Spearing community rallies around Koenigs

Court records indicate widespread roe bartering practices norm for years

Sturgeon spearkers on the Lake Winnebago system have worked for decades to protect the lake sturgeon, a prehistoric species that is rare in most of the world but plentiful here in Wisconsin.

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources fisheries biologists also have worked tirelessly to protect the resource, until a sting into the barter of valuable sturgeon caviar has put the state's lead sturgeon biologist on ice.

Ryan Koenigs, senior fisheries biologist at the Oshkosh DNR office, is facing a charge that he used some sturgeon eggs collected from successful spearkers and pledged for research to instead be used to eat, sometimes even at DNR staff meetings, according to court records. He also faces an obstruction charge for allegedly lying about his phone contacts with caviar processors.

The sting, orchestrated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and DNR, apparently brought to a head practices that were routinely done by many DNR staff and readily admitted to by most of those questioned, court records show.

"The investigation revealed that a number of citizens were making caviar for others, and were accepting sturgeon roe or finished caviar in exchange for their services, which is an illegal barter," the court case states. "The investigation further revealed a concerted effort to funnel sturgeon roe to particular processors for caviar production by DNR staff." Some of the eggs had been collected from spearkers for research, but diverted for caviar.

The criminal complaint against Koenigs and three others indicates no money changed hands in the barter of raw eggs for processed caviar. Spearkers on the Winnebago watershed say the defendants did nothing differently than thousands of anglers and deer hunters have done for decades in exchanging fillets or venison sausage for drinks or help with a car.

"I think it's a big deal about nothing," said Don Herman, vice president of the Otter Street Fishing Club in Oshkosh, one of the clubs who help plow the roads on Lake Winnebago to help the thousands of February spearkers drive to and from their fishing shanties each season. "Everybody thinks it's just a crock. Everyone who fishes or hunts — we're all guilty. You can't

tell me nobody gave away fish or venison.”

Herman, a volunteer who has shared the sturgeon-shocking boats and waded in the Wolf River waters around Shawano Dam alongside Koenigs, predecessor Ron Bruch and other DNR staff, said he and other sturgeon lovers “back Ryan (Koenigs) 1,000%.”

“Ryan’s a dedicated person,” Herman said. “They (spearers) think it’s just bogus. Ninety percent are for Ryan. They don’t want him to lose his job. He didn’t make any profit from it. It’s like a police officer losing his job over a speeding ticket. If they do it, it will be the biggest mistake the DNR ever made.”

According to the nine-page Class A misdemeanor theft charge filed in Winnebago County Circuit Court against Koenigs on Feb. 11 (two days before the 2011 sturgeon season opener), the joint Fish and Wildlife Service/DNR investigation began in 2017 and continued through January 2020.

“Why bring this up right before the season?” Herman asked. “They wanted to make the story bigger.”

According to the complaint, Ryan allowed a former DNR employee to retrieve raw sturgeon eggs from the DNR Service Center in Oshkosh after hours with the intention of processing them for caviar. Based on the DNR’s value estimate of \$100 per ounce for the caviar, this former employee (who has not been charged) obtained 65 pounds or about \$100,000 worth of roe from the center in 2015. He also told wardens that he gave 36 jars (about \$20,000 worth) of finished caviar to Koenigs in 2017.

The arrangement to take some of the eggs gathered from spearers for research and use them for caviar, with the processor keeping a third to a half of the finished product as an illegal barter payment, existed under Bruch, who was the previous sturgeon biologist and is one of the nation’s foremost sturgeon experts. Bruch’s research and efforts

are credited with helping to bring back lake sturgeon numbers to an estimated 60,000 fish on the Lake Winnebago system — the largest population in the world.

Wardens had warned fisheries staff in 2011 that they should dispose of the eggs or return them to the spearer after research was complete, if surplus eggs remained.

Another charged in the sting was Shawn M. Wendt, 52, of Oakfield, an employee of Wendt’s on the Lake restaurant, who has processed caviar and served it at the restaurant for 15 years, he told a warden.

Wendt, who faces two misdemeanor charges of unlawful sale of game fish, told a game warden he uses a dual-screening process to filter the blood and membrane from the eggs, then salts them and lets them dry. They are served at the restaurant for free, and he never takes any money for the processing, but only finished caviar. State law prohibits any sale or barter of any fish or game.

Victor and Mary Schneider of Fond du Lac are also charged with illegally processing sturgeon eggs and keeping some of the caviar.

Game laws also prevent what is called “wanton waste,” or wasting meat or other portions of game or fish. Herman said at least two spearers he knows who speared adult female fish that were full of eggs dumped their eggs, rather than risking similar hassles. The sting likely will prompt other spearers to waste this valuable delicacy, he said.

Another avid spearer, Steve Klein, of North Fond du Lac, agrees with Herman’s assessment of the caviar caper.

“I think the arrests are uncalled for and blown out of proportion,” said Klein, a board member and former president of the Westshore Fishing Club, one of the Lake Winnebago clubs that plow the roads for spearers. “They are not profiting off the eggs as far as I know. There are bigger problems around to deal with.”

sellers except in treatment settings and situations. She must undergo an alcohol and other drug abuse assessment and either maintain full-time employment or make 10 job search contacts weekly.

