick a field goal as time expired and allowed 41 points on the day.

For comparison's sake, the Packers have scored 39 points in their last two games. The Chargers scored 38 on Sunday.

The Packers likely are not equipped to keep up with Herbert in a shootout, but they may not have a choice.

Jaire Alexander missed Sunday's game with a shoulder injury. His status will be unclear for Sunday.

Corey Ballentine had some nice moments Sunday, but he's spent most of the season on the practice squad.

Carrington Valentine has also been solid but will have the ups-and-downs of a normal rookie season as well.

There's a difference between facing the journeymen the Packers have faced recently and taking on the league's elite.

Sunday will be the ladder. The Packers will need their inexperi-

enced secondary to be up to the challenge.

Luke Musgrave vs. Chargers' defense

Luke Musgrave is starting to come on a little bit. Against the Rams, he had two big catches — including his first career touchdown.

Sunday against the Steelers, he had two catches for 64 yards, including a 36-yard reception down the seam.

Those are the types of big plays the Packers envisioned when they picked Musgrave in the second round of the 2022 draft.

Musgrave will have his opportunity again Sunday. The Chargers did just hold fellow rookie Sam LaPorta in check but gave up a big touchdown to Brock Wright down the middle of the field.

That's where Musgrave's big plays have come the last two weeks. Green Bay has given Musgrave more opportunities in the middle of the field, and they'll need to continue that. If they do, more big plays could follow.

In a game against Herbert, the offense needs to make big plays.

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Lack of weapons expose glaring hole

Green Bay has only scored 19 offensive touchdowns through 10 weeks

The lack of first half scoring from the Packers this year has been talked about ad nauseam, but looking at the bigger picture, Green Bay has only scored 19 offensive touchdowns this year, averaging just over two per game.

Green Bay has scored over 19 points just four times and haven't scored over 20 points since a Week 2 loss to the Atlanta Falcons. While many want to blame that on either Jordan Love's inconsistency, or Matt LaFleur's play-calling, which both have merit, that may ultimately be a result of the lack of talent Green Bay sports on the offensive side of the ball.

Guys like Romeo Doubs, Aaron Jones, Jayden Reed and Luke Musgrave are talented football players, but how many of those players are really "difference makers?" While yes, this point can be argued as outside of Davante Adams, teams

from years-past have also had a lack of talent, but with Aaron Rodgers at quarterback, those inadequacies were covered up very easily.

That brings us to this year. It is obvious that Love is not Rodgers and if he can develop, probably won't be Rodgers for a very long time yet. To aid in that development, there needs to be stars around Love. Remember when the Eagles got A.J. Brown to help Jalen Hurts, or when the Dolphins got Tyreek Hill to help Tua Tagovailoa or even when the Bills got Stefon Diggs to help Josh Allen? It seems like that is going to have to be the recipe here for Green Bay as it looks to the future.

As has been the "Green Bay" way in the past though, it is hard to expect that the front office makes a big time trade or a splash in free agency. That leaves Doubs, Reed, Musgrave and Christian Watson to try to play outside their realm right now.

"When you get in position to score touchdowns, you have to

convert," said Packers head coach Matt LaFleur, after Green Bay's loss to the Steelers. "Those are missed opportunities in my mind."

That has been the narrative for the Packers all season — those missed opportunities. While yes, with a young team like this, those things happen, but at this point in the season, the "young" excuse has to be retired.

It is really easy to say that having more talent will result in more points, but does having someone like Adams, Tee Higgins, or even George Pickens remedy some of those missed opportunities? Probably and that has been a problem with Green Bay for many years. The team misses out on the difference maker and that is a reason for only winning two Super Bowls with Rodgers and Brett Favre.

Love himself has to be better, and it is reasonable to think that he will be in the future, but at some point he is going to need someone else to make the play. For example, Mus-

grave continues to use ability to get open, but stumbles after the catch and is tackled short of the goal line. Green Bay then gets stuffed and is forced to settle for a field goal. That is a difference of four points and as everyone who watches football knows, four points forces the other team to score a touchdown to keep up.

Another example is that Green Bay loves to take one-on-one shots to the end zone to allow its pass-catcher to make a play on the ball. While it has resulted in a few touchdowns, more often than not this year, that has resulted in an interception or an incompleteness. That wasn't the case when Adams was the intended target on similar plays.

It is too late to make trades in the NFL now and it has become obvious that this is a rebuilding or transition year for Green Bay, but if the players surrounding Love are not addressed in the off season, next year could be another year of stagnant offense from the Packers.

