City gets approval for downtown grant

State funding will cover cost of proposed plaza

The city of Shawano is moving forward with plans for a long-talked about downtown plaza that could be in place in the 200 block of South Main Street by sometime next year.

The city was informed Friday it had been approved for a state Public Facilities Grant that will provide two-thirds of the cost of the project.

The city's share of that matching grant, however, will not come from taxpayers. Instead, the city is being allowed to use existing Community

Development Block Grant money as its contribution.

The city has roughly \$508,000 in state CDBG funds available for economic development projects benefiting the community. That money has to be used by February 2021 when the state pulls the plug on the CDBG program.

The state Public Facilities Grant triples the CDBG money that had been available. Some of that money will go to tearing down a blighted downtown property formerly owned by the Samanta Roy Institute of Science and Technology.

The city acquired the long-vacant building at 214-216 S. Main St.

in November. The plan would be to use the property to build out a public space for the downtown plaza. The hope is to create a plaza that would connect downtown Main Street with Franklin Park, a block away on Washington Street.

There is no timeline as yet for when the buildings will come down. The city will seek requests for proposals for the demolition work, City Administrator Eddie Sheppard said.

The next step will be planning and engineering designs for the plaza.

Utility disconnection ban still in place

Unpaid bills could go to landlords

A statewide moratorium on utility service disconnection remains in effect after a meeting of the Public Service Commission last week, but collection efforts on delinquent accounts are still going on, and landlords in Shawano could end up footing the bill for tenants who haven't paid up.

The Shawano Municipal Utilities Commission held a special meeting Monday to discuss whether there should be any change to the utility's long-standing policy of adding delinquent utility bills to the landlords' annual tax assessment.

The commission agreed the policy, which has been in place for several decades in the city, should continue, but with a little extra heads-up for landlords that the unpaid balance could end up on their tax bills.

SMU has not been able to disconnect any delinquent services since

Nov. 1 when the winter moratorium went into effect.

That normally ends on April 15, but the PSC extended it because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Lifting of the moratorium was pushed off several times and was delayed by the PSC again last week by a 2-1 vote until at least Oct. 1.

The PSC will review it again on Sept. 17, but utility officials don't expect the PSC to lift the moratorium for what would only be one month before the winter moratorium goes into effect in November.

Under the city's policy, all unpaid utility balances more than 30 days delinquent on Oct. 1 are set aside for possible property tax collection.

Tax collection notices are mailed to all affected property owners on Oct. 15.

The SMU commission asked that landlords and tenants be notified earlier than that.

"We intend to do that with the September notices," SMU General Manager Brian Knapp said.

A 10% penalty is added if the amounts are still unpaid on Nov. 1.

After Nov. 15, all unpaid property

tax collection balances and penalties are placed on the tax roll as a special charge against the parcel of real estate.

The policy doesn't apply to utility customer who have a deferred payment agreement that is in good standing or who enter into one before the tax roll deadline.

"We're required to notify landlords in advance and help get payment from their (tenants) before it goes on the tax roll," Knapp said. "Anything we put on the tax roll, landlords can use as a lien against the tenant's personal property."

Though not all municipal utilities use the tax roll option, it is allowed under state law.

"Some of these folks have no intention of paying or are unable to pay," Knapp said. "They will just walk out."

SMU currently has a total of \$170,000 in unpaid balances from 323 customers.

Knapp said "several handfuls" of those customers have not paid since November.

Baraboo man charged in Star Lake shooting death

A Baraboo man was being held in the Aug. 21 shooting death of his sister at their mother's home near Mountain.

Christopher G. Halase, 29, is charged in Oconto County Circuit Court with second-degree reckless homicide, homicide by the negligent use of a dangerous weapon, and a misdemeanor charge of operating a firearm with a controlled substance.

The victim, a 31-year-old Reedsburg woman identified in the criminal complaint only as AH, was pronounced dead on arrival at Langlade Memorial Hospital in Antigo a short time after the 12:52 a.m. incident at a residence on Heller Lane in the Town of Doty, at Star Lake northwest of Mountain.

According to the complaint, AH and her husband were sitting with her mother in a bedroom while Halase was outside shooting a pistol. A short time later Halase appeared in the doorway, pointed the gun at AH and

it went off, striking her in the neck.

All witnesses said there were no arguments or disagreements before the incident occurred, and Halase apparently did not realize there was a bullet in the gun's chamber, the complaint said.

Halase was coming to visit his mother and arranged for AH, her husband and her children, ages 3 and 5, also to come to the home for a family get-together. The group had drinks and food at the Halfway Bar before the incident.