- Kimberly S. Brown, 36, Keshena, pleaded no contest Feb. 25 to escape while under extended supervision. Sloma sentenced her to six months in jail and assessed fines and court costs of \$1,657.54.
- Nathan D. Sullivan, 37, Plover, pleaded no contest Feb. 16 to burglary and felony bail jumping. Misdemeanor charges of theft and criminal damage to property were dismissed but read into the record. Sloma sentenced him to three years in prison followed by three years of extended supervision, consecutive to any other sentence. Hilary Allen 'Sarge' Waukau

Hilary Allen "Sarge" Waukau was called home by the Creator and his wife, Pat, early Friday morning, Feb. 19, 2021. Sarge was a force of life unlike any other. Those who knew him could find him laughing and singing wherever he went, and his passion for life lifted everyone around him. His booming trademark laugh was unparalleled, and his passion for music and his teams was boundless.

Sarge was a devout follower and practitioner of traditional Native spiritual practices, and he shared his knowledge and wisdom with all who sought his advice and counsel. Sarge was also a devoted husband to Pat Waukau and father to H.J. and Eileen Waukau; and he happily moved heaven and earth doing whatever was required to make sure they were happy and cared for. He lived the example he preached and guided others to do likewise.

Sarge was truly one of a kind, and our world is better because he lived in it. He touched so many lives in such a positive way that it is beyond description how much he meant to us all.

Sarge was born and raised on the Menominee Indian Reservation in Wisconsin to Hilary John "Sparky" Waukau and Edith Marion Waukau, and he was the oldest of 13 kids. Life and the world dealt Sarge a tough start growing up on the Menominee reservation during the era of "termination," and it was further compounded by being born with only one arm.

While the Creator didn't bless Sarge with many material advantages,



he was blessed with one of the biggest hearts imaginable. His heart provided him with the fire and desire to not just survive but thrive in the face of adversity. He

played and excelled at football at Shawano High School and went on to play at St. Norbert College in Green Bay.

While some may have thought having only one arm may have hindered his ability, they greatly underestimated the heart and ferocity with which he played, earning the unmitigated respect of teammate and opponent alike. He passed along his passion for sports and competition not just to his brothers and sisters, but also his children, nieces and nephews.

Sarge moved to Colorado in 1974 where he set out for a new chapter in his life. He was working as a bartender in Estes Park, singing away with the jukebox and chatting up the clientele, when Pat Schumacher walked in the room for a brief respite during a road trip, and their worlds changed forever. It was kismet. Pat knew immediately that "she was going to marry that man," and Sarge proclaimed "they were better together than were apart."

The spirit of that initial encounter endured over the next five decades as they were always at each other's side. Their love was enduring and eternal as they were blessed with two

children — their son, H.J., and their daughter, Eileen. Their house was one of love, laughter, games, dance recitals, birthday parties, graduations and the occasional WrestleMania party.

After marrying Pat, Sarge worked a series of jobs ultimately landing a job as the head of security at Norlin Library at the University of Colorado. It was here that Sarge provided the education and guidance not found in the classroom to untold thousands of students at UC. Sarge made it his personal priority to ensure that students from all walks of life worked together and treated each other with respect.

It was common to see students in the Norlin Security office who were from different ethnic, racial, economic and spiritual backgrounds sharing laughs and working together. Sarge was also active within the UC Indigenous student community sharing his knowledge and wisdom with all who asked, and always when needed.

Sarge loved going to concerts and UC football games and was an avid outdoorsman who loved to fish and go hiking in the mountains. He had a passion for life that enchanted everyone who came across his path, be they strangers he met on the street, or the famous musicians he counted as friends and who would surprise his mom by singing happy birthday to her.

It was often said of Sarge that you could drop him anywhere in the world with nothing, and he would either find someone he knew or charm somebody into helping him out. You could always find him in the front

row singing along to every song and dancing with mom at every show. As big a fan as was of the Buffs and the Packers, he saved his most passionate ardor for his children. He traveled far and wide so his children could chase their dreams, never missing a game or a recital, and loved every minute of it. Even after they asked him to resign as their coach early in their careers.

Sarge's passion for his family and friends was unmatched and he was quick to open his heart and his home to all who asked. He was a father not just to his own children but to countless others who sought refuge under his and Pat's roof, treating each one of them as if they were his own. Whether it was words of wisdom, a favor, a meal, money, or sometimes a song, he was willing to share whatever he had to help those in need.

He is survived by his children, H.J. Waukau and his wife, Elizabeth Schrimpf, and Eileen Waukau; his brothers, Mark, Jeff and Mitchell Waukau; and his sisters, Stephanie Henry, Lenore Waukau, Natalie Waukau, Lori Waukau, Annie Egan-Waukau and Teeta Wilber.

He preceded in death by his parents, Hilary "Sparky" and Edith Waukau; his brother, Berard; and his sisters, Kim and Mary Lou.

A private family final service was held Tuesday, March 2, 2021.

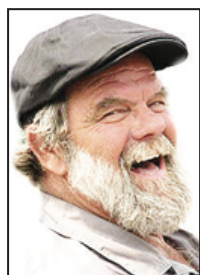

County drug court could be in jeopardy

Low enrollment cause for concern with county board

The Shawano County Drug Court program is still in its infancy, but there is a very real threat that grant funding for the program could be stripped if the county doesn't find more people to participate.

