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Bonduel residents walk to remember 9/11

Event holds significance for community members who recall 2001 terrorist attacks

Dozens of Bonduel residents walked the streets of the village Sept. 9 to remember the lives lost during the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

Bonduel has done tributes for Patriot Day for years, but this is the first time that a commemorative walk has been done. Participants departed from the village's fire station, took 2,200 steps (approximately 0.9 mile) and returned to the fire station where volunteers were cooking up burgers and more.

The World Trade Center, where hijackers crashed two planes, saw 2,753 people lose their lives, with 343 of them being firefighters, 23 police officers and 37 port authority officers. Another 184 people were killed when another plane crashed into the Pentagon, and another 40 died when a fourth plane crashed near Shanksville, Pennsylvania, when passengers and crew tried to retake control of the flight deck.

Some of the people who perished from the terrorist attacks had their names and photos clipped to the brim of Bonduel firefighters' helmets during the walk. Fire Chief Kevin Lynch had a distant cousin, Michael Francis Lynch, who was a firefighter who perished in the aftermath.

"The tags were collected at different 9/11 stair climbs, and they all represent fallen firefighters from that day," the fire chief said. "Hopefully, in the future we can get some more (people walking), and make this a bigger event."

The walk was organized through Celebrate Bonduel, which coordinates a number of activities in the village, including its Independence Day celebration. Spokeswoman Car-

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rie Beilfuss noted that Bonduel's fire department, which is all volunteer, and its firefighters are extremely important to the community.

"We want to make sure we're thanking them as a community," Beilfuss said. "We are very lucky to have the firefighters, paramedics, our police officers. As we're running away from anything traumatic, they're running into it."

Beilfuss said the appreciation extends to the family members of someone involved with public safety, as there's always a risk that their loved ones might not come home again.

This year's Patriot's Day observance is a departure from previous years, Beilfuss noted, with prior events taking place at the village's pavilion. Speakers spoke on the importance of remembering 9/11, and emergency services personnel and military members were invited to

take part, but Beilfuss felt there were other things that could be done as a tribute.

"I kept seeing all this stuff on the walks and things like that you can do like stair climbs, so we changed things this year," she said.

Beilfuss said she had thought about having people climb the stairs of the bleachers at Bonduel High School but noted it would be a lengthy event, so she felt the walk would be simpler while still getting the message across.

The events of 9/11 hold significance for Beilfuss because they happened during her lifetime, but she could recall other tragic days that did not ring out as important to her because she didn't witness it.

"I can remember being a little girl and hearing about Pearl Harbor, and that didn't mean nothing. I mean, it did but it didn't," Beilfuss said. "Then something like that happened during

my time. It was on our land, and you never know what's going to happen when you leave your house in the morning. I remember I was pregnant laying on the couch, and I was watching this plane flying on Good Morning America, and I thought, 'Oh my God, what movie am I watching? Wait, I'm not watching a movie.' For some reason, it just hit me."

For Beilfuss, it's even more important for the community to rally around the firefighters because they're volunteers. While larger communities pay their firefighters, Bonduel's crew does it as a service, working other full-time jobs and often having to bail out from family activities when a fire call comes in.

"I just think there's an extra place in heaven for them because they're selfless," Beilfuss said.

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Revaluation: Shawano property values up 28%

Big jump due to discrepancy last year between assessed and equalized values in community

The market analysis revaluation done by the city of Shawano shows that property values have jumped up an average of 28%, according to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard.

He warned at a city finance committee meeting Sept. 7, however, that higher assessed property values don't translate to a similar increase in taxes. Notices were recently sent out to property owners, which has raised a lot of questions.

"We're going to have to show what this means for someone who had a 20% increase or someone who had a 40% increase as we go through the budget," Sheppard said. "The assessments don't drive the tax impact. In fact, it's spread out now over a wider pool, and potentially some people are going to see a decrease just by the assessments alone."

The revaluation was done after the state came out with Shawano's

equalized value, which went from \$592 million to \$718 million. However, the assessed value, which is what municipalities use to determine tax rates, remained at \$592 million, giving the city a ratio of 83% from assessed to equalized. State law requires the revaluation if the ratio strays outside the 95% to 105% range.

On the city's Facebook page, it's noted that houses in Shawano are selling significantly higher than before, driving increases in property values.

The tax impact will not be fully known until all of the taxing entities in Shawano — the city, Shawano School District, Shawano County and Northeast Wisconsin Technical College — go through their budget processes. In 2023, taxpayers paid \$10.67 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation on city taxes, \$5.17 for the county, \$8.24 for the school district and 79 cents for NWTC. That means that the owner of a \$100,000 home paid \$2,339 in taxes.

In the Facebook post, it was noted that the new Shawano Municipal Utilities building under construction had nothing to do with the increase in property values, as SMU's budget is separate from the city and is funded by utility rates, not property taxes.

Sheppard noted that the gap between the assessed and equalized values was an unusual anomaly, and he preferred having smaller increases.

"We don't like doing large updates like that," Sheppard said. "We like to do things incremental and keep things steady. That's what we'll have moving forward. We're in weird times, and the market is changing in Shawano. These are the growing pains of that impact."

City Clerk Lesley Nemetz noted she has received a number of calls on the issue in recent days, but the majority of folks have asked questions and learned information as opposed to being angry and ill-informed. She hopes those people will speak to their neighbors and spread the information.

"I was able to walk through this well with individuals on the phone," Nemetz said. "I can honestly say every one of them, we hung up the phone in a much better mood than when I answered, and that's not always the case."

Nemetz added that the revaluation is good news for anyone who wants to sell their property, as the higher values can hopefully result in a higher selling price.

Sheppard agreed, noting that someone who bought a home in the city in 2017 is in pretty good shape for selling at this time.

"People have said: 'Awesome. It's about time that I can show how much my house is worth,'" Sheppard said. "I totally understand why some people get flustered or concerned because it's a big jump."

\$15K donation helps fire department get PPE

The Shawano Area Fire Department received a generous donation of \$15,000 recently from Little Rapids Corp. and the Egan Family Foundation.

The funds will be utilized to acquire essential tactical gear aimed at safeguarding the lives of firefighters and emergency response personnel during potentially hazardous active shooter situations.

Recognizing the urgent need to enhance the capabilities of their emergency response teams, the fire department has recently participated in active shooter training. The department has been designated as a key component of the emergency response teams tasked with treating and extracting victims during potential active shooter incidents. Given the unique circumstances of the region, where full-time fire and EMS services are not as readily available as in larger cities, the role of the volunteer fire department becomes even more critical to provide adequate

manpower and support.

One of the challenges identified in these situations is the need for specialized tactical gear, including body armor and other safety equipment, that would allow firefighters and emergency personnel to enter the scene before it is fully secured, potentially exposing them to active threats. Due to the extraordinary nature of this requirement, these items are not included in the department's regular operating budget.

Fire Chief Shawn Borlace said he appreciated that the fire department will be able to purchase the personal protective equipment to stay safe during critical incidents.

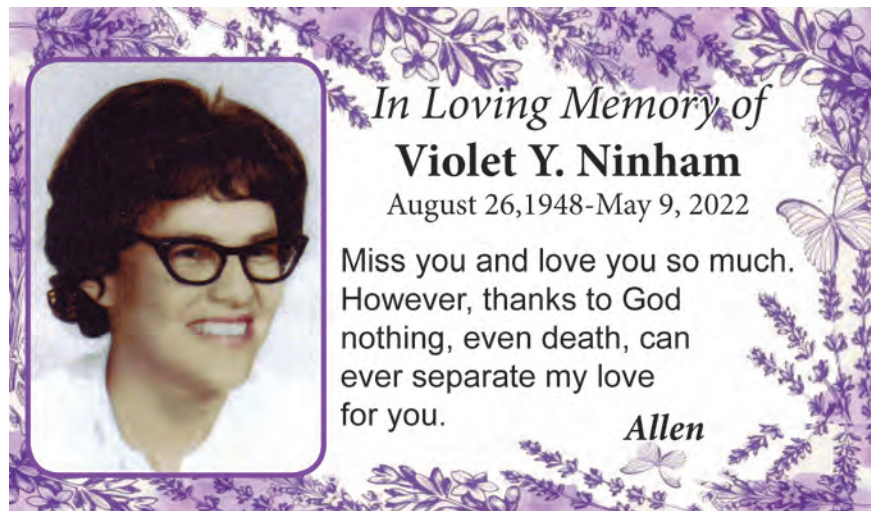
"The PPE being purchased will not only increase safety for the firefighters, but our community as well," Borlace said.

