Middle Village woman pleads guilty to neglect

She's sentenced to supervision due to pregnancy with another child

A Middle Village woman whose infant boy tested positive for amphetamine and methamphetamine was sentenced June 10 in federal court to one year of supervised release.

Summer R. White, 22, pleaded guilty in April to child neglect after drugs and drug paraphernalia were recovered from White's residence in January while Menominee Tribal Police conducting an investigation of co-defendant's Jesse A. Grignon's alleged abuse of another child.

Both White and Grignon, 35, were initially arrested for child abuse and child neglect but federal prosecutors only indicted White on a child neglect charge for exposing her 18-month-old boy to drugs.

Grignon has a July 7 trial date and is currently detained in the Brown County Jail.

After being indicted, White was released on conditions but subsequently tested positive for drugs and since April has been detained also in the jail.

The 59 days in jail was the basis for her "time served" sentence. Her attorney, Thomas Phillip, said his client is about eight months pregnant and has a July 17 delivery date. While White received pre-natal care in jail, being incarcerated during the third trimester of a pregnancy is difficult. More jail time is not necessary to punish, deter or impress upon her the seriousness of her offense, Phillip wrote the court recently.

Phillip also said the toddler suffered

no physical injuries or ill effects from his drug exposure.

The maximum penalty for child neglect is 18 months.

In court on June 10, Phillip said White would be under federal and tribal supervision. A March 15 order from a tribal court placed White's son with a paternal grandparent and gave White 10 conditions to meet before her child would be returned to her. Those conditions include no drug use, take parenting classes and provide a safe home environment for her son, he said. A tribal social worker will help White with parenting her child.

"If she fails (federal) supervision, she is in danger of having her unborn child taken from her, too," said Phillip, who added that White has strong incentives to remain sober and law abiding.

When released after sentencing, White may stay at her mother's home, with her mother agreeing to move out or stay with another relative until there's room at the currently filled Eagle's Nest homeless shelter Phillip said.

White told District Judge William Griesbach that her arrest was "the wake-up call I needed as something worse could have happened to me or my son due to my drug use."

Griesbach agreed to impose the time-served sentence recommended by Phillip and Assistant U.S. Attorney Andrew Maier.

"The real test is how you behave when you're on supervision. Nobody wants to be in jail when they're about to give birth to another life ... You need

to be a good mother, put your child first and make the sacrifices every parents has to make for their children," Griesbach said.

According to the criminal complaint filed in Grignon's case, the alleged physical abuse occurred to a 2½-year-old boy who was an occasional playmate of White's son. The parents of the boy had dropped him off with White and Grignon on Dec. 29. On Dec. 31, White and Grignon asked the boy's father if they could take him to a motel to celebrate the New Year.

The couple declined the father's request to take his son and White's so they could enjoy New Year's Eve by themselves.

For the next three days, the father's messages to Grignon went unanswered. On Jan. 3, a woman living with the boy's parents went to White's residence, picked up the boy and found bruises on his back, hands, buttocks and genitals.

The boy's parents took him to ThedaCare Medical Center-Shawano for an examination and a nurse there contacted Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal Police to report suspected child abuse.

The boy was taken to ThedaCare Medical Center in Neenah. The boy was examined by a nurse who specializes in evaluating physical and sexual abuse of children.

The nurse identified bruises on the boy "too numerous to count," and said they were likely caused by a "switch-like object," and some were similar to injuries caused by being struck by an adult hand.

Three vehicles involved in Highway 29 crash

Injuries were reported following a three-vehicle accident on state Highway 29 a mile and a half outside of Shawano on the morning of June 10.

The Shawano County Sheriff's Department was notified of the crash at 8:22 a.m.

The crash involved a farm implement driven by a 44-year-old Cecil man, and two cars driven by a 27-year-old man from Illinois and a 40-year-old man from Green Bay, according to Lt. Jon Blaskowski.

One of the cars struck the farm

implement, which then in turn struck the other car. Both lanes of Highway 29 going west were closed as the scene was cleared and ambulances transported the injured.

