City of Shawano issues emergency declaration

Non-essential staff being sent home, meetings to be held remotely

SHAWANO — The city Monday issued a proclamation declaring a state of emergency due to the COVID-19 coronavirus.

The proclamation followed the announcement that Gov. Tony Evers planned to issue a stay-at-home order closing all non-essential businesses and services statewide.

The Shawano proclamation states that the city will make all of its resources available to adopt, implement and support all actions and recommendations of federal, state and county public health agencies.

Under the emergency declaration, all in-person meetings and gatherings involving city employees, staff and elected officials are being suspended.

Any necessary meetings of the Shawano Common Council, committees, commissions and boards would be conducted remotely.

Currently, there are no meetings scheduled but the city will likely have to hold its April reorganizational meeting following the April 7 election.

"If we have to meet, if there is

something that is required that we need to do in a timely manner, we will meet but it will be done remotely," City Clerk Lesley Nemetz said.

"Right now, our intention is that we will be doing our meetings via Skype and we will be doing Facebook live events to have that out to the public as well as hoping we can also broadcast that through our cable feed," Nemetz said.

"Another option that we're looking into is having a call-in number where people would be able to call in and listen," she said.

Much of the emergency declaration includes steps the city has already taken, including closing down City Hall to the public.

However, one of the key things the new emergency declaration is doing, Nemetz said, is putting the city in a position to receive any federal funding assistance that might be available.

"The other thing that it is doing is putting into effect our emergency preparedness plan and response directive, which then allows us to send home those non-essential employees," she said.

Non-essential city personnel will either work from home or be ex-

cused from work.

City-sponsored events will either be canceled or rescheduled.

All city business travel is suspended for the duration of the emergency.

The city will continue to provide essential services, including emergency services, garbage and recycling, and the Shawano County Landfill.

Curbside absentee voting will continue at City Hall during the emergency, with hours extended to 7 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

At this point, the state has no plans to cancel the April 7 presidential primary and general election, according to Nemetz.

"It's basically up to each individual clerk to figure out how they're going to have a safe and effective election on the seventh," she said. "We're in the process of coming up with different ideas and plans to ensure the safety of our staff as well as the residents who choose to come out and vote.

But that's also why we're encouraging people so strongly to take care of this in advance and request their ballot either by mail or by stopping down and doing the in-person curbside voting."

2 men facing armed robbery, drug charges

Pair allegedly broke into Wescott home with masks and guns

SHAWANO — Two men are facing armed robbery and burglary charges and multiple drug counts for an alleged home invasion in the town of Wescott last week.

Alex J. Kofnetka, 35, of Neenah, and Joel D. Koehnke, 35, of Appleton, are

accused of breaking into a residence on March 18 wearing masks and armed with dangerous weapons.

The pair allegedly kicked open the front door of the residence brandishing guns and demanding to see a man who lived there that they claimed owed them money.

The man they were looking for was not home at the time.

A woman who was home at the time fled into a bedroom with her two children and called 911 while Kofnetka and Koehnke searched the residence.

Shawano County sheriff's deputies

arrived just as the two men were leaving the residence and getting into their vehicle.

Authorities located a .44 magnum revolver and a semi-automatic pistol in the vehicle, along with 6.27 grams of marijuana, 6.02 grams of cocaine, drug paraphernalia and \$2,258 in cash.

Both men have been charged with felony counts of armed robbery, armed burglary, possession of cocaine and second or subsequent possession of marijuana.

Koehnke is additionally charged with felony counts of possession of

narcotic drugs and possession of a firearm by a felon.

They could each face a maximum 40 years in prison and a \$100,000 fine if convicted on the armed robbery charge.

Kofnetka was ordered held on a \$20,000 cash bond set by Judge James Habeck and is due in court for an adjourned initial appearance April 6.

Koehnke was ordered held on a \$25,000 cash bond set by Habeck and is also scheduled for an adjourned initial court appearance on April 6.

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Gresham man facing multiple drug charges

GRESHAM — A Gresham man is facing multiple felony drug counts after Stockbridge-Munsee police executed a search warrant at his residence last week.

Roy H. Martin, 45, has been charged with felony counts of possession with intent to deliver marijuana, manufacture and delivery of mari-

juana and maintaining a drug trafficking place.

According to the criminal complaint, police received a tip in late January that Martin was dealing marijuana products.

Police collected trash from his residence on three separate occasions that yielded material that tested positive for marijuana, according to the complaint.

Police and Shawano County deputies executed a search warrant on March 18.

A total of approximately 467.32 grams of marijuana plant material, marijuana vape cartridges, marijuana honey oil and other substances were seized along with various items of drug paraphernalia and drug manufacturing equipment, according to the Stockbridge-Munsee

Police Department.

