3 arrested after drug bust

One suspect out on bond in pending felonies

Three people, including a man out on bond in two other felony cases, were arrested after a drug bust in the Town of Richmond last week.

Authorities executed a search warrant at the residence of Lee E. Lindner, 33, of Shawano, as part of an ongoing drug investigation in Shawano County.

Lindner, Alisha C. Henning, 28, of Shawano, and a male from the Clintonville area were taken into custody.

Authorities did not identify the Clintonville subject.

Lindner was charged with two felony counts of maintaining a drug trafficking place, as well as felony counts of possession of methamphetamine and possession of narcotic drugs.

He was also charged with seven felony counts of bail jumping and several misdemeanor drug counts.

He could face a maximum 3½ years in prison and \$10,000 fine on each of

the felony drug counts and six years and a \$10,000 fine on each of the bail jumping counts.

Lindner was out on bond in two other felony cases that are still pending.

He was first arrested July 31 of last year after authorities executed a previous search warrant at his residence.

He was identified in a criminal complaint as “a large-scale supplier of illegal drugs in the Shawano County area.”

He was charged with multiple felony drug counts, including delivering methamphetamine, manufacture and delivery of marijuana and maintaining a drug trafficking place, all with the use of a dangerous weapon, as well as felony bail jumping.

The state requested a \$25,000 cash bond for Lindner.

Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge James Habeck instead set a \$500 cash bond, along with a \$4,500 signature bond.

Lindner posted that bond on Aug.

6, 2019, the day after his initial appearance. He had been free on that bond for one week before being arrested again, this time on three felony counts of bail jumping and two misdemeanor counts of obstructing an officer.

Habeck once again set a \$500 cash bond.

This time, Lindner was ordered held on a \$15,000 cash bond set by Family Court Commissioner Luanna Henk. He is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance Sept. 14.

Henning is charged with a felony count of possession of methamphetamine and four counts of felony bail jumping.

She was ordered held on a \$2,500 cash bond set by Henk and is scheduled for an adjourned initial appearance Sept. 14.

The search warrant was executed by the Shawano County Sheriff's Office, Shawano Police Department, Wisconsin Department of Justice-Division of Criminal Investigation, Wisconsin State Patrol and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency.

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Shawano man charged in string of burglaries

A Shawano man has been charged with multiple felony counts of burglary and auto theft in connection with an alleged spree of break-ins that took place from May through July of last year.

David G. Reynolds, 29, is accused of seven counts of burglary and attempted burglary, including arming himself with a dangerous weapon in two of the incidents, and three counts of auto theft.

He also faces 44 felony counts of bail jumping, two felony counts of theft, one felony count of possession of burglary tools and numerous misdemeanor counts of theft and criminal damage to property.

According to the criminal complaint, the alleged burglaries took place in the towns of Waukechon and Herman between May 19 and July 15, 2019, and included residences, hunting cabins, campers, a barn

and a shed.

He is accused of arming himself with a stolen machete on one occasion, and with a hunting knife and BB gun on another.

Reynolds is also accused of stealing a handgun during one of the burglaries.

One of the alleged auto thefts took place in the Town of Washington.

In July of last year, Shawano police tried to pull over a vehicle for having an expired registration. The vehicle fled the scene and a pursuit ended when police lost sight of the car.

The vehicle then fled from a second attempted traffic stop by Shawano County sheriff's deputies before crashing near Sandy Lane and County Road K.

Reynolds was identified as the driver and taken into custody, according to the complaint. The car had been reported stolen out of New London.

A search of the vehicle turned up several items reported stolen in

the burglary spree, according to the complaint.

Reynolds could face a maximum 15 years in prison and \$50,000 fine on each count of armed burglary and 12 1/2 years and a \$25,000 fine on each of the other burglary counts.

The other felony counts each carry a possible maximum of six years and a \$10,000 fine.

Reynolds, who is in custody for a pending case of auto theft in Waupaca County, is due in Shawano County court for an initial appearance on Sept. 28.

An alleged party to the burglaries — Breanna M. Tindle, 27, of Shawano — has already been charged in the case.

Tindle faces eight felony counts of burglary, three counts of auto theft, felony bail jumping and other charges.

She is scheduled for a preliminary hearing on Sept. 11.

Shawano dog park finally has its day

Facility open for business as city sets future grand opening date

The city of Shawano has finally unleashed its long-awaited dog park, which quietly went into service last week while the city works out future plans for a ribboncutting and official grand opening.

There are still some minor finishing touches to be done over the next few weeks on the Animal Recreation Facility (ARF), located at the corner of Industrial Drive and Jaycee Court, but canine visitors and their owners can make use of the facility now.