A distraught Halase had to be wrestled into a squad car and was screaming about how his sister had been shot when deputies arrived, the complaint said.

Halase had not yet made an appearance in court, and authorities had not released AH's full name as of late Tuesday afternoon.

What's Parker's motive for smearing Damrau?

To the editor:

Shawano-Menominee District Attorney Greg Parker represented to this paper that he asked the Office of Lawyer Regulation (OLR) to investigate any wrongdoing by his office regarding statements made by his assistant DA regarding his political opponent, Aaron Damrau, and Damrau's former client E.C.P.

ADA Laura Nelson stated in court on Aug. 11 that E.C.P. violated bond by leaving the state and that potentially Aaron Damrau was party to a crime of felony bail jumping. OLR considers complaints about lawyer ethics brought by third parties against lawyers or lawyers self-reporting unethical behavior which is kind of like confessing one's sins.

One might ask what motive Parker office might have for smearing Damrau. Consider the following:

- Damrau is Greg Parker's election opponent.
- Parker is upset that Damrau, a county supervisor questioned Parker about DA expenditures related to the cost of out-of-county service of subpoenas.
- Damrau maintains that Parker and his office lack professionalism; fail to timely file documents resulting in dismissals; has a miserable record of dismissals based on lack of preparation; fail to prosecute cases; refuse to prosecute child support felonies; fail to cooperate with the drug court; and cause excessive taxpayer expense and inconveniences jurors for cancelled jury trials, etc.

Before alleging serious crimes against unrepresented defendants and impugning the integrity of Parker's political opponent, any prosecutor's office worth their salt would've taken a deep dive into the facts of a case and the law. The logical action here would've been to get a transcript, which no one from the DA's office

requested before freely lobbing false felony accusations.

The facts show that at the Feb. 3 hearing, Judge James Habeck said, "Then, of course, we have a plan that if the extradition waiver comes in, I accept it then and we would drop the leaving Wisconsin restriction." This is a court order modifying bond.

ADA Alec Ballo was present at the Feb. 2 bond hearing, presumably with the file for the purpose of taking brief notes as to what transpired. Either Ballo accurately recorded the bond was modified and leaving the state is allowed or he failed to do his job.

OLR will investigate the conduct of Parker and his office and determine whether there were violations of Supreme Court rules on ethics, and if so, what sanctions could apply from private reprimands to suspension or revocation of licenses to practice law.

County should speak out on gerrymandering

The Shawano County Board should pass a resolution urging the Wisconsin Legislature to ban gerrymandering and establish a process of independent, nonpartisan redistricting.

We're falling behind on this in Shawano County. Already, 52 other county boards have passed such a resolution — including our neighbors in Langlade, Marathon, Oconto, Outagamie and Waupaca counties.

It's time we stepped up.

Gerrymandering — the rigging of district maps — is undemocratic. It takes people's voices away. It leads to uncompetitive districts and unrepresentative and unresponsive politicians. Those who are in "safe" seats don't have to listen to citizens in their own districts who disagree with them. They can just blow them off.

Politicians should run scared.

When I was in office and someone called me at midnight and told me they weren't feeling well, I'd practically drive some aspirin over at 1 in the morning.

Because of gerrymandering and one-party rule in the Legislature, we've also seen that county governments lose their power. More than 180 laws were passed after the 2011 gerrymandering that took away our local control.

County board members, of all people, should be able to understand that.

So let's fix this problem. We don't need to reinvent the wheel here. Iowa solved the problem 40 years ago. It passed a law saying that career civil servants — not the politicians in power — draw the maps. That law specifies that they can't use any data on how people voted in past elections when they are drawing the new maps.

This process has worked great in Iowa for four decades, and it'll work great here in Wisconsin if we give it a chance.

Keep the counting going on census

President Donald Trump has just dramatically escalated his attacks on a fair and accurate census count. In early August, he announced that the census will end one month early. That's right. Common Cause has sued the Trump administration over its census manipulation. Trump needs to learn that the 2020 Census is off-limits to his political meddling. It is paramount to give the census bureau the time and resources it needs to conduct an accurate and equitable count.

Every avenue is being worked on to restore the integrity of the 2020 Census and get the accurate count that government agencies, businesses and charities rely on. We should all be genuinely concerned about this fight to save the 2020 Census or it will get lost in the 24-hour news cycle — and that if we don't act, the consequences will be with us for the next 10-plus years.

