County gets \$4M from American Rescue Act

Total of \$8M expected as county board looks at where money should be spent

Shawano County has received almost \$4 million in funds through the American Rescue Act recently, almost half of the \$8 million promised by the federal government.

County officials are expected to work through the summer to determine where the money is expected to go in the next three years, as it must be spent by 2024. What would help, according to county board chairman Tom Kautza, are specific parameters on what the money can and can't be spent on. Kautza said during the May 26 board meeting that some guidelines have been distributed by the Biden Administration, but they are unclear.

"That seems to change, and it's pretty vague," Kautza said. "We don't know exactly in detail what the guidance is going to be in the end. As a board, the next step we have to do is decide how we spend the money."

Kautza said that putting a lot of the money toward future capital improvement projects will be a consideration. He noted that existing funds for those projects are low, noting that while sales tax revenues are higher, the American Transmission Company revenues are dwindling.

"If we use this money for some of the things we know we're going to have to do, and they qualify, then we won't have to find that money in the future," Kautza said.

He recommended about \$1 million to \$1.5 million go into capital improvement projects, if the county board agrees.

Another item that Kautza said the county is looking at is bringing back the revolving loan fund it had through Shawano County Economic Progress Inc. He said one of the first loans it could potentially give is to Newcap Inc., which has expressed an interest in purchasing the Lakeland Center in Shawano, which used to house the county's community service programs

and was recently used as a mass vaccination clinic.

"We could give a chunk of this money to SCEPI, like a half a million, and we tell SCEPI to start a revolving loan fund," Kautza said. "SCEPI will then take that money, start the revolving loan fund, loan it to Newcap, and then Newcap buys the property, and we could get a good chunk of our money right back to spend again."

Supervisor Jerry Erdmann supported the idea of reestablishing the revolving loan fund, noting that the money helped with establishing businesses throughout the county.

"It was really good for the county," Erdmann said.

Supervisor Sandy Steinke echoed the sentiment, noting the revolving loan fund that the city of Shawano had helped to keep Arrowcast in the community.

"There were lots of businesses in the town who used it, and some outside of the city in the county that used some of this revolving money to get startups for their businesses," Steinke said. "I think it would be great."

Kautza said he didn't plan on forming a special committee to look at how to spend the money, feeling the existing committees could handle the job. Much of the work would likely be taken on by the executive committee, which oversees the county's finances.

Kautza also toyed with the idea of purchasing a building in the city, not specifying which one, and using it as a new site for the Shawano County Library, closing down the current site across the street from Shawano City Hall.

"We should explore every avenue we can," Kautza said.

The chairman also recommended the county come up with projects that are revenue generators so that the county can continue to have funding for necessary projects long after the American Rescue Act funding is spent.

"I haven't come up with any big ideas yet, but one small one would be

to give some of the money to keep up parks," Kautza said.

Kautza encouraged board members to submit their ideas to consider.

Administrative coordinator James Davel urged patience as the county determined how it could spend the money as the county, the state and municipalities continue to press the federal government for specifics.

"There's some gray area in this," Davel said. "As we get more of the rules, I think you're going to need to be willing to take a little more risk and operate in a gray area."

Davel said in a phone interview with NEW Media on May 27 the guidance the county has received so far has been regarding assisting small businesses, nonprofits, impacts to tourism and travel, investments in water and sewer as well as broadband, and giving essential workers premium pay.

"If we had any revenue reduction, we could mitigate that with some of this," Davel said. "I was really disappointed that there wasn't more sent out with the left and right limits on what this could be spent on."

The rescue act funds have been put into a savings account, according to Davel, as the funding needs to be kept separate from the county's standard budget systems.

"Until we establish the rules in the county government on how we want to use the funds and process the money, it's just sitting there," Davel said.

He hopes there will be enough clarity by July to make some decisions on how best to use the money. The remaining funds are expected to be delivered to the county in May 2022.

"The good news is we did get the money, and we don't have to spend it today," Davel said. "The other good news is the county is trying to do its due diligence by putting together the process on how these funds are established to maximize them across the breadth of the county."

Wind, thunderstorm cause damage in Shawano

Trees, boats and boat lifts became victims of a heavy thunderstorm that rolled through Shawano on May 25.

"We saw that there were several trees that went down north of West Green Bay Street and west of Main Street," said Scott Kroening, Shawano director of public works.

Kroening said Shawano Public Works sent four workers out to cut up the trees that had fallen in the streets.

According to Kroening, the storm

came through around 7 p.m. and the workers were sent out around 8:30. The workers took a couple of hours to cut up and clean up all of the big trees.

"It was a mess," said Charlie Harvey, owner of Charlie's County Market. "There is a boat lift and pontoon tipped over in the water. We don't know whose stuff is whose."

The big wind gusts lasted about four minutes, said Harvey, who had small pieces of dock blow off and down the lake.

