Board divided on tweaking its school reentry plan

SCHS students to attend school one day a week instead of two

The Shawano School Board was divided Monday on approving an amendment to the school district's re-entry plan that would keep the district from starting the school year in a virtual environment.

In the end, the board voted 6-3 to approve the amendment, which adds an additional learning model to the original three that it had approved on Aug. 3.

Shawano County recently went to a high-risk category regarding the spread of the coronavirus, and with the plan approved by the board two weeks earlier, being high risk would require holding school online and keeping the buildings closed.

The amendment adds a second level of hybrid learning that would only impact Shawano Community High School students. Instead of students being able to attend school two days a week with the other three in a virtual learning environment, they would be in school one day with the other four learning online.

"We want to be able to open, and we want to be able to stay open," Anderson said, explaining the rationale for the updated plan.

The high school has about 770 students, according to principal Scott Zwirschitz. About 100 are opting for all virtual learning, leaving 670 students to come to school. Dividing the population by four would put almost 170 students in SCHS on a given day.

"When you have half of the student body in the halls, that still causes some congestion, which impacts our ability to create space (for social distancing)," Zwirschitz

said. "If we have 25% of our students here, that would definitely open up the hallways."

The second level of hybrid learning would not impact the frequency of other students attending school. Elementary students would be in school five days a week, while middle school students would spend two days in school and three online.

The second level of hybrid learning would apply whenever the county's health risk was high and the number of active cases are either shrinking or not experiencing any change. If there is a high health risk and the number of cases are growing, the school district would shift to a virtual environment.

Board member Bruce Milavitz, who voted against the amended plan with Chris Gull and Mart Grams, felt it was unwise to put the high school students on four days of virtual learning and said it could result in lots of students falling behind. He noted that the board was satisfied with the social distancing in place with the first level of hybrid learning, so he suggested extending those provisions to the areas of the plan that the second hybrid level would cover.

"I am so concerned that, if we go one day a week and four days virtual, there are going to be a lot of kids left behind," Milavitz said.

Board member Michael Sleeper favored the amendment, reiterating that, without adjusting the plan, Shawano's public schools would be in a total virtual environment on day one.

"I look at it being like a marginal swimmer jumping into the water and finding out I can't swim well enough," Sleeper said. "If I go into the shallow end and work my way up, there's a whole lot better

chance of success. That's how I see this. If it's overly cautious, we will win. If it's overly ambitious, we could be in virtual (learning) for weeks or months."

Sleeper also suggested keeping close watch on the health conditions and finding ways to safely move into a learning model that has older students in school more days.

Even though the plan alters the schedule significantly for SCHS, the other three schools in the district are having to make adjustments under the new plan. Hillcrest Primary School principal Troy Edwards had to bring in additional desks because the tables alone were not enough for social distancing. Olga Brener Intermediate School principal Terri Schultz reassigned intervention staff members to teach in order to lower classroom student counts. Shawano Community Middle School principal Stuart Russ reported having to add additional lunch periods to maintain social distancing.

The elementary and middle schools will require special classes like art to come to the students. At SCMS, teachers will switch classrooms instead of students, avoiding crowds in the halls.

At all of the schools, there can be no gatherings of more than 70 people, impacting some school activities like assemblies.

Anderson said district officials have been looking at what other states and even other countries have been doing to reopen schools to see what has worked and what hasn't.

"We need to figure out how we can open and what we can do to make that happen," Anderson said.

Committee looks to keep schools open as much as possible

Medical experts report on coronavirus trends in area

Medical professionals on Shawano School District's new reentry committee offered suggestions to keep schools open at the committee's first meeting last week, including one that the community should take masking more seriously.

The committee was formed to guide Superintendent Randi Anderson as she determined which education model would be safest to allow for student education while ensuring community health. School board member Chuck Dallas, who is chairing the committee, pointed out that the coronavirus has turned into a sensitive and political issue that has polarized people.

"We want you to be our eyes and ears out there and feed information to Randi," Dallas said, noting that the committee has representation from two health organizations — ThedaCare and Prevea — along with other health officials. "Tell us what is going on in your area so we can make an informed decision with the kids."