Not only will the new legislative districts drawn after the census be in place until 2030, but letting the census become a partisan, political tool will be a defining moment for fair representation in this country. We cannot allow this to happen.

That's why we must go all out — right here and right now — to protect the 2020 Census from political manipulation. Please help to eliminate Trump's plan to end the census early, provide the full funding we need and make sure that every single person who lives in the United States is included in the final count.

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Packers football returns, but lacking the buzz of fans

In a normal year, the NFL matchups get rolling in early August with a handful of preseason games, the kickoff to a season that culminates with the Super Bowl in February.

NFL fans however, especially those who call the Green Bay Packers their favorite franchise, are tuned in well before August — starting as early as April when teams go through their offseason programs. From that point, excitement builds as teams partake in voluntary minicamps, organized team activities and mandatory minicamps before jumping in to training camp practices and preseason games.

This year's NFL schedule was heavily altered by the COVID-19 pandemic though, and it's slowed the excitement process for fans.

The Packers and the rest of the NFL spent April through July doing virtual meetings and quarantined workouts, meaning there were no practice photos, videos or stories for fans to digest. Extensive COVID-19 testing then preceded the start of training camp, which opened Aug. 15 for the green and gold.

Even though football has returned to Green Bay, it's still a far different feel than in years past.

The Packers announced that their training camp practices would be off limits to fans, meaning the only individuals at daily practices are team members and a select few members of the media. After attending a few training camp practices over the past couple years, I got to take in my first COVID practice Saturday.

While the activities on the field were very similar to past practices, it was also missing something that's extremely important in Green Bay — the energy of fans.

Players could be heard celebrating after big plays or impressive individual feats, but the buzz from the usually packed bleachers at Ray Nitschke Field was absent.

Perfectly thrown deep balls from quarterback Aaron Rodgers drew oohs and aahs from other offensive players, something that's normally drowned out by the roar of the crowd. An interception got the de

fensive side of the ball fired up, but something still felt off without the fans there to react.

It's a sign of things to come this NFL season, as many stadiums will be without fans.

The Packers announced in early August that Lambeau Field wouldn't host any fans during the team's first two home games — Sept. 20 vs. the Detroit Lions and Oct. 5 vs. the Atlanta Falcons. The way the team's schedule lays out, the organization will have plenty of time to decide if fans will be allowed after that, as the team's third home game isn't until Nov. 1 against the Minnesota Vikings.

Green Bay has its final six home games over the last 10 regular-season weeks. COVID concerns eliminated all four preseason games this season, meaning every game a team plays will be meaningful. Green Bay opens the season on the road against the Vikings on Sept. 13.

The lack of crowds at the games will affect some teams more than others, and the Packers could be among the teams that are most impacted, especially during home games.

Lambeau Field has hosted 350 consecutive sellouts and has proven

to be one of the hardest places for road teams to win. According to teamranking.com, the Packers have the fourth-best winning percentage at home (70.7) over the past five years and second-best percentage (77.4) if you look at the past 10 years.

When head coach Matt LaFleur was hired by the Packers in 2019, the coach prodded the organization and fans to make Lambeau even louder and more difficult for road teams to play at than in years past, and it came to fruition.

With various video packages and

an announcer hyping up the crowd, the Packers rolled to a 7-1 regular-season record at Lambeau last year, tied for the best mark in the NFL. The raucous crowd also helped the team earn a playoff win against the Seattle Seahawks.

While green and gold fans cheer on their favorite team from a place outside the stadium this year, the team will have to learn how to create its own energy for at least two home games. The NFL is discussing whether to allow home teams to pipe in crowd noise, similar to what the MLB and NBA is doing for crowdless games, so at least there might be some noise that goes along with the play on the field.

Regardless of how many fans are in attendance or what kind of noise is produced, the 2020 season is going to have a much different feel to it. Still, Packers football is still Packers football, and you and I should be thankful that we'll get the chance to watch their games and then be able to talk about them for the next several days before they take the field again.

Federal grant may aid Oconto Falls senior center

\$1.1 million upgrade is in line for CDBG funding

Nearly 40 years after it was dedicated, the Oconto Falls Senior and Community Center is due for a makeover, and a pending grant from the federal Community Development Block Grant program may pave the way.

The city and Oconto County Economic Development Corp. are working together on an application for \$1.1 million in CDBG-CLOSE funds, so named because the money came available after the state Department of Administration closed HUD-funded local revolving-fund loan programs. Municipalities like Oconto Falls were asked to return the loan funds, then encouraged to apply to receive the money back to pay for eligible projects.

