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Vaccines for county use facing some hurdles

County's health improving when it comes to coronavirus pandemic

The Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department is working to develop vaccination sites for the coronavirus vaccine, but resources are scarce to make it happen, according to Theresa Harmala, health director.

Harmala told the Shawano County Board on Jan. 26 that the health department is smaller than that of other counties across the state, and much of the acquired vaccine in Wisconsin is going to facilities that can more easily get shots into arms.

"I know this is burning on everyone's mind," Harmala said. "They've opened up the 1B (phase), which is 65 and older, plus the 1A. That opens it up to about 700,000 Wisconsinites that are eligible to be vaccinated, and we're only getting 70,000 (vaccines). People that want it want it now, and people that don't want it don't care about it. But it puts it in perspective."

Harmala said she is working with Menominee County and the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin to get vaccines there, but Shawano County only recently received \$700,000 in coronavirus funding. However, the health department is working with an agency to establish a mass vaccination clinic.

"Your mass clinic is not going to look like your flu clinic where you can just walk in and do this," Harmala said. "If you've worked with ThedaCare at all, you know you have to have a scheduled appointment. With the coronavirus vaccine, there's a lot of prep work."

A lot of structure is required to administer the coronavirus vaccines, according to Harmala, which means volunteers need to be trained to make the process flow smoothly. She noted her department is working diligently, but it's going to take some time to make things happen. Hospitals are moving to using the Pfizer vaccine, which requires extreme cold to store, which frees up the Moderna vaccine for county health departments and pharmacies to utilize, she said.

ThedaCare Medical Center-Shawano is taking some appointments,

according to Harmala, as is Gwidt Pharmacy in Wittenberg.

Supervisor Gene Hoppe noted that there are facilities in Green Bay offering help to people in Shawano County

in the interim. He noted his wife was able to reserve spots for both of them in mid-February.

"You can get in there and get your vaccine, but you have to have it by appointment," Hoppe said.

Supervisor Sandy Steinke noted that Langlade County, which is similar in population to Shawano County, is currently administering vaccines through its health department, so she was puzzled why it couldn't currently be done here. She also said that Langlade County required a call through a primary physician, and she was worried that Shawano County residents would not be able to follow suit.

"Unfortunately, with ThedaCare, a lot of people no longer have primary physicians because they've moved them back and forth so often that nobody knows who their primary physician is," Steinke said. "Can we get a number from your department that says what you've got to do if you don't have a doctor? People are confused. People are getting anxious."

Regarding Langlade County's ability to provide coronavirus vaccines now, Harmala said that every county health department is different. In Shawano County's case, there is Harmala and one other nurse handling the department.

"A lot of them have a lot of different resources," Harmala said. "We just happen to not have a lot of resources, for what it's worth. Brown County was not doing it because it has a large hospital system. We're so limited in what we can do with just us."

Because of the limitations, coming in to the office at the courthouse will not be enough, according to Harmala. It would work once the "masses" were vaccinated, she said, but right now, bigger facilities and

resources are needed.

"We need a space where we can have this, five stations," she said.

County Board Chairman Tom Kautza noted that there would need to be additional staffing, but he is unaware of any doctors or nurses who would be able to break away from hospitals and clinics, even for a day, to administer vaccines.

"There's also a ton of paperwork you have to go through even when you find someone to do it," Kautza said, noting that any medical personnel volunteering for the effort would need liability insurance.

Supervisor Aaron Damrau suggested looking at retired doctors and nurses in the area as potential volunteers.

"You've got 27 people here on the county board that know a lot of people," Damrau said. "You can make something happen."

Supervisor Deb Noffke said that it "boggles the mind" how much red tape is holding up the process when people are seeking vaccines.

Supervisor Joe Miller suggested working with the Wisconsin National Guard. He pointed out how the guard has come to the Stockbridge-Munsee reservation for coronavirus testing for months, so it made sense to ask them for help with administering vaccines.

"With a mass vaccination event, they can assist you with that," Miller said.

Harmala said she has been in touch with the National Guard, but was informed that only five people would be provided — and that only happens once the county gets the clinic figured out.

Kautza said the process to administer vaccines would not be as easy as it appears on television.

"Everybody's looking for it, and they want it right now," Kautza said. "I don't understand where you can watch the news and they're driving up in cars, getting a shot and they're driving away, but that does not go with anything the state tells you that you need to have. I think they're being disrepresentative of what it really takes."

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Waukechon couple charged with abusing their child

Lisa R. Gutenberg, 40 and Gabriel J. Gutenberg, 39, each face four felony counts of physical abuse and neglect of a child in a preliminary hearing held Feb. 4, according to Wisconsin Circuit Court Access records.

The couple is each charged with two counts of physical abuse of a child, repeated acts intentionally causing great bodily harm and could result in prison sentences of up to 60 years on each count if convicted. They also face prison sentences of up to 25 years for each of the two counts of chronic neglect of a child with the consequence of great bodily harm.

The Gutenbergs' residence is listed on County Road T southeast of Lunds in the Town of Waukechon.

Dade M. Marthaler, 18, also of the Town of Waukechon, will face a felony count of physical abuse of a child, repeated acts intentionally causing great bodily harm.

Marthaler was ordered to have

no contact with any of the children involved while the Gutenbergs were ordered to have no contact with two of the children involved.

Judge William Kussel Jr. will preside over the hearing in Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court.

Court records show search warrants were executed in June and November 2020.