Details on injuries were not immediately available.

Farm seeking expansion in Green Valley

Wagner Farms seeks to increase to hold 1,802 animal units

Shawano County residents were in attendance at a public informational meeting on June 9 in the Green Valley Community Center regarding a license request with a proposal of an expansion of Wagner Farms, N6928 County Road BB, between Green Valley and Oconto Falls.

The Wagner family appeared at the meeting to walk through the proposal of the expansion with Shawano County conversationist Scott Frank. The proposal of the expansion of the farm centered on increasing their animal units to 1,802. An animal unit is a measurement of how an animal influences a farm through food and waste. A larger animal, like a fully grown cow, usually has an animal unit larger than one.

Frank said that the meeting was held in order to receive information from the Wagner family on the proposed expansion as well as hear input from the public on their thoughts regarding the expansion. Frank added that the community could submit questions and concerns to the county land conservation office up to June 21. He also said that the land conservation department can take up to 90 days to review the application, where they can grant or deny it. That runs through Aug. 23.

"At this point we do not anticipate a lengthy time period to grant or deny the application," said Frank.

Shawn Wagner, co-owner of Wagner Farms, said that the most important part of the project was the proposed expansion of the heifer barn.

"Our heifers are currently being raised out of state in Oshkosh, Nebraska," said Wagner. "At this point, we have chosen to have these animals come home for health reasons."

He added that Wagner farms has had trouble with health conditions regarding their animals after sending them out of state.

"Over the years, we have seen these animals leave with our expectations of their health," said Wagner. "They end up coming back in not such good condition — not meeting our expectations."

All of the heifers will be housed in the barn that is proposed to be built. Along with the barn, Wagner said that a feed storage bunker will be next to the proposed barn.

Due to Wagner Farms updating to new codes and standards, water running off of the feed pad has to be collected, rather than before, where it was rerouted. A new leachate collection area will be added for that water runoff.

"We have to have a certain amount of days of storage per animal unit on the farm," said Wagner. "So that will also help with this project."

After a question from Wagner's neighbor, Mike Streug, regarding increasing the number of cows milked, Wagner said that the milking number will not increase.

"At this point right now, it is just heifers. There are no milking cows being added," said Wagner.

An eight-foot manhole will be next to the collection tank in order to regulate the collection. Two automatic pumps are also proposed to be added to handle the runoff collection.

In an event of a power outage on the farm, Wagner said that there is a generator that will automatically kick on and provide power to everywhere on farm.

"It is good to know that you have backup power for pretty much anything if it does go out, to keep it functioning like it is supposed to," said Frank.

Frank said that there was an environmental incident response in place, as well as a list of people to contact if such an incident were to occur.

"It is not if it happens, its when,"

said Frank. "We have been witness to enough of them over the years that things are beyond our control at times and you have to have a good way to address them."

After June 21, when all public comments are taken into consideration, the land conservation department will go

through the process of making the decision to approve or deny the application. Wagner hopes that if everything moves forward with the proposal, an expansion will be finished by the start of fall.

Off-road vehicles bane for Shawano resident

She urges council to reconsider allowing ATVs and UTVs on city streets

The addition of all-terrain vehicles and utility-terrain vehicles on Shawano streets has thrilled city residents who own one of those vehicles and gets to use it more, but one local resident isn't happy with the Shawano Common Council's decision.

In May, the council signed off on a resolution that allows ATVs and UTVs on certain streets in the city with a maximum speed of 35 miles per hour, unless posted signs have a lower speed limit. The decision followed on the heels of towns and Shawano County expanding where the off-road vehicles can go.

As far as Shirley Hinze is concerned, those vehicles should not be used in an urban setting.

"I would like to know why this decision was made without adding this as a referendum to the spring ballot, so that the city residents had an opportunity to make a decision on it," Hinze said. "As a city taxpayer, I am not living rurally. These vehicles are designed specifically to be on trails outside of the community."

