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Sloma named to circuit court

Shawano city attorney will replace retiring Judge James Habeck

Shawano City Attorney Katherine Sloma has been appointed circuit court judge for Shawano and Menominee counties, filling the vacancy that will be left when Judge James Habeck retires at the end of the month.

Gov. Tony Evers announced the appointment Monday.

"Katie Sloma will be an excellent judge for the people of Shawano and Menominee counties," Evers said. "As an experienced civil litigator and city attorney, she will apply the law fairly and protect our constitutional rights."

Sloma thanked Evers for what she called an exciting opportunity and said she looks forward to serving the community.

"I am grateful and honored that Gov. Evers has appointed me to the Shawano-Menominee county branch 1 bench," she said. "In my position as judge, I promise to apply the principles of the law knowledgeably, thoughtfully, and fairly to all individuals

that appear before me."

Since 2004, Sloma has maintained a general practice in Shawano, including handling family law cases, divorces, guardianships, wills and estates, real estate transactions, juvenile matters, and guardian ad litem appointments.

She was first elected city of Shawano attorney in 2018 and was reelected in April.

City officials will be discussing their options for filling the city attorney vacancy at their personnel and Common Council meetings later this month.

Greg Parker, district attorney for Shawano and Menominee counties, said Evers had made an excellent choice.

"I have worked with Attorney Sloma on Children's Court cases for over 10 years," Parker said. "She has a reputation of being hardworking, demonstrates a high level of competence, professionalism and integrity in performing her duties. She has a calm

and deliberate demeanor in and out of the courtroom. Based on my experience in working with Attorney Sloma, I know she truly believes in fairness as it relates to court matters, and I am confident that she will do a fine job as our next circuit court judge."

Sloma earned her undergraduate degree from UW-Green Bay and her law degree from Ohio University. Sloma served on the boards of the Shawano Redevelopment Authority, and the Shawano Area Community Foundation.

Habeck has been circuit court judge since 2002. His latest six-year term expires on July 31.

Circuit Court Branch I generally conducts probate of estates, guardianships of minors and incompetents, juvenile hearings, adoptions, mental hearings, alcoholic commitments, traffic cases and one half of superior civil cases, and some criminal cases.

Branch I also handles small claims of \$5,000 or less and marriage ceremonies.

2nd Amendment issue could be delayed again

Kautza considering canceling County Board's July meeting

A proposed resolution declaring Shawano County a Second Amendment sanctuary could be put off again after four months of delay amid uncertainty over whether the County Board will hold a meeting this month.

County Board Chairman Tom Kautza said he won't make a final decision until Wednesday when the board agenda would normally be drafted, but due to a light itinerary of county business and summer vacations, this month's meeting might be called off entirely.

"I may just cancel the meeting entirely due to a lack of items to put on the agenda," Kautza said.

Meetings have been canceled in the past due to lack of business, most recently in June 2019 under then-chairman Jerry Erdmann.

At last month's County Board meeting, Kautza announced plans to have the controversial Second Amend-

ment resolution on the board's July 22 agenda.

There was some discussion about whether the meeting should be held at its normal location at the county courthouse or moved to a place where the anticipated crowd interested in the sanctuary resolution could have room to socially distance.

Health officials continue to discourage large gatherings due to concerns over the spread of the COVID-19 coronavirus.

After some discussion, the board's consensus was to hold the meeting at the courthouse as usual.

Under the proposed resolution, the county would give the sheriff the discretion not to enforce laws considered to be an infringement on the constitutional right to keep and bear arms.

The resolution states that the county "shall not appropriate any funds for any enforcement of unconstitutional laws against the people of Shawano County, and requests the Sheriff to utilize his discretion to avoid the unlawful enforcement of any law which unconstitutionally impedes our fundamental Second Amendment right to Keep and Bear Arms."

Kautza said in an interview last week that he wanted to move forward with the resolution because of the public interest in the matter, even though there is no urgency to the issue.

At present, there is no gun control legislation being discussed at the state or federal level.

"There really is no rush," Kautza said. "That's why it's been put off as long as it's been. But there's a group out there that feels this is a major issue. I really don't see it that way."

Kautza said that when the issue was first presented months ago he didn't pay much attention to it.

"I think it's irrelevant," he said. "It's a federal issue, not a county one."

However, Kautza said, he wanted to honor the wishes of the public safety committee, which unanimously forwarded the measure to the County Board in March.

"As long as public safety thought it was important enough to pass a resolution and send it along to the board, I kind of feel it should have its day in front of the board then," he said.

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City of Shawano 2019 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report

This is our nineteenth Annual Drinking Water Quality Report. We want you to be informed about the water we deliver and you use everyday. We are dedicated to providing you, our customer, with safe, clean and high-quality drinking water. We want to share with you the results of our efforts.

To learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled Field Committee meetings. The meetings are usually held the last Tuesday of each month at 8:00 a.m. at the Public Works Department, 2905 E. Richmond St. Shawano.

Where Our Water Comes From

The City of Shawano Public Works Department owns and operates the water supply and distribution system for most of the City of Shawano. The area along Green Bay Street east of Waukechon St. is served by Shawano Lake Sanitary District. The Shawano water system presently consists of four active ground water wells constructed in the Elk Mound Group of the Cambrian Sandstone, a 500,000 gallon elevated storage tank, a 2 million gallon ground storage reservoir and the water distribution system. The distribution system consists of approximately 58.7 miles of water main. The system pumps 1.5 million gallons of water per day from our four wells. The employees at the Shawano Public Works Department work around the clock to provide top-quality water to every tap. We ask that all our customers help us protect our water sources, which are the heart of our community, our way of life and our children's future.

Educational Information

Sources of drinking water- both tap water and bottled water-include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

DPW Tests for Water Quality

The DPW staff monitors many different contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State Laws. In addition, we also monitor on a weekly basis for potential harmful bacteria. Out of all the constituents that we are required to test, none were in violation.

The EPA has determined that your water is safe at these levels. We are proud to report that the water provided by the City of Shawano meets or exceeds established Federal and State water quality standards.

Current Tests Results

Here are the number of contaminants that were required to be tested in the last five years. This report may contain up to five years worth of water quality results. If a water system tests annually, or more frequently, the results from the most recent year are shown. If testing is done less frequently, the results shown are from the past five years.

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DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

In the previous table you may have found many terms and abbreviations you were not familiar with. To help you better understand these terms, we've provided the following definitions:

Action Level (AL) - The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - Highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter - One part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) - One part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) - A measure of the radioactivity in water.

Total Coliform Rule (TCR) - A measure of testing that has been performed since the early 20th century.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

ADDITIONAL HEALTH INFORMATION

Inorganic Contaminants

- **Arsenic.** Some people who drink water containing arsenic in excess of the MCL over many years could experience skin damage or problems with their circulatory system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.
- **Barium.** Some people who drink water containing barium in excess of the MCL over many years could experience an increase in their blood pressure.
- **Chromium.** Some people who use water containing chromium well in excess of the MCL over many years could experience allergic dermatitis.
- **Copper.** Copper is an essential nutrient, but some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over a relatively short amount of time could experience gastrointestinal distress. Some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over many years could suffer liver or kidney damage. People with Wilson's Disease should consult their personal doctor. Drinking Softened water may raise your exposure to higher levels of copper.
- **Fluoride.** Some people who drink water containing fluoride in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Children may get mottled teeth. Lead. Infants and children who drink water containing lead in excess of the action level could experience delays in their physical or mental development. Children could show slight deficits in attention span and learning abilities. Adults who drink this water over many years could develop kidney problems or high blood pressure. Lead in drinking water is rarely the sole cause of lead poisoning, but it can add to a person's total lead exposure. Infants and young children are typically more vulnerable to lead in drinking water than the general population. It is possible that lead levels at your home may be higher than at other homes in the community as a result of materials used in your home's plumbing. If you are concerned about elevated lead levels in your home's water, you may wish to have your water tested. All potential sources of lead in the household should be identified and removed, replaced or reduced. Additional information is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791) or from the EPA's web site at www.epa.gov/safewater/facts.html.
- **Nitrate.** Nitrate in drinking water at levels above 10 ppm is a health risk for infants of less than 6 months of age. High nitrate levels in drinking water can cause blue baby syndrome. Nitrate levels may rise quickly for short periods of time because of rainfall or agricultural activity. If you are caring for an infant, you should ask advice from your health care provider.

The **Total Coliform Rule** requires water systems to meet a stricter limit for coliform bacteria. Coliform bacteria are usually harmless, but their presence in water can be an indication of disease-causing bacteria. When coliform bacteria are found, special follow-up tests are performed to determine if harmful bacteria are also present in the water supply. If this limit is exceeded, the water supplier must notify the public by newspaper, television or radio. DPW treats the water with chlorine as a disinfectant. We are not required to add chlorine, but do so as a precautionary measure.

MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of developing the described health effect.

Drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily pose a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hot line (1-800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers.

EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (1-800-426-4791) or from their web site at www.epa.gov/safewater/facts.html.

As you can see by the table, our system has no violations. We're proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State Requirements.

All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by constituents that are naturally occurring or manmade. Constituents can be microbes, organic or inorganic chemicals, or radioactive materials.

The fact that our system is based on deep well water reduces the risk of certain contaminants associated with surface water systems, such as Cryptosporidium.

