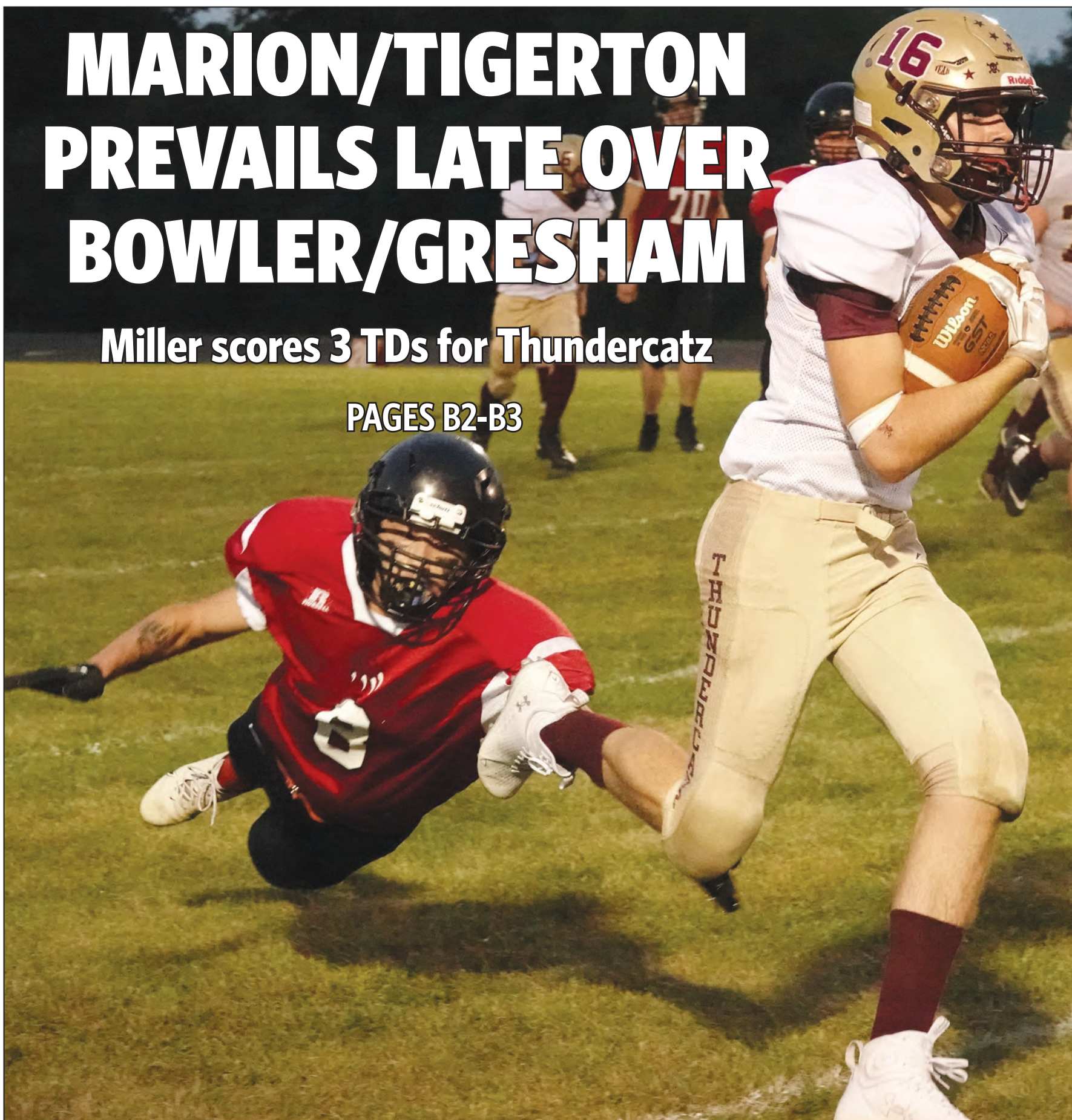

Marion/Tigerton knocks off Bowler/Gresham

Thundercatz rally late after losing lead

The Marion/Tigerton football team lost a two-score lead but rallied late to secure a 28-22 win over Bowler/Gresham in a Central Conference 8-player battle on Sept. 16 in Bowler.

