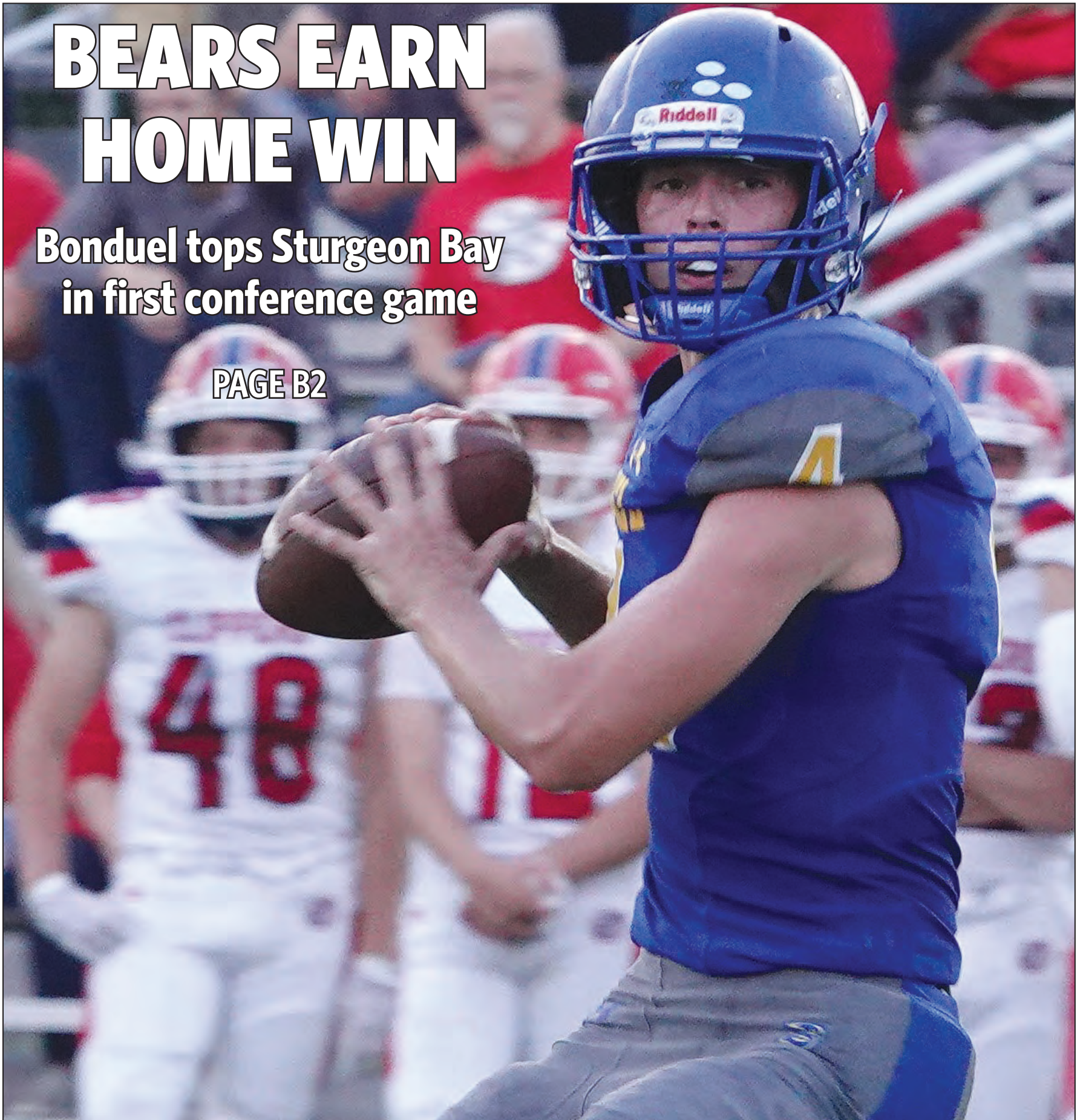

Bears coast to conference win over Clippers

Bonduel's Weier tallies 3 total TDs

The Bonduel High School football team opened Packerland Conference play in a big way, trouncing Sturgeon Bay 41-7 on Sept. 2 in Bonduel.

Bonduel scored five first-half touchdowns and stifled Sturgeon Bay's offense for most of the contest. The Bears' offensive attack was a balanced one, while several Bears made big defensive plays.

