Shawano School Board approves reopening plan

Committee formed to look at whether it's safe to open five days a week

The Shawano School Board approved the district's reopening plan Monday, with the current first week of school looking to be a hybrid model unless the county's health risk drops or a newly forming committee determines otherwise, whichever comes first.

Under the hybrid model, students at Hillcrest Primary School and Olga Brenner Intermediate School would be in school five days a week, but Shawano Community Middle School and Shawano Community High School students will attend two days a week while spending the other three days learning online.

Some parents commenting on the issue at the board meeting want to see all the schools providing in-person education five days a week. Parent Brent Polzin submitted a letter supporting the idea and urging the district to make it a reality on day one. He also wrote that he had a petition with more than 500 signatures in support of in-person education.

Polzin noted that there have been zero deaths in Shawano County attributed to the coronavirus, as well as daycare centers and summer baseball leagues not showing a surge in cases. He claimed many of the positive cases Shawano County has reported have not come from the Shawano area but are from "nursing homes in the western part of the county."

"If we do not open the district now, then when?" Polzin wrote.

Rosie Thiel, another parent, agreed with the idea of getting all the students back into the classroom. Commenting to the board via Zoom, Thiel said the virtual learning implemented by the school district in March was a struggle for her two children, one who is going into seventh grade and another who will be a junior in high school.

"Let us get these kids back into school," Thiel said.

Not everybody felt that way, however. Joe Guenther, a local physician

and parent of three children, urged the board to move cautiously, saying that not doing so will make the community's health situation worse.

"We're going to see more cases," Guenther said. "People will start dying."

Katrina Bubolz, an interventionist at Hillcrest Primary School, urged that masks be a requirement in school for students and staff.

"We are already bring students and staff into an environment of risk, so a mask should be required of staff," Bubolz wrote in a letter to the board. "I realize this is a novel virus and we're not sure how to protect ourselves and families, but as the staff member, I feel doing all we can to protect each other is to wear a mask."

Administrators had already updated the plan presented last week to require masks after Gov. Tony Evers issued an executive order later in the week requiring masks statewide.

A sticking point for some school board members is whether to use county health data to determine when schools open or close. To that end, the board approved forming a committee to look at developing a local rubric to make decisions on whether the schools change from one situation to another.

Board member Chris Gull said he did not trust the county numbers, saying they relied too much on "fuzzy math." Gull pointed out that the health risk assessment is based on the number of cases per 100,000 people, but the county's population is just shy of 41,000.

"If there are five new cases in Wittenberg, 28 miles away, we get bumped up" in the health risk assessment, Gull said.

Superintendent Randi Anderson said she could make more sense of the

county numbers. She noted that, based on the county data, the school district could have done face-to-face learning in May, but Evers' order to close schools in March would have superseded that.

From July 12-25, the county had 35 new cases.

"We're heading in the wrong direction," Anderson said.

Board member Bruce Milavitz said that he has heard from multiple parents that they feel "powerless" basing the school's openness on the county's coronavirus caseload.

"We're doing far more harm because of not being in school five days a week," Milavitz said.

Board member Michael Sleeper said he feels it's better to use caution to avoid total closure like what schools experienced in the spring.

"I would prefer to be a little more cautious — start out blended and as soon as possible get to face-to-face five (days), rather than jump in the deep end and then risk being virtual," Sleeper said.

Families have the option of enrolling in all-virtual learning for the first semester, and Anderson reported 13% of local families have already done so.

SCHS principal Scott Zwirschitz said that grades will return for the new school year after the district went to a pass-fail system during the previous closure. He said the high school and middle school are looking at adjusting the class loads so classes are divided in half by quarters; instead of eight classes every other day, students would have four classes daily in the first quarter and four in the second quarter.

Zwirschitz noted that the hybrid learning system will not have the same rigor as in-person learning.

"To say we'll have absolutely the same rigor if we're blended or virtual instead of face-to-face, I don't feel confident enough to say we'll do that," Zwirschitz said.

Gresham eyes 4-day week with Wednesday break

Surveys to garner public input, safety measures being set in classrooms

The Gresham School District is planning to have students in the classroom four days out of the week, closing Wednesdays for deep cleaning.

