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Grams steps down from Shawano School Board

Administrative pay raise proposal last straw for him

Mart Grams, one of the Shawano School Board's more outspoken and critical members, decided he'd had enough and walked out of a board meeting June 19.

Grams turned in his computer and declared he was quitting while the board was discussing administrative salaries for the 2023-24 school year and whether or not to spend over \$43,000 to administer raises to principals, assistant principals and district directors. The raise is a 3.6% increase from existing salaries but would not apply to incoming principals for Hillcrest Primary School and Shawano Community High School.

The administrative salaries vote had been delayed from the June 5 meeting, when the board asked for more details.

Grams expressed his displeasure at voting on the raises collectively, saying that he felt some of the existing administrators did not deserve a raise, citing the example of an earlier discussion the board had about the achievement gap reduction at Hillcrest and Olga Brener Intermediate School.

"Why is this not public?" Grams said of the individual salary information. "They take money from taxpayers. The taxpayers have a right to know how much they're taking."

Grams accused the board of being afraid to reveal the details on what's being spent and claimed Shawano is "a failing school district," which prompted other board members to push back, saying it would be inappropriate to specify individual administrators in a vote.

Board member Jeana Winslow tried to call for the question, which means discussion ends and a vote is taken, but Grams said that was out of order.

"I still have the floor," Grams said. "You can't call the question when I have the floor."

Board member Bobbi Lemerond noted she met with Superintendent Kurt Krizan to look at the individual data and information, and Grams claimed that was conducting business in secret.

"(Administrators) chose to work for the public," Grams said. "If they don't like the raises we're giving them, go somewhere else. There are hundreds of principal jobs."

Board member David Cullen chastised Grams for personally attacking the administrators.

"Mart, your whole agenda has been to bash the administrators," Cullen said. "You worked in the Shawano School District for a long time. Why didn't you become an administrator? Are you jealous that you were never an administrator, and now you have to bash administrators every chance you get?"

Winslow pointed out that the only one the board directly oversees is Krizan, and he is responsible for evaluating the other administrators. She said the board is only

responsible for approving raises.

"It's the good ol' boys again. I'm done," Grams said, standing up. "I resign. I've had it with the corruption and the lies, consistently lying about, 'Well, the test scores are blah, blah, blah.' The test scores are horrendous. I cannot be part of a corrupt system."

After Grams' departure, the board voted 6-0, with board members Frank Kugel and Karen Smith absent, to approve the administrator pay raises.

Grams first became a board member in 2019 and was reelected in 2022. Grams often went against the rest of the board on matters, often being the lone opposing vote, and has been critical of Krizan's leadership.

Grams was censured by the board in 2020 after he posted on Facebook, "You know George Floyd has been drug free for 2 months," referencing the Black man who died in Minnesota earlier in the year while in police custody, which set off protests and riots nationwide.

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City seeks 28% increase in water rates

Rate request is Shawano's first since 2015

City of Shawano water users can expect their water rates to go up for the first time since 2015 after the Shawano Common Council gave the green light June 14 to city officials to send the matter to the Wisconsin Public Services Commission.

The council approved an increase averaging 28% going to the PSC for review. The review is expected to last six to eight months, but the city is hoping the increase will take effect Jan. 1, 2024. The average residential water bill is expected to go up from \$23.71 per month to \$29.31, while a multifamily residential home with a one-inch meter can expect to see a \$53.40 bill jump to \$67.10 next year.

A commercial customer with a one-inch meter can expect the average bill of \$61.15 go up to \$77.35, and an industrial customer with the same meter is likely to go from \$167 to \$220.10.

According to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard, the increase will also include the public fire protection fee. The city is hopeful that once this long-overdue increase takes effect, the city will be able to review its rates annually and seek smaller increases of 2-3%, if it's deemed necessary.

With the current rates, the city expects to bring in a little over \$1.6 million in 2024, but the city is anticipating expenses that exceed \$2.1 million with a number of road reconstruction projects that usually include upgrading water lines. Finance director Greg Davis said the increase is necessary to keep up on city infrastructure and pay off on some debt that has been incurred from previous projects.

"We've been working a number of months with Rueckert Mielke, and they gave us a preliminary cost increase," Davis said. "That equates to about \$80 per year maximum for our average residential user."

Davis noted in his report to the council that the PSC has the final say on the increase, so it could possibly be less. The final decision is expected around the end of 2023.

Sheppard said that the report includes what the city anticipates the operational demands and capital work will be for the next five years.

"With a lot of rising costs like in construction and other projects that we have ... that's going to require more capital expenditure," Sheppard said.

The reason the city didn't seek a rate increase sooner is because of the labor intensive process required.

According to Sheppard, it was a strain on city staff before Shawano created its own finance department. Now that there is one, the city anticipates conducting yearly studies on water rates and seeking smaller hikes.

"If you do rate increases of 2-3%, it's much less (of an impact)," Sheppard said. "We haven't done a rate case since 2015, so the rates for water haven't changed since 2015."

The PSC, in the course of its evaluation, is expected to hold a hearing where Shawano residents will be able to speak about the proposed rate increase, but it's not known when that will be.

Sheppard noted that the numbers presented to the council will certainly not be the numbers that factor into the PSC's final decision.

"They'll never just accept that," he said. "They're going to review it, and they're going to change it."

Road projects for a year are determined by how much the water department has in its fund each year, according to Sheppard, and with the current funds, the number of roads to be upgraded are fewer.

"We know that if we're going to a street, and the street part is say \$200,000, but the water part's going to cost more than we have, then we can't do that street," Sheppard said. "It's all tied together."

Larock preliminary hearing pushed to August

Arresting officer's absence in court prompts defense attorney to ask for delay

The preliminary hearing for attempted homicide suspect Royce Larock, 21, of Shawano, was pushed back more than a month after the arresting officer was unavailable for the scheduled hearing June 16.

Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney Greg Parker had planned for another officer to serve as a reader during the hearing to describe what had happened the night of April 25, when a man was stabbed in Shawano. That drew objections from

defense attorney Carly Jo Foor, who wanted to be able to cross-examine the arrest officer directly.

"Given the actual seriousness of this case, I would like to be able to reschedule this for when the actual officer can be here," Foor said.

Due to a booked court calendar over the next few months, it took more than five minutes for the attorneys to be able to settle on a mutual date, but 1 p.m. on Aug. 3 was decided, as at least an hour was needed for the hearing. Parker said that the arresting officer's schedule allowed him to be available on that date.

Larock is being charged with one count of attempted first-degree intentional homicide, one count of aggravated battery, one misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer and one misdemeanor count

of disorderly conduct.

According to the criminal complaint, Shawano police officers were dispatched to Acorn Street for a reported stabbing. When officers arrived a victim was allegedly laying at a neighbor's front step with a stab wound to the stomach area, with intestinal protrusion from a stab wound. The victim allegedly stated that Larock was the person who had stabbed him.

Law enforcement located Larock about 30 minutes later on Richmond Street, where he allegedly told officers that he did not recall fighting with the victim, but admitted to drinking alcohol beforehand. The knife of the alleged crime was found in the front yard of the residence.