The City did have a violation concerning it's record keeping. Correction of the violation was to send the DNR the Certification of Consumer Notification of Lead/Copper Results. This was done on 1/19/2020.

The SCADA systems controls the wells, reservoir and water tower. The SCADA system provides alarms when the tower level is too high or low and when there is a power outage that requires the operators to use standby generators.

The City is committed to providing quality water to the residents of Shawano and from time to time extensive maintenance must be completed to maintain our high level of quality. What's new for 2019

Water main replacements that are coordinated with 2019 street reconstruction projects are in the following areas: The 600, 700 and 800 blocks of East Fifth Street.

All wells have been maintained based on the DNR recommended schedule.

The DPW provides clean safe water to all its customers. We are also responsible to inspect the plumbing in your building to make sure that there is no possibility that it could contaminate the city water supply. Cross-Connection inspections will be done at approximately 200 businesses and 300 residences during 2019. If your home or business is to be inspected this year you will be notified by mail to schedule an inspection. If you would like to have your home or business scheduled for inspection call the DPW.

Shawano flea market celebrates golden anniversary

If it's not at this table, it might be at the next one — the item you've been searching for. The one perfect thing to complete your collection. A treasure, hidden in plain sight.

Or just a box of old socks. The mystery and the allure of the flea market is all about the hunt.

For 50 years, treasure hunters have spent Sundays in Shawano at the Zurko Promotions Shawano Flea Market. Their treasures aren't found in chests but on tables that stretch from one end of the Shawano County Fairgrounds to the other. They search through stacks of old comics or through mountains of used jeans.

They'll pick up a marble statue of an unknown goddess and set it down to take home a cast iron boot scraper.

The Shawano Flea Market is celebrating its golden anniversary — 50 years — and regular patrons

know there is gold to be found. Even if it is on a table, that doesn't make it easy to find.

Bob Zurko, who operates Zurko Promotions with his wife, Irene, and three sons, understands what

drives treasure seekers to the family markets.

"It's all about the hunt," he said.

His 50-plus-year career in secondhand goods started with a few floating bottles.

Zurko started his work life as a teacher in Chicago. His route to school took him past the Chicago port area, where old building materials were bulldozed into Lake Michigan. This was back in 1968, an era where some environmental rules were more like guidelines.

"I'd drive by and see all this glittery stuff in the water. All those old bottles were floating," he said.

He found himself drawn to the

sight and started to drive to the water on Saturdays to collect old bottles.

It took about two years to determine that his life would not be spent in the classroom.

In 1970, he started the market in Shawano. It started on the same site as it is today, the Shawano County Fairgrounds on East Green Bay Street.

It was not much of a market, he confessed: "Nine dealers sat around a big oak tree." It took a few years for customers to understand what a flea market is, he said.

It took about seven years for the market to take off. When it did, it was so successful that the family moved to the Shawano area, though they continue to have many ties and markets in Illinois.

At the Shawano market, vendors range from commercial antiques and second-hand dealers to families wanting an easy way to set up an estate sale. Sales spots are open to everyone, so long as the merchandise is deemed family-friendly.

Zurko sees the flea market not as just a large sale, but as a family-friendly destination for all of northeast and north central Wisconsin.

"Where else can you spend three or four hours for \$2 and enjoy family-oriented fun?" he asked.

In addition to secondhand dealers, the market has plant sellers and offers refreshments. But the main draw are the antique and off-brand sellers.

"Vendors are small businesspeople. Very dedicated," he said. "They'll go wherever they have to to sell their wares."

One of those businesspeople is Ross Grode, who brings his Little Misfits antiques, collectibles and oddities to the market every week that it isn't raining. He also participates in the markets in Antigo and at Sun Drop Dayz in Shawano.

Grode has been coming to Shawano for six years. During the week, he and Missy Dennis sell their items at Memories Antique Mall in Little Chute where they have a booth. He said the flea market is about more than sales.

Grode said he enjoys the interaction with customers and their sense of accomplishment when they find what they were looking for — even when they didn't know they were looking for it.

"It makes me feel good about what I am doing," he said.

Grode has been selling antiques full time for three years. He retired from a career in welding and has no

desire to return.

"There were too many lonely hours under that mask," he said.

Looking back at sales over the years, he said the most interesting item he bought and sold was a set of Victorian ram horn candle holders.

Today, the big sellers are farmhouse items, such as milk cans, window screens and anything cast iron.

The items that qualify as "treasures" have changed over the years, Zurko said.

In the past, Zurko said, old beer

cans sold. Stamps were hot. Now, neither of those items are popular. It wasn't long ago that Roy Rogers toys were very valuable. But it seems that old Roy had his day — and his revival — but both have passed.