Whether that plan goes into effect will depend on the results of a survey being sent out this week and the decision of the Gresham School Board later in August. Superintendent Newell Haffner hopes the proposed reopening plan will be an acceptable compromise between those who believe schools should be open five days per week and those who believe it's too risky to open until the coronavirus is under control.

"Everybody wants the kids back — the teachers do, the parents do. Everybody does," Haffner said. "Right now, COVID levels are rising, so I was telling the staff that I don't know how we make this a win-win situation."

There is a virtual option for those families still uncomfortable letting the children out of the house during the pandemic, according to Haffner.

Air purifiers have been set up with the ventilation system for two-thirds of the building, which includes the new expansion. Portable purifiers are being set up in the remaining classrooms, according to Haffner. There are also ozone units and sprayers to clean the classrooms daily and especially during the big cleaning day on Wednesdays.

Masks will be required, per the executive order of Gov. Tony Evers, but the district is planning to require them even after the order expires Sept. 28.

"We're trying to limit as much risk as we can," Haffner said, adding that the school board "was going to vote the masks in anyway before Tony Evers stepped in."

Busing is one of the unknown factors. Haffner said that planning for buses will come into focus once the district knows for sure how many students will opt to attend in person.

"I'm sure I'll have parents that will want to drive their own kids here, and that will help with the busing situation," Haffner said, noting that the survey will ask parents what their plans are for transportation.

Physical distancing measures are being put into place, and Haffner has told his staff that minimum decor will be in the classrooms as a result. He noted that study carrels will be placed on each desk.

"I told them there's going to be no fluff in the rooms this year, and one of the teachers said, 'Well, it's going to look like a prison,'" Haffner said. "I said, 'Yes, it is, but it's only going to be for four months, five months until they get it under

control or we get a vaccine.'"

Currently, assemblies and field trips will not be happening in order to prevent large group gatherings. Visitation by parents and other community members will be very limited to prevent any potential outside illness from getting in.

"I can't control what comes through the door. That's what I can't control," Haffner said. "I think we've got a pretty good handle on what's inside the building."

The school could possibly go back to five days per week if the number of positive coronavirus cases drops significantly. However, the district could go completely virtual if the number of cases intensifies, according to Haffner.

"If we have 30 more kids in the Gresham School District (test positive), we're not going to be open. We're going to be virtual," Haffner said. "Whatever we put out may change in a week or two with the way COVID is going."

Haffner is surprised that some

parents are upset with the proposed plan, noting that "the science" would probably require that Gresham start the year with all virtual learning. With the current proposal, students can return to school four out of five days, he said.

"I'm amazed at the people that are mad because we're trying to keep people safe," Haffner said. "That's the part that just blows my mind."

Haffner estimated that the plan would work for the first semester, but a review and potential alterations would be necessary before the second semester if circumstances beforehand don't already force changes.

"I don't envision everything sticking the whole year because I'm an optimist," Haffner said. "I think a vaccine will happen. I think the majority of people will use it, and then we can get back to a somewhat normal life."

No sharp-tailed grouse hunting season this fall

In light of scientific data and concerns over population viability, there will be no sharp-tailed grouse hunting season this fall. With no permits available, no applications will be made available or accepted this year.

Each year, the Sharp-tailed Grouse Advisory Committee uses spring mating survey data to recommend permit levels for the sharp-tailed grouse hunting season to the department's Bureau of Wildlife Management leadership team. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, surveys were unable to be fully completed. Some data were gathered by partner groups, but the dataset for 2020 remains incomplete.

The Sharp-tailed Grouse Advisory Committee consists of DNR wildlife biologists and representatives from interested conservation groups.

Without a complete 2020 survey of the sharp-tailed grouse population, the committee made its recommendation based on the spring 2019 survey results, the limited 2020 data that were available and a scientific population model, which showed the potential for a marked decrease in

sharp-tailed grouse numbers. Permits were not issued in 2019, though permits were issued in three of the last five years.

Wisconsin has a strong, storied connection to sharp-tailed grouse hunting.

Thanks to the passion and commitment of DNR's partners in conservation, work is ongoing to restore and manage the young forest and barrens habitats that sharp-tailed grouse depend upon for their survival.

As a result of the increased barrens habitat management activities occurring in recent years in northwest Wisconsin, there is great optimism that the population will respond positively to these efforts and Wisconsin will experience an increase in sharp-tailed grouse population data in future years.