The drug court was a topic of heated discussion Feb. 24 by the Shawano County Board of Supervisors. Drug court officials and legal representatives pointed out that, in spite of the ongoing issue of drugs in the county, finding people to go through the program for 14-24 months is not as simple as busting someone for possessing a marijuana joint.

Currently, eight people are going through the county's drug court program, which has a capacity for 20 people. However, the referrals are not coming in, even though referrals can be made by judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys and others.

If the county can't increase its numbers, it risks losing \$107,000 in grant funding. The program has the potential to save the county more than \$400,000 annually in incarceration and other costs if participation is at capacity.

"DHS (Department of Human Services) is afraid that, if we don't get things improved, we're not going to get the funding from the state the next time around, and that the drug court is failing," said County Board Chairman Tom Kautza.

Becky Edgren, the county's drug court coordinator, noted that the county approved its drug court in 2017 and, after a year of training, started it in earnest in late 2018. She said that the stringent requirements of the program limit the enrollment to high-risk, high-need offenders, and only in cases where the person does not have a record of violent crimes. The program is for those who are drug dependent — not those dealing the drugs, according to Edgren.

"The National Association of Drug Court Professionals states that research has proven that drug courts work better than jail or prison. They work better than probation and better than treatment alone," Edgren said. "Drug courts significantly reduce

drug use and crime and do it cheaper than any other system and any other justice strategy that is used with these people."

Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. noted that the reason high-risk offenders are targeted is that they have been involved with drugs long enough that only a large treatment program is effective. First-time users can usually get treatment in a shorter time frame, he said.

"These are people who need our time and our effort," Kussel said of the high-risk offenders. "We are aware that drug court is very time consuming. It's very, very expensive, not only for the county but it's also time-consuming for those who are admitted into it."

As a recommendation to help

bolster the drug court program, Kussel suggested that the county turn the part-time family court commissioner position into a full-time post so that more people can be helped through drug court. He noted that the court calendars are very congested, making it difficult for him and fellow Circuit Court Judge Katherine Sloma to have the time to check up on enrollees.

"Drug court is not a free ride. It's very difficult," Kussel said. "Their lives are controlled by that drug court team. They're told where they can live pretty much. They're told the jobs they can have and can they be employed and their hours of employment, who they can talk to, who their friends are, what they can do. They have to go through multiple meetings and multiple sessions."

Edgren said there are currently no referrals waiting to be screened. She noted that only Shawano County residents can be referred, sparking concern from board members that no one from the Menominee Reservation can be eligible, as 99% of the reservation is outside Shawano County, even though the court system includes Menominee County.

Laura Nelson, an assistant district attorney who has handled much of the drug court traffic since November 2019, told the county board that the district attorney's office has the final say on whether someone is admitted into the program. Nelson noted that

setup is not unusual, as Marinette County operates its drug court the same way — something she saw firsthand as a defense attorney in that area.

Nelson also pointed out that state Highway 29 is a major corridor for drug trafficking, and many of those apprehended by law enforcement do not live in the county, so they can't be considered for the local drug court.

"People come up here for a lot of recreational opportunities, and unfortunately, they bring drugs with them," Nelson said. "That's one of our struggles. We can charge them here because this is where the crime happened, but we don't get all of those people that are eligible for drug court because they are not residents of Shawano County."

Nelson noted that candidates for drug court also have to face a minimum probation sentence of two years. She said that some offenses, like the first-time possession of THC, only carries with it a one-year period of probation.

"These are not kids smoking weed in the basement that we're targeting, and that's not by my definition," Nelson said. "That's the terms of the drug court team."

Kautza is tasking the county's public safety and health committees to look at the drug court program and figure out what to do to keep the state funding from being lost.

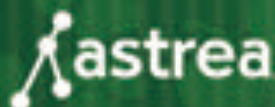

County Board approves ATV/UTV ordinance

Supervisors take issue to licensing rules, speed limits

The Shawano County Board of Supervisors approved an ordinance expanding which county-designated roads can be used for all-terrain vehicles and utility-terrain vehicles, but not without some pushback.

Supervisor John Ainsworth took issue with allowing operators as young as 12 to drive ATVs on county roads and tried to push through an amendment that would require any ATV or UTV operator to have a state driver's license and pay liability insurance. That measure failed as only eight of the 27 board members voted in favor.

"If one of these vehicles is involved, causes an accident, nobody's liable?" Ainsworth said.

Supervisor Randy Young pointed out that some of the vehicles don't have seat belts or turn signals, as a motor vehicle is required to. Like Ainsworth, Young feels intermingling ATVs and UTVs with cars and trucks is an accident waiting to happen.

"From day one I've said this, it's just a bad idea to mix these vehicles on county roads with regular vehicles," Young said. "If the towns want to do it on theirs, I'm fine with it. It's the county roads I have an issue with."

If there are issues with the ATVs being on county roads, the Shawano County Sheriff's Department hasn't seen many complaints. Chief Deputy George Lenzner said deputies have dealt with very few incidents involving ATVs or UTVs.

"It's been a lot better than what we expected," Lenzner said.

Supervisor Mark Bolin had issue with Ainsworth's amendment because it would make a stricter ordinance than state law already has in place. State agencies like the Department of Natural Resources are under no obligation to enforce county regulations, he noted.