Projects must serve at least 51% low- and moderate-income families and individuals to qualify for the CDBG-CLOSE program, said Paul Ehrfurth, OCEDC executive director, during an Aug. 18 public hearing at Oconto Falls City Hall.

"Folks who utilize the senior center are presumed to be persons of low and moderate income because of their status as being elderly," Ehrfurth said. "It's referred to as a limited clientele."

Deb Arndt, president of the senior center board of directors, said the building was last improved a little more than a decade ago, when the original siding was replaced and

\$40,000 of remodeling installed.

"It's 100% better than it was but needs to be better," Arndt said.

Key components of the proposed renovation are a canopy over the front entrance, to allow seniors to enter from a vehicle under cover, and a new elevator to improve access to the basement. The only way that people in wheelchairs can reach the basement now is in a cramped freight elevator, in effect making half of the

center's 50,000 square feet inaccessible to people with disabilities.

Both floors have large meeting rooms, kitchens and smaller offices or conference spaces. For a few years the Oconto Falls School District used rooms in the basement for its New-Path Charter School but has since found another space, said Jim Damp, board vice president.

The renovation would reconfigure the building's interior to allow a

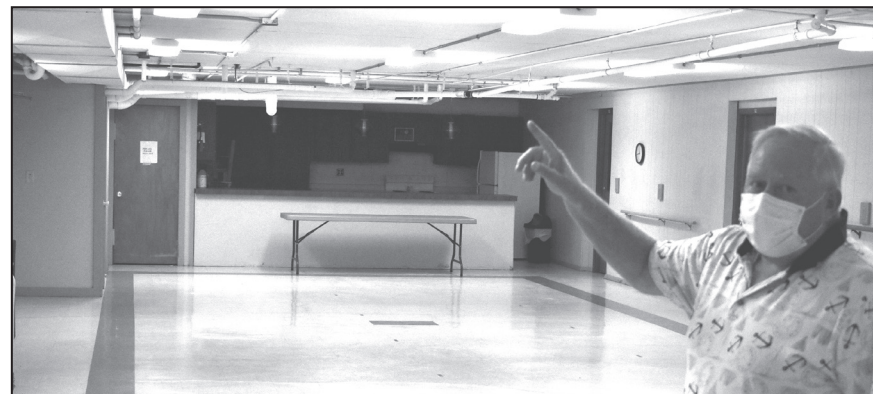
greater variety of programs and more efficient use of space, Arndt said. The project would also better waterproof the basement, Damp added.

The Oconto Falls City Council approved the concept at its July meeting. With the successful public hearing, the OCEDC is finalizing the application, so the project could be underway by spring, Ehrfurth said.

College experience changing during pandemic

CMN puts in Plexiglas, other health and safety measures to protect students and staff

Classes started up at the College of Menominee Nation last week, and returning students couldn't help but notice the way their classrooms had changed.

Fewer desks and chairs are in place in classrooms. Teachers are teaching behind a wall of Plexiglas as large, flat-screen televisions showcase information in the way that blackboards and whiteboards used to.

Buildings have temperature kiosks at their main entrances. Looking like overgrown iPhones, the kiosks check the temperature of anyone entering the building, and anyone with a temperature over 100 degrees will be asked to leave.

Additional distance learning facilities were added to allow more classes to be taught by professors on the Green Bay campus, or even by visiting faculty from outside the state or country. There are also labs set up so that staff on the Keshena campus can teach to two adjacent classrooms if a class gets more students than there are available desks.

The campus commons has even transformed. A kitchen where students could whip up a quick meal is closed. Small study areas are closed

off, and more open areas for study have fewer chairs. Hangout areas are no longer there to avoid the risk of students congregating and spreading the coronavirus.

It's not the same college experience their parents had, or even the same as last year before Gov. Tony Evers closed all learning institutions in March — including colleges and universities. However, it is the college experience that needs to exist in order to continue to teach adults and further their education, according to Geraldine Sanapaw, CMN's interim academic officer.

"We've rearranged our classrooms to allow for social distancing so there is 6 feet between all students," Sanapaw said. "We're removing extra tables and chairs to discourage anybody from sharing tables."

The college also has a tent outside that it used this summer for children's programs, but it will also be used by faculty to allow for outside classes as long as the weather cooperates, Sanapaw said.

"You're not inside that confined room where it's easier to spread germs," she said. "That'll be limited once the weather gets cold, but that is an option."