Brad Keuschel, who works for Little Rapids Corp. and is a member of the Shawano Area Fire Department, also sees the benefit of the protective gear.

"When the training for these active shooter scenarios came to be, there was a lot of new information given to us as a department, and new gear that we would need to get that is outside of our day-to-day firefighting equipment," Keuschel said. "As with anything, we were not sure how or where we would be able to work these into

our budget. I know that the Egan Family Foundation is a strong supporter in our community and have helped many organizations out without receiving the recognition that they deserved."

School board finalizes community survey

Discussion of high school priorities looks at lumping them together vs. considering them separately

Final tweaks are being done this week on a survey that the Shawano School Board signed off on Sept. 11 by an 8-1 vote, which is expected to gauge whether voters are likely to support a capital referendum in April 2024 that would build a new middle school and renovate the other three schools.

In early October, the eight-page survey will be sent to all households in the Shawano School District. It will be the third survey from the district in the last five years, but this one will list specific capital project areas to help district officials to determine how much of a referendum that voters would support, with specific amounts ranging from \$70 million to \$110 million listed on the survey, along with options that voters would prefer a lower amount or that voters would not support a referendum no matter what amount the district asks for.

The survey will ask specific school questions, with the big one being whether the voters would support building a new middle school next to the existing Olga Brener Intermediate School to the tune of \$53.6 million. Along with the question will be an explanation of why such a measure is being considered, including figures on

how much it would cost the district to maintain the existing Shawano Community Middle School building, which is almost 70 years old.

There is a question about priorities at Shawano Community High School, which are estimated to cost up to \$30 million once all is said and done. This includes a new weight room and other athletic priorities, as well as changes to the district's performing arts facilities, career and technical education wing and more. The question does not include the pool facility and other athletic facilities outside the main building.

There will be separate questions for those issues, with one specifically for the pool. There is talk of closing down the pool, which is becoming more expensive to maintain. The question asks if voters would support spending \$5 million to bring the pool up to modern specs, or if they would rather spend \$2.3 million to close the pool, which would then possibly become the new weight room.

As for outdoor athletic facilities, the survey would ask if there's support to spend about \$9.1 million for a football stadium and upgrading other fields and courts.

The survey will also ask if residents support spending \$5.2 million to create a daycare facility at Hillcrest Primary School to help families who

are having difficulty finding available local options. Another question will ask about spending \$4.4 million to update Olga Brener, which is the second oldest district facility next to SCMS.

The survey will also provide options for respondents to provide specific comments on projects, which is expected to help board members make decisions when it comes to determining in January whether to proceed to the April ballot. There are several places on the paper survey to provide responses.

Board member Frank Kugel, who cast the lone vote against the survey, recommended that there be more spaces for comments, specifically on the high school projects. He wanted the specific projects to each have their own question and space for comments so that survey takers who might support some of the SCHS projects but are against others would not have to make an all-or-nothing decision.

"I've been involved in multiple referendums in the Green Bay area, so as I look at, under the community high school, the six talking points, I would be really happy if each talking point could be rated and not have them all together in one rating," Kugel said. "In my experience, because of some of the things in that one question, they will say no."

Bill Foster with School Solutions,

which put the survey together, noted that Kugel's suggestion would make for a longer survey, but it would help to provide specific data on what voters would support in terms of high school improvements.

That was not a view shared by others on the board. Board member Bobbi Lemerond saw the move as something that would create factions and divide instead of bringing the community together.

"This way, we're not pitting people against each other for a certain department," Lemerond said. "I would like to see all of these areas get expanded and not just give everything to one area. I think this makes it more fair to give everyone something and not just update the athletic area or just update the performing arts or just update the tech ed."

Superintendent Kurt Krizan pointed out that the district survey from early 2022 had data on whether voters would support performing arts over athletics or vice-versa. Kugel did not believe the data was still valid, considering how the economy has changed in the last 18 months.

"We have different people, different ideas and a different economy," Kugel said. "Let's get an updated idea of what the people want."

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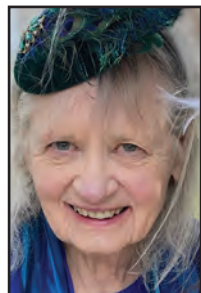

Some HSHS, Prevea services operating again

IT staff continues to work to solve systemwide outage

Officials with Hospital Sisters Health System (HSHS) hospitals in Illinois and Wisconsin, including the hospital in Oconto Falls, and Prevea Health clinics in Shawano and Oconto counties continue to work to correct the systemwide outage that has plagued the medical providers since Aug. 27.

"We are working diligently to

bring all of our systems back online as quickly and as safely as possible, and we are prioritizing patient safety as we establish a process for restoration," according to a statement on a newly created website aimed at addressing the issue. "We are making steady progress in our restoration process."

The HSHS hospital website dedicated to the clinical and communications system outage will also continue to be updated as more information becomes available: <https://www.hshsupdates.org>. For updates specific to Prevea, visit www.prevea.com/updates.

Whether patients' information was compromised remains unknown.

"The investigative process into the scope of the incident is ongoing and

will take time to complete," according to the website. "If we determine any patients' sensitive, personal information is involved, we will notify them in accordance with applicable law."

Some patients have reported receiving suspicious communications that appears to be a fraudulent bill. Hospital officials said they should ignore such notices.

"At this time, HSHS and Prevea are not collecting payments from any patients for outstanding bills," officials said. "We will notify you when billing processes are back up and running. That being said, we are aware of certain HSHS partners in Wisconsin and Illinois that are sending out bills to patients. You should review all bills carefully to ensure they are for

services that were rendered."

Suspicious emails, texts and phone calls should not be responded, and when possible, information should be saved and forwarded to questions@hshs.org for tracking and investigation.

Prevea will accept cash and checks on site at the check-in desk if a patient requests to make a payment or if payment is required for service.

As of Sept. 7, Prevea's website lists several phone numbers in the Green Bay area that are now active and available for patients to call.

Wendy Powell no longer has to travel to Appleton to check out books up close and personal with the opening of Thrifty Books in Shawano.

The other side of the coin is that she has to run the place herself, with some help from her husband, Nathan.

The couple opened the new shop Sept. 7 in the Fairview Plaza at 732 E. Green Bay St. in Shawano. The Powells have new and used books, board games and some craft items on consignment to keep locals entertained.

"I love reading, and my go-to bookstore is in Appleton at the Half-Price Bookstore, mainly because there is no bookstore here. There used to be, but it closed down years ago," Powell said, referring to Book World, which closed down its Shawano shop downtown in 2017 after the company decided to close all of its 45 stores, claiming e-books' rising popularity as a factor.

Powell and her husband attend the Church of Acts, also located in Fairview Plaza, and she noticed the vacant storefront nearby.

"I just put two and two together. There's no bookstore here in Shawano, and it's a wonderful space," Powell said. "I thought I would start a bookstore because I love books, and it was time consuming going back and forth to Appleton. That's how this originated."

Business ownership is a new thing for Powell, who is still working full time as activities director and a certified nursing assistant for Evergreen Health Services. She attributed her determination and her husband's "backbone" to the reasons that the bookstore is now open.