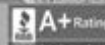

COVID testing available locally

A negative COVID-19 test is good news, but the celebration may be short-lived.

Tests for the public — for people who have been exposed to COVID-19 or have symptoms — are available in several locations in northeast Wisconsin. However the test, like so many other aspects of COVID-19, does not provide 100% reassurance against having the virus.

A negative test means that the person tested is not currently sick or does not have enough virus yet to show up in a test. Vicki Dantoin, Shawano-Menominee Counties health officer, noted that if someone is exposed to a person with COVID-19, self-quarantine remains an important way to stop the spread of the disease.

“Even if you test on day five, you could come down with it on days 6-14,” she noted. She added that the 14-day isolation period is based on the best statistics currently available about the new disease. She estimated that the two-week period would capture about 95% of the infections.

Testing, though, remains a valuable tool to help health care providers and patients plan.

In Shawano, Oconto and Menominee counties, tests are available to the public; however, what the tests can and can’t do depends on the type of test. The type of test varies but can be scheduled through health care providers throughout the area. (See related story with test options.)

Amber Allen, executive director of primary care, quality and innovation at Prevea Health, called this testing a look “at a moment in time.”

She said a patient can test negative but still have the disease, because they were infected within the past 48 hours and there is not enough virus yet to show up on the test. They can also test negative and become infected upon leaving the test site.

Patients must have a reason to be tested, such as being in close contact with someone who has tested positive or having symptoms of the virus. For this reason, anyone testing positive is asked to self-

quarantine.

She agreed that isolation is a big part of the reason for the test. As it can take 14 days for the virus to show up, if someone has been near someone who tested positive, that is a long time to spend around others.

The clinic or drive-in tests are paid for by the state of Wisconsin, though some tests are billed to insurance for some hospital-based care, she said.

Test results such as the tests now available at the drive-up service in

Shawano at the Prevea Clinic, 1300 E. Green Bay St., Shawano, use a specimen from both nostrils. The sample is collected and sent to Exact Sciences, an independent lab in Madison that processes specimens for the state of Wisconsin, Allen said.

From the patient’s nose, the sample goes into a sterile container. Then it is shipped to Madison where it is analyzed for RNA, converted to DNA and interpreted. (RNA and DNA are molecules found in a cell’s

nucleus that help form a blueprint of a cell.) Unlike some tests, nothing is grown on a Petri dish.

Although all testing sites have slightly different procedures, patients in community tests generally wait two to five days for results.

Positive results are shared with the patient and the county health department.

The tests at the drive-in sites will show if the patient currently has a COVID-19 infection. Another type of test, the antibody test, shows if the patient had the disease in the past. This is not included in the drive-up service.

Prevea is testing an average of 23 patients a day in Shawano County and about 40 a day in Oconto County, Allen said.

Prevea is currently testing only for COVID-19, Allen said. Later this fall, she said, strep or influenza may be added to the tests that are run on the samples.

COVID-19 is test new drive-up experience

You are not going to lose any brain tissue. Let's just put that rumor to rest.

The test for COVID-19 has developed a reputation as an experience involving an item resembling a baseball bat that a person in a scary suit sticks ALL THE WAY INTO YOUR NOSE, possibly dislodging some gray matter along the way.

As Theresa Arndt — the cheerful technician at the Prevea Clinic in Shawano — was eager to demonstrate last week, the actual experience is not as it was in the past. It's not threatening and, if not exactly comfortable, it is also not painful.

"I tell people we are after boogers, not brains," she said.

It's also important to do: to make sure someone who has the virus receives the right care and stays home to avoid sharing it.

Prevea and other health care providers are offering appointment-based drive-in or drive-through testing options for members of the

public who have been exposed to COVID-19 or have symptoms.

Prevea set up a demonstration and allowed me to document the experience, presumably to assure the public if the world's biggest chicken, medically speaking, could handle the test, anyone can.

The process starts with pre-registration, as all regular tests in the area are by appointment.

I signed up on MYPREVEA, pulled into a designated parking spot, registered with my cell phone and rolled down the window. Considering what usually has to get rolled down for medical tests, this was a pretty easy start.

Arndt came out in a blue protective suit, with blue gloves and printed post-test information.