"Nowadays, no one knows who Roy Rogers is. Kids today don't even know who the Beatles are," he said.

Grode offered advice for treasure seekers: "Come in the booth and take your time. And remember, everything is negotiable."

LoraLe Martin is one of the regu-

lar attenders at the market. She said she is there every Sunday throughout the summer, usually with her grandchildren. She does take her time and said the hours she spends are very relaxing.

The children are allowed to pick out one toy while she concentrates on knickknacks and anything that might catch her eye.

Zurko and his family operate not only the Shawano market but regular and specialty markets in Wisconsin and Illinois. There are a haunted flea markets in Illinois, pop culture sales and car sales.

Zurko admitted he was a customer as well as the market owner, and he has an eye for collecting comics, old toys and old signs. The old Shawano Community Hall on Division Street is his Shawano business headquarters and home of the indoor winter flea market. It is lined, upstairs and down, with antique metal and wooden signs.

"Old signs have aesthetic appeal. They are an art themselves and are very nostalgic," he said.

Zurko doesn't see a lot of changes ahead for the market. As a family business, they will continue to offer sales. Although family members are helping with the business, Zurko intends to stay involved.

"It's a great way to make a buck, or half a buck. I've lived a life most people dream about, rewarding and challenging at the same time," he said. "This is the only business where you can work 80 hours so you don't have to work 40."

Rather than be hurt by the online sales of used items, Zurko said in-person flea markets seem to be helped by them.

"People like to go and touch the items they are interested in," he said. He says he knows of buyers to go to the flea market to check prices and handle potential purchases. They also shop there for bargains and sell them profitably on digital platforms.

"You make money when you buy it, in the antique business," he said.

Zurko sees flea markets, Shawano's in particular, as a form of commerce that is destined to endure.

"Flea markets are as essential to the economy as any big box store. Customers desperately need something, and vendors desperately have something to sell. When the economy is good, flea markets are great. When the economy is bad, flea markets are great," he said. "After 50 years, I've never seen it real high or low. There is always a demand for flea markets."

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Mask debate extends to school athletics

New policies could affect all Shawano public school students, staff

What was listed as an update on buildings and grounds in the Shawano School District on Monday turned into a heated discussion on whether high school athletes can be required to wear masks in a world where coronavirus is still considered a threat.

Shawano Community High School spring sports teams were allowed to return to practices this week after their seasons were cancelled due to schools, parks and most other facilities being shut down by Gov. Tony Evers through measures like the Safer at Home order. However, new rules have been put in place, according to athletic director Joel Wondra, including one that would have athletes wearing masks during practice except for when aerobic activity is taking place, due to Shawano County presently being designated as moderate risk by the state.

The new policy would also have athletes wear masks at school for a

minimum of 14 days after attending a mass crowd activity or visiting a hotspot where coronavirus cases have had a sharp uptick.

Wondra told the Shawano School Board that he considers the new rules to be a “healthy balance” that allows student athletes to get back out onto fields to practice their skills.

“All of this is consistent with what was put forth by the WIAA (Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association) in terms of the limitations we should observe,” said Wondra, noting later that guidelines from local health officials, the Centers for Disease Control and the American Pediatrics Association were also interwoven into the new policies.

The mask requirement did not sit well with board member Mart Grams, who called social distancing “crap” and bluntly asked Wondra who said the school district was required to implement the new guidelines.

“All you’re doing is placing more fear on those children,” Grams said, adding that closing schools have harmed students and their families enough. “Let them play. They’ve already signed a waiver.”

Wondra, who wore a mask at the meeting, pointed out that there was no “requirement” for any of the guidelines to be implemented, nor was there a requirement that the district resume sporting activities for SCHS. He noted that it wasn’t

the “Joel Wondra plan” and that he’d worked with Superintendent Randi Anderson and other district officials to come up with the guidelines.

“Unless this body (the board) were to say differently or that we’re going to do something different, then I’m not going to overturn the work of our group,” Wondra said.

Board member Michael Sleeper felt the new policies were necessary to prevent further spread of the coronavirus, which had 87 confirmed positive cases in the county at the time the board was meeting. He noted that he had been keeping track of the data and studies coming out regarding the virus and felt the district’s guidelines would minimize the spread.

Sleeper added that all anyone had to do was look at states like Florida, Texas, Arizona and California — all reporting record daily cases — to realize that Wisconsin needs to take steps to avoid becoming a new hotspot for the coronavirus.

“We’ve been really fortunate so far, knock on wood, but I do not want us, as a community, to play Russian roulette,” Sleeper said. “We need to get schools open, and we need to get athletics going, but we must use every precaution within our means.”

The guidelines are expected to extend beyond the summer practice days allowed by the WIAA and would likely impact all students — athletes or not — when school opens again in September. Anderson

pointed to the upcoming Shawano County Fair as an example, noting that the event brings visitors from out of town daily during the six-day run.

