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Shawano schools' strategic plan approval pushed back

Board members concerned language in document too complex for community

Approval of the Shawano School District's draft strategic plan, originally scheduled for Feb. 15, is being pushed back to March after Shawano School Board members expressed concern about only having a few days to look over revisions.

The board held a Feb. 8 work session to look over those goals and strategies to see if they would fit in plans to be what district administrators have referred to as a "destination district," preparing education to help students graduating as far out as 2038.

"We have spent much of the past year working on the strategic plan, working towards a mission that talks about engaging, empowering and educating every student, every day, every way," said Superintendent Randi Anderson. "It's an extremely powerful commitment to the Shawano community to serve each of our students at high levels of engagement, high levels of academic achievement and focusing on the whole child."

After more than two hours of presentation and discussion, board members recommended taking out any language that a regular resident of the community wouldn't understand.

Board member Mart Grams noted that the term "increase awareness" under one of the goals for student success made no sense to him as a retired social studies teacher, so he questioned how parents were supposed to read the strategic plan and understand what the district is trying to accomplish. He also questioned how the district was supposed to measure whether awareness has been increased.

"I've done three of these before, so I know how words can be really wishy-washy so they mean everything to everybody," Grams said. "It says here that 'Each student experiences personalized learning.' Great, but where does it say 'to their abilities'?"

Board member Chris Gull told administrators presenting that he was also having difficulty wading through vague terminology and acronyms.

"Do you have a cheat sheet for all of these abbreviations?" Gull said. "This document shouldn't have them, unless it's a common thing for the entire world, so it's lazily written. PLC? ELS? I mean, it's just ridiculous. It's like you're throwing buzzwords on just to have buzzwords on, like it's not completed and ready for us."

Board member Michael Sleeper said he understood where Gull was coming from, noting that the acronyms might be commonplace for educators, but non-educators are left taking their best guess.

Board member Chuck Dallas asked whether the district planned to address artificial intelligence and changing skills needed to address the jobs that would be taken away, as well as the jobs that would be created managing those machines.

"There are jobs that haven't even been created yet, and there are jobs today that are going to be gone," Dallas said. "Where, as a team, will you get that information to be able to not only help the students in making that academic and career planning decision but also educating the parents so they're aware of certain professions that will no longer be out there by the time these children graduate?"

Anderson noted that the new report card for the state, which has not been released to the public, will have the benchmarks that indicate where the goals from the district strategic plan will be achieved. She also pointed out that since the district will be in its first year of implementing the strategic plan, the data will be more qualitative in nature instead of quantitative.

Board president Tyler Schmidt said he understood why there were few benchmarks in whether the goal was achieved in the early years, but at some point, there needs to be something definitive to show the district is executing the strategies it has laid out.

"At some point, we've got to have a measurable part: 'We've contacted 12 businesses, or we have 12 businesses working collaboratively. We have X number of students working with these. Then the next year we're up to 18 businesses,'" Schmidt said. "Everybody likes to see the numbers."

Grams questioned whether administrators were willing to defend the plan or were just defending the people who worked on it over the last year.

"Are we just here to say OK, or are our suggestions going to be taken seriously?" Grams said. "If not, then I can go home."

Grams also objected to the phrase "voice and choice," saying it sounded like something being said at the "Black life matter riots" and claimed "equitable" was wishy-washy. He said he also wanted the references to "global" removed.

"What about the United States?" Grams said. "The world 'global' is in here way too much for good Americans."

Sleeper questioned why Grams was objecting to that term, noting several companies in Shawano, including GenEx and Timber Pro are dealing with a global market.

"What we're producing here in small, little Shawano is being sold and shipped to 60-70 different country markets every single year," Sleeper said. "Our global business exceeds our U.S.-based business."

Grams said he understood that, but felt American culture should be taught first in school.

"We need to create jobs here, and some of this is going to sound political, but we're more important than the rest of the world is," Grams said. "It sounds like we need to be supportive of countries and cultures which are, quite frankly, anti-American and understand their perspective. No. ... Our culture comes first and what it means to be an American."

School class size policy gets an update

Rules have not been updated since 1999

The Shawano School District is updating its class size policy for the first time since the last millennium.

The district's executive committee was informed that the rules dictating class sizes at the various grade levels have not been updated since 1999. Nathan Hanson, director of personalized learning, told the committee on Feb. 3 that administrators met and felt an update was needed since there have been a number of changes since the policy was last looked at.