Park and Recreation Director Matt Hendricks said a grand opening would probably take place this fall, but the park was basically opened for business once the public picked up the scent.

“With the fences being up and the gates in place, which are obviously the primary piece, people kind of started finding it,” Hendricks said. “They got to wondering what it was and what’s going on, so the story kind of got going.”

Hendricks said the grand opening could take place in late September or early October.

The ARF currently features perimeter fencing, double-gate entry, separation between large and small dog areas, benches, and waste bag dispensers.

Donations that helped make the dog park a reality include \$15,000 from the Nora Jende Charitable Fund and \$2,000 from the Triple MT Group, along with other donations from various other individuals, ac-

cording to the city.

“These donations combined with city funds are what made this highly anticipated development a reality,” the city said in a news release. “The ARF offers our community a dedicated and safe environment for dogs to exercise and for people to socialize with other pet owners and enjoy time outdoors.”

The city put up \$30,000 toward the facility in its capital improvement projects budget.

The park was designed to accommodate future amenities, should funds become available through additional donations or sponsorships.

Hendricks said some trees will be planted on the spring, and other items on the future wish list could include a water source, dog agility components and some small struc-

tures to provide shade.

“As far as I know, it’s the only one in Shawano County and it’s been talked about since long before I got here,” Hendricks said. “It’s cool to finally be able to offer one to the community.”

The city asks that visitors obey the rules posted at the park, including that dogs be legally licensed and vaccinated.

Owners are also asked to pick up after their dogs. Waste receptacles are available on site.

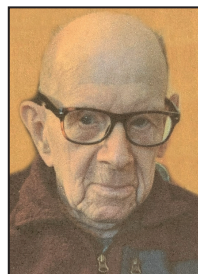

Apple and pear harvest time approaches

Most gardeners and homeowners have one or more fruit trees and are starting to wonder when their fruit will be ready for eating, sauce making or pie baking. Some of the earliest maturing apples are already mature, but most apple cultivars and all pear cultivars are still going through the maturation and ripening processes. There are some physical signs to watch for in your fruits to help you assess when they are at optimum harvest timing.

Unfortunately, we can't just look at the calendar and know that a particular apple or pear cultivar is mature and ready to harvest. If you have a few years of experience with your trees, you will have good ideas as to their maturity timing, but a particular cultivar's true maturity may change as much as two weeks from year to year. Instead of the date, we have to rely on physical clues that fruits give us, and maybe adding in a little bit of minor detective work.

The most commonly used and most easily seen clue is skin color. Overall fruit skin color changes over time, usually going from bright green early in the year, to duller green, then moving toward the fruit's final color. Fully red fruits will have subtle color changes, such as having less bright coloration or developing/losing some degree of mottling, but color change is difficult to assess with these cultivars.

Color change of any cultivar that is yellow, mottled or not completely red is at least a good indicator of maturation. In particular, you want to look at the area inside of the stem indent. This zone's color, known as the ground

color, is the last area to change as the fruit nears maturity. When this area changes from greens to yellows and reds, that is a strong indicator the fruit is nearing maturity.

The other physical aspect we can use as an indicator without cutting fruit open is their general hardness. As fruits mature, flesh density changes from hard to firm to soft. Soft means that the fruits are overmature and have already started losing flavor and storage capability. Firm versus hard can be assessed with finger pressure. Pushing onto the fruit with your thumb consistently as days or weeks pass, you will be able to feel the resistance differences. Immature fruit are more baseball like, whereas maturing fruit flesh will give a bit, and overmature fruit yield very easily to pressure.

The other two key indicators require a knife, as they are seed color and starch-to-sugar conversion. These also get us to the discussion of mature versus ripe. A mature fruit has seeds that are capable of germinating. A ripe fruit has converted nearly all of its starch content into sugars. An overripe fruit has completed all starch conversion and is going to decrease in quality quickly.

Seeds of ripe apples turn brown, but you need to cut a fruit open to see this trait. Many cultivars will be ripe before their seeds turn completely brown, especially early

maturing types. Thus, you do need to conduct this assessment consistently and watch for changes from white to part brown to full brown. Also, knowing how that cultivar's change has occurred in past years gives you a very good indicator of their status in the current year.

Starch conversion is harder to measure, but discerning palates can do so pretty readily. Immature fruits store energy in the form of starches. As fruits mature, the starches are converted into sugars. The sugars are meant to attract beings like us to eat the fruit and then spread the seed naturally. A full starch fruit is bland tasting, at best. Fruits that have transformed all starch into sugar are going to be soft and overly sweet, and will likely have started losing some of their typical cultivar trait flavors. Assessing this conversion takes practice and consistent sampling over time, probably with some accompanying sour looks on your own face.