Marthaler could receive up to 60 years in prison if convicted.

The charges were filed July 2020 for incidents happening in August 2019 and January 2020.

Gabriel Gutenberg and Lisa Gutenberg each signed a \$20,000 bond in July 2020. Marthaler signed a \$5,000 signature bond.

Lisa Gutenberg was ordered to pay child support of \$195 per month for one minor child in October 2020. Also in October, Gabriel Gutenberg was ordered to pay \$1,603 per month to support two minor children. Court records show the mother and father are required to pay equally for any uninsured medical and dental expenses.

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Sheriff's Facebook post draws county supervisor's ire

Miller asks if Bieber was in D.C. day of Capitol riot

It could have been a “yes” or “no” answer to a question Joe Miller asked at the Jan. 27 Shawano County Board of Supervisors meeting.

Miller, county board member and former police officer, asked if Shawano County Sheriff Adam Bieber was in Washington, D.C. on Jan. 6, the day thousands of former president Donald Trump's supporters broke into the U.S. Capitol.

No one from the sheriff's department, including Bieber, was in attendance at the board meeting when the question was asked, although there is

usually a department representative present.

Miller said that he began his question noting it may not be able to be answered immediately.

When asked on Feb. 2 if he was in the capital on Jan. 6, Bieber said, “No. I don't know why anyone would think I would be.”

Told of Bieber's answer, Miller said he was satisfied.

Bieber, however, initially responded with a Facebook post Jan. 28 showing a photo altered to put the sheriff's face on the body of a man with his feet on House Speaker Nancy Pelosi's desk. Bieber commented with the photo, “A county board member asked in open session whether I was in D.C. on January 6th...lol” followed by three emojis.

Dan Weisensel, a Shawano County deputy, commented immediately

below the manipulated photo, “Dam straight you were there!”

The Associated Press reported the man in the original photo is Richard Barnett, 60, Gravette, Arkansas. He faces a felony charge of unlawfully entering a restricted area with a lethal weapon. AP said the weapon was a stun gun.

Barnett, also is charged with disorderly conduct and theft of public property, the AP added. If convicted on all charges, Barnett, currently in federal custody and denied bond, could be sentenced to more than 11 years in federal prison.

In an email, Miller said, “This is how Bieber responded. A sworn Law Enforcement Officer depicting himself committing a federal crime!”

The sheriff said that “absolutely” his intention with the Facebook post

was to be humorous.

“It ain't funny,” Miller said.

“I just wish county board members wouldn't play politics in this manner,” Bieber said.

Miller related in an email to Tom Kautza, county board chairman, “Yesterday, my question in the board member comment (part of the agenda) was with the intent that I had to address rumors and questions floating out in the county. I phrased the question so it could be answered with a simple yes or no.”

Miller said he had no malicious intent.

Miller continued in the email that he found Bieber's response was disrespectful to the entire board, “He (Bieber) could have just stated ‘no,’ that would have been sufficient. He did not do that.”

Recent proceedings in Shawano-Menominee County District Court include:

- Michael J. Thorson, 33, Wittenberg, was charged Jan. 28 with driving/operating a vehicle without consent, disorderly conduct and two counts of misdemeanor bail jumping. He posted a cash bond of \$1,500 and an initial appearance will resume Feb. 17 before Judge William F. Kussel Jr.

- Trevor J. Aschenbrenner, 23, Shawano, was charged Jan. 29 with two counts of battery or threat to judge, prosecutor, or law enforcement officer, disorderly conduct, resisting/obstructing an officer and eight counts of felony bail jumping. A cash bond of \$20,000 was set and an initial appearance before Kussel will resume Feb. 15.

- Malorey C. Borroughs, 33, Bonduel, was charged Jan. 29 with possession of methamphetamine. She signed a signature bond of \$2,000 and an initial appearance will resume Feb. 24 with Kussel.

The sentences will be served concurrently with those Teller is already serving at the Red Granite Correctional Institution.

Miller was ordered to spend 18 months on probation, pay \$443 in costs and to stay away from his previous residence. A charge of battery or threat to judge, prosecutor, or law enforcement officer was dismissed on the defendant's motion.

Also on Jan. 26, Kussel found Miller guilty of knowingly violating a domestic abuse order and imposed a jail term of 60 days with credit for time served, Huber Law privileges and any counseling required by the probation agent. Probation of 18 months was also imposed. Miller was also found guilty of misdemeanor bail jumping and will spend 18 months on probation. A second charge of misdemeanor bail jumping was dismissed on the prosecutor's motion.

Solar farm in Shawano County gets green light

Project expected to bring in more than \$8.4M in revenue

The Shawano County Board of Supervisors signed off Jan. 27 on a solar farm project expected to provide big dividends to the county in the future.

The proposed solar farm is expected to take up anywhere from 300 to 500 acres of the 630-acre county farm property. It will be run by National Grid Renewables (formerly Geronimo Energy) and will likely produce up to 50 megawatts of solar energy, potentially providing the county with over \$8 million in revenue over the course of the lease. The lease is established for up to five years of development, two years of construction and an extended term of 25 years, with an option for three extensions that could extend the lease up to 30 additional years.

Nitta Charnon, county finance director, said that the revenue from the agreement would be a minimum of \$8,433,000 at a minimum of 300 acres, noting there is an opportunity for that figure to increase if more acreage is used or if the project goes over 50 megawatts. Charnon noted that leasing the land for agricultural pursuits during that same time period would only bring \$1,136,000 to the county, although the county is expected to lease the land for agricultural use until the decision comes to begin construction.