"This week, the focus was to get those missing pieces (that the team lacked in a tight loss to Coleman a week prior) and have every play be the play we wanted it to be," said Bonduel quarterback Noah Weier. "Obviously, tonight we didn't a perfect game by any means, but I think we focused enough where we could beat this team in this fashion."

"Our scout team gave us a very good look, so we wanted to get them an opportunity to play. It's a great way to start the conference out."

Sturgeon Bay started the game with the ball, but it was Bonduel that made an early statement. On the first play of the game, Judah Griesbach broke through for a sack. Three plays later, the Bears' offense took over from midfield after a punt.

Bonduel scored on its first drive behind its rushing attack. Louis Hrabik did most of the heavy lifting on the drive before Gaven Vance picked up the final 23 yards, including an 11-yard score.

Sturgeon Bay was moving the ball on its second drive before Hrabik forced a fumble that Weier scooped up.

On the first play of the ensuing drive, Weier found Vance for a 30-yard gain, with Vance making an acrobatic catch. Weier later capped off the drive with a touchdown run from nine yards out on a fourth-and-two play.

"I think we know we're a two-dimensional team, we can run, we can pass," said Weier of the offense. "That starts at the offensive line. They're blocking good for us, and

I think we have the specialists that can do it. When we get time like we have been, we're a tough team to beat."

Bonduel's defense continued its strong showing with another three-and-out on the next drive, with Jeffrey Campos finishing off a sack on third down after Griesbach applied initial pressure.

After another long, balanced drive, Hrabik scored from three yards out to make it 22-0 early in the second quarter.

The visiting Clippers worked into Bears' territory on the next drive, but Bonduel's defense eventually stiffened and forced a turnover on downs.

"Our DBs (defensive backs) tonight, I mean Josiah (Basten), he played a good game. We emphasized that because we knew they were a passing team, they are a spread team," said Vance. "We threw our DBs a little bit back and widened out our outside linebackers a little bit. Whenever they would go outside, we'd shove them inside toward our middle linebackers and then clamp them up on DBs in the back."

Bonduel didn't score on its next offensive possession, but got a big boost from Basten after that. Basten first made a leaping interception and returned the ball to the Bonduel 22-yard line. Three plays later, Weier scored from eight yards out.

Basten had a big punt return on the next drive, getting the ball to the Bonduel 30-yard line. The first offensive play for Bonduel after that was a 30-yard touchdown pass from Weier to Vance.

Basten downplayed his two big plays, instead choosing to mention the team as a whole.

"Our coaches came up with a gameplan and each one of these guys are great guys and we just came out and executed that obviously," said Basten. "I had some big plays, but a bunch of other guys had some big plays. It's a team game and we rallied together, you know, look at the score."

Bonduel finished the half a point short of starting the running clock and had trouble getting to the 35-point threshold in the second half. Bonduel's offense went on two long drives but came up with no points after two fumbles.

Bonduel's Karter Schroeder intercepted a pass after a long Sturgeon Bay drive, and Dylan Hillsberg recovered a fumble on another drive in the fourth quarter.

Benjamin Letter broke the long scoreless streak in the second half with a 34-yard rushing touchdown for the Bears.

The only question remaining was if Sturgeon Bay would be able to score late, which it did on a rushing touchdown with under 20 seconds to play.

Hudl will power the WIAC streaming network for the next three years.

"The conference is thrilled to partner with Hudl for the WIAC Network. Anyone interested in watching WIAC action will now have one location to access all of our streamed events," said WIAC Commissioner Danielle Harris.

In addition to advanced distribution technology and streaming apps, the WIAC and its member schools

will utilize Hudl's Production Truck software to produce and stream broadcasts. Production Truck will allow schools and the conference to insert graphics and produce their broadcasts professionally and easily.

"We're proud of being able to help schools bring their games to where their fans are," said Ben Kant, head of streaming at Hudl. "We believe in making every moment count, and easy-to-use livestreaming cre-

ates more visibility for athletes and schools, no matter where or when they play."

The WIAC Network is available and will provide fans the ability to watch all contests from around the conference via a custom network website, mobile apps (iOS and Android) and Apple TV. Additional streaming TV devices, including Android TV, Amazon Fire TV and Roku will be available soon.