Pre-kindergarten through second grade will have an average of 18-22 students, with a maximum of 24. The third through eighth grades are expected to have class sizes hovering

between 20-24 students, with a maximum of 30, while 25 is the average class size anticipated for high school grades, with a maximum of 30.

"With the secondary classes, there should be a minimum of 15 (students) before we truly start to scrutinize whether or not that class should be offered," Hanson said. "These are guidelines. These are not hard rules."

The reason the rules are not quite so rigid when it comes to minimum class sizes, according to Hanson, is that it would impact new classes getting off the ground at the middle and high schools.

"We would lose some of our advanced courses, some of our tech ed work," Hanson said. "They take hits from time to time. It's after a year or two or three of low enrollment before we look at our programming and say, 'Are we not advertising this enough, or is this class just not meeting the needs of our students anymore?'"

Board president Tyler Schmidt agreed, noting there are sometimes courses at the high school where only eight or nine students enroll for a semester.

Hanson noted the numbers that make up the guidelines are similar to class sizes across the state.

Board member Michael Sleeper expressed concern that the numbers might be high for class sizes.

"I've done enough teaching in the school system and teaching and training groups," Sleeper said. "It doesn't seem like a lot, but going from 22 to 30 is going over the top of a mountain."

Superintendent Randi Anderson noted the numbers are not high when compared with state and national averages. The reason the administrators looked at the policy now is in preparation for the day when they might have to make a call on keeping or eliminating programs.

"People who come into this sys-

tem are astounded at the numbers we've been able to maintain," Anderson said. "Choice and opportunity is a priority in our community."

There are also plans for a 200-unit apartment complex being finalized for the city of Shawano. Anderson estimates there could be 100 kids or more who would come into the complex and require the schools to potentially look at bumping up the number of elementary classes or the number of English and math classes at the middle and high schools.

"As we look at those pieces and we look at what's happening, we want to be primed to be able to serve those kids and establish a system to be able to do that," Anderson said.

Because the policy is an administrative rule, it will not require approval from the Shawano School Board.

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Notice of Spring Primary and Sample Ballots

February 16, 2021

OFFICE OF THE SHAWANO COUNTY CLERK
TO THE VOTERS OF SHAWANO COUNTY:

Notice is hereby given of a spring primary election to be held in Shawano County on February 16, 2021, at which the officers named below shall be nominated. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where Paper Ballots are Used

The voter shall make a mark (X) in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and connect the arrow next to the write-in line.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone in a manner that would reveal how the ballot is marked.

Spoiled Ballots

If the voter spoils a paper or optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall deposit the voted ballot in the ballot box or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit and shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official touch screen ballot is cast, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Post office looking for Shawano mail shipment

The U.S. Post Office is tracing the location of mail from Shawano processed last month that currently can't be located.

Pam Donner, Shawano postmaster, said she didn't know the specific dates although items such as the Shawano Leader have been delivered. Other classes of mail are being sought, she said.

The situation is under investigation, but "I have no information to share yet," Donner said Friday.

Local business representatives said it appears that mail dropped at the post office on Saturday, Jan. 9, never reached its destination, including an undetermined number of checks.

Mail sent out weekdays is generally delivered to the main Green Bay postal processing center to be canceled and distributed, but Saturday mail makes a stop in Green Bay and is then forwarded to a Milwaukee center for processing. On this particular date, a truckload of mail reportedly was scanned in Green Bay but not at the Milwaukee destination.

He leaves behind his sister, Caroline (Bert), of Gresham; brother John (Yvonne), of Chicago, and nearly 100 in the generations below him who mourn his passing.

Voting important to maintaining our democracy

In a democracy, the people hold the political power. Every citizen controls that power through their vote. We can hire the people who we think will be best for maintaining our democracy, or we can fire those who don't have our best interests in mind.

Democracy requires the people to exercise their right to vote. Throughout our nation's history, there have been struggles for voter access. It continues today with the crackdown on voting rights that the Republican-controlled Wisconsin Legislature is expected to pursue.

The struggle for voting rights began when the 15th Amendment was passed in 1869 allowing Black men to vote.

When they started to cast ballots and were elected to government positions, the Southerners who wanted to maintain the status quo of white power, set up artificial hurdles like poll taxes, literacy tests and other measures meant to discourage the Blacks from exercising their voting rights.

Barriers like these prompted activist John Lewis and 600 vote-seeking marchers to cross the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama, on March 6, 1965.

The violence of that day and other civil rights protests pressured the government to finally pass the Voting Rights Act of 1965. It outlawed legal voting barriers at the state and local levels, ended Jim Crow laws which intimidated Black voters and strengthened the voting rights that Native people had won in every state.