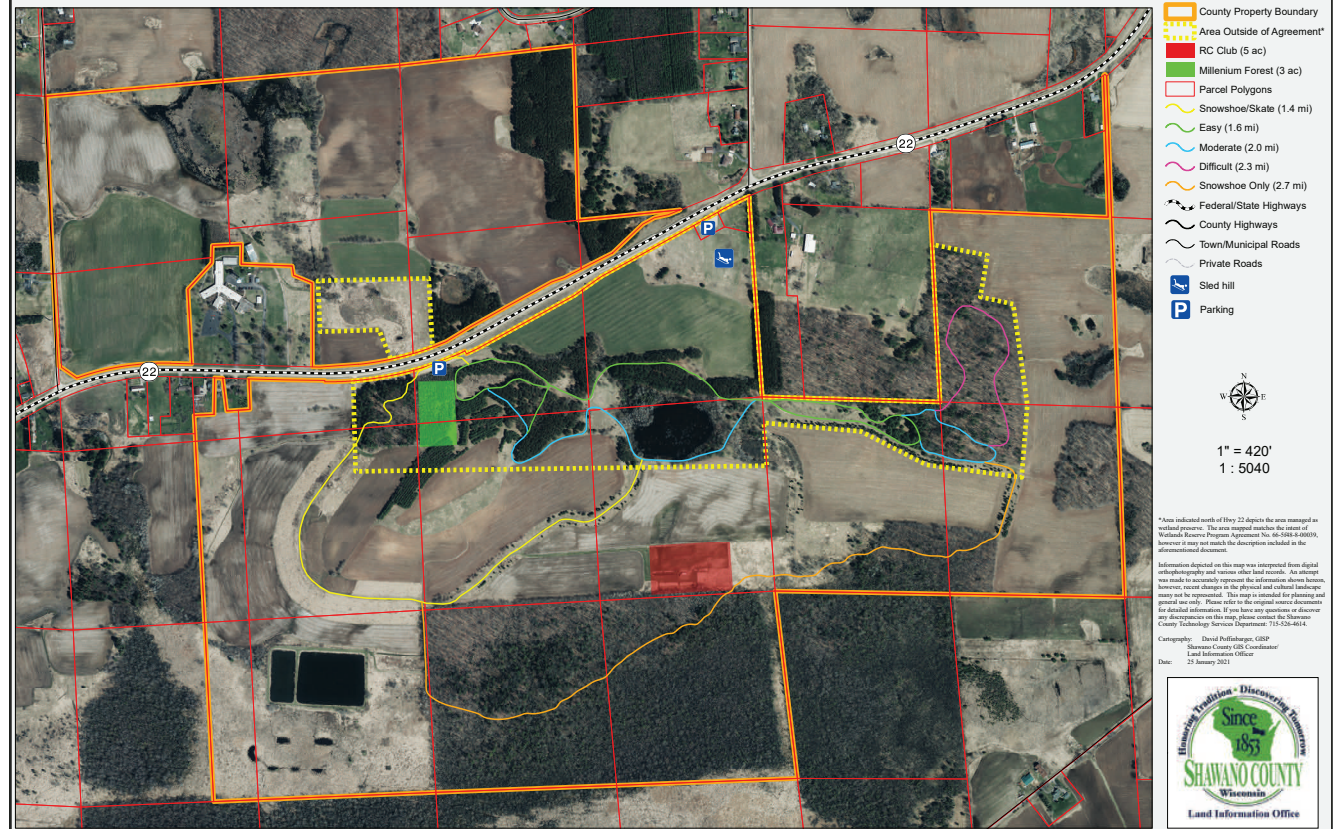
According to Steve Dreher, county maintenance director, the proposed solar farm would not eliminate the ski trails, millennial forest, sledding hill or any of the other recreational amenities in place, but it's possible some of the trails might need to be relocated.

“Right now, it’s a blank palette because they’re going to do their due diligence and figure out where they can and where they can’t (place solar panels),” Dreher said. “It’s going to take a couple of years of work for everybody to figure out things.”

Supervisor Jerry Erdmann noted that interest was expressed about a year ago in setting up a solar farm in Shawano County. He said the former county farm property was ideal because it's close to American Transmission Company lines.

"Solar energy is, in my mind, the way to go in the future," Erdmann said. "Really, there isn't any harmful things with solar. We're looking at enough to maintain at least 50

megawatts. That would give us a big enough rate in the long run.”

Supervisor Kathy Luebke expressed concern about the payments to the Shawano Area Agricultural Society, which have come from the leasing of the land. The society has received payments to operate the Shawano County Fairgrounds for the fair, Shawano Speedway races and other activities, but National Grid Renewables will only be paying \$25 per acre per month during the development period.

"We're funding the fair about \$35,000," Luebke said. "If the farmer doesn't re-lease and we're going to be short, where are we going to find that money?"

Board Chairman Tom Kautza pointed out that the land will still be leased for agricultural crops until formal construction begins — even if current lessor Craig Rosenow decides not to re-sign to lease the farmland — and that additional revenue will cover what the county provides for the fairgrounds. He noted it might not take five full years for the development planning to take place, saying it could possibly be done in two or three years.