When searching the scene, law enforcement allegedly saw blood in the kitchen, on the inside of a screen

door, on the driveway and also saw a trail of blood leading to the neighbor's residence.

When interviewing Larock, he allegedly had cuts and scrapes on his body that were consistent with running through the woods and being scraped by branches and bushes. Larock allegedly told law enforcement that nothing had happened and that he was dropping the victim off at the residence and left. Larock allegedly told law enforcement that he had anger issues, but stated that he did not have a fight with the victim.

If convicted, Larock faces 60 years in prison for attempted first-degree intentional homicide, \$50,000 in fines and 15 years for aggravated battery, \$10,000 and nine months for resisting or obstructing an officer, and \$1,000 and 90 days for disorderly conduct.

Breaking fever of hate everyone's job

I read. A lot. Newspapers, of course. Magazines. Books, lots of books. Fiction and nonfiction. Print or digital. Whatever is handy.

Now and then, I've written about a particularly interesting reading experience, and so I will again today. At the end, I'll attach a brief recommended reading list. The intent is to suggest, for those who believe we're in an unprecedented time of divisiveness and hate, that maybe we've been here before and managed, with great effort, to find a better way.

Today's featured book: "A Fever in the Heartland," by Timothy Egan. Subtitle: "The Ku Klux Klan's Plot to Take Over America, and the Woman Who Stopped Them."

As kids in school, most of us learned the Civil War was fought to free slaves in southern states. After Northern victory, the Klan briefly rose in a spasm of racial violence. Federal troops hounded the Klan out of existence. The march of progress, slowly at times, moved ahead.

Not exactly. The North won. Slavery was abolished. With Lincoln's assassination, his scoundrel vice president, Andrew Johnson, succeeded him and looked the other way as former confederates rebuilt racial barriers by any means necessary. The Ku Klux Klan rose as night riders, terrorizing the Black population. The violence continued and rights were crushed until Ulysses Grant became president and sent in troops.

When Grant left the White House, Rutherford B. Hayes succeeded him, in a contested election, which

deals with the revival of the Klan in the 1920s. Following World War I, an era of change occurred. Prohibition played a role. Suddenly millions of people were breaking the law with bootleg booze at speakeasies. Women were dancing and wearing bobbed hairstyles and short skirts. Blacks were moving north to seek opportunities in industry. Heightened immigration brought in new populations. Many of them worshiped differently — Catholics, Jews.

The Klan rose again, touting a message that White Protestant morals were under attack. The old hate of Blacks was front and center, but the new Klan left plenty of room to hate the Irish, the Italians, Asians, Jews, Catholics and others.

I was fascinated to read "Fever in the Heartland" because it's largely based in southern and central Indiana, which became Ground Zero for the new Klan. Much of the action takes place in or around Indianapolis, including places like Terre Haute. I grew up 90 miles from Indy and 30 miles from Terre Haute. As a kid, I heard stories of how the Klan took

involved cutting a deal to remove troops — essentially ending reconstruction and ushering in the rule of Jim Crow laws that locked in second class status based on race.

Egan's book

root throughout the region in the 1920s, how thousands of young men in the largely rural population joined. It also was said that just as quickly as the joining took place, it ended for reasons left unclear.

"Fever in the Heartland" answers a lot of those questions. Indiana became corrupted with the Klan controlling local and state government. But when Klan leaders were shown to be what they were — grifters, moral degenerates, liars and cheats — the fever broke, and followers retired their robes. I won't spoil the rest of the story, of a woman wronged by Indiana's Klan boss speaking truth from the grave.

The point: Hate is always there. Its mortal enemy is truth and, often belatedly, the goodness in decent people's hearts. Americans have beat hate before. They can beat it again.

As promised, a brief reading list on similar topics:

- "Killers of the Flower Moon," by David Grann. When oil was discovered on what was believed to be useless land occupied by the Osage, members of the tribe stood to become fabulously wealthy. Instead, they were targeted for exploitation while authorities looked the other way. Murder was the most efficient tool. The case marked the emergence of the fledgling FBI, to bring at least some justice for the victims.

- "1491," by Charles Mann. The date in the title suggests the content to follow, because it's one year before the arrival of Christopher Columbus to "discover" the Ameri-

cas. Mann's purpose is to report on a land that was not empty, but rather populated by millions of people now referred to as Native Americans. The result of "discovery," as one might surmise, did not turn out well for those who were already here.

- "Blood and Thunder, the Epic Story of Kit Carson and the Conquest of the American West," by Hampton Sides. The story fairly presents the widely differing versions of history surrounding western expansion. The incredible persistence and heroism of people like Carson, the most famous and accomplished mountain man and guide through the wilderness. The sad and violent displacement of Native people who were in the way. The taking of Mexican territory that was the culmination of a vision of America's manifest destiny to become a continental nation.

- "The Man Who Saved the Union, Ulysses Grant in War and Peace," by H.W. Brands. Warts and all, a presentation of Grant's career as the determined general who bled the South into submission and later brought the same will to the effort to win the peace.

History is a guide, if we're willing to see it. Hate is not new, but rather an ever-present challenge to overcome.

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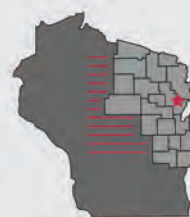
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Food box program receives \$1.5 million infusion of cash

Distribution effort helps elders in Menominee, other tribes, is expected to surpass 32K boxes

The Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin put Gov. Tony Evers to work June 15 as he helped to load tribal elder food boxes into the back of Menominee vehicles for the biweekly food pickup.

Before that, he announced that there would be \$1.5 million in the biennial state budget specifically to help tribal food programs like the Patricia B. Goodson Food Distribution Center operating in Keshena. Evers said he

had asked for \$2 million, but the legislature's joint finance committee opted for a lower amount.

The funding will help the Great Lakes Intertribal Food Consortium's efforts to get food boxes to elders and others in need for all 11 federally recognized tribes in Wisconsin.

"We understand that it's important to work together," said Legislator Gary Besaw, who also heads the tribe's department of agriculture.

The food consortium's work has grown in leaps and bounds. Besaw noted that in 2021, the first year for

the elder food box program, three tribes were involved and 900 boxes went out monthly, resulting in 10,800 boxes being distributed. The next year, 24,000 boxes went out total, with all 11 Wisconsin tribes taking part.

Besaw estimated the total boxes for 2023 will surpass 32,000.

"Yes, that helps our elders, most definitely," Besaw said, noting that the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection helped provide the initial funding for the food box program. "We know,

in working with Feeding America, they've directed funds to us, too. We have a lot of partners to be thankful for."

Patti Habeck, chief executive officer for Feeding America Eastern Wisconsin, noted that programs like the elder food boxes are vital to her organization's mission, noting that the Menominee have specific food needs that differ from other ethnicities and nationalities.