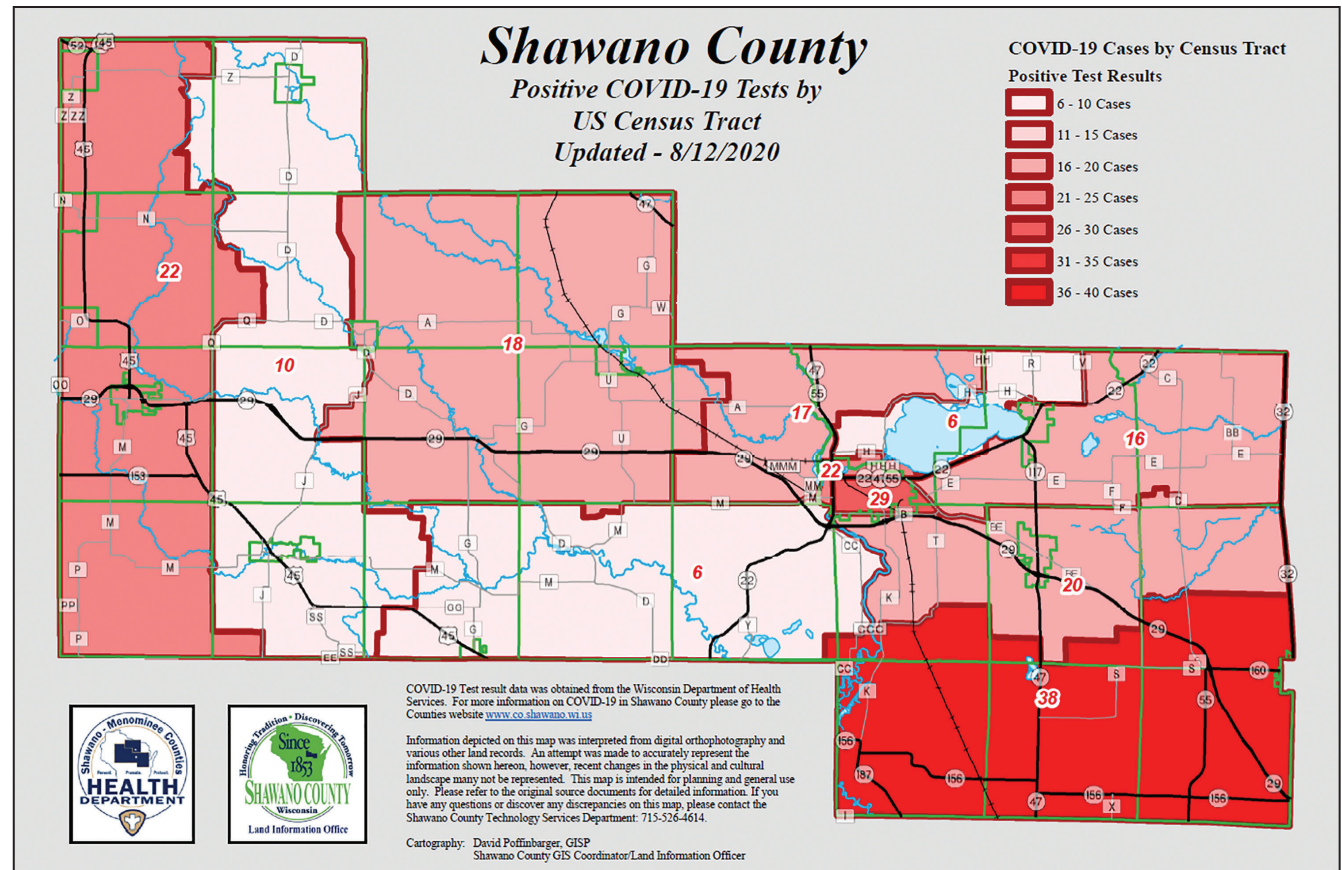
Anderson noted that the Wisconsin Department of Health Services has not released any updated guidance for districts on when to shift from one education model to another but is expecting the information to come next week. However, she fears it won't take much to impact the school district's ability to educate.

"One of the biggest concerns we have is, once (coronavirus) gets into our system, we're done," Anderson said.

The district already has 300 students signed up to receive total online learning for the fall semester, according to Anderson, but it could easily extend to the more than 2,000 students expected to be in school come September if conditions worsen.

As of Monday, Shawano County had 219 positive cases recorded, with zero deaths and 16 incidents where people had to be hospitalized. However, medical professionals on the committee pointed out that, due to limited testing ability, those numbers are probably higher.

Shannon Daun, a family medicine physician at Menominee Tribal

Clinic, said she and her colleagues have been seeing a "constant trickle" of cases since the pandemic was declared in March.

"The testing availability is a large issue right now, so the numbers are probably a lot worse than what we know of," Daun said. "People who are only mildly ill will not necessarily be tested because of the limited availability."

Dr. Mindy Frimodig with ThedaCare noted that the area is running low on rapid testing kits and will likely have to turn to the send-out tests, which take days to receive the results.

Prevea has been a leader in coronavirus testing in Shawano County, with Dr. Yu Chin Fang pointing out that 30 patients per day come to the Shawano clinic, and it's not just locals who seek the tests.

"Some people come from as far as Green Bay to test because all of the sites are full there," Fang said. "We

are testing more people with milder symptoms than ThedaCare is."

Vicki Dantoin, health officer for the Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department, reported that her office has received reports of 60 new cases in recent weeks.

Most on the committee want to see the schools open five days a week, regardless of the statistics. Jess Huntington, a Shawano pharmacist, noted that 92% of Wisconsin's counties are currently designated high risk and expressed concern about what would happen if those districts had to go to all virtual learning.

"I don't see not reopening at least three or four days a week to be safe," Huntington said. "I think this data is a little skewed. I feel it is your duty to reopen because if you think of all the people working at Charlie's County Market, Walgreens, Walmart. You have health care providers in the hospital. If we all shut down, where would this world go?"

