Resistance to contact tracing, negative social media causes issues

Shawano County COVID cases spiked in last 2-week reporting period

Health officials working to contain the spread of COVID-19 are increasingly facing the additional challenges of negative social media backlash and a growing number of people refusing to cooperate with contact tracing.

It is not just a local problem.

"This is happening across the state as well," said Vicki Dantoin, health officer for Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department, at a meeting of the Shawano County Board of Health Monday.

"We don't know the solution. We don't know how to fix that, but it's becoming more of an issue," she said.

Contact tracing is seen as a vital tool for identifying where and how the coronavirus is being spread and keeping it contained, but that tool requires public cooperation.

"More and more people are not compliant or they don't want to give us information," Dantoin said. "They tell us it's an invasion of their privacy. They tell us it's none of our business. They tell us contact tracing is useless."

Claims that COVID-19 is all just a conspiracy sometimes come up as well, she said.

The lack of compliance can also hamper efforts to identify workplaces where COVID-19 could be being spread.

"They're not telling us their workplaces," Dantoin said. "So then you're

getting more cases at workplaces and we find out later on, 'oh yeah, we had six cases there.' We didn't know about it because they wouldn't tell us they worked there."

The increased resistance comes at a time when Shawano County is seeing a marked increase in positive cases of COVID-19.

As of Monday, the health department was reporting 115 confirmed positive cases in Shawano County, an increase of eight cases in only three days. Menominee County held steady at nine confirmed cases.

Both Shawano and Menominee counties are listed by the state Department of Health Services as having a moderately high burden, the total number of cases per 100,000 Wisconsin residents in the last two weeks.

The COVID activity level for both counties is also listed as high.

Dantoin said the increased numbers are not just the result of testing.

Fewer tests were administered in Shawano County during the last two-week reporting period, while the number of positive cases more than doubled.

There were 935 tests given between June 14 and June 27, which turned up 10 positive cases.

Over the next two weeks, from June 28 through July 11, there were 801 tests and 24 positive results.

Efforts to keep the public informed of those numbers is also meeting with some resistance, with an increasing

number of negative comments on Facebook.

"I've heard this from other health officers across the state," Dantoin said.

The comments have ranged from criticism that department is exaggerating the coronavirus threat to claims that COVID-19 is a conspiracy.

"There are about 30 comments a day, most of them negative," Dantoin said.

There have also been threats made, mostly through private Facebook messages.

"It hasn't been physical harm," Dantoin said, "but it's like, 'You need to be out of there,' and 'You're a disgrace to humanity,' and those types of things."

Some health departments elsewhere in the state have added disclaimers to their Facebook pages saying the department is not responsible for Facebook comments.

"Others have deactivated their Facebook pages because of such negative commenting," Dantoin said.

Those departments instead are relying entirely on websites to inform the public.

The Board of Health discussed whether Shawano County should follow suit, but was split on a resolution to deactivate the Facebook page.

Several members felt the Facebook page continues to provide an important source of information for the public and gets more traffic than the county's website.

The board ultimately voted unanimously to keep the Facebook page going but add a disclaimer regarding the comments.

District wants more officers in schools

Officials plan on adding 2nd to staff

The Shawano School District is looking at bolstering its relationship with the Shawano Police Department, even as other Wisconsin school districts are taking action to cut ties with the police.

Superintendent Randi Anderson told the district's finance committee on July 15 that there has been discussion of having a second school resource officer in the halls of its schools. She noted that it has been a discussion she has been having with Shawano Police Chief Dan Mauel since she was hired by the district a year ago.

"How can we better support our community, our families, our students?" Anderson said. "The goal of that person is to build the relationship with the community and strengthen the relationships with the police."

If the district decides to employ two school resource officers, the school district would be looking at bearing 70% of the costs associated with those officers, while the city of Shawano would pick up the tab for the other 30%. Currently, the costs are split 50-50 between the two entities, even though the officer usually works nine months in the schools and the other three months for the city.

Anderson pointed out that the current officer is dealing with a number of calls between the four schools, and enforcing law isn't supposed to be the entire job description. She noted that school resource officers' primary role is to interact with students and staff and try to show that the police do more than just arrest criminals.

If the plan moves forward, one officer would serve at Hillcrest Primary School and Olga Brener Intermediate School, while the other would handle Shawano Community Middle School and Shawano Community High School. Anderson said the officer at the elementary schools would likely not be a uniformed officer.

"They would have a presence in the community at all of our events,

and so we would see that connection," Anderson said. "It's important to say that they're here to serve us. They're here to support us."