She held a sealed test kit and extracted a swab that looked like an XXL Q-Tip.

I asked her — possibly a bit suspiciously — how far the stick would go. Not as far as it had in the past, she said.

Unlike earlier tests, which required a sample from far back in the nasal cavity, the current tests only require four turns around the lower part of each nostril with the cottony end of the stick.

She smiled, which you could see

even through her substantial mask.

And extended her hand toward my face.

There are not many things to compare the sensation to. It didn't sting. There was no "little poke" or pressure. It didn't scrape, shred or tickle. I didn't feel compelled to blow it out. It didn't feel great — it felt like something was there that didn't belong. Like a stick. In your nose. But, that's it.

It made my eyes water a little, probably because I did not want to see the stick approaching and glued

them as tightly shut as I could. (You know, the whole world's biggest chicken thing.)

Four swipes — an extra half swipe in one nostril and that was it. It took more time to roll the window up and down.

She placed the specimen in a container and went back to the building to change her gloves, get coated in hand sanitizer and get ready for the next patient.

I backed out of the parking spot, brain intact.

What I was not able to document was the anxiety that someone may feel when they drive away from the test site. I am always concerned about working with the public, but that's not the same as someone who is afraid that they have shared the virus with someone close or vulnerable.

As I was leaving, a car pulled into the next spot with two people in it. I didn't see them, but I heard them say they needed two tests. They sounded a bit nervous. I could only wish them the best, and now, can wish for them the same results as mine — negative.

This includes: all hospitalized patients with COVID-19 symptoms; patients with moderately severe symptoms of COVID-19 or risk factors for complications; any skilled nursing facility resident with symptoms; any health care worker, team member or first responder with symptoms; surgery patients; hospital patients who do not have symptoms but will go into labor, have a high-risk procedure, develop symptoms while in the hospital, or will be discharged to a

nursing home.

Keshena

Menominee Tribal Clinic offers options for clinic patients only.

Point of care testing is done on site and results are available the same day. This testing method including instruments, swabs, and transport media are supplied through the Indian Health Service and funded by COVID relief monies federally-appropriated for tribal communities. These testing kits are limited in number and are reserved for clinic patients only, with COVID-19 symptoms.

The clinic also uses COVID testing supplies for specimens sent to Mayo Clinic through ThedaCare, with a longer turnaround time, currently 4-6 days. These tests are used primarily for testing persons who are asymptomatic and in quarantine since they must complete quarantine regardless of results.

Sacred Heart plans 'blended learning'

Students to practice computerized lesson plans in school in case online learning warranted

Sacred Heart Catholic School believes it has everything it needs to have students in the classroom five days a week for the 2020-21 school year — although like other schools, it's taking things one day at a time with the coronavirus.

Sacred Heart will be implementing "blended learning," according to principal Gary Cumberland, with online learning taking place if the school has to close due to an outbreak within the school or a state order like the one Gov. Tony Evers gave in March. Most classrooms are already around 10 or 11 students, Cumberland said, but those that are larger will be broken up between the teacher and classroom aides to avoid having too many people in one location.

"We'll try it just so we can get used to it," Cumberland said, of the online learning. "Obviously, last year we didn't do a good job because we didn't know this was going to happen. We're going to make sure that even our younger students are aware of the Google Classroom and how it works. The teachers are putting together lessons through a (Microsoft) Powerpoint system. They'll have themselves videotaped and embed those in the lessons. If we have to close down or if we have to quarantine, at least we'll have that ready to go."

Busing is still up in the air, although Cumberland noted that a majority of Sacred Heart families already transport their children to school themselves. Sacred Heart works with the Shawano School District and its bus contractor, Kobussen Buses, and the district is still working out its own details, Cumberland said.

"I'm also putting out (to families) that hopefully they can find someone who will give them a ride to school versus using the bus, because I don't know where that's going," he said.

School hours will remain the same, with school starting at 8 a.m.

and ending at 3:15 p.m. Students will be required to enter "assigned doors," according to Cumberland, in order to prevent a large group of students coming together at the same time and potentially becoming a hub of infection.

Any student who eats breakfast before school will need to grab the meal and take it to the classroom, Cumberland said, and the lunch period will have three separate shifts for students instead of the single gathering that took place last year.