"It takes away the enforcement ability for the DNR and the state patrol and leaves everything on the sheriff's department," Bolin said. "They will not enforce our ordinance."

The reason for the updated ordinance, which was first passed in 2019, is that it only permitted ATV/UTV use on piecemeal segments of some county roads to the point where it was difficult to ascertain where someone could or could not ride their vehicles, according to Highway Commissioner Grant Bystol.

"We started getting so many requests in certain segments, and in enforcement it was difficult because there were so many segments where it's open, closed, open, closed," Bystol said. "The intent of this ordinance, brought to you by the highway committee, was to open it up and clarify they can all be open."

Bystol noted that ATV/UTV users between the ages of 12 and 16 are required to be accompanied by an adult driver. This can be in either the same vehicle or a separate vehicle.

Ainsworth feels that the heavy use of county roads would make expanded ATV/UTV use too dangerous.

"We have loaded log trucks. We have full-length semis on county highways that stop and back into driveways, taking up most of the highway and both shoulders when they back in," Ainsworth said. "We have farm equipment that can be as wide as 16 feet. We have horses and buggies that

travel 12 or 13 miles per hour. These (ATVs/UTVs) are fully capable of driving past that 16-foot farm implement or that horse and buggy.

"These kids are going into sixth grade. They are not given any driver's training, driver's instruction or anything like that. I just don't think it's safe for 12-year-olds. I think they should have a valid driver's license and proof of insurance like we need for motor vehicles."

Supervisor Richard Ferfecki took exception to Ainsworth's amendment, clarifying that tractors and other farm equipment are designated vehicles of husbandry.

"That's state law," Ferfecki said. "You can't stop them from going on

the road, and you don't need a driver's license."

Supervisor Ken Capelle also had concerns with the expanded ordinance, but not with the licensing requirements. He expressed concern about limiting ATV speeds to 35 miles per hour when the posted limit for motor vehicles can be as high as 55.

"These vehicles are capable of driving the same speed as a motor vehicle," Capelle said. "They are not a slow-moving vehicle."

County Board Chairman Tom Kautza noted that the 35 mph limit is set by the DNR, so the county can't waver from that.

"That's what we used as a model when this all started," Kautza said.

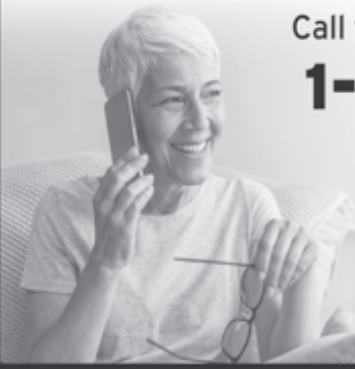
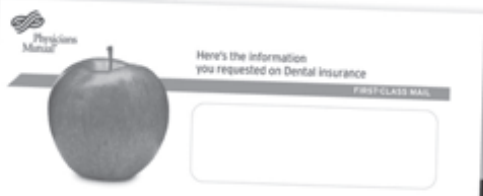

Stress relief comes to Keshena Primary School

Student kits obtained through DPI grant help them to sort through emotions

They might look like bags of toys, but the stress kits are actually bags of tools that help students at Keshena Primary School to sort through their emotions during difficult times.

The elementary school recently received a School-Based Mental Health Service Grant from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, which allowed it to

produce 440 stress kits that include items like Play-Doh, pinwheels, sand timers and more to allow students, both in class and at home, to focus on something as they're dealing with emotions like anger and sadness or if they're just feeling overwhelmed.

Courtney Slewinski, social worker, said that KPS teaches a variety of self-regulation techniques to its students and coping tools. With the entire school district remaining in virtual learning mode

for the full first semester of the school year, the stresses that young students normally feel were magnified, and with most of them isolated from friends and other resources, Slewinski and others at the school knew they needed to get something in their hands to help.

"We kind of came up with the idea of creating an SEL (Social Emotional Learning) toolkit, known as a 'calm down kit,'" Slewinski said. "That way, they have access to things that we're teaching them

here at school at home, as well."

One of the items is a mat with a drawing of a person with no facial features. Students can use the little containers of Play-Doh to form eyes, a mouth and other features that they can show teachers and other staff members what they're feeling.

"Some of them might look like toys, but how we teach them is to use them as tools," Slewinski said. "If you're struggling with your words sometimes to say what you're feeling, sometimes it's easier to draw it out."

If words are not so difficult for

students, the kits also have tiny journals with lavender stickers that students can use to make their feelings known and why they're bothered.

"We teach them about how different scents can help with self-regulation as well as journaling," Slewinski said. "Drawing pictures is a great way to get out those thoughts and feelings in a healthy way."

Pinwheels and bubble makers help the students with breathing techniques. Slewinski noted that those items are not as effective when students are wearing masks in school, but they're helpful for students who are socially distanced at home or elsewhere.

"While we're teaching them the deep breathing exercises, we're also teaching them how physically things in their body are changing and helping them calm down and regulate," Slewinski said.

Snacks are also included in case hunger is an issue, as growling tummies can make it hard for students to be in a decent place emotionally, according to Slewinski. There are also do-it-yourself bottles with orbs that grow in water and glitter that helps students to focus on the changing and swirling patterns and help ground themselves during emotional crises.