Once the construction begins,

National Grid Renewables will pay \$825 per acre per month. Kautza noted that the county will also be receiving payments from the state for every megawatt produced, potentially giving the county additional revenue to pursue capital projects and handle other issues.

“If they never achieve 50 megawatts, and they make less than that, then we get paid ... based on the value of the personal property,” Kautza said. “The town (Belle Plaine) would also receive a payment.”

Erdmann pointed out that revenue for counties has been drying up in recent years, and he expressed concern that, if the county doesn't pursue the solar farm, there might come a point when it might have to borrow money to maintain its operations.

“With the levy limits, sooner or later the county’s going to be borrowing money to maintain their budget simply because everything is going up,” Erdmann said. “Revenue has been going down. We have staff we’ve been losing because they can go someplace else and get a big raise. We need to be looking at a sustainable revenue source, and this solar farm, in my mind, is an ideal situa-

tion for the county."

Supervisor Deb Noffke, who cast the lone vote against the lease, feels the county should have a more realistic plan laid out on how to spend the money prior to moving forward.

"It's green. It's clean. It's a good revenue stream," Noffke said. "We can't look at it as, 'Let's give away some more money to somebody, any group.' We should have a more realistic plan laid out for what we would do with the potential — not just a free-for-all, spend like crazy."

Noffke suggested paying off existing debt as a potential source for the funding.

Kautza pointed out that until the solar farm is designed and it's determined how many megawatts can be generated from the property, there's no way to figure out how to spend the money.

“We won’t know until we have a design done and all the permitting is done through the DNR,” Kautza said. “There is the potential for a fair amount more of revenue to come from this. We can always use the extra money.”

Legislature applies brakes to mask mandate repeal

An effort by the Wisconsin Legislature to repeal Gov. Tony Evers' mask mandate hit the brakes quickly Jan. 27 when the Assembly canceled its vote.

Two days earlier, the Senate voted 18-13 to strike down Evers' order. Since then, however, state officials learned that repealing the mask mandate would have jeopardized federal food assistance for low-income people. According to the Associated Press, nearly 243,000 state households received \$49.3 million in January alone.

Rep. Gary Tauchen's spokesman, Derrick Scherdell, said that there had been a lot of calls to Tauchen's office regarding the mask mandate, but that Tauchen, R-Bonduel, had no comment on the mandate or the decision by Assembly leaders to cancel the vote.

"He says he doesn't have a comment on what his vote would be because things keep changing," Scherdell said.

Sen. Rob Cowles, R-Allouez, who represents much of Shawano County

in the Senate, had plenty to say, though.

Cowles was one of only two Republicans who voted against repealing the mandate, saying on the day of the Senate vote that the governor's action has been in place without much citation for violating the rules. He said he feared a repeal would change the principle of mask wearing in the minds of his constituents.

"I've heard from dozens of constituents in the past few days – health care workers, families of those who were seriously ill or passed, vulnerable residents and essential workers – asking me to support the continued use of masks," Cowles said. "Meanwhile, in the months this mandate has been in place, I haven't heard from any Wisconsin residents who've been cited for a violation of these orders."

Cowles noted the repeal wouldn't have had much impact on local requirements, noting that municipalities, businesses and other public places had announced their mask requirements before Evers first issued his edict.

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PSC approves city utility rate change

Commission denies SMU request for 23% hike for Arrowcast, settling for 11%

The Public Service Commission recently increased Shawano Municipal Utility's electric rates but didn't honor its request to end the rate subsidy enjoyed by its largest customer.

Rates for residential customers will increase about 3%. Those currently paying \$61.42 monthly for 1,000 kilowatt hours will pay \$64.10 for the same amount of power when the new rates take effect as of Jan. 31, according to PSC documents.

The PSC declined SMU's initial request to increase Arrowcast, Inc.'s rates by 23%, which would be high enough to recover the cost of serving its largest customer.

According to information SMU filed with the PSC, Arrowcast is the only customer in SMU's Cp-4 rate class, but due to the rates the PSC has set in prior cases, SMU spends about \$1 million more annually to furnish Arrowcast with power than it can collect.

The revenue shortfall is made up by other industrial customers, mainly Little Rapids Corp.

In 2020, SMU expected to purchase wholesale power for Arrow-

cast at about \$5.96 million but under current rates could only recover \$5.05 million of that cost.

In contrast, SMU expected to collect close to \$6.71 million from Little Rapids in 2020 for power that only cost SMU \$5.73 million.

"This case is fundamentally about one simple issue: under what circumstances, if any, is it fair for a small group of businesses to overpay for their electric service by nearly \$1,000,000 a year in order to provide an ongoing subsidy to another business," SMU wrote the PSC in November.

Little Rapids, Arrowcast, the Wisconsin Paper Council and the Citizens Utility Board all intervened in the case, and spent the past year seeking information from the other parties and suggesting new rates the PSC should set.

During the course of the rate case, SMU lowered its request to a 19% increase in Arrowcast's rates and a 9.8% decrease for Little Rapids and other customers in its rate category.

Arrowcast opposed the size of the increase. It had recently spent \$3.5 million to improve molding capacity by 20%. It expects to continuously enlarge production operations

in Shawano in hopes of capturing more of the market for iron castings.

That expansion would enlarge the burden on Little Rapids and others in that rate category, unless rates more closely resemble the cost to serve Arrowcast, SMU countered.

Arrowcast backed a 7% increase for its rates. CUB favored a 5.5% decrease for Little Rapids and a 20% increase for Arrowcast.

