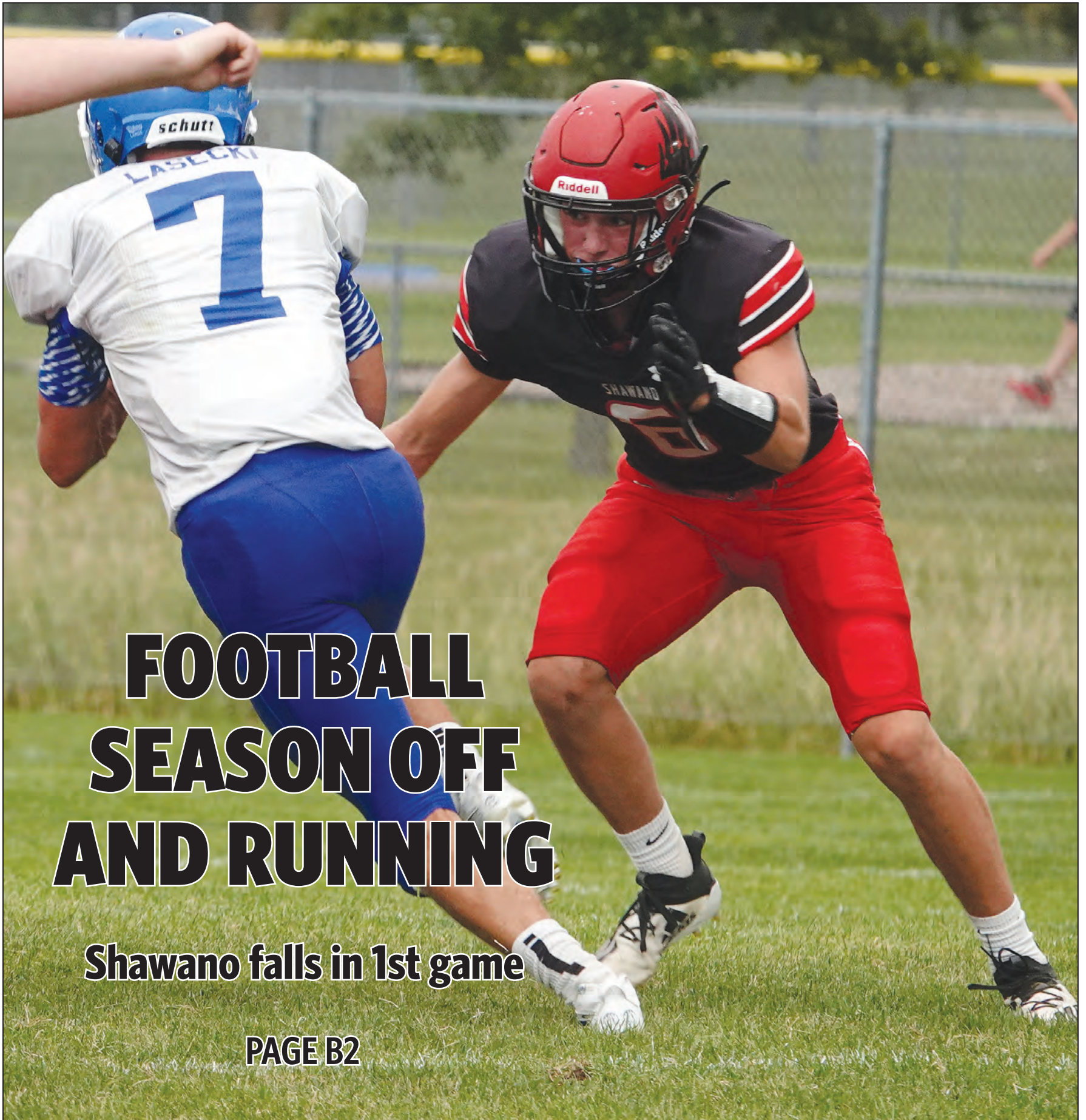

Shawano drops opener to Wrightstown

Little mistakes add up for Hawks

The Shawano Community High School football team fell short in a 20-18 nonconference loss to Wrightstown on Aug. 19 in Shawano.

A turnover near the goal line on its first possession of the game and inability to capitalize on any conversions after scores turned out to be the difference for Shawano in the tightly-contested matchup.

Shawano coach Alan Tomow was proud of the team's effort despite being undermanned — with Ashton Henning, the team's leading receiver from last year, among others, missing due to injuries.

"There were situations that we didn't execute and some mistakes that we made," said Tomow. "We know our margin for error is really thin, and we made a few mistakes at times where we couldn't."

The first mistake came on the first possession of the game. After Shawano marched over 60 yards down the field, a pass from new senior starting quarterback Michael Metcalf-Grassman at the 1-yard line was intercepted.

"I threw it a little bit behind the receiver, I probably should have just tucked it and run it in — I think I had an angle," said Metcalf-Grassman. "Wasn't a great decision. Can't do that at the goal line, we need to score if we are that close. That one's on me."