The school resource officer was very busy answering calls with the elementary schools last year — prior to the pandemic closing the schools — and so working with the older grades was being neglected, according to Anderson.

"I want our community to understand the services that are provided," she said. "Part of this is education from our SRO to our community, so part of the scope that Dan and I have talked about is there would be classes for students to attend, parents to attend, and just understanding that whole system."

"It's not catching our kids being naughty and dealing with that as it is building the relationship, so there has to be a little shift."

School board member Bruce Milavitz said he has been thinking the schools need additional officers for at least a year or two. He noted it's hard for the current officer to be based at SCHS but spend most of the time at the other schools.

"I hope you can look at that budget and find a way to fit it in," Milavitz said. "I see how the kids always treat her. They're always smiling and they want to talk to the school resource officer. I think it's a great team-building, community-building spend for the district."

Business Manager Nick Curran noted the district could utilize its community education fund to pay for the two officers. He said he did something similar when he worked for a school district in Omro.

"When we first had school resource officers, they were primarily for protection," Curran said. "While they still serve that purpose, there's so much more now to a school resource officer."

School board member Diane Hoffman agreed, noting that the job description should be examined thoroughly to reflect the officer's role in the schools.

"I feel there are a lot of calls to them that shouldn't be calls to the SRO," Hoffman said. "They're not there to be a disciplinarian."

Program contributes to community, says farewell to coordinator

Leadership Shawano County graduated its 20th class last week at The Gathering, continuing a tradition of creating and maintaining needed community programs by training local people to be the next generation of movers and shakers.

The ceremony also marked the last class under the direction of Wendy Crawford, who has stepped down from the program after 15

years. Crawford was honored by present and past graduates of Leadership Shawano County for being the person who kept the program running smoothly year after year while changing things up to reflect the evolution of Shawano and other communities.

Even at the ceremony, Crawford was making sure everyone was comfortable as the graduates and their guests gathered under a tent outside The Gathering, ensuring the sun wasn't causing issues for

those who weren't in the shade and asking if everyone had a beverage prior to talking about the graduates.

"What a journey it has been the last few months," Crawford said, talking about how even the leadership program fell prey to the coronavirus pandemic, requiring the final sessions to be conducted online. "Graduation typically happens the evening of our last session, so that would have been May 17. Well, we all know we couldn't be together on May 17."

It became evident to Crawford how serious the COVID-19 issue was when she called the Capitol building in Madison on March 11 to confirm the class's visit the following day, to which she was informed that everything was business as usual. However, during the visit itself, she learned that the Shawano group would probably be the last to tour the building before everything was shut down.

"We could almost hear the doors closing behind us as we were leaving

the Capitol,” Crawford said. “The reality of COVID-19 was settling in.”

Even though she was able to get the last couple of sessions done through the online meeting application Zoom, she noted it was not the same as the sessions when everyone gathered to learn and discuss.

“There’s less discussion, less creativity,” Crawford said. “There were fewer conversations and less laughter, but we learned that we have to just be adaptable.”

The 2020 class created three community service projects — a review of the county’s 4-H program, the creation of a Friends group for the Mountain Bay Trail and an area resource center for nonprofits to be housed in Shawano at the Fellman Center, where the county’s social services and job center used to be.

The 4-H review looked at ways to increase the amount of youth participation in the program, according to Megan Suehring, the 4-H coordinator for Shawano County’s Extension program, to the point of doubling enrollment nationwide. That included checking to make sure the program is robust and that communication on what 4-H is all about helps people to understand how open it is to all youth.

“Leadership Shawano County has a reputation for getting things done,” Suehring said. “If you look at our 4-H program in Shawano

County, it’s a fantastic program, and it’s one we can make even more fantastic.”

The review resulted in the creation of an expansion committee, which will look at updating materials to show modern programs and develop ways for children who age out of the program in adulthood to continue to be involved. There was also the recommendation of creating mentor families to help out new families entering the program.

The creation of the Friends group came about after learning that 51 miles of the 83-mile Mountain Bay Trail is in Shawano County, but most of the trail passes purchased are in the neighboring Brown and Marathon counties, according to Sander Flanderijn, a 2020 grad serving on the Friends’ board of directors. That creates a lopsided care system for the trail, as the majority of the trail is in this county, but little funding is available for the upkeep.

“We formed our nonprofit corporation. We created our mission and our vision, and we got five members on our board,” Flanderijn said. “We got a unique logo, and

we’ve got a brochure with all the information.”