Conversely, if you want to take a more scientific approach and do a home science project with kids or grandkids, you can cut fruits in half and dip them in an iodine solution. Iodine stains starch a purple coloration, so you can truly see and compare maturity of one fruit to another and from week to week. The starch to sugar conversions generally start near the seeds and work outward through the fruit. Thus, immature fruits will be stained throughout the cut surface, while maturing fruits will only stain in a ring under the skin. Of course, if you do this, be careful and wear appropriate nitrile or similar gloves, as the iodine solution is poisonous. Also, do not eat tested fruit,

nor give them to livestock.

Pears undergo the same types of changes as detailed above for apples. The issue with pear maturation is that it tends to happen more quickly, meaning that color and density transitions will be faster. Also, pears should not be allowed to ripen on the tree. Instead, they need to be picked and properly stored in the house to let them mature. A pear that is left to mature on the tree will often go from ripe to mature to overmature in a matter of days, leaving you with very low quality fruit that may not even be usable anymore.

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Phoenix Players rising from COVID ashes

Two shows planned to entertain local audiences

The local arts scene has been quiet for the last few months as the coronavirus pandemic continues to limit large gatherings, but the Phoenix Players are working to find a way around that.

Two shows are on the horizon for the Clintonville-based theater group, according to co-founder Brandon Byng. Both will be featured on the Phoenix Players' Facebook page, allowing patrons to enjoy some entertainment from the safety and comfort of home.

The group is currently accepting audition videos through Sept. 5 for its quarantine cabaret. Anyone is invited to submit videos of themselves showcasing songs, dances and other musical acts. According to Byng, six acts have already submitted audition videos, but he's hoping to have at least a dozen different acts to fill out an hourlong performance.

"It's not going to be a live event, but we're asking people to submit a video of them singing or dancing or playing an instrument or really anything artistic," Byng said. "It'll be a free thing that people can watch and hopefully get a little bit of entertainment out of that."

Byng added that he came up with the cabaret idea to showcase local talent.

The second show in the works is the play "Replacing Linda." Byng noted it is a new play written with the coronavirus quarantine in mind.

"This is a little bit more complicated, new territory," Byng said. "It's like a new play that has come out of the COVID-19 era where it makes sense that you're interacting with your own audience through the webcam and with the other characters."

Auditions for the show take place from 6-8 p.m. Sept. 8 and will be held virtually on Zoom. Auditioners will need to sign up for a time to audition.

Rehearsals and the performance will also be held online, as "Replacing Linda" is designed to be a show without a stage. Byng said the plot for the 30-minute play is about two people co-owning a business, but their

administrative assistant, Linda, has decided to quit, prompting the pair to search for her replacement.

"They're holding remote interviews, so they don't really interact," Byng said. "It is a comedy, though, and the two people that show up for the interview have some quirks and are some goofy characters, so they have a hard time choosing between the two."

"Replacing Linda" will be a test to see if local audiences will engage with theater in an online format.

"We're trying something short like that to see if people will engage with it or not," Byng said. "You don't want to sit in front of a screen for two hours with something that doesn't grab you. It's a new experiment."

The live performance is 1 p.m. Oct. 11, with tickets available on the group's website, www.phoenixplayers.com. Information on auditions for the two shows will also be on the site, according to Byng.

"The challenge will be will we be engaging enough to keep people's attention, because we won't have that interaction with the audience, so we won't know if they'll really think it's funny," Byng said. "The one thing we're going to focus on is interacting with the camera in different ways and finding ways to interact with each other through the camera."

Prior to the pandemic hitting, the Phoenix Players had been working on the musical "Sister Act," but with the shutdown limiting large group gatherings, the nuns went into hiding. Byng said they will be back, though.

"We were fortunate that the publishing company has been very good to people that have had their shows postponed or cancelled, so we've been able to put our rights on hold," Byng said. "When we do come back to the live stage, 'Sister Act' will be our first production."

Teachers shift plans as schools open

Educators learn how to teach in multiple formats

Most area schools went back into session this week, but the first day of school was definitely different from first days in previous years.

Depending on the school, students could be in class anywhere from one to five days a week. For those not in the school five days, there will be an adjustment to learn two different ways.

There has been an adjustment for teachers, too, with most having to adjust the style of teaching they've depended on for years in order to teach students both in front of them and the ones sitting behind a computer screen.

NEW Media journalists met with area teachers at all levels of K-12

learning to see what they've had to do to prepare for education during a pandemic. The responses were varied.

Teachers and staff are ready to start with in-school teaching and move to a hybrid model or even to virtual only instruction if needed.

"The district has prepared for fluidity for whatever happens, if we need to go totally online by October, I feel we're prepared for that," said Patrick Alcantara, Birnamwood Middle School English teacher.