Hinze noted that current road construction is making some residents park elsewhere, and many of them, especially older residents, cannot always see off-road vehicles coming.

"They do not have to have directional signals on them (under the ordinance), and so I feel that with the volume of traffic and what we would consider a city as an urban setting, this is not a good setting for them," Hinze said.

Hinze claimed she has followed some of the vehicles and had photos on her phone showing them being used as an alternative to standard motor vehicles. She claimed some of the photos show off-road vehicles at Shawano Community High School,

while others show parents picking up children at Hillcrest Primary School. She said the photos include an older couple traveling from a restaurant to their home and younger people passing by her home on Bartlett Street.

"We're suffering quite a few of these," Hinze said.

She also found fault with the city not requiring some form of collision insurance, the same as standard vehicles. This puts all city residents at risk, including those in the standard vehicles.

"I take issue with a 13-year-old who has just gotten a permit to drive one of these vehicles, and a lot of them are poor people," Hinze said. "They will not be able to manage this vehicle in an urban setting and higher volume of traffic if they had to take an evasive measure."

Hinze claimed she has walked around her neighborhood for several blocks and found other people who are not happy with off-road vehicles traveling Shawano's streets. She noted that several of them have made complaints to the police and that she has made two complaints herself, including one where a juvenile driver was "popping wheelies."

"This is what we're encountering in all areas across the city where these ORV (off-road vehicle) routes are designated," Hinze said. "It does not do the city any good because they're also not going to local businesses."

The police department should not be put into the position of handling out-of-control ATV drivers, in Hinze's view, and she thinks it's a burden that officers don't need.

She asked the council to reconsider

the ordinance, saying that accidents involving off-road vehicles are on the rise, although she did not furnish any statistics to the council to back up her statement.

"You're dealing with a higher volume of traffic, higher volume of tourism," Hinze said. "You have city streets that are now in disrepair, vehicles not parking in their own homes. I have older neighbors on my street that I'm concerned that they are not watching for these vehicles, so if they're backing out, there could be an issue with something like that."

The council could not take any action or comment on Hinze's concerns because the ordinance was not on the agenda.

Milosch Domazet

Council hires Veit to demolish Main Street buildings

Plans for plaza are coming together with hopes to start construction in fall

The Shawano Common Council approved hiring Veit Demolition to demolish the buildings that occupy 214-216 S. Main St. at its June 9 meeting and found out more details about the downtown plaza that will occupy the space and other areas.

Veit — which is based in Rogers, Minnesota, but has a Wisconsin office in New Berlin — was the lowest bidder at \$139,000, which was above the \$100,000 budgeted for demolition work. However, the six bids ranged up to \$468,000.

Having six bids for the plaza project was impressive, but originally, 15-20 contractors participated in the walkthroughs on what was going to be required for the demolition work, according to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard.

"It was eye-opening for me when we did the walkthroughs with all the

contractor groups," Sheppard said. "By the time I let them in to start walking all around, 10 of them didn't go in and five of them walked away because the challenge of this is that it's an unstable building."

Because the building is unstable, the contractor will have to be very careful about taking things out of it, Sheppard said.

Veit has the reputation for handling large demolition projects, according to Sheppard, who noted the company was the one that took down the Bradley Center in Milwaukee.

"It's a little more than we hoped for, but it's good knowing the company has all the resources to do this," Sheppard said. "It's not just some startup that's going to give it their best."

Sheppard said that the design of the project will make the plaza as maintenance-free as possible, as city departments, especially parks and recreation, already have a lot on their plates. However, public works and parks and recreation will jointly oversee any work that needs to be done after the plaza is built, he said.

"We do not intend to have additional staff to maintain this space," Sheppard said. "That's something

we've been very conscious of during this design."

According to Brandon Herbert with Strand Associates, local resident Starlyn Tourtillott helped the consulting firm get in touch with both the Menominee and Stockbridge-Munsee tribes to get input on the honorarium, which will pay tribute to the area Native Americans who once inhabited much of northeast Wisconsin. Strand has been working with Joey Awonohopay and Heather Bruegl, who oversee cultural issues for the Menominee and Stockbridge-Munsee, respectively, and they have helped to shape what the honorarium will have.