"SMU's primary goal in this rate case is born not out of insensitivity or hostility towards any one customer, but out of the necessity to treat each customer fairly," the utility wrote the PSC last year.

Little Rapids supported the 9.8% rate decrease that SMU requested, writing the PSC that there shouldn't be "an ongoing obligation to fund a portion of Arrowcast's operating expenses.

"It is not equitable for the Commission to shift this burden on to LRC and the other Cp-3 customers," according to comments to the PSC from Little Rapids.

Meeting on Dec. 22, the PSC adopted a rate "gradualism" approach in order to lessen the adverse impact that a steep rate increase would on Arrowcast.

In a written order made public Jan. 26, the PSC decreased the Little Rapids rate category by 1.9% and increased Arrowcast's by 11.05%.

The order also directed SMU to file a limited for full rate case by July 31, 2022.

SMU files rate increases when its earnings fall below the amount the PSC has authorized, said Jennifer Miller, SMU's financial director.

Miller had no comment on the rate difference it asked for Arrowcast and what the PSC authorized.

The last rate increase occurred in March 2018 with the PSC authorizing a 5% rate of return on the value of the utility's infrastructure investment.

SMU filed the just concluded rate case in February 2020, stating that under its 2018 rates it would finish 2020 with a \$5,185 income deficit and a negative 0.11% rate of return.

The rates the PSC authorized are projected to increase annual revenue by \$673,153, a 3.05 overall increase based on a 4.9% return on the value of SMU's infrastructure. SMU had applied for a 3.11% overall rate increase that would bump annual revenue by \$693,838 and yield a 5% rate of return.

Plans to expand SCHS facilities revived

Pandemic, changing of staff put efforts on hold

Plans to expand athletic and arts facilities at Shawano Community High School had to be shelved last year when the coronavirus pandemic hit, but the Shawano School Board seeks to revisit the idea.

Board member Alysia Pillsbury, who chairs the district's buildings and grounds committee, said during a school board meeting Feb. 1 that the committee heard from the high school's athletic boosters, who were inquiring as to whether plans were still being considered.

"We know that to be a destination district, our buildings are an essential part of that, and it's why my committee exists," Pillsbury said.

The school district is planning to expand facilities that are almost 25 years old and in need of upgrading. On the athletics side, the promise of adequately sized training facilities came up a little short when the school was built in 1997.

For the arts expansion, the district visited schools in the Pulaski, Ashwaubenon and Weyauwega-Fremont school districts last year to look at their performing arts centers and figure out what would need improving. The sound system was a key issue at the time.

The plan was to utilize the district's fund balance, which was \$7.56 million in March 2020. The upgrades were expected to cost around \$3.3 million at that time. Before the district could present finalized plans in March, however, schools were closed down by the state, and the focus shifted to maintaining education in a virtual environment.

"Being in school became our first priority," Pillsbury said.

The goal at the time was to find solutions that were not only affordable but would also not require major upgrades until at least 2040.

Pillsbury said that Shawn Mathwich, the district's buildings director, was seeking quotes on what the project would cost today versus a year ago, indicating the price tag has likely gone up.

"Hopefully, we'll be able to continue to move forward," she said.

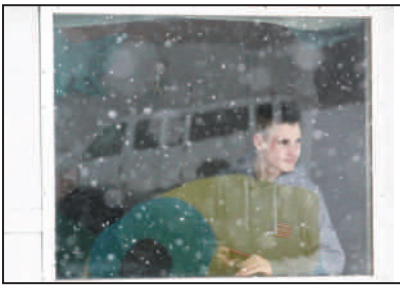
Board president Tyler Schmidt said the board would likely see updated plans and prices in the next month or so. He noted that the departure of Jeff Easter, the maintenance director preceding Mathwich, also contributed to the plans being put on hold.

Board member Chuck Dallas recommended getting community partners to contribute to the project,

as well. He suggested the Green Bay YMCA as a potential contributor. He recalled how the district and the city of Shawano tried in 2019 to get community support for a larger recreation center, expected to cost \$28 million at that time, only to see community members show up en masse at a meeting to say they were against it.

Even though tapping the fund balance would not require voter approval, Dallas felt getting other entities to defray the costs of this project would be good stewardship of the taxpayers' money.

"The YMCA is very well funded," Dallas said. "They have numerous partnerships with Boys and Girls Clubs and other organizations throughout northeast Wisconsin, and this may be an avenue for us to look at if we're looking to do something of that grand a scale."

Quilt display showcases local, state handiwork

If anything can be said to be more than the sum of its part, it is a quilt.

Quilters often take an assortment of fabrics — sometimes even fabrics that don't seem to want to be together — and use a combination of geometry and creativity to bring them together into a cohesive work of art.

The same might be said of the “Sew On and Sew Forth” quilt show, now entering its final weekend at WOWSPACE in Wittenberg. The show displays an assortment of sizes, colors and shapes of quilts submitted by artists from around the state. Walking through the displays, the overall effect is one of unity. Despite their differences, the colors and textures come together into a unified display.

Mary Beth Koeppel, who coordinated the event, said her group, the Quilting Friends of Hatley, worked with about 30 quilters — including local members and sewers from as far away as Milwaukee and Minocqua.

The show is not juried and “People's Choice” prizes are selected by participants. As many area quilters are not professionals, some were

reluctant to enter their creations to be judged, Koeppel said. The WOWSPACE show is their way of sharing their work.