Alcantara, who spent three years teaching fifth grade in Wittenberg, is excited to start his second year of teaching seventh and eighth grades. As much as he enjoys teaching those

grades, he is concerned about the students coming back after being out of school for six months and thinking things will be back to normal.

The new normal for Alcantara includes designing lesson plans for his 23 in-person students and then a more condensed version for his online students. He acknowledged it was very hard to change gears during the shutdown and it was very hard to adapt lesson plans from classroom to virtual.

This year should be different, as Alcantara has had more time to prepare and will have time built into their school schedule to work with online students. Just having a designated time for that will help bring consistency for teacher and students, Alcantara said.

The biggest concern for Alcantara regarding in-school learning is how to maintain cleanliness. Alcantara's students are of the age they can participate in general cleaning duties, but he knows there is a risk in opening the schools.

"It's intimidating that if you don't clean something right the COVID-19 risk can start to piggyback," said Alcantara.

For Wittenberg kindergarten teacher Nikki Steigerwald, the challenges start day one as she notes that she doesn't know her students and they don't know her, so wearing masks will make it hard to notice visual clues. She also knows her ability to keep students at a safe social distance and keeping their masks on depends a lot on how parents have prepared their children.

Steigerwald, who has young children at home, has changed the way she does everything to keep her husband and children safe but has no way of knowing if other parents are being as diligent in their homes.

Steigerwald has been teaching in Wittenberg for five years and knows how different this year will be due to the new routines for lunch, recess and the limited interaction with other classes. She notes that even teachers

won't be able to eat lunch together as they used to, so there will be that adjustment not only socially, but also on a professional level as it's a time for comparing notes and strategies and offering support.

The kindergarten curriculum is very hands on, especially for learning things like math, which she uses special blocks. She doesn't have enough materials to go around so that means extra cleaning time before sharing. Reading is another subject where students need to see how her mouth forms different words and that will be difficult at first.

"Ideally I'd like to get a see-through mask for teaching, but for now I need to focus on making sure the students are comfortable with their own masks," Steigerwald said.

For Jeff Zobeck, who teaches agriculture, shop and food science classes for grades 7-12 at Gresham Community School, teaching in a hybrid in-person and virtual environment will be a definite sharp turn for him, as all of his classes require a hands-on approach and not so much with the books and worksheets.

"The big challenge for me, and I'm sure this is true for a lot of teachers, is that my style of teaching is more hands-on," Zobeck said. "I like to talk about a concept or introduce a concept and then have them do activities that are hands-on and getting them more engaged in that concept."

Zobeck said he spent a lot of time in the spring, with schools shut down to everything but virtual learning, creating kits to send home to students so they could practice concepts they would have learned in the classroom. He noted that students weren't as engaged in their education with the worries of the pandemic, so the kits were not as effective as the hands-on lessons.

Gresham has a four-day in-person school week for the fall semester, with Wednesdays serving as a virtual day for all. However, some of Zobeck's students are opting to go with full virtual learning, requiring him and other teachers to come up with methods to keep those students as engaged as the ones he has sitting behind a desk.

Zobeck is considering turning to videos to educate virtual students, demonstrating how to do something, but he hasn't had much experience making videos. However, Gresham plans to record all lessons in classrooms to help virtual students or students who might have been sick for the day, so it's something he plans to learn.

"We do have a video conferencing system that we're going to utilize with those virtual kids," Zobeck said. "Ev-

ery class will be taught and recorded."

Ultimately, Zobeck believes it's best to learn the technology now, as there is still a risk that schools could close again if there is a sharp uptick in coronavirus cases.

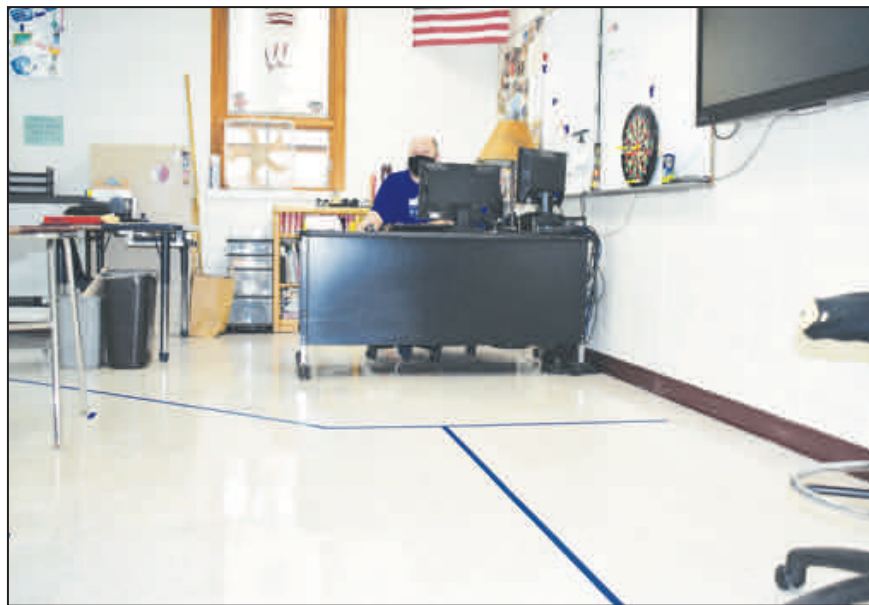
"At least you can get them trained so that, if we were to go back to a status where the state says, 'Nope, all schools are closed, and you can only videoconference,' then they'll have the training, and hopefully we'll be able to progress on as best as possible in that environment," Zobeck said.