Fang said the ultimate solution to get the schools open five days a week lies with the community, which she believes is not doing enough to stem the coronavirus spread.

"I am extremely disappointed

with how this community hasn't come together, do the decent thing and masking so we can get our children back to school," Fang said.

Anderson recommended the committee strongly discourage people from attending the Shawano County Fair, which boasts tens of thousands people attending over the six-day run.

"Community, you need to mask. You need to social distance. You need to cancel your county fair," Anderson said. "We can't have 68,000 people coming into this city and expect us to keep our buildings open."

One suggestion was to try and find more accurate data to help the district determine how many positive cases can be found within its boundaries. School board member Chris Gull said he would consult with other school districts to get their local stats and send the information to the committee members.

A suggestion was also made was to add a fourth model of education in between the hybrid learning and virtual learning models. That amendment to the plan was presented to the Shawano School Board on Monday and passed on a 6-3 vote.

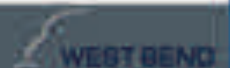
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Shawano looking at ending elected attorney position

The city of Shawano is considering moving to contracted legal services rather than having an elected city attorney, according to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard.

City officials discussed their options for filling the current city attorney vacancy Wednesday during a closed session of the Common Council, but no formal action was taken.

The vacancy was created when city attorney Katherine Sloma was appointed Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Branch 1 judge last month by Gov. Tony Evers.

She was first elected city attorney in 2018 and was reelected in April.

Sheppard said the city has been reaching out to people to gauge their interest in serving as city attorney, and there have been discussions about what such an arrangement might look like.

"The council's been pretty supportive of moving away from our city attorney as an elected position," he said.

"We intend to move that more into a contract position."

The change would require amending the city's charter ordinance, which calls for the post to be elected every two years.

One reason for discontinuing the position as an elected official is that city attorneys are not policymakers, Sheppard said.

"Granted, you're getting someone from your jurisdiction who has a vested interest in the community," he said. "But you also don't have that chance to build a long-term relationship with someone that really gets to know the city."

Sheppard said a lot of communities have gone away or are going away from the elected attorney position.

"It's sort of one of those fringe elected positions where you hope your legal advice is going to be consistent no matter where you get it, but you never know," he said. "Having that opportunity for the city to actually control who is that person providing our legal advice, I think we see that as an advantage."

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No easy answers to COVID-19 response

County health department helps determine next steps

If, then.

If someone tests positive for COVID-19, if an employer has an employee with symptoms, if a restaurant has a regular customer who has symptoms of COVID-19, what is the next course of action?

The answer is, it depends.

“There are a lot of variables,” said Vicki Dantoin, Shawano-Menominee counties health officer. “If this, then that. It’s not the same for every place.”

When the health department is notified of a positive COVID-19 case, the staff begins a process called “contact tracing,” which means asking the infected person where they work and who their close contacts have been. This information is not always something that people want to share, and the health department can’t compel them to do so.

They also don’t have to say where they work. If they do choose to share this, the health department must get permission to talk to the employer.

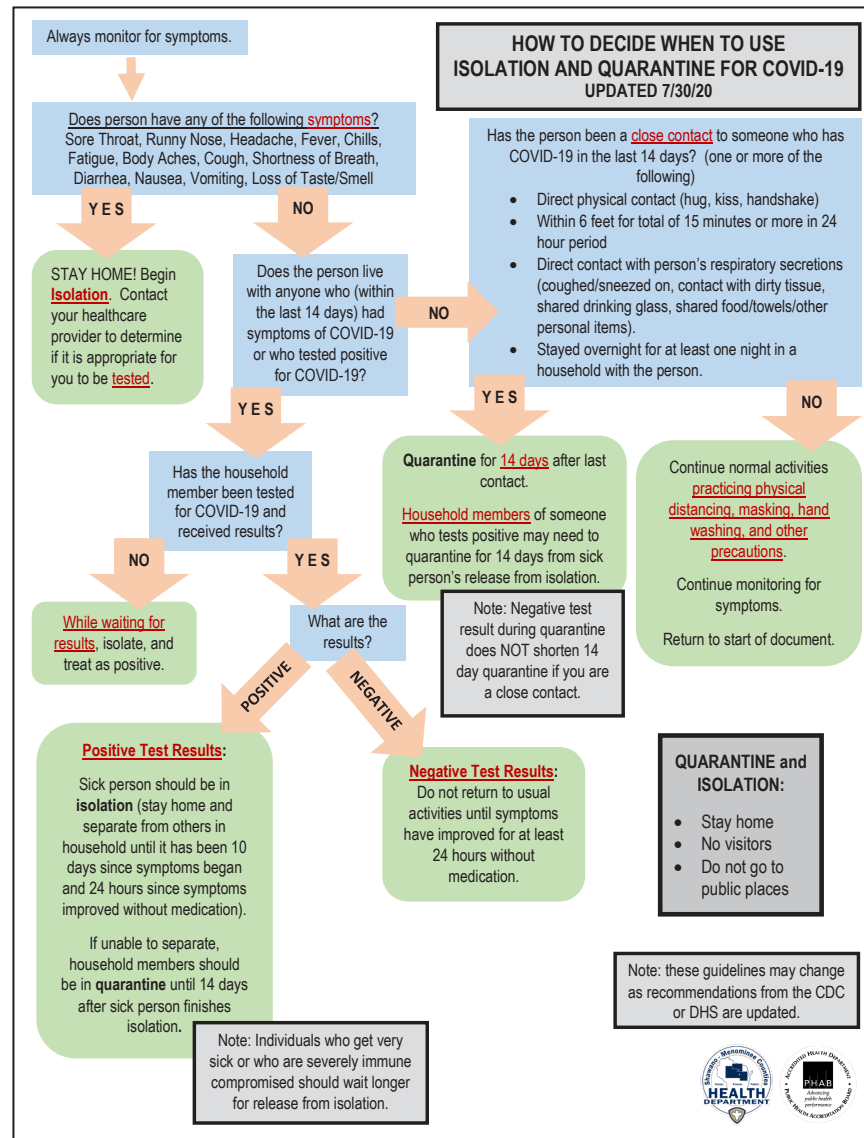
“We can’t call the employer and tell them, ‘We think you have a case,’” Dantoin said.