"It's been a fun time, two months getting this together," Powell said.

Nathan Powell pointed out that the shelving came from the couple's basement and joked that all the stuff is now "on the floor." He noted that other local businesses have helped to push them in the right direction.

"I asked, 'Hey, what do you use for your POS (Point of Service) system,' and boom, they gave me a business card," he said. "All of these

books here have been donated, so obviously there's a large want."

Wendy Powell said she's "making it work" with juggling a full-time job and opening her own business, which is currently open three days a week.

"Being able to get lost, especially if you're having a rough day but regardless of whether you're having a good day or a bad day, just being able to pick up a book puts you into a different world," she said. "I absolutely love to get into different books."

Baiting a bear named Schultz with apple strudel

Overhearing a conversation my husband was having with his good buddy, I couldn't help but bend an ear to listen. Sometimes I eavesdrop, but usually I zone out. Afterwards, he tells me any important stuff.

I caught the words "bait" and "bear" and "swamp." Putting two and two together, I thought, "Oh-oh."

Finishing his conversation, he turned to me. "I'm gonna help Tim get a bear. Gonna haul bait. In the swamp." He waited for my reaction. "What?"

A bear? Baiting a bear? Like to entice him in and not just forget he's out there roaming around big and hungry? I gulped. I don't have a fondness for bears.

"Ya. He's got a bunch of bait he bought, and we're going out there and set up the spot this afternoon."

This baiting bear idea, while I was at first extremely doubtful, has, to my total astonishment, caught my interest. In a big way. As in, I'm the first one to check if our friend has sent a picture of a hit the night before. I can't believe myself. I'm still skeptical but very intrigued.

One morning I helped my husband load up the back of our four-wheeler and, setting out, realized, oh, this is quite fun. Getting about 35 feet from the spot, he advised me to shush now and just follow him in. It was a beautiful morning, the cedars in the swamp were fragrant and the sun was peeking through their canopy, leaving light images so intense it almost made me forget what I was doing in there.

I was baiting a bear. One we'd seen on camera, and this fella was no small bear. In fact, he was probably close to 400 pounds, and from the way he was hitting the bait pile, he'd gain a few more before hunting season rolled around.

After refilling the bait log, I was following my husband out of the swamp that morning and so intent on watching for the bear, which I was sure was watching me, so sure, that my senses were on high alert, like the air was charged with electricity. Even though it was a sultry August morning and the humidity level already high, goosebumps appeared on my arms and a sensation of hair-standing-on-end was rippling down the back of my neck. Suddenly, I thought I heard a

low growl. Goosebumps appeared on top of my goosebumps. Stopping to cautiously peer through undergrowth and toppled-over huge tree trunks that had all the appearance of a big black bear, I heard it again, that low growl. Then I realized with a start — it was my stomach. My stomach was growling! Lord have mercy, Kay. Get a grip.

Getting back to the four-wheeler, we made our way out at the edge of our cornfield alongside a fresh spring-fed creek that goes way back through our 40-acre swamp — a paradise for forest creatures and the perfect spot to set up bait. A number of bears were sighted on adjacent property last year, so our friend, with my husband's approval, set about fashioning his baiting area. This guy has a tree business

on the side (Tim Peterson, Tree Surgeon LLC) and as he felled one at a client's property mid-summer, he noticed it had been hollowed out. Perfect. He sawed a hunk of plywood and sealed it at the bottom of that 4-foot hollow log. After adding his bait, he covered the top with the same size piece of plywood and stuck a large rock on top to discourage raccoons, skunks, chipmunks, squirrels, etc., from snacking. This snack was for one particular species — a big, black boar bear we nicknamed Schultz.

Sgt. Schultz, from "Hogan's Heroes" back in the day, especially loved apple strudel. With all the bait we've been adding, Schultz particularly goes after the orchard fresh cobbler filling. In addition to the cobbler, we've taken out apple/vegetable sticks, marshmallows, buttercream frosting, caramel sauce, sweetened cereal and granola, adding a liquid bacon concoction to drool over the log. It's a sugar party out there.

For the most part, Schultz pushes it aside to get at that apple strudel. Before all of the bait was placed, our friend had walked the length of the 40-acre swamp, spraying liquid

smoke in the trees to entice the bear into checking out that distinct aroma hanging around.

Because I know very little about bear hunting, I asked our friend a few questions.

"What is your weapon of choice?"

"I like to use a crossbow."

"Why a crossbow?"

"It's quiet and fast and one shot is all I need." He is quite confident.

"How do you know where to sit?"

"I'm basing that on the direction he's been coming from, and pretty much I'll determine that when season starts. I've been watching on the trail cam, and I can kinda tell already."

Bear season for Zone C has not started as of this writing. Watch for a follow-up. If I can handle the goosebumps, that is.

Book details maintaining Oneida sovereignty

Oneida Nation tribal member Rebecca M. Webster is guided by the teachings of her people. “Under the Great Law, we are taught to carry ourselves with three main principles — kanikuliyo/skana (peace of mind), kanolunkwatsla (love) and katsast[^]nsla (power).”

Webster’s book, “In Defense of Sovereignty: Protecting the Oneida Nation’s Inherent Right to Self-Determination,” demonstrates how her nation applies these concepts to their social, political and legal dealings with the village of Hobart.

Webster, an associate professor in the American Indian Studies Department at the University of Minnesota, Duluth, is a former senior staff attorney for the Oneida Nation. Additionally, she noted, “I currently reside on the Oneida reservation and have resided there for most of my life, mostly on the portion of the reservation that the village of Hobart occupies.”

The Oneida Nation has held land in Wisconsin since 1822, but the land they received through their treaties has been reduced by the 1877 Dawes Allotment Act. Webster explained, “Allotment was a process the United States used to break up communal tribal land holdings and give title of smaller parcels to individual tribal members.”

She added, “It was also a way to get ownership of tribal lands into the hands of non-tribal members. For the Oneida Nation, tribal members lost ownership of 90% of the land on the reservation in a single generation due to the effects of allotment.”

Allotted lands were removed from federal trust status, meaning they were subject to taxes and could be owned by non-Native people. In 1903, the Wisconsin Legislature created the town of Hobart, which is

located entirely within the treaty boundaries of the Oneida Nation.

A hundred years later, the leaders of what is now known as the village of Hobart tried to deny the sovereignty of Oneida Nation. So far, the village has spent nearly \$1 million in losing efforts to impose restrictions on tribally owned lands and community gatherings. Most famously, Hobart lost their lawsuit in state court that attempted to force the Nation to buy a permit to hold their annual Big Apple Fest.