"We had some nice discussions about what was important for their cultures in this space or perhaps scattered throughout the plaza," Herbert said.

Among the discussion was specific trees geared toward each clan of the Menominee, as well as the Many Trails symbol that is an important part of the Stockbridge-Munsee. There was also some discussion of using wild rice as a pattern on some of the wall decorations, Herbert said.

Sheppard said he felt the plaza was going to do right by Shawano's Native

American neighbors.

"There was a lot of discussion about incorporating some of the significant cultural things that they want to see," Sheppard said. "I'm glad we had those conversations."

Herbert asked for suggestions about what to do with the bumpouts, which will replace current parking spaces in the area and make it easier for pedestrians to cross Main Street.

Alderman Kevin Barkow suggested adding a symbol of a wolf near the riverwalk so that it would symbolize the Wolf River.

"There's nothing really there showing that's supposed to be the Wolf River," Barkow said. "You could kind of assume that's what it is, but that'd be kind of cool to have the bumpout have some image of a wolf. It'll give it more of an eye appeal."

Alderman Rhonda Strebel urged that the bumpouts have a flat surface to make it easier for people with disabilities and others to navigate the area.

"I want it to be decorative, but I want it to be flat so that people with strollers and walkers are not having a struggle trying to get across the sidewalk," Strebel said.

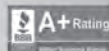

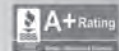

\$674K grant will be used to train educators

CMN one of six schools in United States to receive grant

The College of Menominee Nation learned June 4 that it had been awarded a \$674,000 grant from the Early Educator Investment Collaborative (EEIC) to assist students who are looking toward a career in education.

CMN is one of six college in the nation to receive the grant, as well as the only school in the Midwest and also the only tribal school. The five other recipients were in California, Georgia, Washington state, Colorado and Hawaii.

"We feel very fortunate to be one of the six awardees, and it re-

ally affirms the importance of the work that we are doing in not only training future teachers but also the importance of early childhood education and the impact that it has on young children," said Kelli Chelberg, an associate professor in the teacher education department.

According to Chelberg, CMN is a very popular school for education, with more than 70% of all bachelor's degree graduates having a degree in education.

Receiving the grant is a major step in growing the education department at CMN, Chelberg said. The grant also honors those who are working towards helping to build student's futures.

"We are honored, and honestly I was in shock when I heard that we were selected," she said. "This speaks to the commitment of our faculty and the work that we do in the education program."

Chelberg said that the applica-

tion process for the grant was very intense. She said CMN was chosen as a recipient of the grant due in part to objectives that were laid out in their application, which included offering an Advanced Certification Elementary (ACE) program, creating a culturally responsive induction program, providing elder coaches and mentors, providing training and providing additional support for students.

One of the other requirements to applying for the grant was there to be a 10% matching fund. CMN is partnering with Wisconsin Early Childhood Associations (WECA) to meet that requirement.

With the money from the grant, Chelberg outlined goals of what was to be accomplished. Similar to the objectives in the application, CMN is planning to provide assistance, recruit students, provide release time and mentor, advise and develop early childhood educators.

Chelberg noted that there has become a growing need for early childhood educators, and even though teaching can be difficult, having the grant in place can be a step toward continuing to growing

the CMN education program.

"Education is difficult," she said. "Kids have different learning styles and personalities. With this grant we want to continue to grow the program and get more of our students on the right track to becoming early childhood educators."

The education field has become popular at CMN due in part to students wanting to be part of the change in their communities. Chelberg noted that many students who attend CMN have faced cultural barriers and trauma.

"They see the impact on children in their community and we hear from them over and over again how they want to help make a difference by becoming teachers," said Chelberg.

Chelberg summed up what receiving this grant not only meant to her, but the university and the students as well.

"This validates the hard work of a small tribal school," said Chelberg. "We can meet the needs of the community. It is an honor. We may be small, but we are mighty."