However, that act didn't stop those who continued to try and keep

the power for themselves. In 2013, they took their grievances to the United States Supreme Court. In the case known as *Shelby County v. Holder*, the provisions requiring states to get permission before passing new voting laws were dismantled. Since then, self-interested state legislators all over the country had the green light to increase hurdles to voting.

In recent years, Republican politicians have tried to retain their power by making it harder for certain populations to vote.

These strategies include reducing the number polling locations in predominantly African American or Latin neighborhoods and only having polling stations open during business hours, when many people are working and unable to take time off.

In the 2020 election, there were additional obstacles to voting employed. Voting machines were removed from polling places, which caused hours-long lines. The United States Post Office was crippled to the point that mail delivery was not reliable, thus putting mail-in ballots at risk of arriving too late to be counted.

In Wisconsin, some districts have been gerrymandered to the point that Democratic voters have little power.

The Republican-dominated Legislature has initiated voter ID requirements which make it more

difficult for the elderly and the poor to vote.

It wasn't enough that Republicans in the Legislature reduced the opportunity for early voting from three weeks to two weeks, they may further limit early voting. Wisconsin has enjoyed Election Day registration for years, but they may try and do away with this also. Absentee voting was instrumental in making it safe for high voter turnout in the November 2020 election even in a pandemic. Now there may be more restrictions placed on the ability of voters to utilize absentee ballots.

An overhaul of our nation's voting system is necessary to shore up confidence in our democracy. However, access to the ballot box should be made easier rather than being part of an effort to maintain a partisan advantage by making it harder to vote.

The Democrats have made the need for a fair voting process a top priority with their introduction of the For the People Act in the House of Representatives (HR 1) and in the Senate (S 1). The act is meant to counter voter suppression tactics and to make it easier for eligible voters to cast their ballots.

It would create national automatic voter registration and require paper ballots in all jurisdictions.

The For the People Act has provisions that address redistricting and government ethics. It would prohibit extreme partisan gerrymandering and take a variety of other steps to make the redistricting process more transparent and accessible, including requiring congressional redistricting to be done by independent

commissions.

HR 1 also involves reform of our campaign finance system. The 2020 election was far and away the most expensive election in American history.

We know from extensive research that the people who fund campaigns wield enormous clout in our political system. The For the People Act would revitalize the system that has promoted small donor public financing for presidential primaries and extend it to congressional races.

The bill's critical companion legislation is the John Lewis Voting Rights Act. It would restore the full sweep of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and undo the damage of the Supreme Court's *Shelby County* decision.

It is disappointing that many voters don't see the need to turn out to vote in local elections.

When there is low voter turnout, important local issues are determined by a limited group of voters, making a single vote even more statistically meaningful.

This apathy can't continue if we want to maintain a vibrant democracy. The citizens of Wisconsin need to rise up and make it clear to our legislators that we want to expand voting opportunities. Any attempt to restrict election participation of any Wisconsinite should not be tolerated.

Voting is the cornerstone of our democracy. Our democracy gives us this precious right. Vote as though your life depends on it, because it does.

Do schools need snow days with virtual learning?

Shawano committee looks at pros, cons of having extra days in school calendar

A review of the next school year's calendar earlier this month brought up a question by the Shawano School District's executive committee — are snow days still needed?

Incorporating extra days to account for heavy snowstorms and dangerously frigid weather has been a staple for school districts planning their calendars for decades, as bad weather has kept students and staff from meeting to learn. If schools didn't need to use all of their snow days — a term used even for when schools close due to extremely cold temperatures — they could end the school year a day or two earlier.

If they needed more time than what was allotted — such as in 2018-19, when many districts had to call off school seven or eight times — other days off for students, such as teacher in-service days or spring break, were sacrificed.

However, the coronavirus pandemic forced schools to come up with a system that permitted learning to continue, even if it wasn't in a school building. As a result, there's a system in place for when the snow flies or the mercury dips well below zero.

Board member Michael Sleeper first brought up the issue of snow days and asked how the administration planned to address them in an era where learning from home is possible.

"Now that we've figured out what virtual learning is all about, how does that relate to potential snow days?" Sleeper asked.

The district hasn't come down firmly one way or the other, according to Nathan Hanson, director of personalized learning.

"There's a lot of staff feedback and parent feedback about not wanting to get rid of snow days," Hanson said. "What we've talked about is doing a little bit of both next year and deciding the way it goes."