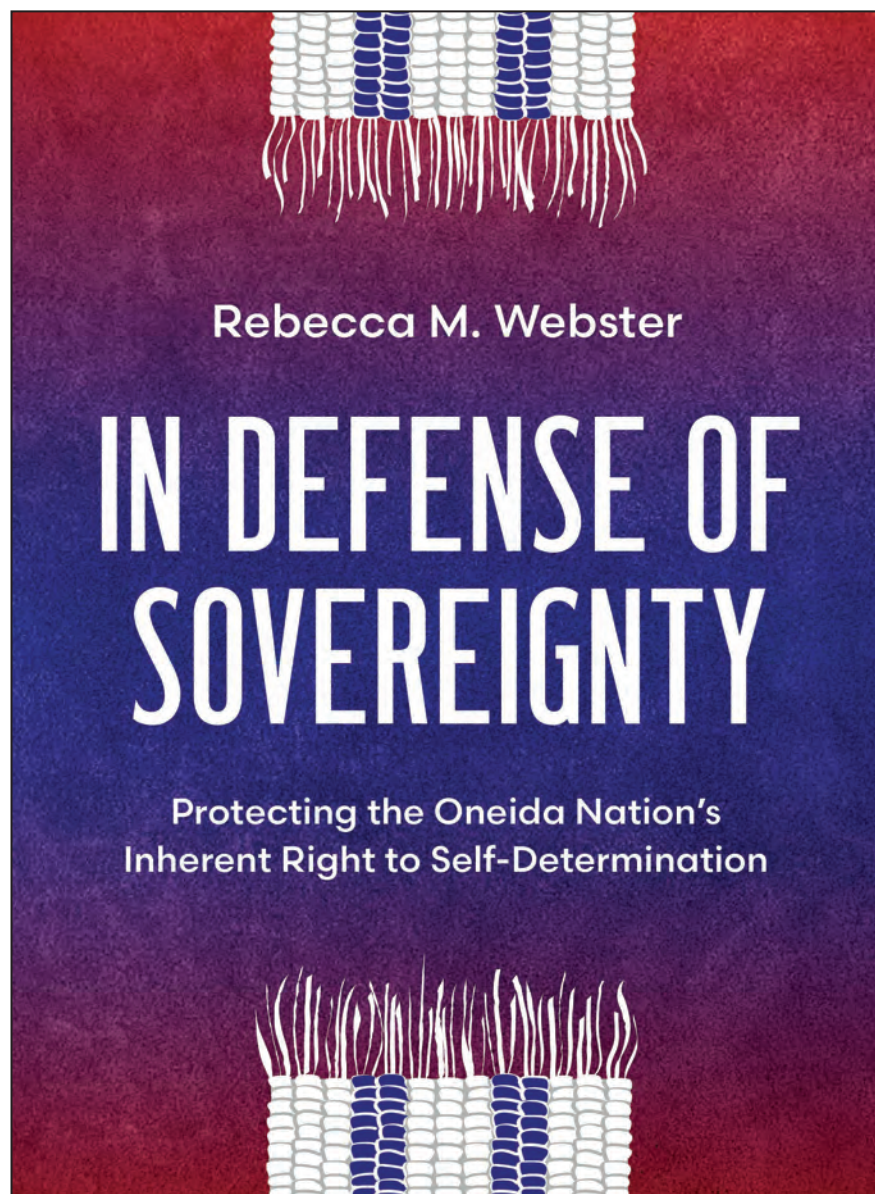
Webster revealed, “This book came about after the Big Apple Fest decision. For a long time, I wanted to find a way to comprehensively educate those wanting to learn more about our litigation history with the village of Hobart. I thought a book would be a perfect vessel to carry that story.”

An influencing factor on the Wisconsin’s circuit court’s ruling against Hobart’s claims was the 2022 federal Supreme Court’s ruling in *McGirt v. Oklahoma*, which affirmed federal, rather than state, jurisdiction over tribal lands.

Webster explicated, “*McGirt* reaffirmed decades of case law that left reservations intact absent express Congressional action to diminish or disestablish them. One of Hobart’s claims was that the Oneida Reservation was diminished and disestablished. The lower court in the Big Apple Fest case agreed. Thankfully, the seventh circuit rejected this claim, citing *McGirt*.”

The book also reveals the Oneida Nation’s endeavors to repurchase their original treaty land. In Webster’s words, “Politics are temporary. Nation ownership of land is forever.”

She elaborated that “I think the need to reacquire land lost through allotment happened imme-



diately as the land was being lost. It wasn’t until the passage of the Indian Reorganization Act of 1934 that the Oneida Nation had a mechanism in place to start to rebuild its landholdings. The Oneida Nation began acquiring land in 1937 and passed several government resolutions setting aside money from its annual budget to dedicate to land acquisition. They did this knowing that it would take generations to rebuild our land base.”

Webster wrote that, due to the Oneida Nation’s victories in court, “relations between the nation and the village can now be written on a clean slate.” She noted that doing so will require Hobart to accept their losses. “With the exception of the still questionable ability of the village to condemn tribal-owned fee land, every single one of their legal theories has

been flatly rejected by the courts. We now have a clearly defined place to begin discussion our relationships moving forward.”

Webster conveyed that “My ideal reader is someone who wants to learn more about how tumultuous tribal and local governments relationships can be, as well as learning more about how these relationships can improve. Unfortunately, the conflict draws people in, but the final words talk about how we can grow together as a community.”

To put it another way, Webster’s text, like the author herself, is grounded in kanikuliyo/skana, kanolunkwatsla and katsast[^]nsla.

Legacy Star 406th barn quilt created for Shawano County

Shawano County's 406th barn quilt, called Legacy Star, is now on display on a barn at N4807 Short Road, Krakow.

The quilt has been sponsored by Josh and Debby Bierhals, who live on the farm that is owned by Debby's parents, Walter Gene and Janet Bohm, who live about a mile away on Nichols Drive.

"We decided to get a barn quilt to commemorate the year we purchased the farm and continue the 120-year-old family tradition," Debby Bierhals said. "We have always appreciated the beautiful barns on family farms and now enjoy looking at the barn quilts around Shawano County as well."

Augusta Bohm purchased the farm from Charles Meilke in 1901. It was later sold to their son Emil Bohm and his wife, Ella, then to their son Herbert Bohm and his wife Sophie. When Herbert purchased the farm, there were stipulations in the agreement such as keeping his parents supplied with eggs, milk and meat and to provide split firewood for use in their stoves.

"It was just one of the unique things I learned while reading the farm abstract," Debby said.

The next owners of the farm were Walter A. Bohm and his wife Irene. Now, Josh and Debby, who live on the farm with their four children — Tristen, 14; Payten, 12; Gaven, 11; and Britten, 7 — are in the process of purchasing the farm from her parents. Once they take ownership of the farm, it will make five generations the farm has been in the Bohm family.

The farm consists of 80 acres and includes the farmhouse, a beef barn, a dairy barn, a silo and a machine shed. The original farm consisted of a pig barn, a chicken coop and a small barn that housed six dairy cows and two horses.

In the 1930s, a larger barn was built that was 40 feet long but without a foundation. Over the years, four additions were put on, including lifting it and setting it on a stone foundation.

Debby Bierhals grew up on her parents' farm on Nichols Drive but spent some of her childhood at the farm with her grandparents. She remembers riding scooters and skateboards up

and down the driveway, playing in the small nearby creek and riding three-wheelers and snowmobiles through the fields with her family.

Josh Bierhals grew up in the country near Pulaski and he and Debby met in middle school. Debby went on to get a degree in veterinary technology from University of Wisconsin-Madison and, when she returned, she and Josh got married and purchased the house on Short Road in 2005. Debby now works as a vet tech and Josh works in the building business.

"Each of our four kids enjoys different aspects of growing up on a farm," Debby Bierhals said. "Tristen has farming blood running through his veins and is my dad's right-hand man. Payten is the animal lover, like me, and enjoys caring for and raising our animals. Gaven loves helping with the fieldwork and riding in the chopper, and Britten is a combination of them all."

Josh and Debby Bierhals enjoy raising their family and their menagerie of animals that includes horses, cows, pigs, goats, chickens, ducks, rabbits, dogs and cats and look forward to what the future holds.

The barn quilt was painted by the Shawano County barn quilt committee and was put on display by LeRoy and Keenan Raddant, who work for Rad-dant Electric in Shawano.

DATCP providing dairy processor grants

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) has opened the window for Wisconsin dairy processors to apply for dairy processor grants through Oct. 13.

The grants aim to foster innovation, improve profitability, and sustain the long-term viability of Wisconsin's dairy processing facilities.

"Wisconsin is proud to be America's Dairyland and produce the best dairy products in the world," said Gov. Tony Evers in a press release. "I was glad to sign the 2023-2025 state budget and once again provide funding to support innovation in our dairy industry."

A total of \$500,000 is available for this year's dairy processor grants, as part of the state's biennial budget. Eligible applicants must operate a licensed dairy processing plant in Wisconsin that is engaged in pasteurizing, processing, or manufacturing milk or dairy products. Funding from these grants can be used to address a wide range of dairy business needs such as food safety, staff training, plant expansion or modernization,

and professional consulting services.

