Witt-Birn tops Menominee Indian in regional play

Shawano, Gillett/Suring eliminated

The Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School softball team topped Menominee Indian 18-3 in three innings during a rainy Division 3 regional quarterfinal playoff matchup on May 19 in Wittenberg.

It was Menominee Indian that scored the game's first run, but Witt-Birn rattled off 17 runs over its first two half-innings to take control. The 10th-seeded Eagles scored twice in the top of the third to extend the game, but the seventh-seeded Chargers added a run in the bottom half to reach the 15-run rule.

"I think we did good watching the ball, and then we got our walks. But when we got our swings, we got the ball into play and that was really big when we got down," said Witt-Birn's Jadalynn Davids.

The Chargers drew six walks in the opening inning, with all the runners coming around to score. Halle Beversdorf and Kaylee Schram drew the first two walks and both scored on an error after a bunt from Makayla Meronk.

Sophia Lemieux drew a bases-loaded walk to force in Meronk before Evelyn Fletcher scored on a wild pitch. Emily Niles, Lemieux and Kylee Beversdorf scored on another Menominee Indian error, and then Halle Beversdorf scored her second run in the inning on a wild pitch to make it 8-1 after an inning.

In the second frame, the Chargers did their damage with the bats, drawing just two walks.

It didn't look like it would be a big inning after Schram scored on a Gwenneth Groshek groundout for the second out, but the next nine batters reached after that.

Lemieux drove in Fletcher and Niles with a single before Kylee Beversdorf plated Lemieux with a single. Davids later clubbed a two-run double, scoring Kalene Rasmus-

sen and Halle Beversdorf. Groshek then plated Davids, Schram and Meronk with a double.

Halle Beversdorf had the walk-off hit for Witt-Birn in the third, driving in Madisyn Sippl.

"We were on the bats really well," said Schram of the 18-run outburst. "We only had, like, one or two strikeouts the whole game, and then we were watching our pitches. And when they were there, we were swinging. A lot of people had really good hits."

Jami Wendler pitched the first inning for Witt-Birn, while Meronk got the last six outs.

Ashlee Corn was one of three Eagles to walk in the top of the first inning, and she came around to score on a wild pitch. A big inning was thwarted by a lineout that turned into an inning-ending double play.

Sam Wilber singled to open the third inning before moving to third on a Corn double. Aniya Peters plated Wilber on a groundout, and Shauna Madosh brought home Corn with an infield hit.

Peters pitched the entire game for the Eagles.

Oconto Falls ends regular season with win

Adler powers Panthers to victory

The Oconto Falls High School baseball team ended its regular season with a 3-1 victory over North Eastern Conference opponent Marinette on May 20 in Oconto Falls.

It was freshman Jack Adler who powered the Panthers to victory just a couple days after the team lost a road game to Marinette.

"It felt good because we had a tough loss against them whenever it was — I think it was Tuesday," said Adler of the win. "It was a tough loss, so it was good to get out there and show it to them."

Adler started on the mound and pitched 6 2/3 innings. He struck out five batters while allowing just six baserunners to reach against him.

He said staying calm was how he was able to work his way through the Marinette lineup.

Adler struck out a pair of batters in a 1-2-3 first inning and then worked around a two-out walk in the second frame. The freshman righty struck out two more in another clean third inning.

The starting pitcher picked up all the run support he'd need in the bottom of the third.

Jake Sager started the inning with a single and then stole second base. Braden Vandermoss walked with one out, setting up a bizarre play with Cy Vizelka at the plate.

Vizelka hit a flyball to right field, so both Sager and Vandermoss tagged up. The confusion began when the right fielder wasn't able to cleanly catch the ball, but nobody knew if he had completed the catch. Vizelka and Vandermoss both were standing at first base, as Sager advanced a couple bases and crossed home plate.

After the umpires met and talked things over, it was ruled to be no catch in right, so Vizelka was awarded first, Vandermoss was out at second base on a force play and Sager's run counted.