LuAnn Neuenschwander, who is a 5-year-old kindergarten teacher under normal circumstances, is stepping into a new role as a digital teacher in the Gillett School District this year, working with those families who chose to have their students work from home.

Relationships with and between students are still an integral part of the virtual experience, Neuenschwander said.

"I'll be contacting each family to set up Google Meets with the students," she said. "I'm also hoping to arrange a Google Meet with everyone in the class so they can see their classmates that way."

Gillett students will be following the same curriculum schedule for both in-person and digital learning, via the Acellus Digital Curriculum program. That should be helpful if families decide to switch from

digital to in-person or vice versa, said Danyell Franti, high school business teacher.

"If a parent chooses to make the transition, it should be seamless whether you transfer in or out," Franti said.

In-person school days will be different with social distancing a priority. The school will have one-way hallways with teachers directing traffic and students urged to remain 6 feet apart, mandatory masking most of the

time, and modified bell schedules.

While admitting to some butterflies, the teachers said they feel well-prepared for the expected changes in the routine.

"We're ready to be flexible," Neuenschwander said.

"I think it's OK to show perseverance," Franti said, "so the kids can see that we can persevere over a challenge."

Annual income guidelines set for school, daycare meals

The U.S. Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service recently updated the income eligibility guidelines for meals served at schools and daycare programs based on federal poverty levels.

The income guidelines, updated annually, are effective through June 30, 2021, and apply to student eligibility for free and reduced-price school meals offered through the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, and milk offered through the Special Milk Program. The programs are administered by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction. Reimbursement for meals served in daycare centers and family child care homes participating in the Child and Adult Care Food Program are also applicable to the updated income guidelines.

"Having equitable access to these programs is essential," State Superintendent Carolyn Stanford Taylor said. "Our children cannot learn on an empty stomach. Proper nourishment is important to help our students learn, grow, and achieve in Wisconsin schools."

The guidelines establish that students in a household of four, with income of \$34,060 per year or less, qualify for free school meals. If that

family's yearly income is between \$34,060.01 and \$48,470, children are eligible for reduced-price meals. The state's participating public and private schools and day cares typically provide applications for free and reduced-price school meals during registration and in the beginning weeks of the school year. However, applications may be submitted at any time. Only one application is required per household.

Based on family circumstances, certain groups are automatically eligible to receive meal benefits, with eligibility based on program specifics. Those groups include children who participate in, or receive benefits from the following programs: Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or FoodShare in Wisconsin, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families or Wisconsin Works Cash Assistance in Wisconsin, some programs under Medicaid, and Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR).

Foster, homeless, migrant, or runaway children; children who are enrolled in Head Start, an At-Risk Afterschool program, or an emergency shelter; and adults who receive SNAP or FoodShare, FDPIR, Supplemental Security Income or Medicaid participants also are eligible.

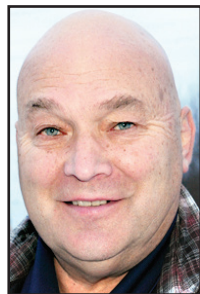
Antifa means anti-fascist which is made up of diverse groups that plan to achieve their motive through non-violent and violent direct action.

Fairness lacking in county justice system

To the editor:

A sense of fairness appears to be lacking in Shawano and Menominee County's criminal justice system, according to a report put together by the Wisconsin Examiner. In its examination of the six Wisconsin counties that have contested district attorney races, they interviewed more than a dozen defense attorneys, defendants, court workers and community members in and around Shawano. What they uncovered is alarming.

It is obvious to me that a new district attorney is needed in Shawano and Menominee counties. We don't want a justice system in which cases are dismissed due to unprepared prosecutors, long backlogs, and victims who don't feel they were treated fairly.

It appears that currently if someone is arrested for a misdemeanor, they might have to wait for 100 days or longer for charges to be filed. This is not normal and doesn't happen in other counties our size. One example is Waupaca County, where the average number of days is 30. Less than half of Shawano County's misde-

meanor cases are allegedly filed that quickly.