"Dairy processors play an essential role in our state's dairy supply chain," said DATCP Secretary Randy Romanski. "These grants allow dairy processors across Wisconsin to continue innovating. Since this program began in 2014, processors have utilized program support to expand, market, and invest in Wisconsin's dairy industry."

Grants will be awarded for projects up to \$75,000 and two years in duration. Processors are required to provide a match of 20 percent of the grant amount. Recipients will be chosen through a competitive selection process.

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Bow & Youth Hunting Guide 2023

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Ready for the fall hunting seasons?

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds hunters to prepare for the opening of several hunting seasons in September. Hunters can once again head to Wisconsin's wild spaces as these seasons open across the state.

There are five dates throughout September when seasons open. Hunters are encouraged to double check they have the correct opening date for their season before going out for a hunt.

Sept. 1: Common gallinule, early Canada goose, early teal, mourning dove, rail, snipe.

Sept. 6: Bear.

Sept. 16: Cottontail rabbit (northern zone), crow, deer archery and crossbow, goose, ruffed grouse (Zone A), squirrels, turkey, youth waterfowl.

Sept. 23: Duck (northern zone), woodcock.

Sept. 30: Duck (southern zone).

The DNR also reminds hunters of the online resources available on its hunting webpage. In addition to hunting regulations, seasons dates, hunting hours and other resources, the public can find a list of public lands open to hunting using the Public Access Lands webpage.

As Wisconsin's most popular hunting seasons ramp up, it's important for all hunters to do their part to keep Wisconsin a safe place to hunt by following these firearm safety rules:

T - Treat every firearm as if it is loaded.

A - Always point the muzzle in a safe direction.

B - Be certain of your target, what's before it and what's beyond

it.

K - Keep your finger outside the trigger guard until you are ready to shoot.

Anyone born on or after Jan. 1, 1973, must have a hunter education

certification to purchase a hunting license, unless hunting under the Mentored Hunting Law. Learn about safe hunting in Wisconsin and register to take a hunter education course on the DNR website.

Consider hunting on public land

If you aren't blessed with generous relatives who own a wooded farm or have your own 40-acre slice of paradise, finding a place to hunt is going to come before finding that trophy buck.

Fortunately you live in public hunting paradise, also known as Wisconsin. Slightly more than 7 million acres of land here is open to hunting in some form, including federal, state

and county land.

When I first moved to God's Country in 2000, having previously lived in Illinois and then Iowa, I was amazed at the amount of public land. I spent many years chasing deer and turkeys on public sites in Waupaca and Shawano counties, including Navarino State Wildlife Area, a 15,000-acre site teeming with deer, turkeys, waterfowl, small game and fish. I did take at least one deer from this mini-wilderness.

Although many hunters prefer

to hunt private land, public hunting can offer a few advantages. First off, you don't need to invest thousands or even hundreds of thousands of dollars to buy the land — you already helped pay for it. You won't need to spend more thousands on taxes (yes, you probably are already doing that, too). You can't plant food plots or leave your tree stands or blinds on public land all year, but if the hunting isn't that great or you just want a change of scenery, get out your plat book or cell phone and find a

new spot. Or scout multiple spots for many options when the wind direction changes or you tire of wading through swamp or stinging nettles.

One thing you'll quickly learn about public hunting is that the harder you work to get away from the crowds of lazy hunters, the more success you'll have. If you have trouble walking or just have no stamina, you can still find a welcome spot. But if you dig deep, get up earlier than everyone else and walk far off the main trails, you'll find that honey hole.

Famed hunters like Greg Miller and Myles Keller have done well on public land. Deer are highly adaptable and thrive close to humans, as those of us who have hit them with our cars and trucks know too well. Both have written many articles and even books on the topic. A quick internet search will show you a few of the many trophies they've taken on public ground. I interviewed Keller many years ago, and he talked about how wise bucks would find relatively undisturbed patches of ground near populated areas where nobody bothered to hunt. Such spots can be found on both public and private acreages.

Finding public spots close to home starts with talking to friends, neighbors and other fellow hunters.

When I grew frustrated 23 years ago that I couldn't get permission to hunt on private land, a co-worker told me about a public spot in Waupaca County that soon became my go-to hunting area. Nearby were two other state-owned spots. We became fast friends, and I occasionally hunt these areas to this day.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources website is a goldmine for information on public hunting, fishing and other recreation on the state's wooded wonderland. Start your exploration here: <https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/topic/lands>.

State-owned lands are divided into parks, natural areas, wildlife areas, forests and fisheries.

Some parks have sections open to hunting, including Hartman Creek State Park near Waupaca. Most state parks have an entry fee. If you buy an annual Patron license, state parks admission is included.

Natural areas totaling around 406,000 acres may include private land, land trusts and county or local government lands as well as state-owned properties. Most natural areas are open to hunting (check regulations on each site).

State wildlife areas are open to a variety of recreation, including hunting, fishing and trapping. Here's a list of wildlife areas by county: <https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/topic/Lands/WildlifeAreas/alpha.html>.

Shawano County has Navarino listed as its only state wildlife area. Oconto County has both Green Bay West Shores and Peshtigo Brook state wildlife areas.

The state has county, state and national forests. Start here for a look at the first two: <https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/topic/forestry>.

Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest is a vast 1.5 million acre haven for hunters, particularly those need-

ing large expanses for their pursuits. Bear, bobcat and previously wolf hunters in particular (wolf season currently is closed) can hunt this area, as do hound hunters. I successfully took a 35-pound bobcat with dogs in 2012 while hunting this beautiful national treasure. Start here to explore this northern Wisconsin adventureland: <https://www.fs.usda.gov/cnnf>.

This provides details on hunting regulations within the national forest: <https://www.fs.usda.gov/activity/cnnf/recreation/hunting>.

Fisheries areas are bordering creeks, rivers and lakes to afford erosion and development protection.

Check the rules of each area for recreation guidelines.

In addition to public lands, many private lands are accessible to hunting because of state agreements.

The best example of this is vast tracts of privately owned paper company lands granted tax breaks (under Managed Forest and Forest Crop laws) because they allow hunting, hiking and other activities.

This site provides access to maps of private land with public access. Note that in most cases, motorized vehicles are not allowed on these lands unless otherwise noted.

The state also has two programs to grant public access to private lands: the Voluntary Public Access (VPA) and the Turkey Hunter Access (THAP) programs. Take a look: <https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/topic/lands/private>.

If you prefer to hunt close to home or in just a few select areas, you can obtain printed county plat maps from each of the state's 72 county offices.

I hope you find this guide to public lands usage helpful.

Brush up on tree stand safety this fall

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is reminding hunters to take proper precautions and follow all safety best practices before climbing into a tree stand this fall.

Surveys indicate one-quarter of Wisconsin bowhunters have experienced a fall or near-fall from an elevated stand in the past. Additionally, research has shown that risky tree stand climbing behavior becomes more likely to catch up to hunters the longer they hunt.

To avoid accidents and ensure a safe outing, always be mindful of the basic rules of tree stand safety before and during every hunt:

- Regardless of the type of tree stand used, always wear a full-body harness, also known as a fall-arrest system, that meets current industry standards.

- Connect the harness to the tether line and keep the tether line short. The tether is designed to keep the wearer in the seat and not catch them after falling.

- Always keep three points of contact while climbing into and out

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of the tree stand. This means always keeping two hands and one foot or two feet and one hand in contact with the stand or ground.

- Always use a haul line to raise and lower unloaded firearms or bow into and out of the stand. Hunt-

ers can also use the haul for other things like a heavy backpack.

- Use a lifeline when climbing up and down; this keeps wearers connected from when they leave the ground to when they get back down.

- Before heading out, tell some-

one where you'll be hunting and when you expect to return.

- Carry a cell phone to call for help if anyone becomes injured after a fall.