"This was something that we really wanted to help and be a part of," Habeck said. "We're collaborators

at our core, so we worked directly with tribal leaders to make sure that each box reflects the diet of people, and that piece is very critical. Buying the food from the tribal producers remains a priority. We only procure foods that are perishable like frozen white fish, frozen beef, produce and minimally processed or traditional foods like maple syrup, maple sugar, wild rice, and we have a heavy emphasis on organic foods.”

Habeck said it was “remarkable” how the food box program has grown in the last few years, and it’s something she’s proud to be a part of.

“We’ve worked with the partners at the table from the very start of the idea to the early execution and the continuous improvement,” Habeck said. “We want to see this continue. We want to see this grow.”

The program not only helps elderly tribal members, but it helps form a network of food producers, many of them tribal, to ensure the food that goes out is for the benefit of those elders. Bryan Bainbridge, CEO for the Great Lakes Intertribal Council, works on Lake Superior as a fisherman to provide some of the food that goes in the boxes.

“Every single tribal nation believes in taking care of our elders and making sure they have what they need to live, survive and be healthy,” Bainbridge said. “We’re too often forgotten and not looked at as part of the solution, but having this exposure in our communities and people in our sovereign nations is truly gratifying and important.”

Evers touted the state’s good intergovernmental relationships with the tribes and said it’s important

to address the fact that hunger is everywhere, but it especially impacts the elderly and Native American tribes.

“It’s because of this partnership that we have this good news to share with everybody today,” Evers said. “We know hunger affects every community in our state, but especially aging and older adults and especially tribal members. Even before the pandemic and the challenges of the past few years, one in four Native Americans struggled with hunger, more than twice the rate of white people.”

The money from the state budget will come from tribal gaming revenue, according to Evers.

“Like many parts of the budget, we didn’t get everything we wanted,” he said. “Negotiations are still ongoing, but I’m happy to say that, as I stand here today, the joint finance committee has allocated \$1.5 million for this program.”

As Native American tribes have dealt with higher instances of diabetes and other health issues related to the food they eat, programs have been working to bring tribal members back to the foods they used to grow and raise themselves. Evers praised the Menominee tribe for its work to do that.

“We know that food is medicine, and I’m happy that this program will continue in the next biennium so we’ll make sure that tribal elders have access to healthy, nutritious, Indigenous food,” Evers said. “Together, we’re building a healthier, more sustainable state for everyone, and I look forward to more good work going forward.”

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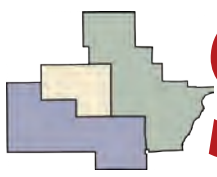

Marion High School's Jaden Stuhr was named the Central Wisconsin Conference-North Division's top player for a third straight spring after a dominant senior baseball season.

Stuhr played all over the diamond for the Mustangs and played at an elite level at every spot.

"To be named Conference Player of the Year during my senior season means a lot, but not as great as having the opportunity of winning it in each of my high school seasons," said Stuhr. "There has been tons of work that's been put into building off each year to become better, along with many challenges to face and overcome as well.

"Life threw a curveball at me before my senior season, and it feels amazing to say that I've been able to not let it affect me but instead knock it out of the park by playing what I believe to be the best baseball that I've played throughout high school."

Stuhr, who dealt with an autoimmune disease before the season, finished his senior season with a .500 batting average. He tallied 19 extra-base hits, drove in 42 runs, walked 27 times, stole 35 bases and scored 33 runs.

As a pitcher, he owned a 10-1 record, striking out 103 batters over 47 innings. He allowed just two earned runs to record a 0.30 earned run average.

Stuhr was one of eight Marion players to earn an all-conference nod. Senior Nick Malueg and juniors Jay Brei and Ryan Malueg joined Stuhr on the first team. Senior Jack VanKooy and junior Jackson Krohn were both second teamers, while senior Andy Faehling and sophomore Braxton Gen-skow were honorable mentions.

Joe Stuhr was tabbed the CWC-North Coach of the Year after the

Bowler senior Marcus Malone and junior Danian Schultz both made the all-conference first team. Senior

Work starts this summer, to be completed in 2024

Shawano Municipal Utilities received approval this month from state utility regulators to build a \$12.9 million service center on the site of its aging and inefficient facility.

Demolition of the existing 21,000-square-foot facility at 122 N. Sawyer St. and 213 E. Green Bay St. will begin in late July or early August, with construction expected to begin in September, said Bruce Gomm, SMU general manager.

Construction should be completed by early fall 2024, giving SMU a

29,000-square-foot, modern facility that better serves its employees and customers, Gomm said.

"The existing service center isn't ADA-compliant. The garage isn't big enough to hold all our vehicles and materials, which should be inside, and security is another big issue. There's no way to secure parts of the building," Gomm said.

Some portions of the service center are 90 years old; with additions constructed in 1959 and 1986, according to the Public Service Commission construction authorization order issued June 13.

During the past 20 years, SMU acquired nearby lots in anticipation of working out of a larger facility.

A new service center has been in the planning stage for years.

A space needs assessment in 2017 found deficiencies in the service center's, roofing, heating and ventilation

systems, doors, windows, pavement and other components requiring imminent replacement of significant repair.

Instead of rehabilitating the center or, moving out of downtown, it was decided to build a better center, Gomm said.

A 100-kilowatt solar array will be added to the roof, expandable but currently sized to generate enough power for much of the building's needs.

Wells dug 150 feet deep will be part of the geothermal system to heat and cool the building.

The new center will have a storm-water management plan and facilities, something that current one lacks.

The current center's employee kitchen is the only room large enough for staff meetings, training sessions and Utility Commission meetings. The second-floor customer service area isn't an ideal location.

The Utility Commission will consider giving final authorization to the project at its June 26 meeting.

The new center will have a first-floor customer service area, staff offices, training rooms, field crew rooms, vehicle and equipment garage, and warehouse space.

It's sized large enough to accommodate some future growth, according to the construction application.

The utility will issue a bond to finance construction and then file a rate case, probably yet this year, to increase revenue to repay the bond. Gomm said.

In January, it was estimated that the project's cost would result in a 5.5% overall increase in electric rates.

Earlier this year, the PSC authorized a 1.35% increase in residential electric rates bringing monthly electric bills to \$84.25. A 5.5% increase would boost the bill to \$88.88.