As a health care professional, Dantoin must abide by the patient privacy rules of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, better known as HIPAA.

Even in a time of communicable diseases, HIPAA goes one way, Dantoin said. As a public health official, she can receive the report but can’t share that information without permission.

She emphasized that a positive test for one employee does not automatically mean that a business needs to close. It depends on the type of business and what it needs to operate. She helps business owners make these decisions by asking questions.

“If everybody is in quarantine, what can you do?” Dantoin asked. “Can you close for a couple of days and deep clean? We like to offer options for going forward.”

Whether an employer wishes to disclose that an employee tested positive depends on the situation, she said. It may depend on how many employees were exposed and have to go into quarantine.

“We ask them, ‘If half the staff was in close contact, can you operate with half staff?’” she said.

Dantoin said she also discusses what precautions have been taken and what the business can do once they reopen. Is it possible to be physically distant in the current

building? If it is a restaurant, are tables cleaned before the next person sits down? How many staff are needed to operate safely? What are the communication strategies, and how will they control rumors?

“For the most part, they are pretty cooperative,” she said. “There are some that are, ‘No, thank you. But have a nice day.’”

Many, she said, ask excellent questions and have already thought about, “What happens next?” They are concerned about the business,

but ultimately, they are concerned about the people, she said.

“The humanity factor brings it back,” she said. “The issue is how COVID-19 works. We really don’t know who it will affect, who it will affect severely. We don’t know who is an asymptomatic carrier.”

When it happens, she said, those who have been told have said they are prepared but also have a personal affirmation that “This is real.”

One of the responses Dantoin emphasizes is time off for the infected individual. At the beginning of the pandemic, many employers were working on getting policies in place for who should stay home. Some have sick leave or short term disability for employees.

That’s the important thing for public health, she said.

“If people who are sick are out and about, you can’t stop the spread of the virus,” she said.

However, she noted, it’s not that easy. For employees, it’s hard to go two weeks without a paycheck, she said. For employers, the question is, “How do I keep my business running?”

It depends on the resources and policies, she said, and it is an ongoing concern.

The issues are faced not just by businesses but other agencies that serve the public, such as schools.

“Schools keep asking, ‘How do we know when to close?’” she said.

Like everything else, the answer is, “It depends.”

If there is a cluster of cases, are they in one classroom? That would mean shutting down that classroom but not the whole school. If there are a number of cases throughout different classes, it means the spread is occurring throughout the building, and the recommendation may be to close.

“There is no good answer,” she said. “It’s like putting a puzzle together. You have to put all the pieces together to see the whole picture.”

Businesses need a COVID plan

Communication is key when anticipating employee absences

Have a plan.

That's the best way to cope with the news that an employee has tested positive for COVID-19, according to Melissa Olson, the human resources expert for KerberRose, SC — a north-east Wisconsin accounting firm.

Olson, who also serves as a consultant for other businesses, said that a strategy with a strong communications focus will help businesses best prepare for bad news.

The plan is important because each business will have its own needs and challenges, she said. For example, at KerberRose, an accounting firm with 10 locations, a designated person was selected to handle internal communications. That person has access to home phone numbers and can be trusted with confidential information about the infected person, she said.

Should the firm receive news of a positive test, an internal text-messaging system sends announcements to all employees. The message can be sent at times when not everyone is sitting at a desk receiving emails, Olson said. That is what works for their firm, but each company — large or small — needs to determine its own best system.

"You need one point of contact and multiple communication channels," she said.

Olson also recommended letting employees know about the plan ahead of time, and letting them know they may not get the name of the person who has COVID-19.

Employers can't release the name of an infected employee without permission, though in a small company, it may be obvious who is not at work, she said.

Employers can go to the infected employee's close contacts and let them know they have been in close contact with an infected person. This will make them eligible to get a COVID-19 test.