The Friends group has partnered with the county parks department and Shawano Pathways to raise funds through the Bike the Barn Quilt event and develop an adopt-a-trail program, Flanderijn said. He encouraged his fellow graduates to write “big, fat checks” to support the program.

The idea for an area resource center was crafted as an outlet to house multiple nonprofit programs, according to Karli Schreiber, another 2020 Leadership Shawano County graduate. There are about 100 programs in the county, she estimated, and half of them have no place to meet.

“The project proposal included the overall mission of the area resource center, which is to provide free space for administrative activities, leverage resources including volunteers to build capacity to carry out the missions of these organizations,” Schreiber said, noting that the plan is to also provide “common space, meeting rooms, free individual office space, internet, anything else they would really need.”

The place could also be a hub for anyone seeking to volunteer but unsure of what the area’s needs are. However, the process of moving into the Fellman Center has been paused due to the pandemic.

In its 20 years, Leadership Shawano County has facilitated 47 projects, according to Crawford. Among the projects still in operation today are the Shawano Area Young Professionals, Taste of Shawano, the Boys and Girls Club of Shawano and Sun Drop Dayz.

Crawford encouraged the graduates to keep learning even though the 2020 program has concluded.

“I really enjoyed being able to attend the sessions with you,” Crawford said to the graduates. “I consider myself a lifelong learner, and I assume the same is true of you.”

Marla Sparks is taking Crawford’s place as coordinator for Leadership Shawano County, which is conducted through the Shawano County Chamber of Commerce and the University of Wisconsin-Extension Office.

County Board Supervisor Dan Miller resigns

Board rule won't let Miller attend meetings virtually amid COVID concerns

Shawano County Supervisor Dan Miller has resigned from the County Board after a vote by the executive committee denied him the opportunity to attend meetings remotely as a precaution against the COVID pandemic.

The committee voted 5-2 on July 15 to leave in place a County Board rule that allows board members to participate in a meeting by phone only once a year.

"That's what I attempted to get changed to more reflect the situation that we're in and provide greater protection for board members and others in the public," Miller said. "It was just setting an example that I felt we needed to do a little bit more to help ensure precautions around the COVID pandemic."

Miller said he checked with six other counties in the area, all of which provide opportunities for virtual meeting attendance.

"I hoped for a little bit more flexibility and understanding based on the COVID crisis," Miller said. "We've been lucky here in Shawano County, but the count continues to go up and it's surging throughout the country."

Miller, who attended the June County Board meeting remotely, and Supervisor Jerry Erdmann cast the two votes seeking to change the rule.

Under Rule 22 of County Board rules, "A Board member with prior permission of the Chairperson may appear telephonically but no mileage or per diem will be granted. A Board member is allowed only one call per year, plus the supervisor must pay for the telephone cost."

Supervisors and executive committee members Mark Bolin, Kevin Conradt, Richard Ferfecki, Rick Giese and County Board Chairman Tom Kautza voted to keep the rule as is.

"At the last County Board meeting, I took a straw poll of the County Board members and asked them if I should bring back a suspension of the rules for Rule 22 so members could call in to the meeting," Kautza said. "There were about six hands that went up."

It takes a two-thirds vote of the 27-member board to approve a County Board rule change.

Kautza said he placed the matter

on the executive committee's agenda at Miller's request.

"Basically the same result came from that," Kautza said. "There was really no interest in changing the rules."

The rules are revisited by the board every two years.

Corporation Counsel Tony Kordus said other parts of Rule 22 have been tweaked over the years, but he does not recall any changes made to the limit on telephone participation in the 13 years that he's been representing the county.

It wasn't known how long that part of Rule 22 has been in place.

Kautza also took a straw poll of board members to gauge interest in holding the next County Board meeting in a different location to allow

for social distancing, something not possible for board members given the space and structure of the county boardroom.

"I basically got the same results," Kautza said, with the majority opposed to moving the board meetings. "In this country the majority rules, I guess. That's the way it works."

The board met in April at the Crawford Center and in May at the Shawano County Park Pavilion, but returned to the boardroom at the county courthouse for its June meeting.

Most board members and other attendees wore masks or other face coverings at the April meeting.

That dwindled down to only a handful of members wearing masks by the June meeting.

"Dan was a very good member of the board, and I hate to see him resign," Kautza said. "But he was worried apparently about his health and setting an example for others, so that his prerogative, I guess. It's too bad. It's unfortunate. But like I say, it goes back to what the board decides."