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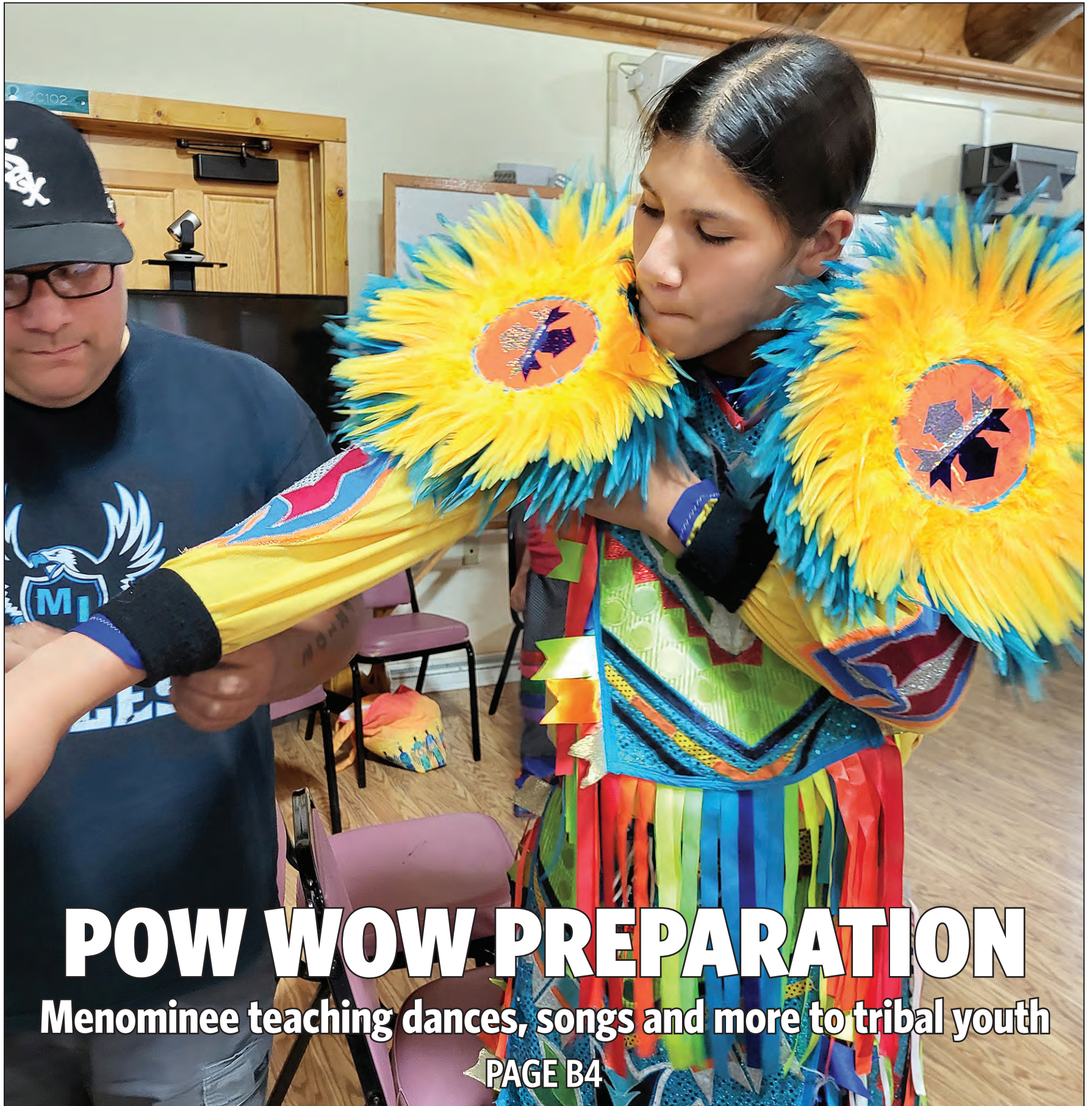
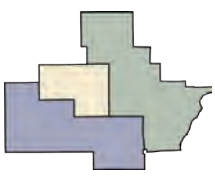

Menominee youth learn about powwow dancing

UW-Extension program helps tribal children to embrace culture, traditions in a fun setting

Encouraging Indigenous children to embrace their culture and heritage is vital to the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin.

So, when the Menominee 4-H Club children themselves requested a chance to learn the traditional dancing and singing of the Menominee, Sofie Cloud got the ball rolling.

Cloud, the UW-Extension Menominee County/Nation 4-H youth development educator, started powwow singing and dancing practice nights on four consecutive Wednesdays in June.

"We're really trying to promote youth voice," Cloud said, "and let the kids guide and decide what we do in 4-H now."

The sounds of laughter and camaraderie, Native drums, traditional Indigenous singing and dancing fill the College of the Menominee Nation Cultural Learning Center weekly during each of the powwow singing and dancing practices this month.

"These sessions are like a laid-back practice, very casual," Cloud said.

"Sometimes when you're trying to learn to dance, it may be intimidating to learn at a big powwow. This is smaller and the sessions are hands-on with teachers. We have it opened up to everyone to come and learn about their culture."

Children ages 3-18 came with family members to the second session on June

14. From the smiles on their faces, it appeared that they enjoyed learning how to dance and to follow the steps of the teachers.

Past and present Menominee royalty have significant parts in the four sessions. Individual performances and group dancing help the kids to learn how to dance in a supportive and fun atmosphere. A drum group provides the background for the dancing and assists those wanting to learn how to drum and/or sing. Everything during the practice sessions is oriented toward the Menominee culture.

Robert Kaquatosh came to the June 14 session with his son. He said that he encouraged his son, Pershing, 13, to dance. His daughter, Selena, is also involved in dancing.

"I danced as a kid and I always went with my friends and family," he said.

Pershing Kaquatosh, the reigning Boys and Girls Club Royalty Brave, said that he was at the session to help other kids learn. He is an accomplished dancer and has participated in powwows outside of the county.

"I've danced here in Menominee, in Carter, Wisconsin, Marquette, Michigan, and in Morris, Minnesota. Dancing makes me feel good. My favorite is the fancy dance," he said. "I've been dancing a long time and think I know everything, besides dancing to new songs."

His solo performance was lively and intricate, urged on by the beat of the tribal drums group. He wore full Indigenous dancing regalia, including a feathered headdress.

Lilly Asaehnew, 15, Miss Menominee Nation, performed a solo dance, and led other attendees in a Menominee Fancy dance. Her regalia included an intricate headdress and feathery shawl. Many of the young girls who came to practice wore shawls and did their best to follow Asaehnew's lead.

Aaliyah Webster, 18, also performed and led the group in dance at the June 14 session.

"I'm here as a volunteer to teach these kids to dance", she said. "I'm not wearing my actual regalia today, but it's similar. I've been dancing since I could walk. I went to my first powwow when I was 2 weeks old."

"Once, before she could even walk, she crawled over to my footwear and grabbed it," Terri Webster, Aaliyah's great-aunt, said with pride. "She put it right on her leg, like she knew."

Aaliyah Webster was recently Veterans of the Menominee Nation Princess but recently passed her title on at the Gathering of Warriors Powwow in Keshena.

"When I was in middle school, my dad signed me up for the Boys and Girls Club Princess," she said. "It's just something I fell in love with, being an advocate for youth and my peers. Being able to inspire young ones to dance and to be a part of this training."

More than half of the 66 participants attending the first session were 18 and under, according to Cloud.

"It's open to the community, but we also had 4-H registration forms

available if someone wanted to join the club. We had 10 families register," she said. "A lot of the kids here are in 4-H, but there's some who aren't. They came to see what we do, and how to get involved."

Cloud herself is a singer and dancer.

"I started as a little kid, probably kindergarten," she said. "My dad took me to powwows all over. I met a lot of caring adults who would teach and show me things."

For the Menominee tribe, dancing is a deep-rooted part of their culture and society. There are several powwows on the reservation each year, including the sturgeon feast powwow in April and veterans powwow in May.