Superintendent Randi Anderson



Shawano Community Middle School and other schools in the area had to close down buildings on Feb. 4 as the first significant snowstorm of the season left anywhere from 5-9 inches of snow on the ground. Prior to the storm, the Shawano School District's executive committee discussed whether having snow days was still a necessity in a time when virtual learning could be an alternative when the weather gets bad.

noted that the district had left the snow days in for this school year and has some planned for next year's calendar, which is expected to be debated by the Shawano School Board on Feb. 15. But there had been some discussion about reducing or eliminating them in future years.

"We figure we should transition slowly rather than at 150%," Anderson said. "I grapple with it. Our infrastructure is there. Devices are going to be there. We've transformed and learned so much about how to deliver instruction in that environment. We really shouldn't skip a beat."

Board member Alysia Pillsbury came down on the side of eliminating snow days.

"I would rather have the nice day off," Pillsbury said.

Hanson said it would be easy enough to transition to virtual learning for a day or two with advanced

warning of bad weather. He noted that, if it looked certain that schools would need to close the next day, they could plan ahead and make sure students took their Chromebooks and other necessary equipment home the day before so they could proceed with learning while the snow flies.

Planning for at-home learning would need to take into account those students who live in areas where internet infrastructure is poor or non-existent, according to Hanson.

"We know that 50% of our students don't have adequate internet access, so we have to be able to send them home with something to work with," he said.

Board member Chuck Dallas pointed out that the next day, Feb. 4, would have been a good opportunity to plan ahead, as the area was expecting 6-8 inches of snow, and the

district knew that closing the school was likely.

"Prepare, communicate and that way, if one of the family members needs to stay home and watch the kids, they can," Dallas said. "It's not a surprise, and you're not waiting to watch the news at seven o'clock in the morning asking, 'Is Shawano going to cancel or not?'"

There could be some surprising bad weather days, Hanson said, that might require the district to take the day off and start learning again once it's safe to come back to school.

He noted that having some planned school closings would allow the district to plan more teacher collaboration time in the event that the extra days are not needed for bad weather.

"We've got some definite things we'd like to do with it," Hanson said. "Next year is just not the right time. We need people to adapt to this."

ThedaCare cardiologist gives tips on staying healthy

Heart disease remains the leading cause of death for men and women, with stress often identified as a major contributing factor. The coronavirus pandemic certainly has increased the world’s stress level.

“The pandemic is raising the stress level of many people,” said Dr. Simone Fearon, physician leader with ThedaCare Cardiovascular Care in Appleton. “Women seemingly may be experiencing increased stress at a greater rate than men. That’s concerning for women’s current and long-term heart health.”

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics recently highlighted a study that reported: “Women accounted for 55% of the 20.5 million workers who became unemployed in April 2020 (because of the pandemic), compared to 13% for men. ... The coronavirus crisis has battered industry sectors in which women’s employment is more concentrated — such as restaurants and other retail establishments, hospitality and health care.”

That study also noted that school and daycare shutdowns due to the virus put more responsibility for childcare on the shoulders of women, along with the need to assist children with virtual learning. In addition, women tend to have fewer jobs that accommodate telecommuting, and

many middle-aged women also are often involved in caring for older parents.

“All those responsibilities can create a level of stress that is hard to cope with,” said Fearon. “That makes it important for health care providers to watch for stress-related health changes in their patients, such as weight gain, increased blood pressure readings and other indicators. It is also important that women make taking care of their health a priority. We are learning the health issues women face in middle age can have a significant effect on their long-term heart health.”

A recent study in the Journal of the American Heart Association (JAMA) focused on women between the ages of 42 and 61 and identified seven markers that can indicate a woman’s likelihood to develop heart disease. The list includes these factors and their suggested ideal results:

- Body mass index – less than 25
- Physical activity – 150 minutes/week of moderate activity
- Diet – more fruits, vegetables, fish and whole grains; less sugar and sodium
- Blood pressure – less than 120/80
- Cholesterol levels – less than 200
- Blood sugar – less than 100
- Smoking – lifetime non-smoking

preferred or having quit for more than a year

Fearon said the JAMA study reported that “women who felt more stressed at their jobs or in their roles as caregivers, mothers and spouses had greater odds of having high blood pressure, being overweight and not eating a healthy diet.”

The JAMA study further noted the middle-age years are a critical time for health, especially for women.

“In addition to physical and mental changes, women may be taking care of both children and aging parents, and their relationships with their spouses and jobs may also be changing,” said Fearon. “What happens to a person during these years has direct consequences for their health and well-being as they progress into old age, when they become more likely to experience physical illness or disability.”