"The one thing I've been telling everyone is to be flexible," Cumberland said, "because everything might change."

Sports for middle school students are still expected to happen, according to Cumberland, but with some guidelines. Volleyball will still happen in the fall, but extra steps will be in place to sanitize balls and other equipment daily.

Cleaning overall will be enhanced, as well. The school has purchased a commercial sanitation machine that "mists" surfaces in every room to clean them every night, according to Cumberland, and staff will be cleaning during the day while students are at recess.

"We're going to make sure we have sanitation stations in each classroom for students to wash their hands and those types of things," he said. "Common surfaces will be wiped down daily, as well."

In the event of an outbreak at the school, the school plans to consult the Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department for guidance. If the coronavirus cases are limited to the school, officials will determine whether to make changes in the affected classroom or the school itself, Cumberland said. But if the cases are connected with community events, that could result in the school closing for a period and going to online learning.

"We're just going to take things one day at a time," Cumberland said.

TO THE VOTERS OF SHAWANO COUNTY AND MENOMINEE COUNTY**

Notice is hereby given of a partisan primary to be held in Shawano County and Menominee County on August 11, 2020, at which the nominees for the offices named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office under the appropriate party, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, if any, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place, a voter shall state his or her name and address, show an acceptable form of photo identification and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles. If a voter is not registered to vote, a voter may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence, if the voter presents proof of residence in a form specified by law. Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that a voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the partisan primary, the voter shall select the party of his or her choice. Voting for candidates of more than one party may invalidate the ballot. The voter must cast a vote for individual candidates.

Where Paper Ballots are Used

- The voter shall choose the ballot of the party of his or her choice.
If the voter votes on more than one party ballot, no votes will be counted.

On the party ballot of his or her choice, the voter shall make an (X) or other mark in the square next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

Where Optical Scan Voting is used

- If a party preference is designated, and votes are cast for ballot candidates of another party or write-in votes are cast in another party, only votes cast in the designated party will count.
- If a party preference is not designated, and votes are cast for candidates (or write-in votes are cast) in more than one party, no votes will be counted.

Within the party of his or her choice, the voter shall connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote connect the arrow next to the write-in line.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen at the party of his or her choice. The voter shall then touch the screen at the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

Spoiled Ballots

If a voter spoils a paper or optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall then deposit the voted ballot in the ballot box, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit, and deposit the un-voted ballots in the discard box. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official touch screen ballot is marked, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

COVID dismissed as cause for complaint uptick

A fistfight, even one in a cemetery over a remark about a deceased relative, wouldn't normally be a big item of interest.

The Shawano County Sheriff's Department responded to such an altercation in the Town of Wescott on July 29, according to George Lenzner, chief deputy. Two men, ages 41 and 67, admitted to the fight and were issued disorderly conduct citations, Lenzner added.

Emergency responders checked the older man's injuries, but nothing

serious was reported, Lenzner said.

With press reports from around the nation documenting incidents, such as an attack last week on a Trader Joe's employee in Manhattan over a mask requirement, a logical question is whether fear and uncertainty during the COVID-19 pandemic has contributed to a rise in violence.

Lenzner said he didn't see a connection in Shawano County, including the Town of Wescott incident.

The chief deputy noted that domestic violence complaints in the county have risen this year, but

he couldn't say whether that was related to the pandemic.

He also noted that suicides are definitely up in 2020, and drug overdoses and drug-related complaints have also risen, he said.

One area that Lenzner could note from a law enforcement perspective was the rising number of speeding drivers — especially on Highway 29. He said deputies “could be stopping people one after another” and have to manage those enforcement efforts along with other priorities.

That observation was supported by information shared at the recent

quarterly meeting held the Wisconsin Department of Transportation and law enforcement agencies, Lenzner said.

Although, predictably, vehicle accidents have dropped as people have traveled less this year, Lenzner said, there is a definite increase in fatalities. Through the end of July, the DOT reported 293 people died on state roads, with three fatalities reported in Shawano County. Through the end of the same period in 2019, DOT tallied 279 deaths, putting the state on a pace to surpass the 2019 total of 551.

New orders impact Menominee gambling, bar and restaurants

Gambling on the Menominee Reservation has been closed and restrictions have been imposed on restaurants, bars and other businesses in an emergency order by the Menominee Indian Tribe's COVID-19 incident command.