It may not be easy to do, but this step is important for keeping everyone protected, she said.

"There is a moral responsibility

to make those calls," she said. "You certainly don't want other people in the workforce to become infected or infect others."

She said she has not heard of anyone who didn't want to share the names of their close contacts.

When employees test positive, health care officials will ask them to spend two weeks in quarantine. This is another possibility to plan for, Olson said — not just for the company, but for the employee.

Most people have not gone to the store to stock up on two weeks' worth of groceries ahead of time. Olson suggested that employers check in to make sure the employee has the resources to get necessary supplies.

Once the notifications have been made, the business has other decisions to make, Olson said. One

infected person does not mean a business has to close, she said.

She recommends working with the local health department.

"The health department can help businesses decide if they can remain open and what they have to do to make it safe," Olson said. "It depends significantly on the type of business." A restaurant, for instance, will have different issues than an office business where most employees are already working from home.

"It's certainly not one size fits all," she said.

Other options include working remotely, changing hours and rearranging the work space. Cleaning procedures should be included in the plan. At KerberRose, for example, each location has a cleaning service with plans for in-depth cleaning

made early on in the pandemic.

Olson also recommended that managers and owners stay aware of other issues that can impact employees. In addition to health issues, employees may be concerned about child care availability, whether schools will reopen and what their company benefits will cover.

That takes the conversation back to planning ahead and communicating.

"The biggest impact has to do with business culture," Olson said. "If you have great culture, it puts people leaps and bounds ahead."

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DA requests probe over Damrau claim

State looking into naming of Damrau during court hearing

Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney Greg Parker has asked the state Office of Lawyer Regulation to investigate whether there was any wrongdoing by his office after a local defense attorney and district attorney candidate was named in a court hearing last week as a possible party to a potential bail jumping charge.

"I just thought it would be the proper thing to do," Parker said.

The investigation was expected to take about six to eight weeks.

The request for the OLR probe came the day after Aaron Damrau, who is running as an independent against Parker in November, announced publicly he had been accused of a crime by the DA's office and was being investigated.

Parker said Damrau was never accused and wasn't being investigated.

At issue is an Aug. 11 hearing in the case of Ethan C. Pollard, 29, of Fayetteville, Georgia, who is charged with felony counts of battery or threat to a law enforcement officer and second or subsequent possession of marijuana.

Pollard, who was living in Madison when he was charged in December, had a bond condition stating he was not to leave the state without court approval.

However, by the time of the Aug. 11 hearing, he had moved back to Georgia.

During that hearing, Assistant District Attorney Laura Nelson raised the possibility of a bail jumping charge against Pollard and possible involvement in that crime by Damrau.

Neither Damrau, who had withdrawn as Pollard's attorney, or Parker were present for the Aug. 11 hearing.

Pollard appeared via video from Georgia.

Nelson said the court record showed no request by Pollard or Damrau for Pollard to leave the state.

"So my concern is not only that Mr. Pollard has violated a condition of his bond which makes this a felony bail jumping as well, which is serious, but also that potentially Mr. Damrau has been party to a crime in felony bail jumping as well," Nelson said, according to a transcript of the hearing.

Pollard told the court he spoke with Damrau prior to leaving.

"He said there was nothing wrong with that because I had signed the extradition paperwork," Pollard said.

Since that Aug. 11 hearing, the district attorney's office reviewed a transcript of a Feb. 3 court hearing at which Judge James Habeck in effect pre-approved Pollard's return to Georgia pending the signing of a waiver of extradition.

"We have the plan that if the extradition waiver comes in, I accept it then and we would drop the leaving Wisconsin restriction," Habeck said at the Feb. 3 hearing.

The court clerk's notes of that hearing did not indicate that, instead indicating that the no travel outside the state restriction was still in place.

A waiver of extradition was filed later that month.

"The clerk's notes from the February hearing were not clear," Parker said, which is what he said caused the confusion at the Aug. 11 hearing.

"It was not clear to us until we actually got the (Feb. 3 court hearing) transcript," he said.

Nelson was not the assistant district attorney in court at the Feb. 3 hearing, which was handled by ADA Alec Ballo while Nelson was assigned to the intake of new court cases that day.

Nelson sent a letter to Pollard, copied to the court, on Aug. 14 stating the district attorney's office is not reviewing any potential bail jumping charges.

"The State does not intend to pursue a felony bail jumping charge against you for leaving the State of Wisconsin," she wrote. "We believe you left the State on the advice of your previous attorney, which advice was based on Judge Habeck's oral statements made on February 3, 2020."

Damrau said in an email Tuesday that he and his attorney were "still working through the malicious attack on my name in court last week" and that he was not aware of the Nelson letter.

"I've heard nothing directly from Attorney Parker or his office regarding the defamation of my name in

court," he said.