"The big powwow is in August, at the Woodland Bowl," Cloud said. "That's our annual contest powwow."

Terri Webster also brought great-niece Olivia and great-nephew Jacob Webster to the June 14 session. Although not a requirement for participating in the practice nights, both Olivia and Jacob wore Indigenous dancing regalia.

Terri Webster also dances and has attended many powwows over the years, both local and distant.

"Dancing keeps me young, good exercise, meeting other people, travelling, bonding with the little ones, as we travel to powwows," Webster said.

Olivia and Jacob moved in with her about four years ago. Webster told them: "This is what Auntie does. We dance and we go to ceremonies. I had them dancing in their first month with me."

The final powwow singing and dancing practice nights is June 28 from 6-8 p.m. at the CMN Cultural Learning Center, N172 State Highway 47-55, Keshena. Contact Sofie Cloud for information at 715-799-6226, ext. 3234.

Dairy has mission to educate consumers

Hosting Brunch on the Farm only one way Synergy Family Dairy gets word out to urban residents

Heather Jauquet vowed when she finished with high school that she would never do dairy farming again.

Things changed, though, and she and her husband, Jay, along with their three sons, milk 650 cows and own 565 acres of land in the Town of Maple Grove, just a stone's throw from Pulaski.

The Synergy Family Dairy will be hosting the annual Shawano County Brunch on the Farm on June 25, and thousands of people are expected to flock to the farm to enjoy scrambled eggs, sausage, ice cream sundaes and more in honor of June Dairy Month, which shines the spotlight on Wisconsin's dairy industry.

Farm tours are planned, along with a 5K run, live music, an early-morning polka church service, a petting zoo and other activities. Visitors will also likely see, in addition to the mature cows, some calves that were recently born on the farm.

Jauquet, like many farmers, believes it's important to showcase farms, especially dairy farms, as most of the people who consume their products are unaware of where they come from.

"As you drive around the countryside, it's pretty obvious that the dairy industry is changing," Jauquet said. "Farms are getting bigger. There's getting to be less of them. The average consumer is four generations removed from the farm, I believe, so most people don't have a direct link. They have a question in what they see, and they don't even have a resource person in their circle they can ask about it."

Being able to host Brunch on the Farm means that Jauquet and her family can help to dissipate the disconnect between urban people and the farm folks who prepare much of what they eat and drink.

"It's our responsibility to be that resource, to be that link," Jauquet said. "We talk about it often. We do tours when it's not always convenient, but it's really important."

This isn't the first time that Synergy has hosted a big event. In May, the dairy hosted the Breeders' Bash, a dairy genetics sale highlighting their genetics and the genetics of neighbors and friends. Also, Synergy gets visitors from area schools and daycares and is a host for the Adopt-a-Cow program, which is conducted in 900 classrooms

throughout Wisconsin.

"That is a great program," Jauquet said. "I am a huge advocate for it."

With the program, three of Synergy's calves — named Lulu, Sweet Caroline and Elizabeth — were adopted by the classrooms and got regular updates from Jauquet on how they were doing, as well as some information about dairy farming in general.

"It's not a ton of work on our part," Jauquet said. "Obviously, we're taking pictures and collecting information, spending time doing that, but the distribution is done through the program.

They have an online portal where the kids and teachers could ask questions directly to me, and I probably responded to 300-400 of those during the school year. The connection the kids feel with their calf is beyond what you think imaginable how attached they get."

The adopted calves will be in a tent during the brunch, according to Jauquet, so local children can see them and learn more about the farm. There are four different breeds at Synergy, so there will be information on each of them.

While working with cows is something that Jauquet is committed to all day, every day, she didn't always feel that way.

"When I graduated from high school, I was 100% sure that I would never be a dairy farmer," Jauquet said. "I grew up on a dairy farm, and I had had enough of it at that point, honestly. Over the years, things have changed. For me, a lot of it is the purpose of what we do every day. There's a lot of variety in what we do, which is nice, too, but I think, more than anything, it's the sense of purpose as we go about our mission — taking care of the animals, taking care of the land and make this a sustainable farm that's going to continue for generations."

Jauquet works with the Shawano County Farm Bureau, which coordinates the brunch this year, and as she talked about the menu, one of the highlights for her is the cinnamon bread that's served.

"Three hundred loaves — I found that out at one of our meetings," Jauquet said.

Brunch on the Farm usually draws 4,000 to 5,000 people each year, but with Synergy's close proximity to Green Bay and Appleton, Jauquet anticipates residents from those two cities might increase the totals.

"For us, our target audience is a very urban population," Jauquet said. "That's why we're doing this. It's really nice to have our friends and neighbors and family and other farmers come out, but the real reason we're doing this is that we want that urban audience here."



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Lemonade sales benefit humane society

Zittlow has been raising funds through his lemonade stands since last year. This is actually the fifth stand he has held to benefit the humane society. He also plans to hold more throughout the summer, although he has no set schedule.

Typically, Zittlow has given 50% of the money raised to the humane society, but has recently decided that with this stand 100% of the funds raised will go to the humane society.

In the fall, Zittlow plans to go with his family to purchase items such as animal feed for the dogs and cats at the shelter. After raising funds over the course of the summer, Zittlow plans to donate all of the items in one visit to the humane society.

Zittlow has already discussed volunteering directly with the humane society, too.

"I haven't volunteered before, but I want to," Zittlow said. "They said I could walk the dogs, play with the dogs and feed the dogs."