Wicks working to clean up details

Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks was selected by the Packers in the fifth round of the 2023 NFL Draft. Wicks attended Plaquemine High School in Plaquemine, Louisiana. He played wide receiver and quarterback in high school. He committed to the University of Virginia to play college football.

What's your background as a quarterback?

My first year in high school when I joined the team, I played QB behind my brother (Trey LeBlanc), so that was a thing. And then I moved to receiver like a year in. So I started on the high school team my 10th grade year. I wasn't playing, I was just backing my brother up; I was like the third-string QB. And then my 11th grade year, one of the receivers got hurt and they moved me. My brother was throwing it to me every time, so I just stayed with it. But I have some background at quarterback, I played a couple games at quarterback. My senior year, I played receiver and quarterback.

Did coaches know you could throw or just did they throw it at you in practice or what?

Nah, we've been doing things, stuff like that, plays, just trying stuff out, and I guess it was the game to call it. We were all confident in it. They asked me if I was ready to throw, and I was ready. So we went with it.

How do you feel like first eight games have gone for you personally?

I mean, losing always makes everything feel different, but I feel good with where I'm at. I've got to clean up a couple things in the game, but I think I'm doing a good job. I can definitely clean up some stuff and be better, but so far I think when my name is called and I step in, I have that confidence to make plays. We do it in practice, so having that confidence in your preparation in practice and trusting that only helps me out on game day.

Are you guys talking about early game struggles?

Yeah, all the time, we're talking about that. As a whole offense, we all know we're letting the team down. We're not complementing the defense or the special teams the way we're supposed to. So, we all got to do something as a whole — individually and as a whole offensive group. We've got to come together, connect more, do more. We've just got to do more.

I think it falls on the players, because we're the ones out there playing. So, as we go, the game goes. And I think the receivers have a big part in that. Whether it's blocking for the running backs or fighting for extra yards. I think it's on us, and I think we can help out a lot just by cleaning up the small details. As a whole offense, we've got a lot of details we miss out on. Just small details that hurt us at the end of the game.

There might be plays early that hurt us at the end of the game. So just cleaning up the details and doing our 1/11th.

Matthews, Kampman to be inducted into Packers Hall of Fame

The Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame Inc. will induct former Packers Clay Matthews and Aaron Kampman at the 53rd Hall of Fame Induction Banquet, announced Packers Hall of Fame Inc. President Don Sipes. The banquet is scheduled to be held Aug. 29, 2024, in the Lambeau Field Atrium.

Matthews, a linebacker, was selected by the Packers in the first round (26th overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft out of the University of Southern California. Matthews played 10 seasons in Green Bay, appearing in 143 games with 137 starts. He ranks No. 1 on the Packers' all-time list (since 1982) with 83.5 career sacks, including 10 sacks in 2009, which tops the franchise record books for the most sacks in a rookie campaign. He earned six Pro Bowl selections during his Packers career, tied with Reggie White for the second-most selections by a defensive player in team history. His 80 sacks from 2009-17 ranked No. 5 in the NFL over that span. Matthews was named first-team All-Pro by The Associated Press in 2010, the first Green Bay linebacker to earn that honor in more

than 20 years.

The same season, he helped lead the Packers to a victory in Super Bowl XLV. His 11 sacks in 15 career playoff games are the most in franchise postseason history (since 1982) and are tied for No. 6 in NFL playoff history. Matthews finished his career playing one season (2019) with the Los Angeles Rams.

Defensive end Kampman was selected by the Packers in the fifth round (156th overall) of the 2002 NFL Draft out of the University of Iowa. He played eight seasons in Green Bay, appearing in 112 games with 104 starts.

In 2006, he ranked No. 2 in the NFL with 15.5 sacks, the third-highest single-season total in team history. That year, he also posted 113 tackles, a franchise record for a Packers defensive lineman.

Kampman started 89 of 90 games from 2006-08, missing only the 2007 regular-season finale when several starters rested for the playoffs. During that span, he ranked No. 3 in the league with 37 sacks. With 54 sacks during his Packers career, he ranks No. 5 overall in team history.



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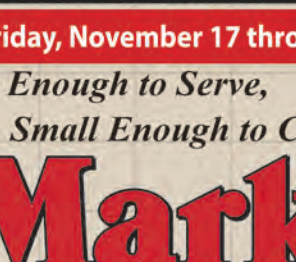
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