Lena outlasts Gillett in conference battle

Wildcats win in 5 sets

A Marinette & Oconto Conference volleyball match between Gillett and Lena on Aug. 30 in Gillett had all the makings of an epic battle right from the first point.

The match turned into just that, with Lena emerging with a 26-24, 17-25, 25-16, 24-26, 15-12 win.

After the two conference foes split the first 22 points of the match, Gillett pulled ahead 17-12 with Halle Fisher scoring a couple points as Madison VanHaren served.

Lena slowly crept back and tied it at 22 on a kill from Natalie McNurlen, only for Gillett's Hailey Elsner to post back-to-back kills to put the hosts within a point of taking the set. The visiting Wildcats got two straight kills to tie it before two Gillett attacks went long, helping Lena steal the set.

The comeback in set one turned out to be big for Lena, as Gillett controlled set two.

The Tigers scored the first five points, with Mia Soper and Fisher each scoring for the team as Grace Baer served.

Despite some fight from Lena, Gillett eventually worked the lead up to nine. Much like set one, the Wildcats made a late surge to get back in it, but some strong serves from Reece Franti helped the Tigers end the set on a 4-0 run.

Just when it looked like Gillett had taken over, Lena found another gear.

"As soon as we started hitting and we were on, the energy is up and everybody is talking," said McNurlen, who led Lena with 16 attack kills. "It's a lot more fun to play the game when everybody is having fun."

Gillett tallied the first three points in set three and five of the first six points before Lena took over. With Claire Brooks serving and McNurlen scoring several times, the Wildcats rattled off nine straight points to go up 10-5.

The Tigers got within three points on a couple of occasions, but the Wildcats scored the final six points of the set to pull away. Brooks was again serving and tallied a few of her match-high 10 aces on the big run.

"We talked more. We had more energy, and I think everyone picked

it up because we were down and we knew we had to get up," said Lena's Alabama Lambert, on the team's more consistent play in the last few sets.

Set four was another back-and-forth slugfest between the teams. The teams were within a point or two for most of the set until Peyton Dorow served a couple aces to put Lena up 19-16. After a timeout, Gillett won the next four points as Fisher served.

The teams traded points over the next couple serves. Lena led 23-21 before Gillett pulled ahead 24-23. A serving error tied the match, but an error from Lena followed by an ace from Cilena Guns gave Gillett the set win and tied the match.

For the first time all match, Lena was the team that pulled ahead early, which is especially huge in a 15-point fifth set. A trio of Gillett errors put Lena up 7-4 and eventually forced a

timeout from the hosts when it was a 9-6 Lena lead.

Points from Brooks and Dorow put Lena ahead 13-8 but, fittingly for the way the rest of the match went, Gillett worked back into things. A point from Soper, ace from Fisher and Lena error brought the Tigers within a point, 13-12.

Lena was finally able to finish off the marathon match with a kill from Brooks and well-placed tip from McNurlen for the final point.

"We've doing a really good job of backing each other up. We got our tips, we got our sets, and we need to keep on serving," said McNurlen, who added communication is atop Lena's things to improve on.

Behind McNurlen's big match, Dorow finished with seven attack kills for the Wildcats. Makynna Herald set up the team's hitters, posting 26 assists. Lambert contributed six digs.

Fisher attributed Gillett's up-and-down play in the match to not communicating well.

"It all depends on our communication," said Fisher, who tallied 12 kills and 10 digs. "Some days we get down on ourselves, and then we stop talking. It's all about talking; we've got to get better with communication."

Fisher believes the team can still look at the match as a positive despite the loss.

"We fought hard. We had good hits. We had good digs and stuff. We just got to figure out how to finish the sets," she said.

Elsner contributed nine kills for Gillett, while Guns had 11 digs, five kills and three aces. VanHaren had 18 digs, while Franti had 14. Baer and Soper tallied seven digs each, and Bella Matczak served a team-high six aces.

5 drivers crowned on Shawano Speedway's championship night

Allen and Torchio turn in highlight plays to help Wisconsin rip Illinois State in opener

Mertz has efficient game passing

Wisconsin teammates John Torchio and Braelon Allen created a couple of truly memorable moments in an otherwise forgettable season-opening matchup.

Allen had a 96-yard touchdown scamper for the longest run from scrimmage in program history and Torchio had the school's longest interception return as the 18th-ranked Badgers trounced Championship Sub-division program Illinois State 38-0 on Aug. 4 in Madison.