Incident command also ordered public safety actions within businesses, in response to growing public health threat posed by COVID-19, according to their press release on July 31.

The two emergency orders are the latest action of the tribe's COVID-19 response. Tribal leaders stand in full support of these orders, an incident command spokesperson reported.

"Public safety is the tribe's incident command's number one priority," said Chairwoman Joan Delabrea in the release. "As we continue to understand the impact of COVID-19, limiting community engagement is intended to support slowing the spread of this virus.

"COVID-19 remains widespread in our communities, putting lives and public health at risk. We have to continue to keep doing the things that are helping to protect such as wearing a mask, staying physically distant, avoiding activities that lead to gathering, and staying home as much as possible."

Emergency Order 2 orders the closing of casino gaming operations, bars and restaurant and farmers markets, starting July 31, 5 p.m., until Aug. 11: Menominee Casino Resort and Thunderbird gaming are closed except for the following: Restaurants within the gaming establishments shall only be available for curbside takeout; casino gift shop; and Thunderbird C-Store. Bars shall only be available for curbside takeout.

All bars and restaurants and farmers markets are closed, except for such business may provide for curbside

takeout of food only. This will remain in effect until Aug. 11 unless otherwise renewed by the emergency management coordinator.

Emergency Order 3 orders all establishments, institutions, businesses, offices, stores, and organizations to institute certain public health measures:

- Restrict the number of customers inside their place of business at any one time so that each customer is enabled to distance themselves at least six feet from any other person.

- Require all individuals ages 5 and older to wear masks covering their mouth and nose while inside the place of business.

- Institute temperature screenings for all individuals prior to entering their place of business and restrict any individual from entering whose temperature is 100.4 or above.

- Persons or groups who violate

this order may be fined up to \$500 per infraction.

- This order is in place from 5 p.m. on July 31 and expires at the expiration of the declared state of emergency unless ordered by the active emergency management coordinator.

These emergency orders follow Menominee Tribe COVID-19 incident command issue of Emergency Order 1 establishing a curfew July 29 through Aug. 31 from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m.

The Menominee Tribal Legislature declared a state of emergency on March 12 in an effort to minimize the threat of a potential outbreak and spread of COVID-19 on tribal land. This emergency declaration authorizes an emergency incident command to centralize the tribe's COVID-19 response efforts, and have authorization to utilize all necessary resources and to issue necessary emergency orders to protect the community.

Tauchen called on to share views on COVID

Gov. Tony Evers, in consultation with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, issued statewide stay-at-home guidelines to reduce the COVID-19 pandemic throughout our great state.

Counties, towns, villages, cities, public institutions, private businesses and businesses catering to social events and recreational gatherings all have committed to different health-related standards that are confusing the public and leaving state directives largely ignored.

Our state representatives, in addition to their generous salaries, also receive about \$160 per day for expenses when in Madison. Rep. Tauchen was in the top 10 legislators in those expenses, receiving over \$10,000 in additional dollars.

The state legislature was in session less than 25 days last year; it would appear that Rep. Tauchen must have been attending several meetings that included discussion of what uniform statewide standards Republican legislators are willing to support, particularly in light of the fact that COVID-19 cases are increasing dramatically throughout the state and in Rep. Tauchen's Assembly district.

Would Gary Tauchen please share his views on the matter? He is our representative, and our health depends on it.

Bike the Barn Quilts event has new look in pandemic

Event started in July, runs through September

The Bike the Barn Quilts event put on by Shawano Pathways will have a much different look and feel in 2020.

In past years, a Friday barn dance took place before the main event on the final Saturday of September. This year, the coronavirus pandemic canceled the barn dance and turned the event into a remote one in which participants have several weeks to complete.

Participants can either walk or run a 10K, or complete a 40-mile bike ride. The event began in July and runs through September.

Because the event won't happen on a single day in one place, individuals from across the world could participate on their own time and at their own pace, while helping raise funds for Shawano Pathways. This year,

the event will also help support the newly-formed group Friends of the Mountain Bay Trail.

Matty Mathison, one of three Bike the Barn Quilts event coordinators, said the event took on the motto of, "wherever, whenever, however" this year.