Invasive species plants of deceptive beauty

In Wisconsin, June is Invasive Species Awareness Month. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources uses the month of June to educate gardeners and property owners on the threat and danger that invasive species pose to native Wisconsin landscapes and ecosystems.

By definition, an invasive species is one that arrived after the first white settlers came to Wisconsin. Many of these plants were brought here for their value as ornamental plants, or as food crops. Others stowed away on ships in the form of seeds, or mixed in with hay and packing material.

While invasive species can include birds, mammals, insects and more, it is invasive plants that get the most attention here in Wisconsin. For gardeners, this is important because many of the plants growing right in our own backyards are technically classified as invasive and should be controlled or eradicated when possible.

Property owners adjacent to woodlands need to be especially watchful of invasive species on their property as, once these plants escape cultivation into our forests, they are capable of a great deal of damage and destruction. Most notably, the biggest threat most invasive species pose is simply smothering out and overcrowding our native wildflowers and plants.

Because invasive species have no natural predators here, they quickly spread and colonize large areas, choking out the understory and smothering native woodland wildflowers such as many of our favorites, trilliums, hepaticas, bloodroot, trout lilies, mayapples, Virginia bluebells and others.

Where invasive species take hold, it is important to realize and understand that there is no quick, one-shot method of eradicating the species, or any poison or product that is going to eliminate them. As long as they took to take hold, they will take at least that long to gain control over.

It is also important to remember that most invasive species are quite beautiful and showy. This is, after all, one of the main reasons they were brought here. Many of our endangered species are beautiful wildflowers and wonderful ornamental trees when they are kept under control. However,

once their seeds begin to spread, they become nearly impossible to eradicate.

Garlic mustard and buckthorn are among the most dangerous of all invasive species here in Wisconsin and the most difficult to control.

Garlic mustard is an herbaceous herb that can carpet entire sections of the forest floor within just a few years. It is important not to let these plants go to seed when they are discovered. Each plant can produce untold num-

bers of seeds that quickly spread and colonize the forest floor. If you have garlic mustard growing in your garden or nearby woodlot, pull as often as possible and prevent back from going to seed by sheering before the plant flowers. Garlic mustard is also delicious and there are many wonderful recipes that you can find online to enjoy this tasty plant.

Buckthorn is even more tricky to control. Because this is a woody shrub,

forming massive tangles of intertwined branches, buckthorn is one of the most challenging of all invasive species to control. In addition, songbirds consume the berries, spreading them quickly and prolifically with their droppings.

The best way to treat buckthorn is frequent cutting and treatment with a brush killer such as Tordon. Follow the label directions. This will require several seasons of work and the patience of the gardener or property owner.

Other examples of invasive species here in our area are the bright and colorful Dame's rocket, a member of the mustard family, as well as phragmites, often called pampas grass, Japanese knotweed, Russian olive, autumn olive, the many introduced bush honeysuckles, canary reed grass, purple loosestrife and others.

The Wisconsin DNR has a wonderful resource online for property owners and gardeners interested in learning more about invasive species. Simply search "Wisconsin DNR invasive species" and you will be taken to a page loaded with information including list of all the technically restricted plants, as well as fact sheets on each one with the recommended control measures and an abundance of photographs to help you identify invasive plants on your property.

Henning's monster game leads Bonduel softball team past Menominee Indian

Sophomore tosses no-hitter, drives in 6

Bonduel High School sophomore Nakiyah Henning made her first softball postseason game one to remember, pitching a no-hitter and driving in six runs for the Bears in their 15-0 win in four innings over Menominee Indian in a Division 3 regional contest June 9 in Bonduel.

In the circle, Henning struck out eight of the 12 batters she faced. She allowed one walk, but the Bears were able to eliminate the runner on a stolen base attempt, so Henning faced the minimum over her four innings.

"It's an amazing experience and it gives me goosebumps just thinking about it," said Henning of the no-hitter. "I'm proud to be a part of this team, and I want to keep helping in any way I can."