Students were able to select from three types of classes, similar to the learning models that K-12 schools are adopting. Sanapaw said there are classes that are taught face to face, classes that are completely online and a hybrid version that incorporates both learning styles.

"With the online classes, students do not have to come on the campus at all," Sanapaw said. "With the

hybrid, a minimum of 25% (of the class) must be face to face.”

The classes that require some face-to-face interaction include any that require lab work — including welding, electrical and other technical education classes. Those classes are set up so only one or two students meet in the lab with the instructor at a given time, according to Sanapaw.

She noted that there are certain English and business classes that require interacting with the instructor. Incoming freshmen are being encouraged to take the in-person English courses, as they require a lot of writing, which necessitates the interaction with a teacher.

“We want to encourage the student and the instructor to make a connection,” Sanapaw said. “That way, if we do end up going all online like we did in the spring, at least we’re getting that connection between the student and the faculty member so they kind of get to know each other a little bit. This is their first semester in college, and we want to make sure that they’re successful.”

The first week has been an experience. On the second day of classes, Aug. 18, the internet went down for the Menominee reservation and several surrounding communities due to a fiberoptic cable in Schofield being cut, Sanapaw noted, which made delivering and accessing the online courses difficult.

“The internet’s always going to be a problem with us being located so remotely,” Sanapaw said. “The outage affected a number of schools and our community, but it’s something in the back of our minds as we try to get hotspots for students, and we try to order extra laptops so they can check them out so that they have the equipment.”

CMN has also implemented a new learning system, Canvas, in the hopes of creating some consistency for students. Sanapaw said instructors had been using different online programs like Google Classroom, Google Hangout and Zoom.

Teachers were called back to work earlier than normal in order to train on the Canvas system so it could be rolled out when the fall semester started, according to Sanapaw.

“They’ll be able to upload homework, have discussions with other classes,” she said.

CMN was already moving toward having a system where online and in-person learning could intertwine long before the pandemic hit. After a

harsh winter two years ago required many school days to be canceled, college officials looked at ways to allow teaching to continue — even on days when getting to campus was

next to impossible.

CMN has an advantage over most other colleges because it doesn’t have the food services, recreation center, housing and other programs that larger colleges have; ergo it will not have to deal with layoffs on the same scale as other higher learning institutions as the risk of closure continues. However, there are plenty of other things that have impacted the college, according to Sanapaw.

“We would do potluck sessions to encourage students to come to tutoring sessions, but we can’t do that now (for health reasons),” Sanapaw

said. “You can’t have buffet-style events happening. That is something we’re looking at this fall — how can we encourage students to come to the tutoring and other services we have available for them?”

The college is part of the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin’s infrastructure, and whenever closures take place by the tribe — like one in early August — CMN might have to follow suit. Sanapaw believes the college is prepared, though.

“We’ve been preparing for the worst and hoping for the best,” Sanapaw said.

Menominee Indian High School announced Monday morning that it was postponing its fall football and girls volleyball seasons. The school's cross-country team will still participate in the fall season.

The announcement was made in a press release from Wendell Waukau, the superintendent of the Menominee Indian School District.

"In making this decision, we factored in the safety and well-being of our entire Menominee community as well as our ability to safely open schools to students on Sept. 21," the press release read. "As the year

progresses, we will evaluate the health concerns and how it impacts our participation in all our extracurricular activities."

The school will attempt to play its football and volleyball seasons during the alternate fall season, which will take place after the winter sports season and end after the start of the spring season. Athletes will be allowed to participate in multiple sports.

"Obviously disappointed, but it doesn't come as a huge shock," said Menominee Indian football coach Chris Clache of the news. "I've been pretty honest with my guys all summer that this was a possibility; things could change real quick. As a coach, dis-

pointed, but we're adults and we can process this and move on."

Clache believes his team handled the news as well as they could have and will respond in a positive manner moving forward. He didn't anticipate losing too many players to spring sports.

The football season will start practice the week of March 8 and wrap up the week of May 3. There is not any tournament play for that football season.

The alternate volleyball season is set to start practice during the week of Feb. 22 and end the week of April 12.

Chuck Raasch, Menominee Indian's athletic director, said the school had been 50/50 on whether it would play this fall, and it had let its conference opponents know that. Menominee

Indian's football team was set to join the Northwoods Conference this fall, while the volleyball squad plays in the Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division.

While those two conferences are planning on playing conference schedules this fall, Raasch and Clache didn't anticipate any problems with scheduling games in the alternate season.

They said they'd be willing to travel across the state if that's what it takes to get the athletes some game action.