Melanie Curti, another event coordinator, gave a perfect example of how that motto is helping individuals partake in the event this year.

"I have a brother and his wife out in California, and even though he's only been to Shawano once, he's planning to support Friends of Mountain Bay Trail by getting a membership and then he's also planning to do the event out there and invite as many of his friends as possible," said Curti.

Participants could walk/run or bike on any trails or roads or complete the event on a treadmill or

stationary bike if they wish.

Typically around 200 individuals participate in the September event. So far, at least 60 people have signed up to compete this year, and the coordinators — with Nancy Schultz being the third — expect that number to grow as the temperatures cool down and make for more comfortable conditions to participate in.

Mathison said there was talk about canceling the entire event this year, but adapting to the situation proved to be a safe choice that allowed the event to "maintain its reputation."

She also noted that while the Mountain Bay Trail primarily is in Shawano County — 51 of the 83 miles — most annual trail passes are sold in Wausau or Green Bay and that 70% of the fees from the passes go back to the county they were bought in. That coupled with the fact that Shawano County has the smallest parks department and budget doesn't leave much money in order to maintain and

improve the trails, which is where Friends of Mountain Bay Trail is trying to help out.

The cost of the event is \$20 for an individual. For an additional \$10, an individual can obtain a Friends of the Mountain Bay Trail-Shawano County annual membership.

It costs \$45 for a family to participate, with an additional \$10 upgrade to get the Friends of Mountain Bay Trail-Shawano County annual family membership.

After completing the event, participants will receive a Hoo-rag, which serves several purposes, including as a face mask or headband.

Brewers' Lorenzo Cain opts out of 2020 season

Decision comes as team's games vs. Cardinals were postponed

Milwaukee Brewers outfielder Lorenzo Cain decided not to play the remainder of the 2020 season.

Cain, a married father of three young sons, said he made the decision "after careful consideration and discussion with my family."

"With all of the uncertainty and unknowns surrounding our game at this time, I feel that this is the best decision for me, my wife and our three kids," Cain said Saturday in a statement released by the Brewers.

Milwaukee's entire three-game series against St. Louis at Miller Park

last weekend was postponed because multiple members of the Cardinals tested positive for the coronavirus.

"The Brewers organization was very understanding and supportive of my decision, and I thank them for that. I wish all of my great teammates the best of luck this season and look forward to getting back on the field in 2021. Please stay safe," he said.

The two-time All-Star's decision was announced as the Brewers' scheduled home opener against St. Louis was postponed for a second straight day.

"He felt this was something that he needed to do," Brewers general manager David Stearns said. "We

completely respect the decision and support the decision. This is something that Lorenzo had been thinking about and discussing with his family for some time. This is the first he had brought it to our attention, but as we understood the decision and understood the decision-making process, it's something that's been on his mind and ultimately he believes this is the right thing for him to do and we understand that."

Cain was 6 for 18 with two RBIs in his first five games this season after batting .260 with 11 homers, 48 RBIs and 18 steals last year, when he earned his first Gold Glove. He has a \$5,925,926 prorated salary this season

as a part of an \$80 million, five-year contract through 2022.

The exit of the 34-year-old Cain leaves the Brewers without one of their biggest leaders as they attempt to make a third straight playoff appearance, something they've never accomplished in franchise history.

Cain finished seventh in the NL MVP balloting in 2018 when teammate Christian Yelich won the award and the Brewers ended up one win away from the World Series, losing to the Los Angeles Dodgers in a seven-game NL Championship Series. Cain ranked fourth in the NL in on-base percentage (.395) and steals (30) and fifth in batting average (.308) that season.

He wasn't fully healthy last year but still helped the Brewers earn a wild-card playoff berth.

Packers' Devin Funchess says he's opting out of 2020 season

Green Bay Packers wide receiver Devin Funchess is opting out of playing this season in a move he calls one of the most difficult decisions he's ever made.

Funchess' choice leaves Green Bay without its only major offseason addition to their receiving group, one year after Davante Adams was the only Packer to catch as many as 50 passes or accumulate as many as 500 yards receiving.

The 26-year-old Funchess announced his decision in an Instagram post. Funchess noted that some of his closest relatives "have experienced the life-threatening impact of COVID-19 firsthand." Funchess said he decided against playing this season "for their and my own safety."