Kautza is looking for someone interested in filling Miller's District 17 supervisor seat for the remainder of the term, which expires in April 2022.

The district includes Wards 1 and 2 of the Town of Belle Plaine and Ward 1 of the Town of Richmond.

Miller was appointed to the seat in 2019 after the passing of Bonnie Olson. He ran unopposed for the seat in April.

Board approves administrator salaries — except one

Community ed increase held until job description updated

The Shawano School Board signed off on a list of contract extensions for administrators Monday night — except for one.

A proposed \$20,000 pay boost from \$45,000 to \$65,000 for the district's community education director in exchange for additional job duties

was taken off the list when several board members expressed concern that they did not know what those additional job duties were.

"Until I know what those additional duties are, I'm not giving that person a 50% raise, especially in a time where half of my constituents don't even have the ability to work," said board member Mart Grams.

Most of the other administrators the district is offering contract extensions to are expected to see a 1.81% bump in pay, according to business manager Nick Curran. The proposed increase for the community education director, Robyn Shingler, would bump the pay by over 44%.

Grams noted that there were other administrators that had not performed as well as the board expected, so he did not believe they should get raises.

Board member Michael Sleeper pointed out that the district had not developed a pay-for-performance plan for administrators, but there is one in place for teachers. Because Superintendent Randi Anderson has only been with the district for a year, she has not been able to develop a plan yet, he said.

Board member Chuck Dallas said he has asked Anderson and Curran to do a competitive analysis on administrator salaries to see if what Shawano pays is comparable with other school districts.

"I think what's important is that we don't get behind," Dallas said. "It used to be that the salary and performance were one discussion. That's not always the case now-days."

Curran said the job description for the community education director still needs to be revised.

That did not sit well with Grams. "You can't go back and say, 'Oh, we gave you the raise. Geez, we want you to do more,'" Grams said. "She wouldn't sign that contract. Nobody would."

Board member Diane Hoffman also advocated for waiting on approving the one pay increase, noting that the district is looking at moving Shingler's status to a cabinet level administrator like a principal or superintendent.

"It seems like it's a separate conversation from the rest of this," Hoffman said. "The rest of this is your standard increase."

Transporting students to school still sticky issue

Bus capacities drop as parents plan other ways to get students to school

The problem of busing students to school in an age of social distancing and fear of coronavirus is one that all school districts are grappling with, and Shawano School District isn't sure where it'll be regarding buses once school starts in September.

Superintendent Randi Anderson said she is working with Kobussen Buses to figure out a plan for busing students next year. The buses currently have a 72-student capacity, but the social distancing requirements will bring the maximum down to 35, she said.

It's unclear how many more buses will be required in the fall, Anderson said, because many of the buses had only been at 60-80% capacity even before the pandemic closed the schools in March. Also, the district has been surveying parents, and many of them are considering using alternative transportation, such as parents transporting students and carpooling.

The school district had been considering running double routes to help decrease the number of students on a bus, but that would cost an additional \$3,000 per day, a cost that would be impossible for the district to cover, according to Anderson.

"We are going to back to the drawing board with that and continue to have conversations about how to meet our needs," she said. "We'll look at our survey data and see what the need of busing will be."

School board member Bruce Milavitz said that, if the district dropped busing altogether and still had in-person instruction, parents would still find a way to get their children to school.

"I just have a feeling that, community-wide, they'd find a way to band together and make that happen," Milavitz said.

Concern was expressed that reduced ridership could result in longer routes outside the Shawano city limits. Anderson said many of those routes are 35-40 minutes, with the longest — going around Shawano Lake — being 58 minutes.

The district has the option to not offer busing within a two-mile radius of the schools, which would impact most of the city students. Anderson was hesitant to recommend such a route, noting students walking to school might be in a hazardous situation if they crossed Green Bay Street and/or Main Street.

Plans for busing are expected to be approved by the Shawano School Board. It is uncertain whether the busing plans will coincide with the plans for reopening the schools, which are expected to go to the board Aug. 3.

School district seeks to boost image

Firm hired at \$10K per year to manage social media

The Shawano School District will be paying \$10,000 per year for the next three years to a marketing firm that promises to bolster the schools' image on social media.

The board voted unanimously on an agreement with Social School 4 EDU to have them take photos, posts and other items and turn them into engaging items on various social media. Chris Marcks, a coordinator in the district's human resources department, noted the district already has a good presence on Facebook but was unsure how well it was utilizing Twitter and Instagram.

"Social media, it's obviously going to go with or without us," Marcks said.