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHAWANO, WISCONSIN, DOES ORDAIN THAT CHAPTER 18, SUBDIVISION AND PLATTING, SECTION 18.06 Compliance is hereby amended as follows; SECTION 18.181 Lot Line Adjustments is hereby repealed and recreated as follows; and SECTION 18.211 Fees is hereby created as follows:

§ 18.06 Compliance. No person shall divide any land located within the jurisdictional limits of these regulations which results in a subdivision, minor subdivision, lot line adjustment, parcel combination or replat as defined herein; no such subdivision, minor subdivision, lot line adjustment, parcel combination or replat shall be entitled to record and no street shall be laid out or improvements made to land without compliance with all requirements of this chapter, and:

(1) Provisions of W.S.A. Ch. 236.

(2) Rules of the Wisconsin State Department of Commerce regulating lot size and lot elevation if the land to be subdivided is not served by a public sewer and provisions for such service have not been made.

(3) Rules of the State Department of Transportation relating to safety of access and the preservation of the public interest and investment in the highway system if the land owned or controlled by the subdivider abuts on a state trunk highway or connecting street.

(4) Rules of the Department of Natural Resources, and the approval of the Department of Commerce shall be required when plat lies within 500 feet of the ordinary high-water mark or any navigable stream, lake or other body of navigable water.

(5) The Zoning Code, Official Map and all other applicable ordinances of the City.

(6) Applicable local and county ordinances.

§ 18.181 Lot Line Adjustments.

(1) General. A lot line adjustment is required anytime there is a lot line revision or change of a lot line between adjoining lots.

(2) Consultation. A preliminary consultation with City staff is required to determine potential conflicts and problems affecting the potential lot line adjustment.

(3) Plat of Survey. A Plat of Survey is required to adjust an existing lot line between two parcels. A Plat of Survey will be prepared of the parcel of land to be divided for the new lot line and a draft will be reviewed by city staff and the County Tax Lister prior to be recommended for approval.

(4) Combination Form. A Combination Form is required to combine two adjoining parcels into one parcel. A combination form will be reviewed by city staff and the County Tax Lister prior to being recommended for approval.

(5) Approval. Upon recommendation from city and county staff, the Plan Commission members shall be provided with necessary information, including the application and/or Plat of Survey, if required for their review and recommendation to Council. The Plan Commission shall refer its recommendation to the Council, with the Council making the final determination for approval.

(7) Recordation. The applicant shall record the lot line adjustment with the County Register of Deeds within 30 days of its approval by the Council.

(8) Copies. The applicant shall file five copies of the recorded certified survey map with the Clerk-Treasurer for distribution to the Director of Public Works, Building Inspector, Utility Manager, Assessor and other affected departments for their files.

§ 18.211 Fees.

There shall be a fee for a preliminary plat review, final plat review, minor subdivision and planned unit development review in an amount set by Council resolution.

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Bonduel schools plan 5 days in classrooms

School days shortened to allow for cleaning, conferencing

Bonduel School District is being bolder than most districts in north-east Wisconsin, pushing for traditional education five days per week despite the ongoing threat of the coronavirus.

While other districts are going with a hybrid model of learning, with a couple planning to do four days per week, Superintendent Joe Dawidziak said families in the Bonduel area are overwhelmingly in support of five days in the regular classrooms.

"Initially, we sent a survey out to our parents, just to gauge their interest," Dawidziak said. "It was overwhelmingly in favor of traditional, and when we asked parents to choose finally, we had 86% that want to go the traditional route."

Even though most families are happy to send their kids back to school, Dawidziak pointed out that about 14% are opting to go with a virtual education this year, similar to

what schools had to offer after Gov. Tony Evers closed down all schools in March.

Although there are five days in school, the time spent in school will be shorter. Students at Bonduel Elementary School will have 34 minutes less in the classroom compared with last year, while class time will be reduced by an hour in Bonduel's middle and high schools. Dawidziak said the school days are being shortened to allow cleaning staff to perform a deep cleaning of the facilities at the end of each day, while teachers can meet online with students in virtual learning.

"Outside of that, we're probably doing the same things that other school districts are doing," Dawidziak said. "We're putting steps in place to socially distance during lunch and recess and in the hallways. We're staggering times and those types of things."

Busing could even itself out, with Dawidziak noting that one-third of families who usually have their chil-

dren ride the bus plan to transport them on their own.

Activities will be limited in Bonduel. Dawidziak said the open house the district holds before school starts will not be taking place, and planning for other activities this fall will be "up in the air."

"I would imagine there are going to be a lot more virtual meetings," Dawidziak said. "There are going to be a lot more virtual open houses and parent-teacher conferences, those types of things, going forward."

Even though Bonduel is committed to offering traditional school each day, he noted that changes could come if the pandemic takes a sharp turn for the worse in the area.

"A lot can change between now and Sept. 1," Dawidziak said, noting that the reopening plan is similar to trying to "build a plane while we fly it."

Dawidziak said plans are in place to make changes if there is a spike in local coronavirus cases, but any decision to shift to a different learning model will be done only after con-

sulting with the Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department.

He declined to elaborate, saying, "I don't think it would be wise on my part to try to answer that now."