The show also features an antique quilt each year, she said. This year, the antique on display is a “Manx Block” from the Isle of Man, an island located in the Irish Sea between Great Britain and Ireland. The quilt, owned by Koeppel, dates from the late 1800s, she said.

The format is “Manx log cabin” and has complex crosses of black and colored crosses that Koeppel said represents a style blending Celtic and Viking roots.

The show included traditional block quilts and one using a “foundation” technique, where the fabric is pieced on paper.

The technique allows the quilter to design with sharp points and angles, Koeppel said.

In addition to individual quilts, the results of some quilter “chal-

lenges” were on display. The Quilting Friends of Hatley were asked to make comfort quilts for veterans participating in Honor Flights to Washington, D.C. “We can't always find quilts that have patterns or colors that men like,” she said, so the group selected a

fabric picture of a bear and deer and asked members to make quilts using that motif.

Other groups were challenged to make quilts with octagon shapes or to express emotions using a specific color.

Schmidt remembered for life of service

SACF co-founder also served on business, civic boards

Barb Schmidt represented what dedication to a life of service can mean for a community.

Barbara Faye Schmidt, Shawano passed way on Jan. 20 at 90. She spent most of that 90 years in Shawano County, where she operated a business with her husband, worked in banking, served on the Shawano County Board and served on or created charities that served not only the city of Shawano but the broader community as well.

Schmidt was creator and co-founder of the Shawano Area Community Foundation (SACF) and served on its board for 13 years. She was secretary, vice-president and president for six years.

Ron Malueg, who co-founded the

foundation with Schmidt, said it was "sheer determination" that allowed the foundation to take off in Shawano.

"A fair amount of community leaders thought we could not

pull it off. They didn't think it would catch on," Malueg said.

Schmidt, though, was determined to create a lasting legacy.

"She wanted to set something up that was philanthropic in nature and didn't end. With foundations you only spend the money you generate—you don't touch the donations. She wanted to give back, wanted to give something that had longevity to it," Malueg said.

Did she succeed? Absolutely, Malueg said.

A Shawano High School graduate, she and her husband, Robert, owned the Lakeshore Telephone Company. She was the first woman to serve on the National Telephone Cooperative

Board of Directors.

Upon retiring from the telephone company, she served for four years on the Shawano County Board, leading an effort to establish the emergency 911 system for the county. She also helped to select the first Shawano County Administrator. She was a member of the United Way Board of Directors and served as president of that organization.

Schmidt donated her time to the Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce board as secretary, vice president and president. She was instrumental in bringing the Main Street Program to the city.

She also served as president of the Shawano County Advancement Association, which eventually became the Shawano County Tourism Council. During her tenure there, the room tax was created and continues to be a source of income for the tourism council.

Schmidt was also one of the original founders of Shawano County Economic progress, Inc., and served as its first vice-president.

She served as a director of M&I

Bank of Shawano for thirteen years. She has been recognized for her contributions for her leadership in community and economic development by the Wisconsin Extension Community Development Association. She was named Business Woman of the Year for the Shawano area in 1987.

In her leadership roles, Malueg noted, Schmidt actively sought out input from other board members.

"She certainly wanted to have everyone's thoughts on what to do," he said.

Once that input was shared, though, he said her leadership style was action-based. "Let's get going and get things done," is how she approached her role, he said.

Her work definitely had a lasting impact, he said, adding, "She was one of the nicest people I ever knew."

Private family services will be held at a later date. The Swedberg Funeral Home in Shawano is assisting the family. Memorials can be directed to Shawano Area Matthew 25 in Shawano.

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Strand Associates to oversee plaza project

Firm chosen over four other companies for \$2M public facility construction

The Shawano Redevelopment Authority spoke with one unanimous voice Feb. 1 as it approved hiring Strand Associates to oversee the design and construction of the proposed new plaza for Shawano, connecting downtown businesses with nearby Franklin Park.

A few days earlier, though, the seven members were having difficulty deciding between Strand, based in Madison, and MSA Professional Services, based in Baraboo. The two were among five proposals received by the city bidding for the plaza work, according to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard.

"We organized a staff review committee," Sheppard said at a previous RDA meeting on Jan. 28. "We got the proposals, sent them out, reviewed them over the weekend and met

Monday (Jan. 25) to review them and kick them around."

The review committee was having a difficult time deciding between the two companies, so city staff brought both proposals to the RDA. Sheppard disclosed that he has a personal friendship with Brandon Herbert, a civil engineer with Strand, but told the RDA that both companies have merit.

"Typically, we would both come to you with a recommendation for a specific firm," Sheppard said. "In this case, because there are some differences, we wanted your input ... and talk that out with you."

Both companies also have experience working with the city previously. Strand was responsible for the development of Franklin Park itself, according to Matt Hendricks, city parks and recreation director, while MSA helped the city with Huckleberry Harbor improvements.

Hendricks noted it was good to be in a position where there are two contractors jumping out as potentially the best to oversee projects. He said that the plaza was a situation where the city wasn't required by law to go

with the lowest bid, which was why both firms were being considered.

"For me, this is one of the more difficult things to do, because you want to recommend the right fit," Hendricks said. "This is a pretty unique and high-profile project, and everybody knows that. This is probably one of the largest public facility improvement projects that will occur in the city in the next several years or decade."