Currently, staff members are posting items when they can, specifically community education director Robyn Shingler and administrative assistant Lori Sherman, but Marcks said this would free up staff to focus on educating instead of worrying about communicating with the community and others interested in the district.

The firm's website touts its director, Andrea Gribble, as a "natural-born cheerleader" who started her program in 2013 after being laid off from her corporate job and was asked by a school district in New Auburn to help with its social media image. The website claims it is currently helping hundreds of schools across the country with social media storytelling; school districts in Shiocton and Menasha are among them.

Marcks told the board that working with Gribble and her group of case managers would help the district to build its "social capital," which she described as feel-good stories intended to shed a positive light on the district. Social School 4 EDU would be expected to develop a strategy for the district to post items in a timely fashion, monitor comments on social media and more.

"What is our strategy for social media? My brief time here shows we don't have one," Marcks said. "I'm still trying to figure it out."

Marcks touted the importance

of social media when it comes to boosting enrollment and community engagement. She suggested using the various platforms to help create a virtual academy showcasing what the district's four schools can do to help with children's education.

Social School 4 EDU is also expected to take the lead when it comes to crisis management. The district recently had to take swift action to distance itself from a Facebook post by school board member Mart Grams that stated,

"You know George Floyd has been drug free for 2 months." A statement denouncing Grams' statement and claiming it doesn't reflect the district's views was posted on Facebook on July 12 prior to an emergency board meeting.

Marcks said that Social School 4 EDU could eliminate the need to have staff members work on a weekend to update social media, as the firm has case managers working 24-7 to deal with school districts and their needs.

"When it comes to crisis management, you've already put it out there and shared so much good stuff that the bad stuff doesn't seem as bad when it happens," Marcks said. "If we don't write our story and use social media to convey it, somebody else is going to write that, and I really don't want to see that happen."

Marcks also suggested the firm would be valuable whenever the district wanted to pursue a referendum. She noted that she had been on a committee working to get taxpayer support on a joint recreation center between the school district and the city of Shawano, which was voted down in November 2019 after community members came out and claimed they couldn't support it. One of the reasons given by several people was they had no idea what was going on in the schools.

"When the time comes to say, 'This is something we support, and we want your support, as well, to move forward,' we can utilize social media very efficiently to do that," Marcks said.

Board member Michael Sleeper pointed out that larger school districts have communication specialists on staff that handle items like this, and he felt the \$10,000 per year would be a "tremendously sound investment."

"If we don't tell our story, someone else will," Sleeper said. "We need to control that."

The Shawano district had created a communication position in 2015 to handle social media and other publicity outlets for the district at a cost of \$34,000 per year, but that post was eliminated a year later.

"I think we suffered because of it," said board president Tyler Schmidt.

The contract offered up would cost \$30,000 for the three years, but it also offered a one-year option for \$11,000. Board member Diane Hoffman said that one year would not be enough time to bolster the district's image.

Marcks noted that, if the district is able to grow enrollment and get out of the current downward trend, that would outweigh the expense being put into Social School 4 EDU.

Local newspapers play key cost-saving role

There are many aspects to the value of a community having a local newspaper serving its community.

The financial health of these newspapers has been challenged in recent years with the loss of local retail advertising, the transition to digital news delivery, negative effects of recent newsprint tariffs, the announcement of huge newspaper postage increases (50%-plus) over the next five years, and the recent negative impact of COVID-19 on many community businesses which advertise in local papers.

One of the main things a newspaper does is represent the public in keeping a local open government. It does this by receiving information about activities/actions occurring at local government meetings, gathering information from open government records and publishing government notices. These three things are the foundation for open government and without any one of them, "openness" is compromised.

The loss of all of those things can be devastating and often occurs when a newspaper closes. Up to this point in time, there has been no effective replacement of a community newspaper in print or online.

One of the impacts of losing a newspaper is an increase in the operational costs of local governments. I am going to reference one study on local governments following newspaper closures to illustrate the financial impact alone of such a loss, "Financing Dies in Darkness? The Impact of Newspaper Closures on Public Finance," by Pengjie

This particular study looked at increased costs to municipalities for borrowing bonds after a newspaper closure. This study looked at actual data from municipalities from across the United States over a period of several years where newspapers were closed.

The study examined the actual cost increase in a municipality during the three years after a newspaper closed. According to the study, "our main finding is that newspaper closures have a significantly adverse impact on municipal borrowing costs in the long run."