The press release also stated that there would not be any fall sports or extracurricular activities at Menominee Indian Middle School or Keshena Primary School.

Love learning from Rodgers while adapting to NFL

Rookie QB competing with Boyle for backup job

Green Bay Packers rookie Jordan Love says he has tried not to pay attention to all the media speculation surrounding the team's long-term quarterback plans now that they've drafted him as Aaron Rodgers' potential successor.

Love instead is trying to soak in as much as possible as the former Utah State quarterback watches Rodgers go about his business.

"It's great for me just being able to sit there, be in the same room as him, and just hear how he thinks about plays and go out to practice

and watch him put it together," Love said. "It's really awesome for me to see and take in and evaluate him and evaluate myself and just try to do my best job to learn by watching him."

The Packers' decision to trade up four spots in the first round to take Love with the 26th overall pick in the draft naturally led to questions about how many more seasons Rodgers might remain in Green Bay.

Rodgers, a two-time MVP with four years remaining on his contract, has acknowledged the move surprised him. The situation has drawn comparisons to Rodgers' arrival at Green Bay and the awkward transi-

tion that took place when he replaced Brett Favre after backing him up for three seasons.

Love had nothing but positive things to say about Rodgers.

"It's been really good," Love said. "He's a great person and has been able to help me in the quarterback room on certain things."

Rodgers has said he always has gotten along well with his backup quarterbacks and expects that to continue with Love. Rodgers has noted the shared background they have since both weren't highly touted recruits coming out of high school.

Love was regarded as less polished than other top quarterback prospects in this draft after throwing 17 interceptions last season at Utah

State. The Packers are betting on his upside, which was more apparent in 2018 when Love threw 32 touchdown passes and only six interceptions on a stronger Utah State team.

If you are like most people, you will have at least one episode of low back pain in your lifetime. Low back pain is most commonly associated with heavy physical work, lifting or forceful movement, bending or twisting, awkward positions or standing in one position too long. Even minor events may

Typically, the pain varies from severe and long-term to mild and short-lived.

Although low back pain has been considered self-limiting, recent research suggests that it is not. The results of several research studies show that short-term symptoms do not always resolve in one to two months. Instead, they tend to recur intermittently in most patients. Once chronic, the condition is associated with long-term disability and work absence.

Health care research teams have concluded that exercise helps reduce pain and improve function in people

with low back pain. Exercise can also be preventive. But exact exercise types and goals have been elusive.

An international medical team examined the relationship between physical fitness and low back pain. They discovered that higher levels of physical fitness, both muscular endurance and aerobic, were associated with about a 40% reduced risk of low back pain.

However, both low and high levels of physical activity were associated with about a 40% increased risk of low back pain. Thus, physical activity of an intensity that improves physical fitness helps prevent low back pain, but excessive exercise and

no exercise do not.

What does this mean to someone with low back pain or someone wanting to reduce the chance of a low back pain attack? The answer is to measure your current level of fitness for spinal muscular endurance and aerobics. Then develop an exercise program that increases your fitness. Please note that before starting any exercise program, you should consult with your health care professional.

Sober driving campaign continues through Labor Day

The Shawano Police Department is joining law enforcement agencies throughout Wisconsin during the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign, which takes place through Labor Day.

"About every three hours in Wisconsin, someone is injured or killed in an alcohol-related crash," Lt. Mike Musolf said. "This is not about

stopping or arresting motorists. This is about saving lives and preventing needless tragedies by encouraging drivers to be safe and responsible."

Last year in Wisconsin, there were 6,058 alcohol-related crashes that injured 2,918 people and resulted in 140 deaths (about one-quarter of all traffic fatalities), according to Musolf.

While alcohol-impaired drivers

remain a concern, a growing problem involves drug-impaired drivers — people whose ability to safely operate a motor vehicle is compromised by legal or illegal drugs, including prescription and over-the-counter medications.

Citizens can help in several ways:

- Identify a sober designated driver or find a safe alternative way home.

Never allow someone to get behind the wheel impaired.

- Ensure everyone is buckled up. Watch yourspeed and eliminate distractions.

- If you suspect a driver is impaired, call 911.

- Download the free "Drive Sober" mobile app from the WisDOT website.

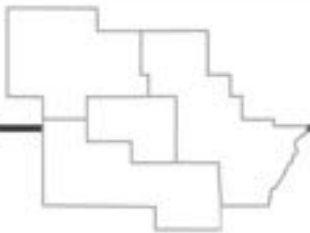