So what can women do to reduce their stress levels and improve cardiac health? Fearon said there are many options.

“First and foremost, try to reduce the occasions that cause you to become stressed,” she said. “Then focus on improving your health: stop smoking, eat healthy food, maintain good sleep habits, get regular physical activity as well as all recommended

health screenings. Regular exercise, such as walking, cycling, swimming, playing tennis, yoga and outdoor activities such as gardening, hiking, skiing and snowshoeing, will benefit both your mental and physical health.”

Fearon said it’s also important to maintain a positive attitude.

“It’s proven that positive thinking helps us mentally and physically,” she said. “Focus on the good things in your life, and it might help push out some of those negative thoughts.”

Fearon also encourages women to engage regularly with friends.

“That’s a little more difficult during the current pandemic and especially in winter months, but don’t underestimate the power of a good chat with a friend,” she said. “Social interaction is important for all of us, even if it has to be via phone or Zoom.”

Fearon noted it is important for everyone to have a hobby or two to give themselves something different to think about.

“Hobbies provide a great way for us to relax, to focus our attention on something we enjoy and to have a little ‘me’ time,” she said. “Moms, especially, often allow themselves to become so busy they forget to take ‘me’ time, which in the end isn’t good for anyone in the family.”

7 individuals running for 3 individual board seats

Seven candidates are running for three seats on the Shawano School Board. The primary election is Feb. 16.

With some candidates running for two seats, one candidate may win two elections. In that case, the candidate will choose which seat he or she wants to accept. Each voter in the Shawano School District will get to vote for all three seats in the upcoming elections.

Stephanie Bendtschneider — Area 4, at-large

Digital learning is a priority for board candidate Stephanie Bendtschneider.

Bendtschneider is the general manager for the Shawano Cinema, as well as the social media manager for Suick Family Theaters.

"I take great pride in this community," she said. "I have always been very

involved in my children's activities and education. That is why I feel I would make a great addition to the Shawano School Board. I have the unique opportunity of looking at the issues from the eyes of a parent, taxpayer, former school employee and former high school coach."

Bendtschneider also gets student input from her own children and the teenagers employed at the theater.

"I saw firsthand how students were affected by the schools handling of the pandemic. I was very disappointed in how underprepared the students, parents and teachers were for virtual learning. I believe the administrators could have and should have done a better job preparing for virtual learning, training their staff and working to get the students back to face-to-face learning faster," she said.

She is also running for the board to control spending.

"I believe it is important to control spending of taxpayer's money and hold administrators accountable for their decisions," she said.

Bendtschneider has lived in Shawano her entire life. She is a SCHS alumnus, class of 1999. She and her husband have three daughters; two are at SCHS and one is a SCHS graduate.

Charles Dallas — Area 1, at-large

Dallas is currently the treasurer of the board as well as the finance committee chair and serves on the executive committee.

The incumbent said he is looking forward to implementing the strategic plan developed by the district. His financial background would be a continuing asset for the district, he said.

"With my financial background I would like to be in-

involved. We're financially savvy," he said.

However, Dallas added, budgeting for the 2021-22 school year may be tricky, given the impact of COVID-19 across the state.

"I would like to continue to give management, financial and leadership advice to the school administration. I am serving as chair of the Bay Area Workforce Development Board. This gives me insight in what employers need from our students as they graduate from our district. Also, we study the impact of artificial intelligence and how this technology will impact the workforce in the future. This insight will help our district build a curriculum that will prepare your children for jobs of the future," Dallas said.

Dallas has lived in Shawano County for 33 years. He started his career with Genex Cooperative and CRI and worked 30 years in finance and senior management. Three years ago, he started a consulting and tax business and is an investment banker for Cornerstone Business Services in Green Bay. Dallas has been married for 30 years and has three grown children who graduated from the high school. They graduated from college and have careers in their chosen fields.

James Davel — Area 1, at-large

The need to keep students in school in person is a focus for James Davel, a 1987 graduate of Shawano High School. Davel said he chose to run for the board after seeing the impact of COVID-19 school closures on his eighth and fifth grade sons.

COVID-19 will continue to be a challenge, he said. He is also con-

"Guess what — we're going to deal with COVID for the rest of our lives," he said. "What do we need to do culturally in the district to get families back in?"

Davel said the district needs to look at its organizational structure and make the best use of its resources.

second-rate.

"I want our kids to be proud of the school they go to and the community they are in," Beyer said.

She said she looks forward to working with the new strategic plan to help students get excited about their school.