Wrightstown was able to advance the ball 35 yards before Shawano's defense stiffened and forced a punt after a tackle for loss by senior Jacob Landon.

Shawano's offense took over at its own 45 and was able to work the ball down the field in less than four minutes for the game's first points. The big plays on the drive were a 15-yard run from Metcalf-Grassman and 12-yard pass from Metcalf-Grassman to sophomore Jerzy Bocker.

Junior Lucas Nuthals powered in from three yards out to cap the drive, but the point after try was no good.

Wrightstown was moving the ball down the field when heavy rains followed by lightning hit the area,

forcing a roughly hourlong delay.

The Tigers converted a big fourth down when play resumed and tied the game up a couple plays later.

After forcing a Shawano punt, Wrightstown appeared poised to score before the half, but a backward pass was scooped up by senior Adam Kunderinger and returned 94 yards to instead put Shawano up 12-6 at halftime.

"Coach (Ron) Schmalz, his saying, scoop and score — I didn't hear any whistles, ball was on the ground, picked it up, scoop it, run it back to the end zone for a touchdown," said Kunderinger on the play.

Wrightstown's run-heavy offense opened the second half with a five-plus minute drive that ended in a score, and after a two-point conversion, the visitors led 14-12.

Shawano went three-and-out on its next drive, but its defense stiffened and forced a punt to get the ball right back.

Taking over at the Wrightstown 47, the Hawks methodically worked the ball down the field before Metcalf-Grassman connected with Landon on an 11-yard score on the

first play of the fourth quarter. The two-point conversion try again failed, leaving the door open for Wrightstown to just need a touchdown to grab the lead.

The Tigers ran 13 plays, all runs, on the ensuing drive, before scoring with five minutes and change remaining.

Needing only a field goal to regain the lead, Shawano looked to be on its way to at least getting that opportunity before a penalty derailed the drive.

Metcalf-Grassman had just hit Bocker for a first down, but a block in the back was called, forcing the Hawks into a third-and-11 play from its own 45. Metcalf-Grassman tried to connect with Landon on a deep pass down the middle of the field on third down, but the ball fell incomplete, and no flag was called despite some contact between Landon and Wrightstown defenders as the ball was coming down.

A fourth-down pass from Metcalf-Grassman to Landon picked up just 10 of the 11 yards Shawano needed, and Wrightstown was able to run the clock out from there to snag the win.

"We definitely learned that we have to be sound in our assignments, especially with a team like Wrightstown that's going to lull you to sleep with the run game," said Landon. "You have to be ready every play for that counter or that little trickery that they run. And then some baseline knowledge, like they weren't going to throw the ball — and when they did, we ended up getting a score off it (Kunderinger's touchdown). I think our guys should have maybe keyed in a little better on that they are gonna run the ball."

Todd Frank notched his first Late Model win of the year. Lucas Hacker took home the extra money after winning the Mighty 4 feature, with it being his fourth win of the year. Jeffery Teske came from 12th to win his sixth IMCA Sport Mod feature of the year, while Kyle Frederick was dominant in winning his third IMCA Stock Car feature.

The IMCA Northern Sport Modified feature hit the track with third generation racer J.J. Vanderloop leading

ing lap one. Vanderloop quickly began to pull away from the rest of the field as Mike Springborn ran second on the grid. As Vanderloop clicked off laps in the lead, Bryce Clements, Teske and Cory Kemkes began working their way forward in the field.

By lap 10 of the race, Clements had worked to second, while Teske moved to fourth. A caution after lap 13 bunched the field back up.

Vanderloop continued to lead, but Clements was able to stay with him. Teske went to the inside of Springborn for third on lap 14.

Badgers seek to reclaim status as Big Ten contenders

Wisconsin used to make trips to the Big Ten Championship Game a nearly annual excursion.

Not anymore.

After playing in five of the first seven Big Ten championship games, the Badgers have made it to Indianapolis just once in the last four years. They blew a chance to get there last year by losing at Minnesota in their regular-season finale.

That gives them extra incentive as they enter this season a Western Division favorite once again. The 18th-ranked Badgers would prefer to go a step beyond that.

"The goal is to win the Big Ten, obviously," running back Braelon Allen said. "It hasn't been done in 10 years. That's definitely the main focus and something we harped on all summer long, our desire to be in Indianapolis and bring home a Big Ten championship."

Wisconsin will need consistency, which the Badgers lacked a year ago.

They lost three of their first four

games before winning seven straight once Allen grabbed a featured role. Then their offense sputtered at Minnesota before a Las Vegas Bowl victory over Arizona State.

Wisconsin will try to produce a faster start with plenty of new faces.

Coach Paul Chryst brought in former Baltimore Ravens tight ends coach Bobby Engram as offensive coordinator. On defense, the Badgers must replace eight of the top 10 tacklers from a unit that allowed the fewest yards per game and yards per play of any Football Bowl Subdivision team last season.

The defense's inexperience means the offense must perform better.