Martin could face a maximum six years in prison and \$10,000 fine if convicted of possession with intent to deliver marijuana, and 3½ years and a \$10,000 fine on each of the other two felony counts.

Martin is free on a \$2,500 signature bond set by Judge James Habeck. He is scheduled for a preliminary hearing on the charges on June 4.

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City extends absentee voting hours

SHAWANO — The city is holding extended absentee voting hours two days a week ahead of the April 7 election to give voters who might not be able to vote during regular hours a chance to cast their ballots.

Shawano City Hall, 127 S. Sawyer St., will remain available to curbside in-person voting up until 7 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays, March 24,

26, 31 and April 2.

The move is part of a push being made to encourage absentee voting statewide due to health concerns over the COVID-19 coronavirus.

“In an effort to continue to keep our residents and staff safe, the city of Shawano is continuing to urge its residents to utilize www.myvote.wi.gov to obtain an absentee ballot for the

upcoming April 7 election,” the city said in a statement.

Those who don’t have the ability to upload a photo ID to that site can mail a written request to City Hall. You will need to provide a copy of your ID with the request.

Curbside absentee voting is available if neither of those options are practical for voters.

“We will continue to keep you informed of any changes the city makes regarding the services being provided to our residents,” the city said in the statement. “We hope you are all able to stay safe and healthy during this time and are here for you if you have any questions. Thank you as always for your understanding and patience during these rapidly changing times.”

Small business deals with illness

Baba's Café is open for pickup service

WITTENBERG — When Laura Jolin and Cary Gorski opened their restaurant in April 2017, they were pursuing their own version of the American dream. The couple planned to work as owners and operators of Baba's Café and decided to start out small, keeping hours only on Wednesdays through Sundays, primarily for breakfast and lunch.

What they didn't plan for was what would happen if one or both of them became ill — and certainly they never imagined dealing with a

nationwide health crisis.

"If we don't work, we don't get paid," said Jolin. "We weren't thinking about not getting paid."

A couple of weeks ago, they had to shut down the restaurant for about a week while they each recovered from the flu. As luck would have it, they reopened their doors just in time to be closed to all but takeout service, due to the state decree for dealing with COVID-19.

"The state isn't giving us options, so we're going with how they want it to be," said Jolin.

"It's a precaution, and we need to do our part to keep the virus infections at a minimum," said Gorski.

The restaurant is offering takeout service and limited delivery at this time.

Planning for such a scenario

was not something they thought about when deciding to open the restaurant in Wittenberg, Jolin said. Looking back, she wished they'd taken their sick time earlier rather than later. Gorski said he is grateful that neither of them ended up in the hospital.

The couple was living in Appleton when they opened Baba's Café. Jolin said she had grandparents in the area and was used to visiting every other weekend. The time spent commuting gave them a bit of breathing room to discuss the business as it grew.

"We needed the time to adjust to the change of pace," said Gorski.

They have since relocated to Wittenberg and live with their two dogs about six miles outside of the village. They have enjoyed a loyal clientele

who appreciate the good food and pleasant personalities offered by Jolin and Gorski.

One thing they say they miss about Appleton is the abundance of food delivery options, which is another reason why they are exploring delivery service for their restaurant. Jolin's parents own The Olde Dime Store, just two doors down from Baba's on Webb Street, and are willing to lend a hand with deliveries, if needed.

Most customers, however, have been calling ahead for pickup. The cafe is open 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Wednesday through Sunday. They can take credit card payments over the phone or cash upon arrival; checks are not accepted. Their menu is available on their website, www.babas-cafe.com. Call 715-253-2288 to place an order.

Menominee Tribal police warn of possibly laced heroin

Authorities responded to four overdose cases Saturday

KESHENA — The Menominee Tribal Police Department is pleading with the public for the community's assistance after responding to four drug overdose cases in a single day.

"We are asking the public to spread the word, to let anyone know that may have purchased heroin recently, we fear that it may be laced with fentanyl or an other unknown substance," the department said in a Facebook post.

Fentanyl is 80-100 times more potent than morphine and an overdose could occur quickly and is likely to end in death if Narcan is not rendered immediately.

"If you would like to turn in suspected heroin or other drugs, the police department will take it from you

with no questions asked," the post stated. "Please call our non-emergency number at 715-799-3881 if you have anything to turn in or any information pertaining to this matter."

The string of incidents began just after midnight on Saturday, as police responded to a medical call of a male not breathing.

The officers on scene quickly determined that the male had overdosed from suspected heroin.

Officers administered Narcan. Menominee Tribal EMS and Shawano EMS arrived on scene to provide emergency medical services.

"Regretfully, the male eventually succumbed to the effects of this overdose," the police department said.

While tending to the first overdose victim, a second overdose was called in to 911 at approximately 12:14 a.m.