Dawidziak added that, if the district decides to move into a learning model where virtual education is required for all students in some capacity, he believes the district will be in a much better position to help families who are in an area where internet infrastructure is very poor or nonexistent. He noted that having to go to a virtual learning model in the spring helped the school district to work out any quirks.

"I think we're in a much better position to be able to help families if they have an issue with internet access," Dawidziak said.

They found cans, bottles, what appeared the casing for a drum and what looked like the tip of a missile or a remnant from a boat that should never have been on the Red River.

A group of about 30 volunteers spent Sunday afternoon cleaning trash from along the bottom and banks of the Red River in central Shawano County.

Jamie Besaw, Shawano, said about 30 people were expected for the second annual cleanup.

The cleanup began last year when Besaw was on the river with friends, and some property owners along the Red helped them find a cell phone in the water. He said he was impressed that they helped the paddlers, even though they also have to pull a lot of trash left by boaters and inner-tube riders every year.

“That got me thinking that we should do something” about the trash, he said.

This year, the event expanded to include drawings and a cookout after the cleanup.

The effort started at the put-in below the Red Lake Dam just east of Gresham, and continued to “The Rock,” a popular swimming hole in the Town of Richmond. Kelly Reyer, Oshkosh, who attended with her family, said this was her 29th waterway cleanup of the year. She is aiming at 50, in honor of the 50th anniversary of Earth Day.

Pack signs Kenny Clark to four-year contract extension

NT gets \$25 million signing bonus

Green Bay's Kenny Clark says he has always wanted to prove the value of nose tackles as complete players.

Now the Packers have given him a contract that showcases that.

The Packers announced Saturday they had signed the 24-year-old Clark to a contract extension without disclosing the length or terms of the deal. Clark's agent, Doug Hendrickson, confirmed an ESPN report that the 2016 first-round draft pick from UCLA agreed to terms on a deal worth \$70 million, with a \$25 million signing bonus.

"Over the years, I've just been trying to just, not get out of that (idea that) nose tackle is just a plug the gap guy and all he's worried about is run, and all that kind of stuff," Clark said. "I've just been focused on pass rushing and being

able to be an all-around player. I think this deal really solidifies that and really shows nose tackles can do both and get paid high. I'm just excited about it."

The signing was announced on the day the Packers conducted their first training camp practice as they try to take the next step after going 13-3 and losing in the NFC championship game last year.

Clark has emerged as the Packers' top defensive lineman. He recorded six sacks for the second straight season last year and was named to the Pro Bowl as an injury replacement.

"Kenny is the epitome of what we're all about here," Packers coach Matt LaFleur said. "He works hard on a daily basis. He is becoming more of a vocal leader for us and (I'm) just really happy for him."

According to NFL Next Gen Stats, Clark had 49 quarterback pressures and 43 disruptions to rank second in the league among everyone who played at least 75% of their snaps on the interior defensive line.

He has 16½ sacks over his four-year career, with all of them coming in the last three seasons.

"My biggest thing this year is I've just got to be more consistent throughout the year," Clark said. "Last year, I started off hot, kind of lulled off in the middle of the season and then ended off hot. I've just got to put a whole season together and just be consistent on a game-in, game-out basis. That's what they're paying me to do, so that's what I've

got to bring every day."

Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers says Clark at times hasn't gotten as much attention as he deserves, but added that "I think the teams that play him know how dominant he can be."

"He's a fantastic guy," Rodgers said. "He's a quiet guy who goes about his business the right way. He's found his voice at times and his leadership role has increased over the years. It's been fun to watch him kind of step into that opportunity. He's one of those guys you just know you can count on every single week."

Clark, who turns 25 on Oct. 4, was eligible to become a free agent next year. Now that the Packers have reached a long-term deal with him, they can start making decisions on all the other notable players with contracts set to expire in 2021. That list includes Pro Bowl offensive tackle David Bakhtiari, running backs Aaron Jones and Jamaal Williams, cornerback Kevin King, center Corey Linsley and guard Lane Taylor.

"I'm just excited to be a Packer for the long haul," Clark said.

WIAA maintains fall sports plan, but also introduces an alternative season

Dates for winter, spring seasons adjusted

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association unanimously approved a plan to maintain its current fall sports options but provided an option should schools need to move fall sports to the spring. The decision was made during a WIAA Board of Control meeting on Aug. 14.

The plan also adjusted season start and end dates for winter and spring sports.

No decision was made on any state tournaments, with the board saying those determinations would be made about a month before they start.

For the schools that are able and willing to offer fall sports, the start and end dates for the seasons remained the same as what the board approved in July.

Girls golf, girls tennis, girls swim and cross-country practices were allowed to start practicing Monday, with

football, boys soccer and volleyball practices opening Sept. 7.

The football and cross-country seasons will last 11 weeks each, with girls swim going 13 weeks and girls tennis playing 10 weeks. The volleyball, boys soccer and girls golf seasons would all last nine weeks.

“Football programs unable to start or complete 50 percent of the fall season, including games and practices, are eligible for a prorated alternate season,” stated the WIAA’s release from the meeting. “Other fall sports unable to start or complete 50 percent of the fall season, including games and practices, are eligible for a complete alternate season. Fall sports programs exceeding 50 percent of their seasons will be considered a completed season.”