Beyond following these basic rules, hunters should always select a substantial and solid tree that can support their weight and is free from any dead limbs above them. Hunters should also inspect their equipment before each use, ensuring all lines are intact, their harness fits and that the harness is absent of snags and tears.

Additionally, hunters should thoroughly inspect their stand for missing components or broken features before climbing.

Hunters can also participate in the Tree Stand Manufacturers Association Safety Course. This free and interactive course takes just 15 minutes to complete yet contains valuable information that could save a life.

to be safe for themselves, fellow hunters and their environment," said Rick Heisler, a volunteer instructor for more than 40 years and the hunter education program's 2022 Instructor of the Year. "Teaching these courses has become a vital part of my life."

There are two ways to become a certified volunteer hunter education instructor. Interested volunteers can either serve as an apprentice under a sponsoring instructor for at least two complete courses or attend a certification training session hosted by a DNR outdoor skills trainer.

Once certified, the DNR provides volunteer instructors with all the materials and equipment required to teach a hunter education course. Instructors must only teach one class every three years to remain certified, although many teach more.

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Help the DNR monitor state elk this fall

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) invites the public to help the DNR better monitor the movements of the state's elk herds throughout the fall breeding season by reporting sightings of elk outside of their normal ranges.

September marks the beginning of the breeding season for elk, with the season running through October. While most breeding activity occurs within their established territory, the Clam Lake and Black River Elk Ranges, younger bull elk have been known to wander great distances this time of year in search of unoccupied territory and lower competition for female elk.

It is not uncommon to see elk in Ashland, Bayfield, Price, Rusk and Sawyer counties in northern Wisconsin or in Jackson County in west-central Wisconsin.

Anyone who sees an elk outside of those ranges is encouraged to report their sighting online using the DNR's large mammal observation form. Reports with photos are helpful, if possible, but all reports are welcome. Additionally, elk may

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sport unique identifiers such as ear tags or orange GPS tracking collars. If tag or collar numbers are easily visible, please include that information

in the report, as that information is helpful for DNR staff.

"Many elk are on the move this time of year," said Christina Kizews-

ki, DNR wildlife biologist. "Tracking the movements of these animals is an important, yet difficult part of our work. The reports we get from the public are a huge help towards these efforts."

Once widespread across North America, elk were eliminated from Wisconsin in the 1880s due to unregulated hunting. With the support of the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, the Ho-Chunk Nation, the Ojibwe Tribes and several other partners, the DNR successfully reintroduced elk into the Northern Elk Range near Clam Lake in 1995 and the Central Elk Range near Black River Falls in 2015 and 2016, and subsequently supplemented the northern herd with elk from Kentucky in 2017 and 2019.

The Wisconsin elk population is estimated to reach 515 elk at the conclusion of the 2023 calving season, with 160 elk in the central herd and 355 in the northern herd.

"They are based on a good mix of hard science and the observations of DNR professionals and experienced outdoorspeople from across Wisconsin."

Hunters and trappers can explore fall forecasts for deer hunting, upland game birds, migratory bird hunting, bear and furbearer hunting and trapping.

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Bowhunting basics in the 21st century

Ancient man used a bent stick, sinew string and crude arrow to take game for centuries. It wasn't a sport for them - it was pure survival.

Some of us bowhunters still prefer to keep it simple, using recurve bows or longbows with no mechanical advantage to hunt deer, turkeys and other wild game. But most of these traditional bows are laminated with fiberglass, and we shoot carbon or aluminum arrows (a few holdouts still shoot wooden shafts) tipped with machine-created broadheads that screw into the shafts.

Most bowhunters, however, have embraced technology in the form of compound bows. These pulley-equipped bows, once condemned in the early 1970s as the end of bowhunting, are now being used by the vast majority of bowhunters because they make it much easier to draw and hold the string for longer periods of time. This feature and precision sights, including adjustable front sights and a rear peep sight on the string, make the modern compound bow a very accurate weapon for quick, efficient kills.

As technology advances, so do compound bows. Even in the past 20 years, they become smaller (axle-to-axle lengths are now averaging 30 inches, while a few decades ago they were 40 inches), more efficient (shooting up to 340 feet per second and allowing let-off percentages of up to 90%) and most importantly for hunters, quiet. For comparison, recurve bows and longbows range from 54-70 inches long and they have no let-off. What you pull is what you hold. A compound bow that has a draw weight of 50 pounds would require holding just five pounds if it has 90% let-off.

If you are new to bowhunting or just want to learn to shoot a bow, don't panic. The gadgets and bewildering designs can be overwhelming, but every bow at the pro shops and in big-box store catalogs is basically the same design. You don't have to spend \$1,000 or more to get a good hunting bow, but you do need expert advice.

As a bowhunter for the past 49 years, my advice is to never buy a bow online. Any bow needs to be set up to fit you and tuned to shoot quietly and accurately. Head for your

archery pro shop and then listen.

Talk to other archers. Visit a 3-D shoot and watch the shooters. Most major bow brands with deep roots make quality products. The hometown favorite, Mathews, built in Sparta, is very popular, but can be pricey. Hoyt, Bow Tech and their Diamond line, Elite, Bear, PSE and many others will serve you well.

Don't be afraid to buy a used bow at a pro shop if that shop will give you a warranty. Today's bows will last a lifetime if they aren't dry-fired (never shoot a bow without an arrow) or otherwise abused.

Big box stores can be hit or miss, depending on the person who is working on your bow. I worked many years at the Gander Moun-

tain store in Appleton, and we had a few staffers who were experts on bow setup and tuning, but we also had a few who were learning. The mom-and-pop stores who specialize in bows are the ones you seek. Yoda would take his bow to places like Butch's Archery in Embarrass and Lena Swamp Archery in Oconto Falls. Buying bows on Amazon you must not.

Set a price range you can afford and keep things simple to start. Let the shop help determine your draw length (the length of your arrows from the anchor point on your face to the far side of the arrow rest, plus an inch for broadhead clearance) and draw weight (the amount of string resistance measured in pounds of

pull). Wisconsin law requires at least a 30-pound draw weight for hunting.

Shawn Angle of Oshkosh and his son, Alex, recently bought their first compound bows, hoping to try bowhunting in the near future. They each bought a Diamond Infinite 305 bow, made by Bow Tech.

Shawn's wife, Becky, then decided to get her first compound as well, choosing a lightweight Bear Royale that will accommodate a wide range of draw lengths and weights for youths and adults.

She has no intention of bowhunting but hopes to shoot targets and 3-D archery. She first shot a bow when she was 12 at a Boys and Girls Club, and now hopes to share the sport with her husband and stepson.

Those of us who first shot a re-curve bow in school or at a summer camp remember using bare fingers or perhaps a shooting glove. Most archers today use a release aid, which straps around the wrist and clamps onto a string loop that's added to the main bowstring. An adjustable trigger allows for a crisp, smooth release of the string, launching the arrow more consistently than fingers.

Many bows now use a drop-away arrow rest, which almost magically falls down the second an arrow is fired. The idea is to remove resistance and deflection of the arrow for a faster and more accurate shot.

But like anything mechanical, they can fail. These rests have been proven in the field, however.

The Angles opted for the tried-and-true Trophy Ridge Whisker Biscuits on their bows. A big advantage of this style of rest is that it holds the arrow in place when the bow is shot at any angle, which is common when bowhunting from a tree stand. An arrow slipping off a rest when shooting can have disastrous results. The Whisker Biscuit is also typically a fraction of the price of drop-aways.

Old-school arrows were wood, usually Port Orford cedar, and varied in straightness. Today's carbon

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and aluminum arrows are made by machines and extremely straight, with more expensive options built to tighter tolerances. Plan on spending \$50-\$100 for a half dozen arrows. Carbons are far more popular than aluminums because of carbon's strength and resistance to dents and bends, but carbons can crack and splinter. If you hit something hard

with a carbon, tap it against a tree or carefully twist it to see if it's splintered and then immediately throw it away.