Tribal officers and the Menominee County Sheriff's Office responded to the second overdose and administered Narcan to the second individual. This individual was revived, checked over by EMS and recovered from the overdose.

After a brief investigation, officers were able to determine the source of where the heroin came from for both of these overdose incidents. The same name was given as the supplier for both overdoses.

A search warrant was obtained for the residence of the reported supplier of the heroin.

Menominee Tribal police and Menominee County sheriff's deputies executed the warrant at approximately 3:06 a.m.

As a result of the warrant, a female adult was taken into custody, the police department said. Illegal drugs, drug paraphernalia and money were seized. The female was booked into

the tribal jail.

"Through Menominee Tribal Police Department's investigation it was determined the female that had been arrested from the search warrant had received the heroin from her supplier," the department said in its Facebook post.

A second search warrant was obtained for the residence of original supplier of the heroin. Police and sheriff's deputies executed that search warrant at about 6 a.m. Saturday.

"As a result of the second search warrant Tribal Police seized the following; 33.6 grams of Methamphetamine, 14.8 grams of Heroin, 12.7 grams of Cocaine and a large sum of cash. A female adult was also arrested from the residence and booked into the Menominee Tribal Jail," the department said.

The department said two more overdose cases were reported later that day.

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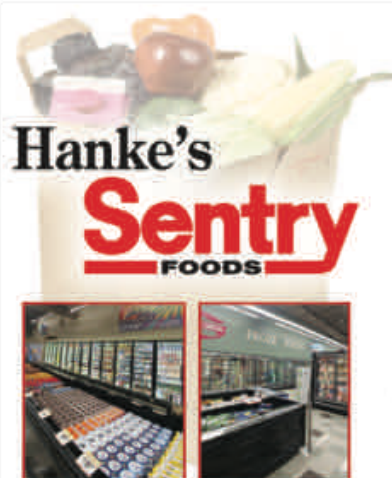
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Menominee COVID-19 response expands to food deliveries

KESHENA — Children in the Menominee reservation's Head Start program will start receiving food deliveries on March 23, according to Vaughn Bowles, tribal public information officer.

That's one of the continuing responses to the COVID-19 pandemic as discussed in the daily meeting of the tribe's incident command team.

Students in the Menominee Indian School District (MISD) can go to their school for two days of food on Tuesdays and Thursdays, Bowles said.

The tribe's Aging Department is also maintaining its food service program but is now only providing

takeout and home delivery meals, Bowles continued. The priority is on those seniors who are restricted to their homes and other elders.

Bowles credited tribal leadership with taking the pandemic seriously and providing good examples. He said part of the reason why some people haven't taken the pandemic seriously is that we haven't had a disease like this since the Spanish Flu Epidemic of 1918 and they have nothing for comparison. The tribal public information officer observed COVID-19 is different and it is much more lethal than the flu.

Infections are not confined to the elderly as has been the experience early in the pandemic, Bowles said.

He cited Doug Cox, who is coordinating with other tribes on the pandemic, in telling the Friday meeting that a 17-year-old boy on the Bad River Reservation in Ashland County had tested positive, as an indication that all age groups are at risk.

Bowles expressed concern for young people who contract COVID-19 and survive but then have to live with damaged lungs.

Menominee gaming operations and the hotel closed on Friday, Bowles said. The tribal buildings are being subjected to a deep cleaning.

Tribal government departments are allowing only essential personnel to come to work, with the remainder

working from home, Bowles said. Operations are also being consolidated into fewer spaces.

Employees of the tribe will remain on the payroll during the shutdown, Bowles said. Other entities, such as Menominee Tribal Enterprises (MTE), will make separate decisions on whether to pay employees.

MTE forest work remains open, he continued, as most of those workers operate power equipment from an isolated cab or perform tasks at a distance from other people. The MTE board will soon be deciding on its next steps in keeping the business open.

More PSC consumer protections ordered

Gov. Tony Evers issued Emergency Order 11 on Sunday, suspending several utility-related administrative rules, paving the way for the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin to temporarily order further consumer protections amid the COVID-19 public health emergency.

"It is critically important to give people flexibility during this emergency, when paychecks might be disrupted, to keep the lights and heat on and water flowing," Evers said. "We're making sure that folks don't have to make the critical choice between keeping their utilities on and paying for other essentials."

Immediately following the governor's emergency order, PSC Chairwoman Rebecca Cameron Valcq directed regulated utilities in the state to take the following actions for the duration of the emergency:

- Stop utility disconnection for nonpayment for all customers, including commercial, industrial

and farm accounts. Previously this applied to residential accounts only.