The biggest challenge, she said, is the mindset that it is hard to get things done. She hopes to help promote a culture where people work together to make "common sense decisions, knowing whatever we decide is going to be good for students and the school."

Beyer grew up in Shawano on a family dairy farm west of town. She

went on to school to study landscape horticulture and has managed several garden centers. She is currently the general manager at Shawano Lawn and Stone Company. Beyer recently received her substitute teaching license.

"I really enjoy working with the young kids of this community," she said.

Beyer has served on church leadership boards including adult youth committee and the board of family life, which involves planning family events for the church and community. She was also the director of Sunday School for over eight years and taught Sunday school for five of those. Beyer has three children, two of whom attend the high school and one at the middle school.

Robin Raber-Bergeon — At-large

Robin Raber-Bergeon says she can bring fresh eyes to the school board.

"I can be unbiased and neutral, a fresh perspective," she said.

The family moved to Shawano from Milwaukee four years ago.

"We are relatively new to the area, but I have always been involved in the PTA/PTO groups in their schools and continue to volunteer my time as needed," she said.

Raber-Bergeon has been a social worker for over 20 years. Her programs have included educational programs, art, community centers and

diversity training. Raber-Bergeon is a licensed clinical social worker and a clinical substance abuse counselor, working in private practice in Shawano, with children, adults and families.

She said she enjoys working as a team and taking a solution-focused approach to problem-solving.

The COVID-19 pandemic has been a challenge for the district and will continue to be one, she said.

"We need to come together to keep everybody healthy and safe; stay in school safely and work together to get the kids caught up," Raber-Bergeon said. "Schools did the best they could last year. Teachers did a great job in trying to keep kids educated. We need to support our teachers."

Raber-Bergeon has two daughters — one in graduate school, and one is in high school in Shawano.

Sam Sousek — Area 1, at-large

Sam Sousek wants to bring both financial and teaching experience to the board.

After several years working in the Wausau and Adams-Friendship area, he returned to Shawano to pursue a banking career. Sousek's experience in banking includes budget preparation, strategic planning, running the day-to-day operation of the business, handling employee benefits and adhering to all state and federal rules and laws.

Sousek retired at the end of 2018. He is currently enrolled in college to obtain a teaching degree to become a high school math teacher.

"I have had the privilege of working as a substitute teacher in both the Shawano School District and also in a neighboring school district, which has provided me a slew of first-hand observations and experiences from the other district that I believe can be helpful,"

he said. "I believe that as a representative that is voted in, it is my responsibility to represent you and your views when I make a decision on a vote."

Sousek is running for the board because he was "very unhappy with the focus of the current board and how they've set things up with COVID and business decisions," he said. He said he felt the decision to keep schools closed was a negative for students and countered the wishes of parents.

The financial impact of the virus will be an ongoing challenge for the district, he said. He feels his combination of business experience and his pursuit of a teaching career will give him a unique perspective on the board.

A graduate of SCHS, he has two sons who graduated from the school; his wife is the orchestra teacher at SCHS.

Jeana Winslow — Area 4

Jeana Winslow said she is running for the board to serve the community, learn from those around her and be able to seek community input to help create great things for the future of Shawano community schools.

"My dad served on Shawano School Board for many years, and seeing him in that capacity has always inspired me to be involved in the community," she said. "I have been able to serve in different areas as a part of my church and have learned so much from each of those responsibilities. I feel being on Shawano School Board would be an amazing opportunity to serve and learn new things."

One of the challenges facing

the Shawano School District is the number of students leaving the district. The current board is working on a strategic plan, Winslow said, and she would like to work with the

plan set in motion.

Winslow lives in Shawano with her husband and four children. Her older three children attend the middle school, and the youngest attends Hillcrest Primary School.

Winslow said she brings "a new set of eyes to the table, and maybe a little different idea. With four kids in school, I have a lot of skin in the game. I'm not going anywhere. My kids are going to graduate from here. This is important to me."

ELECTION 2021: SHAWANO COMMON COUNCIL

4 candidates crowd field for District 1 council seat

The Shawano Common Council has four people running for the First District aldermanic seat on Feb. 16, and voters will whittle down the list of candidates to two for April.

Incumbent Jeanne Cronce is not running for the council seat because she is running for mayor against Bruce Milavitz, a current Shawano School Board member. Running in her place are Bob Kurkiewicz, who previously held the seat, along with other challengers Daniel Poels, Muffy Culhane and Brad Kueschel.