Delays can have harmful effects on people's lives. Defendants and victims may move on with their lives, get new jobs and forget about the incident. Then when they are finally charged, it can be distressing. It can also be very traumatic for youthful offenders.

As a defense attorney, Aaron Damrau has experienced those calls and emails, which go unanswered by the attorneys in the DA's office. He is frustrated when plea negotiations don't exist even when contradictory evidence comes up. He doesn't like it when the attorneys in the DA's office

routinely don't look at a case until the week of jury trial and don't prepare victims and witnesses for trial.

I personally spoke with a courtroom officer who believes that many jury trials are won by the defendant simply because one of the prosecutors is so sarcastic and makes snide remarks to the witnesses on the stand, which jury members find to be rude and inappropriate. Victims, defendants and ultimately the taxpayers are hurt by the practices of DA Gregory Parker's office.

It's time for change. I'm supporting Damrau for district attorney.

Farmers and Wisconsin's changing climate

While we still have much to learn, and far more to do, about climate change, it's impact on natural resources and communities is becoming increasingly clear. Lake Superior, the largest single source of fresh water on the planet, seemed immune to algal blooms that trouble the more small and shallow Lake Erie, as well as smaller bodies of water throughout Wisconsin.

Superior was believed too vast to allow for the concentration of nutrients needed to fuel a bloom and too cold for the algae to multiply. Only a few surface blooms of cyanobacteria, occurring in the 1960s and linked to acute releases of mining byproducts into Superior, have been recorded through modern history. Unfortunately, the deepest of the Great Lakes started experiencing these blooms since 2012, with one bloom stretching about 50 miles along the shoreline in 2018.

The lake is getting warmer. Meanwhile, escalating average temperatures allow the atmosphere to hold more moisture, which results in more frequent and intense downpours. The increasing frequency and intensity of these storm events flush nutrients from overwhelmed municipal wastewater treatment plants and farm fields alike into vulnerable surface waters.

Trout streams and wild rice beds in Superior's watershed that have provided reliable sustenance to Native American communities in Minnesota, Michigan and Wisconsin through time

immemorial are threatened by the increasing temperatures and potential for blooms, demonstrating that today's conditions are new to Lake Superior.

While changes in Lake Superior and other water bodies throughout Wisconsin are uniquely visible, climate change's impacts can be observed across Wisconsin's farming landscape. More intense spring rains and the resulting mud are keeping folks out of the field.

Rachel Bouressa, a Wisconsin Farmers Union member raising cows on grass from start to finish in New London, is also witnessing how the changing climate impacts farmers in her community. Rachel serves on the Farm Service Agency County Committee, where she participates in the execution of emergency farm support programs.

This is in stark contrast to the experience of Bouressa's parents, who manage a more conventional operation in Australia. While Wisconsin experiences more intense rain, the community where Bouressa's parents farm went nine months with no rainfall leading into the wildfires in late 2019 and early 2020. Their farm ultimately wasn't damaged by the fires, but the surrounding community was decimated.

The added risk from all the extreme

weather facing farmers across the globe, both drought and deluge, track with a July 2019 report issued by the USDA Economic Research Service, Climate Change and Agricultural Risk Management Into the 21st Century, that modeled farmers' likely utilization of the Federal Crop Insurance Program and determined that agricultural risk management programs are likely to become more expensive to manage as the climate continues to change.

Farmers place themselves in peril by ignoring the mounting evidence and need for action on climate change. The higher the cost of the farmers' safety net, the more difficult these programs become to justify to taxpayers. Fortunately, there is growing interest in supporting farmers to manage their operations in ways that reduce their own risk in a changing climate while also reducing the emissions of greenhouse gases that exacerbate climate challenges.

While witnessing neighbors struggle with mud, Bouressa said that the soil health practices she employs, like interseeding with legumes instead of chemical fertilizer and maintaining pasture for over twenty years, allow her ground to absorb more water and hold it against future dry spells while remaining traversable. Further, her grazing regime avoids the need for many passes with heavy equipment that may be prone to damaging or getting stuck in wet ground. Bouressa also points out that grazing is generally far less fossil fuel intensive than growing

crops for feed with a lot of chemical input.

Making the changes to more resilient farming is a big lift for any farm operation, but the investment in the stability of the food supply is worth it. Farmers can make several asks of government officials to help clear the way for climate resilient farming, including investing in diverse agriculture research, support for farm bill conservation programs, and reducing barriers to market for animals on pasture.

Climate change presents serious challenges to farmers, rural communities, and the stability of domestic and global food systems. Despite overwhelming scientific consensus that the phenomena is occurring, and that human activity is contributing to its severity, the issue has become politicized and often painfully difficult to discuss.