Strand planned to spend more of its billable hours overseeing the design of the plaza, according to Hendricks, while MSA was planning to have more hours to oversee construction.

Strand's proposal is expected to cost the city \$199,400, which does not include the actual building costs. MSA submitted a bid for \$164,700.

Hendricks noted the final price tag could probably change due to costs going up or down.

"The difference between those two dollar amounts probably shouldn't be a priority because it won't actually be a \$35,000 difference," Hendricks said.

The city of Shawano has about \$2 million in grants earmarked for constructing the plaza.

Herbert, who would be the project manager for the plaza, told the RDA that the Main Street intersection,

which would connect the two parts of the plaza, is very busy and would require bringing in the two curb lines to create a tabletop crossing.

"You have to cohesively connect the plaza space and make it an attractive element for pedestrians to use but also preserve the functionality of the parking lot," Herbert said. "I would envision a barrier for the parking lot, maybe some kind of active stone feature or raised planters, something like that."

Blake Thiesen, who also works for Strand, said that the firm spent a lot of time working with city officials on the Franklin Park project to ensure that colors and textures would be right for the public facility. He said the same attention would be given on the plaza project.

"We're very big on ground plane art and using that as cues for our park patrons," Thiesen said. "I think we would want to focus a lot of attention on that aspect and make sure people are aware, not only when you're on foot or on bicycle, but also when you're traveling in a motor vehicle."

The proposal for Strand to oversee the plaza project will still need final approval from the Shawano Common Council.

11:56 p.m. in response to a fight in progress and a possible gunshot. The press release states, "Officers located a male adult victim and rendered medical aid until emergency Medical personnel arrived and determined the victim to be deceased."

The interim chief said officers are assuming it's a gang-related death. The FBI is interviewing people and processing evidence at what may be two different scenes.

The press release adds, "We can assure the community is safe."

9 Hawks qualify for sectionals

The Shawano Community High School wrestling team continued its strong season by posting the top team score at the Division 1 Shawano Regional on Jan. 30 in Shawano. The Hawks also advanced nine individual wrestlers to sectionals.

The Bay Conference champion Hawks earned 245.5 points on the day, comfortably ahead of second-place finishing Bay Port (214.5). It was Shawano's first-ever regional title.

"I am extremely proud of every person on our team — every wrestler, manager and coach has worked extremely hard to get to this point," said Shawano coach Mike Homan. "The success of the wrestling program is a direct reflection of the work that has gone into it. We look to keep the success going this week at sectionals."

The first- and second-place finishers in each weight class advanced to sectionals. Shawano had seven wrestlers claim first and two more place second.

Drake Herm (106), Damien Wudtke (113), Wyatt Brandt (126), Reef Anthony (138), Caden Young (160), Andrew Popp (170) and Nick Kohn (285) all placed first for the Hawks, while Noah Jones (145) and Gage Timm (195) each took second.

One of three wrestlers in his weight class, Anthony was awarded a double bye into the first-place match. In that match, Anthony won a 7-2 decision.

Herm wrestled twice, earning pins in both matches. In the semifinals, he pinned his opponent in 33 seconds. In the first-place match, Herm pinned his opponent about halfway through the second period.

Popp also was 2-0 with two pins on the day. He needed just 35 seconds to pin his semifinal opponent. In the first-place match, he won with a pin 66 seconds into the second period.

Kohn started his day with a hard-fought 5-2 decision win in the semifinals. In the first-place match, Kohn

made things look easy after pinning his opponent in 23 seconds.

"It's nice being able to qualify for my senior year this year," said Kohn of making sectionals. "For a while it looked like I wouldn't even have a chance at wrestling this year because of weight and injury, so to be able to come back and take first is really awesome."

Young opened his day with a pin in the second period before winning by technical fall in the first-place match. Wudtke earned a pin in the third period in the semifinals before claiming an 8-2 decision win in the first-place match.

Brandt had to win three matches to emerge atop his weight class. He opened the day with a pin in the first period. Brandt then earned back-to-

Wrestling primarily at the 195-pound weight class, Bergsbaken earned a 12-1 record during the abbreviated regular season. He earned wins by pin in six of those matches.

The senior also earned a win by pin at the Division 3 Lena Regional on Jan. 30. Bergsbaken placed third in the 195 weight class to cap his season.

Q: When did your interest in wrestling begin?

A: I started wrestling early in elementary school but then took a year off to try out basketball. Thankfully, I went back to wrestling; I then had a passion for the sport ever since.

Q: What is your favorite part about the wrestling season?

A: Everything. Wrestling is a gradual sport. Each meet prepares you for the next up until the end of season tournament time where every athlete is at the peak of their abilities.

Q: What has wrestling taught you over the years?

A: Confidence, respect, teamwork, compassion, growth. The list could honestly fill up this entire page.

I truly believe no other sport teaches humility at the same level as wrestling. Because of this sport, I am a greater person than I could have ever imagined.

Q: You were one of the top-ranked wrestlers in your weight class. What was the key to your individual success this season?

A: Rankings aside, the key to my successes is nothing more than confidence in ability and determination. Just wrestle, be humble enough to fix your mistakes, then wrestle again.

A: As unfortunately small as this season may have been, I'm thankful enough to have had a season at all.

Q: Do you have any rituals you go through before a match?

A: Dozens at least. I'm a very routine person so if I can do everything exactly the same before each match, then I'm ready to go.

Most of it is just "lucky" shirts, chewing gum, listening to specific music, etc.