Mary Juckem, KPS principal, said the bottles have been particularly helpful to students, and she's heard from students about how much they help with emotional grounding.

"I've had some students who have said they take them to their rooms, and one says he even sleeps with it whenever he's getting frustrated or irritable," Juckem said. "That's the tool he's using (to calm down)."

Of course, some classic items are in order, too. Each stress kit comes with some bubble wrap for students to use for popping and getting back to a calm state, and there's even a sand timer that students can watch and actually feel themselves calming down over a period of time.

"We talk about health coping tools versus unhealthy coping tools and how do we express our frustration and anger in a way that's healthy to ourself and other people and property around us," Slewinski said.

The school has been highlighting one of the items weekly in newsletters sent to families so parents can learn about the tools and how to use them to calm their children down when they're stressed at home, according to Juckem.

"They can apply those pieces in different settings," Juckem said.

All in all, the kits are making it easier for teachers to manage their

classrooms without having to resort to disciplinary action on students who are displaying negative behavior.

"I think it's empowering them to learn how to manage their own emotions in safe ways, but also knowing they have resources with their adults

and things like that to ask for help," Slewinski said.

FRESH Project coming out of hibernation

CSAs, summer market, expansion to Menominee County in the works this coming year

The coronavirus pandemic kept the FRESH Project from doing its annual winter market in Shawano, but patrons of the program can rest assured that other activities are taking place to keep food coming to the area.

The FRESH Project held a community-supported agriculture project over the weekend, featuring local food producers like Five Star Lamb, Johnson Family Cattle, Belle Plaine Cheese, Pienko's Meat Processing, Sweet Timber Maple Syrup and Milo's Eggs. According to Barbara Mendoza, the program's executive director, the one-time event is a prelude to an extended subscription program that will start around summertime.

"We've done this several times, where we would just work with our local farmers," Mendoza said. "We say that we'd like to do a CSA with your products, and then we add maybe 50 cents to their price, and it's just a small fundraiser for us."

The FRESH Project will start accepting subscriptions for the full CSA on April 1. The cost will be dependent on a family's income, Mendoza said, and prices are still to be determined.

The CSAs are a good thing to come about in light of the FRESH Project having to cancel its winter market, which started a few years ago as a monthly way for farmers to sell off excess product. Due to the coronavirus pandemic still causing a high number of cases in the area when the winter market was due to begin in November, it was determined that the indoor event couldn't be pulled off safely.

"That is so missed," Mendoza said. "That is missed by so many people and our farmers, but we are going to have a full farmers market."

The summer farmers market was able to take place last year but required eliminating a lot of the activities in order to keep people socially distanced. This year, Mendoza is confident that the farmers market can be spread across the full perimeter of Franklin Park to allow some distancing but not require people to hurry in and hurry out.

"We are getting the forms and the

applications ready for that," Mendoza said. "I'll be sending out an email to all of our vendors, including our craft vendors, and then we'll have our forms online April 1."

This year's market will kick off June 19 and continue through Oct. 2, going from 8 a.m. to noon every Saturday. Once again, the market will team up with Shawanofest on July 10 and stay open later. The market will also hold its regular 5K walk/run, but it will not include the scrabble run, according to Mendoza.

The need for fresh food is there, she said, noting that the Shawano Area Food Center called the FRESH Project to help stock its shelves at one point during the pandemic.

The FRESH Project has done a mobile market program for years that has brought fresh vegetables and other items to the smaller communities. Mendoza said the program is being expanded to include Menominee County with the help of a grant.

"We are working with Keshena

Primary School to work with their third-grade class about planting, the soil, the light and the water," Mendoza said. "We are also working with the Boys and Girls Club Menominee Nation. We're going to expand their garden, and we'll have a classroom setting to talk about some higher-level education on that."

The Menominee County expansion will also include preparing garden boxes for families that will include the soil needed to grow the seeds, according to Mendoza. The mobile market and the CSA program will also take place at the tribe's farmers market every other Friday when it starts up again.

"We have a lot going on," Mendoza said, noting that she hopes to revive the winter market for next winter.

The bald eagle, master of the hunt

Bald eagles have presence. They capture your eye wherever they are. They exude a sort of majesty and an ease with themselves and their environment. And for good reason — they are well outfitted for a raptor's (bird of prey) life.

With a wingspan of 6 to 7 ½ feet, bald eagles can soar easily on thermals with nary a wing beat, but, on the strength of those same wings, can also reach speeds up to 30 mph, according to the National Eagle Center (NEC) in Wabasha, Minnesota. When intent on a meal, they can swoop down after prey (stoop) at speeds up to 100 mph and strike with deadly force.

Their talons are efficient weapons, designed to grab and carry prey such as fish and small mammals. Those talons, according to the NEC, can catch prey many times the eagle's size. Once a meal is caught, the eagle uses

They also have two foveae (we have only one) where focus is the sharpest at the back of the each eyeball; these are packed with those light-sensing cells. The two foveae in each eye point in different directions — one

its stout, hooked and sharp beak to break it down into bite-size chunks.

The eagle's sharp vision gives this hunter a really distinct advantage. According to "What It's Like to Be a Bird" by

straight ahead, the other at about 45 degrees, allowing an eagle to focus on four different areas at the same time and providing nearly 360 degrees of peripheral vision. We have much less, about 110 degrees of peripheral vision.