The study further found that "the number of government employees increased by approximately four per 1,000 residents, tax revenue per capita increased by \$85, and the deficit per capita increased by about \$53."

This means taxes increased \$340 per year for a household of four people. It is not theoretically what could happen. This is what actually has happened. In perspective, a \$50 annual subscription to a community

newspaper is an incredible value.

Other media, including radio, can provide news coverage, but usually cover larger areas and thus cannot provide detailed/complete coverage of each government entity in the coverage area. Television news coverage in rural communities is usually limited to only the very top or sensational news stories that would be of interest to the entire region or state audience.

Sharing information via social media by citizens can be good or bad, but is not the same as a professional journalist who gets first-hand information witnessing a meeting, interviewing newsmakers, reviewing original documents and then editing material so it makes sense to the public. A large amount of information shared on social media is not complete, out of context, or simply not true.

Community newspapers are the most trusted source of local news — more than all other media combined. Trust is a huge issue.

In recent times, many papers often have few options other than to close. Most small-town newspaper publishers put their hearts and souls into the paper because they understand what it means to lose the paper, so they will go as far as they can.

Community newspapers are different from any other local business. No other business has the rights of the citizens tied to it as community newspapers do. The "press" is the only private business mentioned in the constitution, so our founding fathers must have

thought it was important.

What can you do? First and foremost, subscribe to the paper, give gift subscriptions, or ask your employer to offer subscriptions to the local paper as a benefit. Encourage your family and friends to subscribe. It is much less expensive to subscribe than not.

Second, patronize businesses which currently advertise in a local paper and encourage other businesses you patronize to advertise in the paper.

Third, support the paper by what you say in words and post on social media.

Fourth, consider making a tax-deductible contribution to the paper specifically to employ professional journalists. Perhaps there will be a day when surviving newspapers will have a similar model structure to public television stations.

Finally, engage with the people who run your local newspaper. Let them know you do care and want to see them succeed. Citizens that are lucky enough to still have newspapers in their communities should do whatever they can to keep the papers, because if they close, the publications statistically will not return and it will cost every business and citizen more money — a lot more money each and every year into the future until something is developed to effectively replace the community newspaper ... if that ever happens.

County board ignores impacts of COVID-19

It is appalling that the Shawano County Board has such utter disregard for the well-being of its members and community at large. At best, this is a discriminatory act against a perfectly healthy member who was only trying to protect himself and therefore his family

from the poor judgment of others. At worst, this is a reflection of the state of Shawano County, a community which historically was full of compassionate, kind individuals who pulled together when the going got tough.

As someone who grew up in Shawano and knows what the community is capable of when it works together, I ask each and every person reading this to take a good hard look in the mirror and re-evaluate your priorities. As a physician, I hope to God none of you or your family have to see the destruction COVID-19 is capable of wreaking upon those who laughed in the face of science.

State court ruling puts Wolf River Trail funding in limbo

Governor's partial veto broadening use of transportation funds ruled invalid

An unexpected state Supreme Court ruling earlier this month has put funding for Shawano's Wolf River Trail in limbo just as the city was getting ready to award an engineering contract for the project.

A walking trail that would connect Kuckuk, Judd and Sturgeon parks has been a goal of city officials for more than two decades.

The city has been purchasing properties for the trail, which would run along the Wolf River, as they have become available for more than 12 years.

The city was recently awarded a state Department of Transportation grant of \$250,000, which was estimated to cover 40-50% of the project's cost.

Under the terms of that grant, the city would have six years to complete the trail.

The first step would be to get engineering done and construction plans put together to determine the actual cost of the project.

City staff had put out requests for proposals and had recommended awarding the design contract to Retler Corp. of Stevens Point at a cost of \$34,750.

That recommendation was supposed to go before the Shawano Common Council at its July 15 meeting.

But on July 10, the Wisconsin Supreme Court issued a decision in the case of Bartlett v. Evers concluding that three of the 78 partial vetoes Gov. Tony Evers made to the 2019-2021 budget were unconstitutional and invalid.

One of those vetoes created the \$75 million Multimodal Local Supplement Program, from which the city got its \$250,000 grant for the Wolf River Trail project.

The state budget provided \$90,000 in general purpose revenue to fund local road projects under the Local Roads Improvement Program.

The governor's partial veto reduced that to \$70,000 and provided that the funds could be used for local grants, rather than exclusively for local road improvement projects.

The DOT informed the city via email on July 14 that it is reviewing the court ruling to determine the impact on local projects and would provide more information as it becomes available.