Fallen heroes get their due in Shawano

More than 1,000 flags decorate the graves of fallen veterans as living residents pay tribute

The men and women who fought and died for this country's freedom were honored in song and story by community leaders in Woodlawn Cemetery on Memorial Day.

Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney Greg Parker, who served in the U.S. Army and was part of the military police, was the main speaker for the event and recounted how many people in the Armed Forces in Wisconsin had lost their lives fighting in the United States' various wars.

"Memorial Day is a day of utmost importance in our history," Parker said. "Memorial Day, once called Decoration Day, originated after the American Civil War to commemorate the Union and Confederate soldiers who died in the war. Since the Civil

War, Memorial Day has become a day that our United States of America sets aside each year to remember and honor the men and women who have died in service of their country."

Wisconsin has seen many sacrifices in the wars that America has fought, Parker said. The Civil War took the lives of over 12,000 from Wisconsin. Another 134 Wisconsin residents died in the Spanish-American War.

World War I, which Parker said had been recorded as one of the deadliest wars in history, saw almost 4,000 Wisconsinites die. In World War II, Wisconsin lost over 8,000, and another 13,000 were wounded. The Korean War saw more than 700 Wisconsin deaths, and another 1,200 died in the Vietnam War.

"It is because of their personal courage, their sense of duty and their honor and integrity that we can all

have freedom to live in this great country," Parker said.

Parker grimly noted that this year the country will observe the 20th anniversary of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, which saw over 3,000 Americans killed in just one day.

"Therefore, it is important to remember the reason that we all stand here today," Parker said.

Parker recalled that his grandfather fought in World War I and was injured by mustard gas, which left him disabled. His grandfather had four sons who fought for the United States in World War II. Parker's father fought in the Korean War, and his brother served in Vietnam.

"Like my family members, I felt compelled to serve my country in the United States Army," Parker said. "I served as an MP and a working dog handler. Though I did not experience

the full fury of battle, I never regretted the decision to serve because I believe that my time in the military was one of the most defining experiences of my life, and I would venture to say that many of the veterans here today will tell you the same thing."

Parker noted that the Thursday before Memorial Day is when flags are set at the graves of veterans. He acknowledged the work done locally as he pointed out how the U.S. Army places flags at the graves of more than 200,000 veterans buried at Arlington Cemetery in Virginia.

"Folks, look around you," Parker said. "As you enter the cemetery today, you saw numerous flags at each veteran's gravesite. Veterans Service Officer Nick Benzinger estimates there are 1,000 flags placed within this cemetery. What better way to show our community and our fallen men and women

country that we care — and we will never forget.”

Shawano County Board Chairman Tom Kautza said that he was glad to see that there were a lot more people in the cemetery this year honoring fallen veterans. He noted that the coronavirus pandemic kept many at home last Memorial Day but felt it was important to come out and honor those who have died.

“I feel a little out of place here because I was never in the service,” Kautza said. “I can never fully understand the bond and the camaraderie that they have, but I do know that I hear a lot at the county board and other places about our rights — or my rights.”

Kautza said that it was important for everyone to get along, even when there’s a discussion about rights and liberties, because of the men and women who fought for that freedom and don’t get to enjoy it today.

“Look at what people pay for us to have our rights,” Kautza said. “Think about it, there are young men and women not much older than what you see over there in the (high school) band that never came back home. They never had a family. They never got to be a father, a mother, a grandfather — none of that. They gave that up for us, for our rights. Not my rights, all our rights.”

Shawano Mayor Bruce Milavitz told the crowd of more than 200 that this holiday was not just a “four-day weekend” but a time when citizens

need to remember those who have fought and died in war.

“We are here to remember the many who served, the great men and women who never had the opportunity to take their uniform off,” Milavitz said. “They’re still wearing

it today.”

Even though Memorial Day is to remember the heroes who have died, Milavitz expressed his appreciation for the men and women who have fought for freedom and were present for the ceremony.

“Let’s keep all of the families and these great men and women in our hearts and never forget the freedoms we have today because of them,” Milavitz said.

ECWRPC undergoing some restructuring

Shawano County Board approves resolution of support for changes

The East Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission is undergoing some restructuring, but for it to proceed, it needs the blessing of its participants.

The Shawano County Board of Supervisors did its part May 25 by approving a resolution that will continue to have three representatives on the planning commission but takes out some red tape on how one of those members is appointed.

Currently, each county in the ECWRPC has one member that must be appointed by the governor. According to Melissa Kraemer-Badtke, the commission's executive director, it can be very difficult to get the governor's office to move quickly on appointments, leaving some counties without adequate representation.

Under the proposal, the county board chairman and two other supervisors would sit on the commission for Shawano County. Eight counties are represented in the ECWRPC, and the commission currently has 36 members, according to Kraemer-Badtke, with larger counties getting more seats, but the commission will be reducing the total number of members.

"Board composition cannot be modified without resolutions from a majority of the local units of government in the region with a majority of the population," Kraemer-Badtke said.