The two record-setting touchdowns showcased Wisconsin's big-play ability

across its roster.

"You guys saw it tonight," said Allen, who rushed for 148 yards and two touchdowns on 14 carries. "Not even just on the offense. We had the longest interception return for a touchdown as well. I think both sides of the ball have explosive playmakers."

Torchio opened the scoring with a 100-yard interception return late in the first quarter after Illinois State had reached the red zone.

According to outside linebacker Nick Herbig, Torchio predicted the interception before the ball was snapped.

"I'm getting lined up, and Torch says, 'Hey, Herbie, I'm about to pick this one,'" said Herbig, who had two of Wisconsin's four sacks. "I'm like, 'All right.' So I'm pass rushing, and I turn around and sure enough, there's Torch with the ball in his hand. He's called the 'Jewelry Thief' for a reason."

Torchio broke the record previously held by Joe Ferguson, who scored on a 99-yard interception return in a 59-10 victory over Utah State in 2017. Wisconsin's longest run from scrimmage before Allen's breakaway was James White's 93-yard burst in a 51-3 triumph over Indiana in 2013.

Illinois State was facing a Big Ten team for the first time since 2016, when the Redbirds won 9-7 at Northwestern on a field goal as time expired.

But the Badgers took the suspense out of this one early.

Illinois State lost its main weapon on offense when running back Cole Mueller was carted off the field on the Redbirds' second series with an injured left leg. Mueller rushed for a team-high 977 yards last season.

"It's pretty serious," Illinois State coach Brock Spack said. "We'll obviously see when we get home, but he's in a cast right now and I don't think it looks good for this year anyways."

The Redbirds did make things interesting for a little while.

Illinois State outgained Wisconsin 78-6 and possessed the ball for over 13½ minutes in the first quarter, but still trailed 7-0 because of Torchio's interception.

The Redbirds faced second-and-10 from the 12 when Minnesota transfer Zack Annexstad attempted to throw across the middle to tight end Tanner Taula, who was standing around the goal line.

Torchio picked off the pass, headed to his right and capitalized on down-field blocks from teammates Max Lofy and Hunter Wohler to make it to the other end zone.

"He forced a ball in where it shouldn't have gone," Spack said. "That's what you learn in a game like this. You make that kind of mistake, a great player on a good football team can turn it into 100 yards the other way."

The Badgers produced their next record-setting play 90 seconds into the second quarter.

Wisconsin had first-and-14 at its own 4 when Allen took a handoff and looked for running room. Illinois State outside linebacker Zeke Vandenburg had his hands on Allen in the backfield, but the 18-year-old sophomore broke

out of his grasp and found a huge hole on the right side of the line.

"I ran into somebody, bounced off him and there was nobody left," Allen said.

Cornerback Franky West tried to chase the ball carrier down and made a diving attempt at an ankle tackle inside the 10, but Allen made it into the right corner of the end zone.

Wisconsin had one other big play aside from the two record-setting touchdowns.

Chimere Dike caught a pass around the line of scrimmage and turned it into a 74-yard gain, the longest completion of third-year starter Graham Mertz's career. Mertz found Dike all alone in the left corner of the end zone three plays later for a 16-yard touchdown.

This marked the first time a Bowl Subdivision team had a run, pass completion and interception return of at least 70 yards in the same game since Middle Tennessee did it in a 51-17 victory over Old Dominion in 2018. No Big Ten team had done it since 2003.

Mertz went 14 of 16 for 219 yards.

"Just trusting my reads, just doing my job," Mertz said.

Wisconsin will next host Washington State on Sept. 10.

Wohler sidelined with leg injury

Wisconsin safety Hunter Wohler will miss at least one game after injuring his left leg in the season-opening victory over Illinois State.

The status report Wisconsin released Sept. 5 ruled Wohler out for the Sept. 10 game with Washington State. Badgers coach Paul Chryst indicated there's a strong possibility the injury will keep Wohler out for a longer period.

"I don't know for sure, but I think it will be a bit of time," Chryst said.

Wohler made his first career start against Illinois State. He played in each of Wisconsin's 13 games last season in a reserve role, finishing with 16 tackles and one sack.

With Wohler unavailable, Wisconsin's depth chart indicates either Utah transfer Kamo'i Latu or Preston Zachman will start at free safety against Washington State. Zachman had an interception in the Illinois State game.