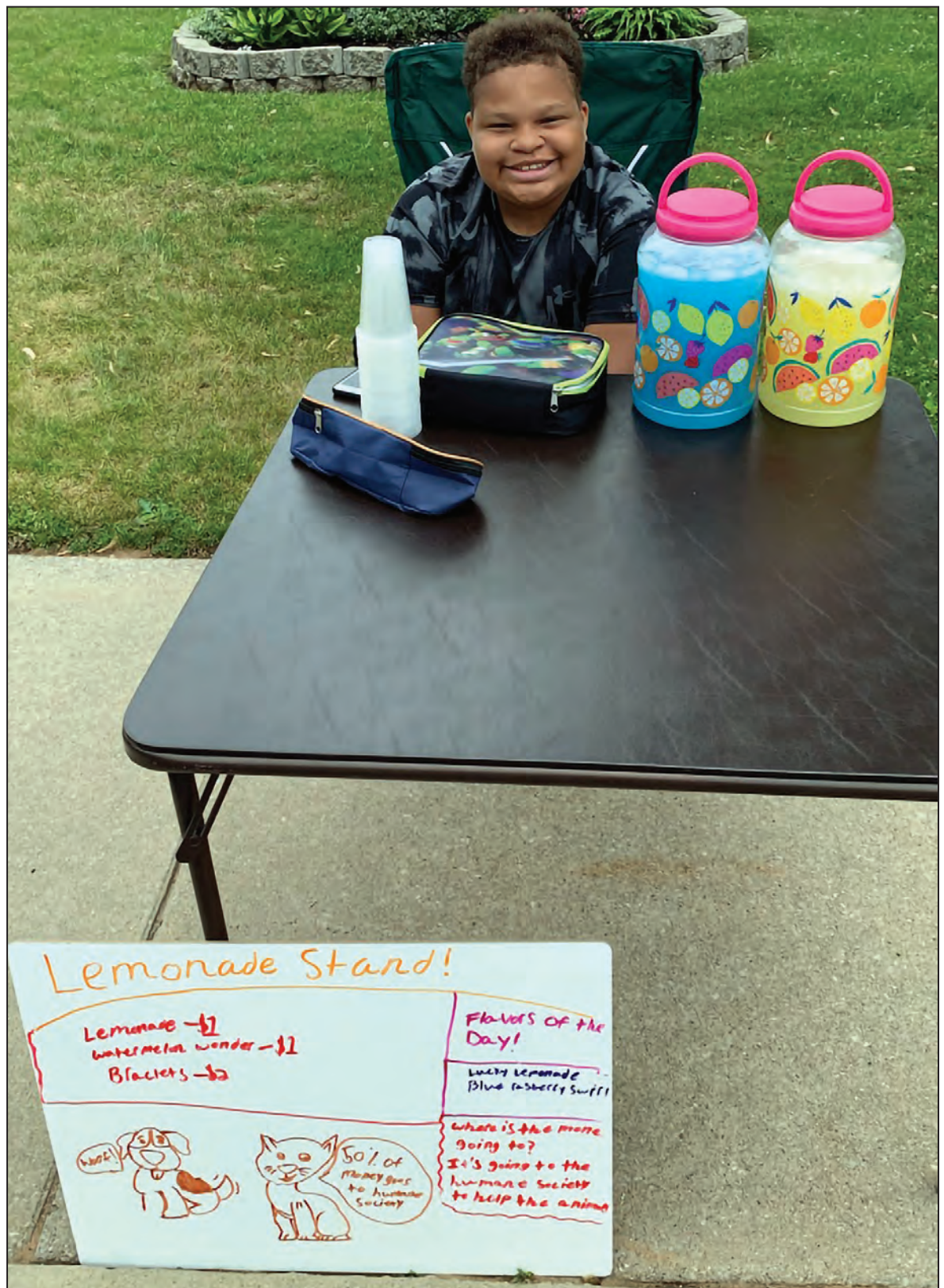
When not holding lemonade stands, Zittlow's main focus is on his education and enjoying his summer vacation.

Oh, to live like a Karner blue butterfly

While I was out working in the yard yesterday, I saw a Karner blue butterfly. What a thrill. The last one I saw was in 2016 as I hiked

near Glockie Lake, a challenging six-mile segment of the “Hundred Miles for a Hundred Years” Townsend Centennial Walk. I remember stopping to watch this remark-

able creature hover and flutter its delicate one-inch powder blue wings right in front of me. I was so entranced I almost got hit by a passing pickup truck.

I saw three more Karner blues two days later on the next segment, seven even more remote and intimidating miles on Gluckie Lake Trail. Wow, I had never seen a Karner blue, and now four in one week. That was some kind of wonderful. I figured I would probably never see another in my lifetime. Sadly, butterfly populations are declining dramatically, and these blue beauties have been on the endangered species list since 1992.

The Karner blue’s scientific name is *Lycæides melissa samuelis*. (I’m guessing the scientist who named it had a daughter named Melissa and a son named Samuel). Canada lists the Karner blue as extinct, but they can still be found in the Great Lakes states and small areas of New Jersey, New Hampshire and New York. Wisconsin’s Necedah National Wildlife Refuge is home to the world’s largest population due to its vast area of savannah and extensive fields of lupine.

I said hello to my unexpected visitor, taking the time to enjoy the encounter with this rare, enchanting creature. I congratulated myself on planting wildflowers in my garden a few years ago. One of them was blue lupine, happily growing near a thriving stand of milkweed, the only weed given permission to freely grow in my garden. That’s because monarchs, another endangered species, cannot exist without milkweed, and I am doing what I can to help the monarch population rebound.

Now Karner blues won’t touch milkweed, but they cannot live

without blue lupine, a lovely wildflower that blooms in late May. Blue lupine is the sole larval food source of the Karner blue. In one of those fascinating symbiotic relationships of the natural world, when Karner blue larvae feed on lupine leaves, the resulting damage actually helps the plant to thrive.

Monarch butterflies can have several generations each year, but Karner blues have just two. The first flight occurs sometime between mid-May and mid-June. First flight females lay their eggs on the lupine; then the eggs develop into the adults of the second flight, which generally occurs in July and August. It’s a marvelous stroke of luck I even saw a Karner in my yard, probably because the weather didn’t warm up this year until late May.

I’m fairly confident that all the Karner butterflies I saw were adult males. Not only do the male and female butterflies differ in appearance, adult males like sunny open areas whereas juveniles and females prefer shade. When I saw

the butterflies in 2016, they were on a sunlit gravel road winding through an open area covered with wildflowers. The one yesterday was near my flower bed, an open area baking in the sun during our drought-like conditions.

When you have a very limited lifespan, you need to get your priorities straight. These butterflies spend their three to five days of life gorging at their own version of an all-you-can-eat buffet. During one Necedah study, adult Karner blues were observed feeding on the nectar of over 40 different flowering plants.

When they’re not eating, they’re mating. Once that mission is accomplished, the males go back to their outdoor feasting and leave the females to the hard work of producing the next generation. I mentioned that to my husband, Jon. “That sounds like a helluva life if a guy could expand it to say, 90 years.” I smiled sweetly and reminded him it was his turn to make dinner.

I know it doesn’t seem possible,

but Karner blues and I have a lot in common. We both love wildflowers. We hate hot, humid weather and thrive when the thermometer reads 75-80 degrees. We love blackberries, except they like the flowers while I like the fruit. We hate wasps, flies, spiders and other biting insects. One major difference: they hate dragonflies and white tail deer; I love both. Then, dragonflies wouldn’t devour my young and deer wouldn’t consume my children’s sole source of food.

Still, all in all, doesn’t living like a Karner blue sound like fun? After all, humans also enjoy feasting and mating. I decided to put the question to Jon. He pondered it for a moment and then suggested we go out to dinner and come home to snuggle. Like the Karner blue, the man definitely has his priorities straight.

Sharks, mackerel provide Carolinas fishing action

I was waiting all morning to use the classic line from "Jaws": "We're gonna need a bigger boat."

When I finally started reeling in my first Atlantic sharp nose shark, I used it, although I'm not sure the 18-year-old first mate on board the Fish Hook I got the connection.

Although Fish Hook Charters is based in North Myrtle Beach, we were actually fishing off the shore of North Carolina near Sunset Beach. Our 45-foot custom boat was big enough for our fishing group of four, plus Capt. Brandon Johnson and first mate Holden Boulter. It was plenty big enough for the Atlantic sharp nose sharks, which seldom get more than 3 feet long.

They fought like they were mini great whites, providing plenty of action on our five-hour adventure.

We started out the morning trolling for Spanish mackerel and bluefish. The waves of the Atlantic Ocean were larger than those on the Gulf of Mexico in Florida that I'm used to when deep-sea fishing, but this boat (smaller than those 30- or 40-angler "cattle boats" I normally fish from) seemed to handle the waves well.