- Cease assessing late fees to customer accounts.
- Halt the practice of requiring deposits from customers for reconnection of service.
- Allow deferred payment agreements for all customers who request them.
- Remove any administrative barriers for customers establishing or reestablishing utility service.
- Authorize water utilities to provide budget billing arrangements to customers. Electric and natural gas utilities are allowed to do this under current rules.

Previously, the PSC directed utilities to cease disconnecting residential service for nonpayment until the state public health emergency had been lifted. Additionally, utilities were required to make reasonable attempts to reconnect service to an occupied dwelling that had been disconnected.

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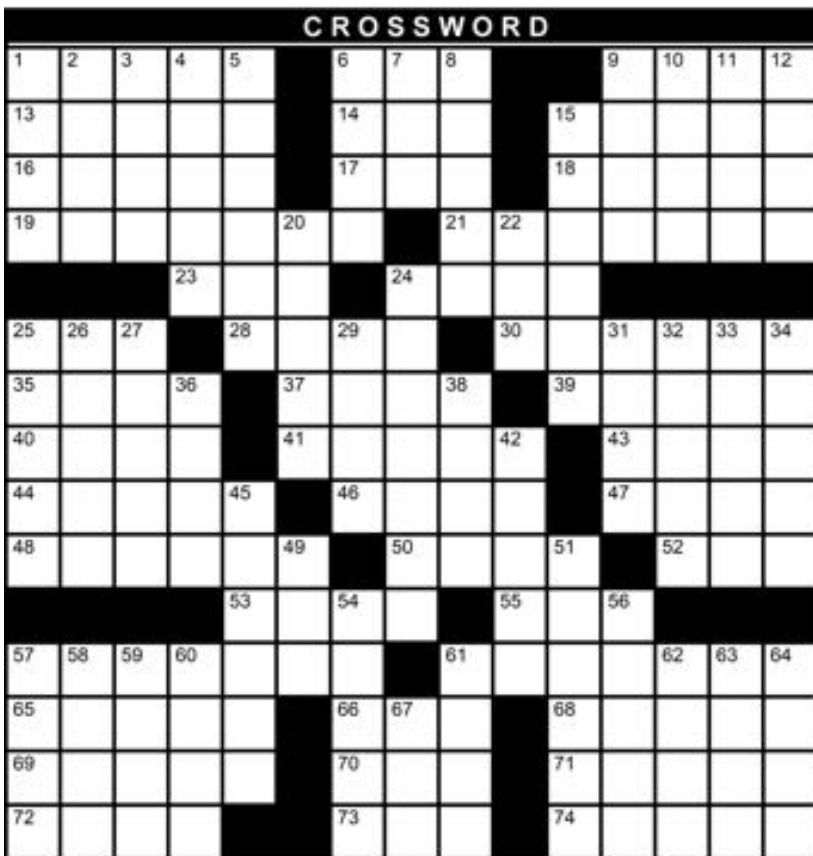

McCarthy portrait needs to be removed

To the editor:

In the Circuit Court Branch 2 courtroom at the Shawano County Courthouse hangs a portrait of Sen. Joe McCarthy.

The picture hangs there because Joe was circuit court judge here in Shawano in the late 1930s. During his time as a judge, he was censured on two occasions, by Wisconsin Supreme Court. He is from our area, he grew up on a farm in the Appleton area.

He was raised without any special wealth or privilege, just a poor Irish Catholic kid from the sticks.

His claim to infamy occurred when he became a U.S. Senator representing Wisconsin in 1946. He served for a few uneventful years, and then he started his witch hunt which was characterized by hatefulness, and by destroying other peoples lives, often with little or no evidence.

At that time, homosexuals were characterized as deviants, so he would sometimes accuse people of being homosexuals, in order to help destroy them. Other people he simply destroyed because he was looking for media attention. The media, at the time, were very tuned into the things he was saying. He had a circus show going on, and he

was the ringmaster. History tends to repeat itself.

For years, he continued to destroy other people, and as far as I can tell, he did it to advance his career possibilities. He wallowed in all the attention, of course. Eventually, the Senate censured him, and they also socially ostracized him, left him out in the cold, with few friends. His life ended a few years later.

We have a portrait of a hateful person, really a malignancy, hanging upon the courtroom walls.

The portrait has been there for years, and it speaks to all people who enter the courtroom, including the public, the court personnel, lawyers and judges.

Now, I know the judges who have been serving out community the past 20-30 years. They are people who would not want to be associated with hatefulness.

In the Southern part of our great country, many of the symbols of the hatefulness of the Civil War have been removed. We also need to remove the vestiges of hatefulness that still haunt us in Shawano County.

I suggest that we, in Shawano, do the same thing that the U.S. senate did in 1954. Joe McCarthy does not represent our community, or the ideals of our community. We should censure the portrait and remove it from our courtroom wall.