Q: What's your favorite memory of competing on the Bonduel wrestling team?

A: Anything that's team related. Teammates make the difficult practices enjoyable, losses easier to handle, and team bonding is what really makes us a family. There are too many memories that I'll probably never forget.

Deacon Hugh Dyson Walker, Ph.D., passed to be with his Lord on Monday, Jan. 25, 2021.

A Mass of Christian burial for Deacon Hugh was held at 11 a.m. Thursday, Jan. 28, 2021, at Holy Spirit Catholic Church. Burial will be in the spring at Guardian Angel Cemetery, with full military honors.

Hugh (also known as Dyson) was born in Plymouth, New Hampshire, on Feb. 21, 1934, son of Hubert and Lena May (Bosence) Walker. He grew up in Nashua, New Hampshire, attended local schools and graduated from Nashua High School in 1952, where he was active in band, including All-State Band, French Club, sports writing, the basketball team and the golf team. He loved snowshoeing, skating, swimming and golf.

He attended the University of New Hampshire where he received his BA in history in 1956. He was a member of the freshman basketball team, freshman football team, the 1954 Yankee Conference Champion football team and the 1955 football team. He was also a member of the 1956 lacrosse team and a



member of Kappa Sigma Fraternity.

After college, he graduated from Naval Officers Candidate School, Newport, Rhode Island, Class XX-VII, and was commissioned ensign,

USNR. He served aboard the destroyer USS Marshall, DD 676, including a tour of duty to east Asia as damage control officer and later as chief engineer. He was honorably discharged in August 1958.

In 1957, he was married to Sandra Ann Peary of Weirs Beach, New Hampshire. In the following years, they lived in Westwood Village, California, where he was a graduate student in history at UCLA, and she was employed by the UCLA Antibiotic Research Laboratory, working on some of the first staphylococcus antibiotic research in the country. Following his MA and teaching assistantship in history, and language studies in Chinese and Japanese at UCLA, he undertook graduate studies in Chinese at Yale.

The couple moved to Tokyo, Japan,

in 1962, where he was a professor of History and Chinese Language in the Far East Division of the University of Maryland, and she studied Japanese Flower arranging and became a licensed teacher in the Sogetsu Ikebana School.

In 1965, they moved to Stevens Point, where he was appointed assistant professor of history at University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, with the charge from President Albertson to "develop Asian studies" at UW-Stevens Point. In the next five years, 37 courses on Asia in eight departments were developed, and a minor in Asian studies was offered.

Hugh received his Ph.D. in history from UCLA in 1972 and taught Chinese language at UW-Stevens Point from 1976 to 2000; he continued to teach several Asian history courses until his retirement as professor emeritus in history and Chinese in 2005. Teaching was his life.

In 1983, he was ordained a permanent deacon in the Roman Catholic Church, one of the first class of deacons ordained in the Diocese of La Crosse. He was given the status of senior deacon in 2005 and continued to function

on a limited basis until his death.

He had a God-given gift of languages — he was fluent in Chinese, Japanese, Korean and Vietnamese, the first three of which he also taught, in addition to French and German; and semi-fluent in Russian, Italian, with reading knowledge in New Testament Greek and some Mongolian. At the invitation of the Chinese government, he was invited to give a paper in Beijing to be orated in Korean — which he did and received many compliments from the Korean scholars who attended.

In 2010, he returned to part-time teaching, volunteering to teach Chinese language classes at Pacelli Catholic High School in Stevens Point.

He is survived by his wife of 63 years, Sandra; children, Christopher (Lynn) Walker, of Stevens Point, Sarah (Shawn) Hagedon, of Plover, Gregory (Laura) Walker, of Benbrook, Texas, and Anne (James) Hassett, of Kenosha; nine grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren, and nine nieces and nephews.

He was predeceased by his parents; his brother, James H. (Blanche) Walker; and son, Andrew (Milissa) Walker.

Veterans of the Menominee Nation

Despite a challenging 2020 that severely limited fundraising, Veterans of the Menominee Nation found a way to give back, donating nearly \$6,300 to community members and organizations.

The Contractor acknowledges to and for the benefit of the City of Shawano ("Purchaser") and the State of Wisconsin (the "State") that it understands the goods and services under this Agreement are being funded with monies made available by the Clean Water State Revolving Fund and/or Drinking Water State Revolving Fund that have statutory requirements commonly known as "American Iron and Steel," that requires all of the iron and steel products used in the project to be produced in the United States ("American Iron and Steel Requirement") including iron and steel products provided by the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement. The City of Shawano Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, waive any informalities in bidding, or to accept the bid or bids which best serves the interest of the City.

DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES (DBE) REQUIREMENT

The City of Shawano encourages DBEs, including Minority Business Enterprises (MBEs) and Women Business Enterprises (WBEs) to submit a bid proposal as a prime contractor, if pre-qualified as stated previously.

This requirement is subject to the City of Shawano's (grantee's) policy regarding the increased use of minority and women's businesses. The grantee's policy requires all bidders to undertake specified affirmative efforts. At least 15 days prior to bid opening, the bidder needs to contact five MBEs and five WBEs to solicit bids. To comply with the requirements, the grantee requires documentation of all contacts on the contact forms included within the bid documents. The contact forms need to be submitted with the bid.

No bid shall be withdrawn for a period of thirty (30) days after the scheduled opening of bids without the consent of the City.