Bowler/Gresham took its first lead of the game with a touchdown early in the fourth quarter. The teams combined for four turnovers in under a two-minute span before Marion/

Tigerton took over at the Bowler/Gresham 32-yard line.

Marion/Tigerton used the running game to move the ball toward the end zone, and were helped out by three penalties from the hosts. On second-and-goal from the 13-yard line, Marion/Tigerton quarterback Braxton Genskow found Parker Miller on a touchdown pass, and after a two-point conversion, the visitors led 28-22.

"It was more or less my teammates," said Genskow of rallying late. "They saw my head go down (after throwing an interception) and all my teammates know I get down on myself a lot. They all came over

to me, gave me my pep talks and it put me in the zone mentally. They prepared me. I came back out, and we executed."

"We don't worry about that last play because we can't change anything about that," said Miller. "We go on, we move forward. That's all we did. We kept our heads high."

Bowler/Gresham's offense worked the ball all the way to the Marion/Tigerton 14-yard line, but four straight incomplete passes ended the team's chance to at least tie it. Marion/Tigerton then picked up a couple first downs to seal up the win.

The touchdown pass from Genskow to Miller was a familiar sight in

the contest, with the duo connecting for three total scores.

After the teams traded three punts to open the game, Genskow threw a screen pass to Miller, and Miller took the ball the distance for a 56-yard touchdown.

The visiting Thundercatz also scored on its next offensive drive, with Ethan Carlson scoring on a 21-yard run.

Bowler/Gresham got back into the game when quarterback Emmitt Kietlinski scrambled for a 47-yard touchdown a little more than halfway through the second quarter.

With under 20 seconds to go in the first half, Genskow and Miller

connected again, this time on an 8-yard slant pass.

"My quarterback," said Miller on what allowed him to score three touchdowns. "He puts the ball in spots and I catch it. It's all on him."

Marion/Tigerton appeared in control, but Bowler/Gresham continued to battle and eventually starting to chip away at its deficit.

The hosts got within six, 20-14, after Kietlinski hit Conner Kaquatosh on a 32-yard touchdown pass. On the drive, Kietlinski converted a fourth-down run to keep the offense on the field.

The momentum continued to swing in the favor of Bowler/Gresham after stopping a fourth-down pass from Marion/Tigerton, giving the hosts the ball at the Thundercatz' 35-yard line.

Kietlinski and Beau Brunner connected for a 20-yard gain before Kietlinski scored his second rushing touchdown of the day. A two-point conversion pass from Brunner to Kietlinski gave the hosts their first lead.

"We could tell in the first half we were there, we just couldn't get that spark," said Kietlinski, adding it was the team's best showing of the year. "So at halftime, we kind of talked about shoring up our blocking on offense and some pass things to try to get a little more time. And on defense, we just wanted to keep busting the gaps and keep stopping their run."

"I was very happy with how we came out there and did it in the second half. We just ended up coming a little bit short."

The string of four turnovers in less than two minutes began with Bowler/Gresham recovering the ball after Marion/Tigerton wasn't able to handle a short kickoff.

On the second play of the Bowler/Gresham drive, the team fumbled the ball over to Marion/Tigerton, with Sam Anhueser recovering. Marion/Tigerton got in just three offensive plays before Kietlinski picked off a pass. The Thundercatz got the ball right back, with Anhueser picking off a pass that was batted around a few times.

Witt-Birn earns big CWC-East win over Bonduel

Chargers rally late to claim 5th set

The Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School volleyball team is seeking a fourth consecutive Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division title this fall.