You can spend hundreds of dollars on sights that are lighted with fiber optics or batteries, but a basic sight for \$40-\$80 will do just as well. Your pro shop can show you options and help you sight in.

The most important factor in bowhunting is a sharp broadhead. While classic fixed-blade broadheads are recommended for elk and other thick-skinned game, mechanical or expanding broadheads have become the most popular. Fixed-blade heads sometimes windplane or can be difficult to tune for straight flight, but most mechanicals fly like target heads because their blades are tucked inside a ferrule and only open on impact. When they work right, they also create huge wound channels for large blood trails (broadheads kill by hemorrhaging, not hydrostatic shock like a rifle bullet). But again, these "trick" heads sometimes don't deploy properly or otherwise fail. I've used both, but am back to fixed-blade heads.

Be sure you practice with whatever broadhead you choose before hunting.

Your pro shop and local archery club will be happy to help you get started on this adventure.

Bowhunting in the fall woods is like nothing else, no matter which equipment you choose. Good luck.

Team rallies around Love, defeats Bears again

Packers dominate Bears in opener

Love passes for 245 yards, three touchdowns

Although Aaron Rodgers is no longer in town, it appears that the Green Bay Packers still own the Chicago Bears.

Quarterback Jordan Love kicked off the new era of Packers' football, leading the team to a dominant 38-20 victory on Sept. 10 in Chicago. The fourth-year quarterback looked to be ready to follow in both Rodgers and Brett Favre's footsteps, as he threw for 245 yards and three touchdowns, with no interceptions.

With Christian Watson injured, wide receiver Romeo Doubs was the main benefactor of Love's impressive start, catching four passes for 26 yards and two touchdowns. More impressive than the two touchdown passes to Doubs though was Love's third.

The touchdown pass came in the middle of the third quarter, when Green Bay was facing a fourth-and-three up 17-6 and looking for a three score lead. Love dropped back and hit running back Aaron Jones out of the backfield for a 35-yard touchdown. Jones left the game after the touchdown with an apparent leg injury.

"It feels great," said Love, on the victory. "Obviously that was the plan for us, coming in here and starting the season off in the right way. I think we did that in all three phases. The second half was huge for us today."

That second half that Love referred to included 28 points on four touchdowns.

"It just feels good to get a win — never took it for granted, so to start off like that feels great," added Love.

Much like Doubs, Jones was very busy on the day. The El Paso alum saw 11 touches for 127 total yards and two touchdowns.

As for the other side of the ball, Green Bay's defense held the Bears to just 20 points. With four sacks on Bears quarterback Justin Fields, the Packers' defense seemed to live up to the hype from the summer and in general looked like one of the better defensive units in the NFL during week one. Defensive backs Rasul Douglas and Keisean Nixon led the

team with six tackles, but it was the rookies who made their names heard. First-round draft selection Lukas Van Ness and sixth-round selection Karl Brooks both recorded sacks, while second-year defensive tackle Devonte Wyatt added another 1 1/2.

Head coach Matt LaFleur is now 9-0 all time against the Chicago

Bears. More than that, Green Bay has won 26 out of the last 30 matchups against the Bears. The record of the rivalry now sits at 106-95-6 all time.

"Yesterday I was definitely visualizing just having a win — coming off of the field after the win, kind of telling myself I am going to play great,

that we are all going to play great," said Love. "That is just what I kept telling myself over and over again. I woke up today doing the same thing, just telling myself we are going to get this win and that we are going to play great today."

PACKERS OFFENSE VS. FALCONS DEFENSE

Jordan Love is receiving rave reviews after a sparkling debut saw him throw for three touchdown passes and finish with a quarterback rating of 123.2 against the Chicago Bears.

The Bears may have tried to remake their defense in the offseason, but that was clearly a team still in transition as they try to work out some of the kinks of adding as many new players as they have.

The Atlanta Falcons could be a different story.

Calais Campbell might be on the wrong side of 30, but he remains a productive player along the Falcons defensive line. He spurned the New York Jets to sign with the Falcons this offseason.

Along with Campbell up front, the Falcons have Grady Jarrett who had six sacks a season ago.

He added half a sack in Sunday's 24-10 win over the Carolina Panthers.

The Falcons strength at this point is in their secondary. Their prized offseason acquisition was Jessie Bates, who they signed to a four-year \$64 million deal on the first day of free agency.

Bates was worth the investment on opening day. He had two interceptions of Bryce Young, the most recent number one overall pick and flew all over the field in run support.

AJ Terrell is an excellent cornerback that could give the Packers problems considering they are a little short in the passing game. It's unclear if Christian Watson will be able to return from a hamstring injury to play, and Romeo Doubs was limited against Chicago with a hamstring injury of his own.

In addition, Aaron Jones suffered a hamstring injury that kept him out for most of the second half. The hamstring was the only thing that stopped Jones from having a huge day against the Bears. He had two catches for 86 yards and a touchdown. He ran for another 41 despite only having nine carries.

If Jones is out, the Packers may lean more on AJ Dillon, who struggled in the season opener, totaling 19 yards on 13 carries. The Packers will need more than that from Dillon if Jones is unable to go.

Luke Musgrave causes a matchup problem every week simply due to the combination of his size and

speed, but this week could be particularly advantageous for the former second-round pick.

Carolina's Hayden Hurst was the team's leading receiver against Atlanta with five catches for 41 yards. Musgrave had 50 yards receiving in his debut and could have had a long touchdown if not for a cramp on what turned into a 37-yard reception. His matchup against Atlanta linebackers Kaden Elliss and Troy Anderson could be one to watch.

PACKERS DEFENSE VS. FALCONS OFFENSE

For all the focus on the Packers quarterback situation, it was the defense that shined the most in their season opening win over the Bears.

Joe Barry has been under fire coming into the season after a talented defense has disappointed in the two years under his watch.

One of the big pain points for the Packers defense was against the run. Sunday was a big test against Justin Fields and a Bears run game that was

dynamic a season ago.

Fields was able to scamper for 59 yards on nine carries, but none of them went longer than 10 yards. Considering the opponent, that's about as good as a team can hope for.

In the traditional run game, Bears running backs ran for 63 yards on 19 carries. That is an average of 3.3 yards-per-carry.

That's a far cry from the nearly five yards the Packers gave up per rush a season ago. That's the first test the Packers have passed.

However, a bigger test is on its way. If Khalil Herbert is the equivalent of algebra, Bijan Robinson is advanced calculus.

Robinson was picked 8th overall in this past year's draft due to his ability in both phases of the offense. He averaged 5.6 yards-per-carry with 56 yards coming on 10 carries. He added another 27 yards on six catches, including a touchdown.

Robinson isn't the only player to worry about in Atlanta's backfield.

Tyler Allgeier tormented the Panthers with 75 yards on 15 carries and

two touchdowns.

Overall, the Falcons ran for 131 yards on 25 carries. Both of their running backs averaged more than five yards per carry. This week will be a bigger test for a Packers defense that has vowed to be better against the run in 2023.

The passing game is a different story. Desmond Ridder is the starting quarterback in Atlanta.

This is his first year as a full time starter after he was picked in the third round from Cincinnati in 2022.

He was 15-18 for 115 yards and a touchdown. The completion percentage was high, but 115 yards is almost unfathomable in the modern era of football.

Ridder has plenty of weapons at his disposal. Kyle Pitts and Drake London were both top-10 picks in their respective draft classes. They have ability to make contested catches and plays down the field.

Jaire Alexander accepted his first challenge of the season. Alexander and the Packers secondary held the Bears prized acquisition, DJ Moore, to two catches on three targets. It was a quiet day.

London is a different style receiver, but after being held without a catch in his debut, the Falcons might try to feature him more in the passing game.