NEW Media asked the candidates three basic questions to inform readers of why they're running and what they hope to tackle if they make it into office.

Q: Why are you running for the First District aldermanic seat?

Poels: I would like to see more transparency with what is happening in our city. People need to learn more about how their precious taxpayer dollars are being put to work. I want the people in my district to have more opportunity to express their views so that I can act in the best interest of the majority.

Kueschel: I've always been interested in what's going on with the city, and I figured that having a younger family

and being a representative for that age demographic would be a good fit.

Culhane: I like to be active in the community. I've been on the board of SAM25 (Shawano Area Matthew 25) ever since it began in 2014. My husband and I have lived in Shawano for 30 years, and we've raised our family here. It's just a great community, and I'd just like to participate on the common council and make Shawano the best that it can be.

Kurkiewicz: I'm running because I believe that I've provided a strong conservative voice on the council. I've worked with (city administrator)

Eddie Sheppard and the council, and I believe I have the energy and experience to do a good job. I'm a veteran of the Vietnam era, a member of AmVets, the American Legion and the Vietnam Era Veterans. I'm a member of the honor guard on each of those groups. I'm not afraid to tackle tough issues.

Q: What is one key issue you would like to address, if elected?

Kueschel: I have an interest in what's going on with the city. I like what they're doing with the expansion of the downtown and the projects that they're doing with activities in town. With it being my first term, if elected, there'd be a little bit of a learning curve

because I need to find out what's going on before I can address anything in particular.

Culhane: I would be interested in looking at the housing issue in our city.

Since I do live in District 1, there's the issue of what the plans will be for the old hospital property. I'd also like to look at the housing overall in our community, including affordable housing. I think we need all types of housing in our community to help everyone.

Kurkiewicz: I don't have a specific agenda. I think every item is important, and that's the way I've always approached them. I'm anxious to totally review the current issues and act appropriately.

Poels: With what has been happening in our national elections, I want to ensure that communication is paramount. We have all seen what misinformation and a lack of understanding of what our officials are doing has led to. I want to work with my colleagues to come up with a better form of communication within our city to our residents.

Q: Why should voters choose you over one of the other candidates?

Culhane: I would bring fresh ideas, and I feel as though I'm pretty approachable and open-minded. I like to

be fair and honest, and I like to learn about different issues, participate in community decisions.

Kurkiewicz: My over 30 years of experience with the city on various committees. My past 16 years on the city council (Kurkiewicz stepped down in 2019 because he was facing knee surgery). I've been a 40-year resident of Shawano. I'm a retired school principal. I'm currently active in the school system; I'm the assistant girls tennis coach. I currently serve on the humane society board of directors.

Poels: I grew up on a farm with my parents and grandparents, teaching me a great work ethic and moral code. I do volunteer work for Shawano Pathways, youth bowling and our driver escort program to help those that need rides to doctors' office visits get to them in a safe and timely manner. I believe these are the qualities we need to lead our city to a more inclusive future.

Kueschel: I would represent a younger demographic than what's typically been on the council. I'm in my mid-30s. I have a younger family, and I have a vested interest in the current and future of the community, so I'd like to help our city grow, not only for the residents but also for our tourism and things like that.

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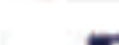

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USDA suspends debt collections, foreclosures

Agricultural producers behind on their Farm Storage Facility Loan and Direct Farm Loan payments will now get some temporary relief.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has suspended past-due debt collections and foreclosures for the two programs indefinitely, according to a press release from the Farm Service Agency (FSA) that administers the two programs. According to USDA data, more than 12,000 of FSA's 129,000 borrowers, approximately

10% of all borrowers, are eligible for the relief.

The press release added the suspension is likely to be in effect while the national COVID-19 disaster declaration is in place.

USDA will suspend non-judicial foreclosures, debt offsets or wage garnishments and referring foreclosures to the Department of Justice, according to the FSA. USDA will work with the U.S. Attorney's Office to stop judicial foreclosures and evictions

on accounts previously referred to the department. Additionally, USDA has extended deadlines for producers to respond to loan servicing actions, including loan deferral consideration for financially distressed and delinquent borrowers. In the Guaranteed Loan program, lenders have been given additional flexibility in servicing their customers.

FSA provides several different loans for producers in two categories: Guaranteed loans made and serviced by commercial lenders, such as banks, the Farm Credit System, credit unions and other non-traditional lenders. FSA guarantees the lender's loan against loss, up to 95%; and direct loans made and serviced by FSA using funds from the federal government.