When you see an eagle cock its head to one side, it is using one fovea of one eye to see something more sharply. An eagle's vision is so sharp, according to the NEC, it can see a rabbit bounding across the landscape three miles away.

According to Sibley, to approximate an eagle's visual acuity we would need to look through binoculars that magnify our world by a factor of five. And bald eagles have yet another advantage: They also see in the UV range of light which allows them to track their prey by its urine trail.

Once a species protected by Federal Endangered Species Act, and the state,

the bald eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*) has made a comeback, thanks to all the conservation measures taken to restore its population. You can now see bald eagles year-round in Wisconsin. Locally, we see them at the Oconto Harbor, along the west shore of Green Bay and perching near rivers, woodland edges and roadways.

Take care when driving rural roads where eagles may be feeding on roadside carrion. The bald eagle's large size makes it difficult for them to make a speedy getaway from approaching vehicles, and many of them are killed or injured every year by vehicles.

Enjoy your bald eagle sightings, and know that while you are watching this majestic bird, you too are "captured" in even sharper focus by this majestic and amazing raptor.

5 area high school teams eager for start of alternate fall season

4 volleyball teams, 1 football team will play over next several weeks

The winter high school sports season has come to a close for all area teams, which usually means spring sports are on the horizon. But because of the pandemic altering the sports calendar, it will be several weeks until those spring sports begin, and instead several area teams will compete in the alternate fall season over the coming weeks.

Volleyball teams from Gresham, Bowler, Tigerton and Menominee Indian and Menominee Indian's football team all plan to participate in the alternate fall season after having their original fall season cut short or not played at all.

The volleyball teams have already begun practicing, with games starting up this week.

With so many area teams being a part of the alternate season, schedules were a bit easier to put together and long trips were mostly avoided. While no schedule was the same, the teams are set to play around 10 matches. After those matches, the WIAA also has plans to have a postseason.

Gresham, Bowler and Tigerton would typically be competing for a Central Wisconsin Conference-North Division title, but with other members of the conference having already completed their seasons in the fall, no conference title will be on the line.

"The first thing that stands out about the opportunity to play in the alternate season is it is going to give our seniors another opportunity to play volleyball before graduating," said Gresham coach Tim Wild. "Secondly, it is going to give our younger players an opportunity to play together and learn more as we move forward to next year. If we weren't able to play in this alternate season, those younger players would lose that experience."

"We are excited to get to play another season," said Bowler coach Brad Brei. "The girls are excited to get to play more volleyball. As a coach all I can ask the girls is to play hard, have

fun and remember it's just a game."

While the alternate volleyball season will be unlike any that came before, teams are still approaching it as if they were playing in a normal fall season.

Teams will continue to chase wins, but most importantly play hard every chance they get and try to have fun while doing it.

"We approach this alternate season with a peculiar excitement that is difficult to explain," said Tigerton coach Holly Mevenden. "There is no conference championship on the line, but that doesn't mean our athletes will settle for anything less than their best efforts. There is the tournament to look forward to that we didn't think was possible when we closed down

our season last fall."

For Menominee Indian's football team, which starts practice on March 8, the situation is much different.

The Eagles will play a seven-game schedule but have to make several long trips to do so, as not many area football teams are part of the alternate season. There is no postseason or culminating event for football.

The only team on Menominee Indian's schedule that the team has played before is Deerfield. Arcadia, Kewaunee, Parkview/Albany, Princeton/Montello/Green Lake, Poynette and Columbus round out the schedule, with only the game against Princeton/Montello/Green Lake being a home one for the Eagles.

Coach Chris Clache said playing

this schedule "is definitely a huge jump up in competition. I feel this will prepare us for our eventual move into the Northwoods Conference in the fall. We will definitely need to improve to be competitive with those teams, and I feel our schedule this spring will do just that."

While the alternate volleyball season will wrap up before the start of spring sports practices on April 19, football games are scheduled through May 6.

Clache said the school has worked out a practice schedule that will allow athletes in football to also participate in their spring sports. "I feel our athletes are able to handle it."

Bonduel's Chris Rank retires from coaching

Rank served as head coach last 23 years

Bonduel High School wrestling head coach Chris Rank has decided to call it a career, retiring after 30 years on the coaching staff.

"Coaching all these years has been an incredible journey for me and my family. I have been truly blessed," said Rank.

Family helped introduce Rank to wrestling when he was in high school and kept him in the sport on several occasions throughout his coaching career.

His brother, Greg, was one of the individuals that talked Rank into trying out for wrestling in high school. While Rank admits football was his favorite sport, wrestling "certainly made me the person I am."

Rank wrestled on the varsity team his final three years of high school, placing third at state in the 138-pound weight class as a senior in 1981.

He volunteered for the wrestling team his first two years out of high school before joining the staff as an assistant under Dan Weidner. He was an assistant for three years, getting to coach his younger brother, Kevin, over that time before getting a job at Pierce Manufacturing and having to give up coaching while working second shift.

After five years, Rank was moved to first shift and returned to volunteering for three seasons.

After the 1993-94 season, Weidner stepped down as coach and Jeff DeLorme took over. Rank became an assistant under DeLorme and served in that position for four years.

"Those four years were amazing," said Rank, who got to coach his youngest brother, Jeff, during that time. "I truly enjoyed being an assistant where I could drill and wrestle with the team to help make them better."