The winter sports of gymnastics, girls basketball and boys and girls hockey would all start practicing the week of Nov. 16. Boys swim, boys basketball and wrestling would start practicing the next week.

Gymnastics and the boys and girls basketball seasons would each run 15 weeks, while boys and girls hockey would go 14 weeks. Wrestling season would last 13 weeks, and boys swim season would be 11 weeks long.

For any of the fall sports that have

to be played in the spring: girls swim teams can start practicing the week of Feb. 15, volleyball the week of Feb. 22, football and girls tennis the week of March 8, cross-country the week of March 15, boys soccer the week of March 22 and girls golf the week of March 29.

Football would last nine weeks, while the other sports would all go eight weeks. Spring football will not have any postseason play, while the other sports tentatively have weeks set aside for tournament play.

Spring track and field, baseball, softball and boys golf can all start practicing the week of April 19, while girls soccer would start the week of April 26 and boys tennis the week of May 3.

The track and field, baseball and softball seasons would all last 11 weeks, while girls soccer runs 10 weeks. Boys golf will have a nine-week season, and boys tennis an eight-week season.

All spring sports would be wrapped up by the end of June.

While there isn’t much overlap between the fall and winter sports seasons or the winter and traditional spring sports seasons, there is lots of overlap between the fall sports that move to the spring and the regular spring sports.

Only the girls swim and volleyball

seasons would be done when the first spring sports practices are starting up. The spring football and cross-country seasons each last three weeks into the track and field, baseball, softball and boys golf seasons.

The WIAA decided to not push the traditional spring sports further into the summer months to avoid conflicts with club sports and because spring sports athletes already lost an entire season this past spring.

The WIAA released a document entitled “2020 WIAA Return to Fall Sports Considerations,” which offers assistance to athletic administrators that plan to hold athletic events in the coming weeks and months. The document can be read at <https://www.wiaawi.org/Portals/0/PDF/Health/Covid/WIAA-Return-to-Fall-Sports.pdf>.

“For planning and scheduling purposes, schools will be required to initially declare if they plan to participate in the traditional fall season or the alternate fall season in the spring by Sept. 1,” stated the WIAA release. “Athletic directors at member schools will receive an email with a link to the online form to declare their intentions.”

Several WIAA rules, regulations adjusted for 2020-21

Changes provides flexibility to schools, officials and athletes

Along with approving its plan for the fall, winter and spring sports seasons on Aug. 14, the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control also addressed a number of other rules and regulations to be modified or suspended in 2020-21.

The following changes were made to provide flexibility to members and licensed officials during the pandemic:

- If tournament series are conducted, regional groupings will be implemented (four teams in football).
- All minimum number of contests requirement for tournament eligibility will be suspended.
- All tournament series seeding will be conducted virtually.

- All nonborder out-of-state competitions or practices are strongly discouraged.

- All multiple-team events from outside a host’s region are strongly discouraged.

- Co-op programs that include schools that are unable to participate in activities during 2020-21 may seek other co-op partners to provide opportunities for participation.

- With conference approval, schools whose conference has canceled sports in 2020-21 may seek schedule relief with other conferences as an independent without sanctions or going through the prescribed conference realignment process.

- For 2020-21, programs may

schedule contests after they are eliminated from the WIAA tournament or culminating event.

- Schools that were unable to conduct their five unrestricted coaching contact days during the 2020 summer may schedule those days during the 2020-21 calendar provided there is one week of no contact prior to the start of the respective season. However, during the closed-session meeting, the board directed staff to have discussions on coaching contact during 2020-21 placed on the agenda of the September meeting.

- Licensed officials will not drop in classification in 2021-22 if they choose not to renew licensure or are unable to fill a varsity schedule in 2020-21.

The board also determined student-athletes may compete in no more than two non-school events with school approval during each regular sports season in 2020-21 only, which adopts the middle-level regulation. An “event” will be defined as a game or tournament.

The “Return to Fall Sports Considerations” (<https://www.wiaawi.org/Portals/0/PDF/Health/Covid/WIAA-Return-to-Fall-Sports.pdf>) was approved for distribution to the membership and for placement on the COVID-19 page of the WIAA website. Also passed was a recommendation to add language to the code of conduct section of the rules of eligibility, clarifying how schools respond to allegations of sexual harassment at school or at school-sponsored events.

Please be advised of the following requirements to appear before the board of review and procedural requirements if appearing before the board:

1. No person will be allowed to appear before the board of review, to testify to the board by telephone, or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the assessor to view the property.
2. After the first meeting of the board of review and before the board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the board of review may contact or provide information to a member of the board about the person's objection, except at a session of the board.
3. The board of review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, and the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.
4. Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.
5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.
6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s. 73.03 (2a), Wis. stats., that the assessor requests. The Town of Washington has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph that provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court.* The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35 (1), Wis. stats.
7. The board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the board a letter from a physician, surgeon, or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability.