The Chargers moved a step closer to achieving that goal after pulling off a 25-19, 23-25, 25-16, 16-25, 15-13 win over Bonduel on Sept. 13 in Bonduel.

Things looked bleak for the Chargers in the fifth set after falling behind 7-2, but the visitors rattled off seven straight points to pull ahead. The teams were tied at 10 when Witt-Birn won three straight points, and the team was able to hold off Bonduel late to claim the set.

"We stuck together as a team and we really believed in ourselves in the end," said Witt-Birn's Reese Rogowski. "We didn't quit the whole time so that really shows how we finished it out strong."

In the deciding fifth set, the Chargers leaned on Rogowski and London Metropulos.

Metropulos delivered a kill to start the Chargers' seven-point run. Rogowski then delivered multiple kills as Metropulos provided strong serving, including an ace.

Rogowski added two more kills before Camryn Miller served an ace to help the Chargers pull ahead for good. Metropulos ended the match and a big match with a kill.

"I honestly just think that it was the coverage. We had some really good hits off the outside from Reese Rogowski and I think our passing was a lot better," said Metropulos on how the team came back in the fifth set. "We kind of all came together as a team at the end."

The back-and-forth battle between the two conference foes began right at the start of the match.

Bonduel got off to a quick 4-0 lead behind strong serving from Hailee Thompson before Witt-Birn won the next eight points as Lilly Betry served. Witt-Birn led 11-7 and looked to be in control, but Bonduel went on a 6-0 run as Abby Stoltenow served.

The teams traded points for awhile before Metropulos helped the Chargers take control. She delivered three kills on a 6-1 spurt from the visitors, and Rogowski soon

ended the first set with a kill.

Set two saw Witt-Birn leading in the early going. The Chargers were up 13-9, but the Bears scored six of the next eight points to tie things up. After helping Bonduel get back in the set, Audrey Weier then gave the hosts the lead with a kill.

The teams were neck and neck in the final few points of the set, being tied at 20, 21 and 23. After a Rogowski kill tied things at 23, a Witt-Birn attack landed just out of bounds, and a Bonduel ace secured the set win.

"We knew that they had two really good hitters (Rogowski and Metropulos), so we worked a lot in practice on coverage, so we were prepared for their hitting because that was their powerful point," said Weier. "I think we did really good with that."

The third set saw Witt-Birn jump out to an early 6-1 lead. A couple Metropulos kills and an ace from Allison Linke bumped the lead up to 10, 12-2.

Bonduel battled hard to get back within three points on a couple different occasions, but a couple more Metropulos kills and a run of three straight aces from Betry helped the Chargers pull away.