There was a talented freshman class the first year of that four-year timeframe. The team ended up placing second at the state team tournament when that class

were juniors and then claimed the school's first team title as seniors, which was one of Rank's most memorable moments during his time on the coaching staff.

After the 1997-98 season, DeLorme decided to step down as coach, leaving the future of the program in question.

"I enjoyed my role as an assistant and had never even dreamt of being a head coach," said Rank. "I guess God had different plans."

After talking things over with his wife, Judy, Rank decided to apply for the vacant head coaching position.

Rank recalled talking with administrator Dr. Peter Behnke and informing him he'd be committed for at least seven years — to see his son Lucas through high school graduation.

"Those seven years flew by with some incredible team success and individual success," said Rank, who intended to turn the reins over to someone else after the 2004-05 season.

Again, family kept Rank in the sport.

Rank's daughter Peri was set to start her freshman year of high school the following year and wanted to serve as the wrestling manager under her dad while having him coach her friends. "I looked at Judy and said 'I guess I'm not done yet,'" said Rank.

Rank's teams continued to find success over those four seasons, but Rank continued to coach after that, racking up dual wins and qualifying several individual wrestlers for state along the way.

Now after 30 total years on staff

— seven as an assistant before the last 23 years as head coach — Rank is calling it a career.

"One thing that I am very proud of is that most of my staff, whether in high school, middle school or youth over the years has come through our program," said Rank. "Also, there have been some of our wrestlers that get involved in helping other programs. Also, year after year we have wrestlers coming back to help out on their Thanksgiving and Christmas breaks which is very nice. We stress to athletes to give back to the sport."

Over his 23-year stint as head coach, Rank's teams accumulated a dual record of 309-121-1. Sixty individual wrestlers qualified for state, with 40 of them placing in the top six.

Of the school's eight individual state champions all-time, Rank was the head coach for seven of them. Six others placed second at state.

Rank's teams claimed six conference titles and five regional championships.

"A huge part of my coaching philosophies was confidence," said Rank, who is a Class of 2012 member of the Bonduel Hall of Fame and member of the 2009 wrestling Hall of Fame class. "I felt that was very important to have that confidence when competing. I always felt if you didn't believe you could win, the end result probably wouldn't be so good. I stressed that in life as well. You need to have that confidence in whatever you set out to do in life."

"His strongest suit over the years was being able to motivate anybody to believe that they could win," said Chad Bogacz, who wrestled for, coached alongside and has known Rank for about 30 years.

"He made you believe, even if you weren't as talented as the person you were stepping on the mat against, that you were going to come off a winner. It went from a kid trying to win their first match, to a .500 wrestler, all the way to trying to win a state championship."

Rank intends to be a fan of the sport going forward, although he said he'd always be willing to give advice for the team's next coach.

Gresham boys' rally falls short in sectional final

Wildcats unable to overcome Blazers' size

The Gresham High School boys basketball team's valiant second-half comeback effort came up short in a 84-66 Division 5 sectional final loss to the Green Bay N.E.W. Lutheran co-op on Feb. 27 in Green Bay.

Third-seeded Gresham had difficulty rebounding against the top-seeded Green Bay NEW Lutheran co-op, which used its size to its advantage. When Green Bay wasn't scoring in the paint, it was grabbing offensive rebounds to get second and third chances at scoring on the possession.

Gresham was able to build a little momentum at the end of the first half and then put together a strong second half, but the team's surge eventually fizzled out and the hosts were able to pull away.

The hosting Blazers took control early by scoring nine of the first 11 points, doing most of the scoring in the paint.

A couple of buckets by Will Jensen helped Gresham cut into the deficit, but Green Bay then went on a 21-6 spurt to go up 20 points, 32-12, with less than three-and-a-half minutes to play in the opening half.

"I think in the first half, we were kinda like a deer in the headlights out there," said Gresham coach Jeff Zobeck.

With Green Bay on the verge of blowing the game wide open, Gresham found some much-needed answers. The Wildcats got three-point plays from Belasaire Vele and Jensen, and then a 3-pointer from Vele to trim the deficit to 15 by halftime.

After struggling against Green

Bay's pressure defense in the first half, Gresham decided to return the favor in the final half, using full-court pressure to slow the hosts and take them out of rhythm. While the Blazers still controlled the boards, the Wildcats did a better job of boxing out and securing rebounds to turn the momentum.

The second half started with two Vele free throws before a bucket by Jake Hoffman, who missed a lot of the first half after picking up two fouls.

The hosts responded with a 6-0 run before Gresham settled in and quickly started erasing the 17-point deficit.

Hoffman started the run with a bucket before Austin Sperberg hit a triple. Jensen later knocked down two free throws and then Hoffman converted a three-point play. Hoffman hit another field goal before Jensen converted a shot to make it an eight-point contest, 47-39, with still 11-and-a-half minutes to play.

Green Bay got back to attacking the basket and used a 7-3 run to regain some control. But Gresham still had plenty of fight remaining.

Jensen converted a three-point play before making another shot less than 15 seconds later to make it a 54-47 game with 9:21 to play.

Over the next few minutes, Green Bay was able to work back out to a 13-point lead. Gresham's chances of making a comeback then took a hit when Jensen had to leave the game with 6:53 remaining after a hard fall to the floor.