"Family is first," Funchess wrote on his Instagram post. "Always has been. Always will be. In such unpredictable times, it's been one of the constants on my mind as I've worked through one

of the toughest decisions of my life."

Funchess thanked the Packers for their understanding and said that "I look forward to getting back to work with them next season."

The Packers announced the signing of Funchess on April 2. Funchess agreed to a one-year contract worth \$2.5 million with a signing bonus of \$1 million, according to Spotrac.

Family restaurant opens on Green Bay St.

Cruise In offers breakfast, lunch dishes

Alex Morales first got into the food industry by working at a restaurant called Cruise In in Kaukauna when he was 14.

Now, he's opening up his own restaurant with the same name in Shawano, planning to bring fresh, home-style cooking to local residents without the need to cook at home.

"This is where I started," Morales said, referring to the style of food he serves.

Morales, who had previously operated a Mexican restaurant in Appleton, is bringing American cuisine to his latest restaurant, turning the former Fifties diner turned sushi restaurant back into a Fifties diner complete with checkerboard motif and tunes from the Beach Boys playing in the background.

"I like the '60s and '50s music," Morales said. "All of the elderly people, I like how they feel like they did back then when they were raised. I like the atmosphere."

Morales noted that the outside looked like it would be good for a Fifties diner, but he was unaware that there had been a similar-style restaurant in the space at 1045 E. Green Bay St. years earlier.

"I came here one day with my family just to travel," Morales said. "I had seen it and saw the lease sign and liked how it looked. I said this was the perfect spot for a Fifties/Sixties diner."

Cruise In Family Restaurant opened July 28 and has seen steady business. Morales noted that breakfast hours have been a little slow, but the lunch period has seen brisk attendance.

At the moment, Cruise In is only open one night a week, Friday for the fish fry. Morales said he is waiting to hire more workers before he is comfortable opening the restaurant to evening customers.

"We plan to serve up things like breaded chicken and liver and onions, stuff like that," Morales said.

As for the fish fry, customers can enjoy all-you-can eat perch, whitefish, haddock and jumbo shrimp.

Breakfast dishes are served all day, including a wide assortment of omelettes. For those in the mood for lunch, Cruise In serves up plenty of burgers, wraps and sandwiches.

"This is homestyle. This is fresh,"

Morales said of the food. "It makes people feel like they're eating at home."

There will also be some daily specials. On Tuesdays, Mexican dishes like chimichangas and burritos will be served up. Cruise In goes Italian on Wednesdays with lasagna, spaghetti and chicken alfredo specials. Baked chicken is on the menu for Thursdays.

With the coronavirus pandemic in full swing, Cruise In is offering takeout in addition to its dine-in options. The restaurant currently is utilizing Facebook to get the word out.

Morales wasn't too worried about opening a restaurant in the middle of the pandemic, but he was unsure how receptive Shawano would be. The few days he has been open has been reassuring.

"So far, so good," Morales said. "I'm getting to know a lot of Shawano people, and I like it so far."

Besides the long-term success of the current restaurant, Morales hopes to open another restaurant in another community in Shawano County. He has not yet found a perfect spot, but he

noted that it could either be another Fifties/Sixties diner or possibly a Mexican restaurant similar to what he had in Appleton.

"I do have the Mexican restaurant experience," Morales said.

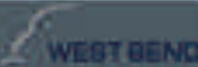

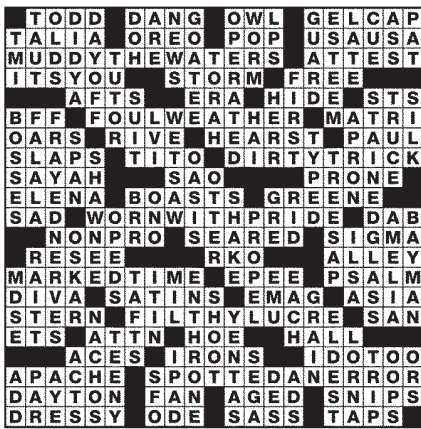

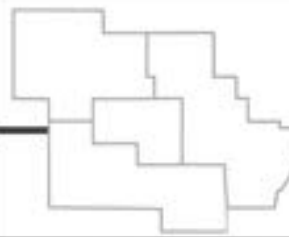