“I have to go back to my students, to my staff that are working in this building ... and figure out how to best mitigate that risk,” Anderson said. “Based on the guidelines, we’ve said anybody who attends the fair, we recommend that you wear a mask. If you choose not to wear a mask, we will have to figure out what those consequences are.”

Anderson said that the policy would require anyone attending the fair or other large group events to wear a mask at school for a minimum of 14 days. She also stressed that the safety of the community is paramount in any plans the district comes up with.

The policies extending to all students are expected to be part of the district’s reopening plan, which is expected to be sent to the board for approval in August.

Grams said he would not vote for a plan unless he can see what the punishment will be for students and staff that don’t abide by social distancing or mask policies.

“I don’t want us to be thinking that our community is a bunch of redneck hillbillies who don’t know nothin’,” Grams said.

Trees take out pickup--twice

Recent storms packed a one-two punch for one Shawano resident.

Three weeks ago, Will Rankin was eating breakfast at his home at 304 W. Richmond, Shawano, when he watched a storm blow through — taking down an oak tree on his property, which took out his 2019 Dodge Ram pickup truck.

He took the truck to the body shop, cut the tree down to a stump and chalked it up to one of those things that happens.

But sometimes, “one of those things” happens again.

On July 5, after \$1,700 worth of body work, the truck was again in the Rankin driveway when a gust from a localized thunderstorm took down a massive limb from the tree next to

the oak stump, and it fell squarely on the pickup.

As he surveyed the damage, Rankin noted that this time, the damage may take longer to repair. The tree missed the house and garage as well as a Jeep parked alongside the pickup. The pickup received the brunt of the fall.

He had been able to enjoy his newly restored truck for all of 10 days.

The localized storm also brought down branches throughout the neighborhood on Shawano’s southwest side, including branches on power lines.

By late in the afternoon, Rankin had freed the pickup from the tangle of branches that covered it, and he was removing the damaged branches with the help of friends and neighbors.

There was a river and two brothers...

2 of the top 20 Brewdown finalists local breweries

Wisconsin is known for its love of beer, but apparently Shawano County is one of the better segments of the state when it comes to beer and where its brewed.

Travel Wisconsin has announced that Stubborn Brothers Brewery in Shawano and Pigeon River Brewing Company in Marion are among the top 20 finalists in the state for its Wisconsin Brewdown. Either one has the opportunity to be designated the top brewery in the state, as fans get to vote once per day through July 24 at www.travelwisconsin.com/wisconsin-brewdown and determine who has the best beer in the land.

Stubborn Brothers is the new kid on the block among the breweries, opening in late May after being delayed two months by the coronavirus pandemic. Owned and operated by Aaron and Eric Gilling, the pair spent several years renovating the old Crescent Theater and adjacent buildings to create a brewery and entertainment venue in the heart of downtown Shawano.

The Gillings use locally sourced malt and hops, wanting to form a strong partnership with local farmers and to keep their beer as fresh as possible. Among the specialty beers they've created are Whiskey Fugitive, an amber ale, and Imperial, a vanilla milk stout.

Aaron Gilling was excited about learning that his brewery made the list and that people were willing to nominate Stubborn Brothers for the honor.

"The fact that people nominated us, and we're in the top (20) so far, it's utterly incredible," he said. "I know that we can win this competition because it's a big thing with people reaching out. We've only been open four weeks, and it's just amazing."

Gilling acknowledged that it has some pretty good competition with Pigeon River, praising its neighbor to the south. However, it's going to come down to people in the

community getting the word out and encouraging their friends and neighbors to vote online in order to beat out the other breweries around the state, some of which are in larger communities than Shawano.

"This could bring huge business to Shawano, Wisconsin," Gilling

said. "All of the people who spend a dollar here at the brewery go and shop at Tumbleweed. They shop at the Stock Market. They shop at 'Til the Cows Come Home. They go to all these places and spend a dollar. I know it sounds trivial about a contest, but beer people care a lot."

It's not too shabby, in Gilling's

view, that two of the 20 finalists are in Shawano County.

"It shows that people care about their craft beer," Gilling said. "It shows you've got two talented breweries right in your home county. That's pretty darn cool."

Pigeon River has a longer history in the community, opening in a small building along U.S. Highway 45 in 2012 before renovating and expanding into the Northwinds Banquet Hall on North Main Street a few years later. Nathan Knaack, who grew up in the Marion area, owns and operates the business with his wife, Kayla.

Pigeon River has 11 year-round brews that they create, along with four seasonal brews that include an Oktoberfest lager and a shandy called Cherry Drop. Pigeon River already has a couple of accolades under its belt, being named the fastest growing brewery in Wisconsin and 11th-fastest growing in the United States.