Shawano County Board Chairman Tom Kautza sponsored the resolution, explaining that time was a factor, and putting the process through a committee would have slowed things down.

"That's the way the other

counties are doing it in the state," Kautza said.

Kautza agreed that taking the state government out of the equation was the way to go.

"We thought, what's the use to keep struggling to find people to fill that and run that process through to Madison," Kautza said. "We don't lose a member. Our membership will remain the same."

Currently, Kautza and Shawano County Supervisor Steve Gueths sit on the commission, along with Chuck Dallas, the gubernatorial appointee. Kautza noted that Dallas' term is coming to an end, and he declined to offer any recommendations to the governor's office, knowing that the restructuring was in progress.

"It's definitely a good thing to do," Kautza said.

Supervisor Jerry Erdmann, the

former county board chairman, agreed with Kautza's view.

"They go above and beyond and help the counties out," Erdmann said. "What we pay is minimal for the services they provide. This plan, the way it is now, in my mind, is the best one I've seen so far. With downsizing but Shawano County staying the same, how can we lose?"

However, counties giving their approval are only the first step. Municipal governments will also be asked to give their approval, so the Shawano Common Council and town and village boards in the county will be asked to offer their own resolutions.

Besides the reorganization of the commission structure, ECWRPC also wants to shift its focus to look closer at some key issues, including transportation, economic development and water quality management.

County opposes legislature's wildlife damage plan

Pair of bills would grant authority to DNR instead of county land conservation program

The Shawano County Board of Supervisors approved a resolution May 25 opposing the state of Wisconsin's efforts to diminish its land conservation authority.

The Wisconsin Legislature is proposing changes to the Wildlife Damage Abatement and Claims Program, a voluntary program through the Department of Natural Resources that helps farmers and other agricultural producers with losses caused by

deer, bears, geese, cougars and other animals. The county has been part of the program for over 25 years, and the resolution notes that county land conservation departments are the local mechanism for many resource management programs.

Senate Bill 63 and Assembly Bill 49 seek to strip the county of administering the programs and have the DNR manage it instead. Besides the authority issue, the county would also lose \$7,000 that it receives annually for staffing and mileage reimbursement.

Supervisor Arlyn Tober, who sits on the county's land conservation committee, said the committee received the resolution from a neighboring county and asked for Shawano County's support.

"There are still 17 counties in Wisconsin that are enforcing the program, and the rest of them already changed over to the DNR," Tober said. "I don't know why, because the conservation committees in these other counties is running it pretty good, and we're running it very well."

By giving the authority to the

DNR, anyone seeking to appeal a decision would have to go down to Madison for a public hearing, whereas the current setup would keep farmers closer to home.

"That's really going to put them out," Tober said. "Why fix something when there isn't any problem?"

The bill passed by a 24-2 vote. Supervisors Gene Hoppe and Dennis Knaak cast the opposing votes but did not specify why they were against it.

RICHMOND SANITARY DISTRICT NO.1: ADDENDUM TO SEWER**USE ORDINANCE:****DISCHARGES FROM DENTAL CLINICS**

- (a) This section applies to discharges from dental clinics where amalgam is placed or removed. For the purpose of this section, a dental clinic is a non-mobile facility dedicated to the examination and treatment of patients by a health care professional specializing in the care of teeth, gums and oral tissue. This section does not apply to orthodontics, aerodontics, oral and maxillofacial surgery, enzootics, prosthodontics or other practices that do not place or remove amalgam, or which are identified by the Wolf Treatment Plant Commission as negligible contributors.
- (b) Dental clinics that place or remove amalgam shall implement best management practices for amalgam as established by the Wisconsin Dental Association and/or the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources from time to time.
- (c) Dental clinics shall install, operate and maintain an amalgam separator meeting the criteria of the International Standards Organization (ISO 11143) for every vacuum system receiving amalgam waste. Amalgam separators shall be installed, operated and maintained according to instructions provided by the manufacturer. The amalgam separator shall have a design and capacity appropriate for the size and type of vacuum system.
- (d) Dental clinics will annually submit reporting information to the Commission using forms provided by the Commission. Reporting information may include;
 - (1) Certification that the amalgam separator is operated and maintained in accordance with instructions provided by the manufacturer.
 - (2) Certification that best management practices for amalgam as established by the Wisconsin Dental Association are being implemented.
 - (3) Any other information deemed relevant by the Commission.
- (e) Dental clinics shall obtain recycling records for each shipment showing the volume or mass of amalgam waste shipped, the name and address of the destination and the name and address of the contractor. Dental clinics shall maintain these records for a minimum of two years. Dental clinics shall make these records available to the Commission for inspection and copying upon request by the Commission.
- (f) Dental clinics shall allow the Contributing Authority to inspect the vacuum system, amalgam separator, amalgam waste storage areas and other areas deemed necessary by the Commission to determine compliance with this Section. Inspections shall occur during the normal operating hours of the dental clinic.

This ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication and/or posting as provided by law.