Bonduel used two big innings at the plate to support Henning, with the sophomore delivering key hits in each frame.

After tossing a 1-2-3 first inning with three strikeouts, Henning drove in Abby Stoltenow for the game's first run with a two-out single in the bottom of the first.

The lone baserunner to reach against Henning was Menominee Indian's Selena O'Kimosh to lead off the second inning. After she was caught stealing, Henning struck out the inning's other two batters.

The Bears then scored four runs in the second to push the lead to 5-0.

Stoltenow drove in Julia Lorbicki and Macy Niles with a double before Henning plated Stoltenow and Hailee Thompson on a triple.

Henning's big day in the circle continued in the third with a pair of strikeouts and a nice catch on a liner by Hailey Zernicke, the first baseman.

After the Bears' bats went down

in order, Henning struck out a batter before inducing a groundout and flyball in the fourth.

Bonduel then erupted for 10 runs in the bottom of the fourth to reach the 10-run rule and secure Henning's no-hitter.

Henning got the scoring started in the frame with a two-RBI double. A couple batters later, Zernicke cleared the bases with three-run triple. Zernicke scored on an error during the next at-bat.

Niles kept the big inning going with another triple to score a run. Claire Gehm then drove in Niles on an infield single.

A bases-loaded walk by Thompson later in the inning made it 14-0 before Henning ended the contest

by grounding a ball to third base and having Stoltenow beat the throw home.

Bonduel sent 14 batters to the plate in the fourth, with the final 13 reaching.

"I think our pitcher pitched really well tonight, and then the few balls that did get (put) in play we fielded cleanly and we made plays," said Stoltenow on the team's win.

Aniya Peters was dealt the loss in the circle for Menominee Indian. She started the game and ended up getting all 10 outs.

Mariah Fish came on in the fourth but was replaced by Peters again after facing seven batters.

Other postseason action

Just down the road, the third-seeded Bonduel baseball team picked up a 12-2 Division 3 regional playoff win in five innings over sixth-seeded Weyauwega-Fremont

on June 10. The Bears scored five runs in the fourth and fifth innings to pull away for the win.

Mason Bohm came through with a two-run double in the fourth for the Bears, with Garrett Engel following with a two-run home run. Bohm also earned the win on the mound after tossing two scoreless innings in relief of Cole Anderson.

Carson Robaidek led Bonduel's offense with three hits, four runs scored and three stolen bases. Engel finished with three hits and four RBIs, while Brett Margelofsky had three hits and Bohm two.

Gresham's baseball team, which was seeded fourth, topped fifth-seeded Elcho 9-5 in a Division 4 regional matchup June 10 in Gresham.

Lukas Pecore earned the win for Gresham, striking out nine batters over six innings. He surrendered two earned runs. At the plate, Pecore doubled twice and tripled once while driving in four runs.

Austin Sperberg chipped in two hits and three RBIs for Gresham, while Blade Hoffman had two hits.

Marion's third-seeded baseball team also earned a Division 4 play-off win, downing the sixth-seeded Green Bay NEW Lutheran/Providence co-op on a walk-off walk June 10 in Marion.

Jaden Stuhr walked with the bases loaded in the bottom of the seventh to give Marion the win. Stuhr pitched the first 6 2/3 innings for the Mustangs, striking out 12 batters along the way. Nick Malueg earned the win after getting the final out in the top of the seventh.

Seventh-seeded Menominee Indian battled, but the team eventually came up just short in a 2-1 loss to second-seeded St. Mary Catholic on June 10 in a Division 3 regional battle in Neenah.

Shawano's fifth-seeded girls soccer team dropped a 3-1 match to fourth-seeded Luxemburg-Casco in a Division 3 regional playoff matchup June 10 in Luxemburg.

Caitlyn Moede scored Shawano's goal in the 11th minute.

Shawano graduate named to national rowing camp for 2nd straight year

Brandi Gueths was one of 54 athletes named to the 2021 Under 23 National Team Selection Camps by USRowing for a second year in a row, but this time around, she actually got to take part in the camp.