The inning continued with a booming double from Logan Kramer, moving Vizelka to third. Adler then blooped a hit over the infield to plate Kramer and Vizelka to give the team a 3-0 advantage.

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"At the start of the year, I was struggling at the plate, so it felt good to get some RBIs on varsity and then it gave me confidence on the mound, too, knowing I had insurance," said Adler.

"To start the game, we didn't have very much energy. I think after I led off, it kind of set the tempo and every-

body's like, 'OK, we can score a couple runs here,'" said Sager of the three-run inning. "Steal second, there's the weird play in right and we score a run and everybody is hyped, and then Jack gets a base hit over there and he's getting hyped. I was like, 'all right, we're going to win this game.'"

Adler walked a pair of batters with two outs in the fourth, but avoided any more trouble by inducing a groundball to end the frame. The freshman then worked another 1-2-3 frame in the fifth.

Marinette's first hit off Adler came with one out in the sixth on a double. The runner later scored on a batted ball off a diving Sager's glove. Adler kept the team's lead at two after getting a groundout and popup.

With 91 pitches to start the seventh, Adler hoped to get the final three outs before reaching 100 pitches. He fell just short of that after hitting a batter and then getting a popup and flyout.

Sager came on in relief as Adler walked off the mound to a loud ovation from the Oconto Falls' faithful.

Sager needed just one pitch to get a game-ending groundout.

"Well, we haven't won a game in a good amount of games, so to finally get the win brings positive vibes. Everybody is happier," said Sager. "We've been playing better lately, but this really seals the deal on how we've been playing."

Popelka, Rabideau combine for 5 goals for Hawks

The Shawano Community High School girls soccer team was dominant during a 10-0 Bay Conference Tournament win over New London on May 16 in Shawano.

It took the Hawks less than two minutes to get a shot on goal. After several near misses, the goals came at a furious pace.

Abigail Rabideau netted Shawano's first goal at the 14 minute, 22 second mark of the first half.

Kaylee Rindt appeared to be on her way to a goal a couple minutes later, but was taken down before she could get off a clean look. Rindt was able to score on the penalty kick however at the 18:10 mark.

Along with peppering the New London defense with offensive attacks, Shawano was able to mostly keep the ball on the visitor's side of the field. Goalie Brynlie Boyles was tasked to stop just a couple shots, and none of the New London shots were all that troublesome to save.

"What we did the most, and what we try to do every game, is communication. It's really, honestly, key, said Rabideau. "Communication is key for a lot of things, but we really try to communicate a lot and make sure that we are aware of where we are on the field and where everyone else is.

"Possession is another really big thing we do. We try to make sure we have nice strong passes to each other and make sure that they rarely get possession, and then we can make those nice passes to each other where we can just slip one in the goal or power-house it into the goal. That's two of the really big things we try to do on our offensive line to keep the ball on our side."

The Hawks' next two goals came in a 33-second span. Adison Moesch netted the first goal off an assist from Kyla Dove before Rabideau was able to sneak another shot past the New London keeper. Moesch's goal came at 20:07, with Rabideau's at 20:40.

Shawano upped the lead to 5-0 when Trinity Popelka scored off an

assist from Evony Perez at the 24:29 mark.

Caitlyn Moede joined the scoring outburst with a goal at 26:49 before Popelka scored again at 28:19.

Faith Lammers scored an unassisted goal at the 32:06 mark before Perez scored unassisted at 33:47 to cap a nine-goal first half.

"We really trust each other. When we look for our passes, we're not just thinking about ourselves and trying to get the goals in, but really working on ourselves and doing the best that we can," said Perez.

Shawano continued to dominate the contest in the second half, with Popelka finishing off a hat trick and the scoring in the match with a goal in the ninth minute off a Rabideau corner kick.

"It's really just about not looking for the goals, it's about trying to get them for the team and letting the goals come to you," said Popelka on what led to her hat trick.