There are plenty of options for empowering farmers to adapt to and mitigate climate change, but denying the challenge prevents us from coordinating efforts and maximizing results from farming practices with climate benefits. Hopefully, developments like algae blooms in Lake Superior and USDA's predictions on the rising expense of crop insurance programs will provide the motivation needed to address climate change in farming communities.

just gotta work for improvement."

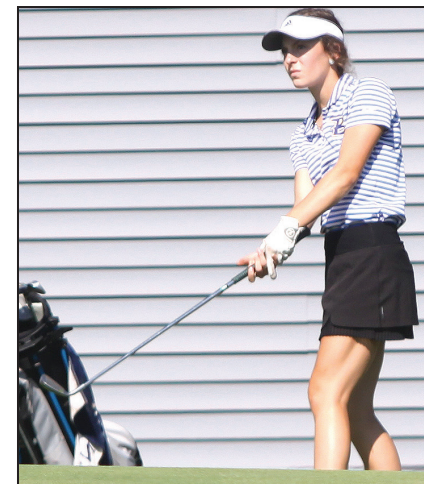
Aside from Luepke, Bonduel had three other golfers on the course.

Giannis Antetokounmpo voted NBA's Defensive Player of the Year

Giannis Antetokounmpo figured somebody was in trouble.

Even though the Milwaukee Bucks had just defeated Orlando for a 3-1 lead in their playoff series — a series the team went on to win 4-1 — Mike Budenholzer wanted to talk to them in the locker room afterward.

Antetokounmpo looked around, wondering if a teammate was about to be scolded.

“Usually when coach wants to talk to us after a game, somebody messed up,” Antetokounmpo said.

This time, it was because the Greek Freak did really well.

Antetokounmpo was voted NBA Defensive Player of the Year on Aug.

25, becoming the fifth player to win that award and MVP in a career.

The All-Star, who was last year’s MVP and is the favorite to repeat this season, ended the two-year reign of Utah center Rudy Gobert as Defensive Player of the Year.

He got the news with the rest of his teammates on the league’s best defensive team a day earlier.

“Coach was so excited; he was so happy,” Antetokounmpo said. “He told me I won Defensive Player of the Year. He jumped on the table.”

Antetokounmpo received 75 first-place votes from a panel of 100 sports-writers and broadcasters, finishing with 432 points. Los Angeles Lakers forward Anthony Davis was second (200 points; 14 first-place votes) and Gobert (187 points; six first-place

votes) third.

Antetokounmpo joined Michael Jordan, Hakeem Olajuwon, David Robinson and Kevin Garnett as players to do the MVP-Defensive Player of the Year double. He was runner-up for the defensive award last year.

He led the Bucks to the NBA’s best record and helped them limit opponents to 101.6 points per 100 possessions, the league’s top defensive rating, as of March 11. Voting was conducted on games through then, before the season was suspended because of the coronavirus pandemic.

“His commitment to defense, his commitment to winning, his commitment to doing everything is beyond incredible,” Budenholzer said. “His impact on the game with blocked shots and rebounds, guarding all five posi-

tions, chasing down blocks, close-outs, communicating. He does everything defensively — literally everything. This award is representative of that.”

Milwaukee allowed only 96.5 points per 100 possessions with Antetokounmpo on the court, giving him the lowest defensive rating among the more than 300 players who averaged at least 15 minutes per game.

The Bucks were holding opponents to an NBA-low 41.3% shooting from the field when the season was suspended, and Antetokounmpo often ended up with the shots that were missed. He was leading the league with 11.5 defensive rebounds per game, while also averaging a little more than a steal and block.

Colla was one of two Trucker's named to an all-conference team last fall, making the honorable mention list.

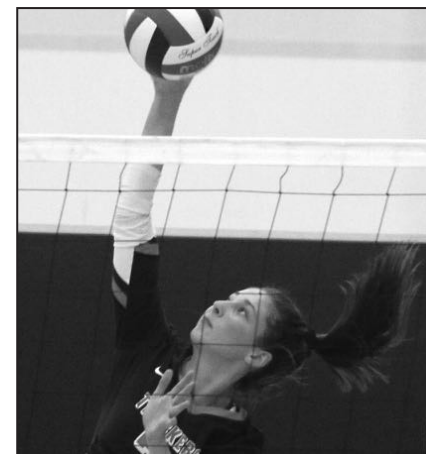
Seniors Kate Malesa (right side) and Morgan Federwitz (setter, right side) also return for Clintonville

CMN grads walk the sidewalk

Drive-thru ceremony allows hard work to be recognized

The College of Menominee Nation finally said its farewells to graduates on Aug. 26 with staff handing out degrees and more in a drive-thru graduation.