The program was used by DOT this spring to award transportation grants to 152 local governments, including 84 towns, 34 cities and villages and 34 counties.

"We know there are a lot of other communities that have probably already started projects that already probably utilized some of these funds," Shawano City Administrator Eddie Sheppard said.

"We're in limbo right now, so we're just kind of holding tight," he said.

The city was also recently awarded \$35,000 from Shawano Pathways to compete the Wolf River Trail project.

There is only one more property the city would need to acquire for it to have a trail that would connect the three parks.

Sheppard said the city is working with that property owner.

Components of the trail once its completed would include:

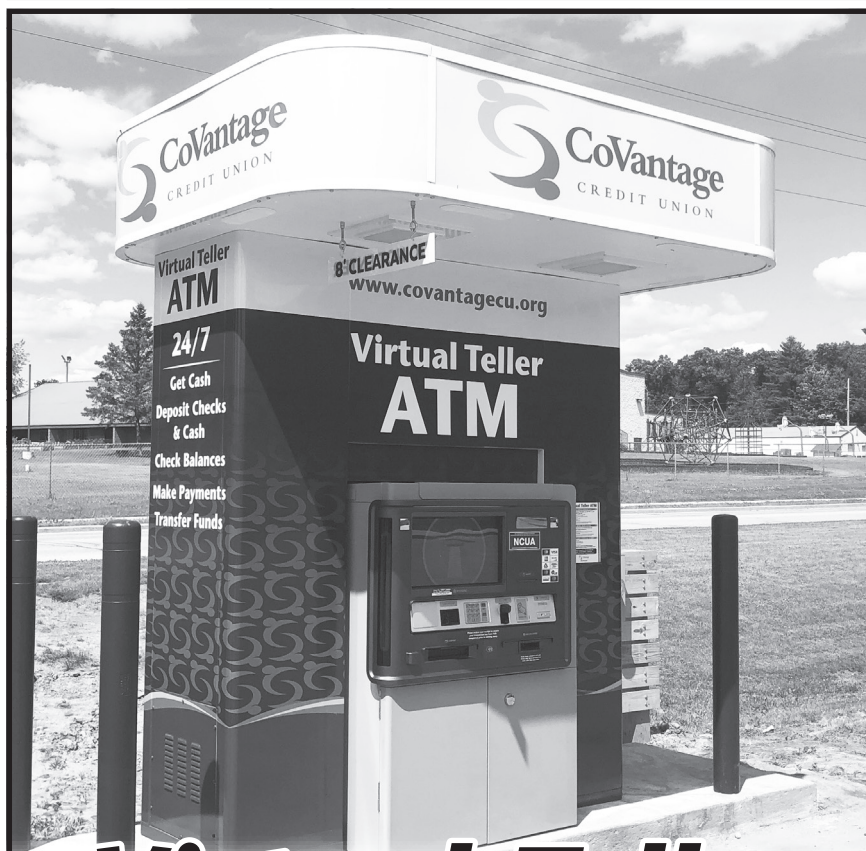
- A paved ADA-accessible walkway, friendly to bikers as well as pedestrians
- Trail lighting
- Benches and lookout points to the water
- Excavation and grading
- Grubbing and vegetation management
- Site restoration
- Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon and crossing at West Lieg Avenue
- An underpass at West Lieg Avenue



Kuckuk Park currently offers plenty of walking paths for visitors to enjoy. Plans to make a trail from that park to nearby Judd and Sturgeon parks are on hold due to legal issues with the funding.

Building inspector, zoning administrator leaves job

Bunke, city enter into resignation agreement with no further info

Shawano building inspector and zoning administrator Brian Bunke left his job effective July 9 after reaching a resignation agreement with the city.

City officials are mum on the reasons behind the resignation or whether he was asked to resign, but City Administrator Eddie Sheppard said it was a mutual agreement.

"We accepted Brian's resignation, and we need to move on," he said.

The Shawano Common Council discussed the Bunke matter in closed session at its July 15 meeting.

The city on July 16 released a copy of the resignation agreement after a request from the Leader.

The agreement states that there is no acknowledgment or admission by either party of any liability or wrongdoing under federal, state or local law.

The agreement also states that "The City agrees to conclude any pending internal investigations involving Mr. Bunke without the issuance of discipline."

Sheppard said the agreement is a form document commonly used by the city in these situations and not everything in the agreement necessarily applies in Bunke's case.

"It's a form letter that we have, just as an official document, providing the person resigning a full understanding of rights," Sheppard said. "So not all instances are going to be relevant, but in this scenario we fill in the name within the form."