The Wildcats continued to battle though, as Sperberg hit a 3-pointer, Vele converted a field goal and Sperberg hit a free throw to make it 69-60 with 4:40 to go.

That was as close as Gresham got

the rest of the way, as Green Bay used a 6-0 run to push its lead back to 15, and was able to put the game away from there.

"They were a really fast team; they can shoot, drive, just an all-around team," said Vele. "I think when we put our press on, we slowed them down a little bit but we just fell short. We didn't have enough energy, I guess you could say, to come back. We got right there, but we couldn't make it all the way back."

While it was a tough way to end a special season for the Wildcats, the players didn't hang their heads.

After an 8-16 season last winter, with a number of close losses and blown leads, Gresham flipped its record to 16-8 this season. The Wildcats fell just short of a Central Wisconsin Conference-North Division title.

"Definitely teamwork," said Hoffman on the reason for the team's improvement this season. "Teamwork was the main thing this year. Last year, we had players that would try to take

the ball and just be solo the whole game. This year, we had teamwork going in. You could tell by the Prentice game (Feb. 25) — we had five players score over 10 points."

Against Prentice, Gresham rolled to a 75-55 victory in the sectional semifinal matchup.

Hoffman scored 17 points, while Vele and Sperberg added 15 points each. Jensen and Pecore each chipped in 10 points.

With just two seniors — Hoffman and Jonah Surprise — graduating from the team, the Wildcats will have high hopes heading into next season.

At the Shawano County Board of Supervisors meeting held on February 24, 2021, the following ordinances were adopted.

Ord. No. 1-21 modifying Ord. No. 8-19 concerning the use of All-Terrain Vehicles (ATV) and Utility Terrain Vehicles (UTV) on the County Trunk Highway System. After collaboration and gathering input from interested parties, the Shawano County Highway Committee recommended modifying the existing ordinance No. 8-19 by opening all county trunk highways under Shawano County jurisdiction unless otherwise signed closed to ATV / UTV. This ordinance is effective upon publication on March 5, 2021.

Ord. No. 2-21 amending the Shawano County Livestock Facilities Licensing Ord. No. 1-18. This ordinance complies with the requirements of Sec. 93.90 of Wis. Statutes and ch. ATPC 51, WI Adm. Code (ATPC 51) to establish standards and authority to protect the public health and safety of the people of Shawano County. This ordinance sets forth the procedures for obtaining a license for the siting of new and expanded livestock facilities on all lands within unincorporated areas of Shawano County. These amendments reduce the number of copies of a license application and to include an electronic copy, removes unnecessary setback thresholds and acknowledges Shawano County's Board of Adjustment may grant variances to setbacks.

Volunteers feed ‘fish sticks’ to White Clay Lake

Log structures benefit fish, turtles, birds, frogs

The ultimate goal was better fishing on White Clay Lake, but the discussion on Feb. 26 among nine volunteers was about “fish sticks” — not about the right lure for the right time of day.

It was more on the order of, “Did you bring a come-along?”

“Naw. But I’m pretty sure Jack has one in his truck.” A come-along, by the way, is a hand-operated winch with a ratchet used to pull objects.

Jack Schneider, Cecil, did indeed have the tool. A few trips off the lake back to volunteers’ garages and shops eventually produced the necessary ingredients for the “fish sticks” construction, including a generator, a ladder, a grinder for cutting cable, a maul, U-bolts and a drill for tightening them.

The “fish sticks,” or log structures, create habitats where small fish can find cover and grow, in turn attracting larger fish to the area. Emily Henrigillis, watershed coordinator for Connecting Our Waters, said the fish sticks also attract turtles, ducks, songbirds and frogs. “Everything benefits.”

In many other lakes, shoreline trees naturally fall into the water,

creating the desired habitat. White Clay Lake does not have the quantity or size of trees along its shore to provide the habitat.

The project was put off from last winter due to poor ice conditions. A \$25,000 grant from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources

Healthy Lakes and Rivers program provided the financial support. The grant’s size was due to the multiple property owners potentially benefiting from the “fish stick” installation, according to the DNR’s website.

The volunteers started by felling trees, 45 to 60 feet tall, on nearby

properties. The impromptu logging operation had the added benefit of removing some hazardous conditions, like a big cedar leaning over Lodge Road near the White Clay Lake Lodge, they noted.

Pickup trucks then hauled the logs to various sites along the southeast shore, where they were assembled into bundles of five. The logs were cabled together and anchored to a solid bottom layer.

That wasn’t always easy to reach, due to the lake’s signature thick clay layer on the bottom, and required holding the anchors down via a stout metal pole. Jeff Simon, Bonduel, then climbed up a ladder on a carefully positioned pickup truck to provide the vigorous pounding needed to reach the required depth.

When the ice melts this spring, the “fish sticks” will settle down into the water, enhancing the populations of northern pike, largemouth bass, perch and walleye in the 236-acre body of water. Improving the walleye fishery — not just in White Clay Lake, but also in surrounding waters — has been a priority of the White Clay Lake Sportsmen Club for many years.

Connecting Our Waters, along with the White Clay Lake Protection and Rehabilitation District, White Clay Lake Sportsmen Club, the DNR and Crappie Junction, cooperated to make the fish sticks project happen.