Some graduates went all out with caps and gowns. Some only wore one or the other. All were eager to receive to their degrees and continue on with their lives after the coronavirus pandemic brought all education, including college-level learning, to a screeching halt in March.

The graduates due in May obviously had to wait to receive their degrees from the college, but graduates who had completed all their requirements last December were also waiting to walk the stage because CMN only holds one ceremony per year.

Instead of walking the stage, however, they walked a sidewalk wearing a mask as college officials greeted students and posed for pictures with a CMN banner serving as a backdrop. On the other side of the circle that served as graduation central were professors and staff eager to say one last goodbye and to offer well wishes.

Among the graduates were brother and sister Brandon Boyd and Christa Lyons. Lyons was graduating with two degrees — a bachelor's in business administration and an associate degree in public administration. Boyd received his degree for natural resources.

Both were eager to receive the degrees for which they'd worked so hard.

"I was kind of bummed out during the spring because I was looking forward to graduating with two degrees and wanted to make my family proud and watch me walk across (the stage)," Lyons said. "It is very unusual, and I know they tried to plan something."

Lyons plans to continue her education at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and seek a master's degree. Before that, she got to feel the honor of getting her degrees with her brother at her side.

"I feel real proud," Lyons said. "We have so many experiences and memories made here."

Boyd said he was surprised at how

much of a graduation event there was at the college.

"I didn't know what to expect, actually," he said. "I knew it wasn't going to be a regular ceremony, but this is great. All of our instructors are over

there, and I think I had classes with every one of them."

Boyd said a lot of his classes were with his sister, so they helped each other along the way and, in spite of the pandemic, achieved their dreams.

"She gave me a kick in the butt when I needed," Boyd said.

He looks forward to putting his degree to use, noting he's had internships through Menominee Tribal Enterprises to show him firsthand what's needed to care for the forest.

"Working in the woods is something that really interests me," Boyd said. "That's the career that I'd like to pursue."

The act of providing a graduation ceremony in the midst of a pandemic took a lot of hard work from CMN staff, according to Chris Caldwell, acting president.

"I know our staff worked to provide some kind of balance keeping people healthy and safe," Caldwell said. "I think this is turning out to be a pretty nice event, even though it's a little different from previous years."

As fun as the drive-thru graduation was, several staff members commented that they hoped they'd be able to do a traditional graduation ceremony for 2021 graduates next May.

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Talking to children makes it easier to don masks

Donning a face mask when venturing outside your home is the new norm. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) says face coverings help slow the transmission of COVID-19 by people who unknowingly have the virus.

"When they breathe, speak, cough or sneeze, virus particles will be trapped in their mask, protecting other people from being infected," said Dr. Jennifer Frank, chief medical officer at ThedaCare. "Respiratory droplets can spread the virus that causes COVID-19."

The CDC recommends those over the age of 2 wear a mask when outside of the home.

"Cloth or handmade masks are recommended for everyone," said Frank. "We don't want to give people who wear cloth masks a false sense of security. Keep in mind, an estimated 25% of people infected with COVID-19 are asymptomatic, meaning they have no symptoms. That said, people wearing cloth face coverings play an important role in curbing cases.

"We encourage parents to be honest with their children, while keeping the conversations appropriate for their age group so they understand the importance. Let children know they are protecting their friends, neighbors and community members by wearing a mask."

The American Academy of Pediatrics has recommendations to help speak with children about masks. For children under 3, it's best to answer their questions simply in language they understand. If they ask about why people are wearing cloth face coverings, explain that sometimes people wear them when they are sick, and

when they are all better, they stop wearing them.

For children over 3, try focusing on germs. Explain that germs are special to your own body. Some germs are good and some are bad. The bad ones can make you sick.

Children should wear face coverings when they cannot stay 6 feet apart from others. This includes places like the grocery store, pharmacy or a doctor's office.

Children do not typically need to wear coverings if they are at home, as long as there is not exposure to COVID-19. Masks are also unnecessary outside, as long as children can stay 6 feet apart from others.

"Staying home and physical distancing is still the best way to protect your family," said Frank. "Especially for younger children who may not understand why they need to be 6 feet apart from others, or who cannot keep their mask on their face."

For children with special health care needs, the AAP has the following recommendations:

- Children who are considered high-risk or severely immunocompromised are encouraged to wear an N95 mask for protection.

- Families of children at higher risk are encouraged to use a standard surgical mask if they are sick to prevent the spread of illness to others.

- Children with severe cognitive or respiratory impairments may have a hard time tolerating a cloth face covering. For these children, special precautions may be needed.

"Many districts are in the process of determining how to bring children back to school safely, and that may include some type of masking," said Frank.