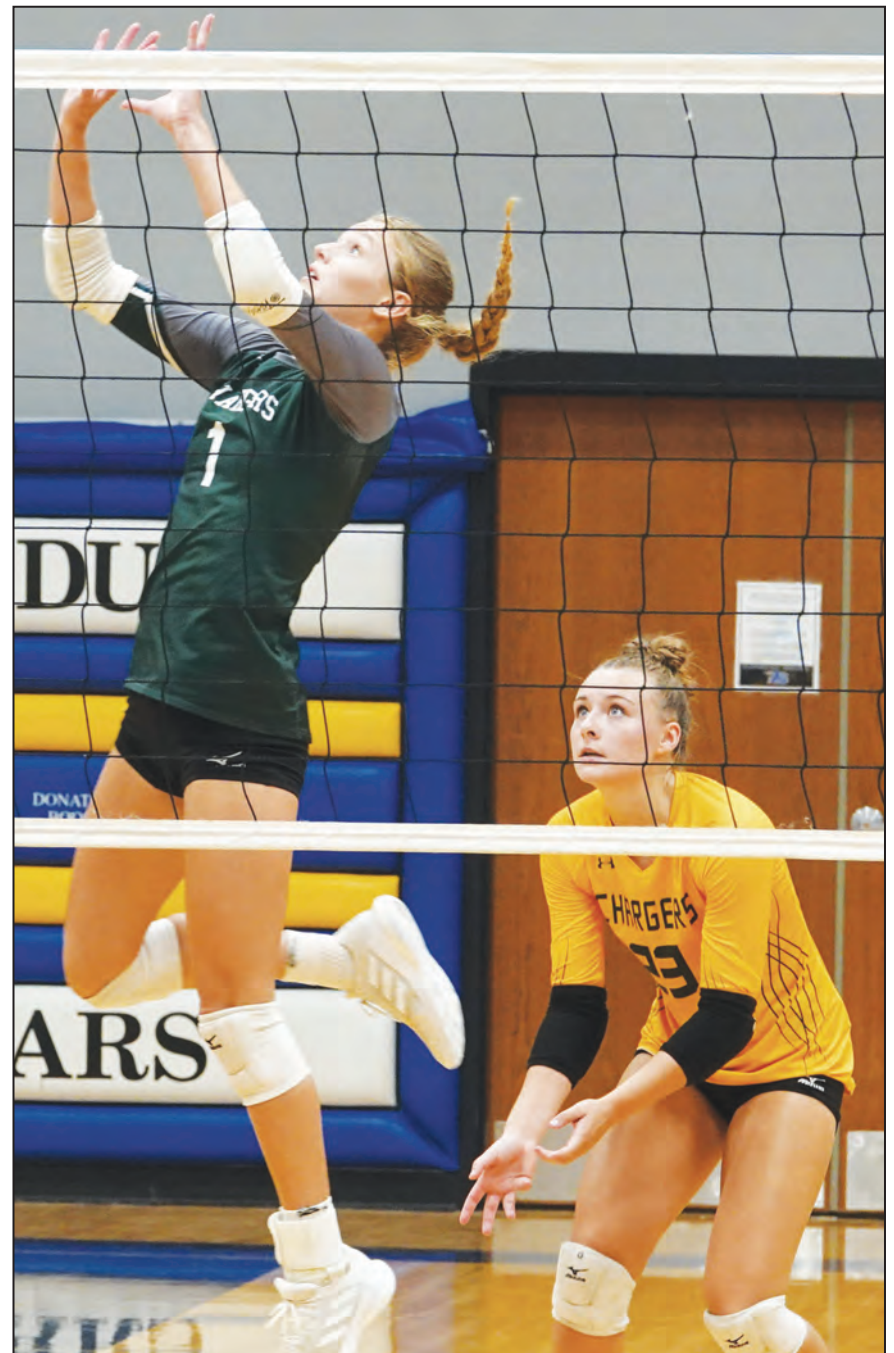
The fourth set was a much tighter battle, with neither team ahead by more than two until Bonduel went on a 5-1 run to go ahead 12-8. Weier and Nakiyah Henning had kills on the run for the Bears.

The Bears held the lead the rest of the set, and finished it off with a 5-1 run. Weier and Henning scored multiple points to help the hosts finish off the set.

Bonduel pulled ahead in the fifth set after winning a couple long volleys and taking advantage of a couple Witt-Birn errors and some strong serving from Stoltenow. Witt-Birn called timeout trailing 7-2 and dug deep to keep their chances of winning a conference title outright in reach.

Rogowski said the team came into the match knowing Bonduel would be one of the biggest obstacles facing the team on its quest to win another CWC-East title, and that helped the team dig deep.

"It shows that we can rally with

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a lot of teams and never give up, even when we're not doing so hot," said Rogowski.

"It was really big," said Metropulos of the conference win, adding that tight matches like the one against Bonduel are her favorite to play in and help the team get closer. "We take every single conference game super seriously. This year it'll be four years as conference champs and we really want that, it'd be awesome for all our seniors, so we're really fighting super hard for it."

Despite coming up short in the

match, Bonduel was focused on learning from the match instead of dwelling on it.

Weier noted the team had several leads in the contest, only to see Witt-Birn rally off several straight points.