Allen rushed for 1,268 yards and 12 touchdowns as a freshman. He benefits from the return of Chez Mellusi, who ran for 815 yards in nine games last season before tearing his anterior cruciate ligament.

Mellusi could only watch last year as Wisconsin struggled at Minnesota when Allen was held in check.

"I was sitting on the couch," Mellusi said. "I was at home watching that game. So it was very difficult for me.

It was hard. Not even just me, I feel everyone on this team is going to do everything they can to make sure that doesn't happen again."

Mertz back at QB

Graham Mertz enters his third season as Wisconsin's starting quarterback realizing he must get steadier.

Mertz owns a 13-7 record as a starter. He has a combined 16 touchdown passes and four interceptions in the 13 wins. In the losses, he threw 12 interceptions and three touchdown passes.

He will be working with new wideouts. Chimere Dike is the only returning Badger who had more than 86 yards receiving last season.

Herbig's return

Although Wisconsin must reload on defense, the Badgers return their 2021 sack leader.

Outside linebacker Nick Herbig had nine sacks as well as 14½ tackles for loss last season.

Transfers in secondary

Wisconsin's defensive backfield

includes plenty of proven players who got their experience at other schools.

The Badgers added cornerbacks Just Clark (Toledo), Cedrick Dort (Kentucky) and Jay Shaw (UCLA) plus safety Kamo'I Latu (Utah).

New LB coach

Chryst brought in Mark D'Onofrio this summer to replace Bill Sheridan as inside linebackers coach. D'Onofrio hadn't coached since 2018 but is a former defensive coordinator at Temple, Miami and Houston.

Sheridan joined Wisconsin's staff in February after spending two years as Air Force's defensive line coach, but he resigned less than three months later. The NCAA is investigating Sheridan and three other former Air Force assistants for potential rules violations.

Bob Bostad, who coached Wisconsin's inside linebackers last season, is back to his old position as offensive line coach. Bostad previously coached Wisconsin's offensive line from 2008-11.

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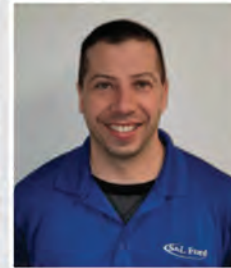

LaFleur impressed by Love in win over Saints

Coach speaks on development of several young players

Rookies and younger Green Bay Packers' players were at the forefront as the Packers beat the New Orleans Saints 20-10 in both team's second preseason game on Aug. 19 at Lambeau Field in Green Bay.

Second-string quarterback Jordan Love played a major portion of the game for the Packers, recording 113 yards and one touchdown. Third-string quarterback Danny Etling provided the highlight of the night though as the quarterback ran in a 51-yard touchdown with 8:29 left in the fourth quarter. Etling's rush proved to be the game-sealer, as Green Bay kept New Orleans out of the end zone for the remainder of the game.

Green Bay Packers head coach Matt LaFleur spoke on Love's development after the game, as well as his impression of the young quarterback in the game.

"I thought that there was a lot of good," said LaFleur. "I saw a guy that was making off-schedule plays and running around — there was some times where we did not have great protection. He stood in the pocket and was throwing on rhythm."

On an early play in the first quarter, instead of throwing a pass, Love instead tucked the ball and ran for a first down. LaFleur showed praise for Love as he continues to develop and make the right play, especially in a situation like that.

"That is something that is a fine line in terms of how you coach it," said LaFleur. "They brought pressure on that play and I couldn't tell how hard (New Orleans') safety came down on our slot receiver. Jordan was decisive and that is the big thing. I see a much more decisive player out there. That will lead to a much more effective player."

Speaking on his own development, Love said that he feels much better this season, compared to seasons past.

"I feel confident and more comfortable back there," said Love. "I think that just comes with getting more reps and getting more plays."

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In terms of Love's decisiveness, he said that that skill is extremely important when it comes to playing quarterback.

"I think for me, I have gotten more comfortable being decisive and letting it rip," said Love. "I think I have been definitely taking steps there."

To go along with talking about Love, LaFleur also said that he was disappointed in the number of drops by receivers over the course of the game.

"Unfortunately, we had too many drops — I think we had at least five or so on offense," said LaFleur.

"He made some nice runs and one thing that you see from him quite frequently in practice is that he has good hands. I think a lot of it for our third running back is coming on special teams."

After Etling's run, LaFleur showed praise for the quarterback and com-

plimented their relationship.

"First of all, he is just so much fun to be around — he's got a great personality and fits in well with all of the guys," said LaFleur. "And he is a talented guy, he is a very good athlete. That (run) was something that was not called, but he saw the safety barrel down and close in, so he just pulled it and went. I think Danny has done a lot of great things. He is making our decision very difficult."

On the defensive side of the ball, LaFleur pointed to safety Micah Abernathy, linebacker Isaiah McDuffie and defensive back Shemar Jean-Charles as players who stood out immediately to him.

"I think knowledge of the game is where he has really grown," said LaFleur, when speaking on McDuffie's development. "You definitely feel his presence on the field and that is what we need from him."