Knaack did not return several phone calls seeking comment by press time.

America's past actions don't show equity

"...with liberty and justice for all."

How often have we said those words when reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and not really thought about what the words really meant. Being free within a society from the oppressive restrictions imposed by authority on one's way of life is liberty. It means civil rights and human rights.

Just behavior or treatment is justice. It means fairness and equity.

Since 1892, these words have been recited as an expression of allegiance to the flag of the United States and the republic of the United States of America. However, the "for all" part of the pledge has never really applied to everyone.

Beginning in the 17th century, European colonizers seeking to amass untold riches, abducted people from the western shores of Africa. They forcibly transported them to what is now the United States. Once here, this country's founders legally declared that Black people were not fully human and declared them to be white man's property.

By the 1780s, a religious group called the Quakers were the first abolitionists who no longer owned slaves. Though many who opposed slavery did not regard blacks as equal to whites, they did generally believe in freedom and often even equality of treatment for all people.

Inequality can manifest itself racially, socially and economically.

Racial equality is believing that individuals, regardless of their race, are morally, politically, and legally equal and should be treated as such. Racial inequality deprives individu-

als of opportunity and treatment because of their race. Social equality means that all people within a group are having the same status in respect to civil rights, freedom of speech, property rights and equal access to certain social goods and social services. Social inequality can be found in income gap, health care and social class.

Equity or economic equality exists when there is fairness in providing goods and services to all citizens regardless of identity. Economic inequality can lead to higher crime rates, poorer public health, and lower average education levels.

Prior and during the American Civil War, the number of abolitionists, who believed in human equality in the North, became more numerous. Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation showed the shift in political attitudes, although it did not completely extinguish legal slavery in several states. As many of us first learned during this year's celebration of Juneteenth, slaves in Texas didn't know they were free until more than two years later.

After the war, the government passed the 14th and 15th Amendments to the U.S. Constitution guaranteeing the rights of blacks. Many ex-slaves had access to education for the first time. Blacks were also allowed to vote.

Due to resistance in the South,

however, Reconstruction ended and steps toward positive race relations were eroded. The Jim Crow laws were enacted during the period from 1890 to 1920. These laws limited equality safeguards such as the right to vote, hold jobs and get an education.

Many Confederate statues were erected during this Reconstruction period to preserve southern values, history and culture. Many consider these values to include racism and glorification of slave holders. Protesters are demanding that these symbols of black oppression be moved or torn down.

The Black Lives matter movement was founded in 2014 in response to the murder of Michael Brown by the Ferguson Police Department. It has been at the forefront of the movement to reform policing policies toward Black citizens.

For 400 years, racism has been a disease we've failed to adequately address. It manifests itself today in the high incarceration of black people, health care disparities, and unequal wages, education and housing.

During the past few weeks, millions have gathered to memorialize George Floyd's death, to demand change and accountability, and to call on this country to keep its promises of justice, fairness, and equity.

Gov. Tony Evers believes that we need to start by having accountability for unacceptable use of force by certain law enforcement officers in our country and our state. He is call-

ing on the Wisconsin Legislature to immediately pass Assembly Bill 1012 which would reform our use of force policies by prioritizing preserving life and minimizing the use of force.

Nationally, the Democrats in the House of Representatives recently passed a similar reform legislation — the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act of 2020. Before this law can take effect it needs to get through the Republican-controlled Senate and be signed by the president.

One bill isn't the solution to racism but it's a start. We need systematic change to address the racist policies and attitudes of the past. The Black Lives Matter movement demands that we create a society that affirms human worth and creates spaces where people take care of one another as best they can.

Change starts with us. It is time to do the work. We must confront society's comfort with racism. We must become anti-racist. All lives don't matter until Black lives matter. It is our responsibility to make the world better place.

There is no one way to fight for freedom. All that is required is that we continue that fight for freedom and justice for all.

The Declaration of Independence states it well: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

I have spoken to a number of people who worked for the defense department procurement office in San Diego, along with several relatives who have worked for a number of other agencies (social services, post office and transportation-related), and they all complained about the difficulty of these government-run entities (both state and federal) not being able to fire someone who violated department rules.

Ninety-nine percent of our public

servants need to know how much they are valued and appreciated for serving the public, while at times being at great personal risk. These great people would not be put in the same category as those who abuse that trust. We need these people! Without them, we will all be dealing with Chicago-style violence and lawlessness. We need to fix the underlying problems preventing the bad apples from being removed and not destroying the entire system in the process.

Braun says he's now more likely to play beyond 2020 season

Milwaukee Brewers veteran Ryan Braun said he's more likely to continue playing beyond 2020 because of the unusual circumstances of this pandemic-shortened season.