"What's really important for me is just focusing on getting those passes in, because what's most exciting for me is the assists I get in a game. It's awesome seeing my teammates get excited about goals, so it's just a bonus on when I'm able to put a few in for my team, too."

The match concluded at the 60-minute mark with the Hawks up by more than eight goals.

Menominee Indian High School athlete Devin Beaulieu-Morgan took the next step in his athletic career when he signed a letter of intent on May 19 at the high school.

Beaulieu-Morgan signed to the University of Minnesota Morris, where he will play football.

"It was an incredible feeling, really a reminder as to how great God is," said Beaulieu-Morgan of signing. "It feels like all of the long nights and early mornings are telling me how worth it it is. I'm not done yet and today made me even more hungry for the future. It was such a blessed day to my family and I, and it's a moment I'll never forget."

The Menominee Indian senior said there were ups and downs during his recruitment process, with the uncertainty of where he'd end up playing the biggest role. Beaulieu-Morgan said things picked up as a senior, and that he had to "put himself out there."

"There were a few schools, but after my visit with Morris I knew I'd be there this fall," he said.

Beaulieu-Morgan said Minnesota Morris felt like home to him, and the fact that a couple of his high school teammates also will be there also was a positive.

Andre Corn signed to Minnesota Morris back on Feb. 25, and Bryce Dixon signed to the school on Feb. 15.

"It's really going to be a special thing for the three of us. They're two of the hardest workers I know, and being able to grow with them on and

off the field over the years is something I've always been grateful for," said Beaulieu-Morgan.

"Andre and I have been talking about this since middle school. I can only thank God to actually see this come to fruition. To be able to continue that growth with them, and keep that bond at the next level, is truly a huge blessing. I can't describe it."

From all his interactions with the team so far, Beaulieu-Morgan expects to play quarterback at Minnesota Morris, just like he did at the high school level.

According to www.wissports.net, Beaulieu-Morgan threw for 1,772 yards over 16 games between his sophomore and senior seasons.

Most of the yards came during the 2020 alternate season and 2021 fall season. As a senior, he competed just under 65% of his passes for 1,244 yards and six touchdowns.

Beaulieu-Morgan said playing quarterback at the college level is a "dream come true."

"I understand it's college and things change, but I plan on doing big things for them at that spot and it's the spot I love playing," he added.

He said he strives to be the best at whatever he does in life, and will do the same as he attempts to guide the Minnesota Morris football team.

"The No. 1 goal is winning that championship with my team,"

Beaulieu-Morgan said.

The senior couldn't pinpoint a single favorite memory from his time on the Menominee Indian football team, instead saying he enjoyed every moment he got to

The girls 4x800 relay team had a time of 11:48.57 was also good enough for second.

Placing third for the Suring girls was Noack in the 1,600 (5:50.97) and 3,200 (13:50.35), Sleeter in the 400 (1:06.4), Lily Hakes in the 200 (29.5), Kaylee Otradovec in the 300 hurdles (56.5) and Harlee Wolf in the discus (95-9).

"After getting conference champ in high jump, I needed that confidence for the rest of my events," said Sleeter. "Pole vault, I got

second place and that also gave me so much confidence. Then I ran a PR (personal record) in my 400 and that made me super happy. I definitely couldn't have done it without the best coach ever, Mrs. (Heidi) Gerndt. She pushed me so much and she was one of the reasons I did so well.

"All the girls on my team cheered me on throughout the whole meet. It was amazing running and being able to hear them from the sidelines. I love my team and my coaches and I'm so glad that we got conference champs."

Jeremy Hensel posted both of the boys team's top finishes, winning the 400 (55.23) and pole vault (12-9).

Jackson Schaal took second in the shot put with a toss of 41-1½. He placed third in the discus (107-6).

Trent VanDenElzen claimed third in the high jump (5-4) and pole vault (10 feet), while Ashtyn Edwards was third in the 300 hurdles (48.18).