"It's really all mental, mental blocks, getting rid of that. Having one good play and holding on to that," said Weier on how the team can limit big runs from opponents. "Putting the first ball down and not giving them free balls, really trying to contain them."

Menominee Indian earns home win over Stockbridge

Eagles win several close sets

The Menominee Indian High School volleyball team earned a nonconference home win over Stockbridge on Sept. 15 in Keshena, winning by scores of 25-14, 25-22, 24-26, 25-22.

The Eagles were able to shake off some slow starts to sets before rallying. Menominee Indian was especially good after calling timeouts and used a couple big runs to come away with a win.

"I think our positive attitude this game and our way of covering," said Lily Boivin on the biggest reasons the team won. "I think that we worked as a team tonight and played our hardest."

The two teams battled back and forth in the first set, eventually splitting the first 20 points. Stockbridge pulled ahead 13-10 before Boivin took over.

She had back-to-back kills, and then after the Eagles tied the match at 14, was serving when the team scored 12 unanswered points. Boivin served a few aces on the run, with Tiarra LaTender and Samantha Wilber also scoring a few points for the hosts.

It was a rough start to the second set for Menominee Indian, falling behind 7-2 because of some errors. Eagles' coach Keso-Kookie Oshkosh called timeout and talked things over with the team, and the team responded by scoring five of the next seven points.

"It was more like motivational speeches and things that inspired us, positive attitudes" said Boivin on what was said during timeouts.

Stockbridge responded to Menominee Indian's run with a 5-0 spurt to go ahead 14-7, but the Eagles continued to battle.

A kill from Lena Waukau and other point off the hands of Samantha Wilber got the Eagles back on track, and the hosts eventually tied the set at 18. Three straight Stockbridge errors gave Menominee Indian the advantage, and then points from LaTender and Kaysha Wilber helped the Eagles seal up the set and go up 2-0 in the match.

"We as a team just need to play our game," said LaTender. "I think sometimes a lot of us just get in our heads when we're out there, so when we take them timeouts, we remember this is our game and we pull through, or try at least. Win or lose, we know we did a good job."

Menominee Indian jumped out to a four-point advantage early in set three, but Stockbridge went on a 7-1 run to go ahead 8-5 and force an Eagles' timeout. Menominee Indian responded by winning five straight points, with strong serving provided by Alexis Zhuckkahosee.

The back-and-forth battle between the teams continued, with Stockbridge tying it back up and then having the teams trade the lead several times.

LaTender and Waukau each delivered kills to get Menominee Indian within a point of taking the set and match, but Stockbridge rattled off four straight points to steal the set.

The Eagles bounced back by leading for a good portion of the fourth set, with the big run being a 6-1 spurt in the middle of the set to go up 16-11.

"I would say the motivation for that is we knew we could do it and we knew that how we were just playing wasn't how we usually play, and we just needed to snap back into our game," said LaTender of bouncing back in set four. "To just take the time to recollect ourselves as a team and know that we have to work as a team to win."

A Kaysha Wilber kill followed by a Stockbridge error made it 22-15 and forced a timeout from the visitors.

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Stockbridge had one final run left, getting within two points a couple times, but an attack error eventually ended the set and match.

"I think our defense helped out a lot," said Shae Caldwell, who served as the primary setter for the Eagles

on the night. "We didn't really communicate that much this game, but we still pulled through in the end, even though we should have beat them in three sets right away."

Gresham/Bowler falls to Northland Lutheran at home

Co-op battles despite being down a player

The Gresham/Bowler boys soccer team dropped a Central Wisconsin Conference match to Northland Lutheran on Sept. 16 in Gresham, falling 5-1.

The outcome was still a good one for the Gresham/Bowler co-op, especially considering the team played with one less player than Northland Lutheran all game.

Northland Lutheran had a majority of the strong offensive attacks in the early going, but Gresham/Bowler scored the first goal.