Braun said in January that he was considering retiring after the season. He was more bullish on his baseball future Saturday as the Brewers held the first full-squad workout of their summer camp ahead of the 60-game season that starts later this month.

"I feel like it's more likely that I play another year than I anticipated a few months back," Braun said.

Braun, the 2011 NL MVP, is entering the final season of a five-year, \$105 million contract and will turn

37 in November.

Those circumstances help explain why Braun was uncertain in January about whether he would play in 2021.

"I don't take for granted this could be my last year playing baseball," Braun said at the time. "Obviously, there's a sense of urgency every year, but for me, knowing that this could be my last chance ever, it's something that adds to that sense of urgency."

Braun knows he'll be fresher at the end of this season than he would be after a 162-game schedule. The NL also is adopting the designated hitter this season, a move that could help

Braun lengthen his career.

Brewers manager Craig Counsell has said Braun will spend some time at DH but would also play right field and first base.

"We'll have a number of people in that role," Counsell said. "There will not be a starting DH. For our team, you'll see Ryan there. I probably liked it for Christian Yelich just as much when I saw the rule, the ability to keep him in the lineup for more games, especially at the start here when we're going to just have to be really careful with soft-tissue injuries for guys. Those are the two names that come to mind right off the bat."

Braun said he was skeptical at times that there would even be a season as coronavirus cases surged in

the U.S. and baseball's labor negotiations dragged on. He also considered not playing this season, and he still hasn't completely ruled out taking the year off.

Braun batted .285 with 22 homers and 75 RBIs with a .343 on-base percentage and .505 slugging percentage last year while playing 144 games, his most since 2012.

Braun believes the shorter season could boost his production.

"For me personally, playing a smaller number of games is something that's beneficial," Braun said. "I think I've been able to be pretty good the last few Septembers because when I know it's a smaller sample size we're working with, I can just focus on sprinting to the finish line."

In-person DNR hunter safety classes set to resume on Monday

In-person hunter and recreational vehicle education classes will resume July 13 under a set of guidelines and safety protocols released June 26 by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources' Recreational Safety and Outdoor Skills Section under Phase II of the Wisconsin State Government Bounce Back Plan.

The in-person hunter and recreational vehicle education classes resuming July 13 are for courses with 50 people or less. Based on a review of enrollment data for DNR hunter safety courses over the past three years, less than 2% of the more than 2,200 courses provided exceeded 50 attendees.

In March, the DNR temporarily suspended all in-person hunter education and recreational safety classes due to public health advisories relating to COVID-19. At the same time, the DNR also canceled, adjusted and postponed an array of other in-person public events, meetings, trainings and agency operations to protect public health.

The suspension reflected the dedication to safety by the DNR and the program and provided the time to establish classroom guidelines to keep students and instructors as safe as possible from COVID-19 exposures.

The COVID-19 public health

steps go beyond providing the educational safety courses for hunting, boating and off-highway vehicles, and they will remain part of the safety class environment as classes start in July. The safety protocols are for the protection of students, instructors and the communities in which they live. The DNR will continue to prioritize the safety of the public, volunteer instructors and department staff when determining protocols for resuming in-person recreational safety classes.

Class timeline

The DNR's Recreational Safety and Outdoor Section will work col-

laboratively with volunteer instructors and partners to reopen safety classes.

Safety class participants can expect these changes:

- Social distancing of 6 feet between participants
- Maximum of 50 participants in any one class
- Attendees strongly recommended to wear face covering
- Sanitizing of class equipment
- Availability and use of hand sanitizer
- Outdoor class instruction where possible

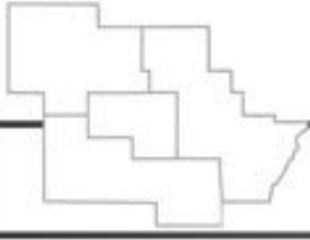

The Department of Natural Resources plans to treat 2,366 sites covering 199.6 acres of non-native common reed, or Phragmites australis var. australis, in wetlands, rights-of-ways, shorelines, public and private lands where written permission from landowners has been received. Non-native common reed is an invasive plant that overtakes native vegetation while providing little value as wildlife habitat. This project is an attempt to eliminate stands and seed sources in many counties to prevent a large-scale invasion as seen in other Great Lakes states.

Treatment would be done chemically with a commercial herbicide containing the active ingredient Imazapyr in an aquatic formula, along with an aquatic-approved surfactant. Application would be done from the ground with trucks for roadside locations, as well as boats, ATVs, amphibious vehicles such as the Argo or MarshMaster, or contract staff with backpacks or hand sprayers. The treatment would occur between August 1st to October 15th or until the first killing frost of 2020. This project is an equivalent analysis action under chapter NR105.20 Wis. Adm. Code. The DNR also prepared an environmental assessment (EA) that analyzes Phragmites treatment. The EA is available upon request by contacting Jason Granberg using the means listed below.