The agreement prohibits Bunke from any other employment with the city or from instituting any legal action against the city.

The agreement calls for Bunke to be paid for all hours worked through July 9 along with any accrued and unused vacation time. The city will also cover its share of Bunke's health insurance costs through Aug. 31 unless Bunke finds other health insurance before then.

The city posted the job opening to replace Bunke on Tuesday.

In the meantime, a contracted building inspector started work on Monday.

Paul Hahn, an inspector for several townships around Shawano, will hold office hours from 10 a.m. to noon on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Bunke had been the building inspector in Kiel and Howards Grove prior to his hiring in Shawano in June of 2015. His starting salary at the time was \$55,000

"Overall, a super fun tournament and I'm happy with how I placed," said Passehl. "I look forward to advancing my difficulty and placing top three in the years to come."

Lew Worthington was named the new varsity volleyball coach at Shawano Community High School.

Worthington replaces Breanna Young, who served as the team's head coach since 2016. Joel Wondra, Shawano's athletic director, confirmed the hiring.

"Volleyball has always been a big part of my life, and I love working with and teaching young people," said Worthington. "As a newcomer to the community, this was an opportunity that I could not pass up."

Worthington, who moved to Shawano in February to serve as the pastor at Peace United Church of Christ, has helped lead several club volleyball teams over the years, including ones at Iowa State, Vanderbilt and Anderson universities. He

was an assistant coach for the Anderson University women's team and has also conducted workshops and skill development sessions for players in grades 7-12.

When asked about what he was most looking forward to in becoming the next Shawano volleyball coach, Worthington couldn't single out just one thing.

"I love the whole experience of building onto a program with a strong tradition of excellence," Worthington said, "but I do love working with people committed to a common goal."

The new coach cited how the foundation of all his relationships are built by "mutual, unconditional respect" and that the same will apply when working with his players.

"We need to respect and honor young people as they are, rather

than seeing them merely as future adults," he said.

"In addition to his rich background in the sport of volleyball, coach Worthington demonstrated a clear understanding of the role of interscholastic athletics in our educational setting," said Wondra on what made Worthington the right coach to hire. "He has a clear vision of how he will build team chemistry, and his disposition will make him an effective leader who is able to develop meaningful relationships with his players."

Young, who started on the Shawano varsity volleyball team for all four years in high school, has served as a coach in the program ever since. She started as the coach of the freshmen team before eventually taking over the varsity team in 2016.

"We were able to build a program that had great success, a heavy winning record, always had tons of fun, and I've had the opportunity to form many great relationships with the athletes and their

families," said Young.

"We appreciate coach Young's contributions to our volleyball program during her tenure as our varsity head coach," said Wondra. "She built upon a program with a history of competitive success, and participation in our program has grown under her leadership. We wish coach Young all the best."

Young helped guide the Hawks to successful regular seasons and strong postseason runs. Shawano made it to the regional finals in 2017 and 2018.

The 2019 season was the only one in which the team did not win a playoff game under Young, as the team was upset by Clintonville.

"The girls often talked about the bonds that were formed and how our team felt like a family. I have put my heart and soul into this program," said Young. "Coaching these athletes will definitely be something I miss spending so much time doing."

Sports suspended at UW System branch campuses because of COVID concerns

Intercollegiate sports at 10 branch campuses within five University of Wisconsin System institutions have been temporarily suspended for the 2020-21 academic year.

UW-Eau Claire, UW-Green Bay, UW-Oshkosh, UW-Platteville and UW-Stevens Point are the five institutions that made a joint decision on Tuesday. The 10 campuses affected

are in Baraboo, Barron, Fond du Lac, Manitowoc, Marinette, Marshfield, Menasha (Fox Cities), Richland, Sheboygan and Wausau.

"The one-year pause in sports reflects the additional challenges of facility cleaning and disinfecting, providing athletic trainers and other logistical issues posed by the current coronavirus pandemic," a news

release from the UW System schools stated.

The 10 campuses, which feature a few area graduates, play in the Wisconsin Collegiate Conference. The WCC includes 13 two-year campuses in total.

Bowler's Kayla Pecore and Menominee Indian's Raymond Fish were both planning on playing

basketball for a UW System branch school after graduating this year, but are now both exploring other college options because of the suspension of sports for WCC teams.

Pecore was set to join the UW-Green Bay Marinette Campus women's team. Fish was planning on joining the UW-Green Bay Manitowoc Campus men's team.

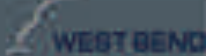