Trolling is more exciting than fishing off the bottom as is mostly done on Florida charter boats. You basically fish straight down for grouper,

waves, adding to the drama. You'll also get more of a workout with trolling, as I soon found out when I caught my first few bluefish and Spanish mackerel.

My line to start was the thick 100-pound test monofilament used for shark fishing, and I was on the starboard side of the stern, so I was catching fish hundreds of feet from the boat, while the others had considerably less reeling to do. The heavy line was causing fits for Boulter, who struggled to untangle at least two spider webs before switching me over to the bright green 20-pound mono used for the mackerel.

There were many times when I had to stop and rest when reeling in one of four mackerel and two bluefish I caught by mid-morning. The smaller mackerel seemed to fight harder than the big ones.

amberjack and red snappers in Florida, but you don't really see the fish until they are close to the surface. With trolling, you often see the fish jumping as they fight against the line and the

One of my early fish felt like a dead weight, initially pulling hard and then going limp. I actually thought he'd flipped the hook, but then I felt him on the line again.

Boulter started getting excited when the fish got close to the boat, yelling at Johnson to get the gaff. Up to that point, our mackerel were about a foot (the minimum) to 16 inches or so long. Since I had never caught or even seen one of them prior to this trip, I didn't know what a big one looked like.

They gaffed the fish quickly and pulled it aboard. After measuring its length (26 1/2 inches), Boulter dragged an old, rusty scale out of storage and determined it was "between 3 and 4 pounds." I called it "just under 4 pounds," as any self-respecting fisherman would. They told me it was the biggest one caught by the charter so far this season. I called it lunch.

"That one fought less than the little ones," I said to the captain.

"He heard about your reputation and just gave up," he said with a grin.

They are beautiful fish, with a bluish cast on the edges and gold dots scattered across the skin.

We switched over to shark fishing with cut bluefish about 20 feet down in 40 feet of water. Multiple lines were put out and when one rod

started twitching.

The real battle was when Boulter broke out the heavy tackle, baited up the hooks with some chunks of bluefish and cast out to the starboard side (we were all facing the stern). I caught my first Atlantic sharp nose shark just after 10 a.m., and it fought like a blue marlin for a few minutes. Boulter gaffed it and showed me how to hold it (some parts of a shark's skin are smooth and slippery, while others are rough) and tried to get it to open its mouth, but it refused.

Soon we had our limit of four (one per angler) and they were all about 3 feet long. Johnson assured us that that's about as big as they get.

Someone on one of the Fish Hook Charters' other boats (they have three total) caught a larger shark, but it was a different species. I'd guess it to be about 5 feet long and perhaps 50 pounds. When cleaning the big one, there were no license plates or other junk like the one from "Jaws," but the lucky angler did keep the jaws for a great souvenir.

Each day's events begin at 9 a.m. and last until 3:15 p.m. Participants can attend instruction at both sites, if their schedule requires, and there is some flexibility with self-study or other makeup options. Successful completion of the course allows 12- and 13-year-olds to work on their families' farms and operate machinery over public roads between the farm and fields. Mustangs' Stuhr earns top honor

Witt-Birn, Marion split top team honor

Area high school baseball teams enjoyed strong results this spring, with several teams winning conference titles or being in the title hunt all season and several individual players finding great success at the plate or on the mound.

Marion's baseball team had a memorable spring and was one of the top-ranked teams in Division 4 all season. Jaden Stuhr was the driving force that powered the Mustangs, and his dominant overall season earned him the NEW Media Inc. Player of the Year honor. It's the second straight season Stuhr has earned the honor.

Stuhr is headed to UW-Stevens Point, where he plans on pitching. This spring, he was just about lights out every time he stepped on the hill.

The senior covered 47 innings this spring, striking out a whopping 103 batters over that span and walking just 14. He surrendered just 21 hits, and only two of the 14 runs he allowed were earned for a sparkling 0.30 earned run average.

Stuhr won 10 games and was dealt just one loss.

"Off the mound this year I became pretty dominant, mostly by mixing my pitches when I needed to and locating them where I needed to," said Stuhr. "I worked the corners of the plate and zone and hit my spots while mixing in the off speed to keep hitters off balance...."

While his numbers on the mound were elite, Stuhr's statistics at the plate also stood out.

Stuhr hit for a .500 average and posted 19 extra-base hits, with 10 triples, eight doubles and a homer. The senior walked 27 times and stole 35 bases. He drove in 42 runs and scored 33 times.

"This year was by far my best year at the plate and I changed my stance a touch to really engage my lower half even more," said Stuhr. "Just putting the ball in play and spraying it all over the field helped bring success as well."

Stuhr's standout season almost was wiped out before it began after the senior dealt with some health issues during the school year.

He had to overcome reactive arthritis syndrome, an auto-immune disease that took away his vision, along with his ability to walk because of swollen joints.

"Hearing that I may not restore my vision on top of numerous other things really brought me a sense of reality," said Stuhr. "It made me realize that everything that I have is a gift, whether I believe it to be something big or small in my life, and hearing that really drove me to want to succeed greater than the season before."

"Pushing through the mental and physical challenges that came with by working out and getting reps in as much as possible — even though some was a little sooner than I should've — really helped get back to as close as I was the previous season. Everything happens for a reason and everything that is put into our lives God knows we can overcome, and that positive go get it attitude really was the key to it all. Using it as fuel and wanting to prove myself."

Stuhr was able to accomplish everything he hoped to individually and more, which helped him earn the Central Wisconsin Conference-North Division Player of the Year honor for the third straight season.

He will play on Team North at the Wisconsin Baseball Coaches Association All-Star Classic in Oshkosh on June 30 and July 1.