Landowners who have non-native common reed reported on or adjacent to their property have been sent letters to solicit interest in being included in the project. For the project to proceed, the DNR must issue an aquatic plant control permit to wetland invasives staff, county personnel, and any contractors the Department select.

Treatment will occur in counties within the Lake Michigan Basin. Acreage per county requiring an Aquatic Plant Management permit as specified chapter NR107 Wis. Adm. Code are as follows: Brown (2.79), Calumet (2.85), Fond du Lac (51.88), Forest (0.04), Green Lake (0.05), Langlade (0.05), Marathon (0.03), Marinette (2.35), Marquette (0.22), Oconto (19.72), Outagamie (7.91), Portage (0.01), Shawano (0.78), Waupaca (0.71), Waushara (1.6), and Winnebago (2.47).

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VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT FOR THE AUGUST 11, 2020 ELECTION

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 28 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application for an absentee ballot by mail or in person.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is: **5:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 6, 2020.**

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

Voting an absentee ballot in person

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified below for casting an absentee ballot in person.

No in-person absentee voting may occur on the day before the election.

Work out with kids to keep them healthy

ThedaCare practitioner recommends establishing good exercise habits

Think about your exercise habits and routines. Chances are, they mimic your parents' exercise style.

"It's important to engage children in age-appropriate exercises early in life," said Kristin Day, advanced practice nurse practitioner at ThedaCare Physicians Pediatrics-Appleton. "The goal of exercise for children is to build a foundation to have a healthy lifestyle as an adult. Having your kids see you exercise is great role-modeling behavior."

More than one-third of American youth between the ages of 10-17 are overweight or obese, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Approximately 80% of overweight children will go on to become obese adults. Those are reasons early interventions are important.

Day noted there are many benefits to exercise for children and adults:

- Strengthens bones and muscles
- Lowers rates of obesity and cardiovascular disease
- Increases balance and coordination
- Promotes a positive self-image
- Improves behavior
- Decreases symptoms of anxiety and depression

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), toddlers need at least 60 minutes of active

play per day, and school-age kids need 60 minutes of moderate to vigorous activity.

"In general, kids younger than six should do natural physical activities — running, jumping, skipping," said Day. "School-aged kids and teens should have a combination of aerobic activity five days per week and muscle/bone strengthening activity three days per week."

She offered these suggestions for engaging with children.

"Share their interests. If your child has an interest in sports, play the sport with them," she said. "Play catch in the backyard, or even sign up to coach their team. If they are not into organized sports, figure out what their interests are."

"Get their input. Kids, especially teens, are much more likely to engage in an activity if they feel

play per day, and they should not sit still for more than 60 minutes at a time, unless they are sleeping.

The AAP recommends preschoolers have 120 minutes of

they have been part of the decision-making process."

She offered that exercise could be combined with other interests.

"If your child likes reading, walk to the library to check out books," said Day. "If they are artistic or love science, take a walk through the woods and explore. Take a class together, such as yoga or martial arts. Some of the best family exercises are taking walks, hiking, biking or skiing; again following the interests of your kids."

"Walk or bike to where you need to go," she said. "Take the stairs versus an elevator. Make it fun. Turn on some of your kids' favorite music and dance."

"Again, set an example. Kids tend to mimic parents' choices and routines. If they see you doing an exercise activity, they are much more likely to do the same. Establish a routine and make it non-negotiable, like brushing your teeth."

The AAP recommends that school-aged kids and teens should be participating in muscle resistance exercises three days per week.

"That doesn't necessarily mean lifting weights," said Day. "Many times you can use body weight resistance exercises such as push-ups or planks to achieve the same results."

The AAP defines strength train-

ing as the use of free weights, weight machines, and body weight. It says strength training is safe if the child is old enough, has a medical checkup before starting the exercise, doesn't overdo it, and is supervised to ensure proper technique.

Day said there aren't any exercises that are bad for kids as long as they are age-appropriate, supervised, and if the kids are warming up and cooling down after the exercise and using appropriate safety equipment.

Day added that while regular exercise is important under normal circumstances, it is especially important during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Exercise helps boost our immune systems, which may help the body fight off infection," she said. "It also burns calories, which helps to prevent weight gain. Overweight people have tended to have more COVID-19 complications."

Day said exercise also reduces stress and anxiety and helps with emotional resilience, helping us keep a clear mind and stay focused, and it improves sleep.

"Our kids are always watching what we do as parents," said Day. "If we exercise regularly and engage in sports or activities we enjoy, generally our kids will follow our example."