Cody Mehlberg got the ball deep into Northland Lutheran territory and then found Colby Belongia, who got the ball past the keeper for the first score.

"He passed it up to me, I got past all the defenders and then I shot it into the goal," said Belongia of the play.

Unfortunately for the co-op, the strong start to the match didn't serve as a sign of things to come. A couple minutes after the first goal, Northland Lutheran scored the equalizer.

The visitors' constant attacking led to tons of shots on goal, but Gresham/Bowler goalie Kaidyen Zaitz and the defense in front of him did a solid job at keeping the match tight.

Northland Lutheran took the lead with a goal in the final minutes of the first half.

The visitors then took control with another score early in the second half. As the deficit started to grow for Gresham/Bowler, the effort level began to go down, according to a couple co-op players.

"I feel like once they started scoring their goals, we got demoralized," said Edward Castellanos. "As they kept scoring, we kept getting more and more demoralized. So we need to work on that."

While Zaitz and the defense were able to fend off several attacks, on one of the few occasions the group did not, Northland Lutheran took advantage for its fourth goal.

Gresham/Bowler was able to push the ball into Northland Lutheran's side of the field a couple times late in the match, with Castellanos getting a few cracks at scores, but the visitors' goalie was able to turn away the shots.

Eventually, Northland Lutheran netted its fifth goal to finish off the scoring for the match.

Gresham/Bowler interim coach Cory Bougie still walked away from the match pleased at the team's performance, commenting that they played hard.

Only having 10 players, with each needing to play all game, took its toll on the co-op, but the players also didn't use it as an excuse.

"I don't know, with only 10 it's pretty hard, as you'd probably guess," said Zaitz. "I'd say we did pretty good. There were a couple goals I could have saved, but it happens."

"It's hard, because you can't sub out to anybody and get a drink. You have to play all game and you get really tired," said Belongia.

Along with not getting down on themselves after falling behind or giving up goals, Castellanos didn't think there were a ton of things the team really had to clean up.

"We did great but passing, we need to up that a little bit," said Castellanos. "But other than that, I think we did good all the way around."

From the perspective of the goalie, Zaitz said the team needs to a better job of marking up. "There were a lot of times where someone would run through and there'd be no one on them."

Wisconsin routs New Mexico State

Badgers have nearly 600 yards of offense

The Wisconsin Badgers football team bounced back from a loss with a 66-7 rout of New Mexico State on Sept. 17 in Madison.

It was a slow start for the Badgers, who led just 7-0 after a quarter. Wisconsin scored three touchdowns in the first four minutes of the second quarter and finished the quarter with 28 points. Wisconsin added 21 more points in the third quarter and added a

ninth touchdown and field goal in the final quarter.

Wisconsin outgained New Mexico State 595-242. The Badgers passed for 335 yards and had just four passes fall incomplete.

Graham Mertz threw for 251 yards and three touchdowns. He threw two touchdowns to Skyler Bell and a score to Keontez Lewis. Mertz was intercepted once and sacked once.

Backup quarterback Myles Burkett completed four of his five

passes for 84 yards.

Bell finished with four receptions for 108 yards. Dean Engram had three grabs for 63 yards, and Clay Cundiff had two catches for 57 yards.

Running back Braelon Allen scored three touchdowns in the game, but only finished with 86 rushing yards. Isaac Guerendo scored two touchdowns and tallied 77 rushing yards, while Chez Mellusi had a touchdown run and 71 rushing yards.

Outside linebacker C.J. Goetz led the Badgers' defense with six total tackles, including 1½ tackles for losses. Inside linebackers Jake Chaney and

Maema Njongmeta and cornerback Ricardo Hallman each intercepted a pass. Nick Herbig had the lone sack.

Wisconsin's Nate Van Zelst kicked a 27-yard field goal for the final points in the contest.

It was the first time Wisconsin topped 60 points in a game since 2019 and most points since 2014.