Honorable mentions

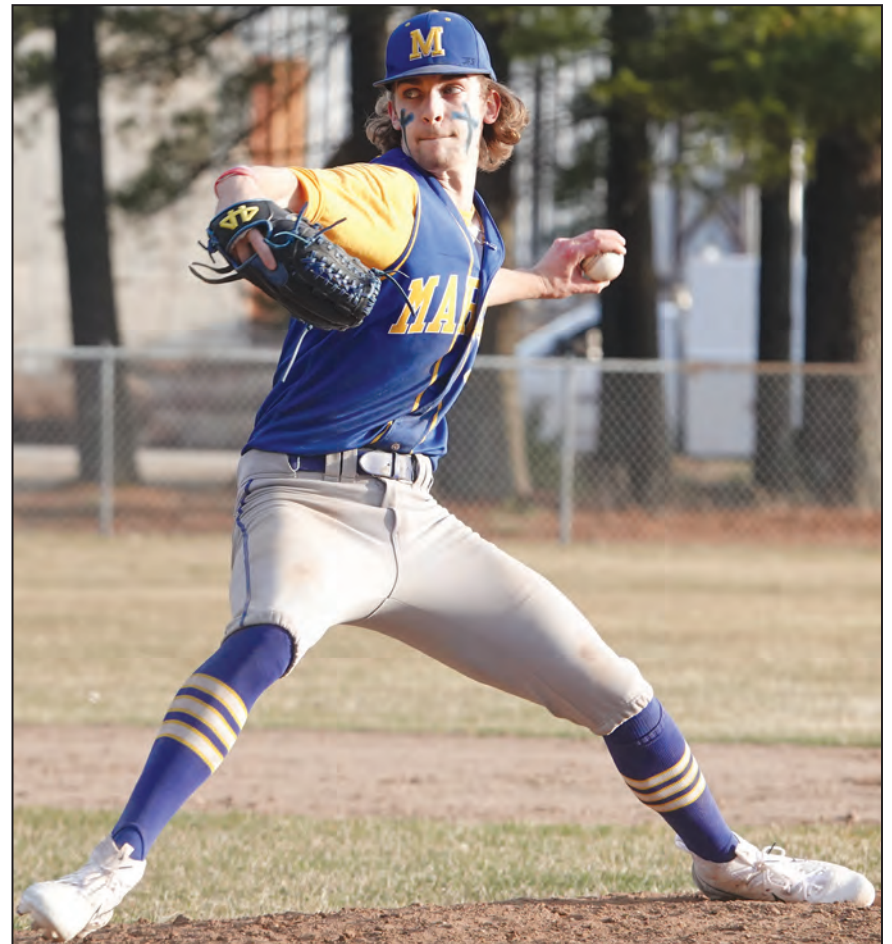
There was no shortage of individual talent in the area, as demonstrated by the many all-conference first team players. A few players stood out this spring.

Rogowski named top girls athlete again

Suring repeats as top area team after 2 titles

This spring season was another special one for area high school girls track and field athletes and teams, with several individuals making it to the state meet in La Crosse to cap the year.

After another dominant season and a state showing highlighted by four top-10 finishes, Wittenberg-Birnamwood's Reese Rogowski was tabbed the NEW Media Inc. Girls Athlete of the Year. This is the second straight spring Rogowski has earned the honor.

"The coaching, training and staying active during the off-season, like competing in other sports, helped me to enjoy the spring season I had," said Rogowski.

After a regular season full of top finishes and some of the state's top marks, Rogowski continued to impress as the season winded down.

At the Central Wisconsin Conference-Large Division Meet, Rogowski won the 100-, 200- and 400-meter dashes and long jump.

The top finishes became the norm for Rogowski during her high school career, but it was the fashion in which she won that stuck out.

She was 0.27 seconds faster than the second-place finisher in the 100, 0.94 seconds faster in the 200 and 3.13 seconds better in the 400. Rogowski won the long jump by a full foot.

Those finishes were even tighter than some of the ones she had earlier in the season, but Rogowski kept a couple things in mind to keep her eyes on the end goal of performing well at state.

"I tried to meet interval benchmarks while running throughout each meet to continue to improve throughout the season," said Rogowski.

"I kept in mind each meet that it could be my last meet, and to give everything I had to give in that moment."

Even with increased competition in the postseason, the top finishes kept piling up.

Rogowski won regional titles in the 100, 200, 400 and long jump and sectional titles in the 100, 200 and 400. She placed third in the long jump at sectionals to make it to state in all four of her events.

Rogowski competed in her three sprints on the first day of state competition and did enough to qualify for the finals in all three events.

She competed in the finals in the three sprints and in long jump on a hot second day of state.

Ironically, it was Rogowski's lowest finishing-event at sectionals that she turned in her best finish at state. She placed second in the long jump after a top leap of 18 feet, 2 inches.

Rogowski also made the state podium in the 400 (56.45) and 200 (24.94), placing third and sixth, respectively. The senior took 10th in the 100 (12.65).

"I'm proud to look back at the state meet now that I've let things sink in, because it was a goal of mine to finish top 10 in all my events," said Rogowski.

Area high school boys track and field teams and individual athletes enjoyed a productive spring season, with plenty of top finishes along the way.

Bowler's Emmitt Kietlinski separated himself from other individuals as the season went along and picked up a pair of top-two finishes at the state meet on his way to being named the NEW Media Inc. Boys Athlete of the Year.

Despite the competition improving, it didn't stop Kietlinski from winning.

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He was the top finisher in both events at the regional meet and then won the sectional high jump title, while placing second in the triple jump.

"In sports I never get nervous during games or meets. I actually tend to do better during big moments," said Kietlinski. "I certainly enjoyed competing in front of large crowds and I tended to feed off the pressure situations. I would remind myself to just do what I've done all year and everything would turn out fine."

Kietlinski delivered again during the state meet in La Crosse, winning the high jump and placing second in the triple jump.

The senior cleared 6 feet, 6 inches in the high jump. He was leading the triple jump with a leap of 44-9/4 before the final jump of the competition bumped him back to second.

"My goal all season was to be a state champion, so finishing state champion and state runner-up is something I will cherish forever. It

was a great way to end my senior year," said Kietlinski. "Being just the third state champion in Bowler school history is really special."

"In fact, a few hours after I won the high jump, I received a phone call from Tim Hanke, Bowler's first ever state champion (1987 in the triple jump). He had been watching the live results online from his home in South Carolina, tracked down a way to contact me, and called. His first words were, 'Welcome to the club!' His call meant a lot to me."

Shortly after graduating, Kietlinski made a trip to the University of Oregon to compete in the high jump and triple jump at the Nike Outdoor Nationals.

Kietlinski placed second in the high jump after clearing 6-9, and was 23rd in the triple jump after a top mark of 42-2/4.

Honorable mentions

There was no shortage of talented individuals on track and field teams this spring, with a few get-

ting to state.

Gillett's Alex Peterson made it to state in three events, placing fourth in the 1,600, fifth in the 3,200 and fifth on the team's 4x800 relay team.

scored 14 times. Vertz walked 10 times and was a strikeout victim just four times.

“Growing up, the love for the game was found on the mound, but coming into this year, I had a goal

for myself that I wanted to be a threat at the plate,” said Vertz. “I put in many hours this offseason and after practices to get more swings in. After putting in the work, I saw it all pay off during the season.”

Vertz top individual moment from the season came when she pitched 12 innings and struck out 21 batters against De Pere.

“As a team my favorite moment was our grit to see the game into the very last out, so my favorite moment would be all our walk-off hits and celebrating with the team,” said Vertz.

Thompson starred at the plate for Bonduel, while playing providing great defense from her short-stop position.

Five of her home runs came in the final three regular season games and the team’s first postseason contest. She drove in 13 runs between those four games and the second postseason contest.

“Me personally, I love pressure, I feel as though I perform better under pressure and I just continue to strive to be that person my teammates count on to deliver on the field,” said Thompson. “I prefer to be down in the count during my at-bats, it helps me to focus in and just put the ball in play to advance my teammates on the bases.”

The junior’s top individual moment from this season was breaking the school’s home run record, an accolade she’s been after since she was a freshman.

“My favorite team memories would have to be all the bus rides with loud music, our victory over Amherst at home, and just the countless hours I got to spend with this amazing team,” said Thompson.