The most common loan types are Farm Ownership, Farm Operating and Farm Storage Facility Loans, with microloans for each:

- Farm Ownership: helps producers purchase or enlarge a farm or ranch, construct a new or improve an existing farm or ranch building, pay closing costs and pay for soil and water conservation and protection.
- Farm Operating: helps produc-

ers purchase livestock and equipment and pay for minor real estate repairs and annual operating expenses.

• Farm Storage Facility Loans: made directly to producers for the construction of cold or dry storage and includes handling equipment and mobile storage such as refrigerated trucks.

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"Not only is USDA suspending the pipeline of adverse actions that can lead to foreclosure and debt collection, we are also working with the Departments of Justice and Treasury to suspend any actions already referred," said Robert Bonnie, deputy chief of staff for the office of the agriculture secretary. "Additionally, we are evaluating ways to improve and address farm-related debt with the intent to keep farmers on their farms earning living expenses, providing for emergency needs and maintaining cash flow."

CLUB NOTES

Boys and Girls Club of Shawano

The Boys and Girls Club of Shawano is moving into its fourth year, and many operational changes have been made to serve youth and families during the COVID-19 pandemic. Branch Manager Kim Lodewegen and her staff have been adaptable and creative, developing online club activities that reinforce and enhance what youth are learning through virtual school.

When COVID-19 shut down Shawano schools, the Boys and Girls Club also had to stop in-person program. This resulted in canceling the summer program for 2020 and having to switch gears to become a resource for families during a global pandemic. The club provided care bags throughout the time that school was shut down, and also during the summer. These packages contained school supplies for learning at home, hygiene supplies, food and activities for parents to engage with their children.

The Boys and Girls Club was reopened for in-person activities on Sept. 21 but had to close again one week later, in conjunction with school closures. At that time, the club switched to an online platform and conducted virtual meetings with club members divided into cohorts. Club staff began developing online educational programs, complete with supply kits to accompany those programs, that were picked up or delivered.

Homework help, along with a hallmark of Boys and Girls Club programs, continued to be provided throughout the pandemic. Students could log on for homework help numerous times each week. Going the extra mile, Boys and Girls Club staff also provided individual homework help to students falling behind in school, helping those students catch up with assignments.

December allowed Boys and Girls Club to return to in-person cohort instruction. At that time, they knew that academic success was a key concern for many students. During the month of December, they organized

small group homework help with club members who were struggling with virtual school or lagging behind with homework. Boys and Girls Club staff worked directly with teachers to receive missing work lists and helped youth complete homework that many may not have been able to complete on their own.

Another concern was emotional well-being of club members. Parents and families noted that returning to the after-school club routine, with positive adults and activities to focus on, really helped their child have a more positive mindset.

In addition to program adjustments mentioned above, a new Transition Time has been added to the daily Boys and Girls Club program. Club members receive an inspirational quote geared toward youth, which members write down in a journal. Members then answer their chosen journal questions, followed by a short mindfulness exercise. The goal of Transition Time is to give club members time to self-reflect on their day and give them tools to handle anxiety, reduce stress, improve health, increase resiliency and improve self-regulation skills.

Boys and Girls Club of Shawano always tries to do whatever it takes for our club members. One example was when a club family was recently going through a crisis situation. The Boys and Girls Club was able to spring into action to work closely with the school counselor, school social worker and local organizations to provide aid. Club staff were able to identify specific needs that would help the family immediately, and those items were purchased through a community connection to resources.

Jan. 23 marked the fourth anniversary of Boys and Girls Club of Shawano. Community financial support has made the program possible, as club operations are funded entirely through donations and fundraisers. For information, contact Lodewegen at 715-851-6171.

He was also ordered to undergo AODA counseling and follow through with treatment. On the charge of operative while revoked, Parks was sentenced to 60 days in jail concurrent with the prison sentence. A third count of operating while a prohibited blood-alcohol content, fifth or sixth offense, was dismissed on the prosecutor's motion. Parks was also ordered to pay \$2,674 in fines and assessments.
- John R. Long, 23, Green Bay, was found guilty of battery to an emergency rescue worker Feb. 3 by Kussel. Parks was sentenced to one year on probation and ordered to pay fines and assessments of \$654, undergo AODA assessment and write a letter of apology to the victim.
- Charges against Bert F. Roehl, 58, Eland, for ignition interlock tampering/failure to install/violation of court order, three counts of misdemeanor bail jumping and six counts of felony bail jumping were dismissed Feb. 8 by Sloma. The court record states, "These charges were not proven and have no legal effect. Bert F. Roehl is presumed innocent."