Gueths, a Shawano Community High School graduate and current athlete for the the UW-Madison women's rowing team, was named to the selection camp in 2020, but it was canceled because of concerns over the coronavirus pandemic.

"It is an amazing honor to be recognized again among some of the most talented girls in the nation," said Gueths, who recently helped the Wisconsin varsity eight team to a 14th-place finish at the NCAA Rowing Championships. "Since we did not get to train in person last year, just over Zoom workouts, it is

nice to finally work and learn from each other.

"As many people have learned throughout the pandemic, it is hard to get the full experience through a screen. Being able to actually attend

camp is truly a humbling experience, as there is so much more talent out there than you can even imagine."

The women's selection camp started on June 1 and runs through June 20. The camp is being held at the University of Iowa under coaching from Andrew Carter, Liz Tuppen and Molly Hamrick.

At the end of the camp, athletes will be chosen to represent the United States in the women's eight, women's four with coxswain,

women's four and women's quadruple sculls at the 2021 World Rowing Under 23 Championships from July 7-11 in Racine in the Czech Republic.

Gueths admitted that making the cut and being among the top 12 rowers was a difficult challenge, but she isn't backing down, thanks to the work ethic she's developed in Madison.

"My coaches and team have helped me tremendously to get where I am today," said Gueths, who played volleyball, basketball and softball at Shawano. "Showing up to practice everyday with a 'W' on my chest is definitely motivating, but having everyone on this team strive towards the same goals and putting in the work each day makes it even better. It is this mindset that makes Wisconsin athletics as a whole so successful."

Gueths added that the selection camp "has been some of the hardest

training I have been a part of to this date."

She's typically training three times a day — from 7-9 a.m., 11 a.m.-1 p.m. and 3:30-5:30 p.m., rowing inside or outside.

Gueths said she's done similar workouts with her Badger teammates.

"From long, steady state workouts to short, race pieces, each workout here (in Iowa) is an evaluation; you always have to be mentally and physically prepared for everything," said Gueths.

Along with the under 23 class Gueths is in, there is also a junior/under 18 rowing class. There is also a senior age group, primarily for post-collegiate athletes.

The senior class is the one the competes at the Olympic Games every four years.

Ryan speech paints dismal portrait of GOP, Dems

Everywhere you look, there's commentary that one side of the federal government is bringing about the apocalypse. Depending on which news stations or websites you frequent, it could be the Republicans, or perhaps it's the Democrats. Pundits are quick to blame one segment or another because that is what our politics have become—the assumption that one party has all the answers and the other party is simply a pack of morons.

That's why I found it incredibly refreshing when former U.S. House Speaker Paul Ryan gave a speech last month at the Reagan Library and essentially said that both parties are screwing up the country. While a lifelong Republican, he made it clear that his fellow GOP members and the left wing share the blame for the messed up state that Congress is in today.

Ryan made it clear in his speech that the Republicans need to get back to their roots and not tie themselves solely to the philosophies of former President Donald Trump, noting that Trump's time in office came to “such a dishonorable and disgraceful end.” He made it clear that conservatives need to have their own thoughts on issues and do things because they're the right thing to do, not simply because Trump has proclaimed it so.

This quote from Ryan rang particularly true for me: “If the conservative cause depends on the

populist appeal of one personality or of second-rate imitations, then we're not going anywhere. Voters looking for Republican leaders want to see independence in metal. They will not be impressed by the sight of yes-men and flatterers flocking to Mar-a-Lago.”

Ryan didn't have much to say kindly about the Democrats, either. He accused liberals of bringing about a wild age of identity politics and making America look like the capitol of racism. He said identity politics is getting tiresome, and he is correct. While we do have some steps to take to make sure everyone is treated equally, acting like we're all discriminatory paints us with a broad and somewhat inaccurate brush.