The Lena/STAA boys team was powered by first-place finishes from its 4x100 relay (45.56) and 4x400 relay (3:56.07) teams.

Sidney Sylvester placed first individually in the triple jump (39-11).

"The strong finish in triple jump gives me a lot of confidence going into regionals," said Sylvester. "I have high expectations and I hope I can preform to my best and make it to state in triple jump."

Bonduel wins CWC title behind Uelmen

Witt-Birn grabs 2nd

The Bonduel High School boys golf team secured the Central Wisconsin Conference title with a first-place finish during a meet May 16 at Golden Sands Golf Course in Shawano.

Bonduel turned in a team score of 357 at the final meet, with Wittenberg-Birnamwood in second with a mark of 368. Marion posted a score of 421 to take seventh, while Menominee Indian/Gresham took 10th with a mark of 450.

For the season, Bonduel had a score of 1,472, with Witt-Birn in second with a 1,527. Marion was eighth with a mark of 1,803, and Menominee Indian/Gresham claimed 10th with a total score of 1,841.

"First off, it's huge for me and my team, especially coach (Dave) LaBerge," said Bonduel golfer Cooper Uelmen. "Me and the team have been practicing hard over the past months, and it's extremely reward-

ing to be the first team in 10 years and only the third team in program history to achieve the feat of conference champions. It was also nice to help coach LaBerge get his first team championship in. The amount of work he does for the team is incredible, and he's a huge reason our team was able to grow into what it is today."

Uelmen led Bonduel with an 18-hole round of 79 at Golden Sands to finish as the medalist. He also was the top individual golfer for the season.

"Earning Player of the Year has been probably the best moment of my entire high school career," said Uelmen. "The time and effort I put into learning everything about the game finally paid off. It wasn't all me, I had a lot of help getting to where I am now. For starters, the biggest influence on me would have to be my boss, Jim Acker. His hours of lessons improved my game more than I ever could have done by myself.

"Secondly, my parents driving me everywhere before I was able to get my license. They always called me crazy when I got them up early

to go golfing or wanted to buy new clubs, but they always supported me. Finally, I'd like to thank my team for always being there, they certainly made golf a lot more enjoyable, and I'm hoping we can build off our conference success with a solid run into the playoffs. Everything about this year has been memorable, and I'm hoping we can end it out with a bang."

Bonduel's Colin Margelofsky fired a round of 90, while Jake Dreyer shot a 91. Reece Stoltenow's 97 and Reed Luepke's 102 rounded out the team's lineup.

Dreyer was the conference's fifth-best golfer for the season, with Luepke in 12th and Stoltenow 13th.

Packers sign Alexander to contract extension

The Green Bay Packers have signed cornerback Jaire Alexander to a contract extension.

General Manager Brian Gutekunst announced the transaction May 18.

"We are very excited to be able to come to an agreement that keeps Jaire in Green Bay," said Gutekunst. "He has consistently performed at a high level during his time with the Packers and we look forward to his

continued growth as both a player and a leader for this team."

Alexander played in 48 games with 46 starts for the Packers in his first four seasons, posting 203 tackles (151 solo), seven tackles for a loss, 1½ sacks, five interceptions, 54 passes defended, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

He earned second-team All-Pro honors from The Associated Press in

2020, becoming the first Green Bay cornerback to earn All-Pro recognition since Charles Woodson in 2011. Alexander was also named to his first Pro Bowl in 2020, joining Herb Adderley (1963) and Willie Buchanan (1973) as the only CBs in team history to make the Pro Bowl in their first three seasons in the league.

Alexander, who was selected by the Packers in the first round (No.

18 overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft out of the University of Louisville, was named to the All-Rookie team by the Pro Football Writers of America, just the second Green Bay CB to be honored since 1974 (CB Casey Hayward in 2012).

Alexander led the team in passes defended in each of his first three seasons, highlighted by a career-high 23 passes defended in 2019.

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