Wisconsin opens up Big Ten Conference play on Sept. 24 on the road against Ohio State. The Buckeyes improved to 3-0 on the season after a 77-21 win over Toledo on Sept. 17. Wisconsin has not beaten Ohio State since 2010, with eight straight losses since.

Boys, girls state tournaments relocated to Middleton

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control approved an executive staff recommendation to move the boys and girls state hockey tournaments to Bob Suter's Capitol Ice Arena in Middleton, effective in March 2023, at its September meeting on Sept. 16.

"We are excited about the opportunity to host the upcoming WIAA boys and girls state hockey championships at Bob Suter's Capitol Ice Arena," WIAA Assistant Director LeVar Ridgeway said. "With the move, we look forward to creating a great state championship atmosphere for our student-athletes, coaches and fans in a hockey centric facility."

The WIAA and Bob Suter's

Capitol Ice Arena agreed to a two-year term. Built in 1999, the venue received a multi-million dollar renovation in 2018 that added significant amenities and upgrades. The facility is equipped with two full sheets of ice with seating for 2,611 spectators, a state-of-the-art sound system, scoreboard and a high-definition video board.

The arena also has a media broadcasting booth, eight public locker rooms, six public bathrooms, and one family restroom. It is the current home for the USHL Madison Capitols and Madison Capitols AAA hockey.

"We are thrilled to be hosting the WIAA state tournaments for the

next two years," Bob Suter's Capitol Ice Arena President Ryan Suter said. "We are thankful to the WIAA for entrusting us with this historic event and believe our venue will provide an incredible atmosphere for the players and fans. We look forward to working with the WIAA and the City of Middleton to host this event and crown state champions."

The boys and girls state hockey tournaments are scheduled for Thursday-Saturday, March 2-4. The state tournaments competition time scheduled will be slightly altered to accommodate the change in venue.

"The Wisconsin Hockey Coaches Association is excited about this option for the WIAA state hockey tour-

naments," President Brian Brandt said. "The WIAA and WHCA have worked collaboratively to give the best experience for our athletes and showcase their talents in an exciting environment."

The boys state hockey tournament has been held at the Veterans Memorial Coliseum at the Alliant Energy Center since the inception of the event in 1971. The only exceptions during that span was in 1974 and 1975 when it was held in Green Bay and in 2021 when the state tournament was held in Wisconsin Rapids during the COVID-19 pandemic. The girls state hockey tournament has been held in conjunction with the boys tournament since the sport was added in 2002.

The meeting will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Sept. 28, originating from Northwood Technical College, 2100 Beaser Ave., Ashland. The board will act on items 1-4 and 7-8 as listed on the agenda, which can be found at dnr.wisconsin.gov/About/NRB/2022/Sept.

The public is encouraged to watch the August board meeting on the DNR's YouTube channel (www.youtube.com/watch?v=V-Pp-skgBVk&ab_channel=WIDNRTV).

On Sept. 27, the Wisconsin NRB will tour and/or receive presentations at Saxon Harbor Campground & Marina, Copper Falls State Park and

Kreher Park Pavilion. No action will be taken.

During the September meeting, several items the board will be considering include:

- Preliminary public hearing and comment period for the Statement of Scope for Board Order WA-12-21, for proposed rules affecting chapters NR 600 to 679 to modify and expand universal waste management.
- Preliminary public hearing and comment period for the Statement of Scope for Board Order WA-14-21, for proposed rules affecting chapters NR 660 to 679 related to technical corrections of state hazardous waste regulations.
- Preliminary public hearing and comment period for the Statement of Scope for Board Order WA-11-21, for proposed rules affecting chapters NR 660 to 679 to incorporate federal hazardous waste regulations promulgated since the previous authorization of the Wisconsin hazardous waste

program, relating to updated test methods.

- Adoption of Board Order CF-12-19, proposed rules affecting Chapter NR 162 related to streamlining, updating, and improving Clean Water Fund Program processes and procedures.