I liked this part of Ryan's speech as he was describing identity politics: “The least appealing feature of the party in power is its constant use of identity politics. So many issues on the left bring up the same dreary view of America as a collection of groups in perpetual conflict with each other. What we could once dismissed as pretentious academic theory, confined to overworked dissertations in obscure journals, somehow has become

Democratic Party orthodoxy.”

That tends to be the problem with political parties in general, requiring its representatives in public office to all hold the same view, and if someone dares to step out of line, then action is taken to censure, silence and shame any rebellious riff-raff. Government tends to work better when there are independent freethinkers in public office instead of mindless automatons who worship a party's leadership and are in lockstep with their party every step of the way.

While it's doubtful that the former Wisconsin Congressman's speech will bring about a new era of prosperity and bipartisanship, it's easy to see how Ryan bases his worldview. Take the infrastructure bill being wrangled around right now as the executive and legislative branches have been trying to negotiate a compromise. A few brave souls are trying to come up with something where both sides get a little, but fringes on both sides are pooh-poohing the process.

You have Sen. Mitch McConnell, a Republican, proudly declaring that “The era of bipartisanship is over.” Considering how much of an effort he has made for decades to shut down everything Democrats have tried to suggest, that's a rather interesting statement, and he makes it clear with every passing day that he's not interested in making America a better place.

Of course, Democrats are no bet-

ter. Take Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, who is telling her fellow Democrats to stop wasting time trying to come up with a bipartisan compromise. Rather than try to come up with a solution, she's contributing to the problem and making it that much more difficult for this country to dig itself out of the polarized hole that we're in.

Sadly, we don't have anything like term limits to force the old guard into retirement, and many times, the new faces have their own personal agendas that have no regard for what we, the people, want. Until the ordinary folks stand up and decide to take action to restore our country to grace, we'll continue to see the seat of power for this country turned into a smoke-covered battleground, and the ones who will suffer will be us.

Ryan makes this interesting assessment of what our country should be: “America is humanity's best attempt at upholding the truth that everyone is created equal. That the condition of your birth need not dictate the whole course of your life, and that word, created, that's still the key to it all because it reflects the true wisdom of our founding.”

I look forward to the day when this becomes what America truly stands for. In the meantime, we need to have more Paul Ryans to hold our elected leaders' feet to the fire.

County workers need to be paid fair wage

To the editor:

When I consider workers needing a living wage in Shawano, I remember my experience applying for work with Shawano County several years ago. I was offered a job at 40 hours per week here, but I chose a similar job in Green Bay working 32 hours per week for the same wages. I was fortunate to have those job offers, but where does that leave Shawano County?

Looks like things haven't changed. In an April 8 Shawano Leader article, Supervisor Tess Serrano voiced her

frustrations about wages and job retention to the county public safety committee, “Shawano County is losing so many good people to other counties.” She also noted some board members don't realize the cost of living anymore.

A living wage is something that has been measured. The United Way's ALICE (Asset Limited Income Constrained, Employed) Project does research to find how many families are living on the edge of financial insecurity. They identify the bare minimum cost of household basics necessary to live and work, which include housing, child care, food, transportation and health care. Thirty-four percent of the workers in Shawano

County are below the ALICE threshold. These are our hard-working neighbors. Our decision makers have access to this information.

Because the pandemic left many Wisconsinites in need of unemployment insurance, Congress passed the CARES Act in 2020. The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 created temporary additional unemployment benefits. The extra money proved to be invaluable to cover housing and monthly expenses for many working families. We know that money has been spent in our local communities at grocery stores, restaurants and other small businesses. The workforce shortage should not be used as an excuse to end worker's unemploy-

ment benefits prematurely.

Reported in the same Shawano Leader article, as the County Board started looking for cost-savings, they considered dropping a full-time position to part-time. Supervisor Jerry Erdmann said, “The county has been cutting positions and programs to the point there's nothing else to cut.”

Our county's budget should be all our concern, and shortages won't be solved if we continue to kick the can down the road. Pay attention that the people we put in Madison are invested in our priorities. Respect our people, but especially respect people's labor. Workers should be paid a fair wage.