Pitts is typically lined up as a receiver as well. The Falcons will try to get him matched up against the Packers linebackers who are coming off a strong debut that included a pick-six from Quay Walker.

Where the Packers' biggest advantage might lie is in the pass rush. Atlanta's offensive line struggled in the season opener, where Ridder was sacked four times.

The Packers sacked Justin Fields four times on Sunday and recorded a whopping 35 pressures, according to Pro Football Focus, which was the second most in the NFL behind the Dallas Cowboys.

The Packers were able to accomplish that without Rashan Gary playing a full complement of snaps.

Gary is one week further removed from the ACL injury that cost him half of the 2022 season. He should see more action this Sunday.

Look for the Packers to try and get Kenny Clark and Devonte Wyatt matched up against Matthew Bergeron, a rookie who will be making a second year start. Both Wyatt and Clark had strong debuts, recording two combined sacks and a forced fumble.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Anders Carlson had a strong debut after a rocky camp led some to wonder whether the Packers would bring in any competition for the rookie.

They did not and their faith was rewarded. Carlson was 6-6 on all of his kicks including a 52-yard field goal before time expired in the first half.

The field goal operation was clean as they were breaking in a new snapper and holder in addition to Carlson.

Daniel Whelan showed off his big leg with a 68-yard punt on Sunday. Keisean Nixon and Jayden Reed both present problems in the return game that could be a challenge for the Falcons.

The Falcons finished 10th a season ago in Rick Gosselin's annual special teams rankings under Marquice O'Brien Williams.

They didn't have any opportunities to return a kickoff on Sunday, and only fielded two punts, which were returned for four total yards.

One thing that could be interesting, should the game be close, late is Younghoe Koo. The Falcons kicker excels at the onside kick in an era where that is mostly obsolete. The Packers were 1-1 in recovering onside kicks on Sunday, but that could be something set to be exploited with as many young players that are on the Packers' roster.

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KEYS TO THE GAME

Consistency needed for Packers to go 2-0

The Green Bay Packers are off and running after a dominant 38-20 win over the Chicago Bears in the season opener.

The Packers had what could be argued as their best game in all three phases over the last two years during the game. Jordan Love was solid in his debut, throwing three touchdown passes. Aaron Jones made two huge plays in the passing game.

The defense suffocated Justin Fields and a new-look Bears offense, and the special teams was solid.

Matt LaFleur often says that you're only as good as your most recent game. If that's the case, the Packers are pretty good right now. He also says things can change quickly in the NFL. That's true, too.

After a thumping of Chicago, the Packers are moving on to play Atlanta, who was victorious 24-10 over the Carolina Panthers in their first game.

This game will be the team's first true road test of the season with Chicago being relatively local.

Here are the keys to the Packers stacking road wins to start their season.

PACKERS DEFENSE VS FALCONS RUN GAME

The Packers defense was excellent against the Bears run game. Justin Fields was not able to find many running lanes. His running backs had even less room to work with. They had 63 yards on 19 carries. The Packers have vowed to be better against opposing run games this season, and Sunday was a good start.

This Sunday will be a different challenge. With all due respect to Khalil Herbert and Roschon Johnson, the Falcons duo of Bijan Robinson and Tyler Allgeier is a much different challenge.

They combined for 131 yards on 25 carries. In a sport where running backs have been devalued, the Falcons thought enough of Robinson to take him with the eighth overall pick in this past year's draft. He is a menace in the run game. He's more dynamic than anyone the Packers have seen so far this season.

Chris Lindstrom is currently the highest paid interior offensive lineman in the NFL as well. The other

two starters on the Falcons interior are Drew Dalman and Matthew Bergeron. They used a second round pick on Bergeron. Combine the investment in the interior offensive line with Arthur Smith as the head coach, the Falcons are committed to running the football.

The Packers need to remain committed to stopping it.

PACKERS PASS RUSH VS FALCONS OFFENSIVE LINE

For all the fanfare surrounding Love's excellent debut, it's Joe Barry's defense that deserves a gold star after Sunday's performance.

It took awhile for them to heat up, but once the pass rush got going, they were nearly unblockable. The

Packers had 35 pressures against a Chicago offensive line that was remade this offseason with the idea of protecting Justin Fields in mind.

Rashan Gary should play more snaps this week as he is further removed from his ACL injury, which could make the pass rush even more lethal.

The Falcons had struggles of their own. Desmond Ridder was sacked four times on only 23 dropbacks.

If the Packers can slow down Atlanta's running game, Ridder hasn't proven to have the ability to beat opposing defenses with his arm consistently. He had a high completion percentage in Sunday's win over the Panthers, but little else.

His struggles could become more exaggerated if the Green Bay front is able to hunt.

FALCONS DEFENSE VS

JORDAN LOVE/THIRD DOWNS

The most impressive part of Love's debut was his ability on third down. He finished the day 8-10 with 141 yards and two touchdown passes. That included a 35-yard touchdown pass to Jones on a 4th and 3 that broke the game open late in the third quarter.

The Falcons gave up five third down conversions in 14 attempts. Green Bay's offense, despite their youth, is a bigger challenge for the Falcons defense considering they're facing a more experienced quarterback.

The Packers were horrendous on early downs on Sunday against Chicago. They averaged -.17EP/play on first and second down.

It was their third down offense that saved them. The Packers probably don't want to make a living on converting third downs, but it is something they'll feel good about knowing they've already had success on that down.

PACKERS RECEIVERS VS

FALCONS SECONDARY

Jessie Bates might have been the best player on the field for the Falcons on Sunday. He picked off Bryce Young twice in his first game after getting a \$64 million contract in the offseason to help spearhead the Falcons secondary.

In addition, AJ Terrell has been a good

player for the Falcons since being drafted out of Clemson.

Jeff Okudah is a former top draft pick that has struggled, but is currently starting for Atlanta.

The Packers receivers are the incredibly young, and walking wounded. Christian Watson missed Sunday's game with a hamstring injury. Whether he will be able to play Sunday is unclear. Soft tissue injuries can be tricky.

Romeo Doubs did play but was limited. He had a stat line that looked similar to that of James Jones in 2015. Four catches 26 yards and two touchdowns. Perhaps a full complement of snaps will get him more opportunities in the passing game.

Jayden Reed had a nice debut with two big catches but looked like a rookie at times. He left the game with cramps but should be good to go on Sunday.

Green Bay's receiver room has things to like about it, but youth and inexperience can lead to mistakes.

The Packers saw plenty of those on Sunday.

They made enough plays against a defense that was the worst in the NFL a season ago.

The Falcons are much more talented, and have players that have played together for longer than what Chicago had.

The Packers are going to need to be more consistent in the passing game against a better defense if are to come out of Atlanta 2-0.

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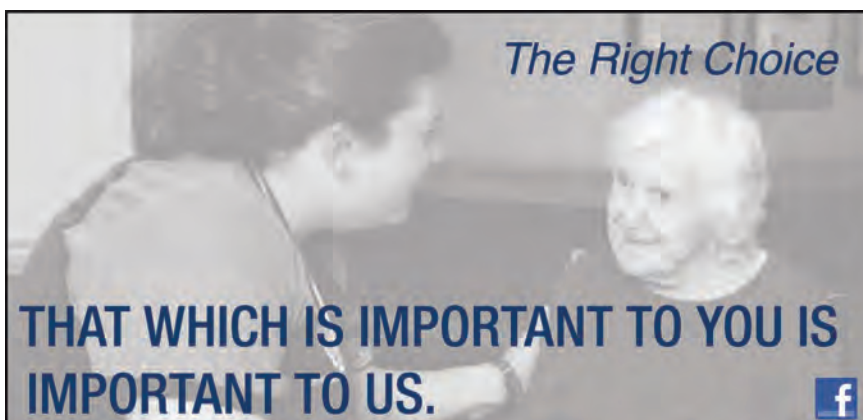
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
